inside the playable King Kong movie. [Cough] King Kong is being developed in ultra-close collaboration with the forthcoming film's director, production company, digital effects people and real-life actors. Peter Jackson (of Lord Of The Rings fame) provides the inspiration and direction and the game team translates this into the 'interactive version'.

The result is an ambitious fusion of first-person shooter and third-person brawler. The supposed masterstroke is in order to balance the weakness of playing as Jack Driscoll (a member of aspiring film director Jack Denham's ill-fated expedition to Skull Island) and the fact that you'll also get to put on the ape suit and be Kong. Suddenly you're in control of a towering super-sized ape. That T-Rex we were cowering from just a moment ago? We laugh at him. Now we're the daddy. In order to maintain the illusion of playing thim, Kong's brawling sequences are seen via swooping camera angles. Kong can punch, grapple and block, but can also perform kill moves like ripping the T-Rex's jaw apart, or dramatically drumming his chest before jumping on its half-conscious body. What's really noticeable here is the differing perspective it gives you on the Skull Island surroundings. That, and the satisfying feeling that you've just kicked a dino's ass right back to the Cretaceous period.

Kong's weakness comes when you move him around the jungle. While we imagined swinging through the trees in a freeform fashion, instead you're forced to follow a set path down a designated channel of jungle.

Another aspect of the ape's game repertoire is his relationship with Ann Darrow, whom he kidnaps early in the game. At first Darrow is petrified of Kong and there are sections where you'll have to chase after her if she escapes. As she begins to trust Kong and rely on him though, she starts helping him – accessing areas Kong cannot, for example.

Back in Jack's shoes we find ourselves in something of a situation. We've wasted our ammo shooting at brontosaurus and now have to negotiate a bridge guarded by evil repto-bats. 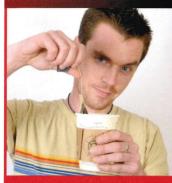

We're playing the filth-black sequel to Midway's criminally underrated horror actioner *The Suffering*, and the images on screen look like they've been smeared with a bucket of congealing rhesus negative mixed with grit. That much is no surprise. Nor are the decrepit surroundings and the high availability of shotgun ammo and health-jacking vials of pills. What is a surprise, however, is just how tight the new game feels.

The Suffering enabled gamers to play from first or third-person perspectives, but this time developer Surreal seems to want to force the issue. There's nothing wrong with seeing convicted murderer turned anti-hero Torque as he creeps around the disused shell of a cinema (surviving audience members are lit by the screen, which some monstrosity then smashes through) but flip into first-person and The Suffering's unflinchingly bleak take on action-heavy horror suddenly feels so right it's scary.

CARELESS TORQUE COSTS LIVES

Set only a single day after the events of the first game saw Torque literally battling his (and every other inmates') demons as he fought to break out of a state prison gone straight to hell. Ties That Bind finds him wandering around the urban decay of Baltimore. Ordinarily, that wouldn't be a problem for a hard case like Torque, but for reasons you'll only discover as you play, the city is beset by a supernatural tempest that's spilling demons which embody the ills of society onto its streets. You may well remember 'Mainliner', the hypodermic pincushion, and blade-limbed, spider-like 'Slayer' from the original game, but joining them is a gang of horrific new enemies. Among them is the 'Triggerman', a gigantic crab-like monster bristling with shotguns, and the 'Creeper', a psychotic stalker whose body is draped with bloody bits of his victims.

The analogue golf swing invented by *Tiger Woods* is still one of the best control systems on PS2. That satisfying high-pitched THWACK! as you flicked your thumb back and forward to ping the ball down the fairway, the delicate weight it gave you when making a vital pitch onto the green... brilliant. Plus the series is licensed up the wazoo, with a great selection of hugely varied courses, and it looks great, too. Hell, you can practically smell the freshly mown grass. So, what would you change? Answer: nothing. Once again, instead of trying to reinvent itself, *Tiger* leaves the finely balanced shot mechanic well alone and focuses on improving your control of what the ball does after you've hit it.

There was only ever one clumsy part of *Tiger Woods* 2005, and that was getting spin on your ball. You could only add spin once the ball was in the air, and to do it you held the desired direction and tapped D – the faster you tapped, the more spin you'd get. It was really imprecise, which was why we rarely used

it. Fortunately, this 'aftertouch' method has been dropped, and now you'll be using the right analogue stick to show off at the greens with some cleverly applied backspin. While aiming your shot, a blown-up image appears in the corner of the screen with a cursor hovering over it, and you move this with the right stick. Shift it left or right, for

example, and you add curve in that direction (that's draw or fade, golfing virgins). The tricky part is that the cursor automatically creeps back to the centre of the ball, so you have to apply the spin at the same time as you take your shot. It takes some getting used to, but it feels more useable and rewarding than the previous game.

Last year's Tiger Vision, which would give you a clue about where to aim on the green and how much power you needed to sink a putt, has also been cut. *Tiger 2006* uses a grid of lines laid over the green that pulse at different speeds depending on the slope of the green. fire a weapon at the creature. Failing that you can just nudge her out of the way at the critical moment. And then film up-skirt shots as she picks herself up of the floor. See? It sounds brilliant.

FOG ALMIGHTY

But, in fact, Michigan pans out as a watered down survival-horror with ropey voice

acting and a terrible plot. With the city shrouded in fog (and monsters, don't forget) you and your news crew follow a series of baffling leads to get to the root of the mystery. During this exploration, the worse elements of Silent Hill come into play – you wander around dimly lit rooms pointing your camera at objects waiting for a cursor to turn orange. You click a button, wait for a clue, a piece of evidence, plus an explanation why it's quite useless to you

right now. Then you solve a simple problem and endure five minutes of cut-scene – by which we mean a black screen with subtitles and a voiceover. Other irritating features include sound man Brisco standing in the way of doors and a control system that expects you to wait for your presenter to walk to a marker point before you can progress. Of course, she walks *really* slowly.

We're also feeling massively short-changed at the lack of eroticism. The only point where something 'sexy' happened was when Brisco, Nina (presenter #6) and our cameraman alter-ego got stuck in a bathroom together. It went all quiet and it looked like something might happen. Like Nina might get in the bath. But then Brisco got wedged between the toilet and the wall and it took ten minutes for us all to tumble out of the door. Bloody hell, we so wanted this one to be good... ■ GW

When we heard Shaolin Monks was abandoning its beat-'em-up roots to become a roaming, platform adventure, we were ready to give up on Mortal Kombat completely. MK: Deception was weak, and the whole 'K' instead of 'C' thing hasn't been cool for years. We gathered our MKT-shirts, collectable Sub Zero figurines and prepared a small bonfire in the garden to say our farewells. But now we've played it, and Khrist alive it's back and better than ever. Despite the changes it's everything you'd expect – brutal, bloody, fast and fun. As one overexcited team member spouted, "It's Mortal God Of Kombat War."

HAT'S ENTERTAINMENT

The fighting justifiably steals the show. It's a meaty, fist-swinging orgy of face pain. You can button bash but you'll miss out on the variety of ass kickery available. There's the usual light, medium and heavy attacks – the latter lifting foes into the air for a spot of juggling – and a throw. But there's also a modifier button, changing your basic moves to unleash more punishing combos. Start mixing it up and the potential's vast. One very cool move is a flying kick that keeps you airborne, enabling you to leap from enemy to enemy. There's also an old favourite: Kung Lao's razor-brimmed hat, which can be thrown Frisbee-style to decapitate people. Suh-weet.

Joining Kung as a second playable character is Liu Kang (the pyjama-wearing, Bruce Lee wannabe with a mullet). You can play either on your own, or with a friend in a 'ko-op' mode. We've also seen Sub Zero, Raiden, Johnny Cage and Baraka making non-playable cameos. Even the old levels are back as many of the classic arcade arenas have had a 3D makeover.

The fatalities also return, but this time there are ten for each character, accessed through the expected button



tappage. However, they must be earned. As you despatch foes you earn experience points. These can be spent to unlock new fatalities or to upgrade other fighting moves and skills. In fact, rather than dumbing things down, *Shaolin Monk's* new action/adventure direction provides the depth needed to revive the flagging series. We're not mad keen on the collect-the-coin-to-continue progression, and the 360° combat could be tighter. Nonetheless, on this showing it's a massive return to form for the Kombat kids. LH

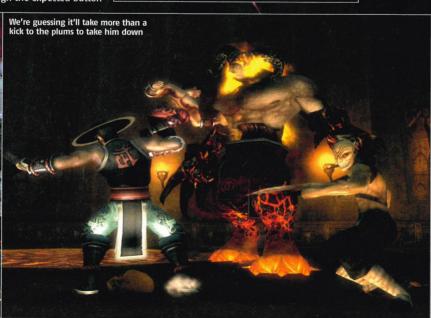

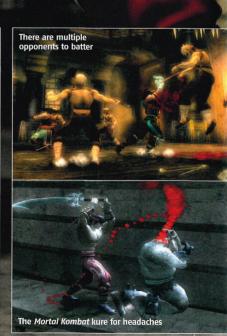

Imagine if the *Tony Hawk's* games had guns. Keep the scoring system, tricks and special moves – but replace the skateboards with weapons and the wipeouts with bullet-riddled deaths. As weird as that sounds, it's the best way to describe this hyperactive, taco-munching shooter. A manic blast of Latin-flavoured action that rewards you for killing in *style*, as well as sheer body count.

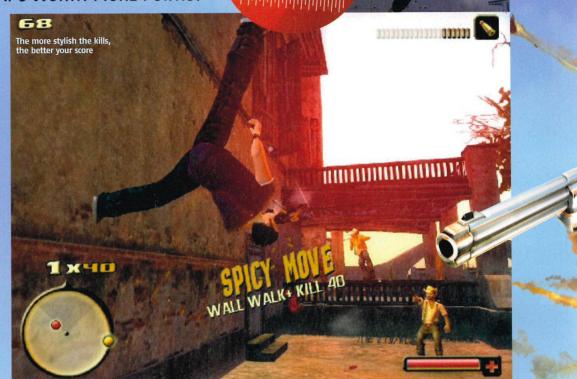
The way it works is simple: you get points for shooting people, and the more flamboyant the kill, the higher the score. There's also a timer that counts down after each fatality. If you kill another person before it runs out, then you begin to build a combo. Where it gets more interesting though, is that you don't just shoot people. You can run them over, blow them up and call in a freakshow selection of special kills and power ups. All of which add multipliers and bonuses to your final score.

CHILI CON CARNAGE

A typical sequence might go like this: start with a bullettime dive to nail the first guy and a headshot to take out the second (there's a rhythm-based targeting system for these, adding an extra layer of skill). As the counter ticks away, jump in a car and drive through a crowd to gain more points, then hang out the side to tag a couple with the door. Finally, use another dive to exit the vehicle as it crashes, while shooting some explodo-barrels to take out even more thugs before you hit the ground. If you're good, it's possible to complete whole levels as a single combo.

This choreographed carnage doesn't just net you a score, however. Pull off a flawless sequence of slaughter and you can unlock a wealth of power-ups and special kills – 60 in all. These can range from spinning around like a helicopter, firing twin Uzis and hitting everything in sight, to unleashing a man dressed as skeleton, wielding

a grenade launcher (check out 'Unleash The Mexican Wrestler!'). There's also a damn handy rewind power – mess up your combo or get killed and you can wind back time for another go. Yeah, very *Prince Of Persia*, but when was the last time you saw *him* flying through the air carrying a shotgun, yelling "Eat chili and die!"

The plot follows ex-con Ramiro Cruz, as he takes on the drug traffickers that killed his father, but frankly, who cares about plot when wreaking havoc is this much fun? There's no doubt that this would be just another average shooter if it weren't for the genius combolscoring aspect, but because of this the whole thing is turned on its head. Before long you're constantly seeking out new and interesting ways to hurt people. Just like *Tony Hawk's*, you'll be trying out different routes, attacks and skills to maximise your score. And as well as the missions, there's a free-roaming challenge mode to test your skills, where you can wander the city, kicking ass for fun and profit.

Total Overdose is bizarre, but in a good way. It's a daft no-brainer/entertainer full of cheesy one-liners and huge sunburst explosions (plus a surprisingly excellent Mexican hip-hop soundtrack). If the crazy combo action can stay fresh throughout then this could be one hot tamale. Full arse-ruining review soon.

BEST FOR CRUISING?

Not in a wandering-around-Soho-with-a-yellow-neckerchief-poking-out-of-your-back-pocket sense. *Most Wanted* gives you a vast cityscape to explore, picking up races and challenges by driving over the hotspots dotted around. But there the similarities with its predecessor end. The new city is played entirely in daylight, and in contrast to *Underground 2*'s fairly anonymous urban sprawl, the new environment is rich, detailed and diverse — with instantly recognisable landmarks deliberately placed to make navigation easier. Obviously, traffic varies depending on whether you're hammering down the freeway or tootling around suburbia,

although it doesn't approach *Burnout*'s choked-lane mentalism – but that's okay because the cops create all kinds of mayhem. One particularly cool section we've seen involved racing between tollbooths, pursued by the filth (who chat constantly on their radios and scream at you using megaphones) on a costal road complete with run-down boardwalk and amusements. Brilliantly, there's plenty of scope for going off-road, using tight alleyways and secret shortcuts to lose the 'ello 'ello 'elloing lawmen.

BEST FOR DRIVING SLOODOOOWLY

Don't panic, moonface. *Need For Speed: Most Wanted* is still fast like a greyhound on a waterslide, but executing particularly tight turns has been simplified using the new Speedbreaker function, which operates – and let's be absolutely frank about this – almost *exactly* like the 'zone' in *Midnight Club 3: DUB Edition*. So, once you're travelling over 100mph or so, a meter will begin filling. Click R3 and the camera zooms in, the sound drops out and the screen goes two-pints-of-neat-vodka blurry. More relevantly, everything slows down and the control over your car is increased. The upshot being that you can wrench it through otherwise stupidly narrow gaps without losing a fleck of paint. 'Bullet time for cars!' you may not unreasonably cry at this point.





BEST FOR DRIVING LIKE A MADMAN

Making a car on PS2 look exactly like a car from real life is not that hard - look at 674, that was all just wet sand, Bonjela and mother-of-pearl, believe it or not. But making one actually feel like you're driving a car is tough, and if you're going to all the trouble of invoking the spirit of driving, you might as well sup the strongest spirits available. And by that, of course, we mean the Hollywood spirit of driving: huge chases, spectacular crashes and fragile fruit markets. You lost your way at the Bonjela, didn't you? Do keep up.

Burnout Revenge laughs in the face of reality, then piles into it at 185mph and explodes in its ear. You'd hardly think it possible, but the chaos peaks higher than in Burnout 3: Takedown. Much higher. One particular section of new track, for instance, is said to contain more traffic than an entire lap of B3's busiest course. That's possible because you can now punt fellow commuters out of your way, so

long as they were travelling in the same direction as you when they died. (Actually, despite the 'gritty' and probably 'urban' makeover, there's still no hint of life, injury or death here. It's Hollywood, baby, and popcorn doesn't bleed.) So now you can drive into, through, under or even over (welcome to the vertical Takedown) all that traffic in a spark-deluge to rival the money shot in a robot porno. It makes the deranged chases in Bad Boys II look like a gentle comedy of table manners by Emily Brontë – particularly if you're racing one of the Miami-style tracks at the time. The locations are Switzerland, Italy, USA and China, for the geographers out there. Yo to the geographers.

BEST FOR MOD-HATEI

Some of you may enjoy being judged by a mentally subnormal bodybuilder in a tight white vest, but we don't welcome that kind of thing here. Burnout Revenge is far more simply focused than the clusterflunk of Fast & Furious clones – you wreak traffic havoc, cause enormous damage to property, and twist the unlicensed-

but-oddly-familiar cars of your foes into unrecognisable tangles. Simple. Explosive. Wincingly fast. Crash mode now has a golfing mentality - a power-bar launch and a wind-affected flight towards, you hope, the target-rich 'holes' rather than barren 'bunkers' - to introduce a



opponents are newly colour-coded according to how much they hate you. Which, unsurprisingly, is a lot.

BEST FOR TOTAL CAR-NAGE

Excited? If you're like us, you can hardly wait, but will accept some gentle tweaking in the meantime. Eliminator races have been significantly furious-ised by the elimination judgement – which sees the last-placed car exploding like Jerry Bruckheimer colliding head-on with a comet - that's made every 30 seconds, rather than at the end of each lap. What's more, each successive lap carries a multiplication bonus, so all damage on lap two is worth twice the amount as on lap one, and so on. Barging small cars into big lorries (which can't be hit directly without crashing, whichever side of the road they're on) earns bonus cash, and your in-race destruction levels now determine how much stuff you unlock. Other racers, innocent traffic, anything not made of concrete... in fact, breaking anything at all counts towards your Revenge meter and overall driver rating. And let's face it, nobody wants to be labelled 'harmless' - driving neatly to a win isn't good. Fitting a cretinously large splitter doesn't even figure. But, thankfully, causing chaos does. On certain tracks the unlockables include the (previously crash

mode-only) Crashbreaker self-destruct for use in races. Not all tracks, though. Developer Criterion felt that would be just too much of a good thing.

BEST FOR RUINING THE WHOLE WORLD

The Burnout games have always looked impressive, but Revenge has gone up another notch with even more debris, bigger explosions, more damage types (such as flailing doors, for instance) and some sexy particle effects. On some of the sunnier tracks, the into-the-sun bloom effects have been taken to the extreme, with the result that obliterating everything except your tailbone against a bus's radiator becomes almost poetically likely. Even very large vehicles loom out of the white haze at the last moment like some kind of very large, looming vehicle. It's a shocker. Firing the Crashbreaker at times like this eases the pain, and also easily takes out several passing racers. It's got quite a blast radius. At least, it'll demolish the others if they're on the same road, as there are now all manner of alternate routes, jumps and shady alleys to find. You may need to smash through a barrier to find them and each has its own benefits and dangers, while every track is littered with solid objects, making those hyperspeed road fights that little bit more unbelievably, catastrophically perilous. And all without a single Subaru Impreza in sight! We are agape. ■

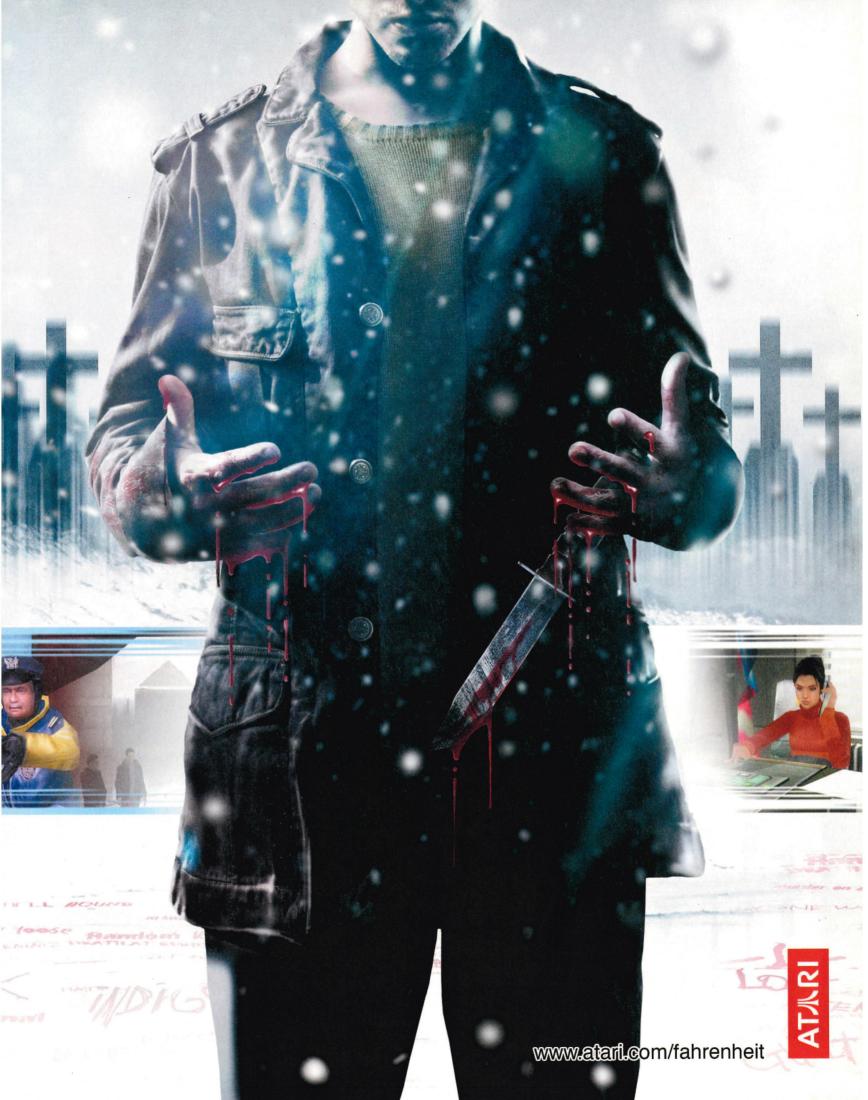
















FIFA 05



ootball thrives on bitter grudge matches. Just take a look at the dugout during any Man United vs Arsenal game and you can see how much 'getting one over' matters. That's why Arsene Wenger sits there silently chewing through his own tongue, while Sir Fergie does a decent impression of a saucepan of boiling Ribena. And it's no different on PS2. The annual clash between FIFA and Pro Evolution Soccer is the spiciest rivalry in videogames.

The stakes are now so high that when we visit EA's Vancouver studio to see FIFA 06, its producer describes the situation as like Coke vs Pepsi. The obvious implication is that EA sees itself as Coke – the bigger, better–known brand. But after that the analogy falls down, because your choice of fizzy tooth–rot is purely down to personal taste and you can't categorically prove one's better than the other. Not so with games. Despite the fact that FIFA perennially outsells Pro Evo (by about half again), Konami's game undoubtedly remains the critic's choice. The gulf isn't as massive as you might imagine, but checking Metacritic.com, which averages out hundreds of reviews from across the world, reveals that last year's FIFA scored 81 compared to Pro Evo's 92. And EA doesn't like that particular statistic one little bit.

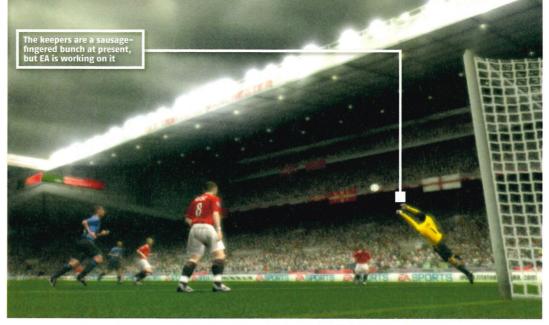
With the next generation within groping distance, the super publisher is determined to reinvent its ultralucrative franchise. We're told this year's game is a complete reinvention (at which point a small child enters and whispers 'Challenge Everything' in our ear). And in stark contrast to previous years, EA is now openly talking about beating *Pro Evo* at its own game. Over the next few pages we explain – step by step – how *FIFA* has been rebuilt, and deliver our verdict on how it plays. Go on, there's just time to grab a pie before we kick off.

STEP 1: BRING IN NEW BLOOD

The best indication of just how serious EA is about rebuilding FIFA is its team - three quarters of whom are new to the series. Wondering what happened to the old lads? Relocated. Which we assume is management speak for 'taken into the car park and shot'. The most important signing is a group of programmers drafted in from EA's Japanese office. These boys previously worked on FIFA Total Football – the Japanese version of the game, the second instalment of which scored an impressive 36/40 in Weekly Famitsu (the magazine routinely described as Japan's 'videogaming bible', mainly by people who don't read Japanese or know that it's actually more of a family-friendly tabloid). The game rated so highly due to its improved tactical depth over the western version, and that's exactly what's been added to FIFA 06.

In FIFA 2005 there were holes in the midfield big enough to pitch a marquee in. But play 06 and the difference is immediately obvious, with players making much more intelligent runs and midfielders charging forward to support the strikers. The result being that the goals are now shared around the team more equally, rather than just being scored by your strikers. The improvements are less pronounced while defending, and at times it can still feel awkward trying to wrench your centreback into the right position to block a run, but overall it definitely looks and feels more like football. The increased depth also applies to in-game tactics, which can now be altered on the fly by tapping the D-pad to switch to counter attack, wing play or several other variants. Particularly cool is 'box overload', which orders everyone forward - perfect when you're chasing a goal in the last few seconds.

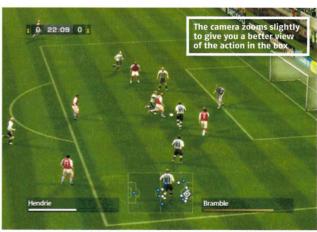


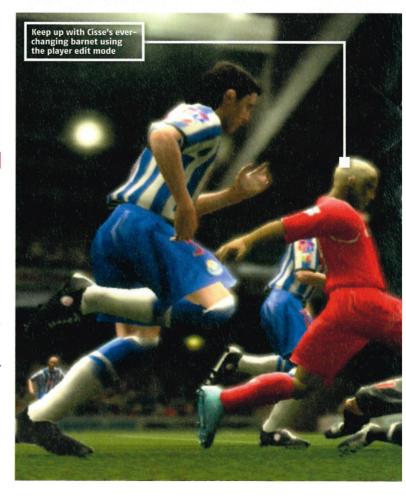


STEP 2: LOSE THE GIMMICKS

One of the biggest and most accurate criticisms of FIFA in the past has been the obsession with coming up with some flashy new feature for marketing to plaster all over the box. Two years ago it was the hopelessly convoluted 'Off The Ball' mode which, among other things, allowed you to activate an icon-driven Madden-style passing system. Bleurgh. Last year's innovation was the 'First Touch' feature, designed to let you flick the ball smoothly in another direction while bringing it under control, theoretically leaving your bamboozled marker looking like Titus Bramble with concussion. And, when you remembered it was there, it actually worked quite well. But this year the focus isn't on any one element. Instead, the emphasis has been put on making the core game – pass, move, shoot - brilliant. It's tempting to say 'well, duh', but in order to truly fix FIFA, going back to basics was essential. And with so much riding on the game, it's actually pretty brave.

So, how does it play? Imagine splicing last year's FIFA and Pro Evo together and you've got a decent idea. It's immediately clear that a painstaking attempt has been made to emulate what makes Konami's series so brilliant, right down to sharing the exact same controls for certain tricks (see 'Could It Be More Like Pro?') and even offering Pro Evo's button layout as an alternative option. The biggest improvement probably comes in the passing, which is crisp and accurate. The shooting is also now completely free-form, in the sense that your shots aren't computer-assisted rockets, as was often the case before. Now the ball goes exactly where you aim. So initially you'll find yourself dragging shots wide or shanking them at the keeper, but it's a system that should be more rewarding once perfected. Unfortunately, at present the goalies are sub-Roy Carroll standard, routinely spilling even the tamest strikes. With only a couple of weeks in development left, this has been earmarked as a priority for the team to fix. Best dig out those Petr Cech videos, eh lads?

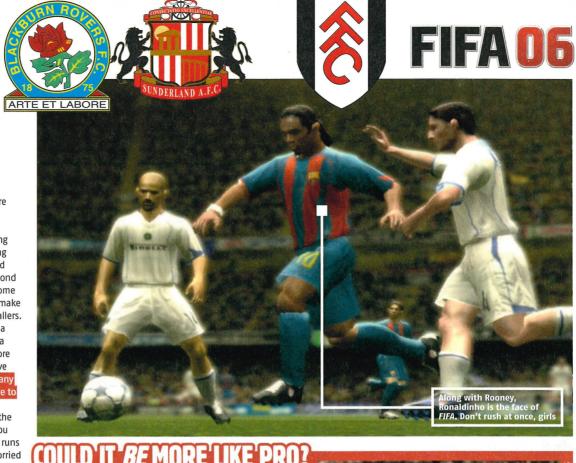




STEP 3: **DITCH THE SCRIPT**

The emphasis on total control extends throughout FIFA 06, to the point where we're promised that nothing in the game will be 'scripted'. Scripting is an accusation often levelled at Pro Evo, with its detractors arguing that the game artificially creates goal-scoring opportunities. But that's never really washed with us, because getting stung by a last-second sickener is what football's all about! Plus, some degree of scripting is probably necessary to make sure your teammates behave like real footballers. (Cue cut-scene showing Kluivert dancing in a nightclub.) Playing the game, it's clear that a huge effort has been made to make FIFA more flexible and fluid. Now that the players move more intelligently, it feels like you've got many more options on the ball, making it possible to string together some terrific moves. Your defenders are also quick to cover, where in the past they would've left gaping holes, and you can rely on midfielders to make penetrative runs at the right time. However, we're slightly worried that visually the game seems to chug like previous version, particularly when there are a lot of players on-screen. Querying this, we were told the slowdown is a by-product of playing the US version, and won't be noticeable in the UK one. Obviously, we want to believe, but unless the slowdown can be fixed it could be 06's achilles heel. Or broken metatarsal.







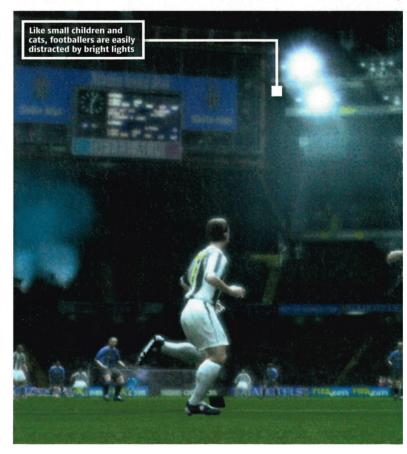


Brown envelopes shoved under a Little Chef toilet door, bailing your skipper out in the middle of the night, stress-induced triple heart bypasses... Just some of the perks enjoyed by today's top flight 'gaffers'. The management mode in FIFA 06 dwarfs that of its predecessors - largely because EA took the bold decision of axing Total Club Manager and using its team's expertise on FIFA instead. But successful management isn't just a case of buying a really expensive raincoat and looking furious. Your job involves controlling every aspect of the club, including all the expected stuff like negotiating transfers, organising training regimes, masterminding tactics and improving facilities. You'll also have to contend with hostile media coverage, securing sponsorship, dealing with tantrum-throwing players and numerous sanitytesting 'acts of God'. What's more, as in Pro Evo's Master League mode, your players will improve based on their training and performance during matches, which are shown either as a 2D overview or played out using the full FIFA engine. You can also export your custom team to use in the game's other modes. Speaking of which, 06 includes a new mode

Speaking of which, *06* includes a new mode called the FIFA Lounge. Known internally as 'the pub mode', this enables you to set up a minileague for up to eight mates, and the game then keeps track of all the results. Oddly though, players can also earn rewards that can be used to penalise each other. For instance, you could make your opponent start without his best striker or issue six of his players with yellow cards. It was at this point that we scribbled JESUS CHRIST! in our notepad – but before you ask, yes it can be switched off.







STEP 5: SECURE EVERY FOOTBALL LICENCE ON EARTH

One area in which FIFA consistently batters Pro Evo is licensing. This year's game comes bristling with fully official clubs and competitions. How many? Try 21 leagues and 10,000 correctly named and fully kitted-out players. To be fair, Pro Evo has made some progress - and in terms of the actual physical likenesses there's little to separate the two games (see 'Hello Handsome') but in terms of kits and badges, FIFA clearly has the edge. And there's also a voluminous player creation mode, in case you've got your heart set on painstakingly recreating your local nonleague hoofers. One criticism we would make though, is that although the players have now been given a wide range of individual skill attributes, as with previous FIFAs, they don't feel unique enough out on the pitch. Whereas in Pro Evo, you really get the sense that Adriano is muscular and skilful, in FIFA the star players just tend to seem faster. Again though, that's only a first impression.

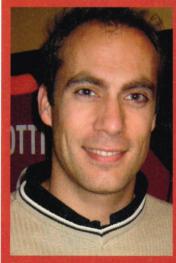
We're also told players will tire more visibly as the matches progress and respond to psychological factors such as going a goal down. Interesting stuff, but the impact wasn't really clear during matches. Hopefully extended play will reveal more. Overall, though, we're definitely impressed by *FIFA 06*. The decision to concentrate on the core game has paid off, and although some tricky problems remain, the derby match between the two big footballing powers should be harder fought than ever. Game on.

OPS2: How do you currently see the battle between *FIFA* and *Pro Evo*?

HR: The reality is that FIFA 2005 was a great football game, but we have a competitor that scores in the 90s in terms of quality, and FIFA was more in the 80s region. I thought Pro Evo 3 was excellent, but Pro Evo 4 felt very similar, and they'll probably build on that again this year because it will be the same engine. So the freshness won't be there, but it will still be a very good game. On the EA side, you have a competitor that's better than you according to some players, but not all the players. Some prefer FIFA, some prefer Pro Evo, but there has been a sense in which maybe hardcore gamers were more tempted by Pro Evo.

OP52: So rather than concentrating on one specific innovation you're bringing the gameplay as a whole up to *Pro Evo's* standards, yes? **HR:** Overall, I think *Pro Evo* touched on a good point, which is to always 'respect the football'. I'm a Frenchman, and most of the French

people play *Pro Evo*, but I think *FIFA 06* will deliver on both authenticity and realism in terms of making sure that it plays like football.

OPS2: How fierce is the battle between the two games?

HR: Well, it's like Nike against Adidas! What's also clear now is, because of the dominance of FIFA and Pro Evo, anyone else who tries to do a football game just collapses.

OPS2: Have you set out to make *FIFA 06* play more like *Pro Evo*?

HR: No, it plays more like football.

OP52: You also say *FIFA 06* won't be scripted at all. Do you think *Pro Evo* is scripted? **HR:** A lot of people complain about it – especially in Japan. Think about it this way: you've played *Pro Evo* enough to know that sometimes when you're winning 1–0 and there's a counter attack, you know the computer's going to score. You *know* it. That's because it's scripted.

OP52: But the computer doesn't score every time. You can stop it. So it's not scripted to the point where it's 100%...

HR: Well I'm convinced the posts are scripted. So, if you're in the area in the last two minutes of the game, and it's 1–1, you can almost be sure that the ball will hit the post. And that's scripted. That's what a lot of people complain about.

OPS2: How do you think the attacking gameplay has improved in *FIFA 06*?

HR: We wanted to make it more organic, so that midfielders will push into the box and sometimes score. The positioning of players is key, because when it starts to feel like real football you can then build on that and add more layers, but until the positioning is right you can't do anything.

OPS2: Have the visuals been re-done from scratch, too?

HR: No. The graphic's evolve every year, but the rendering engine is four years old. However, we

fully optimise it and add new effects. Our priority is good gameplay, so we've added more animations and improved the camera, just to serve the gameplay. And that was a shift in mentality. Everything we do has to support the gameplay.

OPS2: The *FIFA* games sell huge numbers. How conscious have you been of trying to keep the existing fans happy?

HR: These guys are mass-market gamers who love football, so if you give them a deep management mode, all the licences, all the teams, the chants, the classic players... I think they're going to be very happy, because you get a lot for your money. Because these people are football fans, they want to play with Rooney. They want to see him behaving on the pitch like he behaves; being aggressive, following the ball, being good at first touch, and so that's why we've concentrated on the players' attributes.

OP52: What will *FIFA* be like on PS3? **HR:** We're really going to tackle animation, but we don't just want to focus on graphics. Gamers want real football, and in the next generation we will focus on adding a lot of animation depth to make sure each player runs and dribbles differently. Ultimately, it should feel completely different every single time you play it.

OPS2: Is there a lot of pressure on you from the suits upstairs to get *FIFA 06* right? Are you sleeping okay?

HR: I've spent a lot of money, taken a lot of risks and grabbed some of the best staff from other teams. I've also asked for a lot of autonomy and freedom to be able to do what I want, which is not easy in this environment. If I don't have a 90, I'm out of here. The whole team is out of here.

OPS2: That's not true. They'll give you another chance, surely.

HR: It *is* true. I know what happened to a couple of teams before me.

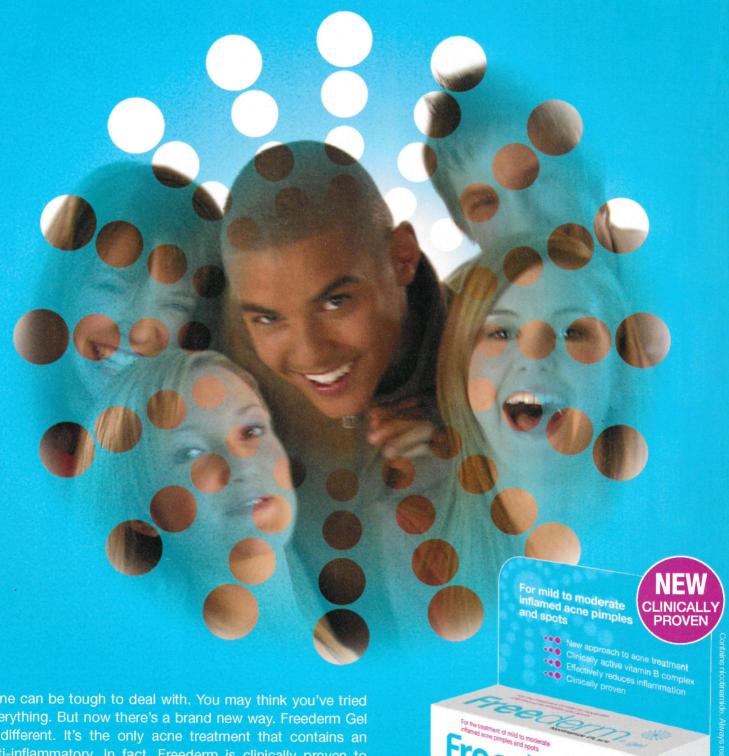

ere's how we lost our Pro Evo 5 cherry. We're playing Arsenal against Chelsea, both resplendent in fully accurate kits. It's midway through the second half and the Gooners have a free kick on the edge of the box. Up steps Thierry Henry. We brush the (a) button and he pings the ball over the Chelsea wall... dipping... curling... GET IN! The ball zips past Petr Cech and into the net. Your correspondent instantly jumps out of his seat, punches the air and swears euphorically. Scoring with a free kick has always been rock hard in *Pro Evo* (we can count the number scored in Pro Evo 4 on our actual balls) which also makes them by far the most satisfying goals. But that's only half of why we're so excited. See, our opponent on the day is none

other than John Terry, Chelsea skipper and last season's PFA Player Of The Year. "I can't believe that," he says, laughing, "I've been all over you!" And he's not wrong. Terry has been playing *Pro Evo* for five years, and it shows. Still buzzing from the free kick, we get complacent and he snatches an equaliser — a scrappy six-yarder from Drogba. The match finishes 1–1 and it's time for our interview. You can read that in full next month, alongside our exclusive *Pro Evo* 5 review. Right now though, you need to know everything about the new game.

Ch-ch-changes

The clue, as ever, is in the title: *Evolution*. Like we said last month, glance at the screenshots

and beyond the new kits you'd have a hard time taking the Pepsi challenge between *Pro Evo 4* and 5. And online play aside, there isn't a single new feature that you can point to and say, "here's why you *must* buy *Pro Evo* this year". But if you want an answer to that question, it's simply that *Pro Evo 5* feels and plays more like football than ever before. How so? It's all about the animation.

Pro Evo 5 has 20% more than its predecessor. We're talking flicks, lunges, snap shots, back heels, sliding passes... and it's not just about making the players look pretty – the gameplay impact is significant. Think about it this way: the more ways to interact with the ball and other players, the greater your sense of control. Out on the pitch, it immediately feels more physical. Get positioned under a high ball



Beautiful tackle

The way the ball responds to the caress of shin, boot and chest in *Pro Evo 5* is eye-cheatingly real. Forget about the PS3's rubber ducks; there's no better demonstration of how important accurate physics are than seeing an Adidas Roteiro ball springing off Stevie G's head at exactly the right angle.

It's this physical accuracy, coupled with the extra animation, that gives Pro Evo its ocean trench depth. The key – whether you're shooting, passing or tackling – is timing. Everything feels less automated now, which

critical that you time and weight your passes according to how all the players are positioned. Sounds dull? It's not. It's real football, and it's why stringing moves of geometric beauty together proves so satisfying.

As with the transition between Pro Evo 3 and 4 (which also added more animation) your initial reaction is likely to be that the game feels 'heavier' to play, but that's only because you're doing more of the work as opposed to relying on the computer to do it for you. About half a dozen games in, the subtleties will start to reveal themselves, and once that happens there's no going back.

A basically normal man gets irradiated. Then he turns green, grows massively, loses most of his clothes and destroys everything. In a city. And a desert.

Itimate is an overused word, and game subtitles are a rich source of overused words, but it's surprisingly hard to pick a fight with it here. Ultimate Destruction is probably the most chaotic, damage-intensive bout of happy slapping ever seen on PS2. It's almost biblical in scale, but with fewer locusts. Everything, from the beasts of the field to the helicopters of the sky to the office blocks of the city can be hit, smashed, thrown around, used as a weapon or blown up. Okay, throwing cows at helicopters may sound a bit camp, but Hulk doesn't stop there. How about bringing a Black Hawk down by throwing another Black Hawk at it? While the mangled hull of the one in your hands is still burning? Now that's a proper strop.

Grand, Theft and Auto are also overused words, ones that clearly come up in lesser developers' meetings on the end of 'We can rake in loads if we just quickly rip off...', but Radical Entertainment aren't such lazy copyists. The GTA influences are clear - the sprawling city, the roam anywhere gameplay, the story/non-story missions, the increasing police response - but they've taken the most suitable components and gone their own way with the rest. And there's nothing wrong with that. So, what in the hands of cynics could have just been a lame GTA clone with a big green gangster in the middle, is instead a faintly wrestling-flavoured beat-'emup with miles of scenery to ruin.

Remember the ambulance missions in GTA, where you rush fragile patients to hospital? In one side mission in Hulk, an ambulance has broken down and the fragile patient must be rushed to hospital. A cheap knock-off would use this to crow about 'in-car driving missions', but Hulk just picks up the whole ambulance and runs. Most amusing. Of course,





you probably accidentally kill 15 people or so during your mercy dash, but hey, sacrifices have to be made. Secretly, we reckon the gamma ray programme that created The Hulk is secretly financed by the insurance industry in order to drive up profits.

HULKAMANIA

The main missions concern Banner's attempts to find a cure for his rage, though obviously it doesn't go that well, or we'd be reviewing 'Unremarkable Bruce: Inadequate Destruction'. He's aided by his pal Dr Leonard Samson, who works out of a church that serves as the game's main hub. It's here, away from the threats of the desert badlands and the city, that Hulk can buy combat upgrades with his Smash Points. There are over 150 moves in all, and happily they're worth having for more than just stylistic reasons. In fact, some missions remain unavailable until you've acquired certain abilities, simply because

think you're just buying mission-specific moves that will be useless elsewhere, though. Early on you're forced to get the Air Recovery move, which lets you regain control when blown ten stories high by, say, one hundred megatons of cruise missile. You face a lot of missiles in that mission, but it's not an isolated incident. It happens all the time.

In fact, we've rarely been pinned in the centre of such a whirling shitstorm in all our gaming years (like dog years, only longer and with more crying). Fair enough, a giant green man is a pretty good target, but there's almost no usable cover, and enemies attack from all sides. If you don't bust out a decent array of those 150 moves, you simply won't survive.

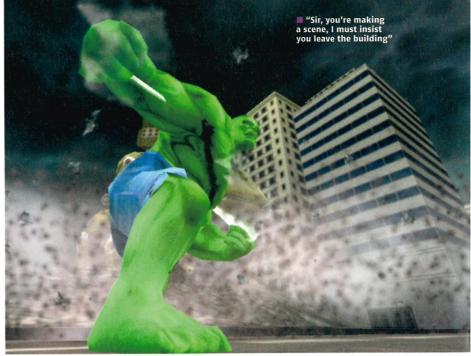

With a man who simply gets really, really angry as a power – radioactively aided or not – a politically correct makeover was always going to be difficult. So nobody's bothered doing one. Yay! Perhaps our favourite side mission is Batter Up, where Hulk is perched on top of a beachside skyscraper with a golf club-shaped piece of debris. This particular fact is massively unfortunate for the soldiers wanting to drop onto the roof and fight, rather than get welted 300 yards out to sea...

The ultra-narrow alleys between city skyscrapers provide the only real respite, and while you're not seriously going to hide in them (it's just not that kind of game), it's at least a relief to avoid some incoming fire every now and then. It can actually get quite annoying, with the helicopters being particular irritants. They're almost constantly drilling you with machine guns and never miss, while missiles home in repeatedly from seemingly everywhere.

It's usually entertaining chaos, but at times it gets too much. Particularly in open spaces. For instance, you pick up a bus to throw at a helicopter and a rocket blows it out of your hands. You pick it up again and another rocket blows it away. And again. And again. And again... until your headache forces you to switch off. You can even find yourself suspended in the air on streams of rockets, completely unable to do anything and utterly controlled by your battering enemies.

With the destruction at its considerable peak - whole buildings collapsing while you swat helicopters with a burning tank turret, for instance - comes a further problem. Visually the game is only reasonable at the best of times, but the scruffy boxiness seems a fair trade for the sheer number of objects you're able to throw, break and blow up. But at the worst of times, with everything exploding everywhere, the camera hardly seems to know where to look. And where it does look, it sees a confusing mess. While we frequently died in a swarm of warheads, unsure of what was happening, we also won raging boss battles in exactly the same way - utterly out of control. Sometimes it seems like the destruction is too much for even the game to deal with.

Learning to prioritise your most dangerous foes certainly helps, but the story missions are still surprisingly tough. Just swinging Hulk's fists is nowhere near enough, and we like the way you're forced to learn and use his moves as a consequence. Yet even with a fairly good grip on his powers, the odds are stacked pretty heavily against you. Being seasoned pros we played on the Normal setting, but very nearly pushed the buttons right through the pad as a consequence. Powering up an attack (by holding a button down) is vital, and it's a fraught process with so much incoming fire. Like a sinking submarine approaching crush depth, our Dual Shock buttons pinged and creaked. But it's impossible to play Ultimate Destruction without imperilling your pad in a fittingly Hulk-like fashion. And gritting your teeth so hard they start to bend. And ruining your jeans. Perhaps not the ultimate way to enjoy yourself, but Hulk is well worth a crack nonetheless. Esteve Williams

he most excitement a lorry driver gets is the flashing beams of the faster vehicles queuing up behind him. The main mode is a series of missions designed to get 'mutha' out of chokey. There's more to the story, but we credit you with more class than to care. Handling of trucks is unsatisfying - understeer is understandable, but it sure is tedious on the windier roads, and the impressive reversing mechanic lets itself down when, too often, the truck's cab thrashes around like the head of an angry python. Plus the missions are repetitive and usually too short.

It's a shame, because BMT2 successfully uses ideas from other driving games, and adds them to its own cash-driven preoccupations: bribing the unscrupulous and pimping your truck. Both you and your PS2 deserve something much better than this. It's a distressingly basic, unlovely and very short first-person shooter based on the filmsiest of plots. onspiracy: Weapons Of Mass Destruction is a first-person shooter, but only in the way that the stripped, burning chassis of a Lada Riva is still a car, or the bloated carcass of a mongrel washed in on the tide is still a dog. Barely clinging to the classification, this consistently disappointing game takes an instantly forgettable hunt-the-virus plot and dresses it up in some of the blockiest graphics and most clunky gameplay we've ever seen.

That whistling noise you can hear? It's not just the sound of *Conspiracy* sucking, it's your sharp intake of breath as the game repeatedly manages to rub the salt of poor execution into the wound of lazy ideas. A few examples: it's bad enough that you can empty an entire clip into some enemies AT POINT BLANK RANGE with apparently little or no ill effect to them, but it's even more distressing to see blood stains floating in thin air when you eventually do nail them. Then there's the bullet holes that lay sheet-like over environmental damage, and then fade away. *Fade away*. And how about the

game's exploding barrels? A soul-deadening shooter cliché in any game, but *Conspiracy* can do one worse: its barrels can't even muster smooth surfaces. They're ugly, octagonal pretences at cylinders that appear to have been rendered by someone who's never even seen a curved line, let alone tried to draw one.

Talking of barrels, the game unerringly continues to scrape one the longer you play. Unlike your opponents' apparently bullet-proof skin, your wisp of a health bar is an absolute joke. Moreover, you could finish entire games in the weapon reload times, and the no-brainer puzzles barely constitute decisions, let alone choices or conundrums. Oh, and to cap it all, it's a very short experience, so even if you did summon up the willpower to give the game a rinsing, you'd be done and dusted in one hopelessly wasted afternoon. Tops. Ironically, brevity is probably Conspiracy's one redeeming feature. At least it would be if some hapless gamers weren't doomed to blow 30 quid on a total lemon. Paul Fitzpatrick

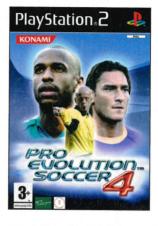

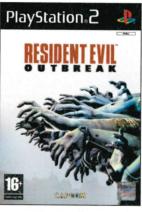

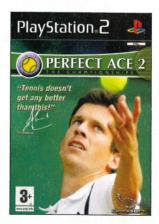

Four people go through the same radioactive cosmic storm, vet. inexplicably, get completely different superhero-type abilities. And then they hit lots of things.

Indestructible

e could have very easily given this an 'ironic' score - a Fantastic 4 out of 10, if you will. But even that's a point too high for such a souldestroying excercise in supertedium. Who knows, maybe one day you'll get a job working in videogame development. If so, consider the rest of this review your handy 'what not to do' guide. Where to start? Well, for a kickoff, the game thinks you're an idiot. Reasonable assumption, maybe - after all, you're the one who bought it - but it's still annoying to find a game that insists on giving you a little countdown warning before something as complex and hard to grasp as 'hammering & really fast'.

Each of the 'four' has their own powers. Sue does invisibility, The Thing throws stuff, Reed's a bit stretchy and opens doors and Johnny sets fire to things. When they're together, you can flick the D-pad to switch between them to solve puzzles, with a couple of basic team attacks available on different button combos. The trouble is that as soon as you start toying with this setup it's clear that there's a lazy range of moves on offer. Each of the 'fantastic' four isn't fleshed out with their own set of unique moves - rather, an uneasy compromise has given everyone the same basic set of controls with minor variations representing their special powers. Instead of being a proper stealth character, for instance, Sue just turns invisible and everybody just forgets that she was there, letting her sneak up and do stealth kills unmolested. Instead of flying - like he does in the film - Johnny floats just off the ground and rather randomly just happens to have better

dodge moves than anyone else. Unlike the Spider-Man and Hulk games, which give you a proper depiction of their hero's skills and a citysized toybox to try them out on, here you're restricted to shuffling down corridors and punching robots. Oh, and being peppered with inane advice.

FANTASTIC BORE

'Digger' Molemen, for instance, only take damage when knocked down. In any game worth its sodium chloride, you'd work this out on your own, perhaps noticing something in their physiology that makes them more vulnerable when they're flat on their backs. Not in Fantastic 4, though - here you're told to knock them down, and even told what combo to use (@, @, @, if you can't stand the suspense). Why? Because knocking them down doesn't make any logical sense. And the game's full of that kind of stuff. It's a series of shrugged 'whatevers' in place of good ideas and coherent design.

Also crowbarred into the mix are some imperilled civilians, but all they do is confuse things and make the bad guys look even more hopeless. At one point The Molemen are attacking a Subway. This is irritating enough because they fire poison, which [grinds teeth]

reverses everyone's controls. That must've taken seconds to think up. Worse still, is when you're called on to save a construction worker. The camera's swirling around, so it takes you a good 20 seconds to find him. But despite the delay, his energy bar's hardly scratched. Bored, we stood and watched while a Moleman hacked away at him for nearly a minute before we intervened. Where's the challenge in that? We're not in favour of killing innocent people, but if you're gigantic rock-monster-hero The Thing and you're beating up things that can't even murder a weedy man properly, that's not super-heroism, it's bullying.

CHILD'S PLAY

So you have enemies that are juvenile, weak and pathetic, and to accompany that, the rest of the game is relentlessly patronising. There's very little sense of satisfaction to anything you do. Hideous mini-games











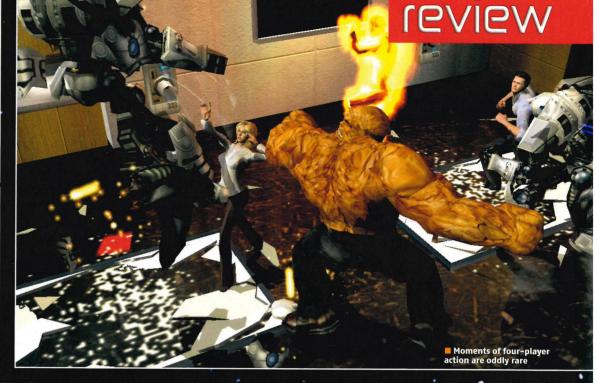
drag simple moments, such as breaking a balcony to escape, into a drawn out, pointless ordeal. Computer hacking's the same – a fivesecond puzzle that does nothing but shred your patience and waste your life. (Yeah, we said computer hacking – no overused and clichéd idea goes unused here.) Meanwhile, boss battles are reduced to tedium, priming you with a helpful 'Ready? Go!' before making you do three 'timed' button presses that wouldn't challenge a monkey. It doesn't feel organically connected to the action onscreen, because it waits until you're finished before your character actually does anything, and yet the game's amazingly, inexplicably impressed, dishing out a 'Well Done!' after the simplest, most remedial of tasks. You get the feeling that during production someone must've lobbied for a peripheral that'd give you a pat on the head and a biscuit at the end of each level.

You may argue that this sort of thing, working within the constraints of a pretty terrible film, was to be expected and that we should give it an easy ride. You might even say it's just a bit of fun, a bash-'em-up that's okay if you fancy switching your brain off for a bit. But you'd be wrong – to be so casual about this abomination would be an act of tolerance implying you were actually brain dead. This is an awful cash-in, and we'd much rather eat our own bodyweight in Fantastic 4 breakfast cereal than have to play it again. ■ Joel Snape

ike a sideswipe to the kidneys with a rusty trident from a dwarf wearing nothing but a lion-mane loincloth and a thin sheen of olive oil, Colosseum: Road To Freedom has taken us by complete surprise. Twice.

Surprise one: we were fully expecting this Gladiator-inspired sandal vandal combat game from the guys behind the hyper-kinetic Dynasty Warriors to crank the relentless action knob right off. But it doesn't. Instead you get intense bouts of arena combat that require real skill to survive, sandwiched between thoughtful – but not too thoughtful - RPG-style training and weapon massaging. And surprise two: given the existing. offal-dripping brilliance of Capcom's Shadow Of Rome, we were fully expecting to give the Maximus-come-lately Colosseum a thumbs

down. But we can't. The thing is, what this game lacks in Shadow's pace and sheer volume of ketchup, it makes up for with slow-burning appeal. Nurturing a lowly slave and building his reputation and combat skills is more rewarding than it sounds. Of course, building a formidable arsenal of spiked, hooked and multi-bladed instruments of organ-pokery while you're about it doesn't hurt any.

There's other good news. The combat system is enjoyably complex, giving you buttons for left, right, high and low blows with either a single weapon and shield or dual weapons. And the reward dynamic encourages investment in your gladiator, since winnings in the arena are split between you and your slave master. Earn enough and eventually you'll buy your freedom.

That's right!

Quite frankly, if the game camera didn't demand constant and frustrating manual adjustment - hard to do when you're trying to fend off four barbarians with a dagger -Colosseum would have scored higher. As it is, it wins kudos and favour for its fresh approach. Oh, and did we mention you get to fight elephants? Have it in your mouth, Nellie! ■ Paul Fitzpatrick

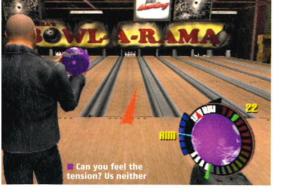

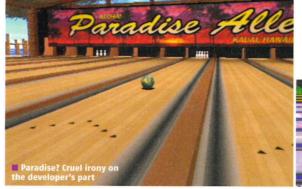

et's face it, making a quality bowling game shouldn't rank as a major challenge to most developers. Even if they spend time honing the ball and pin physics, lavish attention on the character design and create pixel perfect alleys, it could still be knocked out on a rainy Wednesday lunchtime. If you really wanted to hit pins on PS2, wouldn't you want a system like that?

Well, you know where this is heading don't you? Black Market Bowling doesn't have lavish graphics, deep gameplay options, attractive character design or particularly sensitive physics. But above all these failings is a control system

that attempts to be flexible and slick, but ends up feeling imprecise and utterly divorced from the activity gamers are supposed to be enjoying.

Sure, you could hand over your 15 guid and take the time to master it, but why don't you just call up your mates, arrange to meet up at the local Megabowl and hire a lane for a couple of hours with the cash instead. kay, so Alpine Skiing 2005 probably isn't going to have SSX On Tour quaking in its designer moon boots. And yes, it's more than a little rough around the edges. (Take the claim that it can handle up to 12 players. True, but it's a take-it-in-turns deal.) But overall there's definitely 15 quid's worth of entertainment here.

It breaks down like this. You get 48 real ski runs and a succession of downhill, slalom, giant slalom and super G(iant slalom) events. Which is about as much slalom as any man can handle. The events can be tackled as either stand-alone races, one-off challenges or as stages in the game's central career mode. If you've ever played a sports game, then this will be instantly recognisable. You win races, you earn cash, you spend it on performance-enhancing equipment and a trainer. If you do well, then you'll proceed to bigger races, more cash, and the cycle continues. That's the theory anyway.

As it happens, it's a theory you're likely to want to apply, thanks to the likable racing experience. The skiing's fast, with responsive controls that don't come between your skills (or lack of them) and how your skier hurtles down mountainsides. Hit a rhythm on any event slalom in particular - and carving a perfect racing line is ample reward for your efforts. No classic, but this is a solid game that more than warrants a speculative punt. 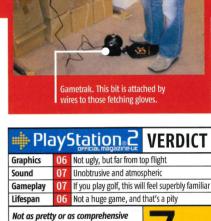

s committed sailors, we really wanted to like Wild Water. Canoeing games don't come along that often (alright, ever) and using the analogue sticks to row sounds interesting. As does hurtling down rivers at the mercy of the currents, paddling frantically to make turns and avoid rocks. And it almost comes off. The sense of floating along with only an oar to steer your course works well. Unfortunately, the novelty value soon wears off, thanks to a lack of variety and the overall pisspoor design.

Test your friendships with Wild Water's unusual co-op mode

The controls take some getting used to, but it soon becomes instinctive and knackering in equal measure. In single-player races each stick controls one side of the paddle, while in the four-player mode, four pads control one person at each corner of a raft. If you want to go left, you rotate the right stick(s) frantically, working that oar and turning the boat. Races then consist of guiding your kayak through the fastest lines possible against the currents to beat the clock. You're literally forcing the boat to go with the flow, not rowing for speed alone. It's quite

strategic, requiring you to watch the water ahead and plan your strokes in advance. The rivers are impressive, too. Each is full of swells, dips, waterfalls and scattered with dead spots and fast eddies.

WATER WAY TO GO

It's a shame then, that despite the potential on offer, numerous flaws sink this game. The camera always faces the nose of your vessel, which is a problem when progress often involves rowing across the river, but you still need to see downstream. As a result, the view often focuses on the riverbank, the sky, trees; anywhere you're not actually going. While the controls are fun, there are only time trial or slalom events and it soon gets dull. The courses are also poorly designed, considering the frantic paddling required to navigate them. You can't change direction instantly in a small boat, so some of the narrower stretches are extremely unforgiving - it's possible to get pinned against rocks, hopelessly caught forever by the current. Realistic maybe, but not much fun. And unfortunately that sums up the whole game. **Leon Hurley**

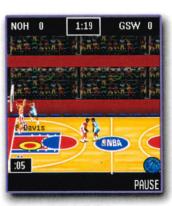

he first thing that strikes you about *Pursuit Force* is the beautiful simplicity of the idea — why has nobody done a game like this on *any* console before (never mind the handheld PlayStation)? It's a police car racer that has you jumping from cop to criminal car with a single button press. It's kinetic and frenetic. The retroheads among you will be impressed by how it echoes classic arcade title *Chase HQ*, but the rest of us can coo at the *GTA*-like freshness of the concept and *Burnout*-esque vibrancy of the visuals.

And after playing through the first five levels of the game, we'd wager that *Pursuit Force* will become just as essential for PSP as either of those two games are for PS2. While the bread and butter objectives usually involve playing catch up with law-breakers, you'll often be given different kinds of missions. At one point we

had to kidnap and subdue a passenger while outrunning the crims, and later on make sure a truck laden with explosives didn't explode. Enemies include a pack of crazy lady-crims you chase in a giant articulated lorry, and we're promised a variety of vehicles to take charge of or hijack, including motorbikes, boats and aircraft (there are moments were you take the passenger seat in an armed helicopter, firing at the vehicles on a car-packed freeway below).

Grand Theft Auto: Liberty City Stories may well be at the top of your PSP most wanted list, but we'd strongly suggest you put Pursuit Force straight in behind it. An excellent concept well executed, we're itching to get our hands around the finished version – with a Christmas release planned, the wait may be a little while after the PSP's launch, but it will be totally worth the wait.

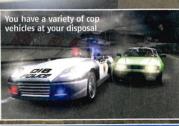




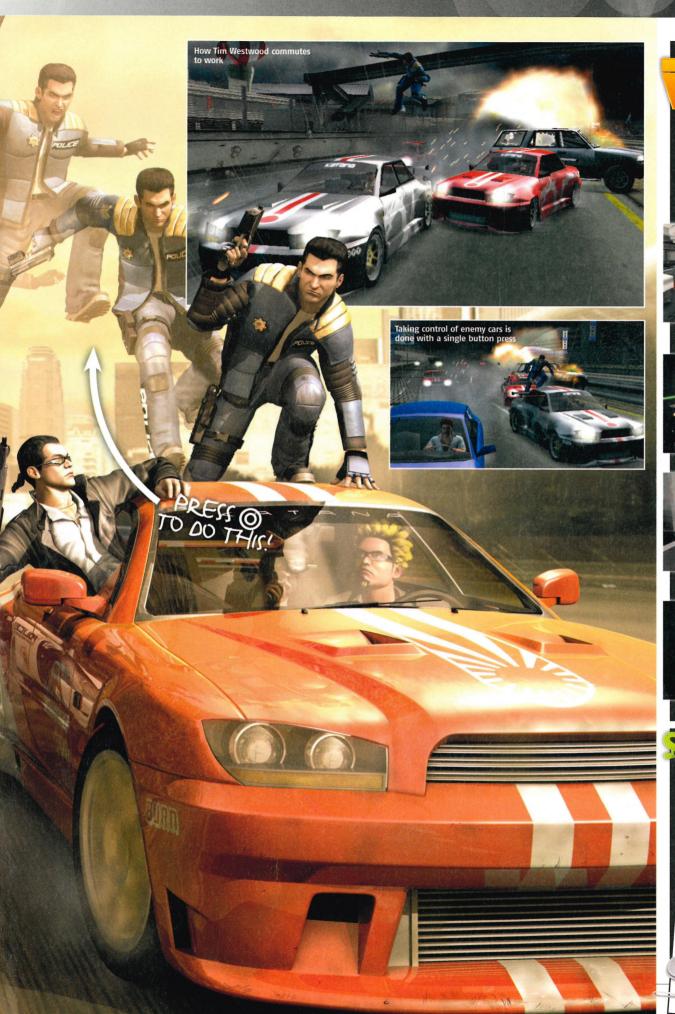

Although this version's content is a remix of the best tracks and cars from previous *Ridge Racer* games, on PSP it's minty fresh and sharply delicious. And it's in playing this that we've come to realise just how much further all the other PlayStation Portable racers need to go before they're worthy of sustained play and praise. *Need For Speed*, *Midnight Club* and *TOCA* are all put to instant shame by *Ridge Racer*'s unparalleled sense of speed and uncomplicated kicks.

First though, understand this about *Ridge Racer*. in an age of modding, ride pimpin' and NOS-powered hatchbacks, it's a more simple game that's elegantly accessible – even minimalistic – in comparison to the chav-pleasing racers out there. The basic structure

is a series of multi-track competitions, with successful performance unlocking courses with harsher and faster opponents. Before each race you choose a car from the line-up available, with more unlocked as you progress.

So far, so traditional, but *Ridge Racer* helped create this tradition when it first arrived as a PSone launch game ten years ago, so you can't really fault it. And anyway, *Ridge*'s racing is spiced up with an emphasis on drifting: long and successful power slides around corners and

past other drivers gradually fills up a boost gauge in the top left of the screen, and if you smoothly massage your vehicle through a bend you're rewarded with a G-force twanging burst of acceleration out of the skid.

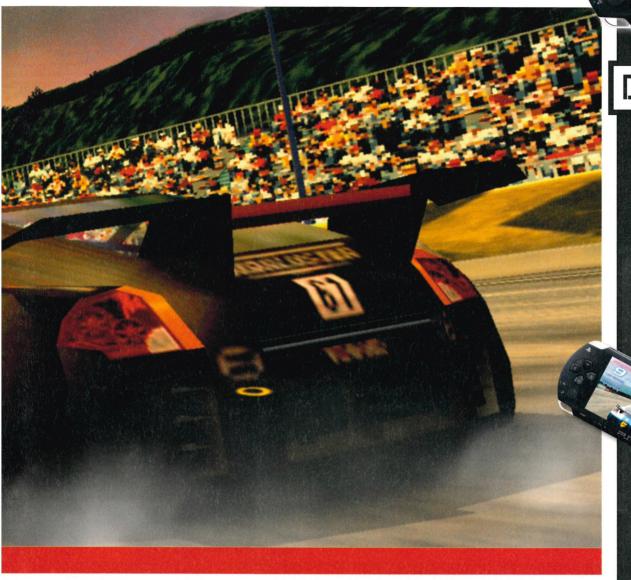
This 'reckless driving = boost' mechanic exists in almost every other racing game these days, but you can't criticise *Ridge*'s polished interpretation. In some of the hottest races, this part of the gameplay merges with the racing tournament structure to deliver a simple formula

that anyone can enjoy, but which requires sustained play to be truly mastered. Of course, playing on your Jack Jones is only half the story. The way the game's multiplayer effortlessly uses the machine's WiFi elements only serves to reinforce *Ridge*'s position as king of the road. The innumerable wireless battles we've had in the *OPS2* office have been easy to set up (the very definition of idiot-proof) and also thick with the heady scent of manly competition.

A word of warning, though. After you've aced the basic tracks and unlocked the seriously

challenging advanced races, the game expects your skills to have progressed significantly. The difficulty ratchets up fast and you need to keep pace. And as you proceed, the game's foibles become deliberate elements for you to exploit. (You'll learn that you can always boost at the start of the race if you rev the speedometer needle to a redline-tickling position, and that touching rival cars oddly makes the two of you swap speeds.)

However, this doesn't dampen the game's basic verve-packed thrills. The key is drifting. (It's simple, just over-steer into a curve or tap/ brake before turning.) Once mastered, there's nothing more exhilarating than pulling off a massive skid, squeezing through a tight-as-youlike-bend and then using the rewarding boost triggered by a successful slide to fire yourself out in front of the pack.

Ridge's star may ultimately fade as the PSP's lifespan goes on, especially with hugely promising vehicular adventures such as Grand Theft Auto: Liberty City Stories, Pursuit Force and Burnout on the way. But the world of racing games is big, and there's room for all sorts (the PSP launch line-up contains no less than six racers). That said, this is currently the only truly essential handheld racer. Ridge shines bright because it feels purpose built for the PSP hardware, offering up a driving experience that manages to be snappy and deep. Make it your first purchase on day one. Michael French

Thank Christ for *Everybody's Golf* – a game which takes all the po-faced nonsense the sport has to offer and makes a crazed, Japanimated circus of the whole thing, while still providing a superb playing experience.

Aside from the cutesy animated characters, Everybody's Golf is filled with frivolous graphic touches - a jet-like trail in the wake of your speeding ball, ricochets exaggerated by speech bubbles, backspinning balls highlighted with blue flames – which set a refreshingly light tone. The game's real trick being that, behind this joviality, a solid and surprisingly challenging golf game lurks. The controls are a back-to-basics affair - select your club, then tap (to measure the strength of your swing, and again in time with the return of the gauge to determine your accuracy. The better your button-taps, the better swing on the ball you have. The ball physics are realistic and complex, so scoring par or below is much harder than the game's design may initially lead you to believe.

Another pleasant surprise is the scope and detail of the courses. Before taking your shot you can glide over and around the fairway to plan the hole, and the lush greens and open



environments are fantastically, unexpectedly gorgeous. The courses are designed with a keen eye for letting you pitch and putt tactically, and the only problem we've had is the frustrating difficulty judging the angle of sloping greens.

The sheer enjoyment factor knocks any chance of a boring golf experience out of sight and the PSP is a fittingly first-rate setting for a bright and exceptionally playable game; Everybody's Golf is an absolute joy. Nathan Ditum

The plot template has essentially remained the same for *Metal Gears* 1–3, and so it goes in the PSP version. Solid Snake, stealth, patience-challengingly nonsensical dialogue – it's all here and looks very, very *Metal Gear*. There is a difference, though, and it's a biggie – *Acid* is a card game.

You have a deck of cards which correspond to weapons, moves and defences that enable you to move Snake (and his lady sidekick Teliko) and make him fight. You also have a limited amount of steps depending on your hand before your turn runs out. Think of it like chess, but with spies and soldiers instead of kings and queens.

Although far from perfect (the rules are very

tough to master) it is enjoyable, particularly if for the kind of fan who loves everything about the *Metal Gear* mythos. It's definitely not for series virgins (the *MGS3* link-up assumes you own the most recent PS2 game and there are tons of injoke references), but once you get over the fact it isn't an action game, the strategic gameplay is intriguing and involving. **Michael French**

...PSP plays music!

The PSP, available in the UK on 1 September, will come bundled with a pair of headphones, a remote control, a 32MB storage memory stick, protective case, carry strap and cleaning cloth – and the first three on that list will help unleash the device's other talent: its music playing powers.

The machine plays MP3s that

are transferred to the memory stick via a USB connection. However – we warn you now – you'll probably want to upgrade and get a bigger memory stick if you want to listen to music for any decent amount of time. The average album size in terms of storage space is about 70MB at a listenable quality, which obviously outstrips the bundled 32MB card. And

that card is also supposed to host all your game saves and downloaded content. Memory sticks come in all kinds of sizes, from 128MB up to 1GB (that's 1,000 megabytes). 2GB and even bigger sticks are currently in the works.

Just like with the Apple iPod, you'll be able to listen to tracks that you've downloaded from the web on your PSP. Sony even has its own online music store at connect.com, with a PSP-dedicated service for free PSP downloads at psp.connect.com.

SPIDER-MAN 2

This time he's the smallest swinger in town

aybe it's some post-modern comment on the duality of the superhero lifestyle, but the Spider-Man games have always been pretty schizoid. The swinging, wall-crawling stuff rocks because, let's face it, it's the closest you'll ever get to being Spidey. But underneath the freedom of hurtling through the air on silk threads, everything else has always been a bit pap. An average adventure-brawler full of 'go here, press that' missions and the worst boss fights ever. Guess what? This is no different. It's enjoyable in places, but overall a brief, throwaway affair.

Spider-Man 2 on PSP has lost the Grand Theft Auto-style freedom of the PS2 version, and now you'll instantly be able to notice that web lines attach to mysterious invisible ceilings rather than buildings (just like the older games). But making up slightly for the enclosed, limited environments are the surprisingly friendly controls. There are plenty of unlockable abilities to collect and they're always easy to access. You'll be instantly throwing punches, zipping to the ceiling and firing off webs like a pro. The only letdown is having to tweak the camera with the direction buttons. The lock-on works well, enabling you to focus attacks on your target, but manual adjustments can be tricky on the move.





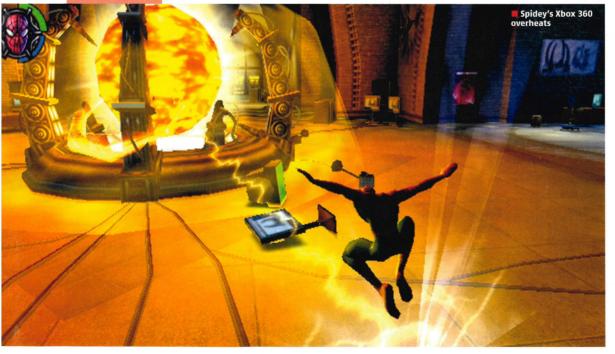
All this web-slinging, baddy-bashing action is fun, but by Christ it's insubstantial. Most missions include big, pointy direction arrows and consist of no more than 'get from A to B'. The more complicated levels might add 'and do C while you're at it', but it's still paper-thin gameplay. Outside, you're nearly always chasing villains across the New York skyline (stuck in the air and unable to touch the ground thanks to unseen floors - another unwelcome hangover





from old Spider-Man games). And when you finally get to play inside a building you'll be hunting down buttons, switches and/or hostages. It feels like the same things keep repeating over and over again. For example, all of the pursuit sequences will, at some point, involve you webbing up a damaged rooftop structure to prevent it hitting the streets below. While inside there's an endless cycle of thugs to twat and doors to unlock. And yes, the boss battles still bite a sizable amount of arse - expose a weak spot, punch it. Repeat, repeat, cry...

Spider-Man on PSP is far from the classic game we were hoping for. It's fun in small doses, and on the move it's not bad for filling brief spare moments. But play it on a long journey and you could finish it before you reach your destination. Most of the levels are just about entertaining enough to warrant a replay, but it's still too short and too shallow. Leon Hurley

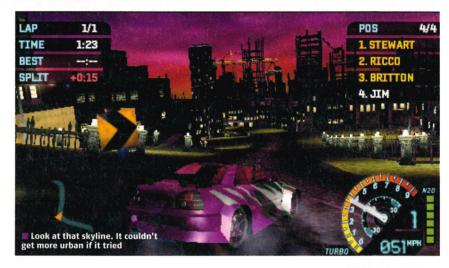

his is a strictly-by-the-numbers street racer. Tear through urban tracks after dark, win competitions and spend the resulting points on spoilers, stickers and oversized rims for your motor. And while there are plenty of challenges and cars to keep you occupied, it's unimaginative stuff. There's nothing here that hasn't been done before, and in most cases done better. Mostly by the 'grown up' version of *Underground*.

The steering, for example, lacks the accuracy to make this the road-munching blast it should be. You can reach impressive speeds (spoilt by a squint-inducing blur effect that makes you struggle to read the road ahead) but you'll never feel completely relaxed with the handling. Races feel too cartoony and the handling jelly-like, so rather than the intended boy racer thrills, the overriding feeling is of racing shopping trolleys around empty car parks. The unpredictable nature of the crashing doesn't help either; some impacts result in glancing blows while others send you spinning through the air in an entirely unconvincing manner.

Then there's the stupid amount of work needed to get at the upgrades. You know there's a lot on offer because of the numerous 'locked' options in the menus, but all this means is that the items you want are trapped behind tedious layers of objective-fulfilment and course completion prerequisites. Identical to the big console *NFSU* this may be, but the small scale amplifies the flawed over-reliance on constant replaying. In fact, this doesn't suit the *portable*

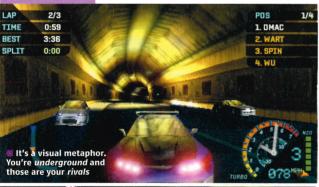


PlayStation at a all. A few hours' driving to access a new colour windscreen or spinner? Whoopde-do. There's no real satisfaction in that – particularly if you need someone to explain what a spinner is in the first place.

The track design is good and, overall, it looks and sounds the part – but we can't help shake the feeling that this is a tricked-out one-trick pony. Rivals by name and rivalled by nature – this version of Need For Speed just doesn't cut it on PSP, left lagging behind to eat the dust of top-grade racers like WipEout Pure and Ridge Racer. Rivals is a functional racer, not an outstanding one. **Leon Hurley**

t first glance this is a really logical match for PSP; dozens of two and three-minute puzzles and challenges that fit neatly into the spare gaming moments you can catch on the move. The one-strike-and-you're-out mission structure is massively aggravating, and

One puzzle randomly disrupts the colour-coded circuits you're connecting, and on more than one occasion, switched things around just as time ran out, leaving us blinking furiously at a reloading screen. 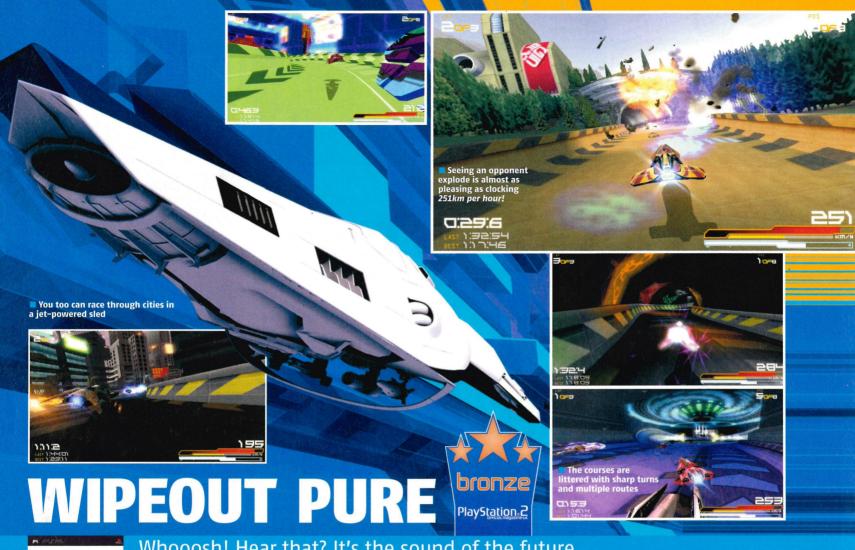
Also, there's much chatter about console and handheld games interconnecting. You can already

ack in the day, the original WipEout fused blissed-out club tuneage with breakneck, tomorrow-tech racing to deliver the cultural package that launched PlayStation numero uno into the stratosphere. Ever since its explosive arrival, though, the series has got progressively quieter - notably muted on PS2 and unable to live up to the impressive standards it set itself. Unable, that is, until now. Sony has reconfigured the sleeping WipEout giant as the perfect, symbiotic match for PSP - tuning it to the look, feel and essence of its new machine.

Those who feared that WipEout would inevitably lose speed on its way to Sony's handheld can breathe easy. On the smaller screen the racers go faster than ever, searing around the 12 new tracks at eye-watering velocity. Steadiness and precision is required when you're trying to cling to the driving line at these speeds, and it delivers admirably, allowing for smooth, arcing gradients and sharp turns.

You can pick up weapons to take out opponents as you race, and although this adds a tactical dimension, the resulting mix of combat and driving can be infuriatingly unbalanced. Concentrate too much on the weapons and you'll find yourself lagging behind in timesapping gun battles, but pay no attention and you'll be open to attack and lacking speed. More than once we've felt aggrieved at our Al rivals' consistent luck at scoring the precise item



needed in order to deny us almost certain victory - a boost, a homing rocket - while we always received an endless supply of shields when chasing for pole position.

Also frustrating is the way in which WipEout steadily edges up the difficulty of the races. As you progress through the game you'll unlock gradually faster vehicle classes, the idea being that the speed increases act as a natural learning curve. Trouble is, as you get further in, a rigid pattern emerges; even with a boost start,

supposedly slower vehicles overtake you on the first lap, leaving you to battle through the pack and attack the leader as the race climaxes. Dramatic? Yes, but it can feel forced and unfair.

But crucially it never compromises the addicitveness of WipEout Pure's highs. When you find yourself missing out on a gold medal in the tournament mode by a mere hundredth of a second, you'll go back again and again until you've aced it. Plus, the weapons, tournament racing and WiFi multiplayer elements come

In the single-player game, Fired Up is quite similar to the driving element in Mercenaries. The levels are much smaller, obviously, but there's plenty scope for vehicular havoc. You're free to take missions as you please or just drive around blowing stuff up — and thanks to a generous amount of auto-aiming the action is remarkably easy to get into. Plenty to keep the lone driver happy, then — and there's also the packed multiplayer mode, with its 12 maps and eight game modes.

Where *Fired Up* is a bit of a let down is in the details. The handling often feels light and

cartoony, like driving a milk float in zero gravity, and the one-weapon-at-a-time pick-up system is shallow. Plus, how much fun you get out of the multiplayer mode very much depends on the number of participants. With only two players, you often find yourself tootling around aimlessly instead of fragging each other insensible. 1. GOALHANG



Position your striker behind the defender closest to the keeper when he's about to do a goal kick. If the keeper is going to kick a long

clearance, he'll run to the ball with a long stride, but if he's playing a short pass he'll shuffle up in smaller steps. Nip in front of the defender when a short ball is played and an easy goal is yours.

2. DIVE IN THE BOX



Using **a** to dribble closely in the box will pull in the surrounding defenders. Let them get close enough to challenge or push you,

then quickly turn away from them and use **(3)** or **(32)** to knock the ball into space. Any contact and there's a good chance for a pen.

3. SLOW DOWN THE PLAY



When your opponent is attacking on the break (from a corner or free kick at his goal), slow the advance with a cheeky foul. The resulting

free kick will give your players time to get back and defend. Try to pull them down with \otimes from behind, rather than a slide, as you're less likely to be given a card. Also known as 'the Mourinho special'.

4. BEAT THE ADVANTAGE



When the ref allows for the advantage (a yellow icon will appear), drag your closest player to the ball with 600 + 602,

but don't collect it. Instead, wait for a second before kicking it on – if you time it right, the ref won't blow for the free kick and you can make a quick attack.

5. GET FREE GOALS



Pause the game the instant you score a goal. If you've done it right, then you'll be able to select Replay and watch the ball cross the line.

Every time you select the Replay option, you'll get an extra goal. For free!

6. USE YOUR MUSCLE



Use the 182 button to get in the way of your opponent's players.
Hold it down and move your player to block runs or stop the opposition

reaching balls that are going out for throwins or goal kicks. Use heavy defenders like Stam or Ferdinand for the best results.

7. JUST SMASH IT

There are plenty of ways to 'go gay' at free kicks (when you play cowardly short balls and cause confusion in the box), but this one

will make your mate cry more than most. It works best with free kicks on either side of the area, especially when the opposition is on fewer men than you. Simply shoot low across the box and into the press of players. Anything can happen, including lucky rebounds and sickener own goals.

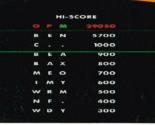

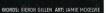

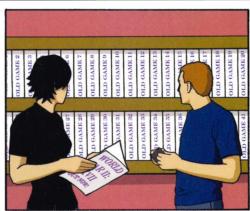

THE HITCHHIKER'S **GUIDE TO THE GALAXY**

FILM: We're inclined to like this. Not because we're hardened sci-fi fans (we're not) or because we have a soft spot for the old radio shows (we do) but because, of all the big budget films Hollywood fires at us, this one is, at least, British. Really British: the humour is based on how an average, middle-class English guy reacts to the absurd possibilities of the infinite universe, experienced first-hand.

It's a brilliant premise that's translated well to the big screen. Freeman plays Arthur Dent - middleclass English guy - with a perfect mix of cynicism and bewilderment, while Mos Def is suitably alien as his guide and best friend, Ford Prefect. Their absurd misadventures are presented at break-neck speed, through a fantastic mix of old-skool puppetry and shiny digital effects.

The problem is that the comedy isn't as sharp as it could be. So much is squeezed into the running time that the gags often seem like an afterthought, although the film is enjoyable nonetheless. 7/10 EXTRAS: Audio commentary, deleted

scenes, fake deleted scenes, making of, additional guide entries. 9/10 **VERDICT:** An engaging and visually distinguished attempt at filming life, the universe, and everything. Never less than charming but pretty low on laughs for a comedy. ND

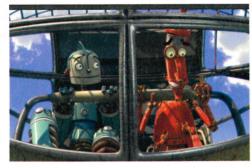

FILM: The most successful computer-animated films are those – Finding Nemo, Shrek – that best bridge the gap between entertaining kids and whole families. Robots is funny and inventive, but never creates the cross-generational appeal needed to make it a real standout. That said, the story - an

affectionate retelling of a naïve small-town boy who makes it in the big city - is charming, and the voice acting from McGregor, Williams and Mel Brooks has some great moments. 6/10 EXTRAS: Audio commentary, deleted scenes, out-takes, a look at Ice Age 2. 8/10

VERDICT: Well animated and acted, with some moments of ingenious and hectic fun. Unfortunately the quality isn't sustained throughout, making this one for the kids only. - ND

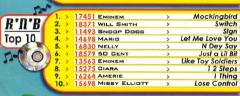

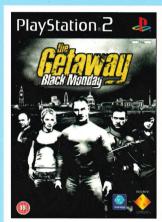
