This month nothing is too much trouble in the search for gaming purity – we're off to that sub-tropical metropolis, Sheffield, and the vast cellars of Gremlin Interactive, for an Ultimate-only look at *Loaded*.

The game itself is taking over from where Gauntlet and

Chaos Engine left off. Now the top-down isometric shoot-em-up genre

has hit the 32-bits in a big way, with superbly



rendered sprites and 3D tomfoolery aplenty. It's still in a very early stage of development, but already it's shaping up to be something of a cracker.

The story centres around the prison planet RAULF. It houses the most desperate criminals in the galaxy, all imprisoned there by FUB (Fat Ugly Boy), an Elvis fetishist who's swallowed one cheeseburger too many. And he certainly has been a busy tubby 'king' while the characters have been banged up, creating a machine that allows him to radically affect landscapes and open doorways

he complex has more than its fair share of princes and kings, and each comes armed with a firing weapon (which can be pilfered once they're dead). Their henchman are more of a problem – they'll take bullets for their boss, while allowing him to still fire at the players. Top Dogs will take around eight hits to despatch, and henchman five, but once you start collecting those weapon power-ups, you'll be popping them off in no time.

console any earlier in the States or in Europe

on the console - now!

s we predicted last month, Sega have followed their early launch in the States with another shock announcement in **Europe. The official UK** Saturn will be in the shops **Calbeit in a limited** number) on July 8th!

At the time of going to press Ultimate Future Games found out that the Saturn will be packed with Virtua Fighter (full-screen mode) and will retail at £399.99 (as predicted by UFG) - this price also includes a joypad.

Of the six games that were available at launch in the US, only four have been

confirmed as being immediately available over here, with two others following within a few weeks. Sega have promised tweaks and slight changes in the gameplay on all the European versions of Saturn games which will be coming out.

Virtua Fighter is obviously available since it is packed with the machine, and we have been assured that it is full-screen (no borders) and full-speed. Daytona USA already has borders in the Japanese version, and these are slightly bigger in the

UK version - this has helped the conversion team keep the original speed. The karaoke option which enables you to switch off that dreadful singing now works in both the

Saturn and Arcade mode - thank God! (in the Jap version it only worked in one mode). International Victory Goal (another new name!) has

national rather than J-League teams. Clockwork Knight has been made slightly more difficult (let's face it, it really was

easy) - there are less continues and the bosses are not so easy to beat (oh, and the first boss is now a blue-faced doll).

The two titles to be released a few weeks after the launch are Panzer Dragoon (full-screen and full-speed - with

added difficulty: now most of the enemies actually attack you themselves, or with extra weapons of destruction) and Pebble Beach Golf (details yet to be finalised).

The launch comes a few weeks after Sega were spotted slapping advertisements in the main-stream press (Loaded, Vox. Select amongst others) and on bus shelter boards. The Saturn logo is used to replace the letter 'S' in a number of slogans like, "Slim chance, fat boy!", "No jerks", and the

classic, "Aural Sex". You really can't fail to miss them.

This is just the start of the massive Sega spend. Next month we'll bring you the latest on how Sony and Sega are arming themselves in the all-important advertising war.

Saturn Re-launch?

Rumours are already flooding in from the industry that Sega are planning to release a new version of the Saturn in Europe towards the end of the year. Already, we have seen 'those' Saturn advertisments cropping up everywhere from bus shelters to music magazines, almost confirming a July release date. Clearly, Sega want to get out ages before Sony, but indications point to Sega trimming down the Saturn hardware to a point where they can match the PlayStation's price point, round about the traditional Christmas boom in videogame sales. Reducing the architecture in the Saturn won't affect current games.

Sega are to shift all their games hardware manufacture out of Japan. This is because of the constant rise in the Yen, and their inability to meet promised Saturn pricing at current rates of inflation. They already produce most of their output in Taiwan, China and Indonesia, and everything else will have moved out of Japan by the end of March '96. Hopefully, this will see prices begin to stabilise a lot more.

Actua Soccer

The stunning motion-captured football sim from Gremlin Interactive is definitely on its way to the PlayStation. It features the actual movements of Sheffield Wednesday and England internationals Chris Woods and Andy Sinton, and a slick 3D viewpoint. The PC CD ROM version will be out in September, while the PSX version should be ready for launch, Gremlin tell us.

ow. That's it, that's all your getting, please move on to another preview.

Okay, that's a big lie. Of course we're going to tell you everything about Sony Psygnosis' unbelievably slick racing game, but let us get our breath back first. It's stunning, you see. Even at this stage in its development (it's due out to coincide with the launch of the PlayStation),

this CD shines like a gem from





the myriad of other racers on both the PSX and Saturn.

Set in the future, where magnetically-suspended hovercars are the norm and racing until glory or death is accepted behaviour, Wipeout bares its polished bottom at all the competition. Forget F-Zero and don't bother looking in Gran Chaser's court - we're confident this will become the benchmark from which other hopeful hoverers will be assessed.

The main concern with previous games in this genre,

has been the conspicuous lack of an actual 'suspended' feeling - it generally felt like you were merely driving on a flat surface two feet above the ground, with none of the subtleties you'd expect to feel in the controls if you were riding on a layer of air. Wipeout has successfully addressed this problem, and for once you actually feel as though you are hovering. The sensitive controls, which are going to take a bit of getting used to after the all-out simple sliding nature of Ridge Racer, really

help with this feeling. The ship really does handle like you'd expect it to.

And what a stunner it is to look at. All the tracks come rendered in real-time, and to eliminate the noticeable effect of horizon update (as seen in Ridge Racer and even more prominently in Daytona USA, when huge chunks of track and scenery slammed into view when you were almost upon them) the actual bends in the track and large pieces of scenery have been used. In the

finished version, these will help mask any jarring update. All the tracks and craft themselves were initially drafted on paper, then brought to stunning life with the help of Softlmage graphics software and SGI workstations. Once these designs had been finalised, they were then ported over on to the PlayStation development hardware for inclusion in the game. If you think the logos, typeface and artwork that you see during the intro and beside the tracks are familiar, don't go

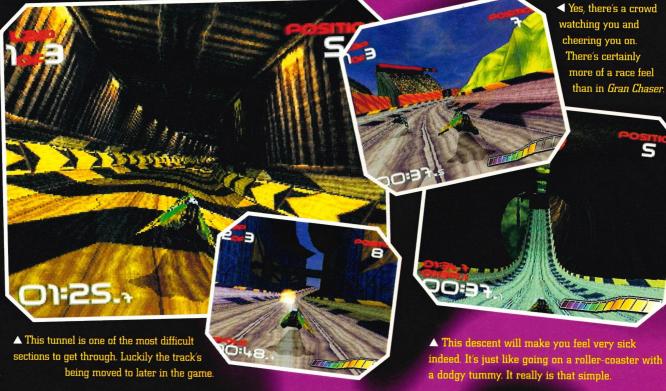

wipeout features ten tracks, divided into two racing classes, the first five being for amateurs, the next five being larger and gradually more challenging. Similar to Formula 1, there are four major constructors, each sponsoring two identical vehicles. The final version of the game will feature all the normal racing features — time trials, practice circuits, Champions' League and save game.

Sheffield-based The Designers Republic, who have contributed to the image of bands like Pop Will Eat Itself, Nine Inch Nails and Fangoria, were responsible. Clearly no expense has been spared in getting Wipeout's glorious look just right.

The wonderfully smooth visuals are certainly enriched by the atmospheric sound.

Admittedly, there isn't a great deal of it currently, but being a

part of the Sony group allowed the team to approach professional musicians and bands that would fit into the whole futuristic feel. In fact, *The Orb*, who contributed a track, will be featuring the piece of music they contributed on their latest album. Sony Psygnosis are planning to release a compilation album of all the tracks, following the highly popular trend that exists in Japanese videogaming culture.

So impressed were MGM by the game, that they got

Wipeout's graphic artists to render up an SGI-generated sequence along the lines of Wipeout, which they are incorporating in one of their latest films, Hackers. The main characters will be seen 'playing' this – but we videogame bods know different, eh?

There are only two tracks in a playable state at the moment, but even these are damned challenging in one-player mode. But where Wipeout's sure to come into its own, is in two-player machine link-up mode.

You can collect power-ups (ranging from speed-ups to a variety of missiles and mines) to use against a computer opponent, but just imagine the frustration you can cause a mate sat not two metres away gazing at a different telly and everything. Sony Psygnosis would have to make a major cock-up to render the completed Wipeout a duffer. We don't reckon they will. When Sony Psygnosis brought it us, we really didn't want to give it back - it's hellishly addictive.

Sony PlayStation price slashed by a whopping ¥10,000 in Japan

Eight months after the Japanese launch of the PlayStation in Japan. Sony have moved to cut ¥10,000 off the original RRP, bringing it down to ¥29,800 - that's equivalent to a £75 dron down to £225

This price tumble is top news for UK game enthusiasts since it could be pointing to a lower than expected retail price over here (but Ultimate still maintains that if Sony are to reach the mass market, they will have to keep the price under £300).

Sega have also cut the Saturn's price to ¥34,800 (£260) in a kneejerk reaction, more than a month before Sony's move. The PSX is still the cheapest machine, though

Our Price have recently trimmed £50 off the price of Panasonic's 3D0 in selected shops, while the Calculus chain has slashed the price of Atari's Jaguar to just £99 (its regular retail price is £149). They're also selling the Mega 32X off for £99 as

Future Zone is another company trying to offload its grey stock. It's currently flogging imported Saturns for £399 in view of the strong opinions of a July official release.

As mentioned elsewhere this issue, the Neo Geo CD is also likely to drop to £329 from £399.

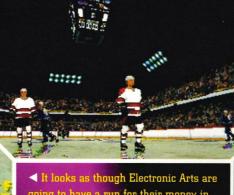

Until now I was unsure as to which Next Generation console I would be buying. And after the past week it WON'T be the Saturn.

The reason, very simply, is that the most important attribute of the Next Gen consoles is their 3D graphic producing capabilities, and on the Saturn the 3D graphics are pap. In a straight comparison with the PlayStation, the Saturn's graphics are at best mediocre, and hardly superior to the 3DO's.

Take the much hyped Daytona as an excellent example of the problem. The arcade machine in my opinion is the best racer by far. The Saturn version on the other hand, is dismal. The graphics are simply not good enough and lack true depth and realism. You see, that's the key with Ridge Racer. The graphics are so darned good

you can almost feel you're there. With Daytona all you can feel is embarrassment for Sega. Add to this the uninspiring gameplay and awfully waffly soundtrack, and for a game Sega hoped to sell the machine by the bucket, Daytona is a let down.

As for the others, Virtua Fighter is good (but not excellent) and Panzer Dragoon is repetitive and has limited gameplay. I'm sure I'll be buying a Sony and the fantastic Tekken.

The reason our reviewer marked *Gex* down was exactly because 'the settings are familiar and there are few real surprises'. Perhaps the mark was slightly harsh – but only by a few percent. *DKC* was eminently playable and damned addictive. *Gex* wasn't, really. Where *DKC* showed sparks of originality, *Gex* was just interesting. Sorry and all that. No, hang on, why am I apologising..?

It seems to me that you are getting caught up in this mass hype of the super consoles. But let us just think about a few things. First, a letter in issue six praises you for being 'well-informed'. I don't for one second doubt that you have information, but how you handle it is another matter. In issue three, a reader wrote in expressing concern about the hype you were generating, stating, quite sensibly, that your expectation for the prices of the super consoles was naively optimistic, making the point that the intended price and actual price tends to be adversely different, saying that £300 was a more realistic figure for the price of a PlayStation. Your reply: 'The PlayStation WILL be £250'.

Do you still stand by that comment? Most people now know that the Saturn will be at least £450 and the PSX around £400. Quite a big difference from the £250 you were so sure of.

Well, we've exhausted our gentle exploration of all the consoles, and it's time to turn our probing beam to the companies that will be making and shaking the future of the gaming scene. Prepare to win friends and influence people with these essential Sony Psygnosis facts...

Erm, they're from the 'Pool aren't they? Oh yes. The firm was given birth by Jonathan Ellis and Ian Hetherington (now Joint Managing Directors of Sony Electronic Publishing Europe) in a small Stonecutters cottage in Liverpool, way back in the blur that was 1984. They now also have offices in Stroud, Chester and London.

So they're pretty bloody big then, eh?

Well, they now employ over 250 people with publishing and development offices in the US, UK and Europe. Working with over 30 development teams across the US and Europe and with six internal development teams of its own, Sony Psygnosis is now the largest development house in Europe. On May 29th, 166 members of staff moved into their plush 45,000 sq ft (roughly the size of a football pitch) HQ in Wavetree Business Park, just outside Liverpool. By Christmas, it'll house 366 Sony Psygnosis and Sony Computer Entertainment staff.

So what did they do in the early days? They got involved with the old Amiga and Atari ST during the mid-eighties, and produced titles like Brattacas, Obliterator and the Shadow of the Beast trilogy. They

also had the misfortune of releasing Microcosm and Novastorm...

Hang on - didn't Psygnosis inflict the legacy of Lemmings upon us all?

Yes indeed. On Valentine's Day 1991, the original game was launched, going on to become the best-selling computer games of all time. There have been sequels aplenty, and it has appeared on every format known to man... kind of. And now we're all geared up for Lemmings 3D on the PlayStation and PC CD ROM. Hoorah for the little blue guys!

Oh yes, that's heading for the PlayStation, if I'm not much mistaken?

Nemesis gives you about four

designers and craftsmen at **Tussauds Studios spent months** purely planning the concept of this creature of hell. The rides themselves are custom built to fit into a chosen theme, then the design team go through a brainstorm process to come up with the ride's own identity. And It's not just the actual ride - the conditions that surround it are extremely important. It's a bit like food - put a bit of parsley on top of cheese on toast and it becomes a delicacy... kind of.

Caroline Elliot, Head of **Design at Tussauds Studios,** explains the process that Nemesis went through to become the awesome

experience that it is now: 'Nemesis is a completely new roller-coaster that was bought for Alton Towers. We

wanted to achieve a whole environment encapsulating what Nemesis was all about. So, we decided that the actual station itself could be the guts of a beast still alive under the ground and the track coming out of it could be the exoskeleton of its body.

'After trying loads of different ideas we came up with this beast that spits you out, with you racing around this bendy, twisty inverted track before you come to rest at the end. Then we worked closely with design engineers to get the right twists and turns in the tracks, how high you can go,

supposed to go etc.

overcars racing round futuristic tracks are becoming a bit of a trend on the super consoles. We're waiting for Wipeout on the PlayStation, we've seen Slipstream 5000 (PC CD ROM) and Air Cars on the Jag. So far, we're not quite sure whether this kind of racing game is quite up to your common racer with tyres. Can Gran Chaser change our minds?

Well, simply stick the CD in and have a gander. The intro is short, but most definitely sweet. **Superbly rendered hovercars** speed down a long Megalopolistype highway, with neon lights slicing through the gloom. This has potential.

There's no doubt that us humans have something to learn about controlling cars that aren't stuck to the ground. Picking up Daytona for the first time is hard enough, but Gran Chaser is a real stinker. For the first few races, there's no doubt you'll be crashing all over the place. How do you take a corner if you have no wheel/tarmac friction to play with? Is there any point in following a driving line as you would in Ridge Racer? These futuristic cars just don't respond in the same way.

Once you get to grips with the controls though, and realise that the shoulder pads give you left and right jet boosts, bit by bit you start driving round the tracks much more smoothly, and this is when the game comes into its own. Essentially, this is when you really decide if it's worth it or not.

There are two choices you must make before you start. You can go through a Story mode where you follow a set pattern of tracks you need to race on, against a growing number of competitors - or a Freestyle mode - where you pick your vehicle and track, and race against time, the computer or another human player via a split-screen (yet again).

The Story mode adds depth to the game if you're playing by yourself. In Ridge Racer, you just have to come first in all the races - and there are some gamesplayers who believe

there's just nothing to go back to once you have completed all the tracks.

In Gran Chaser, you have to come first, but you also need to destroy a range of opponents. Blow them out of sight and out of your mind! You can pick up ammo on the tracks, and then fire them at the other drivers. You can only store five missiles at any one time though, so you have to be bloody sure about your aim if you don't want to waste them.

As you win, you go through the courses which are situated on different planets, and each course has two levels, adding once again to the depth and difficulty of the one-player version of the game.

hills, skulls and a few other objects that look like they are part of the background.

All this interaction with the scenery makes the battle area bigger than those we are used to, and therefore, Sega developed a pan-in pan-out camera mode to fit the whole area when the players move far away from each other.

Now, this is when we have to get negative. The camera zooming is very slow and ropey, and very bad on your eyes. When the characters move there's a mixture of smooth moves and extremely jerky ones, the worst being when you get hit - there are split-second delays while you fall to the ground. Not what you'd expect from our mate the Saturn.

And the one thing that really annoys us is, when you hit

someone, just before K.O.ing them the game pauses, saying "K.O." and then starts again, showing your opponent flying through the air. Aargghh!
