Everyday it is becoming more apparent thruout the entire industry that the one and only way in which the nation's operators will be able to enjoy profitable operating today, as well as in the years to come, will be only thru close cooperation with each other.

This recessive backward slide which has affected the nation's economy, and which has brought about unemployment and therefore loss of sales to many of the country's retailers, has also affected the coin machine operators.

When the retailers are losing business, it is only natural that the coin machine operator loses business. The traffic thru the average retail outlet is what produces an average number of players based on the number of people passing thru the store. With less people entering retail stores, less play results.

Therefore the nation's coin machine operators, whether featuring music, amusement or merchandisers, are today up against the problem of how to continue in business profitably, regardless of the fact that they are enjoying somewhat less patronage than they formerly did.

There is only one answer to this problem. It does not concern itself with the price of the machines only. Even if the price was to drop on certain makes of machines this still would not bring more patrons to the equipment. Therefore, as stated before, it is not solely price.

Much more it is arranging for "front service money" as well as a better percentage commission basis. This is happening wherever operators have organized themselves and have agreed to cooperate with each other for each other's better welfare.

The one overall answer then to all problems now confronting the trade is simply cooperation. Without this vital necessity the operator cannot enjoy profitable operating. He simply must cooperate with his fellow operators to assure himself a decent livelihood and a better business.

Even if operators do get together and do agree to adopt a uniform "front money service gaurantee" as well as a better percentage commission basis, if they do not cooperate with each other, that is if they do not hold to this agreement, then the agreement simply becomes a scrap of paper, a wisp of conversation, has no meaning and, once again, all are back where they started.

The entire matter of profitable operating for today and for the future (and any operator who enjoys a profitable business is a better buyer so that the distributors and manufacturers thereby also profit) is for close, unyielding, loyal cooperation to exist between operators in each area in the nation.

In those centers where such cooperation does exist operators are enjoying good business. Regardless of whether they operatc games, music or merchandise vendors, as long as they make a mutual arrangement to obtain front service money and a better commission basis and stick to this agreement (cooperate with each other in every sense of the word) then there is no earthly doubt that they will continue to enjoy good business and be among the better customers of the distributors and manufacturers.

The overall picture of the industry today resolves itself down to this one simple logical business fact—that cooperation must exist between operators in each village, each city, each town, each territory, if the operator wants to enjoy a profitable business and assure his future welfare.

The average operator today must realize that when he cooperates with his fellow operators he is helping not only himself, but his family. He is assuring his wife and his children that they will enjoy many advantages which he never enjoyed. This alone should cause each operator to make it his business to arrange for close cooperation with all his fellow operators.

And only if each operator will resolve to cooperate with his fellow operators in each area (leaving personal likes and dislikes fall by the wayside) then will he enjoy the sort of profitable business he has always dreamed about, and the industry, too, all its members in every division, will enjoy a better, sounder, more solid business.

Both sides are styled in the progressive music man-ner of the Herman ork, and altho not in the commercial vein, they might win some favor with the crowd who go for this type of music. Top deck has the maestro and Mary Ann McCall knock-ing out a weird item, while the flip a straight instrumental tune features the ork going thru their paces. Wax won't stop traffic.

"You're Heartless" (2:52) "I Never Knew" (2:34) MARJORIE HUGHES (Columbia 38524)

• Thrush Marjorie Hughes into the vocal limelight, with a tremendous ballad that seems certain of winning ballad that seems certain of winning a ton of juke box coin in the near future. Titled "You're Heartless," Majorie really shines on the side as she delivers a wonderful bit of vocal work on this teeming romantic item. The flip, "I Never Knew" is an oldie that should be well remembered. This madifier should continue to keep the rendition should continue to keep the song a top-notch standard. We go for the top deck—we're sure you will to.

"The Galloping Comedians" (3:07)

• Orkster Gene Krupa on deck with a new pair, with the musical refrain of "The Galloping Comedians" and "Swiss Lullaby" seeping thru the wax. Top deck is a unique arrangement of a classical piece. This rendition, offered with loads of flourish by the Krupa band should certainly cause loads of tongue wagging in the music biz. It's a modern adaptation of a polka tune, with the band going all out on the side. The flip, "Swiss Lul-laby," gets novel treatment here, as the gang join to offer a cute side. Top deck might take off.

"Be Goody Good Good To Me" (2:42) "Don't Ever Marry For Money" (2:27) EVELYN KNIGHT (Decca 24655)



Chirp Evelyn Knight comes up • Chirp Evelyn Knight comes up with another great one in this sen-sational recording titled "Be Goody Good Good To Me." It's a song that is sure to start a chain reac-tion of top juke box play through-out the nation. Widely popular since a string of widespread suc-cesses with a bevy of song hits, Evelyn seems sure to retain her immense popularity via this plat-ter. Ditty is a mellow up tempo item, offered in wonderful happy time. Evelyn's vocal spot on the side is top drawer material from start to finish. The gal has that lilt in her pipes that makes you want to sing right along with her. Fond hand clap in the background, coupled with the harmony of the Four Hits and A Miss, and the or-chestrated patterns of the Sonny Burke orchestra, all go toward making this platter the grade A piece of music it is. On the flip with another happy bit, Evelyn and with another happy bit, Evelyn and with another happy bit, Evelyn and the vocal combo keep the wax hot via another cute item in this side tagged "Don't Ever Marry For Money." Lyrics make for splendid listening pleasure, as does the en-tire recording. We're putting our money on the top deck—it rates a top spating pleasure. top spot in ops machines!

"It's A Great Feeling" (2:40) "Fiddle Dee Dee" (2:38) SAMMY KAYE ORCH. (RCA Victor 20-3484)

• Pair of tunes from the Warner Brothers film "It's A Great Feeling," and the musical set up of the title tune and "Fiddle Dee Dee" in the offing for music ops. Both sides are happy items that roll along in smooth, mellow tempo. It's cute stuff that is easy to listen to, and should be greeted warmly by the host of Sammy Kaye's fans. Top deck, with the vocal refrain by the Kaydets and a choir is the better of the pair. Ops should listen in.

"I'll Keep The Lovelight Burning" (3:04)"All Year 'Round" (2:57)

BILL LAWRENCE (RCA Victor 20-3489)

Some smooth romantic wax by balladeer Bill Lawrence, with "I'll Keep The Lovelight Burning" and "All Year 'Round" headed ops way. Top deck is a cinch to score with music ops and fans alike. Bill's enchanting refrain of this ballad should meet with wide favor. The flip, in the same vein is a fair enough tune, effectively performed throughout the recording. Ork backing on the pair isn't too striking, but it does round out the platter adequately. Top deck is the better of the pair.

"There's Yes! Yes! In Your Eyes" (3:05)

"Baby Talk" (2:23)

TONY PASTOR ORCH (Columbia 38521)

• Maestro Tony Pastor pops up with a winner in his rendition of that rapidly rising hit oldie "There's Yes! Yes! In Your Eyes." Vocal refrain by Tony and the band, coupled with the smart instrumental patter, makes this disk a hot one for the phonos. Tony's nasal tones make for extremely infectious listening and should be greeted warmly by his many fans. The flip is another cute item with Tony shining in the vocal spot again on this bright romantic item. Top deck should go.

"Now That I Need You" (2:41)

"There's No Getting Away From You" (2:48)

FRAN WARREN (RCA Victor 20-3482)

Some fresh wax by Thrush Fran Warren, and the vocal splendor of "Now That I Need You" and "There's No Getting Away From You." Both tunes are excellent ones that should prove to be top notch juke box winners. Top deck, from the Paramount flicker "Red, Hot & Blue" is sure to be a favorite in the very near future. It's a smartly styled romantic ballad, handled superbly by Miss Warren's scintillating vocal refrain. The flip turns out to be another great tune, with the comely lyrics of this ballad ringing true from start to finish. Both sides are sizzling hot-get 'em.

"And It Still Goes" (3:04) "Fiddle Dee Dee" (2:56) JIMMY DORSEY ORCH. (Columbia 38523)

• Long missing from the phono spotlight, maestro Jimmy Dorsey comes with a pair of fresh tunes in this coupling of "And It Still Goes" and "Fiddle Dee Dee." Top deck, with Larry Noble and a chorus to chant the lyrics, is a smooth flowing romantic ballad that has loads of winning potential. Vocal refrain on the side is excellent, as is the instrumental work in the background. The flip, from the Warner Brothers flicker "It's A Great Feeling" bears ops avid attention too. This rendition, with chirp Claire Hogan and the boys in the band, rates highly. Ops should take a look-see in this direction.

"Minsan Lamang" (3:06)

"Rumbasia" (3:15) XAVIER CUGAT ORCH. (Columbia 38516)

• Music styled in the Xavier Cugat manner, and the set-up of "Minsan manner, and the set-up of "Minsan Lamang" and "Rumbasia." Top deck is a Philippine folk song, with Del Campo offering the tender vocal re-frain in adequate manner. Ditty is a lover's lament and makes for excellent listening pleasure. The coup-ling is medium tempo'd rhumba tune that should be greeted warmly by Cugat's many fans. Ops who have the spots that go for this brand, might take a look-see.

"Single Saddle" (3:00) "Ev'ry Night Is Saturday Night" (2:48)ELLIOT LAWRENCE ORCH.

(Columbia 38522)

• Pair of fair enough sides by the Elliot Lawrence ork turn up here in this coupling of "Single Saddle" and "Ev'ry Night Is Saturday Night." Top deck, with piper Jack Hunter wailing the lyrics is a cute bit of wax whirling about the title. Ops should know this side since it has been around. The flip, with the band dissome great instrumental playing wares, has a vocal group on tap to offer a pleasing bit of music in "Ev'ry Night Is Saturday Night." The college spots should go for the disk.

Tempo of both sides is slow, with the Victor Young ork lending an effective musical backdrop. The wax won't stop traffic—it should hold its own though.

• The vocal harmony of the Mills Brothers is shown to excellent light on this coupling tagged "Single Saddle" and "Gather Your Dreams." Top deck is a side that bears close attention—the disk is rendered in top notch manner from start to finish and might prove to be a hot "sleeper." Music ops should be familiar with this tune since it has been around for some time now. The flip has the vocal combo back again on another top ditty. It's a slow, romantic ode, superbly performed from start to finish. The disk is hot ops should get it.

"A Sunday Out In The Country" (3:01)

FREDDY MARTIN ORCH. (RCA Victor 20-3484)

• Pair of sides by the Freddy Martin ork, with the refrain of "A Sunday Out In The Country" and "Roseanna" coming at music ops. Vocal work on the pair Merv Griffin is fair enough, and should satisfy the many Martin fans. Both tunes are done up in ultra sweet style, with the tempo rolling along at a moderate clip. Wax won't stop traffic—it should hold its own tho.

"Now That I Need You" (3:15)

VERA LYNN (London 459)

• Top plug from the Paramount flicker "Red, Hot & Blue" gets a fairly nice sendoff here by thrush Vera Lynn. Her vocal work on "Now That I Need You," with the Bob Farnon ork lending musical assistance, makes for pleasurable moments of musical listening time. Tempo of the ballad is extremely slow here, altho the excellent musical backdrop more than makes up for that. The flip is a novelty ditty with the lyrics playing around the title. Members Of All Phases Of Music Industry Expected To Be On Hand. 1949 Show To Feature Largest Number Of Exhibitors

Music Ops Plan Attending Annual Convention

NEW YORK, July 7—One of the year's biggest expositions will open here on July 25 and run through July 28. It is the Music Industry Trade Show and Convention, which will oc-cupy nearly seven flors of The Hotel New Yorker and the adjoining Man-hattan Center. Between 7,000 and 8,000 members of the music industry are expected to attend.

On exhibition for the benefit of the trade will be every known type of musical merchandise, pianos, organs, radios, phonographs, television, rec-ords and related items. A number of important new products are expected to be unveiled.

According to William R. Gard, ex-ecutive secretary of the National As-sociation of Music Merchants, spon-sors of the Trade Show, this will be the first really "normal" music indus-try meeting since 1940. After manu-facturing restrictions began in 1941, the war-time and reconversion prob-lems limited sales and introduction of

Undoubtedly one of the funniest pieces of literature we've had the pleasure of reading, Lee kidded about the poor conditions existing in the rec-ord business, with the net result that Lee's disk sales zoomed with most dis-tributors during the week.

Those of you who are enjoying its success and ordering it accordingly may now step out for a short beer. To those of you who are ordering it like it had B. O., may I ask what it takes to have you consider it a good number . . . Need-less to tell you that business as a whole has been a little off. If that doesn't cop the honors for the under-statement of the year, nothing will." (Editor's Note: We're bettin' Lee gets the Pulitzer Prize for the letter— it just can't miss!)

While distribution plans for the Bluebird label were not announced by the plattery, it was reported that RCA Victor will handle the records thru their own distributors. In outlining the second phase of the 45 rpm campaign, Paul Barkmeier, general manager of the RCA Victor Record department, indicated that the emphasis would be placed on acceler-ated and more aggressive and ingeni-ous merchandising of both the players and records. "We deliberately, and for good reasons," said he, "started out in low gear. We had to do a job of clearing the decks. We did not want to stampede either the dealer or the consumer into acceptance of our

want to stampede either the dealer or the consumer into acceptance of our new system. Now, however, we have reached the point where we can bring our merchandising guns to bear." Barkmeier indicated that the next step in the inventory picture would be one designed to keep 45 inventory, at least, in a healthy state. "None of our distributors," he said, "are loading dealers with 45 inventory, and we will soon be ready to launch our 45 Triple S Delivery System on 45 rpm hits. This, as has been announced, is a test project, designed to speed delivery of hit records on 45 so that dealers can capitalize on the demand when it is strongest and increase turnover of in-ventory." ventory

ventory. Further steps are being taken, too, to stimulate the already effective sell-ing job being done by dealers and their salespeople, said Barkmeier. In this connection he announced a new technicolor training film, produced at a cost of \$25,000, which in turn will be shown to dealers and their sales-people all over the country. RCA Vic-tor sales crews will barnstorm the film in much the same manner as they made the initial 45-rpm demon-strations to dealers last March.

NOV. 7, 8, 9, IN CHICAGO Set for moa nat'l meet

Stevens Hotel Probable Site of First Nationwide Meet of Music Operators of America. Juke Box Leaders Give Warm Approval. Look for Biggest Gathering in Automatic Music History

NEW YORK — After agreement among officers and members of MOA (Music Operators of America) the organization of all the nation's local and state juke box associations, as well as independent juke box ops, dates have been set for the first national meeting of the organization, November 7, 8 and 9, 1949, with the probable site to be the Stevens Hotel, Chicago.

North & South Carolina Ops Form Carolina Music Ass'n

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. - After three preliminary meetings over a period of the last three weeks, music machine operators from the states of North Carolina and South Carolina have formed a two-state association, which will be known as the Carolina Music Association.

At its last meeting, coinmen from these two states elected officers, and drew up a code of general policies, which they state will be followed to the letter.

T. B. Shooter, Lumberton, N. C., was elected to the office of president covering the North Carolina area, and H. C. Keels, Jr. was elected as cochairman covering the South Carolina area. Michael Malkin, Fayetteville, N. C., was elected as secretary-treasurer for the association, including both states.

Next meeting was scheduled for Thursday, July 14, at Florence, S. C. At this meet, members and guests will be presented with additional plans and suggestions to help further the cause of profitable and ethical operations of music machines.

The Code of General Policies set forth at the meet, and which will be enlarged and improved as the association continues, stated:

1) An association of Music Operators formed for the purpose of helping one another and cooperating in endeavors mutually beneficial to all operators in the States of North and South Carolina.

2) It will be the primary function of the Association to set up procedures and policies, by means of which operators can work in unison and harmony. These procedures will eventually help each operator to realize a legitimate profit in his business.

3) Initiate the following two procedures immediately. It is important that no deviation be made in these plans. The success of the organization will depend in a large measure on how closely each operator will follow the plans. Each location, no matter how

good or how bad must be treated in the same manner.

A. Request that ALL locations pay ALL licenses and taxes pertaining to the phonograph in their location. These monies will be taken out of the machine first, and then the regular split will be made.

C. When one location pays for the license and the time ever comes that you have to pull the machine, there will not be a refund made to the location. When this same machine is placed elsewhere later on, the license fees will again be asked for. In this manner all locations will always pay for licenses for their locations.

4) Each operator will guarantee not to place a music machine in the place of business where another operator has one, until a period of ninety days have elapsed. After this period, if he does go in, it will have to be on the same basis as outlined above.

5) No operator will sell a machine to a location that is occupied by another operator for a period of ninety days. 6) If a location should buy their into their place of business to service the machine. If they bring the phonograph to your place of business for repairs, then it will be up to the operator if he wishes to repair it.

7) Each operator will try to inform other operators of the general plans of this group, in order that the organization grow to that point where all operators in the States of North and South Carolina work in the same manner as outlined above.

EASTERN FLASHES

NEW YORK—Starting the season in unprecedented fashion, arcades and resort area locations thruout the East have shown an activity that surpasses anything in the way of receipts for a great many years. Reports from arcade owners and operators of shore and resort locations point the way to a banner '49 season.

Coinmen, in most instances, have enjoyed a break of continuous sunshine since opening day, Decoration Day; and many locations which opened for week-ends weeks prior to that holiday, were blessed with the best possible weather. A few isolated areas ran into some rainfall over some of the earlier week-ends, but overall, never in the memory of the oldest arcade owner, has a run of wonderful sunshiney weather prevailed over such a lengthy period.

There can be no question that the resulting good business is mainly due to this condition, but some of the old-timers point out that they believe some of the added business is a result of the times. "With money tight, and big spending a thing of the past," one arcade man stated: "Our business, which sells low priced entertainment, is the gainer. Whereas in the past years, families would spend week-ends and vacations at high priced resort hotels, today many cannot go for that kind of money. They take themselves and their families out for a day, and entertain themselves with moderate priced types of relaxation, of which the arcade and coin operated equipment gets its good share." good share.'

With the big Fourth of July holiday over, resort coin operators have stated they expected this good run of business to continue, particularly as the weather predictions indicated a good spell of clear sunshine. For years, arcade men have had to struggle to get their rent money up for the first installment on July, but this year the money is on hand, with some plus.


This boom in arcade and resort business is reflected in the amount of sales recorded by wholesalers thruout the country. In the case of the leading supplier of arcade equipment, Mike Munves, altho the season is over a month old he was just able to ship several important orders at the end of this week. Ordinarily, these customers would be unwilling to accept merchandise at this late date late date.

Although wholesalers state that they have been shipping standard type arcade machines, most of the orders were for brand new machines. This can mean, they point out, that arcades are not only adding equipment on their floors, but are replacing older and obsolete machines with currently manufac-tured equipment. "Evidently they have acquired some nice cash," stated one wholesaler. "I believe a condition of this kind will reflect in greater profits for arcade men, as the newer machines will not only dress up their locations, but bring in more customers who will spend more money. I look for the best arcade, shore and resort season we've ever enjoyed."

This sentiment is also prevalent among the coin operators themselves who we've heard from, and to whom whom we've spoken. Therefore, we are happy to report that there isn't one dissenting voice heard from even one arcade man in this area. It certainly appears that the 1949 arcade season will be a banner year for coinmen in this phase of the industry, which we are sure will reflect generally thruout the trade before the year is over.

Things were pretty quiet on coinrow, this week, following the Fourth of July week-end. The unusually torrid weather didn't help any either. Most operators relaxed for a few days following the holidays, claiming they needed a short rest. However, some of the wholesalers reported a pickup in their export biz . . . Harry Koeppel, Koeppel Distributing Company, shipped a nice order to Port Au Prince, Haiti, as well as making several good phono buys from coin companies in this area . . . Another distributor who shipped out of the country was Dave Lowy, Dave Lowy & Company. Dave reports that since taking over the Keeney cigarette vendor, he's lined up a number of substantial orders. Lowy covers the City of New York, Nassau and West-chester counties . . . Harry Berger, West Side Distributing Company, ships equipment to several South American countries, but this is no novelty for him, as the firm has developed quite an export business. 

Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
