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Female Acts: Long-Term Fact Of Endurance

Anyone who saw a short-term fad instead of long-term fact in a female artist invasion of the charts about 18 months ago, had better do a re-evaluation of his assessment immediately. Female artists are making an increasingly strong showing on the listings. And we would emphasize that this includes LP sales, which offers a truer test of longevity for an act. In fact, the female leaders of this development a year and a half ago, Carole King, Helen Reddy and Carly Simon, are continuing best-sellers (Carole King has won two straight NARM best-selling awards in a row for her "Tapestry" album, one of the all-time industry sellers).

The latter artists, of course, were in the vanguard of a new female song expression, one that took a women's point-of-view in matters of love and social commentary. In appealing to their "sisters," they created a female market for female recordings, an historic counterpart to the traditional buying pattern of the strength of male singers among female buyers.

While there remains a strong women's lib point of view—as witness Helen Reddy's Grammy winning "I Am Woman" this year—it's apparent that female performers are winning female

fans by not necessarily engaging in social politics. Roberta Flack's "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face"—this year's Grammy Record of the Year—is, for example, a poignant love-found expression.

Besides the aforementioned, the charts, both singles and albums, are alive with female voices, such as Anne Murray, Aretha Franklin, Diana Ross, Joni Mitchell, Gladys Knight, Judy Collins, Bette Midler, Karen Carpenter, Vicki Lawrence, Melanie, Laura Nyro, Barbara Mason, Donna Fargo, among others. Even the late Billie Holiday is enjoying a revival, thanks to Diana Ross' film bio, "Lady Sings the Blues."

Whatever the ladies are singing—and they're singing of things as varied as the above list of performers—they are attracting a major share of the sales pie today, and have, in essence, uncovered a "new" market as they largely appeal to the female consumer.

Born of social change in which women can communicate their passions to other women, wryly or with traditional warmth of expression, this parade of star female recording acts stretches as far as the eye can see, or any viewer of the musical scene can determine.

If it were necessary to epitomize the British progressive rock music movement of the late '60's and early '70's, Pink Floyd would undoubtedly be one of the first examples to be cited. Their latest Harvest/Capitol LP, "Dark Side Of The Moon", already high on the charts after only two weeks, was released to coincide with the group's current American tour which has been playing to sold out houses including the 1:00 AM Radio City Music Hall concert in New York. Previous to their "Dark Side Of The Moon" LP, Pink Floyd has had nine albums released in America.

Guilty Pleas In Brooklyn Pirate Raid

NEW YORK — Two men arrested in Brooklyn last Dec. in police raids that uncovered a cache of 50,000 pirated pre-recorded tapes along with large quantities of porno films, books and magazines, pleaded guilty to different charges before Judge Larry M. Vetrano in Kings County Criminal Court last week.

Bernard Damsky, 72, identified as the owner of Vogue Record Sales, a storefront warehouse where the bulk of the pirates tapes were uncovered, pleaded guilty to possession of criminal property in the second degree, a felony. Benjamin Lichtman, 61, an employee, pleaded guilty to violating Section 561 of the General Business Law (the Anti-Piracy statute), a misdemeanor. Judge Vetrano set no date for sentencing.

Wounded Knee Motown Single

HOLLYWOOD—Senators, congressmen, and all national news media will soon be receiving a message from an American Indian, Tommy Bee, via a 45 dressed in a specially prepared sleeve that will bare the message words in the form of a letter closing with, "You haven't listened to us in the past. Now that we've put it to music, will you listen to us now?" The letter is signed by Bee who is a member of XIT, an Indian rock group on Motown's Rare Earth label. Motown is sending out over 7,000 of these records, strictly as a public service announcement in connection with the Wounded Knee.

The message is off XIT's LP "Plight of the Redman," which according to Motown's vp of national sales, Phil Jones, originally sold around 30,000 copies.

MCA (Canada) Completes Total Branch Operation

UNIVERSAL CITY — MCA Records (Canada) has become a total branch operation across Canada. Up to this point, MCA had branches in Ontario and Quebec only, with distributors servicing western Canada and the Atlantic provinces. The announcement was made by Richard Bibby, vice president and national sales manager.

Sales offices have been set up in Vancouver and Winnipeg, with a stocking branch located in Calgary. This branch will service the four western provinces. The Atlantic provinces will be serviced direct from the company's central warehouse in Cornwall, which now ships Ontario and Quebec on a direct basis.

Cite Reasoning

In making the announcement Bibby stated, "The decision to go direct terminates a relationship with some distributors that goes back 30 years. However, I felt that to realize our goals and our growth in 1973, this decision had to be made. We have increased upon the number of people involved in sales and promotion. Promotion was one area in which I felt

'Sawyer' Is 3rd Shermans' Film At Radio City In Row

NEW YORK — Here's something for songwriters' Richard and Robert Sherman's record books:

They are the first composers to be represented at Radio City Music Hall with three straight film musicals. Following an animated adaptation of E. B. White's classic "Charlotte's Web," Radio City began last week (15) to showcase "Tom Sawyer," for which the brother team has not only penned the songs, but, for the first time, the screen play as well. And by summer, Radio City will depart from its usual practice of first-run-only by reviving "Mary Poppins," one of the all-time film successes, which includes the pair's Academy Award-winning song, "Chim-Chim-Cheree." "Poppins" was first presented by Radio City in 1964. Interestingly, all three films come from different film distributors. "Charlotte's Web" is Arthur Jacobs' Reader's Digest production through United Artists, and "Mary Poppins" was produced and distributed by Walt Disney Productions.

Come May 1974, the Shermans should have yet another Radio City-showcased property. For Reader's Digest—UA, they're preparing a musical version of another Mark Twain classic, "Huckleberry Finn."

In all, 14 films featuring music by the Sherman's have been presented at Radio City over the last decade.

Governor Signs Utah Pirate Bill

NEW YORK — Utah has become the 11th state to enact legislation against the making and selling of unauthorized recordings. Gov. Calvin L. Rampton signed the bill last week, making the acts a misdemeanor. The other states with anti-piracy laws include New York, California, Texas, Tennessee, Arizona, Arkansas, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, and Washington. 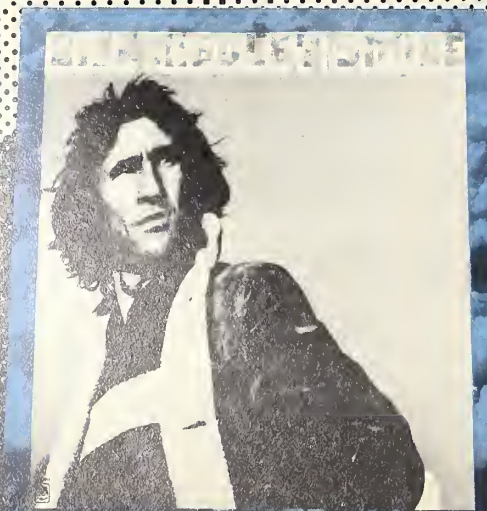

Whitfield To Cut Rare Earth

HOLLYWOOD — Norman Whitfield, with key production credits that include the Temptations and The Undisputed Truth, is currently producing Rare Earth. The new Album is slated for an April release, with a single, entitled "Ma", set for immediate release.

Whitfield is responsible for three Grammy Awards this year in connection with his smash single, "Papa Was a Rollin' Stone," by The Temptations. It was recognized in several categories, including Best R&B Vocal Performance by a Duo, Group or Chorus, Best R&B Instrumental, and Best Rhythm and Blues Song.

His most recent effort for the Temptations is their current single, "Masterpiece," with an album of the same name on Gordy Records, distributed by Motown. The single and the album both have strong chart positions with bullets.

RCA Freshens Up 'Sound Of Music' For Pic Revival

NEW YORK — RCA Records will launch a major new campaign on the album, "The Sound of Music," which at 12 million sales world-wide is considered the largest selling album in history.

The album, first released eight years ago, is the soundtrack of the 20th Century Fox motion picture version of the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical, and RCA is tying its campaign into the re-issue of the motion picture, which itself is one of three biggest grossing films of all-time.

Rocco Laginestra, president of RCA Records, said: "I understand that 20th Century Fox expects this first re-issue of the film as the nation's Easter attraction to be seen by a new audience of as many as 30 million persons. Based on our having sold more than six million copies of the album in this country alone during its initial release and the not-unreasonable assumption that a great many of the new viewers of the movie will want the soundtrack, we feel this album can reach a multitude of new buyers this spring."

New Cover

The new cover being prepared by RCA will include special artwork of the several Oscars won by the film from the National Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. The soundtrack also won the 1965 Grammy as Best Soundtrack of the Year.

The star of the soundtrack (and film) is Julie Andrews. The musical by Richard Rodgers and the late Oscar Hammerstein, with Rodgers adding several new songs for the film, is based on the Austrian Trapp family and its experiences in the early days of the rise of Hitler in Germany. When the family left Austria and took refuge in the free world, it became the Trapp Family Singers.

In speaking of RCA's plans for advertising, promo and publicity tied in with the newest "Sound of Music" go-round, Laginestra said: "This album is the champion of champions, and we are going to treat it in this manner right down the line."

Deny Sale Of Mega Records

Composers are, respectively, Stephen Sondheim, Stephen Schwartz, Micki Grant and Peter Link.

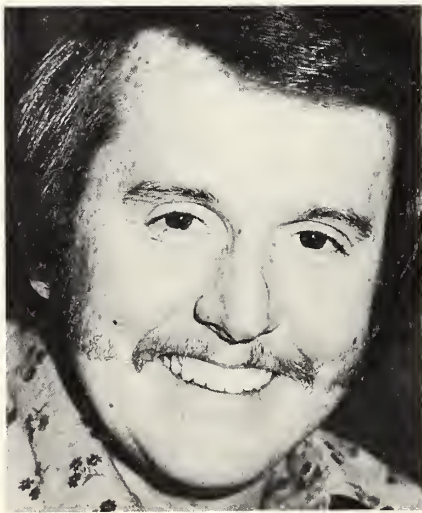

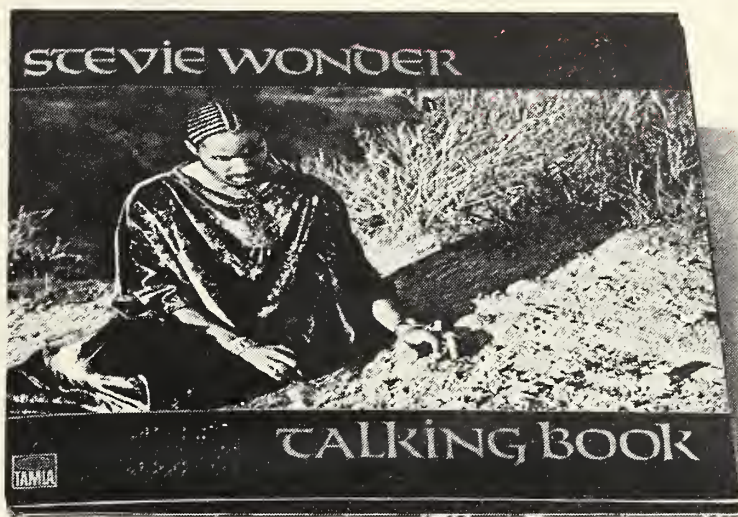

Garry Sherman Sees New Role For Music In Film

NEW YORK — Garry Sherman, a composer/arranger who has worked on such major feature films as "Midnight Cowboy," "Alice's Restaurant" and "Heartbreak Kid," sees music in a new creative light in feature film production.

"Until about three years ago," Sherman says, "a composer could screen a film, decide on the necessary mood and then go off and write X minutes of background music. 'Love Story' is an example of the traditional 'Hollywood' or supportive mood music genre. Today, directors are using music

in a compositional role rather than in a supportive one. Music has been discovered, and is more and more often used in a key role to define plot sequences or to capture the abstraction of a scene. In Alice's Restaurant, music became an extension of Arlo Guthrie's character. In some films music is almost a character in itself.

Working on "Heartbreak Kid" with Elaine May, Sherman used music to punctuate certain points in the film. For example, in the transition between Charles Gordins' first marriage and the rest of his life in the film, the music was used as a writer might use a semi colon. The music is vital to the end of this film, and in a subtle way serves almost as the narrator in capturing the ambiguity of the ending.

"In a film like 'The Emigrants,' says Sherman," music is used to enlarge the canvas on which the director is painting his film. The composer here, Erik Nordgren, painted his music in tonal moods, rather than melodic sequences, using music sparsely, for in the 1800's music was not a part of everyday life. This is an example of music serving as a compositional augmentation of a film.

"Ideally," Sherman concludes, "the composer should have complete communication with the director so that his music can expand the statement of the film. Music no longer need be used only as background color, it can be used psychologically, compositionally and functionally. Directors like Elaine May, Arthur Penn and John Schlesinger are a few of the people who have begun to take advantage of music's newly acquired film presence."

NEW YORK — Barbara Dalton, vice president and manager of Brown Bag Records, has announced that the label has signed a long-term and "very intricate" agreement for the exclusive recording rights of the yet-unidentified musicians who comprise Terry Knight's mysterious new group called "Faith."

According to Ms. Dalton, each member of the group was paid a five-figure sum on signing of the contract and will receive a six-figure guarantee for each year of their contract with Brown Bag Records. In return, Dalton disclosed that the group is only required by contract to deliver a minimum of one LP per year to the company and that there are no singles requirements of the group whatever.

Quad Brings Back Listening Booths At MIA In Denver

NEW YORK — Quadrasonic is bringing back the listening booth in the retail record (and tape) business, according to the latest developments on the Denver scene. Bob Krug, head of the Denver branch of Musical Isle of America, reported that key locations of the city branch of MIA, which is part of United Artists' mass merchandising division, have set up elaborate listening facilities for those who want to know about the quad scene.

"It's an educational thing as well as just a standard way of auditioning a record or tape," Krug explained. "In many cases over the years, special listening facilities, especially booths, were eliminated because the cost of the space they occupied was just too high to warrant that kind of use."

"But today," he continued, "we have an entirely new medium to deal with. We have to be able to show a customer that quad is not just a new kind of gimmick effect but something really different and better."

To accomplish this, the Burstein-Applebee chain of six Denver area electronics outlets has already set up handsome and well-equipped listening facilities. B-A is serviced with records and tapes exclusively by MIA Denver. The first of the May-D-F chain in the Denver and Colorado area has also just set up a quad playback system under the guidance of MIA's Krug and Norm Wienstroer vice president of the MIA St. Louis national buying headquarters, who recently visited the Denver branch.

Krug said the Denver appetite for quad of all types seems to know no bounds and, in his view, is probably markedly heavier than in other major market areas served by MIA. "They are even asking for quad on reel-to-reel tape here and that is a rarity of rarities. They just want it in any and every form and we see the months ahead as very good for business particularly helped by this new magnet to get people into our locations."

RCA For April: 7 Stereo/Quad Disks, Tapes

NEW YORK — Seven albums in discrete, compatible stereo/four channel sound are being released in April by RCA Records.

The release includes two popular, three country and two classical titles.

On Basf's affiliate label, MPS, there are new albums by the Oscar Peterson Trio (Ray Price, drums; Jiri Mraz, bass) titled "Walking The Line;" "Communication" by Nelson Riddle directing a large orchestra performing tunes by contemporary European writers; "Soaring" by Don Ellis and "Try To Remember" by The Singers Unlimited, a vocal group recapturing much of the sound of the successful mid-50's foursome, The Hi-Los, with members of the original group Gene Puerling and Dan Shelton.

Also on MPS is Roberta Peters' collection of lieder songs by Strauss and Debussy, accompanied by Leonard Hokanson.

The Collegium Aureum is predominant in BASF's historical series of Harmonia Mundi releases. Included are Mozart's Quartets 17 and 19; Handel's "Wassermusik" and with the Collegium Aureum and soloist Elly Ameling, albums of Dufay Hymns and Choruses and an LP of Bach's "Actus Tragicus" and "Trauerkantate" by Telemann.

hits, trend sounds or songbooks by hot artists.

The Toronto-based company, with offices here, has already begun its U.S. penetration by offering two of its three record sets "Rock On" and "Love On" to the Grant and Superx drug chains in Florida and Georgia. And it will work with Grants, Superx, Montgomery Ward and Sears in a second promo covering Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia in mid-March to sell "Grammy Awards 73," its newest box set.

While exhibiting its budget albums at its NARM booth, the company met many racks and distributors for the first time who were not aware of its specialized marketing program based around using radio and TV to attract customers into retail outlets.

Acknowledging that there the budget business is getting tougher with cutouts competing against budget merchandise, Salter points out that Avenue's marketing concept is to place merchandise in retail outlets—large or small—on a guaranteed sale. "We lay out all the money for advertising, ship the merchandise to the store, run massive TV advertising and the retailer pays for the product he sells. Stores have not found it necessary to discount our product, so they wind up selling it at the full suggested list."

Each promo is built around new material, Salter emphasizes. "Our policy is not to put older product back into the domestic market. We don't believe in bastardizing our product by putting it out at low ball prices. So we will grind it up first, but we haven't found it necessary to do that yet because we find out products sell for one year after they have been advertised on TV."

Ruben, Jets Play Dates Tied To LP

CHICAGO — To coincide with the release of their first Mercury Records album, "For Real," Ruben and The Jets are making four appearances on the west coast this month. They will appear with Frank Zappa (to produce the album) at the Hollywood Paladium, March 23, San Diego Sports Arena, March 24, and Winterland, San Francisco, March 30-31.

Ruben and the Jets have been appearing along the west coast, both in concerts with Zappa and club dates, for the past six months. The eight-piece band features Tony Duran and Jim "Moterhead" Sherwood, both of whom have played with the Mothers of Invention. Special ad and merchandising will support all concert dates.

Polydor Mkts. LP's

NEW YORK — Polydor Incorporated has announced its new release, headed up by British rock guitarist Rory Gallagher and Link Wray. Also featured in the five-album release are folk-rock veteran Randy Burns, countrified rockers Cat Mother, and Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops.

An extensive advertising, promotional and merchandising campaign is slated for the new product, as well as follow-up plans on Polydor's previous release. Trade ads have been booked, and a heavy consumer print campaign is also set, reinforced by national and local radio buys. In-store promotion will make use of window streamers (and other point of sale display materials).

'History Of...' LP's Via MGM

HOLLYWOOD — "The History of . . ." a new series of historical recordings featuring major artists and material closely identified with their careers, has been developed by MGM Records, with the first five albums now in release.

The LP's, mostly two-record sets, are highlighted by "The History of the Real Billie Holiday," four sides and 22 songs, including "Lady Sings the Blues," "My Man," "God Bless the Child" and "Strange Fruit," with a reminiscence by Leonard Feather.

Another double-LP is devoted to Ella Fitzgerald, with selections including "Mack the Knife," "Miss Otis Regrets," "Walk Right In," "A Hard Day's Night" and "And the Angels Sing."

Others represented in the charter releases are Stan Getz ("Desafinado," "The Girl from Ipanema"), Joe Tex, and the Everly Brothers ("Bye Bye Love," "Wake Up, Little Susie," "All I Have To Do Is Dream").

Newbury On Promo Tour

NEW YORK — The entire Elektra sales and promo staff is currently involved in a major promo campaign for Mickey Newbury, which began with the recent release of his second Elektra LP, "Heaven Help The Child," which will run until mid-April.

The focus of the campaign is Newbury himself, who is touring the country on a regional basis visiting each W.E.A. branch city personally, with special performances, benefits, T.V., press and radio interviews in each market.

The tour was launched on the west coast at San Diego State University, with a sold-out concert at Montezuma Hall broadcast over radio station KGB. Newbury continued the California junket with a benefit appearance in San Francisco, followed by a press conference in Los Angeles.

Newbury begins a week of promo in the Midwest this week (20), kicking off with a branch party at Chicago's Jazz Workshop where he will also perform upstairs at The Happy Medium Club. On the 20th, he will be interviewed on both Roy Leonard's radio and television shows, then travel to Cleveland for a performance at the Agora Club to be broadcast live on WMMS. The following day, Newbury will attend a special party in his honor in Cincinnati.

On March 22, Newbury flies to New York for a taping of the new, syndicated television series "Flipside," in a segment hosted by Elektra president Jac Holzman. He will then perform at the Bob Hamilton Radio conference to be held on Mar. 25 in New Hampshire.

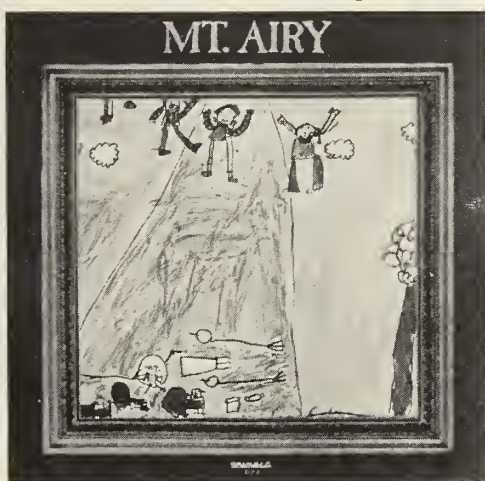

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Sansui Readies QS Vario Matrix Licensing

TOKYO — Sansui Electric Co., Ltd., has announced that its QS vario matrix technique, which is employed in Sansui's new consumer 4-channel stereo equipment to provide inter-channel separation, is now available on a license basis to all interested hi-fi manufacturers world-wide.

The license agreement will provide rights to the QS vario matrix technique itself as well as to an auxiliary function called the QS vario matrix synthesizer. The latter circuitry works in concert with the Sansui-invented QS regular matrix system 4-channel decoder to reproduce authentic and clearly-separated 4-channel stereo recordings, including tapes, discs and FM broadcasts.

Sansui's professional QS 4-channel encoder, and matching monitor decoder with the QS vario matrix, have been used by a number of leading

recording companies and FM stations around the world. Both components have been subjected to performance tests by recording engineers. At present, 19 recording companies are utilizing the Sansui equipment. They are offering 400 4-channel albums encoded in QS under 24 labels.

The QS vario matrix technique, Motoshisa Miyake, director of 4-channel systems planning & Promotion division of the firm claims, is a one-of-a-kind technical achievement that, when incorporated into a QS regular matrix system 4-channel decoder, reproduces all 4-channel program sources encoded with the QS encoder with outstanding inter-channel separation and full musicality. Miyake also says that the QS vario matrix technique puts QS regular matrix sound reproduction on a par with discrete 4-channel tape reproduction.

The QS vario matrix Synthesizer, on the other hand, is of special significance since it permits clear separation of 4-channel sound from all conventional 2-channel sources. "For the prospective 4-channel consumer" Miyake says, "this means, of course, that he will be able to use his present conventional record and tape collection for many years to come, and derive from it outstanding clearly separated 4-channel sound."

Miyake continues that work on the design of IC chips that will integrate the QS regular matrix system 4-channel decoder with the QS vario matrix is progressing favorably. We expect to complete this technology in the near future.

Licensing of the QS vario matrix technique, Miyake finally states, "indicates clearly that the future of matrix 4-channel is bright."

Chappell Into Elementary Band Market

NEW YORK — Chappell Music's educational division is entering the elementary band market for the first time through a print and publishing agreement with Stan Applebaum, the composer, arranger and conductor.

Bob O'Brien, educational manager, announced the initiation of an innovative schedule with a series, Concert Miniatures For The Elementary Band. Distinctly contemporary in its choice of music, "sound" and packaging, this series is considered a departure from existing elementary band programs.

O'Brien stated: "Chappell has wanted to enter this exciting field for a long time, but waited until it could produce something different. This series answers a real need in schools because it offers a challenge to young players through arrangements of such 20th century sources as Bartok, Kabalevsky and Stravinsky, plus unusual works from the 18th and 19th centuries. We are particularly fortunate to have Stan Applebaum arrange this series because of his extensive experience in the area."

One of the advertising industry's most prolific and respected composers, Applebaum created the famed musical campaign known as "Pan Am Makes The Going Great," for which he received several awards including the international Clio. In addition he won a Communication Arts Award for an Eastern Airlines campaign, and has also arranged, composed, conducted and produced commercials for such major companies as Dupont, Coca Cola and Kodak. In the pop music field, Applebaum has worked with such artists as Ella Fitzgerald, Benny Goodman, Connie Francis, Bobby Vinton, Brook Benton and Neil Sedaka.

A classically trained writer, Applebaum has always maintained a deep interest in the educational field for which he has written in many areas—band, orchestra, choral, piano, symphonic band, dance band and textbooks. Among his non-musical projects, Mr. Applebaum has prepared a series of natural science books for children to be published this year by Western Publishing.

In addition to the Chappell Elementary Band Series, other works for symphonic band and orchestra are already in production.

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NEW YORK—THE ALICE COOPER SUPER DUPER BILLION DOLLAR BABIES TOUR (AND HEART FUND BAND)

It was by no means the most elaborate concert tour promotion in the history of rock music promotions, but on the other hand, it was considerably more than just a simple overnighter to the City of Brotherly Love. Warner Brothers, Ren Grevatt Associates and Alive Enterprises, in keeping with the '70's tradition of elaborate promotional schemes for elaborate rock and roll acts, flew approximately sixty New York press folks to Philadelphia for an overnight event filled joyride and the second stop of the "1973 Alice Cooper America-Billion Dollar Babies Tour."

The madness realistically began at LaGuardia Airport, Friday March 9 at 2:00 as we boarded Alice Cooper's private plane to begin our journey. The four engine prop, proudly proclaiming the name "Alice Cooper" and the Billion Dollar Babies logo across its side, was delightfully decorated inside with Cooper posters, photos, pillows and hostesses buxomly advertising the tour across their chests while serving champagne and other delights during the thirty minute flight.

Upon arriving in Philly at the Penn Center Inn and given barely enough time to check in, we were shuttled off to a pre-dinner cocktail gathering complete with strolling violinists (for digestive purposes and dinning. Before another hour had elapsed the bus was on its way to the Philadelphia Spectrum (home of the downtrodden '76ers) for the spectacle which was to be the Alice Cooper Show.

The 1973 Alice Cooper Show is a starkly brilliant exhibition of intense scrutiny and work and is possibly the most slickly executed production in the history of concert productions. Stage production is handled by Joe Gannon, the man behind

HOLLYWOOD—JOE ADAMS: STORY OF A VOLITIVE VOICE

As the interview began, the man heading up Ray Charles' operations excused his Monday mien saying he had a touch of some bug—Hawaiian no doubt since he had just come from there. He certainly looked healthy, and upon hearing something to that effect, he smiled and conceded, "I have a lying face. It never shows how I feel." But the thing that he could never hide was his resonant voice, the conspicuous cachet of Joe Adams.

You'd remember the voice even if you couldn't quite place the name (depending of course on which generation you happen to belong to), for Adams was the first black radio announcer in the country. His famous all-on-one suspiration delivery—"Three and a half hours, two hundred and ten minutes, twelve thousand and six hundred tight tempting high tempo seconds of the finest recorded and transcribed music available for the first people in the world, you my ever loving living listeners"—entertained radio listeners for over a decade. He recalled that during his high school days, the one he attended in Watts, he was constantly discouraged by the public speaking teacher from going into broadcasting simply because it wasn't for blacks. The best kind of job a black could hope for was a good civil service job like the post office, police department (only in Negro areas), and the fire department, only if someone died or got pulled into a fire. That was it. But this did not enervate his aspirations. The thing he liked to do best was talk, and so talk he would. He started doing radio remotes simply because most stations wouldn't allow blacks on the premises. One day he heard an announcer named Al Jarvis says, "Everyone's created equal," and his brain needed no cudgeling to know Jarvis was the one he would see. He sat in Al's office for four days

the Neil Diamond Broadway successes. The set, a marvel of construction in steel cages, stairways and regal mummy atop it all (complete with laser beam eyes) was designed by Jim Newton. The lighting, most of which is above Alice, and includes amazing strobe effects, is being handled by Charles Carnal. Costumes for Alice and the band were designed by Cindy Smith, wife of group percussionist Neal Smith. The show is produced by Shep Gordon and directed by Alice Cooper and Shep Gordon.

A major V.I.P. on this tour for the group is The Amazing Randi who handles special magical effects. Included in his repertoire is the beheading of Alice on stage by use of guillotine. To say the least, the overall effect is truly magnificent.

Following the brilliant performance was a party on the S.S. Showboat, an actual river ferry rented for the occasion. The ship never did get to sail as a result of safety inspectors informing the organizers that too many people were on board (There were probably close to 1,000 on the boat which seemed to comfortably fit 500). Regardless, the party was filled with every conceivable gimmick to keep all aboard happy. Included was a fortune teller who seemed to be up on her horoscopes (but was dressed for the part), a caricature artist (who might very well be arthritic by now) and assorted bands, all seeming refugees from a Philly Jewish wedding earlier in the evening.

It was somewhere around one thirty AM when sanity began to leave most patrons of the party, myself included. Bidding goodbye to the nameless Philadelphia faces we eventually made it back to the Inn for a precious few hours sleep.

The 9:45 AM wake up call came a dozen hours before I had hoped it would. Nonetheless, the breakfast-press conference was waiting below. For all of ten minutes Alice answered questions, few of which made very much sense, from the bloodshot, hungover bunch. He did however enlighten with two interesting responses concerning his reaction to the menacing guillotine. "The guillotine is scary", he informed, "It's even more frightening than the other thing (the hanging device). The blade is really sharp and I'm relying on a safety catch. If that doesn't work, well" In commenting on "mistakes" made in the course of his performance, Alice admitted, "I make mistakes sometimes. But sometimes they really look neat. As we tour and the show sets in, the mistakes get ironed out. After a while the mistakes are few and unnoticeable."

As the conference ended, we shuttled over to Penn Station where we boarded the Metroliner for the trip back to New York. It was one of the few hours of relaxation we had had in the very full twenty hour day.

Looking back in retrospect, the excursion even if tightly planned and executed, was well worth the effort. Alice Cooper is a genuine showman; a peddler of fond memories and pleasant experiences. The 1973 Alice Cooper America Billion Dollar Babies Tour, all fifty six cities of it, is going to give people a good time they won't soon forget. arty goodman

NEW YORK—THE JOFFREY BALLET'S 'DEUCE COUPE' or HELP ME TWYLA

To state it obviously and bluntly, we are not from the dance critics. Nor are we even avid ballet goers. But then neither are most Beach Boys fans. And judging from some rather unshackled and unbridled bursts of enthusiasm from pockets of youth within the staid City Center Theatre, neither are most of the people who made up the cheering majority of the audience for this experiment in

until he was able to see him. At that time Al told him that he didn't need anyone but a bumptious Adams told him "You need me because I'll work for free."

He got a job as combination cook, masseur, and announcer. Things were going along fine until one day Jarvis told him he was through. Jarvis explained to him that if he stayed he'd always be the guy who came after the conjunction 'with'; always Al Jarvis with Joe Adams. So he realized leaving was the smartest thing to do even though that same conjunction now served as an adjuvant to 'no work'. He remained with no radio work until Arthur Crogan, owner of KWOL, who remembering him from those Jarvis days, set up a search to find him. Before he knew it he had his own show at last. It was fifteen precious minutes a day. Those precious minutes to Joe soon became precious to advertisers and his show went from fifteen minutes to five and a half hours a day. During this time he also taped shows for KWBR and KDAY which catapulted him to west coast prominence.

Adams will always be remembered for his racy comments on the subject of race music at what was once a quite talked about press conference. It seems that all of the press and music authorities were inept and dumbfounded over what 'race-music' actually meant. They finally had come up with a rather opaque definition saying it was music with a 'certain beat' and amidst this ambiguity Adams asserted, "You mean like Frankie Laine's "On The Sunny Side of the Street." "This remark only further disconcerted Joe's peers who suddenly felt they should elaborate on their first answer by saying that it was 'negro music with a certain beat' and this time Adams added, "Oh you mean like Nat Cole's "Mona Lisa." These repartees probably helped to erase the nebulous term 'race-music' and also impressed John West, an NBC v.p. who eventually gave Joe a job announcing on the west coast.

He had been with NBC for five years before the east coast even knew he was black. They didn't find out until they had requested him by name to announce for George Shearing at Tiffany's. Upon learning that the broadcaster with a British sounding voice was black they said they would have to check with Shearing first. George's response was, "It's all right with me if it's all right with my manager." They then consulted Shearing's manager and were surprised to discover it was John Levy, who was black.

From radio, Joe segued to television and from there to the silver screen. In addition to starring in "Carmen Jones" and "The Manchurian Candidate" he was also the first black actor to win the Golden Globe accolade for his Broadway role in David Merrick's "Jamaica."

Today Joe's incomparable voice has resigned itself to handling all of the important calls that come into Ray Charles' Tangerine operations. Adams, who first managed one of Ray's concert tours some years ago, has stayed with him ever since directing his career and the aspects of his record company and it's music publishing affiliates. Every once in a while Joe will even announce one of the radio spots. He told Cash Box that he is getting more into TV and film production. He has already filmed "Ray" in Israel. Adams also produced the OIC closed circuit benefit (Opportunities Industries, (Cities) which hosted a score of talent performing at the Waldorf in New York and The Palladium here. The gala event was so well received that he is prepping the next one specifically as a television venture. It's been a long time since Joe Adams has told anyone he'd work for free. As a matter of fact the only context to the word free which Adams presently understands is that the black man is finally free in the arts and that Al Jarvis was only a little less premature than our patriarch fore fathers in saying "Everyone is created equal." ron baron

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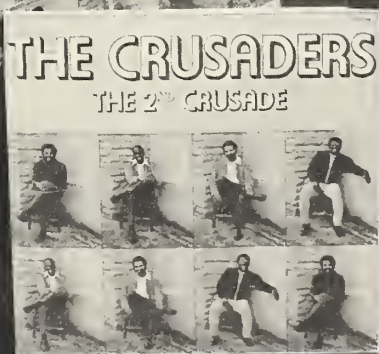
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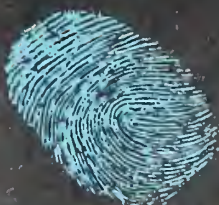

The show, which will be aired nationally over 145 syndicated stations starting Apr. 14, will present a behind-the-scenes look into the record industry. Each program will feature a different record company president with two of his artists talking and performing in the recording studio.

Helen Reddy: She Is NBC-TV Series

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol's Helen Reddy, who recently won a Grammy Award for "I Am Woman," has been signed as the host of an NBC summer replacement variety series, slated for Thursdays, 8-9 P.M. Starting date for the new summer show has not yet been set.

FCC Asks Congress For License Rule

WASHINGTON — The current state of affairs in the area of license challenges, a confused one for both broadcasters and the F. C. C. is expected to come into focus as the Congress steps into the picture.

F.C.C. Chairman Dean Burch, in an address before the House Communications Subcommittee, recently asked the legislative body to spell out the procedures a broadcaster should implement to ward off competing applicants for his license.

The effect of this request tosses the legislative problem back to the Congress, already confronted with the current predicament since the Nixon administration recent request to extend the license period from three to five years.

PM EST will also feature Paul's wife Linda and Paul's new group, Apple's Wings. Titled "James Paul McCartney," the hour special is currently being taped in London and Liverpool. Emmy award-winning producers Gary Smith and Dwight Hemion will collaborate on the program with Hemion directing. ABC and ITC are coordinating the project.

SIMI VALLEY, CALIF. — Returning American prisoners of war recuperating from their Viet Nam ordeals at San Diego's Balboa Naval Hospital are catching up on musical history through a syndicated radio program from More Music Enterprises, "Chronology Of American Music."

The company, located at 6684 Charing Street, has donated the 20-hour presentation of the number one songs from July '55 to December '72 to the facility. The program is produced by KKDJ's Jay Stevens, who co-hosts with KROQ's Johnnie Darin. It has already run on KCPX (Salt Lake City) and Honolulu's KKUA among other outlets.

AFTRA Pres. On AFL-CIO Mission

NEW YORK — Bill Baldwin, national president of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, will visit Japan for two weeks beginning Mar. 25 as a guest of the Japanese government. Baldwin will participate in an exchange of opinions with Japanese trade unionists, Japanese government officials and industrialists on current U.S./Japan relations and other matters of mutual interest and concern to trade unionists of both countries.

The AFTRA president will be one of six American union presidents designated to represent the AFL-CIO by Federation president George Meany.

WBEN Honors Its 30 Yr. Vet Jock

BUFFALO — Clint Buehlman, who is believed to hold the all-time American radio record of 30 years as WBEN's morning man in the same time slot was honored March 15 at a WBEN-sponsored civic luncheon in the City's Show Boat Restaurant. Clint is a 42-year radio veteran in Buffalo, having started in March, 1931.

Alice Cooper Flo & Eddie

THE SPECTRUM, PHILADELPHIA — There are precious few superlatives left with which to describe an Alice Cooper performance and justifiably so. Having long since transcended the simplicity of rock 'n roll and basic theatrics, the Cooper evolution has become a sophisticated helzapoppin' on stage with no holds barred. The 1973 version of the Alice Cooper Show, to understate matters a bit, left this City of Brotherly Love on its ear and begging for more.

As Alice and the band, resplendent in white from tops to toes, appeared on the stage of the huge sports arena and opened with "Hello, Hooray" for the cheering capacity crowd of 17,000 plus, electricity could be felt crackling through the air. But it was merely the beginning for the theatrical spectacular which was yet to be unveiled.

When it did arrive, almost a half hour into the performance, the spectacle was painstakingly perfect. The three fold unveiling, including the removal of a giant tooth, the beheading of Alice and the America spectacular (complete with the recorded Kate Smith singing "God Bless America") left the crowd stunned and begging for more.

Ellen McIlwaine

KENNY'S CASTAWAYS, NYC — With two Polydor albums and the admiration of just about every critic under her belt, Ellen McIlwaine took the small stage at Kenny's and gave the newly installed sound system a supreme test.

Ellen doesn't play the guitar—first she stares it into submission and then squeezes out every bit of juice the amped acoustic can possible yield. Sometimes she scratches its guts out with her bottleneck. On other occasions, she treats it like a punching bag. But she never lets it make one sound that isn't supremely musical.

Ellen doesn't sing—she puts her vocal chords into action by taking the psychic energies in the room and compressing them until one full and shimmering aural orb, revolving on an axis of boldness and artistic audacity blinds the audience with its total power.

Ellen McIlwaine is to the seventies what Jimi Hendrix was to the preceding decade. What else is there to add to that?

Nana Mouskouri

CARNEGIE HALL, NY — Does anyone offer a more enchanting, sweeter sound of music than that of Nana Mouskouri? Surely, no member of the full-house at Carnegie would have thought of even a close runner-up to her magnificent way with a collection of varied songs: foreign songs, songs of love (both requited and unrequited) and happy rhythms from her native Greece.

Lovely to look at, unassuming in manner, she is a rather complete vocal artist, one who puts her material over without recourse to gimmicks that other vocalists utilize in a vain attempt to hide a shallow voice. For in Nana a voice of beauty is wedded to warmth and understanding, conveying a sense that each of her selections is her favorite. And to complement this magical power are the Athenians, her accompaniment of five men, including her husband: wonderful musician-vocalists in their own right. They get some solo chances to prove it.

Nana, whose first Bell album effort is being produced by Snuff Garrett, should be a bigger name in the U.S., something beyond superstar. It'll happen, just you wait and see.

Musically, the Cooper band has improved considerably and the show has reached the point where it is as entertaining aurally as it is visually. Especially noteworthy were "Elected", "I'm Eighteen", and "No More Mr. Nice Guy" (from their Warner Bros. "Billion Dollar Babies" LP). Alice, however, must still be chastised for his poor taste in risking injury to the orchestra during the "School's Out" segment where he tosses "diplomas" to the gathering below. Excluding that incident, the 1973 Alice Cooper Show is slick, highly professional and promises to be in the minds of many for some time to come.

Opening the bill was Flo & Eddie (formerly the Phlorescent Leech and Eddie), Warner Bros. recording artists, who demonstrated a wonderful ability to rock and roll and fully entertain an audience in their own right. Howard Kaylan and Mark Volman lead this band up front with delightfully comic antics which the huge gathering obviously enjoyed. Their presence helps make the Cooper Show one of the best packaged tours in years. This show should not be missed.

Brewer & Shipley Hoyt Axton

BITTER END, NYC—The Bitter End was turned into a living room recently as Mike Brewer and Tom Shipley and friends invited their audience to join in on an evening of sheer down home pleasure. Straight from their farm in Kansas City, Brewer & Shipley has managed to maintain a consistently superior show through the years combining in their performances tunes from all of their four Kama Sutra albums. Tunes included in their Bitter End performance were Jesse Winchester's "Yankee Lady" and Nick Gravenites' "Blue Highway," where Mike and Tom demonstrated the most powerful aspect of their performance: their tight and simplistic harmonies. The blend of the two voices accompanied by bass, acoustic guitars, electric guitar and pedal steel are evidence to the fact that a four man group can sound as fulfilling as a nine piece symphony. Special mention goes to guitarist Larry Knight who accompanied Mike and Tom on both electric guitar and pedal steel. An accomplished musician, Larry's exceptional guitar work did not go unnoticed. Bass player, Billy Berosini, a full fledged Gypsy, completed the quartet, making this band the finest set of musicians to back Brewer & Shipley since the duo began traveling with side musicians.

"One Toke Over The Line" opened their set to a hearty response from Brewer & Shipley's guests. Hand-clapping and foot-stomping accompanied their next numbers, "Black Sky" and "Oh Mommy." Perhaps their most noted song, the Jim Pepper tune, "Wichitaito" closed the set, leaving the audience begging for more.

Opening the set, A&M recording artist Hoyt Axton (noted for original compositions recorded by Three Dog Night: "Joy To The World" and "Never Been To Spain;" The Kingston Trio and Steppenwolf) performed a commercial which he was commissioned to write on shoplifting for the L. A. Chamber Of Commerce and his spectacular Big Mac commercial. "Telephone Booth" and "Dueling Banjos" also were highlights. But the climax of his set were two songs when Larry Wright was called upon to render his services to jam on two funky dixie style tunes with Axton's six piece band.

Much of their material was moldy oldies from the group's previous albums with Tommy Makem or other personnel. Only one song, "The Grey Funnel Line" (about the Royal Navy), was culled from the current group's recently released album, "Save the Land," on Audio Fidelity. There were several previously unrecorded (by the Clancys) songs from the new album which would have been welcome diversion at the concert. It is not that their material grows stale with overexposure; it is just that an act needs new material to continue their growth, and a vast percentage of their current act has been seen or heard before.

One welcome departure was the increased use of humour in this concert. There was a certain amount of bantering between Northumberland-born Louis Killen and the Clancys about "native" material, and Liam and Louis traded raps over Scottish and Irish material. The two also handled most of the instrumental chores, trading off between guitar and concertina, with Louis also soloing on pennywhistle, banjo, and spoons.

Tom Clancy delivered several recitations, including a Yeats poem which served as a preface for "The Golden Apples Of The Sun." Clancy concert would be complete without the inimitable "Finnegan's Wake," the song based on the James Joyce novel. Tom has a personal hold on this one, and he burlesques and carries on, the audience loving every minute. (The actor in him is frequently in evidence.) Paddy acts as the dignified elder statesman of the group, countering the buffoonery of Tom. Louis, as the token Englishman, has been described by Paddy as the group's "hostage." Instrumentally, he is by far the most adept—and a damned good spoons player!

The program does not stress the Irish "troubles," as The Clancys do not think the subject belongs in an evening focused on entertainment. They do, however, still perform rebel songs from the not-so-distant past, such as the rollicking "Johnson's Motor Car," written in 1922, and the classic "Rising Of The Moon," written in 1798. Liam's intro to "The Patriot Game" stressed the universal, rather than localized element of nationalism and war. The songs will suffice to cover situations "all the way from Belfast to Wounded Knee," he said.

The audience got what they came for, and that is the name of the game.

SANTA MONICA CIVIC — Everybody and their dog showed-up to welcome Steve Miller back to town; not to mention groupies, grass and a nut or two. But you nearly forgot what you came for after listening to the remarkable Warner Bros. group of Paul Butterfield.

Lead-singer Butterfield, who used his harmonica as effortlessly and effectively as his voice, has assembled some exceptional back-up, not the least of which included Christopher Parker on drums and Jeff Muldaur on organ. Although it is these three who are the backbone, the entire group understands that the idea of complementing one another lies in good arrangements and not just some sort of fair-shares-of-spotlights formula.

Their professionalism was evidenced in particular with "Small Town Talk," a Nilsson-like bloom that was lyrically mellow yet musically strong and vibrant. Ditto for "You Get All the Money," which highlighted Butterfield. You'd give it back for that kind of entertainment.

The show was kicked-off by the Jesse Davis group who scored a touch-down with the "Screw You Blues." Some of the other titles were equally as "catchy."

But it was Capitol Record's Steve Miller who packed them in. And he gave them what they wanted, including "Burgandy Crossroad Blues" and "Space Cowboy," which apparently generated the most excitement.

WESTBURY MUSIC FAIR, NY — To be a comedienne in the round, you have to be a well-rounded comedienne, one whose comic sense of balance is not thrown off by the turning of a stool or the twining of an electrical cord. Lily Tomlin is a special funny person who gets serious every now and again to prove that she can come out of a deep state of concern for the common good as quickly as she got into it. All this without ever succumbing to motion sickness or asphyxiation.

Doing the same act we caught last year at the stationary Carnegie and some weeks back at The Bitter End, Ms. Tomlin proved how the plastic face and chameleon voice can get the yocks when the material itself has become familiar. That's why you go back for seconds and thirds of the same thing. Hers is a strange and wonderful gift. Happily, a third Polydor LP is in the works.

A&M's Paul Williams, a self-described "rock star slash sex symbol" is really a most cuddly version of the composer who manages to get out of the "and then I wrote . . ." routine and into some honest to goodness performing. He always travels with a fine lot of a group—and this gig was no exception. Most impressive was Kenny Ascher's piano, now with a flourish and then with a gentle tickle, capturing just the right mood at every juncture.

The show isn't slick—Paul glances at his watch to help with the pacing—but it sure is a set full of meaningful love song and pleasingly irrelevant patter. Even with a cold, he sounded like "more!" And his hits just keep on comin' like they should.

POP PICKS

GRAND HOTEL—Procol Harum—Chrysalis CHR 1037

Welcome to the black tie affair. Elegance within the rock genre has always been their cornerstone, expansiveness their watchword. But at long last, here's an album from the British quintet that can cause a few of the "Salty Dog" fanatics to accept the fact that just maybe the group can outdo even that crowning achievement. Listening to the title song is almost like being knighted. The vocal arrangement on "Robert's Box" is clearly the most ballsy the group has ever gotten, and it could be edited for a single of major proportions. For their first on the Warner-distributed label, PH have erected an edifice extraordinaire.



LIVE—Lee Michaels—A&M SP 3518

The most commercially accepted two man organ-drums band going, Lee Michaels brings his successful career on the label to a glorious head. This is a double-LP set priced as a two-fer, and as such, it should have tremendous buyer appeal. Attractive packaging and a solid mix of material, including his standbys "My Lady," "Stormy Monday" and "Hold On To Freedom" should insure hefty chart success. On this set, the drums are courtesy of Keith Knudsen. Michaels himself plays the keyboard like a heavy angel, and he sings like a good rocker oughta.

IN DEEP—Argent—Epic KE 32195

Their last album really brought them home in America, sparked by the success of the single "Hold Your Head Up." The opening track here, "God Gave Rock And Roll To You" sounds to be as big. But beyond a doubt, this is also their most solid effort throughout. Not only does each cut have a distinctive flavor of its own, but the tracks themselves are a cornucopia of intra-song interest and amazement. A planned national tour should give this a strong shot for the Top 10.



WATCH—Seatrain—Warner Bros. BS 2692

It's not often you hear an album of music with a sense of humor. The group is obviously taking the loss of fiddler Richard Greene in mirthful stride—introduction to the second side which features a crowd ready to walk out because he isn't there is a stroke of comic genius. For those who really go back to when Seatrain was the last line-up of The Blues Project, the remake of "Flute Thing" should come on like manna from heaven. It could prove another Deodata-like hit as an edited single. Many different tracks here—the group is artistically eclectic as always.

THE NEW AGE—Canned Heat—United Artists UA-LA049-F

This most attractively packaged offering from the group that did so much to bring blues-rock into prominence during the psychedelic era is an impressive transitional effort. Their sound is much cleaner this time around, with the solos more easily isolated. Keyboards especially do much to give them a crispy crunch. Best single sounds like "Rock & Roll Music," Bob Hite's new adaptation of the Lloyd Price classic, "Lawdy Miss Claudy." "Lookin' For My Rainbow," with some strong female back-up, should see much FM airplay as a Bramlett-like neo-delta blues.



MY FEET ARE SMILING—Leo Kottke—Capitol ST-11164

Because Leo Kottke is such a singular talent, an ordinary approach to a live album just would not seem appropriate. So to keep it all together, producer Denny Bruce has ingeniously edited out most of the applause after the first track (which is a winning false start) lets you know he's live. While other solo acoustic performers turn over every possible stone in their search for relevancy, Leo just gets out there, does his thing sans ego, and impresses all with only the music and his adept and artistic digits. Many of the tunes are from his previous two Capitol albums, but the whole stands as an entirely new and rewarding experience.

I'M IN LOVE WITH YOU—Detroit Emeralds—Westbound WB 2018

This soul trio has been a consistent hit-making contingent for three years now, and the freshness is still very much a part of their smooth style. Take the closing cut here, "My Dreams Have Got The Best Of Me." Within their framework of carefully controlled string and brass arrangements and a persistent but subtle beat, they add a hint of Mills Brothers to make it mellow still further. "You're Getting A Little Too Smart" is reminiscent of their "Baby, Let Me Take You" hit. Album also features two fine medleys of originals.



RAUNCH 'N ROLL—Black Oak Arkansas—Atco SD 7019

What can you say about a six man crazy band with a lead vocalist/scrub board player named Jim Dandy? On this, their first live effort, the band whose name tells you where they're from gets their groove at the outset and never lets up. They make no bones about being pure energy 25 hours a day. They are so powerful, they have to have two lead guitarists. Their zip code is 72414; but they hardly have to drop you a line to let you know when they'll be in the neighborhood. Recorded at The Paramount Theatres in Portland and Seattle.

NEWCOMER PICKS

BECK, BOGERT & APPICE—Epic KE 32140

The news of the formation of this group set the rock press on its ear—Jeff Beck with former Vanilla Fudge/Cactus rhythm section members? Well, no need to worry about how they sound now—the trio bound to success on the order of West, Bruce & Laing is here. Two past hits are included—Stevie Wonder's "Superstition" and Curtis Mayfield's "I'm So Proud." The originals, save for one, tend to the ultra-heavy side. "Lady" could prove their biggest showpiece. BB&A are a powerhouse from the word "rock!"



SKULL SNAPS—GSF S-1011

The debut of a black trio who'd rather show you the ultra-inside story than their faces. The self-contained band of funk (vocals, bass, guitar and double percussion) deals in the sounds that are selling to both pop and rock markets these days. The most exciting cut is the interestingly titled "I'm Your Pimp." Airplay may be a problem here, but word of mouth alone could cause this track to bust the album wide open. They also sound strong on "I Turn My Back On Love" and "It's A New Day." The disco crowds have a new giant here.

COMEDY PICKS

CHILD OF THE 50's—Robert Klein—Brut 6001

The first LP offering from the Buddah-distributed label is the long-awaited solo debut of the best of the new stand-up comedians. While his subjects are not novel, his insights are voluminous. You will relive dog tags and air raid drills and you'll be laughing every second of the countdown. Album includes his classic routine about the fabled 57th St. panhandler, as well as the one about the southern drawl of all ballplayers. When this guy stands up, people take notice. Ever so much more than a nostalgia trip, Klein's album is going to establish him right alongside Carlin and Cheech & Chong.



MONTY PYTHON'S PREVIOUS RECORD—Charisma CAS 1063

Now that The Firesign Theatre are a mass phenomenon, it's left to the British zanies in Monty Python's Flying Circus to carry on the underground cult comedy banner. At home, they're bigger than Guinness and twice as bubbly (slurp slurp) . . . while their American following is in the fledgling stages. This LP could well spread the word here via FM radio who has been begging for a follow-up to their first Charisma album. There is no group around who understands better what a comedy disk is supposed to be. They leave no groove unticked.

Lonnie Elder, who wrote the screenplay for "Sounder" is under exclusive contract to the Stigwood Organization for the project.

L.A. Court Judge Dismisses Writers' Action

HOLLYWOOD — Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Charles S. Vogel has dismissed the class action filed by songwriters and composers for \$4 billion damages against music publishers for alleged denial of renewal copyrights in their songs, on jurisdictional grounds.

The damage claim of plaintiff, John Blackburn, cowriter of "Moonlight In Vermont," alleging that his assignment of renewal rights to Capitol Songs, Inc., in a standard form of Songwriters Agreement was made under conditions of coercion, was likewise dismissed for lack of State Court jurisdiction.

Beverly Hills lawyer Irwin O. Spiegel represented all of the music publisher defendants. Plaintiffs' attorney, Harvey G. Cooper, said that he is going to appeal the decision of the Court.

Col. Inks J. F. Murphy & Salt

NEW YORK — Columbia Records has announced the signing of JF Murphy & Salt to an exclusive recording contract. The six man band, managed by the Linet Group Limited, was formerly with Elektra records. JF Murphy & Salt consists of JF Murphy—lead vocals and keyboards, Ron Allard—horns, bagpipes and backing vocals, Joe Parrino—lead guitar and backing vocals, Russell Warmolts—bass and John Reilly—drums. Columbia is now planning initial recording sessions for the rock-jazz-folk band which is represented by APA. JF Murphy's original music is published by Famous Music Corporation.

Fox, Gimbel To Lecture

NEW YORK — As part of A.G.A.C.'s (American Guild of Authors and Composers) lecture series, Charles Fox and Norman Gimbel have been invited to participate in a discussion on Mar 20. They will be speaking to a group of young composers about writing for films and records. At the present time, Fox and Gimbel are writing two songs for Cinerama Film "Harrad Experiment". Fox and Gimbel are the composers of "Killing Me Softly With His Song".

Bandleader Tito Rodriguez Dies

NEW YORK — Puerto Rican bandleader, singer and television personality Tito Rodriguez died in New York on Weds. Feb. 28 at Polyclinic Hospital following a short illness. He was 50.

Rodriguez was born in San Juan, P.R. He began his professional career by singing on radio at the age of thirteen. Three years later he was signed to a recording contract by RCA Victor.

In the 1940's, Rodriguez sang with the Latin bands of Noro Morales, Enric Madriguera and Xavier Cougat. In 1947, at the age of twenty-four, he formed his own band.

In recent years Rodriguez headed the Spanish department for Musicor Records as well as producing and performing. Total sales of his records to date have exceeded 12 million copies.

Jennings Performs At Atlanta Prison

NEW YORK — Waylon Jennings is the latest RCA recording artist to present a free concert for the inmates of the Federal Penitentiary in Atlanta.

Jennings appeared Saturday afternoon (10) prior to giving two shows Saturday night at the Atlanta Municipal Auditorium in the Shower of Stars series sponsored by radio station WPLO, Atlanta.

HOLLYWOOD — In Department 87 of the Los Angeles County Superior Court, judgment was entered Mar. 9, in favor of Monarch Record Manufacturing Corp against Happy Tiger Records, Inc., in the principal sum of \$29,515.79, plus interest, attorney's fees and costs, based on Happy Tiger's failure to pay Monarch for record pressings. Monarch Record Manufacturing Corp. was represented by attorney Richard S. Trugman.

Vegas United Mgmt. Co. Merger

HOLLYWOOD — Vegas Music International and United Recording have merged with Professional Management International and offices will be set up in Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Houston and Nashville.

Sam Cammarata will be the president and chief exec officer of the firm, Irving Deutsch will be vice president and manager of the publishing division, Vic Beri will be vice president in charge of personal management, Larry O'Keefe will be the executive assistant to Cammarata and Dominic Daileida is controller.

The firm, which presently has existing offices in Las Vegas and Houston, will function in personal management, recording and publishing. They will produce many of their own artists and are presently negotiating with three major labels to distribute their product through.

Whispers Deck On POW Return

NEW YORK — "P.O.W.s And M.I.A.s," a new recording by the Whispers, is being rush-released by Janus Records as a "welcome home" song for returning Vietnam veterans. This is the first single produced by the group themselves with manager Dick Griffey under the new long-term, worldwide agreement they just signed with Chess/Janus Records.

The Whispers, recently on the pop and soul charts with "Life And Breath," were in the recording studio when the Vietnam peace settlement was announced. They had originally intended to record "P.O.W.s And M.I.A.s" as a reminder about the soldiers who hadn't returned yet. Griffey and the Whispers rewrote the song in the studio and now Chess/Janus is rush-releasing it with a major publicity and promo push.

Recent events allowed the song to take a more optimistic approach, especially in the last verse, which is in the form of a letter written by a soldier to his wife. Originally, the letter was to end, "Oh by the way, tell our next door neighbors their son got blown away." The Whispers changed it to "Their son will be home any day."

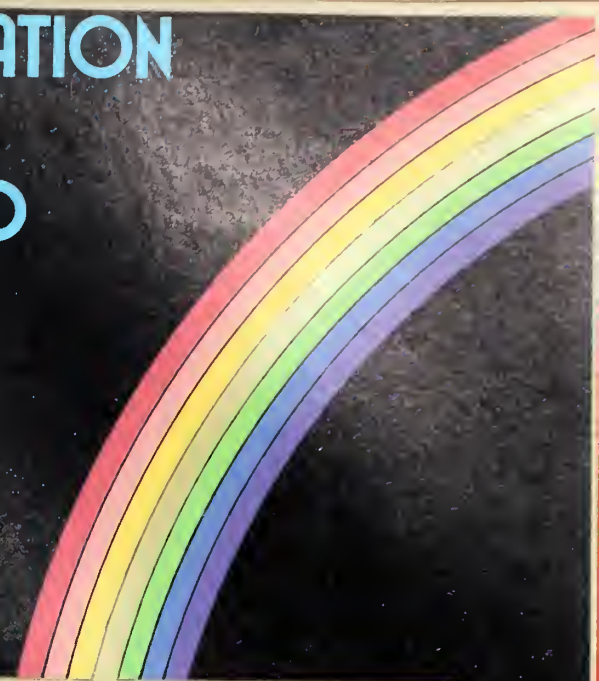
On Steel Guitar is Eric Weissburg, who is currently represented by the hit recording, "Dueling Banjos" from the "Deliverance" soundtrack.

NEW YORK—KOOL & THE GANG: COSMIC COMMUNION

A group of seven energetic young self-taught musicians, who hail from the Jersey City, New Jersey, area and who also came out of Lincoln High School with the last of them emerging as late as '69, are often referred to as the Jersey City Seven by their friends and fans, and collectively and more commonly known as **Kool & The Gang**. The Gang members are: **Dennis (D.T.) Thomas**, vocals, alto sax, flute and percussion (he is also the groups manager); **Robert Bell (Kool)**, bass and vocals; **Ronald Bell**, tenor sax, alto flute, sop. sax, and vocals; **Rick West**, piano, arp syn., soloist, clarinet and vocals; **George Brown**, drums, percussion; **Claydes Smith**, guitar, acoustic guitar; **Robert "Spike" Mickens**, trumpet, flugel horn, percussion and vocals.

Each member of the group is dedicated to a 'musical journey', a journey, not only revealing the beauty in music, but also, building toward musical formats that would, "expand into the minds of the listeners, sending out musical vibrations that would make the audiences minds come to a state of mental arrest", according to Robert (Kool). He also said that they do have rehearsals, but a great deal of time is used for studying such things as what the universe is all about, questions of metaphysics and religion. These influences are readily apparent in their expressed comments. They prefer to be called "universal musicians." One can also get the feeling of spontaneity in their music. They have written things collectively and their attempts at progression are even apparent within one LP. Jazz has an impact on the group. **Art Blakey**, **Miles Davis** and **Coltrane** were the greats that Dennis (D.T.) cut his teeth on, and D.T.'s father turned him onto **Charlie Parker**. He served as the inspiration for D.T. to start playing.

When he was ten years old, Ronnie Bell made a set of drums out of some old paint cans. As he listened to records, Ronnie would work out rhythmic patterns by beating on the cans. During his elementary school years, Ronnie attended music classes. He played the trombone for a couple of years and then went to the sax. His brother Robert (Kool) has strong feelings about pre-destiny. Kool attributes the direction the group is going and the moves they are making to a fated plan. Kool said, "Music in school can be a real hang-up. Everything is so cut and dried, it can do a thing to the emotions, and it often takes some time to get the mind and the emotions onto the self-expressive course".

College students are generally rated as a hip group of record buying fans. (Labels are now aware of this.) Groups like Kool & The Gang are way up there as one of the popular dance bands working the college circuit. But, the college fan doesn't automatically run out to buy their favorite artist's release. The record has to be damn good. Kool & The Gang who record for De-Lite Records are well aware of the importance of recorded material and live performances. They have been successfully getting their message across.

If you wish to do yourself a soul-favor, check out Kool & The Gang. They will acquaint you with their version of a cosmic communion. **don drossell**

rock ballet.

It seems rather appropriate that in this day and age, one has to go to such an establishment to see something built upon what you used to see at any sock hop or dance. There is very little organized body movement left in our society that is associated with response to rock music. There's that general gyration that we go through when it's party time in the home or in the aisles of a concert—but very little that can be called graceful at the most or dashing at the worst. Social dancing has gone the way of the big name button, poni tails and greasy kid stuff.

Well, someone named **Twyla Tharp** (a most respected choreographer/dancer and head of her own Foundation), saw fit to take on the task of balleting the Beach Boys, using the old steps from *American Bandstand* as well as from the classical ballet dictionary. Different it was. How successful as a ballet, we are probably not the best people to judge. But the tape that presented an alleged "ten year history" of the group's music, we feel more than qualified to beg to differ with.

For starters, the choice of material was inexcusably unrepresentative of the Beach Boys' true contributions to rock. Many of the featured songs (like "Alley Oop," "Devoted To You" and "Papa Ooh Mau Mau") are only associated with the group tangentially. Of their original biggies, only "Little Deuce Coupe," "Don't Go Near The Water" and "Wouldn't It Be Nice" are included on the 15-song tape in any semblance of their untampered-with selves. "Honda" is played against itself on two speakers about twenty seconds out of phase, and the speed is increased to Chipmunks dimensions midway through the number. "Cuddle Up" serves as the frame of the ballet, primarily because its sweetness and light probably reminded **David Horowitz** (the perpetrator of the taped score) of a traditional ballet when he first heard it.

Yes, we know. We have opened up an artistic can of worms here, fit for a wriggle of a debate. Is it not the prerogative of the artist to select elements from which he makes his own world sensible to his own psyche? True, but to a point. Is this supposed to have anything to do with the Beach Boys or isn't it? If the ballet is merely a personal impression of what the Beach Boys music means to the artist who fiddled with it, then have we not the right to question that impression on our own level of sensibility?

We might have been able to let this whole issue ride, were it not for the fact that for most of the ballet, there's something vying for your attention which has nothing at all to do with ballet. On three huge roles of revolving paper, stage rear, six of the city's best known graffitist/artists (on a rotating basis), paint their way into your mind with their now plastered-all-over-fair-NYC signatures. The result is a circus effect, and we would like to think of our Beach Boys as a whole lot more than clowns merely making us smile when we've nothing better to do.

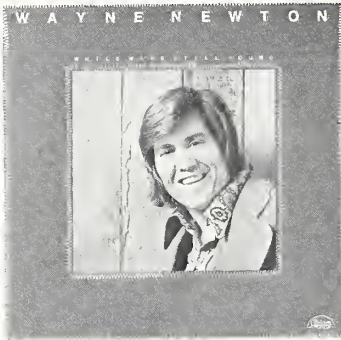
"Tommy" was the first rock ballet. It was a closed system in that the entire musical work was a given the choreographer had to take or leave. It broke ground and was considered by many dance critics a successful experiment. "Deuce Coupe" is also a ground breaker, but one that should be cemented over soon. Now that the novelty of selecting rock music explicitly for the dance is waning, perhaps the energies of all concerned can be better directed towards making the next rock ballet less of a "happening" (in the psychedelic sense) and more of a true event. **robert adels**

WHILE WE'RE STILL YOUNG—Wayne Newton Chelsea 1006

For his third LP on the label, Wayne takes a slightly different approach. Without sacrificing the commerciality of the sessions one bit, produce. Wes Farrell has given him a less frantic and more contemplative setting for some of the tune here. The arrangements take their time, and are not dominated by a beat. Titled after his new single, the album also includes a version of "Danny Boy" and a very strong entry in "We Didn't Know The Time Of Day." Album makes for even better listening than his previous efforts.



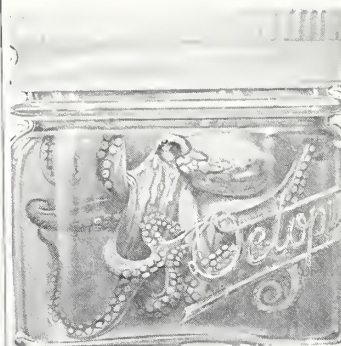
JACKSON HEIGHTS—Verve V6-5089

When people, asked for their opinion of an album, tell you "It takes some getting into," it usually means they don't care to bother. Honestly, those words are the first impressions here; but there's so much offered on the initial listening, that the subsequent apathy never has a chance to ensue. Take for instance the track "Bebop"—it's either about a train anthropomorphized as a woman who may or may not be an actress, about a possible actress who is metaphored into a train or simply a devilishly clever excuse to reprise Rosemary Clooney's "Mambo Italiano" in the chorus. Group leader is former Nice-member (along with Keith Emerson) Lee Jackson. The ultimate in FM programming.



GENTLE GIANT—Columbia KC 32022

This big boy lives in a mythical land bordering on Yes and the Mahavishnu Orchestra. Their four albums released in England have brought them to the forefront of the new rock. This is their second here, and it should build upon the reputation engendered by their first. The six-man group consists of three Shulman brothers (Derek, Philip and Raymond) who all contribute to the composing of their inventive material. All the signs of the new music (moog, violin, sax, vibes) are here in the right places.



THEY LOVE ME, THEY LOVE ME NOT—Genya Ravan—Dunhill DSX—50143

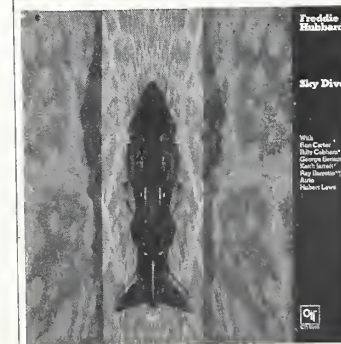
The original female dynamo from Ten Wheel Drive has her second solo outing here, the first for the label. Co-produced by Jim Price and Joe Zagarino (with two cuts by Jimmy Miller), we now hear Genya with wall-to-wall arrangements. The basic band includes Jim Price, Jim Horn and Bobby Keys. Much material from Price, and contributions from Redbone's Vegas brothers, Clapton-Whitlock and King Peasure. The monster cut is "Missy (Mister)" which should see the raves coming from both AM & FM listeners.



JAZZ PICKS

SKY DIVE—Freddie Hubbard—CTI 6018

It is the black progressive FMer more than any other kind of station that is responsible for the surge in jazz LP sales that the market is currently experiencing. And CTI is certainly getting a huge piece of the action-filled pie. The latest LP to be picked up by the general public is Freddie Hubbard's 18-piece ensemble which highlights the master's trumpet as well as Ron Carter's bass, George Benson's guitar, the percussion of Ray Barretto and Airtio and the flutes of Hubert Laws. Four works here: two originals by Hubbard, a Bix Beiderbecke ("In A Mist") and a singularly polished version of "The Godfather."



JAZZ NUMBER II—Ray Charles featuring The Ray Charles Orchestra—Tangerine TRC-1516

This is a companion volume to his earlier, "My Kind Of Jazz" which spawned a hit single, "Booty Butt." This album is even more oriented towards big band jazz and its golden era of orchestrated togetherness. Compositions by Teddy Edwards, Thad Jones, Jimmy Heath, Louis Bonfa and Ray himself should appeal to traditional jazz as well as traditional Charles fans.

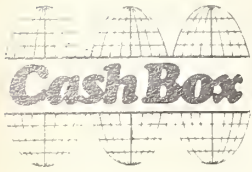

Free Land Deeds Via Black Oak

NEW YORK—Atco recording group Black Oak Arkansas started sharing the land last week, as complimentary deeds to "Heaven On Earth" began making their way to the more than 30,000 people who so far have reacted to the rock group's offer.

Each deed provides one-square inch of an acre in the Ozark mountain community of Heaven, Arkansas, subdivided specifically for this purpose by Black Oak Arkansas. In all, 6,300,000 square inch parcels are being given away.

As part of the Black Oak Arkansas sharing plan, a deed has been included inside each copy of the group's new live album, "Raunch 'n' Roll," released last week by Atco Records.

"That's to make sure we reach everyone who's continued to support us through buying our records and attending our concerts," advised the group's manager, Butch Stone. "Otherwise, they're free for the asking, for anyone who shares our philosophy or, simply, would like to own a part of America."

The deeds observe that sub-division was for the "specific purpose of sharing with everyone who believes in the universality of man."

They acknowledge that "no man owns the land, but merely occupies space on it, and that it is the duty of all mankind, now and tomorrow, to feel responsibility and respect for

those with whom he shares possession."

"If good is within the individual it is within us all, and Heaven is not so much man's destination as a reminder of his destiny."

Legal restrictions and requirements, involving matters such as taxes and improvements, obligated the group to classify ownership as "honorary." The original intention had been to simply give away each square inch parcel and, commented Stone, "in our minds and hearts that's what we've gone and done."

The acre sub-divided into square inch parcels is one of 1,300 purchased with earnings by Black Oak Arkansas, who created the community of "Heaven," located about 15 miles north of Dogpatch in Boone County, as a communal homesite.

In addition to forthcoming dedication ceremonies at Heaven, the group contemplates a Summer Fresh Air Festival and Frolic in their community, an Ozark concert exclusively for deed-holders.

Members of Black Oak Arkansas are Jim Dandy, Patrick Daugherty, Burley Jett, Stanley Goober Knight, Rickie Lee Reynolds and Tommy Aldridge.

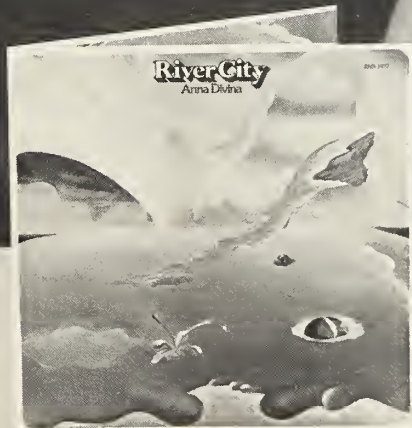
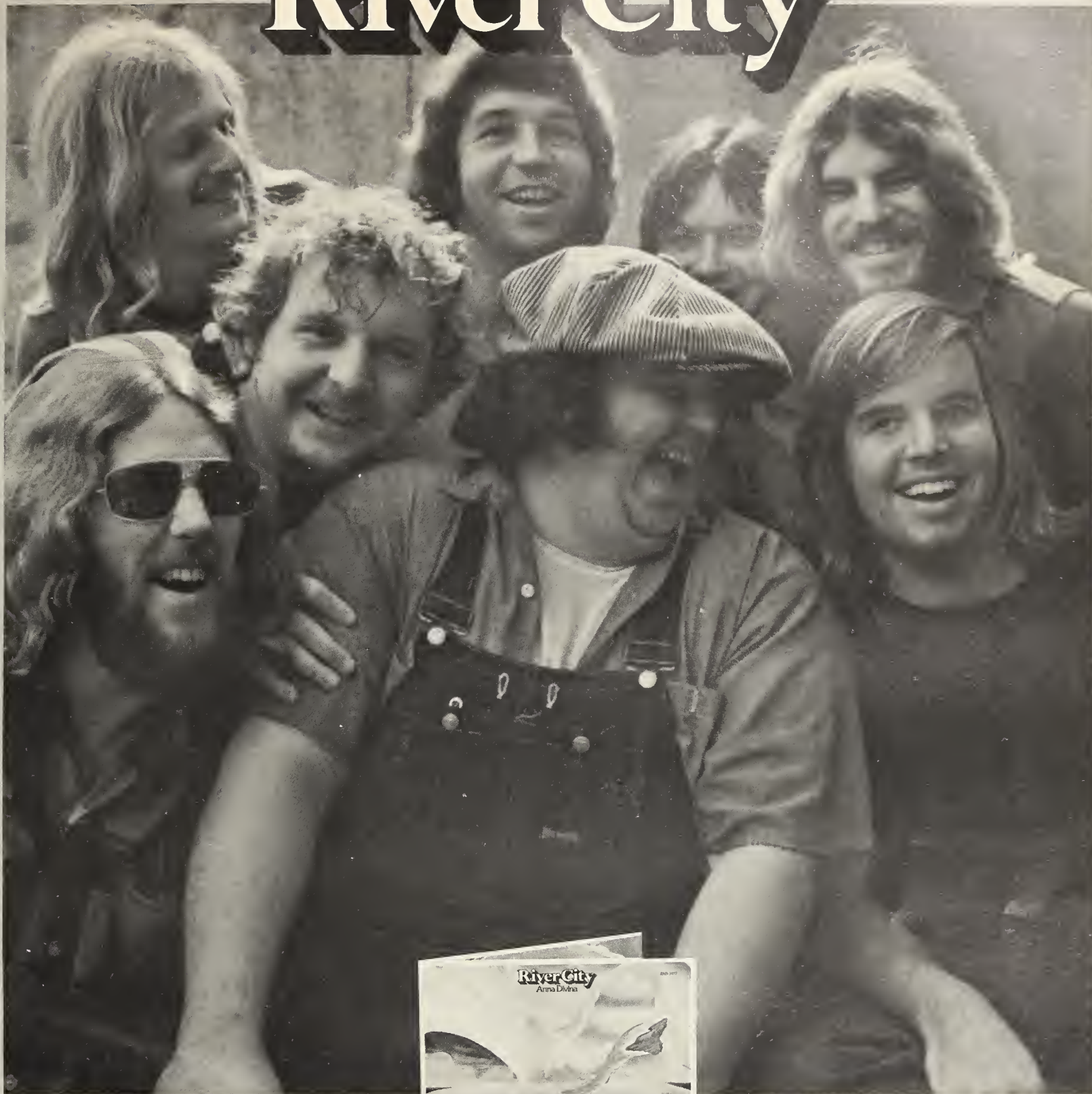

The most important aspect to any record merchandising campaign, Rice affirmed, is to get the name over at the consumer level. He felt this is a tremendously difficult thing to do today when you have so many new acts vying for recognition. The Raspberry campaign has been designed specifically for this kind of consumer awareness.

Capitol has already done well in launching Rick Springfield especially as a contemporary 'teen-age idol,' and Rice noted that the male teen-age idol of today must have a sort of unisex look.

Pink Floyd

MUSIC HALL, BOSTON—Setting forth yet another chapter in interstellar overdrive, Pink Floyd engulfed Boston's Music Hall with swirling magic mist, hypnotic lights, and commanding quadraphonic synthesized music. In a word, England's space-rock pioneers were superb as they began their latest U.S. tour.

Messrs. Waters, Gilmour, Wright and Mason are known masters at guiding audiences through musical excursions while blending perhaps the best visual and sound effects to be seen or heard in rock today. This three hour performance was no exception.

The show was divided into two segments that displayed a complete showcase of Floyd's musical evolution. The first set contained their older and lengthy pieces like "Careful With That Axe Eugene," "Obscured By Clouds," and the classic, "Echoes," which if you can imagine was highlighted by a simulated waterfall of

pink fog streaming over the edge of the stage and into a vacuum below. A triumph, to say the least.

The second set featured a non-stop production of "Dark Side Of The Moon," Floyd's newest and most promising album. Departing from earlier works, Pink Floyd has focused more on separate songs and soaring vocals which should earn them wider mass appeal. Tremendous backing vocals by three very soulful ladies accented the already haunting harmonies and lyrics of their new material. Standouts were "Money," which could develop into a single and "Eclipse," which proves to be a powerful epilogue to both the set and the album.

The encore, "One Of These Days," although extremely well received was unnecessary to the continuity of the show, which had a clear-cut beginning and end. Pink Floyd is a group not to be missed, as their musical and visual imaginations are a glory to behold.

Loudon Wainwright III David Bromberg

PHILHARMONIC HALL, NYC—Goodtime music returned to New York with the appearance of Loudon Wainwright III and Dave Bromberg. They had the audience on the edge of their chairs and also in the palm of their hands throughout the entire evening.

David Bromberg opened the double bill and tantalized the audience with songs from his Columbia album, "Demons In Disguise". The song that seemed to stir up the most reaction was "Sharon." The crowd really got into this number and throughout the song two girls from the audience, danced exotically in front of the stage. Dave at times sounded and looked quite a bit like Dylan and this also served to enhance his set.

Loudon performed brilliantly again as usual and was in quite a funky mood. He played songs from his first two albums, which he did while at Atlantic but the majority of his set consisted of tunes from his first Columbia LP "Album III". He seemed pleased that AM stations were finally playing one of his songs and that served as a cue for him to launch into his hit "Dead Skunk." He was joined by his wife, Bromberg and a few other musicians in a tribute to George Brewer, Columbia promo man who recently passed away.

All in all the evening was a most enjoyable one for both the performers and the audience. It was a performance well worth attending.

Tom T. Hall Johnny Rodriguez Mike Seeger

CARNEGIE HALL, NYC—There was a problem with this concert that had little to do with the talents of the performers involved. Despite their professionalism, the staging and lighting made it all seem like amateur night. Unless you just concentrated on the sounds, which were impressive indeed.

Mercury's Mike Seeger, erstwhile (and occasionally present) member of a pioneer folk revival act, The New Lost City Ramblers, had to play in front of the distraction of the set-up for the following acts. It would have been so easy for the Hall to draw the curtain closed and have Mike really get his one-to-one relationship going out in front.

Be that as it may, Seeger and his old-timey music played on jew's harp, banjo, harmonica, fiddle and autoharp truly set the mood for the evening in a most respectful way. Libba Cotten's "Freight Train" was particularly well received. Seeger's verbal delivery is educational without being pedantic; so even if you are unfamiliar with what he is doing at the outset, you come away a much entertained expert.

After an intermission, Mercury's Johnny Rodriguez hit the stage with a six-man back-up band. Pacing the stage back and forth trying to find the spotlight, he opened with Doug Kershaw's "Louisiana Man." He presented a number of fine originals from his debut LP, but with the same prowess brought out the best in country oldies like "Faded Love" and "Jealous Heart." Here is a new c&w talent with a twist—his Mexican background and his sometimes bi-

lingual approach to a song gives him a positive edge that is well supported by his talents as a writer and singer. His first single, "Pass Me By" is a classic in our own time.

Without so much as a breather after Johnny's last note, WHN jock and mc for the evening, Jack Spector, heralded the arrival of the big man for the night, Tom T. Hall. The Storytellers, who had backed Rodriguez's set, are obviously Tom's band. They worked out for him as if they'd all be fired should the show not go totally right in every respect.

The obvious appeal of Hall is his material, and the obvious appeal of his material lies in the lyrical content. They don't call him the Storyteller for nothing. The keener segment of the rock audience has come to respect the Mercury artist for his way with words; this night, they were not let down by his performing stance either. "Shoe Shine Man" has all the live guts of Jerry Lee Lewis' more pleasingly rambunctious stuff. "Me And Jesus," the set's high point, is a religious-revival-type song that we'd think even Madeline Murray O'Hare could sink her soul into.

Hall can carry a tune well and thus avoids the pitfalls most narratively-oriented country singers are prey to. He is energetic and inspired, even on the more controlled numbers like "The Year Clayton Delaney Died." Without having to change one bit, Tom T. will continue to win the respect of all kinds of people who like to hear about real life in a meaningful, worldly-wise yet homey way.

Following each day's seminar, a lively discussion will be held on the negative and positive aspects of Stamps "special stage performance."

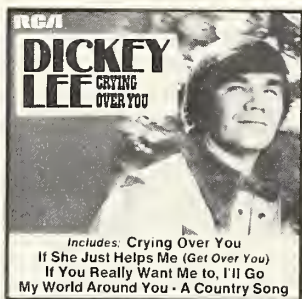

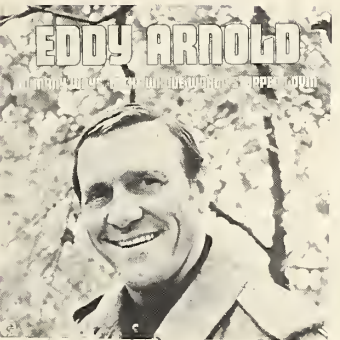
SHE'S GOT TO BE A SAINT—Ray Price—Columbia KC-32033

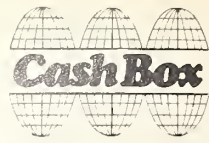

Haggard grossed \$28,000 for two shows, making it the highest one night gross in the 52 year history of the Mosque. Appearing with Haggard was Bonnie Owens, The Strangers, Ernest Tubbs, and the Osborne Brothers.

J. D. Sumner and The Stamps have been booked for an engagement with Elvis Presley at Lake Tahoe, Nev., from Easter through May 17th . . . Loudilla, Loretta, and Kay Johnson, co-presidents of the International Club Organization announce that Jay Drennan of WSLR Radio, Akron, Ohio, will serve as Emcee of this year's IFCO Dinner and Show on June 6th, opening night of Fan Fair.

Tickets are now available from the organization at P.O. Box 177, Wild Horse, Colorado 80862. A tremendous line-up of top name talent is being set for the popular program . . . Loretta Lynn returns to Dinah's Place (The Dinah Shore Show) on March 20th. She and Conway Twitty just wound up an extensive Northwest U.S. and Canadian tour and were in Los Angeles for the Academy of Country & Western Music Awards Show, back in Music City for the Grammy Telecast and now Loretta and husband Mooney, are off to Mexico for a week-long vacation. A far reaching April tour will again take Loretta and Conway back to the mid-west and West Coast areas.

"Skeedaddle," the new Nashville taped TV package produced by Marshall-Armstrong Productions and starring Archie Campbell, presents the first country oriented game show. Scheduled for one night a week airing, the half hour show will be distributed by Jack Rhodes Productions, Los Angeles, California. In addition to Armstrong, other production executives include Gail Roberts as associate producer, Bob Barkwell as talent coordinator and Bill Gernert as set designer. "Skeedaddle" is the first project for the recently formed Marshall-Armstrong Productions of Los Angeles, a company composed of Armstrong and Peter Marshall, host of the popular "Hollywood Squares" show since its inception six years ago.

Tanya Tucker, Columbia recording artist, has had so much success on her recent Texas tour that she is being rescheduled for a 27 day tour of military installations in June . . . The show, syndicated in four hundred markets by VP Productions of Nashville, is entitled "Webb Pierce In Louisiana," and is filmed on the stage of the famed Louisiana Hayride in Shreveport, Louisiana.

Dot recording artists received a combination of six awards which were the majority presented at the 8th Annual Academy of Country and Western Music Awards, held February 26th at the John Wayne Theatre at Knott's Berry Farm in California. Roy Clark received two awards: "T.V. Personality Of The Year," and "Entertainer Of The Year." Donna Fargo was the recipient of four awards (she won in every category in which she was nominated). She was named "Top Female Vocalist Of The Year." Her album "Happiest Girl In The Whole U.S.A." won "Album Of The Year." "Happiest Girl In The

Whole U.S.A." was picked as "Song Of The Year," and it was also named as "Single Record Of The Year" . . . Officializing at the signing were Don Gant director of ABC/Dunhill Nashville Operations and Don Right, Buffett's booking and personal manager. Buffett is currently engaged in a series of college concerts around the country . . . Reports are that Bobby Denton is putting together a mind bending day long celebration show and banquet in honor of WIVK, Knoxville's 20th birthday celebration. The Happy Birthday will be during March with the top stars in country music on hand to help celebrate . . . Recording artist Johnny Carver has signed a recording contract with ABC/Dunhill. Carver was formerly with Epic Records.

Darrell McCall recording artist for American Heritage Records will cut his first album for the new label under the production of Little Richie Johnson within the next few weeks. Both the album and the new single will be shipped out immediately. American Heritage National Promotion is handled by Little Richie Johnson Agency, Box 3, Belen, New Mexico 87002 . . . Willie and Carol Lumbee have signed an exclusive writers contract with Cedarwood Publishing Company, Inc. Carol and Willie, who make their home in Fayetteville, North Carolina, were in Nashville recently to sign the contracts.

Country Music Series T.V. Pilot Projected

NASHVILLE — The Junior League of Nashville, Inc., and public television WDCN-TV have announced a grant of \$15,000 from the Junior League to the station to assist in financing a half hour color program on the history of Country Music.

The program which will serve as a pilot for a thirteen part series, will be produced by WDCN-TV with the assistance of members of the Junior League. WSN-TV also in Nashville will cooperate in the venture by providing staff facilities.

The pilot which has been funded will be selected from the thirteen proposed programs in the series. Among the projected programs are studies of early country music traditions, with roots in England, a profile of several country music greats, including Hank Williams, the Carter Family, and Jimmie Rodgers, the influence of Western style and the advent of the radio, the Grand Ole Opry, the Bluegrass story, and the influences and changes in today's Nashville sound.

An active participant in the re-

search and planning for the series Bill Ivey executive director for the CMF commented, "The Country Music Foundation, because we're interested in the true history of country music, has been waiting for a program opportunity for a long time such as this. Too much of what is seen is a kind of up-town impression of country music, with non country musicians, dancers, etc. While this type of program has its place and is popular, the Country Music Foundation is extremely enthusiastic about cooperating in a show which will present country music as it really is.

The grant from the Junior League will serve as seed money to produce this first program and the League's financial involvement will be limited to the initial grant, although its volunteer and administrative efforts in research, planning and production will continue throughout the entire series. Mrs. John S. Warner is president of the Junior League.

WDCN-TV is the public television station for Nashville, and is affiliated with the Public Broadcasting Service.

Joe 'Red' Hayes Dies In England

NASHVILLE — Joe "Red" Hayes, fiddle player with Faron Young's Deputies, died March 2nd while on tour with Young in England. Death was attributed to a heart attack suffered enroute from Manchester to London.

Hayes, a native of Mineola, Texas, worked with Bob Wills, Charlie Walker, Ray Price, and other well known country music figures prior to his long time association with Faron Young.

A champion fiddler and songwriter, one of his most outstanding songs was "Satisfied Mind" which was one of the first Starday Records to be released in the mid-fifties.

Survivors include his daughter, Sherry, and a grandson of Nashville; twin daughters and three brothers, Roy, Leon, and Kenneth Hayes, all of Texas.

Funeral services are pending due to an indefinite arrival date of the body from England. There will be a memorial service in Nashville which will be announced at a later date.

Ivory Joe Hunter Forms Publ. Co.

NASHVILLE — Ivory Joe Hunter, who has written and recorded several million selling records, has opened a new publishing company in Memphis, Tennessee. According to Hunter, "I have about 300 songs I had forgotten I had written. In fact I have a string of hits that have never been recorded. I've got country ballads, blues, and songs for just about any category."

Hunter recently finished recording a country album and is in the negotiating stage for a major recording contract. Hunter says he is very pleased with his being recognized country, "I have always been country but I happened to hit with a blues song and then after I was categorized blues."

In January Ivory Joe made his first appearance on The Grand Ole Opry where he received three (3) standing ovations. He is scheduled for an appearance again March 10th.

Ivory Joe is responsible for such hits as, "Since I Met You Baby," "Empty Arms," and "I Almost Lost My Mind."

Mogull and his foreign associates are planning extensive promotion in conjunction with all EMI affiliates both on the single and LP, in the following territories — Australasia, Japan, South Africa, Brazil, Argentina, Mexico, Czechoslovakia, and South East Asia, where Mogull has the rights.

2 French Awards For Tamla/Motown

HOLLYWOOD — Two Tamla/Motown LP's, "What's Going On," by Marvin Gaye, and "Talking Book," by Stevie Wonder, have received important recognition in France, reports Bobbi Amato, International Department, Motown Records.

The Academie du Jazz, which has been in existence since 1954, presented the Otis Redding Award to "What's Going On," by Marvin Gaye.

Stevie Wonder's "Talking Book" was honored to receive a special award from the Academie Charles Cros. The Academy is well known for presenting awards to classical recordings and only a few have been given to albums in the modern music category.

Galas, Recordings To Play 75th Anny Tribute To EMI

LONDON — EMI celebrates its 75th anniversary this year and special events planned include a Pop Gala in London with top international stars and the world-wide release of a two-record commemorative package highlighting some of EMI's most spectacu-

lar recording achievements.

There will also be a Gala Concert at the Royal Festival Hall featuring some of the world's renowned classical artists.

Overseas, EMI will undertake special promotional campaigns through each of its 35 overseas companies presenting the theme "75 Years of the World's Greatest Recorded Music."

It was in 1898 that the Gramophone Company Limited, EMI's oldest subsidiary was originally formed in London. Commenting on the special events being lined up L.G. Wood, group director - records, said "This anniversary provides us with a unique opportunity to remind millions of people all over the world of EMI's outstanding recording traditions, covering virtually every field of music over three quarters of a century."

JPRA Sets Policies

TOKYO — JPRA (Japan Phonograph Record Association, chairman: Yutaka Ando) formulated its "business plan for 1973" at an annual general-meeting at its head office in Tokyo. The main points of this plan are as follows.

1. a) To negotiate the revision of royalty payments with TV and Radio broadcasting companies.

b) To push the amendment of copyright-law and affiliation with international-treaties.

c) To eradicate pirated records and tapes.

d) To join hands with IFPI (International Federation of the Phonographic Industries).

2. a) Joint-PR will be promoted by sponsorship with many musical industries.

b) To push exportation.

3. a) To promote a movement to exempt or reduce sales-tax on recordings.

b) To consider countermeasures for proposed new taxation on music-tape.

Tudor Places Aussie Disks

MELBOURNE — Recently returned from an overseas trip, Ron Tudor founder of Fable and Bootleg Records in Australia sees "intense" interest in his companies product.

Among deals involving the labels are "Marshall's Portable Music Machine" by Robin Jolley to be issued world-wide outside of Australia, New Zealand and Holland by MGM Records. United Artists has negotiated for release of records by local group Mississippi, and top pop talent here, Brian Cadd, will have his first disk "Ginger Man" issued on the Chelsea label this month in America.

Tudor points out that one of the most important aspects of his deals is the fact that each record and act involved, is now identified with a major American company.

Tudor told Cash Box that each company is releasing from Aussie-produced master tapes and all songs involved are original Australian compositions.

Pye Fills Two Posts

LONDON — Pye creative director Peter Prince has announced two new appointments within the company. Robin Blanchflower, previously with A&M, has joined Pye as product manager for Dawn and Pye repertoire, and Peter Summerfield becomes product manager for all licensed catalogs. In addition, Terry Brown, previously with Phonogram, has joined the company as Pye label manager.

U.K. Entry In Eurovision

LONDON — Britain's entry for the Eurovision Song Contest to be held in Luxembourg April 7 has been selected. It is a Doug Flett-Guy Fletcher composition "Power, to all Our Friends," which will be presented in the Eurovision Song Contest by Cliff Richard. Song is rush-released on EMI coupled with the runner-up by Mitch Murray and Peter Callandar. "Come Back Billie Joe."

Japan Labels Reject Hike In Royalties

TOKYO — JPRA (Japan Phonograph Record Association) has rejected the JASRAC (The Japan Society of Rights of Authors and Composers) proposal to raise the royalty of musical copyright.

The JASRAC's proposal, issued on Oct. 16, 1972, consists of 1) To raise the royalty from existing rate of 2% to 4% per side of a record, while raising from 4% to 8% of the price of a music-tape. 2) The royalty should be calculated via manufactured-quantity, not via forwarded-quantity, as it is now. 3) To raise the unit-price of domestic-music.

At a meeting of both parties, JPRA told JASRAC that the raising of royalty rate would not be accepted, and the other two items would be examined in further depth after April.

JPRA's the raising of the rate are as follows. 1) Royalties in the U.S. has been held unchanged at 2 cents per 1 music since 1909. 2) The rate in Japan is more profitable to the authors and composers than that of the U.S. 3) Copyright holders of foreign music have enjoyed increased revenue via recent alteration of exchange rates. 4) The music industry in Japan has been slow in the last few years. 5) The raising of rates will weaken international competitive potential of Japanese music.

London Mgmt Forms A Label

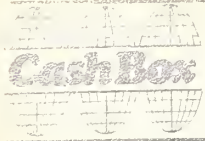

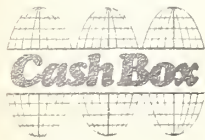

CashBox Great Britain

Profits for EMI for the half year to 31st December 1972 show an increase over the comparable six months of 1971. Sales in the United Kingdom were increased by £10,084,000 from £57,052,000 to £67,136,000. In North America sales increased from £27,146,000 to £28,531,000 and in Europe and other overseas territories from £42,533,000 to £52,135,000. EMI report that the profit improvement in Capitol Industries' results has been due to improved contributions from each of their divisions and, in particular, the strengthening of the company's artist roster. The current half year figures include the group's share of pre-tax profits less losses of associated companies £113,000 (£154,000 last year) and post acquisition profits of Affiliated Music Publishers and the Golden Egg Group.

Profits of the Robert Stigwood Group rose from £535,000 in 1971 to £1,250,000 in the year ended 30th September 1972—an increase of 133 per cent. Chairman Robert Stigwood reports that profits in the current year to end January are in excess of those earned in the corresponding period of the year under review. Stigwood added: "The figures reflect very encouraging growth within all divisions of the Group. Included in these figures are the earnings from the group's rights in the property 'Jesus Christ Superstar' which accounted for twenty nine per cent of company profits and earnings from this source will contribute to group income for several years". He went on: "Whilst it is too early to give any accurate forecast of profits for the current year, profits for the four months to 31st January 1973 were in excess of those for the corresponding period a year ago and the Board is confident of continued growth in the future".

Miki Dallon's Youngblood have set a deal with Wes Farrell's Chelsea label for Don Fardon's "Delta Queen"

having terminated their recent contract with RCA. They have also signed Ian Campbell to Mega with "Do I Still Figure" now on release. These U.S. deals were negotiated at MIDEM and other international deals which have now reached fruition include deals made with Fania Records of Argentina, Orfeon of Mexico, RPM of South Africa and Fonografica of Spain who will be launching the Youngblood label in that territory.

CBS to launch new series tagged "Hall of Fame Hits". Series will consist of double A sides from various bands retailing at the normal single price. Artists concerned are Fleetwood Mac, Santana, Bob Dylan, Byrds, Sly and the Family Stone, Chicago, Soft Machine and Doris Day.

Phil Wainman currently in America to negotiate deal for the release of product on his Maple Annie label in the U.S. and Canada. He is also securing a publishing outlet. Wainman originally discovered The Sweet and has produced all their hits to date including of course, their No. 1 smash "Blockbuster" on RCA.

Many executive changes this week. John Mair, former sales manager at Phonogram has joined A & M Records in the same capacity and A & M's managing director Derek Green told Cash Box that Mair will handle all facets of the sales side of the company, particularly liaison with their distributors Pye Records. David Rozallon has left RCA to join Phonogram as Planning Co-ordinator in the marketing department. Don Dive formerly assistant to Decca's promotion manager Don Wardell (now with U.K. Records in the States) is leaving the company to join Chappell Music as promotion and public relations officer. Dive was with Decca for two years. Derek Allen, formerly with EMI as financial manager, licensed repertoire and marketing has left to settle in Los Angeles.

Polydor's Artists Relation rep, Lori Bruner, has had a busy few weeks with major artists into Toronto. Topping the list were the Bee Gees who pulled capacity houses for their two shows at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre. They followed this up with a full house at the 8000 seat Forum Concert Hall. Ms Bruner, chaperoned the famous brother act from when they deplaned at Toronto's International Airport, through to their well attended press conference, their both shows and finally back to the airport. She is currently working their new album, "Life In A Tin Can" which is receiving heavy play throughout Canada. Also on hand for a promotion trip were the Irish Rovers, currently making a strong play for the adult contemporary market with their "Morningtown Ride" deck on their newly bowed Potato label. Patti Paige was also in town for an engagement at the Royal York's Imperial Room.

RCA's Ontario promo department is putting its best forward with the Hook and Ladder Room (Seaway Beverly-Toronto) appearance of the Everly Brothers. The Everlys are between hits which makes this engagement a toughie for John Murphy and Neill Dixon who have combined forces in an attempt to at least push the name and pick up sales on their last album release.

GRT with a Juno Award feather in their cap for Lighthouse (Vocal Instrumental Group of the Year) have declared March as Lighthouse Month. Larry Green, marketing director, has already put muscle into the campaign which includes a three minute-long sixteen millimetre film for use over cable TV, college television, commercial stations etc. Lighthouse are currently making fast gains up the charts with "You Girl" and are still heavy on sales with their Canadian gold album, "Sunny Days."

Columbia received a bit of a jolt with one of their big hopefuls going

through a name change, just as they had been established through an album and single. Atkinson, Danko & Ford with Brockie & Hilton (which leaves much to be desired as a group name anyway) have shortened their act to Bearfoot. Their former manager Milt Brodey, who left the group last year to work with the Victoria-based Haida Records, returned and apparently after meetings with Columbia, the change of name was announced, with the approval of the label who agreed the group required a new image to launch itself in the U.S. A mid-March release is expected. There is also a personnel change with Mal Turner replacing Hilton who moves over to Capitol's Skylark group. Bearfoot made their Toronto debut at the Riverboat.

Fludd, who release on the Daffodil label distributed by Capitol, are off to the UK and a recording session at Manor Studio. New member is Peter Rochon, well-known keyboard man from Ottawa.

A&M have a Haida by the tail with Valdy's latest release, "A Good Song" grabbing berths on the adult contemporary and contemporary charts. Valdy was awarded outstanding performance of the year award in the recent Juno voting. He is currently touring Canada which has given A&M an excellent vehicle with which to work a promotion campaign. Also high on A&M's list of strong potentials is Chilliwack, who have shown on again off again sales and chart action with their "Groundhog" deck. Their tour of Canada gains them extra sales and plays in each market in which they appear. Their album, "All Over You," on the other hand, has shown excellent sustaining power on the charts.

Music from the Ember Background Library will be principally Sparta Florida Music Group titles, according to Ember president Jeffrey S. Kruger, who made the announcement.

Polydor Japan: Good Showing

TOKYO — Polydor Co., (Japan) held a conference of its executives and all branch managers on Mar. 1, 2, 3 at its head office in Tokyo to confirm the sales results of its 40th term (Oct. 1, 1972 to Mar. 31, 1973), and at the same time, to examine the business policy of its 41st term (Apr. 1, to Sep. 30, 1973).

The sales result of the 40th term: Its expected to show 3,300,000,000 yen (\$12,700,000), 8.2% more than the target, while 26.3% more than the previous term, and 21.8% more than the same term of the previous year.

The company pointed out that this good sales result was due to the "prosperous conditions of the market at the end and beginning of the year."

The sales target of the 41st term: It has been settled at 3,200,000,000 yen (\$11,800,000).

Gladys To U.K.

LONDON — Gladys Knight and the Pips have been signed for a return tour of England by Ember Concert Attractions, with six weeks of concert and television appearances scheduled to begin Thursday, May 10. The itinerary includes two performances at the London Palladium, as well as a series of shows at major cities in the London area.

The group, now recording for Buddha Records, headlined a series of British dates in November for the Ember organization.

Arrangements for this return tour were concluded between Sidney Selth Pips, and Ember president Jeffrey denberg of the SAS management firm, representing Gladys Knight and S. Kruger.

EDITORIAL

Jukebox Poop Sheet

Last week's editorial dealt with the recording industry's current probe into changing the large center hole in the 45 single to the smaller "LP" size. While we voiced our grievances on behalf of the music operating trade, we neglected to explain why a small hole creates a problem on jukes. Several record people were puzzled by our stand, so, for the record, small-hole disks on today's jukeboxes will play at 33 rpm instead of 45 rpm. Little LP's have the small center hole simply because they are designed to play at the slower LP speed in order to get more time out of the 7" disk.

There's probably a lot of technical things about jukeboxes the label people aren't aware of, besides the intermix thing. They may not know, for instance, that a poorly pressed record can yank an operator or his serviceman out of bed at 1:00 in the morning when it hangs up a machine and the bar people want their music. Maybe the record folks don't fully realize that the sophistication of today's jukes precludes proper performance of a vast number of singles simply because they're not produced with the same quality control as an album. Maybe this flimsy quality has cost a lot of disk sales to this trade, and as such, loss of promotional play at thousands of locations.

If the record people think going back to a small hole will help their consumer sales of singles, they'd also better consider that it's been more than the fat hole that folks find awkward about singles—it's the same lack of quality control that prevents many sales there too . . . only difference is that consumers aren't that apt to return shoddy merchandise to the store as is an operator to his one stop.

Singles will sell more if they're pressed better, regardless of who buys the record.

Rock Juke Helps UA Disk Promo



CHICAGO — Rock-Ola Mfg. Corp. and United Artists Records have been promoting the "oldies" for the last several weeks in the Chicago area.

United Artists Records has recently re-released about 160 of their all time hit singles and back to back hits under the name of the Silver Spotlight Series.

The Series is being heavily promoted in the major shipping areas and record stores in Chicago and in three major stores a Rock-Ola phonograph, the 160 selection Model 450, was programmed with the entire series for the patrons to play and

hear the oldies. The three phonographs were placed at the Big Goldblatt Store in the heart of the loop in Chicago, a Korvettes in Morton Grove, Illinois, and in The Playback, a large Hi-Fi record shop on the south side of Chicago.

Among the oldies are such names as Gary Lewis and The Playboys, Bobby Vee, Vikki Carr, Jay and the Americas, Al Caiola and Cher (without Sonny). All the stores' record department managers have reported heavy traffic and especially the delight of the customers when they can select and hear the records played on the Rock-Ola jukeboxes.

Allied Leisure Pops Paddle Battle; Two Player TV Game Is Big On Skill "Collections High"

HIALEAH, FLA. — Allied Leisure Industries has announced initial shipments of their brand new video competition game called "Paddle Battle." According to company sales director Gene Lipkin, the two-player novelty has been thoroughly location tested and has served up "consistent gross weekly collections over \$200 in quarters." Lipkin further declared that some high traffic stops have earned as high as \$400 per week.

The 'Paddle Battle' is basically a two-player skill game based upon the tennis or ping pong principle. A Hitachi television tube, measuring 16 inches diagonally, telecasts one median line straight up the center of the tube. Two shorter lines (up and down) are telecast on both sides of the center line. The short lines, representing ball paddles, can be moved by the player by means of the control knobs on the front of the cabinet and the play of the game lies in the player's dexterity to place his "paddle" in front of the telecast "ball" as it's hit from one side of the "net" to the other. Each time the ball hits the paddle, the machine's sound system makes an appropriate sound.

Players score points when they manage to hit their ball past the opponent's paddle and out of the screen. A game is over when either player scores 11 points (tho the game can be adjusted to a 15 point round).

The Paddle Battle console is encased in a wood-grain cabinet and stands 64" high, 26" wide and 23 3/4" deep. The television tube itself is covered in smoked glass; the lines and the ball appear white against the dark background, making it, in Lipkin's words, "one of the most beautiful and visually appealing games ever to hit the market."

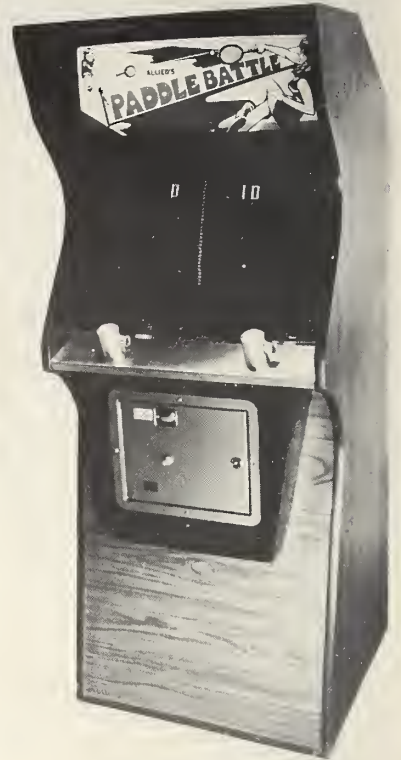
"This is a tremendously exciting game to play," Lipkin declared. "It demands a great deal of skill which can only be built up by playing it many times, which is exactly what happens on location. Matter of fact, good players have a hard time walking away from the game," he said.

Brunswick Game To Be Intro'd To Eastern Block

CHICAGO — Brunswick vice president Roger Bensinger, who was responsible for introducing bowling into Moscow about a year ago, is now planning to bring "Air Hockey" to the Russian people and very possibly other block countries as well. Bensinger will very shortly be traveling to Czechoslovakia, Poland and Russia for this purpose.

The popularity of "Air Hockey" in the foreign market has gained momentum steadily since the game's initial exposure earlier this year at the ATE convention in London. Deliveries to foreign markets have been in progress for the past several weeks and the Brunswick factory is reportedly enjoying booming international business.

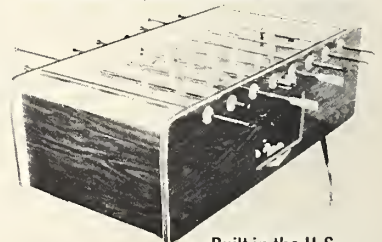
The Brunswick firm in Japan, Nippon Brunswick, is currently producing "Air Hockey" units in the company owned factory out there to service customers in that part of the world.

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California School Sees Art In Flippers

SAN FRANCISCO — While Pin-games have become all the rage at many of the nation's universities (several we understand are included in the sports curriculum, with the college supplying the play coinage), San Jose State University here has gone one step further and put the flippers into their Art Department's intermediate painting class.

Actually, the pinball machines are there for a complete repainting and redesigning of the art work on the playing field and back glass as an eight week class project for some 22 art students.

Instead of cartoon and pop art, the pinball machines will take on a theme of ecology and of animals in keeping with the theme of Africa USA/Marine World in Redwood City, where they will eventually be installed.

The famed wild-life recreation park is creating a new coin operated leisure time center for the coming summer season which will be among many new amusement and entertainment additions planned.

"Pinball and other coin operated machines are in rebirth among young people, perhaps because of the upgrading of the environment in which they are located; and many high schools and colleges now have competing pinball machine teams," says Dick West, general manager of Afri-

ca USA/Marine World.

West asked operator Fred Gillmann of Tempo Sales of San Jose to establish such an entertainment center at Africa USA/Marine World; but in context with the Park's wildlife and ecology theme.

"Gillmann, who has been designing such centers for nine years, could provide the machines; but none with the appropriate artistry," said West.

A former art student at San Jose State, however, Fred called upon the art department to see if a class could undertake a project of creating new design and art concepts. Art professor Paul Staiger responded enthusiastically:

"I liked the idea of my students painting on a different surface instead of canvas and to have the opportunity of doing serious painting. Pinball machines are certainly a new medium.

"Students, today, are not into the pop culture art and certainly are a long way from the old-fashioned pinball cartoon art. They also have the stimulus of coming up with their own art concepts and seeing them put into practice," Staiger adds.

"And, each student will receive \$50 which also is another incentive," he declares.

The students are free to do what

they want and first must come up with preliminary drawings to scale. Then, they will strip the existing art work from the machines and paint directly on them.

All of the work will be done in the three hour studio class twice a week.

Where once these flippers had lawmen in shootouts with the aid of flashing lights, there will be jumping animals; where once, such as in "target pool", where a ball would spin; animals will merrily spin.

Hockey, soccer and basketball-shooting games under glass may soon sport figures of tigers, lions, elephants and dolphins.

Moving pieces and bumpers around the "holes" may take on the appearance of funky fish and killer whale heads and various anatomical parts of animals, as well, Staiger observes.

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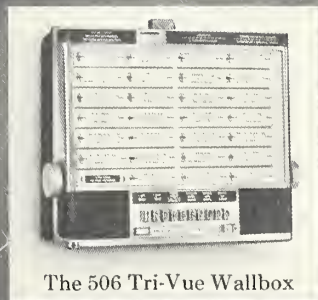
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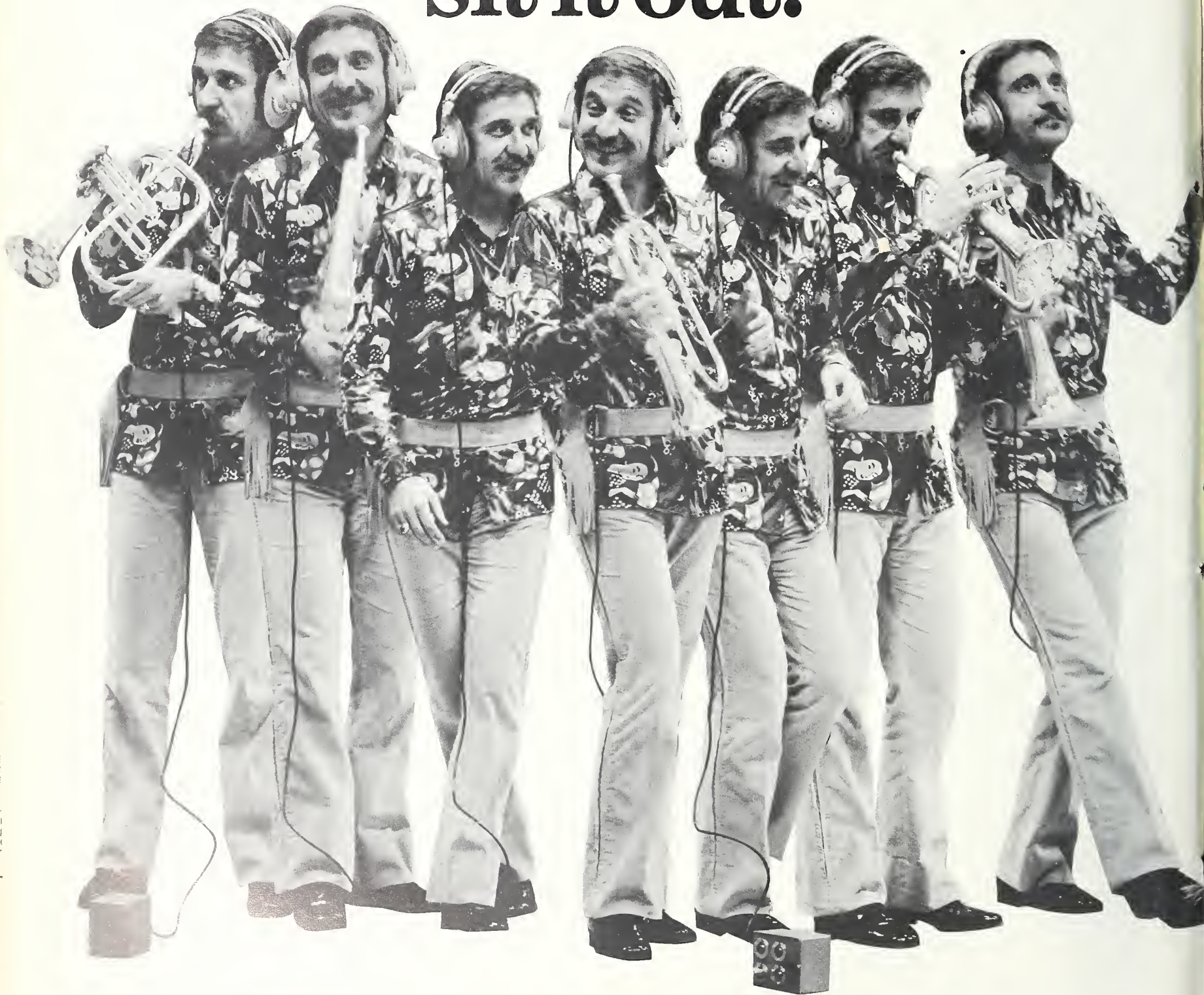
