● Look for Johnny Cash to make another big pop-country splash with his new Columbia twosome. The deep-voiced chanter relates the problems of a convict on the rhythmic, quick beat "I Got Stripes" and of a flood on the slightly up tempo "Five Feet High And Rising." (From his "Songs Of The Soil" LP.) Terrific vocal and musical support for Cash's affectionately light-hearted approach to the problems. Tag both for dual-mart 'hitsville.'

Tillotson's moves along at a pleasant cha cha pace while the Wanderer's is taken for a haunting, slow steady beat ride. Both choral-backed versions feature enticing talking performances by the artists. Flipside on the Tillotson-Cadence outing is an ear-arresting marcher. Backing of the Wanderer's 20th-Fox distributed Studio disk is a light instrumental bouncer with the harmonica out front

Bugle and drums play important parts, along with the fiddles on the march tempo, "Tango Militaire," while a waterfall-in-the-sun picture is painted on the lovely French Waltz import, "Everytime (I Look At You—L'Eau Vive)." A twin deejay delight.

● Two flicks, one old ("Modern Times") and one new ("Say One For Me") are the source of material for Tony Bennett's latest Columbia pairing. The former, "Smile," is the haunting theme from the Charlie Chaplin-revival that Tony projects with touching sincerity. Latter, "You Can't Love 'Em All," from the new Bing Crosby outing, receives a bright, bouncy Bennett treatment. Fine two-sided assist by the Ralph Burns outfit. Topside is stronger commercial entry.

TERRI STEVENS

B+ "ADONIS" (2:12) [Joy ASCAP
—Warren, Goehring] Lots of ap-
peal in this outing by Miss Stevens.
As title indicates, effort is a sort of
female counterpart to the Frankie
Avalon smash, "Venus" and both tune
and arrangement are similar to the
recent hit. Could happen.

blues item packs a tried-and-true rock
punch.

Stone] Bright teaming of two first-
rate vocal talents. A twosome has a
daily cross-country telephone conver-
sation, though they apparently have
never met each other. Chorus offers a
"ring-a-ling" gimmick. Could go.

B "GO TO SLEEP, GO TO SLEEP,
GO TO SLEEP" (2:38) [Walt
Disney ASCAP—Spielman, Cahn] The
spouse yaps away, the husband's ready
for the Sandman in this softly per-
formed novelty. Clever lyrics.

FRANK JUSUFF

B+ "YOU ARE MY LOVE" [Calico
ASCAP—Guarino] A solid rhyth-
mic romance. Vocalist Jusuff is a fine
vehicle for the devoted item and
there's class upbeat stuff from the
combo. Can go over big.

B "LOVE LETTERS" [Famous
ASCAP—Young, Heyman] One of
the late Victor Young's best melodies
comes out honestly in this soft-rock
treatment. Solo violin is uniquely
employed.

NELSON RIDDLE

(Capitol 4244)

B+ "TING-A-LAY-O" (2:10) [Dor-
nelle ASCAP—Riddle] A delight-
ful kiddie chorus & ork attraction.
On a happy tune, the youngsters tell
of the various parts of a donkey. The
Riddle ork backing bounces engage-
ingly. One of those kiddie dates that
can take-off.

B "THE MARKHAM THEME"
(2:24) [Alaska ASCAP—Wilson]
Something unusual: a TV private eye
theme sans a jazz approach. It's a
lush string theme, keyboard and
chanting chorus sharing the solo
chores. Will get those mood time
spins.

Murtaugh, Garfield, Blecher] The oft-
recorded European opus receives a
strong teen view by songster Darnel
and colorful chorus-combo setting.
Caterina Valente also has the effort
on Telefunken.

B "KA-DING-DONG" (2:12) [Greta
BMI—Jordan, McDermott] The
old G-Cleff's hit is excitingly revived
by the personnel.

TEDDI KING

B+ "IT ONLY HAPPENED ONCE
BEFORE" (2:39) [Knollwood
ASCAP—Carr, Tobias] Fine singing
talent in one of her most commercial
outings. Effort is a haunting ballad,
delivered beautifully by the lark.
Lovely Dick Jacobs' ork-chorus stint.
Should be eyed closely.

B "PLEASE BE KIND" (2:26)

[Harms ASCAP—Cahn, Chaplin]
The ballad oldie makes fine teen sense
in the hands of Miss King and the
Jacobs' assemblage. Could make noise.

GEE NEE STERLING

B+ "THE MAN I LOVE" (1:52)
[Harms ASCAP—G&I Gershwin]
Fine teen treatment of the great per-
ennial by the talented wispy-voiced
lark. Reading fortunately keeps on
the melodic beam. Exposure could do
things for this pressing.

C+ "CUSTOM MADE LOVE" (2:15)
[Velvet BMI—Peterson] Thrush
shows-off a good way with a hard-
beat blueser.

easy-going session featuring a so-
prano sax and sans lyric chorus.
Appealing melody. Would make
choice mood spin.

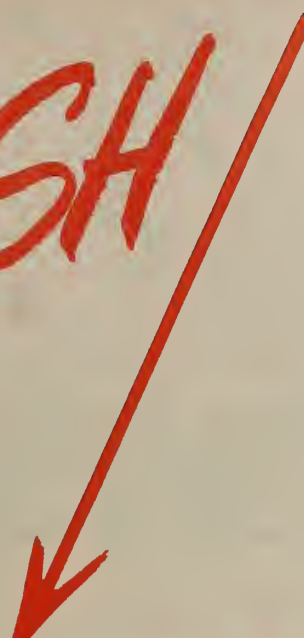
B "HARLEM NOCTURNE CHA

DALE HAWKINS (Checker 929)

● Dale Hawkins has the goods to cop a pair of high chart positions with this double-barreled Chess release. "Our Turn" is an extremely appealing, soft cha cha romancer on which Dale dreams of a future in loveland. Pretty tune receives an attractive vocal and instrumental showcase. "Lifeguard Man" is an engaging summer affair from the "Yeah, Yeah (Class Cutter)" handclapping school. Like 'em both.

"THE TOY DRUM" (2:45) [Knollwood ASCAP—Vaughn]

"LORILU" (2:10) [Audubon ASCAP—Stimmler, George]

THE HARRY SIMEONE CHORAL (20th-Fox 152)

● The chart triumph scored by the Harry Simeone Chorale with "The Little Drummer Boy" can be repeated with the group's latest, "The Toy Drum (With His Drum)". Side, cut from a mold similar to the initial hit, is a sentimental, slow-march enchanter that again demonstrates the Chorale's fascinating vocal blending. The ear-appealing "Lorilu", also from the reminiscing category, tastefully alternates between a quick march and waltz tempo.

"RED RIVER ROCK" (2:08) [Vicki BMI—King, Mack, Mendelsohn]

JOHNNY & THE HURRICANES (Warwick 509)

● Johnny & the Hurricanes, fresh from their recent 'shoot-'em-up,' chart-riding instrumental stint, "Crossfire," bounce back on the wax scene with one that looks like a 'two-in-a-row' item. It's an instrumental-rock re-fitting of the western oldie, "Red River Valley" and it's perfectly tailored for teen tastes. "Buckeye" is the rafter-shakin' undercut that also has an eye on the charts.

● It's more than likely that Ace'll place another new name up on the hit board in the weeks to come. His moniker's Johnny Fairchild and his gravy train is a two-sider tagged "I Was A Fool" and "Please, Please, Please." They're a potent pair of romantic pleaders; "Fool" from the slow fish-beat school, "Please" from the jump dept. Fairchild, ably assisted by the Nite Riders, knocks 'em both out with teen finesse.

"LITTLE GIRL LOST" (2:20) [Joel-Peer Int'l BMI—Sherman, Keller]

BOBBY ROY (JDS 5001)

● Joe Sherman's new JDS label takes an ultra-commercial bow with this slice that also unveils the potent, teen talents of Bobby Roy and the Chord-A-Roys. Roy and the crew offer their assistance to "Little Girl Lost" on a fish-beat hip-swing with an immediate-selling opener. 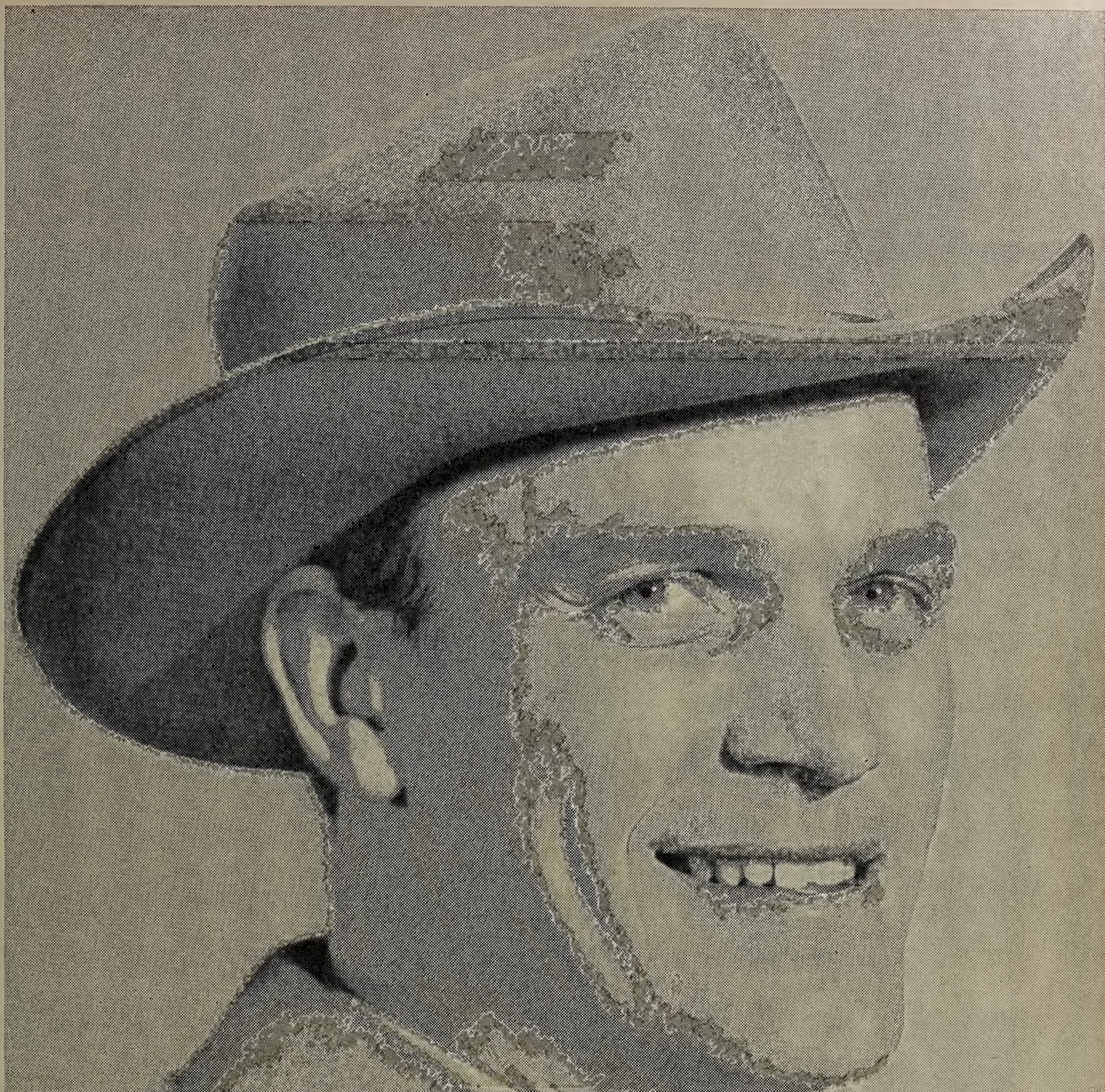

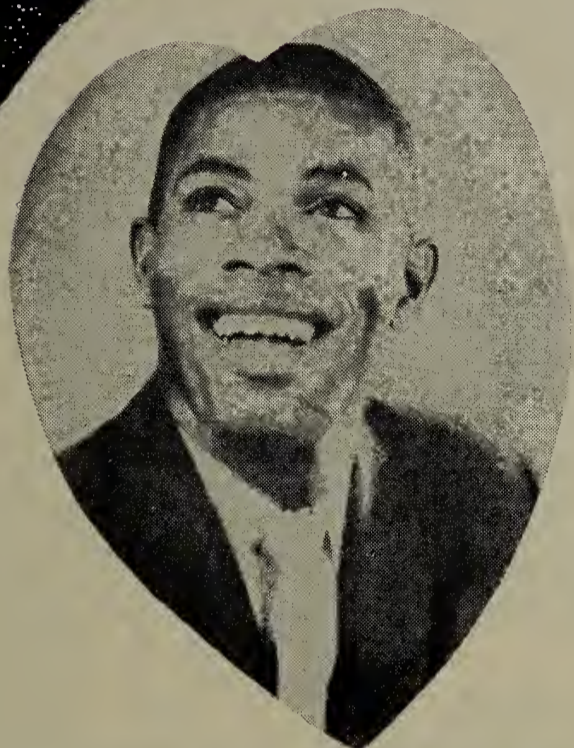

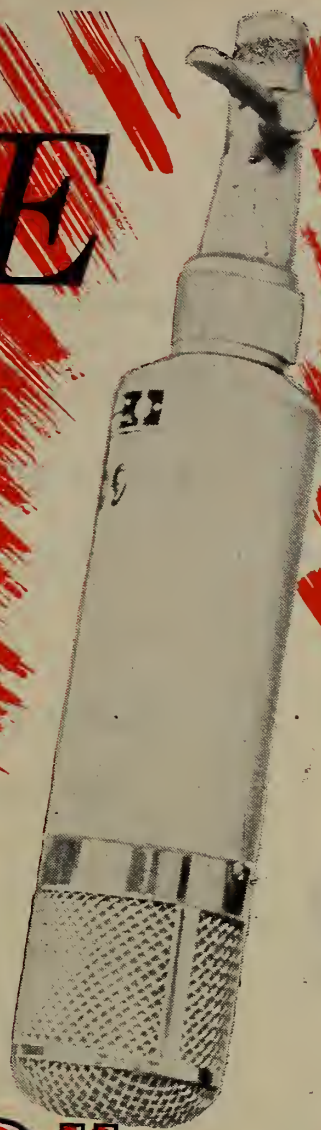

Columbia Expands Canadian Set-Up

NEW YORK—Columbia Records of Canada embarked last week on an expansion program to meet growing demands of the Dominion record market, according to an announcement by Goddard Lieberman, president of the parent company, Columbia Records, U.S.A.

Contracts were signed for construction of expanded new headquarters facilities in the Don Mills area of Toronto.

"We are happy to reaffirm through this expansion program our support of the growing Canadian record industry and record-buying public," Lieberman stated. "Both have developed to a most gratifying extent since Columbia established operations in Canada five years ago.

"Artistically, our ties to Canada have long been close. For many years we have been pleased to share in the recording success of such famous Canadian-born performers as con-

ductor-composer-arranger Percy Faith and the Four Lads vocal group. More recently, we were proud to launch the American as well as international recording career of the brilliant young pianist, Glenn Gould."

The new expansion plans will provide consolidated facilities for administrative offices, warehousing and the Columbia Record Club. The land site chosen is on Leslie Street near Eglinton Avenue. Architects will be Crang and Boake; The Camston Construction Company will erect the building.

With Robert J. Pampe as vice president and managing director, Columbia Records Ltd. was established in 1954. In 1958, the organization established company-owned distribution branches for eastern Canada, Toronto and Montreal. Independent distributors market Columbia Records in the west.

Epic Records Intros Fall Program At Las Vegas Sales Convention

NEW YORK—The largest distributor assembly in Epic Records' history convened at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas last weekend (July 10, 11) to hear details on the label's Fall sales program.

Keynote speaker of the convention was Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia Records. Herbert Green-spon, executive vice president of the company, will also address the convention.

The program offers special incentives for the purchase of 50 Fall album releases. Epic will offer one free LP for every seven Popular stereo and monaural albums purchased. All classical albums will be offered at a straight 10 per cent discount.

Added incentive will be Epic's offer of a classical or popular stereo sampler at a 25-cent price reduction for every stereo record purchase. A stereo rack demonstrator worth \$2.00 will be offered as a special dealer incentive.

Featured in the Fall release list will be such best-selling Epic artists as Lester Lanin, Roy Hamilton, the Merrill Staton Choir, and Joe Glover. Also released will be a first vocal recording by Hugh Downs, well-known for his appearances on the Jack Paar television show, and an O. B. Masingill sequel to his best-selling Epic release, "The World's Greatest Minstrel Show."

Classical highlights will be released by George Szell and The Cleveland Orchestra, pianist Leon Fleisher, the Amsterdam Concertgebouw Orchestra, I Musici chamber group, and the piano-violin duo, Clara Haskil and Albert Grumiaux.

"The World of Wonderful Music Is Yours on Epic" will be the theme of the label's extensive consumer advertising program, with full and half-page ads featuring album covers in various consumer mags.

Attractive two-column and 100-line advertising mats simulating the format of the national ads will be available for cooperative advertising.

Ads featuring key Epic artists will appear in concert programs in each city on their tours.

Each Epic release will receive monthly full trade support, tradepaper advertising support.

A colorful mobile with a five-foot circumference has been designed for in-store or window display. Full-color album covers, reproduced on seven-inch squares, circle a full-dimensional world globe, all topped by a message panel repeating advertising theme, "A World of Wonderful Music Is Yours On Epic Records." Two different mobiles have been pre-

pared, one for classical, one for popular records.

Epic will also make available to dealers two super-size 5-inch by 7-inch self-mailing pieces, a teaser and a follow-up, selling consumers on the potent Epic Fall release list.

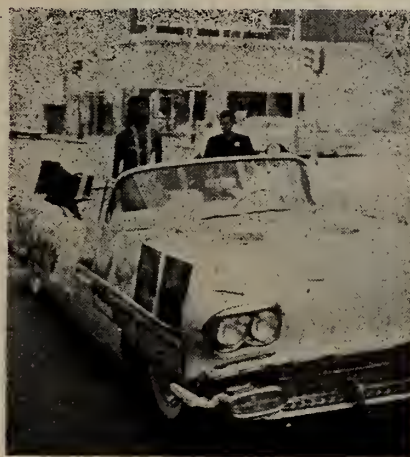

"Plaid and Calico" was recorded by Fabor Robison prior to Horton's joining Columbia, and was originally released on Robison's label, Abbott Records.

Wood acquired the master via negotiations with the composer, Bruce Blalock, representing Robison in the deal, and Sidney Goldstein of Morris Music, representing the publishers, who persuaded Wood to purchase the master for release on Dot.

"SONGS OF OUR SOIL"—Johnny Cash—Columbia CL 1399 (Monaural & Stereo)

Twelve folk ballads, many self-penned or rewritten, spotlight the talents of top country singer Johnny Cash, who currently has four tunes on the country chart. A chorus assists Cash as he sings such tunes as "Clementine," "Drink To Me," "Five Feet High and Rising," "My Grandfather's Clock," and "The Great Speckled Bird." Hot item for the country-pop market.



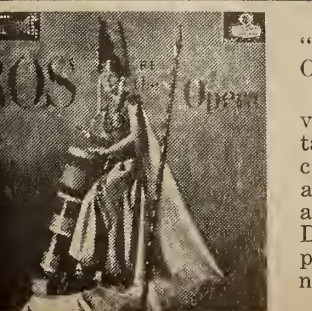
"WORDS AND MUSIC WITH THE AMES BROTHERS"—RCA Victor LPM 2009 & Stereo LSP 2009

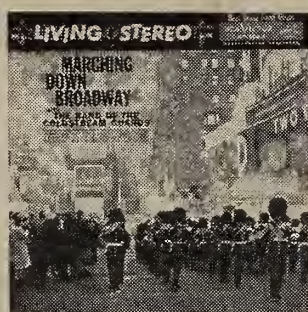
"ROS AT THE OPERA"—Edmundo Ros and his Orchestra—London PS 157 (Monaural & Stereo)

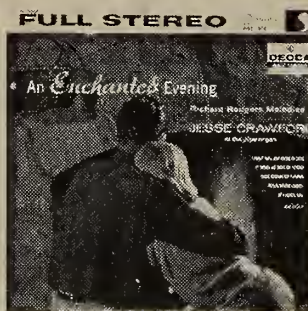
"MARCHING DOWN BROADWAY"—The Band of the Coldstream Guards—RCA Victor LPM 1944 & Stereo LSP 1944

A program of immortal Richard Rodgers melodies is played by pipe organist Jesse Crawford. The songs are great and the instrumentation is straightforward and melodic, making for a beautiful listening outing. Among the tunes are "If I Loved You," "My Heart Stood Still," "Hello, Young Lovers" and "Some Enchanted Evening." Tasteful package by a top organist.



"SLIM GAILLARD RIDES AGAIN"—Dot DLP 3190

After an absence from the record scene, Slim Gaillard returns here with his own zany brand of entertainment. Accompanying himself on guitar, supplemented by a small combo, Gaillard revamps standards with his own hilarious lyrics ("I Don't Stand A Ghost of A Chance With You," "How High The Moon") and adds several original compositions ("Chicken Rhythm," "One Minute of Flamenco for Three Minutes"). Among the funniest song fests in a long while.



"A CONCERT WITH HILLEL AND AVIVA"—Elektra 171

A program of fairly recent Israeli songs is offered by the couple, recorded in concert at Town Hall. Accompanying themselves with traditional instruments, Hillel on the shepherd's pipe and Aviva on the Miriam drum, and with occasional assistance from a guitarist and another drummer, the pair splendidly perform the fourteen numbers. Humorous between-number commentary and enthusiastic audience response adds to deck's listenability. Outstanding folk package.



"FLAMENCO PURO"—Sabicas—Columbia WL 154

One of the world's leading flamenco guitarists, Sabicas is heard in a concert of pure flamenco music. Ten selections are played, each of which presents a different flamenco rhythm local to a certain area or town (i.e. "Fandango," "Mala-guena," "Seguidilla"). Album is to be released in Spain by Hispavox—which will bring Sabicas' music back to Spain after 20 years. In its area—the greatest.

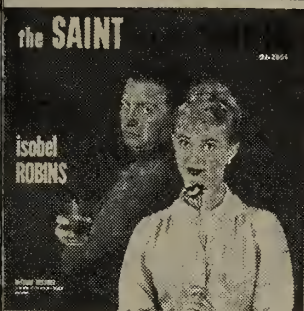

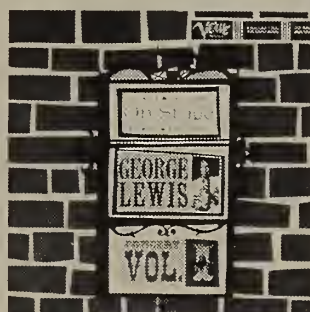
"EVERYBODY LIKES TO CHA CHA CHA"—Rene Bloch and his Orch.—Hifirecord R 819

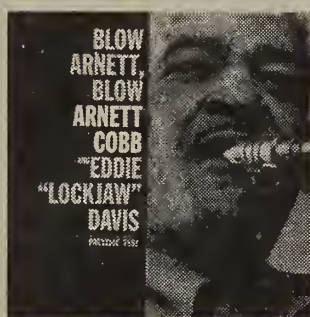
"THE SAINT AND THE SINNER"—Henry Morgan and Isobel Robins—Offbeat OJ 3004

"ON STAGE"—Volumes 1 & 2—George Lewis—Verve MG V-8304

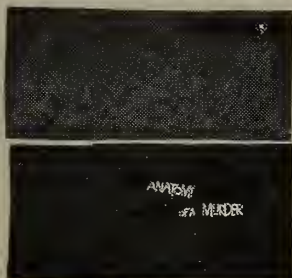

"BLOW ARNETT, BLOW"—Arnett Cobb and Eddie "Lockjaw" Davis—Prestige 7151

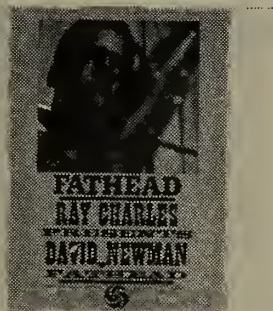

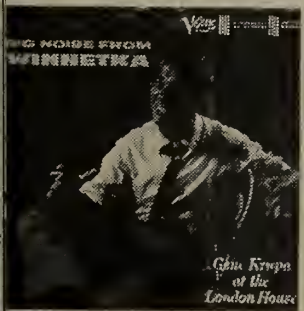

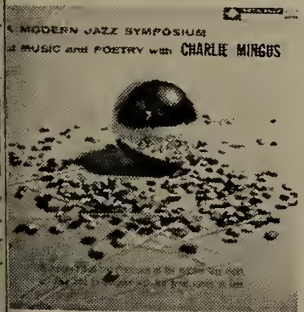
"FATHEAD/RAY CHARLES PRESENTS DAVID NEWMAN"—Atlantic 1304

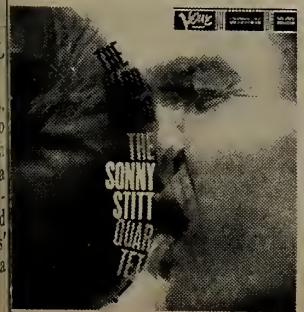
"BIG NOISE FROM WINNETKA"—Gene Krupa—Verve MG V-8310

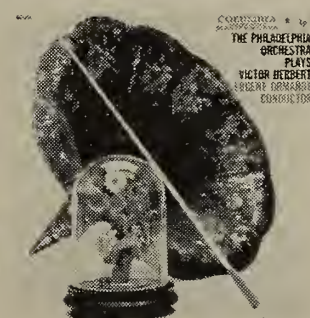
Charles Mingus' Jazz Workshop has made many important contributions to modern jazz. Here Mingus continues to offer his unusual and exciting sounds via five numbers. The poetry comes in on the opening extended "Scenes of the City," narrated by Melvin Stewart. The other four numbers are musical and swing uninhibitedly. A treat for the way-out class.



"THE HARD SWING"—The Sonny Stitt Quartet—Verve MG V-8306

This album is all Stitt, for though he works with rhythm, he hardly moves off the solo stage (just twice in eleven tunes). Seven numbers feature Stitt on alto sax, the remaining four on tenor. Stitt drives unrelentingly, and even the slower tempo numbers move quickly because of his long lines of short notes. Selections include "What's New," "Blues For Lester" and "I'll Remember April." Very bopish—for the cool set.

CLASSICAL



"THE PHILADELPHIA ORCHESTRA PLAYS VICTOR HERBERT"—Eugene Ormandy, conductor—Columbia ML 5376 (Monaural & Stereo)

Five of Victor Herbert's works are represented here. Three are in complete form—"Pan Americana," "American Fantasy," "Irish Rhapsody"—and the others include selections from "The Fortune Teller" and "Naughty Marietta," probably Herbert's most remembered work. Tunes from this show include "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life," "I'm Falling In Love With Someone" and "The Italian Street Song." Great melodies in a skillfully executed session.



"A NIGHT AT THE OPERA"—Walberg and his Orchestra—Mercury SR 60092 (Monaural & Stereo)

Selections from ten romantic operas are played for general appreciation by the very lush, string-filled Walberg orch. All of the works were written during the second half of the nineteenth century, reflecting a similarity in style and romanticism. Operas represented are "Carmen," "La Tosca," "La Boheme," "La Gioconda," "Manon," "La Traviata," "Faust" and others. Set has solid pop-classical appeal.



VILLA-LOBOS: "Bachianas Brasileiras No. 1 and No. 5"; BACH VILLA-LOBOS: "Prelude and Fugue No. 8"—Felix Slatkin conducting the Concert Arts Cello Ensemble, Marni Nixon, soprano—Capitol P 8484 & Stereo SP 8484

The "Bachianas Brasileiras" utilize only eight cellists, with soprano Marni Nixon singing the aria—1st movement No. 5. The Prelude and Fugue are from Villa-Lobos' arrangements from Bach's "Well-Tempered Clavier," and use twenty-six cellists. Astute classical coterie interest here.



KODALY: "Psalmus Hungaricus"; BARTOK: "Dance Suite"—London Philharmonic Orchestra and Choir, Raymond Nilsson, tenor, conducted by Janos Ferencsik—Everest LPBR 6022 & Stereo SDBR 3022

Both pieces were written for the 1923 festival in Hungary celebrating the joining of the cities of Buda and Pesth (Budapest) and both composers have contributed significantly to true Hungarian music. Kodaly's "Psalmus," a nationalistic Hungarian version of the fifty-fifth psalm, is sung in English by Nilsson and the chorus. Bartok's "Dance Suite" is a combining of folk dance forms. Unusually interesting issue.

Seuss' first LP will consist of special adaptations of excerpts from his most popular books.

Ralph Bellamy, Brian Aherne and Ronald Regan have also been signed to make Bluebird LP's in the near future.

In the works now is a new album featuring the original voices of the Terry-Toon characters. The Terry-Toon cartoons, which were a large success in the movies for years, are now enjoying a television revival.

Lunch Honors Oslo Symphony Orchestra

NEW YORK—The United States Embassy in Norway recently gave a luncheon to honor the recordings now being made by the Oslo Symphony Orchestra for RCA Camden. Among the guests was Peter Dellheim, musical director, Red Seal RCA Victor. Tops Earnings Up

LOS ANGELES—Tops Records' resident, Carl Doshay, last week announced that net earnings of Pacific Radiation Instruments, Inc., Tops' legal corporation title, for three months ending April 30, 1959 amounted to 186,330.60, equal to six cents per share on the combined Common and Class "B" shares outstanding. This compares with net earnings of \$81,722.03 earned in the previous three months ended January 31, 1959.

Doshay stated that net sales for the three months ending April 30 totaled \$1.4 million, slightly ahead of sales for the preceding period. Doshay attributed the favorable results of the last two quarters to a combination of many sound management and operational actions, such as new product development and effective inventory controls. More substantial sales and earnings are anticipated during the next six months due to an expansion and promotional product program, the plans for which will be announced soon. "We believe this new campaign will come as a surprise," Doshay said, as it will mark an entirely new concept for the entire record industry.

An inkling to this forthcoming program was given last week with the announcement that George Sherlock had been signed to head up Tops' newly created national promotion department to handle deejay exploitation and publicity. Prior to now, Tops has never serviced radio stations, having concentrated their sales promotion efforts directly to the 15,000 mass shopping outlets throughout the country, such as Rexall Drug, Woolworth's and Sears, Roebuck.

Tops has an existing catalog of over 250 monaural and stereo albums that includes such artists as Johnny Desmond, Lena Horne, Jerry Gray, Kate Smith, Billy Daniels, Mel Torme and the Kirby Stone Four.

Warner Bros. Issues Six Dance Albums

BURBANK, CALIF.—Warner Bros. Records last week announced the release of six dance albums plus three special albums for the month of July. The release is being backed by a strong merchandising and advertising campaign under the theme "Dancer's Choice."

The six dance albums, keyed to six different styles of dancing, are: "Stereo Goes Charleston" by Ira Ironstrings; "Stereo Goes Latin" by the Bobby Havana Boys; "Stereo Goes To A Polka Party" by Felix Citkowitz; "Stereo Goes To A Dance Caper" by Don Ralke; "Stereo Goes Square Dancing" by caller Arnie Kronberger; and "Stereo Goes Waltzing" by David Terry. All of these are also available monaurally.

"Pete Kelly's Blues," music from the TV soundtrack, heads the remaining three releases. Completing the list are "Broadway '58-'9" by Eddie Le Mar, dance tempos of current show tunes; and "Beach Romance," featuring the singing and guitar playing of Roger Smith, star of the "77 Sunset Strip" TVer.

The first, "The Happy Organ," played by Dave "Baby" Cortez, was released just a month ago. The second contains tunes from "More Music From Peter Gunn."

Just released is a new Chet Atkins EP "Hum and Strum Along With Chet Atkins," containing tunes from his new LP. The EP includes "Good Old Summertime", "Bill Bailey" and "John Henry".

Pickwick's Berson On 5 Week Sales Trip

NEW YORK — Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick Sales announced last week that sales manager Ralph Berson left Wednesday (July 8th) on a five week sales trip that will take him to 27 cities.

Some Promotion!



NEW YORK — To what extreme will a promotion man go to push a record album?

New Yorkers, sweltering in 90-degree heat, got a pretty good idea last week. Crusty taxi drivers, harried traffic cops, and thousands of pedestrians who usually charge along the sidewalks like a band of Notre Dame fullbacks, stopped in their tracks and stared goggle-eyed when they saw a gorilla and his keeper cruising around the city in an air-conditioned Cadillac limousine, chauffeur and all.

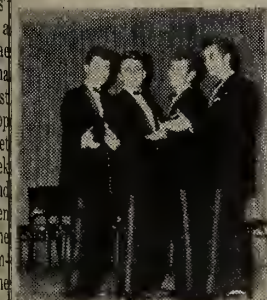

Ample quantities of catalogue merchandise have been distributed to the 28 company-owned branches of Capitol Distributing as well as to the seven independent distributors with whom Capitol does business.

Maitland also reported that the Scranton strike in no way affects the production of albums and single records at the company's Los Angeles plant.

New DJ Association In Works; Jockeys To Meet This Weekend

SAN FRANCISCO—A new nationwide deejay organization could be in operation as a result of a deejay meet this weekend (18 & 19) in Milwaukee at the Milwaukee Inn. Headed in its formulative stages by radio man Bill Gavin, the organization is tentatively tagged "International Association of Disc Jockies & Music Programming," and its membership is expected to include most of the leading lights on the deejay roster.

One of its functions would be the coordinating of an annual deejay convention, a job done for the last two years by Bill Stewart, who worked for the convention's sponsor, the Storz Stations.

"Setting up a national deejay organization is a major undertaking," Gavin said, "If we try to do too much too soon," he warned jocks, "we can get all bogged down and accomplish nothing. Let's take one step at a time. We can't expect a 'smash' response to our public announcements in the press. So let's not get discouraged if membership applications dribble in slowly. After all, we're asking people to join an association that doesn't really exist, so far. Once we make it a reality then we can roll."

According to Milwaukee deejay Don "Coffeehead" Larsen, "he's pretty sure" at least 75 deejays will be on hand for the meet. At Milwaukee, they will have before them or-

ganizational proposals, including one for a 57 man National Board. This would be a representative sampling of deejays from various areas (i.e. New England, Eastern, Central, Pacific, etc.) and would be set-up on a proportional basis, based, presumably, on population density of the individual areas. There would also be convention delegates, membership of which would be six times the board members allocated to each region, which, with board members automatically qualifying as delegates, would make a total of 399 official delegates to a convention, in person or by proxy.

To insure active participation for the "smaller" jocks, the draft constitution provides that some board members in each region must be chosen from outside the major cities.

As possibly the new coordinator of annual deejay conventions, the organization is expected to readily agree to the participation of record companies and station management at such events.

There's a possibility the Regional Meeting would be held prior to annual conventions. Gavin last week end met in Hollywood with jocks Jim Hawthorne, Ira Cook and Chuck Blore. Suggestions have been made for an Eastern meeting in New York and a Pacific meeting in San Francisco, both for sometime next fall or winter.

tured into the pop field recording such talent as Paul Whiteman, Anita O'Day, Johnny Long, Ray Anthony, Ray Block and Liberace among others.

The label was discontinued in 1948 after which Thiele became A&R head for Coral, remaining there seven years. Before the formation of the Hanover-Signature Record Corp. in April of this year, Thiele held the post of vice president in charge of A&R for Dot Records.

Other artists now pacted to the new firm include Steve Allen, Audrey and Jane Meadows, Milton Delugg and Jack Kane, currently musical director of the Andy Williams CBS-TVer.

Latter was the largest one-night crowd the ballroom has seen since Frankie Laine packed 4700 into the room in 1950.

Warner Bros. recently secured the recording rights to the sound track of the English film, which stars Diana Dors. Highlighting the promotion for the album is a jacket cover picturing Miss Dors.

Mercury's New Zealand Affiliate, George A. Wooler, Visits United States



CHICAGO — George A. Wooler, Mercury Records affiliate in New Zealand, visited the home offices in Chicago last week where he conferred with Mercury brass Irving B. Green, Irwin Steinberg, Art Talmadge, Kenny Myers, Pete Fabri and Merle Shapiro on all facets of record manufacture and distribution.

"New Zealand," Wooler revealed, "buys the largest amount of records per capita of any country in the world. Since the country lacks television and is visited by only a very few entertainment celebrities, music is one of the main diversions. A New Zealand teenager," he continued, "knows every recording artist by heart and can reel off the titles of every piece he ever recorded. When the Platters visited there recently, we'd have declared it a national holiday if it could have been arranged."

"In stereo acceptance, New Zealand is far ahead of England or America," he commented. "The George A. Wooler Company, manufacturers of electronic equipment, has manufactured no monaural equipment for almost a year now, concentrating on stereo equipment instead. With no television sets to buy, the average New Zealand and Auckland family can afford to invest in the finest and newest recording sets. Most of our citizens are changing to stereo and the sale of stereo albums is rising rapidly."

Rack sales of records in drug stores, grocery stores, etc. is not practiced in New Zealand. Records are merchandised mostly through appliance stores.

Wooler, a delegate to Mercury's recent sales and administrative seminar in Madrid, Spain, hosted by Louis Sagi-Vela of Mercury Espanols, was deeply impressed by the value of the international get-together of affiliates and licensees.

"When businessmen and women from the opposite ends of the world can meet for a friendly and enthusiastic exchange of ideas, it's an ex-

tremely healthy experience for all concerned and no trade or firm can help but be strengthened and benefited by the interchange," stated Wooler. "I found it stimulating, for instance, to sit down with a Mercury affiliate from Canada, and one from Finland, and to have them explain how they handled certain aspects of distribution in their countries. I'm sure they found a like amount of information and interest in learning the New Zealand picture."

"One thing the convention certainly established is the fact that a distributor or record salesman can no longer sell by the seat of his pants. He's got to get from behind his desk, see the dealer and tell him what other people are purchasing and why he should purchase. The dealer needs more information than he gets from a mailed order blank."

Following the Madrid meeting, Wooler embarked on a tour of record markets and after his stop-overs in New York and Chicago, will visit Hawaii and the Bahamas and other territories which are comparable to New Zealand and Auckland.

Irving Green, president of Mercury, reported that in addition to the annual international sales seminar, the company is contemplating a number of yearly regional meetings among affiliates and licensees whose problems may be comparable. Such as those in the Island markets, South America, etc.

Sid Siegel Predicts "Strong Summer Sales"

NEW YORK—Sidney Siegel, president of Seeco Records, declared last week that in his opinion the overall figures for the record business during the next two months will show that this has actually been a "strong" summer for sales.

Siegel based his prediction on two factors: "Records today are being sold in many different types of locations. Secondly," the Seeco topper stated, "the LP buying-habit is not dependent upon a hit to at least keep moving."

"It's true," Siegel stated, "that hits are still the best possible antidote for a sick business, and the record retailer is still the only one who sells records—the others just display them and there's a world of difference between the two. However, the fact remains that women must shop in supermarkets, variety and department stores and kids go into neighborhood drug stores and news dealers. If we have a good enough product, we can still keep our merchandise moving to the consumer. The real danger is falling into the traditional attitude that we're all licked because the temperature went up. It just doesn't make sense anymore and this kind of complacency and resignation hurts the entire industry needlessly."

"For one thing," Siegel continued, "every really good store today has air conditioning and that makes it pleasant to shop. Juvenile singles business probably will fall off because the kids are out-of-doors so much but the LP habit is a solid factor and promotions geared for adults will bring in better than satisfactory results. Semi-classics and music for light listening are ideal hot weather fares."

"The number of portable radios has reached an all-time peak. Every beach is dotted with the small sets tuned in on music and news stations that keep the record-listening habit just as strong now as it is in December."

"It's old-fashioned thinking that makes us believe the summer has to be bad for the record business. In my opinion, a lot of the things that are wrong with the disk field right now are problems that have been building for a long time and have nothing to do with whether it's warm or cold outside. Manufacturers and distributors who pitch in and try to do business are going to find that the sales are there if they just go after them."

"As it is, when the total industry figures are tallied, and I'm including rack operations, this will be the best

CHICAGO—Musi-copy, a new process by which sheet music can be reproduced at a minimum cost, has been introduced by Cappo, Inc., Chicago musical arrangement and talent company.

Maximum cost for the reproduction process runs 50 cents per double sheet (12½ inches by 19 inches) of music. This price is approximately one-third of the hand-copy or photostatic reproduction systems now in use. Quantity discounts also are available up to 20%.

"Our process is designed for orchestras and acts who travel a great deal and seek insurance against the loss of their special arrangements," commented Cappo president Dwight "Puff" Cannon.

"Each of our clients also has the option of taking along the second copies of his music, or leaving them with us. If he chooses the latter and his library, or part of it, is lost, stolen or destroyed, we can have the second copy in his hands within 24 hours, no matter where he is in the country," added Cannon.

Much discussion was also had on the possibility of sending more Country Music talent abroad to take advantage of the interest in this music, so evident now in foreign countries. Gay and Executive Director were instructed to work closely with the State Department on this.

Other matters brought up were methods of telling the story of Country Music to advertise and agencies with a view toward securing more use of our product on networks and stations.

The next meeting of the Board of Directors will be held in Springfield, Missouri, September 11 and 12.

Gould's suite was recently recorded by the National Symphony and Howard Mitchell for RCA Victor.

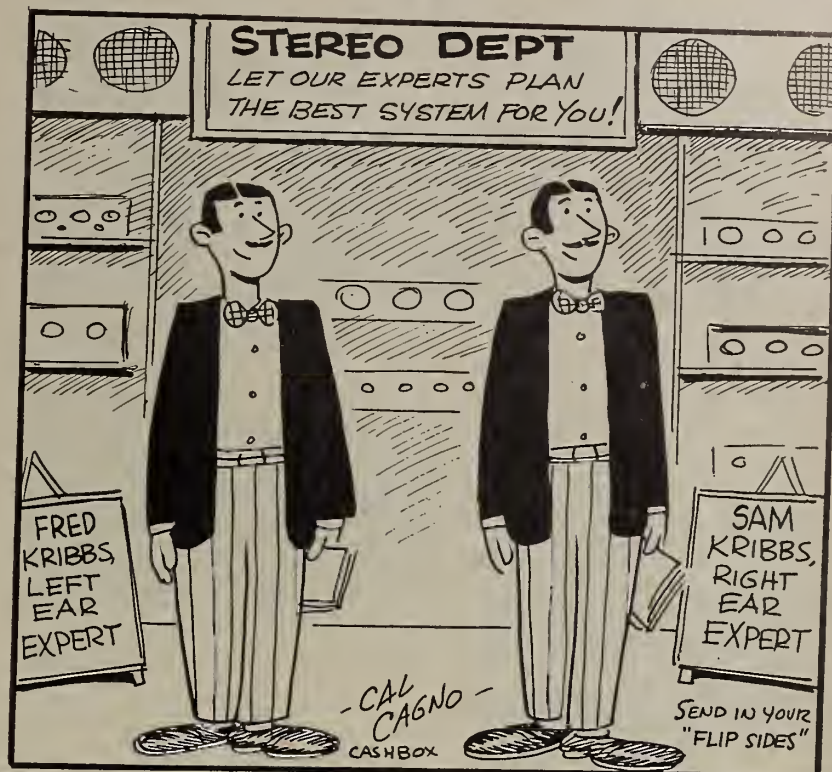
"Duke's" Busy Jazz Sked

Gordon won the American Federation of Music contest for dance bands last month and was named "Best New Dance Band in America."

The dance band contest, the idea of Herman Kenin, president of the AFM, was initiated as a method to revitalize interest in the band business. One-hundred eighty-three bands from the United States and Canada entered the contest with playoffs scheduled on a local, regional, semi-final and final basis. The Gordon band won the local and regional contest held at the Hollywood Palladium last April, then went to Chicago where it

won unanimous voting from the judges in the semi finals, and finally onto New York City where it won the final contest, again with the unanimous vote of the judges. London Philharmonic Sign Somerset Pact

SWARTHMORE, PA.—The world-famous London Philharmonic Orchestra has signed an exclusive two-year recording contract with the Miller International Company, manufacturers of Stereo-Fidelity and Somerset records. The signing assures that future recordings by this orchestra will be available to the public at a suggested list price of only \$1.98 on the Somerset monophonic label and \$2.98 on the stereophonic Stereo-Fidelity label.

First records to be issued under the agreement will be marketed in mid July and include two Tchaikovsky symphonies conducted by Sir Adrian Boult and orchestral pieces conducted by Hugo Rignold.

The new recording contract, executed on behalf of Miller International Company by David L. Miller, President, and on behalf of the London Philharmonic Orchestra Ltd., by Stephen Gray, Secretary and General Manager, calls for a minimum of 130 three-hour recording sessions to be held during the two-year period. In addition, conductor Walter Susskind has been signed for new recordings with the orchestra. Also to be used are several young conductors destined to be promoted by the label.

Since the signing of the contract a few weeks ago, many players in the London Philharmonic have been replaced at the insistence of the orchestra's music director, William Steinberg, and Miller.

At the same time, Miller announced that his company has also signed a two-year lease with St. Mary Magdalene's Church in London for exclusive recording rights in the edifice. Currently, alterations to the church are under way to provide studio control room facilities. The permanent changes are being made so as not to interfere with church services or to be visible to churchgoers. Miller International engineers, Dr. Erich Beurman and Wilhelm Wille are guiding the construction of studio facilities.

In order to facilitate operations in the United Kingdom, Miller also has named Frederick Wright to a permanent liaison position between English artists and facilities and the American company. Miller will continue to supervise all recording for the company.

Mercury A & R Execs In Chicago Confab

CHICAGO—Mercury Records' east and west coast musical directors winged into Chicago last Thursday, July 9th, to attend a home office A & R conference called by executive director, Art Talmadge. Arriving from Mercury's New York division were Clyde Otis, recording director in the popular department, Doug Hawkins, chief recording engineer, and Hal Mooney, recording director of jazz. Also attending the confab were Peter Rugulo, recording director of the California offices and David Carroll, recording director in the Chicago Division.

Meeting at the Bismarck Hotel with president, Irving B. Green, treasurer, Irwin Steinberg, and ad and promotional director, Kenny Myers, the A & R staff reviewed recording product including current product analysis and the recording program in the near future. Says Talmadge, "Basically this meeting was to review, analyze and plan the quality and quantity of our Mercury repertoire and artists. We are the largest company in the business engaged exclusively in the manufacture of records alone, with no motion picture, television, booking agency or other affiliations and interests. Last week's conference was, therefore, primarily concerned with records and their musical content". To which, Irving Green, current president of RIAA adds, ". . . And, of course, with the musical content of our Mercury recording program as it relates to general business trends in the entire recording field, which, in turn, relate to economic trends in all other fields."

Everest To Lease Studios To Outside Companies

NEW YORK—The facilities of Everest's sound recording studio at Bay-side, Long Island, will be made available to motion picture and recording companies, it was disclosed last week. The Belock Recording Company, producers of Everest records, has announced that its modern 115,200 cu. ft. studio will be leased to outside companies, upon special arrangement, when not in use for Everest recording sessions.

Recordings there can be made for single track on ¼ inch magnetic tape, double track on ¼ inch magnetic tape and three track stereophonic on ½ inch magnetic tape in addition to the 35 mm. facilities that are unique to this studio. Among Everest's units is a special stereophonic 12 microphone position, three channel mixing console, which permits extreme flexibility of control, individual channel equalization and individual channel added reverberation control.

Simon Signed For Specs

NEW YORK—George T. Simon, Bouree Productions' president and jazz and pop music authority, has been tabbed by Henry Jaffe Enterprises as a consultant for the forthcoming Bell Telephone Hour series of musical spectacles over NBC.

In the deal, set by Perry Leff of Frank Cooper Associates, Simon will work closely in all phases of conception and production with Barry Wood, executive producer of the series, concentrating especially on talent, musical repertoire and ideas for the dozen hour-long shows.

Victor Lowers Pop Stereo LP Prices

NEW YORK — Effective immediately, RCA Victor is reducing the price of all popular stereo long play records in the LSP series from manufacturers nationally advertised list of \$5.98 to \$4.98, it was announced last week by J. Y. Burgess, Jr., Manager, Commercial Sales and Merchandising Department, RCA Victor Record Division.

Westminster Records Forms New Label

NEW YORK — Westminster Recording Co. announced last week the formation of Whitehall Records, a new company which has been organized for the purpose of manufacturing and distributing under the Whitehall label, a line of \$1.98 monaural and \$2.98 stereo records. Norman Wieland, formerly of 20th Century Fox Records has been engaged as the national sales director of the newly formed company. He is currently setting up nationwide distribution for the new label. It is expected that the debut releases will hit the market in the middle of August.

Brunswick Pacts Linda Fields

NEW YORK—Brunswick Records, the Decca affiliate, has pacted its first femme vocalist, Linda Fields, it was announced last week. Her initial release is "Mama's Boy" b/w "When You Fall In Love With Me."

Miss Fields has done many commercials for the East Coast area, among them Nancy Starr for National Airlines.

Frankie Vaughan Wows 'Em At Copa In New York

NEW YORK — It's just a matter of time before England's idol Frankie Vaughan becomes a favorite in the States. A sensation in British clubs, theaters and on wax, the tremendously talented songster last week completed his first big stint in the U.S.—an engagement at the Copa in New York. And if the closing night's audience is any indication of Frankie's future as a performer in the States, we can expect to see him back on our shores in short order.

In his act, Frankie wastes absolutely no time on needless conversation. With the exception of an expected greeting, the Columbia Records artist offers one song after another. His charm and personality come thru in a matter of minutes. At mid point he has won his audience. And at the conclusion you're sorry to see him go.

Working almost completely in an up-tempo, Vaughan's audience is always attentive. Blaine simultaneously announced the release of two new singles this week, "Romeo" b/w "Always, My Darling" by the Cadillacs, and "La-La-La" b/w "Bow-Legged Annie" by the Deltones. The former is on Josie, the latter on Jubilee.

Miller Switches British Distrib

SWARTHMORE, PA.—Miller International Company has changed distribution in the United Kingdom by execution of an agreement with Pye Ltd. The agreement, which calls for both Somerset and Stereo-Fidelity records to be issued in the United Kingdom by Pye Ltd., was negotiated through the office of Harry Fox.

Distribution in the United Kingdom had previously been handled through Decca Records Ltd. (English Decca).

Frederick Wright, who recently joined the Miller International Company's permanent European staff, will act as liaison between Miller and the Pye organization.

The first release under the new contract will be made in September.

Dubonnet - ASCAP Suit

NEW YORK—In important legal action, Dubonnet Music has brought legal action against ASCAP concerning collections on the Johnnie Ray tune, "Cry." Heard before Judge Epstein in New York Supreme Court, the plaintive has challenged ASCAP's "invested rights" with material it acts as a collecting agency for.

Dubonnet transferred the song, some time ago, to its BMI affiliate, Mellow Music. BMI's collection payments to Mellow have been held back by ASCAP, which still has the song on its books. Judge Epstein "reserved decision."

Stearns Gets Film Tune

NEW YORK—Julie Stearns' Arena Music Publishing Company has taken over the song "I Couldn't Care Less" from the 20th Century Fox film "Say One For Me" starring Bing Crosby and Debbie Reynolds.

The tune, which was in the publishing company of its writers Sammy Cahn and Jimmy Van Heusen, was turned over to Stearns.

"Battle" #1 For 8 Weeks

NEW YORK—The Johnny Horton Columbia recording "Battle of New Orleans" set a 1959 record this week for being the first song of the year to have topped *The Cash Box* Top 100 chart for eight consecutive weeks.

12 New Vanguard LP's

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Can a Capricious—Arbitrary— Unreasonable **DIKTATOR** Ruin Thousands of Small Businessmen in the U. S. A.?

A terribly disturbing condition exists in an area of this great United States which should only happen in a Hitler's Germany or a Communist Soviet. The United States is a land where the "Dictator" is the most revolting of all individuals. Law of the people is the law of the land. Public officials are elected to serve **THE PEOPLE**. Appointed officials are named by these elected servants to serve a function of public duty. Where the individual disregards the welfare of the citizens—he should be removed by the electorate; or by those who appoint him.

In this state it is legal to operate shuffles, bowlers, guns, etc. Rather than lose their licenses, location owners have requested operators to remove their amusement machines, knowing at the same time that their revenues could be reduced to a point where they may have to close up shop.

Every conceivable remedy has been sought by both the coin firms and the location owners. They have asked legal advice. They have asked the advice of the State's legislators. They have had the Church appeal. A petition, containing the names of 1,400 bar and tavern owners, has been presented, advising that without the amusement machine on their prem-

ises, it's highly possible they may have to go out of business. The Liquor Dealers Association in this area, thru its attorneys, tried to relieve this condition. An appeal has been made to the head of the entire State Liquor Authority. Nothing has prevailed.

It is reported that this individual has informed the interested parties to file suit. This is, of course, the recourse every American citizen has to cope with arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable individuals. But legal action takes considerable money, and the operators and distributors in the area, small businessmen, feel they cannot undertake such a burdensome financial investment. They feel that, while they will win their case, they might go broke fighting for their rights. Another point made is that the suit would have to be instituted by a location owner and that reprisals in some manner might be made, and he'll lose his liquor license.

It is difficult to believe a situation such as this could possibly exist in the United States. One could believe a "Dictator" could live and function only in a Communist country.

No solution has been found for this terrible condition altho every possible effort has been made. Our only suggestion is that those people in that area combine their finances and start a newspaper campaign, telling the people that a "Dictator" is living in their community—and leave it to public indignation to demand the removal of a "Dictator" from their midst. If one "Dictator" can get a foothold, no matter what the reason, he could extend his power to other fields or other budding dictators could get ideas.

Let's remove this "Dictator"—or we may find ourselves in a Communist country.

Charter Set, PR Program Approved, Fund Raising Plan Organized As PR Committee Moves Swiftly

Volunteer Contributions Start Statewide Program As \$5.00 Membership Drive Begins

NEW YORK—Just six weeks after a general industry meeting was held, on May 25th, at the Park-Sheraton Hotel, this city, at which operators and distributors gathered to discuss the possibilities of a definite public relations program to be conducted in New York State, the appointed public relations committee for this proposed campaign met for the third time and approved a charter, a definite program designed to improve coin industry public relations, and an organized program for the raising of funds. The swift action was the result of organized discussions conducted by chairman Al "Senator" Bodkin, New York operator, and his committee, with representatives from New York City, Westchester County, and Upstate New York areas.

The official title of the newly formed group is "The Public Relations Committee of the New York State Coin Machine Association, Inc.", operating under the upstate association charter, to function autonomously and completely as a public relations arm of the organization, with provision for separate financial, secretarial and management facets, apart from the association itself. The motion for such a move was passed unanimously at a general meeting held Wednesday evening, July 8th, in the offices of the Music Operators of New York, Inc., this city.

The wheels of organization and progress began to move almost immediately upon approval of the program by committee members in attendance. Stationery, membership cards and letters of solicitation are being prepared. Banking facilities for the non-

profit organization are under way. A community youth center teenage coke party and dance is being arranged with immediate costs already defrayed by volunteer contributions from members at the committee meeting, a turning point and milestone after only six weeks of preliminary discussion.

The decision to move on a basic program designed to "get the ball rolling" was the result of consideration of several types of programs several of which were in the \$100,000 cost bracket. A "grass roots" campaign to activate the much needed drive was chosen, in order that, financially, all coinmen in New York State could be called upon for support, and, to accomplish, possibly in a small way, the purpose for which the entire organization was formed, namely, better impression of the coin machine industry in the minds of the general public. Earlier discussions along the lines of public relations gave evidence of accomplishing very little but talk and unsurmountable problems of raising the necessary funds for programs designed for large industries. Thus, the approval of a solid, low-cost, progressive campaign, to become effective immediately. Much of the organizational details have already been ironed out with acceptance of the use of the New York Coin Machine Association, Inc. charter. The charter has provision for such a committee, saving the time consuming details necessary to institute a new charter, and also the additional costs involved.

Tom Greco, president of the association and Mrs. Amelia McCarthy, treasurer for the New York State group, advised that the public relations program can be assured of support from all of New York State now that the program is truly a statewide organization. Mrs. McCarthy assured the approval for such a program from her own organization as well as from Rockland County and other upstate associations already organized but without a central public relations committee.

Joel Stern, World Wide Distribs, tells us that every-

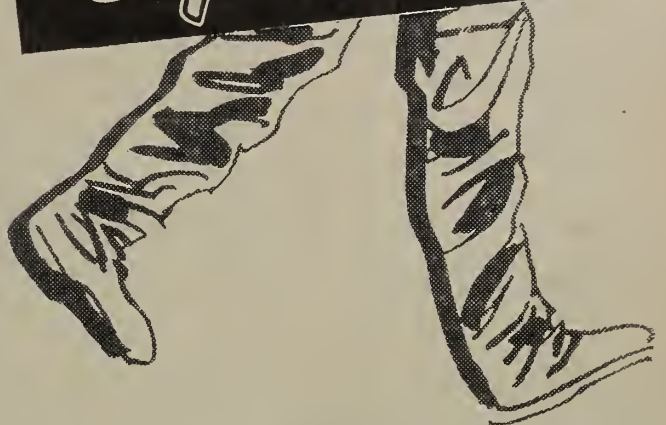

(Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.
