Yes, the people who came to the convention are the people who have that one glowing great attribute—faith—in this industry, in its future—in themselves—to continue onward.



TONY PASTOR ORCH. (Columbia 38383) • Here's a platter that is bound to be played till it's worn white! Following on the heels of his smash success with "It's Like Taking Candy From A Baby," Tony Pastor and his gang, currently hotter than a ten gallon hat, set up with this bit tagged "Grieving For You." Bulk of the credit for this one goes to chirp Rose-mary Clooney, whose piping on this tune is terrific. The gal's smooth, ul-tra-soft treatment of this beautiful tune comes under the heading of a plu-perfect piece of vocal work. Rose-mary's vocal glamour will denitely garner her a ton of attention, and is enough to warrant ops going all out on this hunk of wax. It's slow, warm stuff, the kind you wanna listen to especially when you're snuggled up real close. The smart, plush lyrics of the song make you stop and listen and then come back for more. Take note of the superb musical background furnished by the Pastor crew, and ops really have a winning platter. The flip, "Saturday Night Mood" is another cute piece, with the maestro and the Clooney Sisters joining in. "Grieving For You" will go like sixty -climb on the bandwagon!

"Amelia Cordelia McHugh" (2:56) "Beatin', Bangin' 'N Scratchin' " (2:49) DANNY KAYE-ANDREWS SISTERS (Decca 24536)

(Decca 24536) • Wait'll the younger set of phono fans hear this duo. It's Danny Kaye teamed with the Andrews Sisters to offer ops and music fans throughout the nation a great novelty platter that should keep the boxes spinning hot and heavy. Danny's Scotch brogue on the top deck, "Amelia Cordelia Mc-Hugh" is nothing short of sensational, and should have the kiddies going wild. It's the kind of wax you want to listen to, and then come back for another earful time and again. Take note of the Andrews gal's vocal glam-our here, and ops really have a plat-ter than can set the town afire. The flip, "Beatin', Bangin' 'N Scratchin'" is another boffo platter for Kaye and the Andrews Sisters, and should gar-ner a top spot in the boxes. Top deck will win a ton of coin.

"Why Can't You Behave" (3:17) "No Orchids For My Lady" (2:49) FRANK SINATRA (Columbia 38393)

(Columbia 38393) Balladeer Frank Sinatra in the drivers seat with the faint, smooth strains of "Why Can't You Behave" weaving thru the wax. Ditty, from the hit musical "Kiss Me Kate" is one that should blossom into one of the bigger hits of the season. The ultra slow mood, and fanciful patter de-livered by Frank fits the mood and manner of the tune like a glove. Word-age weaves around the title, with Frak ably backed by the Phil Moore Quartet. It's the kind of Cole Porter music folks wanna listen to—and they will once they hear this disk. On the fip with a strong ballad, Frank bounces back with "No Orchids For My Lady." Ditty is of the sweet kind, replete with hearts-and-flowers lyrics that suit the tune effectively. Orkster Alex Stordahl ably backs Frank throughout. Top deck is the better one—listen in.

10346) rate style throughout. Song flows easily, with the vocal ensemble wailing the infectious lyric in first rate manner. It's the kind of a tune that you take to right off the bat. Light, medium tempo flows throughout the song, with Blue and the boys ably demonstrating some excellent musical fare. It's a brilliant piece of music that should attract a zillion listeners. Ditty will go equally as well with the adult set as well as the young-sters who haven't heard the music before. The tune is one that will easily garner repeat plays by the thousands, and is a cinch to fill ops jeans with silver. The flip, "Powder Your Face With Sun-shine" gets another rousing send-off by Blue and the boys, with the vocal ensemble offering the up tempo lyrics in bright manner throughout. "Cruising Down The River" is a must on your machine -don't hesitate one second! Run out and grab an armful!.

It's smooth stuff on both sides, and is ably suited for the more quiet, inti-mate spots. Top deck is the oldie, and should be fairly well known to music ops. The flip is a cute enough piece rolling around the title throughout. Music ops who have the spots might take note. Pair of sides music ops may get

Top deck, tagged "I'll String Along With You" is the side to ride with. It's an oldie currently getting a tre-mendous push via the Warner Broth-ers flicker "My Dream Is Yours." Ditty is sung as smooth as ice, with Doris and Buddy splitting the vocal chores throughout the waxing. The flip, "Powder Your Face With Sunshine" should be well known at this stage, since it is one of the faster rising phono hits. This rendition should boom juke box play all the more.

"Someone Like You" (2:23) "Why Is It" (2:55) DICK JAMES

DICK JAMES (London 384) The vocal splendor of piper Dick James is ably displayed on this duo titled "Someone Like You" and "Why Is It." Both tunes are currently caus-ing loads of excitement in the music trade and should be among ops most requested platters in the near future. Dick's smooth ballading is pleasant enough throughout and should meet with fair enough reaction. The top deck is the tune that should stir up all the excitement. It's a cute uplift ditty, with ork backing by the Felix King boys rounding out the side. Ops might listen in.

"Don't Take My Word" (2:17) "They Kissed" (1:55) DEL CASINO ORCH.

DEL CASINO ORCH. (Rainbow 10077) Make no mistake about this one! It's gonna be one of the hottest pieces of wax music ops will find in their phonos. A sure fire winner if there ever was one is this bit by Del Casino and The Larks tagged "Don't Take My Word." It's an up tempo ditty, dressed up with loads of stuff that makes for coin winners. The bounce rhythm displayed here, along with the vocal chorus and the hand clap all go toward making this piece a hot num-ber for the boxes. Ditty makes you listen—and then want to get out and dance, hum and whistle. Take note of the vocal work offered here and ops have another reason for latching on to this hunk of wax. The flip shows as another potential winner, altho it lacks the drive of the top deck. "Don't Take My Word" will score— get with it.

"Mademoiselle Hortensia" (2:41) "Little Chinese Girl-Polka" (2:44)

"Little Chinese Girl-Polka" (2:44) BILL HARRINGTON JOE CRICHIO ORCH. (Dana 2036) Ditty loaded with coin culling po-tential is this offering by Bill Har-rington titled "Mademoiselle Horten-sia." The song itself is undoubtedly one of the most requested across the pond. This rendition should boost its value immensely, and start the ball rolling here. Song flows easily in mellow tempo, with Bill's pipes flavor-ing the melody with a ton of spark-ling lyrics. It's the kind of music you want to dance and sing along with, and a platter that rates a spot in your machine. The flip is just what the title indicates, a cute enough polka dressed up in light, pleasant style. Top deck and "Mademoiselle Hortensia" for the moola!

"I'm A Lonely Little Petunia" (3:14) "Little Guy" (3:20) ARTHUR GODREY (Columbia 38390)
The widely popular Arthur God-trey and a pair of sides that appear to be headed for top spots in the na-tions juke boxes are headed ops way. Titled, "I'm A Lonely Little Petunia" and "Little Guy," Godfrey displays his vocal growl in pleasant vein to score with this duo. Top deck should be familiar to most ops, since the tune was a big winner not so many moons ago. Godfrey's rendition of this cute novelty ditty is plu-perfect and should be enough to boost it over the top. It's slow stuff, replete with fond lyrics that make you listen. The flip, a bit of a lullaby in ultra slow tempo is a repeat winning disk for Godfrey. You've gotta listen to this platter to really appreciate it—and that is just what we recomnend. Get with it!

"It's Easy To Remember" (3:00) "Once Upon A Wintertime" (2:50) VERA LYNN (London 374)

• Chirp Vera Lynn on deck with a pair that beat fairly attractive, with the top deck "It's Easy To Remem-ber" hogging the limelight. Vera's high pitch is shown to best advantage on this tune, a soft ballad dressed up with loads of pleasant music. It's a tune that should sit well with Vera's many fans, and should meet with best reaction in those quiet, intimate din-ing spots. Ditty won't stop traffic by any means, but will hold its own. The flip parrots the title throughout, with Vera in the spotlight once again. Ork backing on the pair by the Bob Far-non gang is there for the asking. Ops who have the room might listen in.

"Let A Smile Be Your Umbrella" (2:33)"More Beer!" (2:40)

THE ANDREWS SISTERS (Decca 24548)

(Decca 24548) • The Andrews Sisters offer a plat-ter here that ops are sure to sit up and take notice of. It's a double win-mer for the gals as they give out with "Let A Smile Be Your Umbrella" and "More Beer!" Top deck has the vocal combo purring alongside of some smart up tempo rhythm, with top notch left-hand piano adding to the luster of this tune. It's one that is as catchy as the mumps, with the gal's vocal work shining brightly. The flip, a tune that is currently kicking up a storm in many a box, gets a rousing sendoff by the girls and should garner some heavy play. Vic Shoen's boys offer some first rate instrumental work throughout the pair to add to the winning incentive. Ops should get this hunk of wax.



CHICAGO—Caught during the 1949 Annual Coin Machine Industries Convention, here in Chicago this past week were many of the industry's top recording company executives, music publishers and disk distributors. The general consensus of opinion of those at the show was that the business out-look for the year abead appeared exlook for the year ahead appeared ex-cellent, with many diskers and dis-tribs predicting that 1949 would be the best year ever.

The topic of wide discussion at the show was concerned with the new

music systems recently introduced to the industry by RCA Victor and Col-umbia Records. Altho the subject drew wide comment throughout the show, music operators completely dis-regarded the new systems as being feasible with their operational plans for the coming year. Music operators were quick to note the absence of Columbia Records, the only one of the major platteries who did not have any of its representatives at the Convention. 

Bally Ships Meters

CHICAGO — Bally Manufacturing Company, this city, began shipments of its Bally Volt and Ohm Meters this week, after a slight delay due to a last minute change in certain specifications in the manufacture of the equipment.

The meters are specially made for trouble-shooting coin games, and the firm reports that operators from 42 out of the 48 states, Canada and Alaska have ordered them. Bally is selling them at cost.

Kentucky Levies Tax On Location Television

NEW YORK—With television becoming an important phase of the coin operating industry, coinmen are watching developments in the efforts of various cities and states to hang a tax on taverns using this type of equipment.

Pennsylvania was the first state to inaugurate a tax based on the right of the state to require tavern owners to pay for an amusement permit if television is used on the premises. The city of Philadelphia used this decision as an impetus for its own tax measure. According to W. Frank Marshall, receiver of taxes, the City Council of Philadelphia voted to begin collecting taxes after January 1.

This tax was voted quickly following the State's action, according to Emmett McGinn, executive secretary of the Philadelphia Retail Liquor Dealers Association, and the group was not allowed time to protest the action. However, they will continue to fight the measure.

Now the state of Kentucky is levying a 25% admission tax on tavern owners who show tele broadcasts. The Bureau of Internal Revenue, however, is keeping hands off. It is understood that the Bureau takes the position that television is not entertainment, not at least, under applicable Regulations. The Bureau apparently takes the position that television is in the nature of radio, and therefore, a non-taxable amusement.

Big Field Opens For Expert Shuffleboard Service Men

NEW YORK—One of the biggest and most lucrative fields now opening for servicemen in the coin field is that of servicing shuffleboards now on locations thruout the nation. For many years this has proved extremely profitable to service men in this area and some are servicing the same boards for over twelve years.

As is well known to all who understand woods of various types, regardless of how well shuffleboard is constructed, transport alone effects the playing field.

The playing field (most important part of the shuffleboard) traveling thru the icy winter areas naturally sweats and, when placed in a warm location, the "breathing" of the wood instantly shows up.

The same is true of any board placed on location, regardless of the fact that the very finest dry kilned wood may have been used. The head of the board may be near the door, which is constantly being opened, and the bottom end of the board up against a steaming radiator. Overnight there will be sweat on the board and this prevents perfect play.

Service men for shuffleboards should have a very expert understanding of various woods and woodwork generally. Cabinet makers have been found to be the best service men in the case of shuffleboards.

These men go right to the location with electric sanders and sand down the top of the playing field first. They then clean the board, wax and polish it and return the surface to best playing condition. But the board will continue to "breathe" and this requires at least continued service for the period of a year and even longer.

As the shuffleboards begin to spread thruout the country and players become ever more expert at the game they constantly seek for finer playing surfaces.

This means that the operator who does not take proper care of the playing surface of his board will continue to lose play and the location owner will soon find his patrons going somewhere else where the board is given expert servicing.

Electric sanders of large size to handle and sand down the 22-foot playing surfaces can be purchased in any city. But while sanding there must also be an understanding of a level playing field.

The cleaner and waxing process and then the polishing process, which can be done by the new electric polishers, is also the duty of an expert.

Cabinet makers, knowing what is required of such surfaces, have returned these into highly polished glass-smooth playing fields during servicing.

In the eastern market such service men have been able to earn good money going from location to location and charging a service fee to service boards once per week.

With some spots featuring six, eight and more shuffleboards, it is understandable that this field is one of the largest and most lucrative for well trained service men.

ous action, were Aireon's regional managers. Those seen were Clayton Ballard, Ken Willis, Dan Brennan and Bill Roberts.







Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
