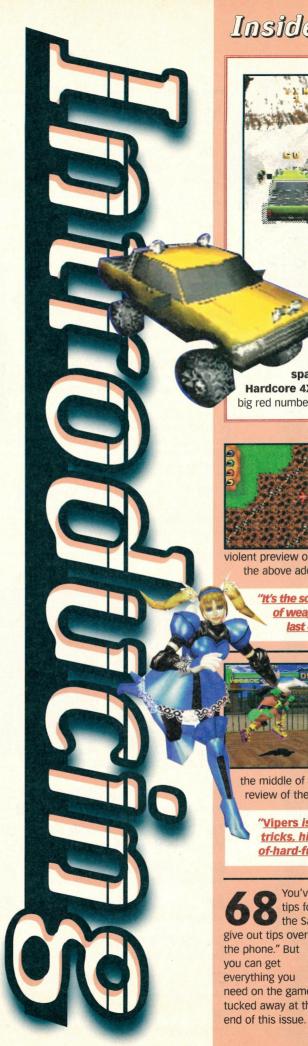

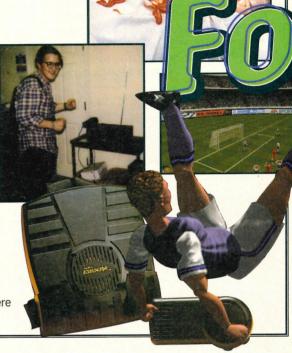

Command thee

Command & Conquer • Saturn • Next March

Command & Conquer may not appear to be an exciting and original strategy game but the truth is that it is just that. Explanation follows...

trategy games may well have all the social grace of a limpet and the interest and apprehension of a fart, but one game has managed to change all that. Command & Conquer from Virgin proved to be one of the most popular games of all time on the PC (PC Gamer magazine readers recently voted it

number one in their alltime top 100) proving that the developers, Westwood have created one of the most

addictive (yet strategic) games ever.

The Saturn version is well into development, and people who know the game have commented that it's going to be the best version yet... by a long way.

The game design is simple. Take the old Mega Drive game Dune 2 as a basis for the gameplay and create everything else around it. (Primarily for

those of you who don't know that game, I'll tell you that Dune 2 was one of the Mega Drive's best selling

games and had you building a base in the middle of nowhere, followed by factories and the like to create a going concern. It was then a case of constructing tanks and weapons before going off to crush your computer-controlled opponents. A bit like an industrial *Populous* then, but better. Much.)

Command and Conquer has you fighting for a valuable mineral called Tiberium and you can choose to be the 'good side' or, if you prefer, you can fly the black flag of the 'Brotherhood of Nod'.

There are over 35 missions, more than 60 minutes of FMV and a sizable amount of information – enough to fill two CDs, anyway.

So, the best PC game ever? Quite possibly. A better version heading for Saturn next spring? Definitely. Most interesting though, is the news that *Sega Power* will be the first Sega mag in the world to take a full look at the game.

Daytona nears completion



hile the British public wait like a group of excitable apes for hard facts on Daytona, we can reveal the verv latest news... as we have it.

At the recent ECTS show in London, Sega were showing a video containing the level these pictures were taken from. Although the game still has a fair way to go to meet it's November deadline, the smoothness of the track and the quality of the graphics were untouchable.

As we leaked exclusively a whole two months ago, Daytona CCE will have three completely new tracks, the highest resolution graphics possible (higher than Sega Rally), the ability to design your own tracks (although how exactly this will work is cloudy at present), loads of new cars, a split-screen two-player option and X-Band/internet compatibility.

X-Band may mean nothing to you at the moment (and it may not even be released in this country), but it's another way to play multi-player games. With this in mind, Sega have also allowed the game to be compatible with the internet link-up, due for release in Europe

While Sega would have to admit that the original Daytona was nothing short of a rush job, the balance is certainly about to be rectified with Daytona USA: Championship Edition. Unfortunately a more complete version was unavailable for a preview, but a more in depth look at the game will appear in our next issue.

Sega were originally planning to release the game in November. However due to it's slow progress, we believe we're more realistically looking at the Christmas period for a UK release.





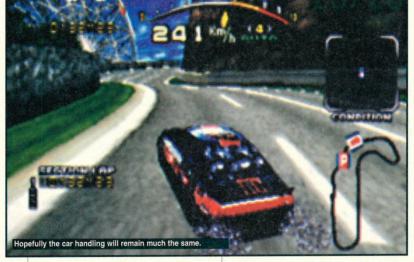

Konami want the game to be as brilliant as we're sure it will be and are just putting the finishing touches to the artificial intelligence. With luck and a strong wind, we should see a review next issue.

- ➤ You wouldn't usually expect there to be a link between pool and buses, but there is. Like BUSES you can hang around for years waiting for a POOL game to turn up and then TWO of the cheeky chaps turn up. BMG are set to release one in the spring of next year and Interplay have their Steve Davis-endorsed affair, which should reach us towards the middle of 1997.
- ➤ A quiet friend close to Sega Power let it slip that he'd seen a running version of Doom on the Saturn and he thought it looked superb. Running easily as smoothly as the PlayStation version and with some all new levels created exclusively by iD themselves the game's being developed by Rage Software (who gave us the excellent Striker). A full preview will surely follow next month.
- ➤ Rumours scuttling over from America seem to lead us to the belief that Psygnosis are thinking about converting *Destruction Derby 2* and *Wipeout XL* onto the Saturn. Although this is just at the rumour stage, we'll be the first to give you any firmer information.

BETTER Rally?

Sega Touring Car Championship Arcade • Later this year



new driving game for the arcades, Sega Touring Car Championship, is cooking in Japan and it's looking pretty amazing. It's not Sega Rally 2 – that should come later – but it's looking every bit as good, if not better!

The game's based around the increasingly popular Touring Car Championships, and involves racing round tracks in souped-up production cars with more than a liberal sprinkling of crashes and collisions. However, the most interesting piece of news regarding is the fact that the game's being developed by a whole new development team set up by Sega Japan. It's called AM Annex and it's made up from a hand-picked band of top programming and designing folk, some of whom have already worked on other top titles such as Sega Rally, and others whom have

been recruited fresh from outside of the company.

Using Sega's Model 2 software development technology, which was also used to produce (among others) Sega Rally and Virtua Fighter 2, AM Annex hopes to create two-and-a-half games a year, and is onto a winner with Touring Car. Kumiko Shioji, graphic designer for the project is clear about her goals for the game "We want the player to be impressed by the game from the first moment they look at it... We're aiming to get very impressive effects. We really want to avoid

having cheaplooking graphics."



Sega's (ahem) track record as far as driving simulations goes is certainly impressive, with Sega Rally, Daytona USA and

Manx TT all being superb games. One of the contributing reasons for this is the attention to detail and the research that goes into them. Touring Car is no exception in this respect, with the research team travelling to Finland to see real touring cars in action. This helped develop their ideas, as did their interviews with the touring car drivers. Ms Shioji adds "I went to Finland and I took pictures in order to recreate backgrounds for the game. I look at real life backgrounds and try to recreate the same atmosphere on the screen."

With this kind of research, as well as manufacturer assistance with the car graphics, (choose from an Alfa Romeo 155 V6 TI, a Vauxhall Calibra V6, an AMG Mercedes or a Toyota Supra GT) Sega Touring Car Championship can't fail to be an amazing game.

As yet there's no confirmation that STCC will get a Saturn conversion, but if it doesn't we'll all be fairly surprised.

Starting with NiGHTS and then continuing with Worldwide Soccer in October, Sega will also be advertising Daytona and Virtua Cop 2 very strongly coming up to Christmas.

Andy Mee, the marketing director at Sega had this comment... "As well as being a new approach for us, the new campaign is bold in terms of software advertising. It will be ground-breaking for us, a move away from our traditional style."

Sad as it many seem, machines win or lose on their image. The Mega Drive beat the SNES because it was marketed in a 'trendier' way. This is what happened with the PlayStation, but fear not, it's certainly not too late. Money maketh sales and Sega are, finally, going about it the right way. Merry Christmas.

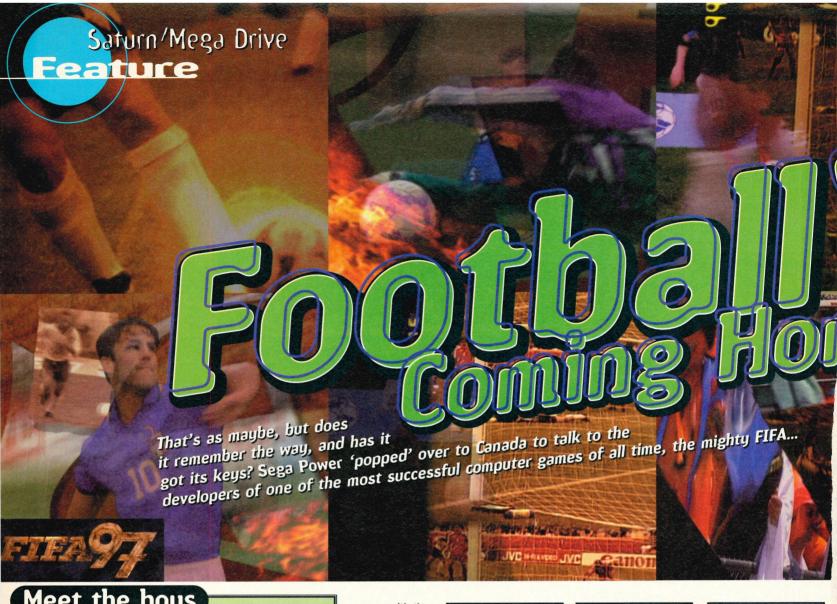

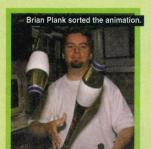

ith the kind of blinding originality that would shame the numerically obsessed namer of

New York streets, Electronic Arts are poised to release yet another version of FIFA, but this time adding the gloriously descriptive '97' to the title.

Over 100 staff at the Vancouver offices of EA Sports, EA's in-house programming team, have been working diligently to create the next generation of football game (I refuse to call it soccer) for you, the punter. Questions must be asked, though. What have they added to FIFA to warrant us all shelling out another £40? Rather than just hypothetically ask that question, we flew to Canada, got over the jet lag, had a quick dip in the pool, and asked Bruce McMillan, FIFA producer, what, exactly, he was playing at.

"This might shock you to hear me say it, but I really love playing Sensible Soccer," he admitted. "It's got great gameplay: easy to pick up but difficult to master. I think we had a good gameplay experience with FIFA '96, but not a great one. Of course, Sensible







doesn't have the whole graphics and sound experience, so we wanted everything to be included in FIFA '97."

Strangely, though, playing a late and stable alpha version of the game, it was the graphics and sound that showed the most obvious improvements. EA have at last moved to full polygon, rendered-on-the-fly players, but flow the 300 different motion captures using a stunning

At the last minute we managed to blag three shots that look remarkably like a Saturn version of the game. The basic Virtual Stadium technology seems to



have remained intact but, as we've mentioned, the players, movement and Al has been completely reworked. Feast your starving eyes on these.

new technique known as Motion

Blending. "In theory it's simple," offers Brian Plank, the software engineer behind the technology. "You can think of it as cross-fading one sound track to another, but working in the world of 3D. The computer looks at the animation of the two moves, running to diving header for instance and interpolates each body part so that the animation is seamless, but it happens the moment you press a button over four or five frames." The effect is

incredible to watch in slow motion, but it's strength is that you don't notice it when you play. Compare this with other motion capture games that introduce a

slight delay after pressing a button so that one animation can end and another start, and you can't help but be impressed.

Arguably graphics and sound are just frilly lace decorations on the FIFA '97 lingerie. The contents must be sufficiently exciting to make you want to play. FIFA's artificial intelligence has been completely rebuilt.

"Last year's AI was really written for the 16-



Bit market although it was subsequently used over all platforms," explains Marc Aubanel, technical producer for FIFA. "We decided that it was time to design a 32-bit specific AI, while finetuning the 16-Bit version for those machines. Every player now understands the physics of the ball, running and passing into space. In fact, the new AI is so advanced that if we moved it over to the Mega drive, it would probably run at only one frame every two or three seconds."

Mark Gipson, Yorkshire-born programmer of the new AI has plenty to add. "Computer players

decide whether to pass to a team mate, shoot or try to pass by, depending on the skills of the other players. They also have a field of vision, and won't know for definite where players are behind them. "We've also completely rehashed the goalies so that they decide whether to run at you, or hang back on the line."

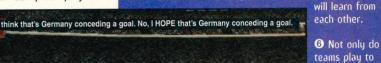
'97 has set itself up as the most advanced football game available, and is a de facto list of features that any new competitors must include. With several weeks of playtesting to go, it's still a little too early to say whether the game will play spectacularly but it does show an incredible amount of promise. Nevertheless, it is FIFA, it is EA, and come the release date on 22nd November it looks set to reclaim its number one

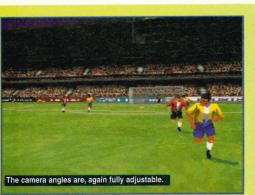

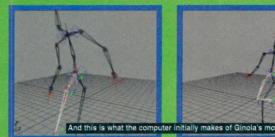

Capture the moment





Motion capture is not a phrase we like to use lightly. We have to from time to time of course, because almost every 3D game released for the Saturn has it in some form or other, but it's become one of those horrible techy, sound-bitey things that us folk at Sega Power simply hate.

What it boils down to, is a method of recording human movement that, when transferred across to the game, is far more

smooth and realistic than sprites or animation could hope to achieve.

First of all a gullible human will cover themselves in specially-coated ping-pong balls and then run, move, dance (whatever) in-between six special cameras. All the balls show up (like girls bras under UV lights in discos) and, via a bank of six monitors (one for each camera), the movements are recorded onto a computer. Then, you build

up the wire-frame skeleton (see the running strip in this very box for clearer information) and whatever you want on top of that - in this case, a footballer.

David Ginola, the Newcastle (at the time of writing) star and French international is the man behind all the players in FIFA '97's movements. Using the Motion Capture technique, his every footballing movement is depicted within the game and to be honest he's over the moon, Brian about it. "It's interesting to see football from another perspective" He told us. "I liked seeing my own movements on TV, it was very pleasing. Obviously, the

game will be greatly improved by this.'

Our next question for big Dave was whether his kids like to play computer games. He told us that his four year old son "sometimes plays the odd game, but he prefers to play outside because it's better for him." We couldn't agree more. "But when he does play games, he understands them more than I do.'

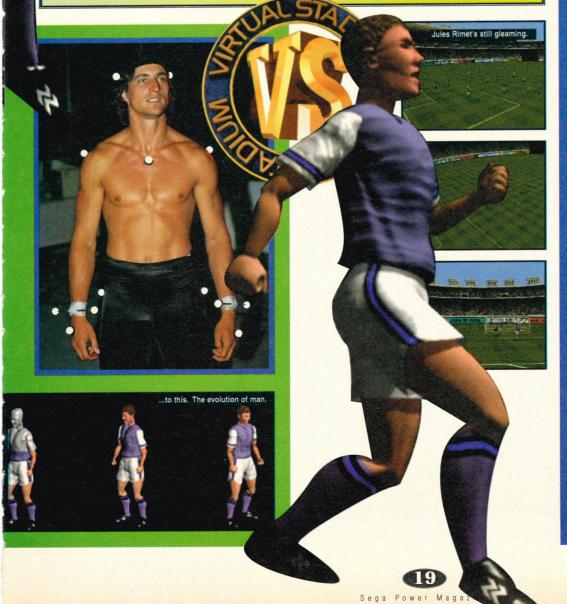

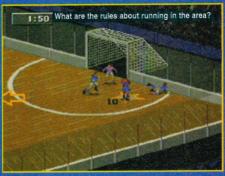

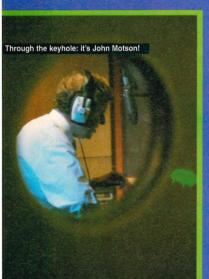

n essential part of any football game (or so it seems nowadays) is the commentary. Fair enough, we've seen some god-awful attempts at it, but it's true to say that it adds a large healthy chunk of atmosphere and FIFA '97 promises to be the best yet. Not only have EA managed to talk John Motson into making a reappearance, but they've also managed to twist the professional arms of Andy Gray and the infamous Des Lynham.

In order to make FIFA '97 seem more like a broadcast, EA realised that there should be a presenter and two commentators. This would allow the commentary team to bounce ideas and criticisms between each other, rather than simply mention who had the ball and what they were doing. The inimitably dry ladies' man Des Lynham could be the only choice as presenter, and this year John Motson has been joined by canny Scot, Andy Gray.

Although a far cry from the



predictable comments of FIFA '96, John and Andy's speech was initially thought to be slightly too distracting, although Chris Taylor, the man responsible for the 1,540 comments and 15,000 recorded player names, insists that the fine tuning is an ongoing process, with an overall style still to be finalised.

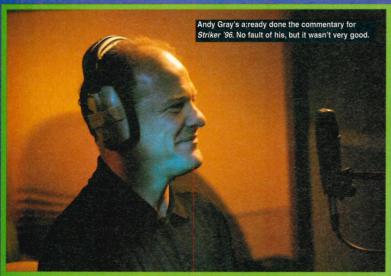
John Motson

John Motson, or 'Motty' as he's affectionately known, is a living legend among football commentators. He's been the BBC's number one commentator for some time now, and takes up the lead commentator's role in FIFA '97. Of course, it's not the first computer game he's appeared in. He was also the commentator for the rather disappointingly playable FIFA '96 (SP 76, 85%), and was pleased with the feedback he received from that. Many fans of the game had complemented him personally, including his proud ten year old son, Frederick.

When asked whether having a second commentator added to the atmosphere of the game, Motty told us

Andy was very enthusiastic about appearing in FIFA '97, especially with John Motson, someone who regularly interviewed him during his playing days. Andy described Motty as "a brilliant commentator" and Des as "a true pro."

This is Andy's second outing in the computer commentary business, after his appearance in the initially good but not as good after you've played it lots, Striker '96. (SP 82 89%)

When asked how commenting on a computer game differs from commenting on the real thing, Andy replied "The beauty is that you can

effects are the same. The

charisma of the players is about the same. Hell, the only reason people like Seve Ballesteros is because (a) he had a slick name for a golfer and (b) he was spontaneous and unpredictable (for a golfer). Spontaneity and unpredictability in a golfer usually just means hitting the ball a bit further off to the left than the next guy.

So, Actua Golf then. Remember what I was

degrees if they want. This rotation is a little jerky which is a pity but the redrawing is 'live'. No resolution is lost, there's no low-res landscape put into place while the Saturn figures out what the hi-res landscape should look like.

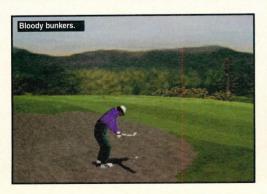

A shoot-'em-up from the old school with plenty to blast. Gives far too many continues and two days of unrestrained violence is all its up to. Two-screen action is worth the admission fee, so too the Arcade Mode but it's still very expensive.

GUN GRIFFON

Sega £45 SP 80 66%

An import-only tank game from Sega. The eight huge levels are spoilt by murky graphics and a time limit that annoys rather than challenges. Your other alternative, Shellshock, doesn't take itself so seriously and is certainly much better fun than this is.

HI-OCTANE

Bullfrog £44.99 SP 74 85%

A futuristic racer with bags of options and tracks. Controls are a mite difficult but while you're getting used to them you'll be entertained by some foot stomping music. There's a leaning towards the shoot-'em-up with armoured floating vehicles taking on all comers. Super smooth graphics but overall, it's not too quick.

INTERNATIONAL VICTORY GOAL

Import £30 SP 78 74%

Another footy game for the Saturn and a rather lame effort concerning itself far too much with the Japanese J

 League. This one has struggled out a bit too late to fend off the challenges from the likes of FIFA and Euro '96 which is a pity.



JOHNNY BAZOOKATONE

US Gold £44.99 SP 77 60%

Visually a treat, Bazookatone is challenging-enough but the gameplay is average if not poor. A real underachiever

KEIO FLYING SQUADRON 2

JVC £44.99 SP 83 80%

The Japanese have a strange sense of humour and Keio is more than enough proof of that. It's a 2D platformer where you play a bunny girl with a hammer running around beating up fish and teddy bears and collecting golden bunnies. It does what it does very well and if you like this sort of thing you won't go wrong.



THE KING OF FIGHTERS '95

Sega £70

The first game to come on cart and CD, a system that eliminates access times. But the game is nothing to write home about - certainly at the lower end of the Saturn 2D beat-'emup spectrum and definitely not worth spending £70.



KING OF SPIRITS

Described enthusiastically as 'the worst console racing game I've ever played' (James) it's hard to get excited about something so duff. There's only ever one other car to race against, the two player mode doesn't work and the cars handle like turds on a skidpan. Terrible.

LAYER SECTION

Taito £49.99 SP 75 79%

A frantic shoot-'em-up so loyal to the arcade version they haven't bothered to take the 'Insert Coin' instruction off. It's also damn near impossible with a joypad but worth the coinage with a chunky arcade joystick. Better than the average import game.

LEGEND OF THOR

Sega £49.99 SP 81 54%

Out on import and thus rather expensive, LoT is another botched attempt at a Saturn RPG. The graphics are risible with no attempt at sprite scaling, no landscape work and no 3D stuff at all. Character interaction is limited, the fighting simplistic and overall it just isn't worth the effort



LOADED

Gremlin £44.99 SP 83 82%

The PlayStation's premium shooter gets a Saturn outing and looks none the worse for wear for it. The violence is well over the top and its fun for a while (especially in two-player mode) but the gameplay is ultimately shallow and can get very dull rather quickly.

When you're buying from any mail order company, it's worth following these Sega Power guidelines:

Make sure there are no hidden costs such as postage and packaging. Find out when you can realistically expect to receive your goods.

- BEWARE companies that do not include their address on their adverts. Also, avoid companies that do not
- BY FAR the best method of payment is by credit card. If ordering goods of more than £100 in total value remember that you are legally entitled to claim compensation from some credit companies if the retailer goes bust. Check your credit card company's policy. You can also try to get extra insurance in advance if you want.
- IF YOU'RE not paying by credit card, pay by cheque. Never send cash and avoid using postal orders.
 KEEP records. If you are buying by credit card, keep a note of the order and ask for an order number. When

- IF YOU are sending a cheque, keep a note of the cheque number, the date and the exact value. Make sure you know the exact name of the mail order company.
- WHEN YOU receive your goods, check them carefully. If anything is missing or faulty, contact the supplier immediately.
- O ALWAYS ORDER from the most recent issue of Sega Power.
- IF A PROBLEM does arise, contact the supplier in the first instance. Calmly and politely tell them your problem. Most problems turn out to be minor hitches or misunderstandings that can easily be resolved. If you think you have a genuine grievance, contact your local Trading Standards Officer. 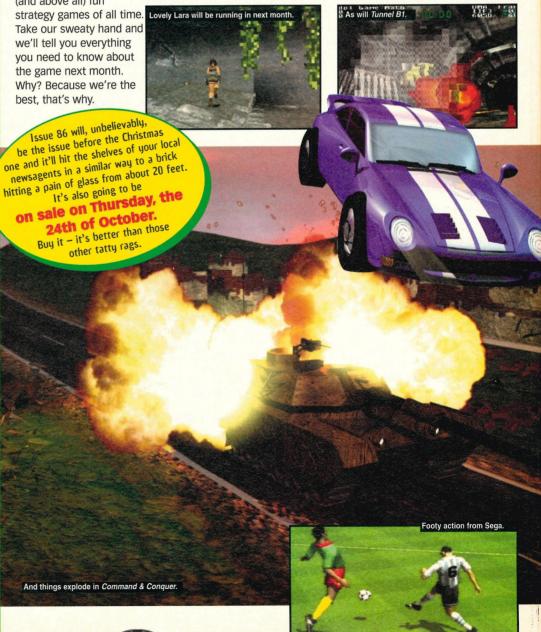

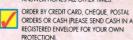
