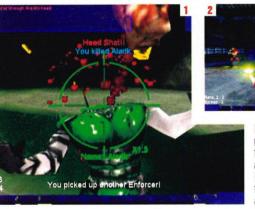
Add Injury To Assault

As the game's plot unfolds it emerges that the root of the problem lies at the feet of the enigmatic Dr Kirk (an AWOL government scientist) who has developed a mysterious new power source known as the third energy.

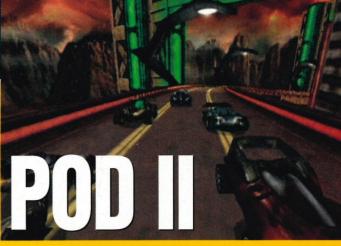
The successful completion of the mission will require you to find the missing doctor and obtain research notes detailing the production of the third energy. In gameplay terms the title plays in a similar fashion to Resident Evil Code: Veronica, although being a port from a 32-bit system the game currently lacks the finesse of Capcom's Dreamcast survival horror masterpiece. With that said, all of the staple elements of



this genre are present and correct, although the living dead have obviously been replaced by flesh-eating dinosaurs. Unlike the Resident Evil games, Dino Crisis places more emphasis on puzzle solving and in contrast to the statue pushing antics of the RE series, Dino Crisis' puzzles require the player to fully engage their grey matter. Unfortunately, this conversion is looking somewhat uninspired and with the exception of the Dreamcast's higher resolution visuals, there's little to differentiate this from its PlayStation brethren. Fingers crossed that the game will offer suitably enhanced graphics and gameplay when it hits the UK later this year. We'll keep you posted.

Before now, the benchmark for multiplayer split-screen first-personshooters was the legendary GoldenEye (and more recently Perfect Dark) and that's on the miserly N64. Now if you thought that was pretty ace (and yes, we know it's ace, Simon) then you're going to be totally awestruck by what Quake III has to offer. All the action, all the gameplay and double the graphical quality. You'd better believe it cos you're going to be blown away one way or another.

Earthquake

Although there are a whole bunch of new levels in the game (see boxout) there are plenty from the PC in there too, although they have been condensed slightly due to the Dreamcast's restricted capabilities in that respect. The effect of this, along with the fact that there will only be a maximum of four players at any one time, has meant that there is a slight change in emphasis in the gameplay. Where before you could happily 'camp' in one place and bomb a doorway knowing that soon enough some unfortunate soul would walk straight into the trap, in the

DC version such underhand tactics simply won't pay off. In other words the style of gameplay has been refined, with more of an emphasis on stealth and strategy rather than blind hope... which can only be a good thing.

However, if you're worried that all this has compromised the rest of the game then cast those fears aside as everything else from the PC version is still firmly in tact. As well as the main attraction, that of fragging sevens bells out of anyone who's stupid enough to get in your way, there's also several other games to play (online or otherwise), namely 'Tournament', 'King> There aren't many games that can boast four different types of control system but that's exactly what Quake III DC does. Not only can you use the standard Dreamcast controller, you can also use the keyboard and mouse, the Mad Catz Panther peripheral and finally, you can combine the DC controller with the mouse and keyboard. Now that's what you call a choice.

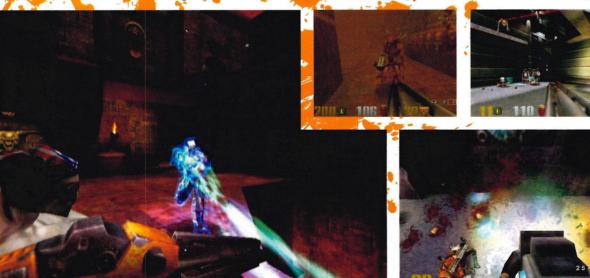

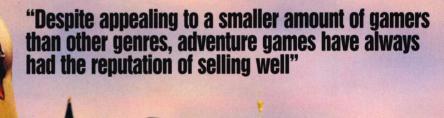

f all the types of videogames out there today, the genre that has gained the most recognition as of late has to be that of the RPG. RPGs (or Role-Playing Games as they're usually known by people who want to be picky) are one of the more involving genres of videogames, simply because they're the kind of game that can't be finished in five minutes flat. Generally, you can tell if a game is an RPG just from a simple checklist of things – if there's a sword-wielding, magic-using hero (usually a young person), an innocent group of

people in need of help and a terrible evil plaguing the land, then you've probably got an RPG on your hands. You lucky fellow, you...

I Sense Much Good In You

Despite appealing to a smaller amount of gamers than other genres, adventure games have always had the reputation of selling well. Thanks to the recent popularity of 'huge' titles like Final Fantasy VII and VIII, Zelda: The Ocarina Of Time and the Resident Evil series though, the RPG genre has been blown wide open and become so much more than just a niche market thing. But why are they so popular? It's probably because they're so much more than just games whereas regular videogames offer escapism at the basic level, an RPG (with its unique blend of characters, locations and story line) allows you to actually become part of the tale... much like like

Skies Of Arcadia

The Story: It's the age of navigation and exploration - people in the land of Arcadia (floating high in the sky, strangely enough) have started to get itchy feet and set out to discover what lies on the other side of the horizon. Of course, with adventure comes danger; behind the clouds lurk the dreaded Sky Pirates, ready to steal the treasure of any would-be prey.

These pirates are split into two groups - the Black Sky and the Blue Rogue. Merciless to the core, the Black Sky will steal from anyone they can overpower while the Blue Rogue are the Robin Hoods of the sky; they rob from the rich and give to the poor. Taking control of Vyse, a young member of the Blue Rogue, we follow the travels of his fellow pirates as they attempt to survive, explore new lands and try to settle some old scores with the evil Valuan Empire...

First Impressions: Having recently settled down with a mug of hot cocoa and a preview copy of the game, we can safely say that Skies Of Arcadia is a sure-fire winner in every department. For starters, the game has some of the most beautiful visual effects we've experienced in an RPG – as you can tell from the

screenshots dotted around this page, it certainly looks mighty fine. Each town offers its own distinct atmosphere (with a musical score to match) and looking towards the horizon allows you to see where you could be heading next, way off in the distance.

As for the game itself, it's nice to see a good mixture of both old-school RPG stylings (weapons, magic and monsters like you'd never believe) and up-to-date additions that weren't previously possible - the ability to explore any area in full 3D or go wherever you fancy via your airship, effectively handling the story in any way you want, is something pretty special. The added fact that airships can do battle, leading to the need for repair and weapons improvement is something we haven't seen before either...

Not surprisingly for a Sega game, though, it's the story line that really draws you in, with its collection of intriguing characters and stunning locations. We've only just begun to scratch the surface of the game and already we find ourselves desperate to find out what happens next. Needless to say, by the time the need for a PAL review comes round, we'll be completely clued up on the goings on in Arcadia. Really, we will.





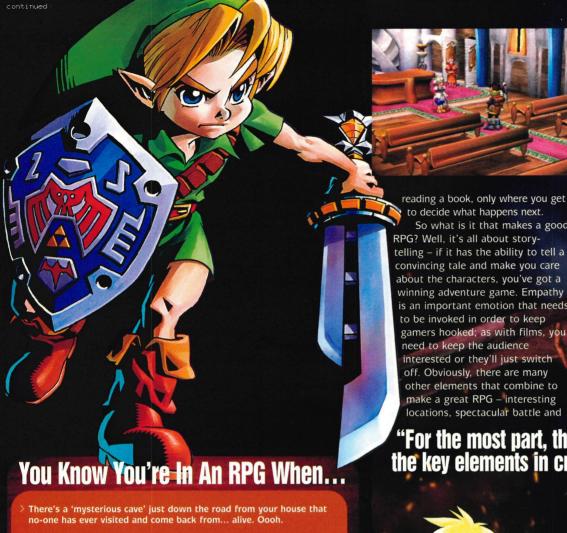

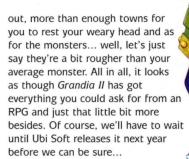

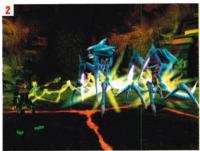

While online RPG play has long since been the lot of the PC gamer, for example, console owners are only just about to experience what it's like - cross console-style RPG with a PC-style MUD and you get a massive multiplayer game like no other on any home console. One of the most anticipated games in the Dreamcast's line-up finally hits the shelves. It's got to be good... hasn't it?



Several years back, Valve Software Several years out.,

brought a game to the PC that merged what was then an unbelievably high level of artificial intelligence with an engrossing story line, and slipped it all effortlessly into a first person shoot-'emup skin. The game was touted as being 'better than GoldenEye' and 'the new benchmark in enemy Al'. To this day it remains one of the most played online games - new patches are still being churned out at an alarming rate, for goodness sake.

This game was GOOD. This game was Half-Life, and PC loyalists everywhere used it as their secret weapon in the then-fashionable PC Vs console wars. Ever since the Dreamcast was launched, there were rumours flying around of a

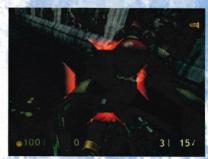
Half-Life conversion. Sega fans around the world couldn't believe their ears when Valve announced that it would be making it even better for Dreamcast! Quite a highly-anticipated game, wouldn't you say? Well, it's finally here - and do we really need to even review it? After all, it's got to be a sure-fire hit, right?



Half-Life finds you playing the part of Gordon Freeman, a research scientist in a top-secret military research facility. Things go a bit wrong when one of the experiments creates an inter-dimensional rip, letting in all sorts of nasty creatures. As one of the few survivors, it's your job to sort it all out. You'll come across a variety of enemies, all superbly detailed

and beautifully modelled - the marines, for example, come to mind straight away, with their facemasks and attachments all present and correct.

Despite the memory differences between a PC and a Dreamcast, the enemy AI has been ported over perfectly. The marines work in close-knit groups, advancing and retreating as you would expect them to, whereas the aliens simply lunge at you until they've been taken out. Admittedly there are occasions when you can walk up to a marine, wave at him and call his mum an old cow without him even blinking, but it becomes something to look forward to rather than something that detracts from the game.

The sound effects in the original were one of the aspects that made the PC version so cool. The same can be said for this version - the sound effects are crisp and the screams will send a shiver down your spine.

Half-Eaten

Let's face it - a fair number of us love a bit of gore in our games and Half-Life, being a game with a nice little arsenal of weapons, doesn't disappoint. Everybody in the game, be they human, alien, alive or dead, can be blown to pieces. For

A gunfight in an enclosed room will almost certainly result in the walls being sprayed with blood, which will stay there throughout the level. It's all extremely satisfying to say the least.

Half-Done

So, what could possibly be wrong with this game? The graphics and sound are spot on - the Dreamcast could handle any other technicalities with its eyes closed, right? Sadly, one of the most important aspects of the game (namely the frame rate) is amongst the worst that we've ever seen. This isn't a case of the hardware limitations, as the problem is so varied that it can only be a case of bad programming. You can walk down a corridor with no enemies in it and have the screen updating at 60fps, only to

walk down the next corridor (still with no enemies) and have the frame rate drop to around 20fps... aargh! With a game such as this, where you have to be able to aim accurately, a constant frame rate is a must. If the game ran at a constant 30fps it would be fine. but dropping from 60 to below 30 and sometimes as low as 3fps (what?) makes it near unplayable in some areas. Most of the time the game runs smoothly, but the occasions where it doesn't really ruin things. And we won't even start on the fact that every couple of rooms you'll have to face a

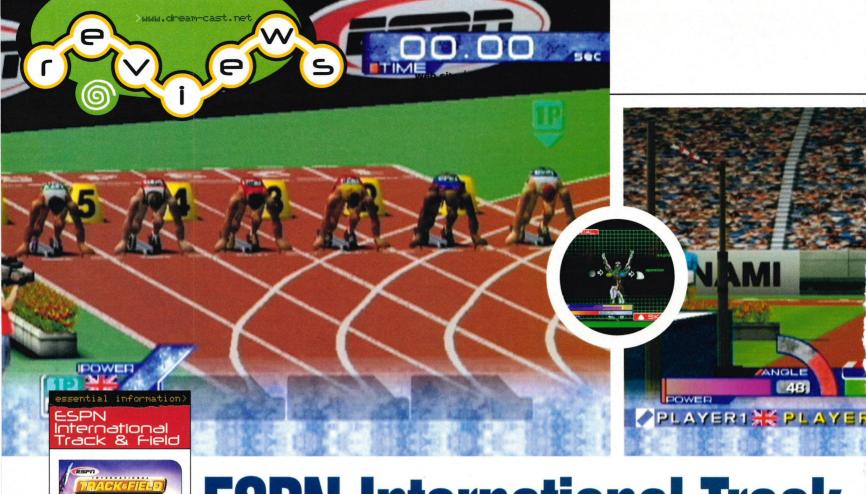

The king of the athletics game is back with its first Dreamcast title. So, gold for Konami then? Don't count on it. folks...

• Mmm, the Olympics. Don't you

• just love them? Getting to watch a bunch of sportsmen (and women) attempt to win some bits of valuable metal on string... brings a tear to our eyes, we can tell you. Of course, every extremely rare sporting event brings along a selection of videogames based upon it and the goings-on in Sydney are no exception. We've seen Virtua Athlete 2K, we've played the rather obviously-titled Sydney 2000 and now (trailing behind slightly after everyone has stopped caring about the Olympics), we've got another.

The third game to try and take the mantle of 'Best Dreamcast Athletics Game' in as many months, ESPN International Track And Field comes to our beloved console with high hopes behind it - after all, the whole buttonbashing athletics phenomenon was started by the original Track And Field all those years ago. It has to be said that Konami's first offering of the game to the Dreamcast has (on paper) the potential to kick proverbial arse. Consisting of a pretty healthy selection of twelve events including the obligatory 100m dash, long jump and javelin, plus more special ones like the horizontal bar, weight lifting and trap shooting - as well as the usual mix of single and multiplayer shenanigans, you'd have thought that Dreamcast Track And Field would be a sure-fire hit. Ahh, if only that was the case.

Clean And Jerk-Off

As seems to be the case more and more often now, we're just not happy bunnies when playing Track And Field. It might

be because of the graphics - considering the amount of detail shown by sports games like Virtua Tennis and Tony Hawk's, it's embarrassing that the standard in Track And Field is considered passable. The athletes aren't that dodgy, but the track looks completely barren and the crowd... well, the less said about them the better. The selection of events is also slightly worrying although Konami has shot itself in the foot anyway by limiting itself to events from just the track and field categories, the fact that the same old events as other athletics games are present still nags our originality bone constantly.

Of all the things that annoy us about Track And Field though, the biggest problem has to be that Konami doesn't appear to have put any effort into bringing the game to the Dreamcast whatsoever. Why do we say that? Well, try comparing the slightly dodgy graphics, number of events and overall look and feel of the Dreamcast version-

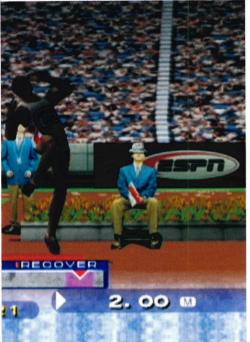

The premise is simple – split into 25 different chapters, there are ten races in each one for you to complete... yep, that's 250 separate races for those of you who aren't so hot at maths. Every time you successfully finish the challenges in a chapter, you'll receive a new car to add to your garage, although more can be earned through various 'special' races during each chapter... there are over 50 cars in total, so you'll be here for a while. Don't think for a second that you'll just be speeding round and beating other cars, though - there are a large number of tasks to perform ranging from basic Hot Laps (your average lap time has to be lower than the target) and Timed Runs (complete three laps in a set time) to One-On-One sprints and even full-blown Championship competitions. But even all this is just the tip of the iceberg...

Kudos To You. Fella

You see, being a success in M-SR is all about Kudos - by driving particularly well,



performing hair-raising handbrake turns and avoiding collisions with obstacles and other cars, you'll be awarded valuable Kudos points. While you'll need a rather large amount of Kudos before being allowed to move onto the next chapter, it's not always easy to earn; pulling off handbrake turns through each corner in order to build up Style points often results in a reduction in Skill points and vice versa. Thankfully, you can earn Jokers that can be bet on each challenge - win and you'll double the number of points earned instantly but if you lose... well, your score won't be looking too healthy afterwards.

Still, with the whole game focused on customising everything to your own tastes (check out the 'Attention To Detail' section for more information on that) you'll be pleased to hear that you can up your Kudos level by tweaking the challenges to suit your abilities. Sure, the game offers basic goals that need to be met before each one is complete but usually, even a trained baboon (or Simon at a push) can make





those with little trouble. To top up your Kudos, you'll need to make things a bit tougher for yourself and that's where the adjustable goals come into play. For example, while you might be set a basic limit of 35 seconds for a lap around St James' Park, your superior driving skills can easily shave a good 15 seconds off that. The answer? Lower the limit, sprint round the track in double quick time and earn yourself a whole bag of Kudos into the bargain. Like we said, a fantastic idea.

The Car's The Star

Quite shockingly (and after much extensive playing time) we're pretty sure that there's virtually nothing wrong with M-SR because in trying to deliver the best pure racing game on the Dreamcast, it's gone and done just that. It's easy enough for the casual gamer to get into without being discouraged and yet offers enough challenge and skill for hardcore driving nuts to love it to pieces. If there was one complaint, it would be that despite allowing you to customise your car how you like it. you can't actually fiddle with the car itself - however, if the difference between winning or losing was shortening your rear axles by half an inch, non-fanatics would switch off immediately so it can only be a good thing in the end. Face the fact; you might have had to wait ages for it to arrive and had all your PlayStation-loving friends point and laugh at you, but now it's time to turn the tables. Buy *M-SR*, sit them down in front of it and then tell them to go and shove Ridge Racer V up their arses. You know it makes sense.

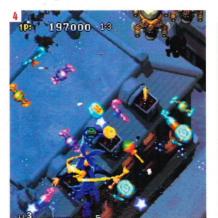

The game looks like one as well, because although the graphics aren't what you would call bad, they're extremely chunky and could have used more than a little polishing. The sound effects, too, could

have been improved, and although they don't grate on your senses, they do leave much to be desired.

In My Day...

When a game has a sub-standard singleplayer game, it can normally fall back on its multiplayer mode but sadly, Gunbird 2

fails to deliver anything resembling an entertaining two-player

game. In fact, the most fun you can get from the twoplayer mode is when the monotony of the game grinds you down and memories of childhood arcade experiences starring you, a friend, 1942 and a bag of twenty-pence pieces come

flooding back. However, memories do not maketh the game and pretty soon, multiplayer fun will involve yourself and your friend thinking up amusing things to do with the GD-ROM to alleviate the boredom. Despite feeble attempts, this game fails to deliver in almost all departments because it is out-dated, outgunned and doesn't take advantage of the considerable powers that the Dreamcast offers. There are three different routes now. The first is to go up the double stairway, the second is to jump onto the roof via the car and the third is to skate through the shops and jump across the gap. All three routes will take you up



where the spray areas are. Find the large wall first - this takes the longest to do, so get it out of the way. The rest are very easy to find - they're on the walls in this section. After a while, the chief will arrive with a group of police dogs. They shouldn't cause much trouble as long as you keep moving. Towards the end, a police helicopter complete with missiles will attack you! By this point you should almost be finished but if the chopper gives you hassle, just jump up at the windshield and give it a good spraying. Now just get the job done and get out of there!







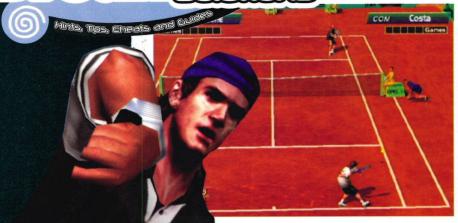

The Secrets

If you're like us, you won't be able to stop playing Virtua Tennis, but that doesn't mean you'll have found all the secrets. Here's how to get the hidden characters and costumes.

Play As Master

Ever wanted to play as the coach who stands at the other end of the court during the Training modes of the World Circuit? Well, now you can. To access Master, you've got to play through Arcade mode without losing a single game and finish the final round to become the champion. Once you've done that, you'll be challenged to a match by Master. If you can beat him, you'll be able to select him as a regular player. The easiest



way to win is to set the match length to a single game however, the difficulty has to be at least Normal or you won't get to play against him.

Play As King

To be able to play as the other secret tennis star. known as King, you need to complete one of two specific tasks. You can either play through World Circuit mode and complete EVERYTHING (all the Training modes and

Trial matches on the highest levels) to unlock him, or you can beat him and the Master (after unlocking him - see above) at Doubles in Arcade mode without losing a game.



Access Special Costumes

There are several secret costumes hidden through the World Circuit mode that can't be bought through the normal shops - to get these, you'll have to do exceptionally well at the various Training modes. Depending on which one you're playing, you'll have to do certain tasks; for example, if there's a time limit then you'll need to complete the training with more than ten seconds left on the clock. The bowling training game

requires you to get a perfect score (so you need to get seven strikes in a row) while the Return Ace and target games require a certain score - usually above 4,000pts - to get the costume.

Ball Skills General Tips

When playing Virtua Tennis, you have to approach it just like you would a real tennis match, so similar skills and tactics should be employed. Always try to second-guess your opponent and mix up your play as much as possible. If you use the same tactics all the time, opponents will figure out your game and exploit its weaknesses before long, so always be one step ahead.

Serving & Aces

The secret to becoming a great server doesn't lie with just being able to hit it as hard as possible, but also in mixing your serves up. Use the baseline to vary your angle as well as the angle that you put on the ball as you serve. It's also worthwhile mixing up the speed of your serve to keep your opponent on their toes. Try not to use the lob serve too much, as it's a bit rubbish really.





Underarm Serve

To perform the underarm serve just like the Master, press A + X + ∜ while at near court; or if you're at the far end, press A + X + ∜. Use it sparingly and you'll have your opponents fooled!



Volleying

The secret to good volleying is getting to the net first, and having quick reactions and good placement. It can prove dangerous as you're susceptible to the lob, but if you remember this and be on your guard, you'll



this and be on your guard, you'll become a top-class player.



Power Shots

The way to make a shot powerful is to ensure that you get to the ball early, thus giving yourself plenty of time to play the shot. The more time you have pressing the A button, the more powerful the shot.



Lobs

Use the lob sparingly when playing against CPU players, as they'll normally get to it. Against human opponents it's a great shot to play every now and again, as it'll totally fool them if you play it at the gight time.



it at the right time, leaving them stuck to the spot – not to mention fuming.

Topspin Shots

To play a topspin shot which will make the ball rush through and not bounce very much, make sure you have plenty of time to play the shot and press forward on the stick/pad.



Smashing

This is all about timing – and when you get it right, there'll be no stopping you. When your opponent lobs you, try to get right underneath it: the longer you spend building up the shot, the more powerful it will be.



You need to be in the front half of the court to smash successfully – if you try it from the back, more often than not you'll hit the net.



Drop Shots

Like the topspin shot, make sure you have plenty of time to play the shot and then pull back on the stick/pad, thus making the ball drop near the front of the court, not bouncing much.

Deadly if combined with lob shots







Doubles

When playing doubles, make sure that you stay to your half of the court and don't poach your partner's shots – it'll leave big empty spaces and you'll get thrashed. When playing with a CPU partner, you can press the Left Trigger button to determine where he plays – baseline, front court or normal – depending on your own style of play.

The World Circuit Challenges

Within the 'World Circuit' there are eight different challenges which will help you improve all areas of your game. They will also help you earn loads of money to buy the bonus characters, their outfits and the bonus courts. Each challenge has four stages, although only three of these are revealed, the fourth being an extra level which will unlock eight 'special' outfits. When you have completed the three levels, a silver statue will appear; and when you have completed the fourth level, it'll be a gold statue

Giant Ball

Bonus Shirt: Flaming shirt and racquet

In this challenge you have to hit a number of giant balls (from three to six) off the court using powerful shots in a limited amount of time. The



best way to do it is to stay at the back of the court and hit strong shots at the balls, concentrating on one at a time. The most annoying thing about this challenge is that the balls always roll forward – frustrating but practice will make perfect. To get the bonus outfit, you need to complete the challenge before the timer turns red.

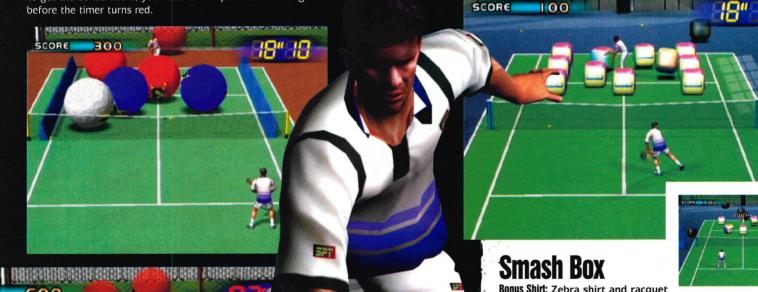
Cannon Ball

Bonus Shirt: Camouflage shirt and radio racquet

The aim of this challenge is to hit the ball-firing machines (from three to six) with the yellow balls, while avoiding the red ones, within a set time limit. If a red one hits you, a machine that has turned off will restart. This challenge is all about accuracy, so stay near the back of the court and give yourself time to aim your shots - it also gives you a greater chance of dodging the red balls. The bonus outfit will become available if you finish the challenge before the timer turns red.

Bonus Shirt: Zebra shirt and racquet

This challenge will test your smashing skills to the limit as you have to knock a set of boxes off the court. Starting with nine and going up to 15, the time limit is exceptionally tight (you need 15 seconds left on the clock for the bonus shirt) so you have to make sure that every ball is hit and is on target.

Bonus Shirt: Giraffe shirt and racquet

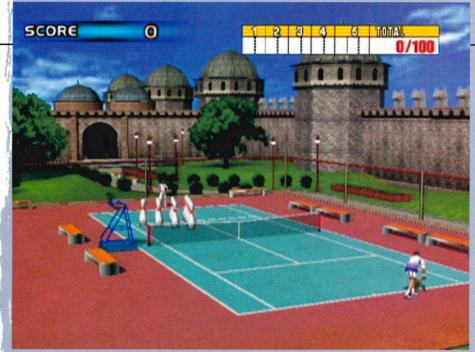
The 'Drum Shooter' challenge tests your lobbing skills as you have to lob the balls into the drums located around the court. The first two levels are



relatively simple as there's plenty of time and the drums are all in a row. However, their numbers increase and their alignment is changed too so you have to move forward and back to hit them. Start at the back and get the wide ones first before moving forward, but never getting too close, to get the more central ones. You need to hit every ball straight into the drums to get the bonus outfit.







Pin Crasher

Bonus Shirt: Bowling shirt and bowling pin racquet

Virtua Tennis's very own Crazy Bowling is probably the hardest of the challenges, but it'll improve your serve no end. Bowling rules apply as you need to knock down a set number of pins to progress to the next level. You need all strikes to get the bonus shirt. To complete this challenge, always remain in the same place, using the stick/pad to subtly change the angle of the ball. The lob serve works pretty well for this too as it gives more curve, but you don't need to be on full power to win.





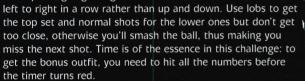

Return Ace

Bonus Shirt: Chinese shirt and wok racquet

This challenge will test your returnof-serve skills; accuracy is the key to success here. To start with, there are only nine boxes in the court, but this number climbs to 15 for level 3. You get ten balls each time, but if you want to get the bonus outfit you need to knock all 15 off with two balls. The best way to do this is to hit the balls from as wide as possible, thus giving you the angle to knock off



the maximum number of boxes in a row. Remember, you don't need to hit every box with the ball - boxes that knock each other will count as well. Do the same again from the other side and hopefully you'll be able to clear the lot.

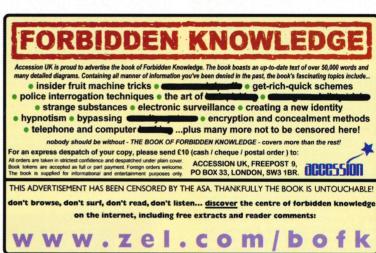
