Dynamo World Soccer Tour Underway

The Dynamo World Soccer Tournament Tour is currently on its "Southern Swing." The tour kicked off with a tournament at the exciting Casino Beach and Resort Hotel in Pensacola, Florida on February 18, 19 and 20. The most recent stop on the swing was at Houston, Texas for a \$5,000 event held at the Ramda Inn-Hobby Airport.

Winners in the May 6-8 event were Ronnie Lewis and Mario Garcia of Austin, Texas in Open Doubles; Mark Crowell of Salinas, Kansas in Singles; Tom and Terry Jonas of Balch Springs, Texas in Mixed Doubles; Sandy Robinson and Nelva Miles of Waco in Women's Doubles; Larry Aden and Delby Bryan of Houston in Novice Doubles; and David Ruben and George Garbet of Houston in Consolation Doubles.

Lewis and Garcia recevied \$700 for their Open Doubles win. Other prize money awarded included \$200 for the Mixed Doubles Winners, \$300 for the Singles winner, \$100 for the Novice Doubles winner and \$75 for the winners in Women's and

Consolation Doubles.

The tour came to Houston after the February stop at Pensacola Beach and March and April stops at Birmingham, Alabama and Atlanta, Georgia. The tour's next event is a \$7,500 tournament scheduled for this weekend, May 20-22, at the El Tropicano Hotel in San Antonio.

In that event \$900 will go to the winners of the Open Doubles and \$300 to the winners of the Mixed Doubles. The Singles winner takes home \$450, and the winners of the Women's, Novice and Consolation Doubles take home \$100.

Among the tour's leading players so far are Mark Crowell and Ronnie Lewis. Crowell teamed with Marty

Chase to take second in the Open Doubles in Florida and win the Open Doubles in Birmingham. Crowell also took the singles and teamed with Diane Queysen to cop the Mixed Doubles crown in the Alabama meet. In addition to his Houston win (with Garcia), Lewis teamed with David Freguson to win the Open Doubles and with Susan Muhlbach to win the Mixed Doubles at the tour opener in Pensacola

Following the San Antonio tournament, the Dynamo tour has stops scheduled for Irving, Texas (outside Dallas), a \$10,000 tournament, June 17-19; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma (\$5,000), July 8-10; and Kansas City, Missouri (\$7,500), July 29-31.

The "Southern Swing" will close with a tournament in Fenton, Missouri (Outside St. Louis) at which \$19,000 worth of cash and prizes will be offered. Among the prizes will be three Honda Civic automobiles. The St. Louis tournament is scheduled for the Ramada Inn at 800 South Hiway Drive in Fenton on August 26-28.

Dynamo officials have declared themselves pleased with the success of the tournaments held so far.

"The tournament momentum is growing," said John Gillilland, tournament director for the Texasbased company, "and Dynamo is preparing an announcement regarding the second leg of its World Tour.'

It is presently hinted that that "leg" will bring tournaments to the Midwest and Northern states.

Gillilland has also announced plans for the establishment of the World Table Soccer Association, a professional players group. Yearly membership dues are \$15. Included with membership are a card. T-shirt and one year's subscription to FoosNoos.

Boon Richards, Dynamo sales service director, reported to us that sales were brisk in promotional items. "We have, in addition to our present shirts, hats, buckles and patches, introduced special tournament shirts, gloves, hand spray and visors," Richards said.

All tournament play on Dynamo's World Soccer Tour is on the new Dynamo CB model table.

Seeburg Charges BSR Violated Patent Rights

Seeburg Corporation of Delaware, a subsidiary of Seeburg Industries, Inc., announced today that it has filed suit in the United States District Court in Chicago B.S.R. (U.S.A.) Ltd., a manufacturer of phonographs and phonograph parts, claiming the latter company has infringed upon Seeburg patents.

In its complaint Seeburg contends that the B.S.R.'s Accutrac Model 4000 turntable is an infringement on the Seeburg sound-track selection patent and seeks treble damages, legal costs and an injunction halting sales of such turntable by Accutrac.

Also named a defendent in the suit is Playback, Inc., a Chicago-based chain of retail phonograph and audio equipment stores.

Counterfeit Coins a Problem

The use of counterfeit quarters in coin-operated machines is a growing problem, according to Field Service Manager Bernie Powers of Bally Manufacturing Corp. "This is everything from cigarette machines to pinballs," Powers told *Play Meter.*

The problem began on the East Coast, Powers said, but has spread through most of the Midwest, and is now being reported in the West as well. Powers suspects a counterfeit ring of producing the fake quarters in large quantities and selling \$10.00 rolls for from \$2.00 to \$4.00.

The counterfeit coins are expertly done, according to Powers, very close to the real thing. "The coins look like copper but contain other metal alloys," he said. Powers went on to say that he was surprised at how many operators had been

victimized by the false coins, some for significant amounts.

"Bally has tested the counterfeit quarters with its coin-rejection manufacturers in hopes of coming up with a solution," he said, "but that has been unsuccessful thus far."

He suggested that until manufacturers can solve the problem, operators send all such coins collected, with letters of complaint, to their local U.S. Treasury offices. "I have been informed that if enough such complaints are registered, the government will take action," he told us.

Powers noted that he had already registered a complaint through Bally and added that "operators can also contact me if they need any assistance in contacting their local treasury offices. I will be glad to help."



Servicing wall game transmitters is an easy, on-location job if you follow a system of fault diagnosis and repair. Once one determines that it is the transmitter that is probably faulty (if *e.g.*, the game gives credit but doesn't play or plays only intermittently), step number one is to tune the F.M. radio in your service vehicle to the fourth harmonic at 108 MHz. This will enable you to determine the presence of the carrier (R.F.) transmission and the one signal that modulates it.

If you cannot receive a signal from the transmitter, your fault probably lies in the R.F. (Radio Frequency) section. Since the crystal is the most subject to failure due to shock, try replacing *it* first. The crystals used are of standard frequencies for radio controlled models and can often be obtained from hobby shops. This can come in handy if you're stuck with a busted transmitter and no spare crystals.

If a new crystal doesn't fix the problem, examine (and resolder if necessary) the soldered connections on the bottom of the transmitter's printed circuit board. Pay particularly close attention to the antenna connections. Since the antenna also carries the D.C. power for the final R.F. amplifier, the connections must be well soldered. Repeated droppings can cause the antenna connections to crack, and so power to the final amplifier is lost.

If the R.F. section of the transmitter is functioning normally but the audio tone is missing, you will hear a quieting effect on the F.M. radio. This is because the unmodulated signal from the "box" is cutting out the background noise without carrying any audio information of its own. If your transmitter has lost its voice, follow the test procedure outlined in last month's *Update*.

If you service a large number of wall games, always make sure that you carry the following replacement parts. With just these four items, you can repair at least 75 per cent of your transmitters on location! The list is in order of failure rate.

1. Batteries. Use alkaline or, even better, mercury cells. The power curve for mercury batteries is excellent for use in wall game transmitters. They provide steady current and voltage to the very end of their chemical energy and then drop like a rock. Since service calls cost money, don't buy cheap batteries!

2. Crystal. As mentioned before, the major cause of R.F. failure is this little guy. If you carry spare crystals with you, for heaven's sake don't throw them in the box with your heavy tools. Put them somewhere that will protect them from the hard knocks of field service.

3. Switch. The originally equipped switch can be disassembled and cleaned if no replacement is available. Some operators prefer to use an enclosed pushbutton that mounts from the front instead of from the rear. This prevents the player from unscrewing the nut on the top and causing a service call when the button drops inside the box. An enclosed switch will also keep dust and beer from interfering with its operation. One suitable replacement switch is a #914 by Switchcraft. You can get these for about a quarter each at electronics stores.

4. Audio Coil. If the broken wire cannot be found and repaired, unsolder the bad coil and replace it with a new one. (You may have to order this part through your distributor.) If you do replace the audio coil, the new coil will not be tuned and you will have to . . . tune the transmitter!

The tuning procedure is a lot less involved than it might sound. It is, in fact, a lot of fun if you're at all musically inclined. All that is required is a working transmitter of the same type, a hex alignment tool—one is supplied with Motorola monitors, so you surely have one around somewhere—and your F.M. radio.

Start by tuning in the working transmitter on your radio. Note the tone you hear. Next, energize the other transmitter simultaneously with the first. Using the hex alignment tool, rotate the "slug"† in the audio coil until the audio tone of the transmitter being tuned equals that of the working transmitter. This point can be easily identified by an effect known as "zero-beat."

As the two tones approach each other in frequency, they will seem to pulsate at a rate which decreases as they get closer together. This is because the tones "hetrodyne" against each other and produce a third tone which equals the difference of the two. As the difference decreases, this hetrodyne beat slows down until a zero-beat is achieved. At this point you will hear one steady tone and your transmitter will be tuned.

Verify that the two tones are the same by energizing first one transmitter and then the other while listening to the radio.

(*Note:* You might want to try this tuning method with two good transmitters first to familiarize yourself with the procedure. While the process is quite simple, it helps to know what to expect before you start.)

Next month's *Update* Technical Topics will include instructions for a cheapo-cheapo field strength meter that you can build to tune up the R.F. section of the transmitter.

†When returning an old coil, melt the wax with a soldering iron first.

MUSIC PROGRAMMING

Rock Scene Looking Up

I think that now we can all finally stop crying in our beer about the state of rock. Granted there was a very dry period some months ago, but all is changing...and for the best. Everything is going to be all right.

Some months ago, I pointed out that for the last year or so rock music hasn't exactly turned the world on its ear. Now that I think back on this period, it was probably meant to be. It was a transition time, if you will, a period of false starts, false hopes, and, mainly, (for the listener) just lying back, enjoying what was around the best we could.

Throughout all of this, most of us didn't really give up; we simply turned on all of the old rock records we had enjoyed so much prior to the "dry spell." Even today, I still go back and listen to the Jefferson Airplane, Grateful Dead, and the first few Stones lps. And they're terrific. Even though they are almost a decade old. But how many listeners are still into Question Mark and the Mysterians, the Sweet, or even T-Rex? Not too many, I assure you.

For all intents and purposes, categorizing always distorts the truth, but sometimes it is more useful than not. This is especially true in considering the whole field of rock, which is simply too diverse. After all, there's soft rock, hard rock, heavy metal etc., etc.

THEME FROM PICNIC—Gap Manaione/A&M Records 1939

A recent facet of the "nostalgia revival" shows up in the release of this single. I would imagine that you saw the film *Picnic* and without doubt you remember the poignant theme song. Well, this is it, in an updated version.

I wouldn't classify this record as MOR, Jazz or Rock. It is simply very listenable. As such it should appeal to just about anyone who likes music. I realize that that isn't much of an indication of what this record can do for you, but it is the best way to describe it.

Older listeners will enjoy "recalling," and younger ones will be pleasantly surprised. I consider this the "perfect" record.

WILD IN THE STREETS—Garland Jeffreys/A&M Records 1934

Garland has a Bob Seeger type of voice, but much rougher. It is a very "believable" voice, too. One would think that he was, and maybe still is, "Wild in the Streets."

Garland performs this tune with dash and great coloration in his voice. It's the music I don't care for. I think that given the proper material, we could be listening to a star, and maybe we will be in a year or so, after Garland refines his music. Pass this one up, but do watch the man.

What a production number this one is! Strings, horns, back-up voices and sound quality that won't quit. It reminds me a bit of the old Phil Spector "wall-of-sound" records produced in the sixties. As a matter of fact, the energies on this disc would tire an Olympic long distance runner!

Millie is one fine soul singer, and she treats this tune with both seductiveness and gusto. The material itself is strong, and yet gentle. There is truth here.

Millie's romantic approach will not suit every taste, but the joy of her delivery should prove an irresistable attraction.

Although none of these singles are "typical" everyday rock tunes, they do rock. All have the character that would make them high contenders for top 40 radio. Rock on . .
