On Friday 31 July, in a gripping final, the one and only Danny Curley was unceremoniously dumped from his European Sega Champion throne by 20-year-old Reza Abdolali from Germany. The games were held all over Europe, but the final was staged at the exclusive Kensington Roof Gardens, London.

Nine of Europe's best Sega gamers flew in to slug it out, and fought their way through five of the most popular Sega titles: Sonic the Hedgehog, Road Rash, Moonwalker, Olympic Gold and Green Dog: The Beached Surfer Dude, an as yet unseen game, which was played for the first time at the challenge. Compering the contest were the dubious talents of Children's ITV presenter Andy "hairspray-o-rama" Crane and Julian "Newsfield boy" Clary. Also there were Chris Kelly and Chris Smith from top US rap group Kriss Kross.

Reza's prize for winning was the first official European Sega Mega-CD, a special trophy, a Sega baseball jacket and a bundle of Michael Jackson goodies. A Sega-customised stretch limousine then took all of the finalists to the Michael Jackson gig at Wembley, where they sat in VIP grandstand seats to watch the man strut his stuff!

You'd think that'd be enough, but no! The very next day, they all jumped on a jet aeroplane and stayed for a once-in-a-lifetime weekend at the Barcelona Olympics. Wow!

This pop-tabulous wall mural (and many others!) were painted by the supremely-talented Lisa Leslie, as part of an Urban Regeneration Project in the Rathcoole Housing Estate in sunny Belfast! Her original ideas were rejected by the residents as being "too weird!" (but what do they know about art?), so Lisa (just 20 years old) then came up with the idea of Mega Drive characters.

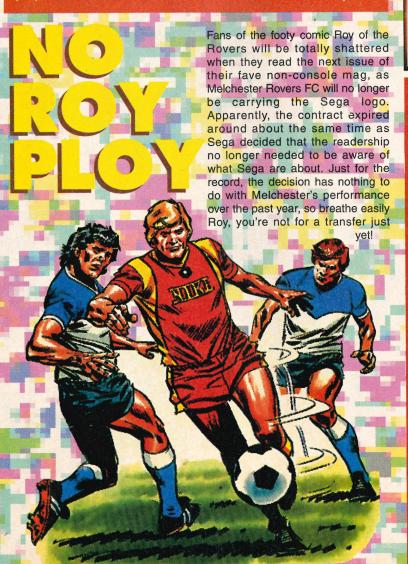

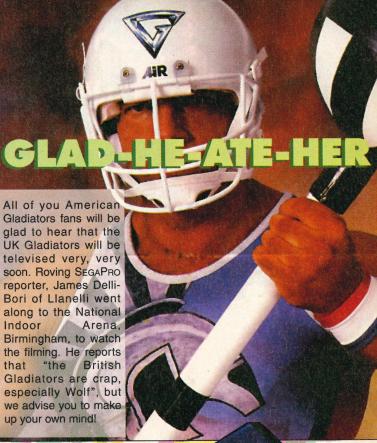

Officially endorsed by Sega (unlike Datel's Action Replay series), the Game Genie is not completely unprogrammable as we indicated. In fact, you can actually make up your own codes by fiddling about with existent codes or even just taking pot luck and plugging in any old combination of letters and numbers. Hornby Hobbies inform us that they have had plenty of people sending in their own codes, made up just from messing about with the device. You should remember, however, that the Game Genie is not intelligent in that it searches for the codes for you; finding the codes is left down to you, not the device - which sort of adds to the fun, doesn't it? Anyway, Hornby Hobbies have thousands of codes to get you started, so getting hold of codes should be no problem whatsoever.

The quarterly magazine that we mentioned is only available in the States, and in lieu of this, Hornby have set up the Game Genie Helpline which will give you new codes directly down the phone. Far from being just an inquiries desk for budding hackers, Hornby are offering free games in return for new codes that are supplied to the Helpline via the auspicious pages of SegaPro. As long as the codes are original – they need not be simply a cheat for a game, but can be anything that has a weird or wacky effect – you stand a chance of being chosen as the winner of the monthly cart. So get hacking, all you Game Genies!

The officially endorsed Game Genie for the Mega Drive should be on the shelves this November, priced £44.99.

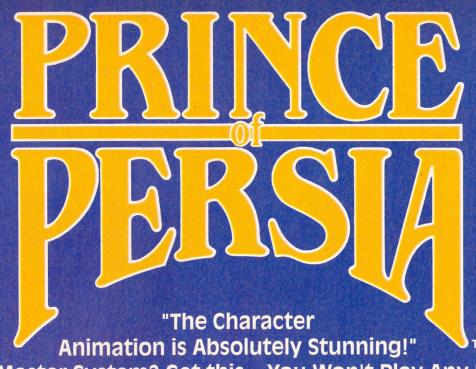

Sonic The Hedgehog Sega Mains Adaptor

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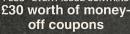
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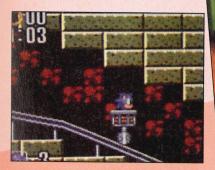
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HERE COMES TAILS!

The name is Sonic. The job is world-wide promotion of Sega. Success rate: 100%.

Since his introduction just 12 months ago (yeah, only a year ago!), Sonic has become the single most successful console character ever! Forget Mario, he's been around for aeons and still hasn't got the street cred of our Sonic.

Just to put things in perspective, can you remember the days without Sonic? Pretty boring, weren't they? The only characters Sega had were Alex Kidd, Wonder Boy and Joe Mushashi; none of

whom you could really relate to. Software on the whole was quite conservative, with no-one really pushing any of the machines to the limit. Hardware sales were fairly modest

too, with Sega only beating Nintendo in Europe.

Then along came a cheeky blue hedgehog. Sales soared everywhere, and so did the quality of software. As soon as *Sonic* was released, along came the likes of *Donald Duck, Kid Chameleon, The Immortal*; when programmers saw the three Sega versions of *Sonic*, they knew that this was only the beginning.

Rumours of Sonic 2 started just months after the original was released. What would it be called? How could it be improved? When would it be released? What would be in it? Now we'll try to answer your questions...

First things first. The Mega Drive version of *Sonic the Hedgehog 2* will be simultaneously released worldwide on **Tuesday 24 November 1992**. The Master System and Game Gear conversions are also being developed at this time, although it is still unclear whether the programmers will be able to get them finished in time for November. As happened with the original *Sonic*, it is likely they will follow around Christmas or even early 1993.

The development is mostly taking place in Japan, with nearly all of the original team working on it. Recently they popped over to America to join forces with Sega's top American programmers, and also to get another perspective from an English-speaking country.

While it's too early to tell what will definitely be in the finished game, we have found out a few of the new items that the programmers have already implemented with a view to using in the finished version.

Primarily, there's the introduction of a two-tailed fox called, conveniently, Tails. Apparently, this cute little kid is just four years old (?), which makes Sonic a real old man at (apparently) 16 years old! We guess,

friend, the Doctor, who is planting death-eggs through time. While some felt *Sonic* was a bit short, they'll be no danger of this in *Sonic 2*. The original game was only 4Mbits, but the sequel is planned to pack out a big 8Mbit cart. Which means more graphics, more sound and more gameplay!

Gameplay is one area where the programmers have spent a lot of time, and are currently trying out many new elements. First off, there'll be a new attack move, a side-kick. Yeah, Sonic's getting vicious! He'll also possibly having a mode of transport, too, with a hang-glider and car-

riage already designed. All the loops, spring and switches of the first should be in there, too, plus new obstacles like the rifle loop (pictured).

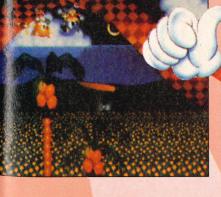
The big addition to gameplay is Tails. While no-one can really decide whether is will be a simultaneous two-player game, there's no doubt that the idea has been tried out. We have already seen a stage where the screen is split horizontally in two, with Sonic and Tails racing along their respective halves at a colossal speed.

Talking of speed, that's what Sonic is famous for, and the sequel should be even faster! Other tweaks include what seems like a brightening up and largening of the Sonic character and more facial expressions and moves when he's in action.

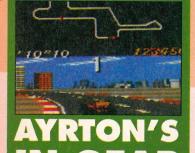
The only working version we've seen of Sonic 2 was at an American show in May. That was a very simple version of the first game, but since then Sonic 2 has come on in leaps and bounds. What we've seen so far looks great, and with Sonic 2 progressing at such a rate, it should – yet again! – cause Nintendo to go back to the drawing board.

Tails is to Sonic what Luigi is Mario, a sort of sidekick who couldn't hold his own game together, but builds even more character into the *Sonic* series.

The whole of Sonic 2 is based around time-travel. Sonic goes all the way back to prehistoric times, and progressing through various ages, will end up in the future. In each zone, he will meet his old

Just imagine yourself as mayor of a large American city. As with most places, it has its good and bad parts, but your problem is that the rougher areas are expanding, and cri

expanding, and criminals and hoodlums are taking over the running of the city. The police chief doesn't know what to do, and the public are screaming for action.

With elections just around the corner, you must act.

Taking the law into your own hands, you

take to the streets in the Mega-CD conversion of the Capcom coin-op, Final Fight. This game was mega-successful on the Super NES, but the Sega version will be even better. While the Super NES couldn't cope with the complete arcade game – missing the all-important stage four and a



w h o l e character! – the Mega-CD has the original arcade tunes, every level and all three characters, Hagar, Cody and Guy!

The only bad thing about Final Fight is that it's one-player. Well, it was on the SNES because the machine couldn't cope with two massive characters onscreen (it slowed down pretty bad in places anyway!), and it's still unclear whether the developers reckon they can get the Mega-CD to do the business in this area. At the moment the game's only 10% complete, so they're just seeing what the hardware can handle.

Although it sounds far from completion, but the programmers hope to have *Final Final* on the shelves by January 1993.

PHANTASY ZONE

Set 500 years after the original game, Game Gear Phantasy Star Gaiden is based in Alisaland – rumoured to be discovered by Alisa (of Dragoon fame). The major change from the other games is that the forced 3-D perspective has been changed to a simpler to view 2-D perspective.

You always have Minina and Alec in your party, plus another team member who can be changed depending on who you meet along the way. Places you visit on your quest vary greatly, from ordinary towns to gypsy villages and rich cities. You get around using various modes of transport, from canoes to cars, making this a very original twist on the usual RPG theme.



SIGGEST GAME EVER

Shining Force was Sega's first 12Mbit cart, and you'll already know that Streets of Rage 2 (Bare Knuckle 2 in Japan) is being developed on a 16Mbit cart for a January 93 release. But between those two, Sega are sneaking out another massive 16Mbit game, Land Stalker.

Yet again, they're packing the cart with a triumphant RPG. Its biggest attraction is the way that the graphics are rendered onscreen. While you stand in the middle of the screen, the whole solid 3-D environment moves around you. The landscape is constructed mathematically from small



cubes, which allowed the programmers to created massive play areas while keeping memory usage down (not that they needed to with 16Mbits available) because they repeated loads of blocks. It also means

that the whole game moves at a very quick rate, with the screen refreshing smoothly.

Your character can move in the four compass directions and jump. The main man also contains many manoeuvres, allowing him to slash his sword, and climb ropes and ladders.

Land Stalker is the first 16Mbit Sega game and is expected in late September. And don't worry about it being a Japanese RPG, because it's all graphics and very little text.

Gate of Shura follows in the footsteps of Electronic Arts' Bushido in being a beat-'em-up that hopes to instruct and educate, as well as allowing you to kick the hell out anyone who gets in your way.

Based on a comic of the same name, Gate of Shura allows you to enter combat using commands rather than the usual instinctive joypad controls. You must instruct ancient martial arts expert Mutsu as he challenges all-comers attempting to squash his head. Between the bouts, you are treated to a few static screens detailing your progress and the story so far.

This game is packed with loads of real moves that require a proficient hand if they are to have maximum effect. It will take many, many games, Daniel-san, for you to become the karate kid...

The Kremlin is not quite what it sounds. In fact, you've been supporting it for years. No, not that Kremlin, we're talking about Domark's development house, The Kremlin. With Christmas just around the corner, like all programmers, they are busy at work on their top releases of the year. But even the high security of The Kremlin couldn't stop the Pros getting in where others feared to tread...





"No, Mr Bond, I expect you to die... <cue evil cackle> And to all intents and purposes, James Bond has died over the past few years. We used to be treated to a Bond film every two years, but due to untold legal wrangles in America, no-one has been able to produce one since the last film, Licence to Kill, came out in



Way back then, as with A View to a Kill and The Living Daylights, there was a computer game, and Domark were the folks with the money (and contacts!) to secure the lucrative licence. It's safe to say that every Bond computer game has improved on the last, with Licence to Kill being quite a decent little shoot-'em-up. No Bond game, of course, has ever made it onto Sega - mainly because there wasn't a Sega machine to put it on. And with the absence of a new film, you might have thought this sorry state of affairs would have con-

tinued. But being the shrewd dudes that they undoubtedly are, Domark decided that they (and tons of Segaowning Bond fans!) could wait no longer, and what they've come up with is James Bond - The Duel, a mixture of great gameplay and even greater Bond

Programmed on the Mega Drive by Paul Margrave at The Kremlin, the latest Bond extravaganza should blow your socks off! First glance of the game reveals it to be not too dissimilar to the brilliant Rolling Thunder 2 (which is only available on import at present). Taking place over four levels, as 007 you must travel over land and sea to your arch-enemy's Caribbean island where he is holding Professor Michael Jones and his daughter, Sarah. Using the professor's know-how, the dastardly criminal has built a cloning machine which he's using to reproduce all of Bond's old enemies.

At the end of each of the four levels, you'll encounter your old "friends"



Oddjob, Jaws, Yoyo (Grace Jones) and the Voodoo Doctor. It's up to you to settle old scores or jump out of the way and get on with the task of tracking down the

Without doubt, the most eagerly awaited release of 1992 was Pit-Fighter on the Mega

Drive. It was not unheard of for people to spend a good £10-15 extra just to get the American import ahead of Domark's official version. Packed with stunning animation and gorily realistic sound effects, you would have thought it impossible for anyone to even think about, let alone attempt, a Master System version of Tengen's beat-'em-up. But with that great MS game Super Space Invaders under his belt, The Kremlin's Andy Taylor was champing at the bit to get his hands on the Master System conversion.

Thankfully, Andy hasn't wimped out and done a cut-down version of the Mega Drive game, he's actually adapted Pit-Fighter to the 8-bit Sega. But this sort of game needs memory, lots of it, so don't be surprised if you don't get the MS's 4Mbit cart squeezed onto a Game Gear cart (although it should, theoretically, work through the Master Gear)

The game contains a massive 94 frames of animation which makes the, albeit small, characters come to life in a very aggressive manner. Practically all the moves from the original are included, and what isn't there isn't worth







having. Sadly, there's no audience participation in the MS version, but you will still find yourself chucked back into the arena if you happen to fall into the crowd.

The main changes come on the options screen. Due to the MS's capabilities, the amount of fighters you can have onscreen is limited to two. Obviously this means you can't have two human oppos against the computer, but don't let that worry you as there are new options to compensate for it.

There are three two-player variants available. The first pits you against each other, with the winner being the first to get five victories. Or you can try your luck against an enemy opponent. Finally, you can choose to play any of the enemies yourself, and fight against any of the game's characters. So, let's face it, two players will not be short of something to play!

Also implemented into the game are a few hidden games and an ingenious cheat method - although we will most definitely NOT be revealing any of these till 1993! And if that wasn't enough there are seven speaker-busting tunes, and even the chance of having some speech!

All in all, Pit-Fighter on the MS has the potential for being the best 8-bit beat-'em-up of the year. Look out for it in November.

WHO THE HELL THE KREMLIN?

The oddly titled Kremlin is the home of Domark's software development division. Its name came out of an in-joke between Domark's central offices in Putney, London, and the programming base in Addlestone, Surrey. To avoid confusion between the two Domark offices, the employees called the two divisions The White House and The Kremlin (just to add a spot of intrigue to any outsider who picked up the correspondence). Journalists caught on to the name, and it's just stuck. They even have Russian text on the wall of the offices (goodness only knows what the locals think!)

The Kremlin was set up in April 1990, when Domark felt that their programmers "needed their own space and identity". For Domark, it's been one of their smartest moves, not only allowing them to keep hands on the development of their own games, but also to create their own original products, not just

The Kremlin's expansion has been so rapid that they are even taking on trainees to bolster the team At present, The Kremlin are working on the three Sega machines, IBM PC and various CD formats (including Mega-CD). On the Sega side, current games on the books include James Bond, MS Pit-Fighter as well as a few games they have slated for next year, like a flight sim and a "totally original" game on the Mega-CD.

Over the next few years, The Kremlin's general manager, Russell Ferrier, envisages them expanding their Sega side and entering more deeply into the realm of compact disc, whether it be CD-I, Mega-CD or whatever. "When an industry standard establishes itself, the CD market will really take off," enthuses an impatient Ferrier. He can't wait, and neither can we!

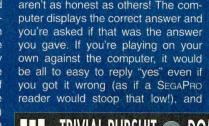

You play against the clock on each mission, even on the big level quardians you meet after every three stages. With only a certain amount of energy and time there's very little room for mistakes. The hostages are



hidden all over the maze-like prison and worker Aliens are everywhere; jumping from the floors and ceiling and wandering the corridor motion tracker in the top right corner of your screen will tell you if any are near, but it eats batteries and finding them wastes valuable time. Aircust crawlways can give you access to other parts of the complex, but pro-vide perfect hiding places for Aliens, who lurk down ladders or drop on you from above. Clearing your path with hand grenades saves your other, more valuable ammo.

Alien3 was developed by Probe, the same team who put together The Terminator, and it shows. The game sprites and backgrounds all display the same attention to detail, and the multi-directional scrolling is as smooth as silk. The backgrounds are relatively simple in the early stages, but as you progress things really hot up. Any RPG stands or falls on its ease of play for newcomers, and it must be said that Warriors of the Eternal Sun is extremely hard work to begin with and, to be honest, doesn't get much easier as you go on. It's not that it's set up any differently to other RPGs, but there's so little help in the early stages, and your characters have so few HPs (hit points), that any battle becomes risky. That, combined with the fact that it takes a long time before you make any real progress in the game, might dissuade a lot of people from buying it.

its normal 16-bit capability – how is this so? Also Street Fighter 2 is on a 16Mbit cart and costs between £60 and £80; will this mean Streets of Rage 2 will cost around the same price?

Andy, you seem to be getting totally confused between your bits, bytes, kilobytes, megabits and Weetabix. You are also confusing the capacity of a cartridge with the processing capabilities of the machine. And considering the amount of different processes there are to measures all these things, who can blame you.

Basically, you must view the megabit size of the cartridge and the 16-bit size of the Mega Drive differently – they are in no way connected. A megabit is 128K, which equates to 131072 bits (1024x128). A cart that is called 4Mbit has the capacity to hold 512K (4x128). Similarly an 8Mbit cart has 1024K (or one megabyte) of game data in it. So the bigger cart Mbit size, the more graphics, sound, etc can be crammed in the cart.

The 16-bit of the Mega Drive refers to how many of the cart's bits the MD can handle at once. So the more bits a machine has, the quicker it can calculate the running of a game. The Master System is only 8-bit, so it can't process the information from the cart as quickly. Also MS carts are usually only 2Mbit, which means you can't pack as much graphics and sound on them.

Think of it like this. The MS is equivalent to a one-armed man trying to get groceries with a shopping basket, while the MD is a two-armed man with a shopping trolley. The two-armed man will get his groceries quicker and can have more of them. Er, or something like that!

A few weeks ago, I found out that Mega Drive carts only cost around £10 to make and yet Sega sell them at £35-40 . I have an Amiga and a Game Gear. Amiga games cost £25 and are 16-bit like the Mega Drive. Sega make good games, but do they really have to make so much profit? Robin Elliot, Bury

Of course Sega couldn't actually sell carts for £10 because there is much more to spend their money on than just getting the carts produced. Don't forget all these things they have to pay for: programmers, translation and printing of manuals, printing of packaging, promotions (through advertising and public relations), shopkeeper's cut, distributor's cut, and finally their own profit with which they have to pay all their employees. Of course Amiga publishers have to pay for all this too, but Amiga games are on disk, which only cost about £1 to produce!

However, if you want some substance to the pricing argument, don't compare UK Sega prices with Amiga prices, compare them with prices in Japan where they have exactly the same costs (and even have full colour manuals!), yet manage to get the games on the shelves for half the price. Someone, somewhere along the line is exploiting the official UK market - and of that there's no doubt! - so how can Sega really argue against importing when the company that produces the carts can't even match the prices of grey market importers?

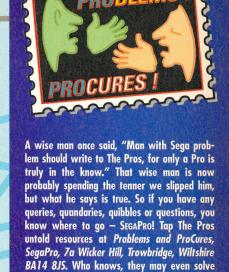

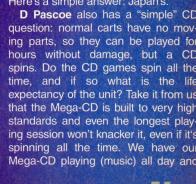

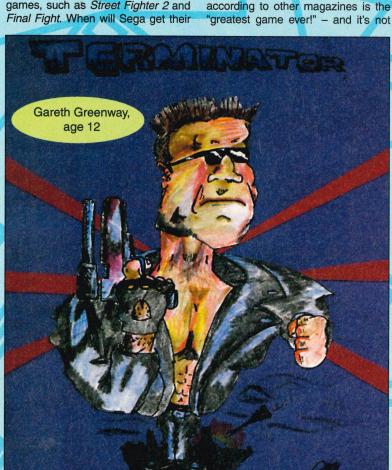

Let's get down to basics. Evander Holyfield is a strategy/training boxing sim that uses, for the first time on the Mega Drive, a spinning 360° view of the ring. The object, as in real life, is to beat hell out of any chump who gets in the way of the championship. But this is boxing with brains. A trainer feature between bouts allows your fresh-faced contender to pump iron and build up variattributes, including speed and stamina, which are essential when the bell rings and an ugly mug starts throwing punches at you. Boxers can be saved and retired at will, but in the end it all comes down to how well you can inflict pain and whether you've got enough bottle to grapple with the champ.

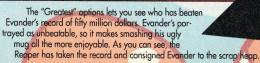

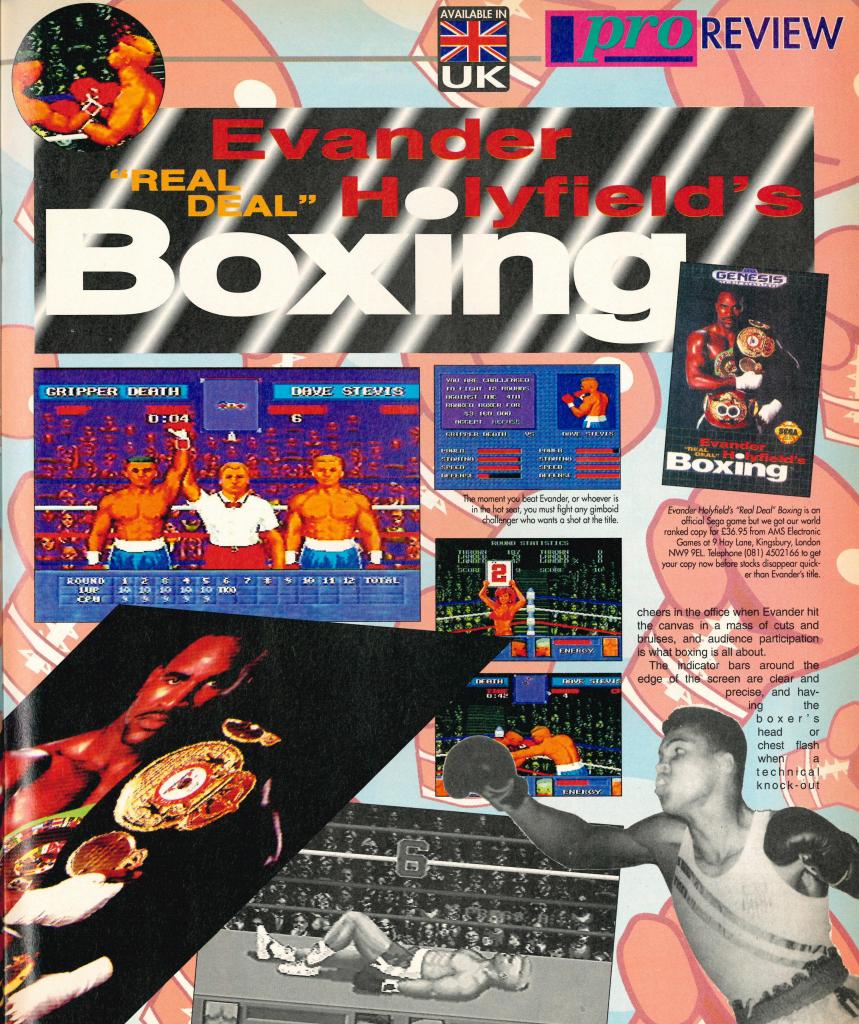

The save option lets you return again and again to sustain your career with the ultimate aim of becoming the greatest fighter who ever lived with an indelible record screen. I would have preferred to have chosen when to save, so as to avoid costly mistakes and loses.

Unfortunately, Evander Holyfield's greatest asset is also its folly. Volleys of jabs, upper cuts and hooks can be effortlessly strung together in competition and as a result it is very easy to find a routine of moves that beat nearly every boxer without breaking a sweat. Once you hit the top ten, the pros get wise to your tricks but a quick jab to the nether regions followed quickly with a punch to their glass jaws and it's all over. tomic Runner starts with an intricately ornate title screen which incorporates an animated version of the cover illustration. A quick

trip to the options screen presents you with a wealth of choices: difficulty level (with three settings), number of lives and continues, pre-programmed button assignments and an option to turn on or off autofire and (for some obscure reason) auto-jumping.

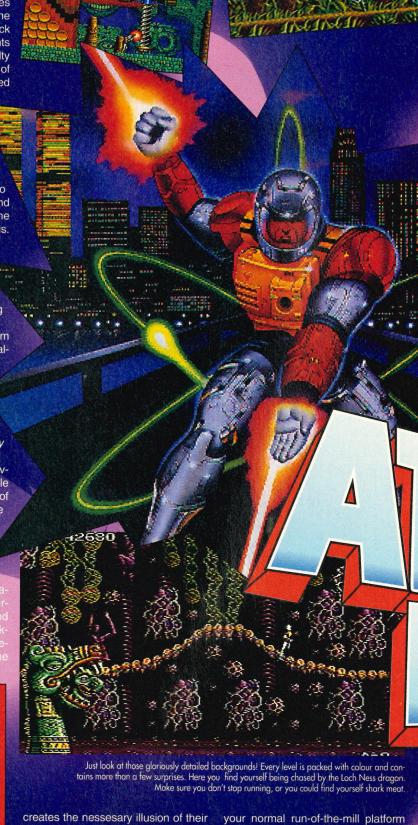
Starting the game proper drops you right in at the deep end. As you explode out of the underground laboratory, the first things to hit you are the in-game tunes and FX. They both add to the feel of the game, which is fast and furious. There are loads of tunes in the game ranging from slightly rock orientated to downright funky! The FX are equally good with huge explosions and laser fire almost ripping your TV speaker to shreads.

The screen continually scrolls from left to right with some beautiful parallax effects which helps the game's unrelenting appearance. Fantastic backgrounds together with colourful and detailed, albeit small, sprites fill the screen. The main character is wonderfully animated, which nearly puts Prince of Persia to shame!

The game boasts seven tough levels, with the first seeing you battle your way Rolling Thunder-style out of your underground lab and into the open air. Then it's over a snow-covered landscape, complete with a blizzard in progress, through a dense jungle and a superb Egyptian desert complete with eye-catching pyramids, finally climaxing with a desperate run through the alien-infested streets of New York. All the backgrounds are expertly drawn with lovely detail throughout, such as the hieroglyphics on the Egyptian level.



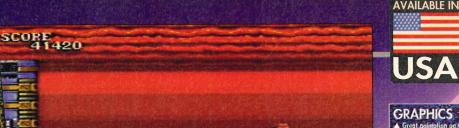
The many, many aliens you encounter are well-drawn and detailed, with some of them looking extremely creepy indeed. The animation of the aliens is nowhere near as good as the main character, but still



creates the nessesary illusion of their deadly intent. The level guardians are the exception to this rule; they're huge, almost filling the entire screen. (I defy anyone to see the huge robot at the end of the sixth level without muttering a few choice words.)

The gameplay is a little different to

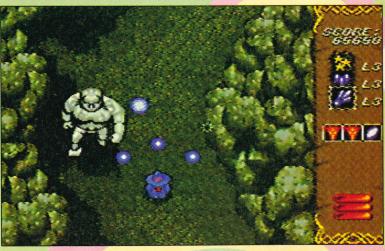

ket, you may think Hornby Hobbies' Game Genie is a bit late on the scene - but not so. In fact the Game Genie is the innovative box of tricks that started the hacking cart industry. It first appeared on the NES what seems like absolutely aeons ago, and because British inventors Code Masters couldn't get permission from Nintendo to produce it, the unit was subsequently banned from sale in the USA. However, courts in Canada quite rightly saw that such a restriction on sales was totally stupid and let the Game Genie sell in its thousands north of the border. Meanwhile, Nintendo and Galoob (the Game Genie's distributors in the States) battled away in court. Years later, and after hundreds of hours

which takes a huge number of hits before exploding! Use Thunder Raven for this one as it is the best at dodging the guardian's fireballs.



To start with, jump onto the island and the monster will rise from the water. You should constantly blast him whilst jumping over the fiery projectiles shooting from his cavemous maw. Once he dives, move to the right of the screen, and he'll re-surface on your left, exuding small green froglike creatures from the pits at the back of his head. These are easily blasted before they harm you, by using a sudden burst of thunder!

As he re-submerges, move to the left side of the screen, staying in the water, and the fiery phlegm/frog muties process will be repeated. To survive this onslaught, wait on the island and watch for the ripples on the water's surface! If they are on your right, jump over the freak of nature as soon as it starts to move in your direction (not before, or it will hit you!). If they appear on your left, though, jump over the ripples when they have fully appeared, and you should dodge the monstrosity as he moves to the right.

After five or six cycles, the gnarly monstrosity will be no more!

DIPOTIPS



To begin with, jump off the hover disk you're on, and climb to the top platform. Use a large burst of thunder magic to wipe out the two red and purple suction creatures waiting on the grey wall!

On your far left and right two monsters will alternately appear, blasting small fireballs at you which can be dodged by crouching. Blast these, then do the same to the red bubbles which appear close by, without allowing them to make contact with you. After a fairly short wait, the whole base will explode, and you can move onto level four!

STAGE 5

This guy comes in the form of an armoured tank, which is fairly easy to defeat, especially if you use either Thunder Raven or Dragon Frye!



Firstly jump onto the highest platform in the centre of the screen, which is made from rock. Now go to the left of it, and soon the tank will come into your field of vision. As soon as it fires blue lasers at you, jump! Run right, dodging the lasers, and jump off the platform and over the tank. It will

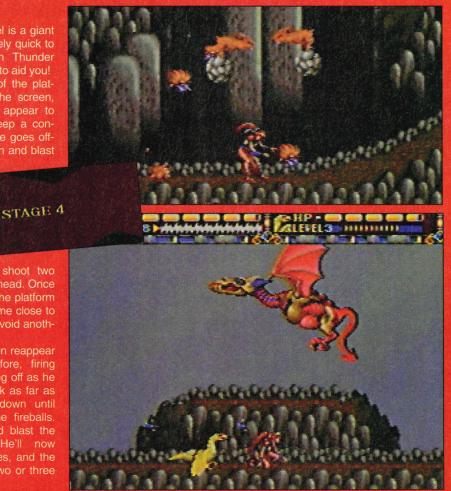
The guardian on this level is a giant pterodactyl who is relatively quick to destroy, especially when Thunder Raven has been enlisted to aid you!

Move to the left end of the platform, in the middle of the screen, and the pterodactyl will appear to your immediate right. Keep a constant blast on him until he goes offscreen. Now crouch down and blast him as he flies

low over your head. Stay in the same place, and he'll appear again to your right. Continue to

blast him, and he will shoot two large flames above your head. Once he's done that, jump on the platform as he shoots a single flame close to the ground. Drop left to avoid another flame, and so on.

He'll disappear and then reappear slightly higher than before, firing small fireballs and backing off as he does so. Follow him back as far as you can then crouch down until you've dodged all of the fireballs. Move to the far left and blast the swooping aberration. He'll now swoop at you a few times, and the cycle will begin again. Two or three cycles and he's bistory

left. The second lot of four must be jumped, and then the fun really begins. The tank starts to belch out toxic exhaust fumes close to the ground, so you've got to reach a higher safety zone! The cycle once again repeats itself, and hopefully the tank will have caught fire. It'll trundle into a cave and explode miserably!



STAGE 6

Now this guardian is a toughie as he has two machine gunners to protect him! Choose Dragon Frye for the first part of this level, although he won't last too long during this part of the game, so keep on checking his power and change before he dies. To begin with, move down towards the bottom right. Move in tightly against the trough-like indent, and move only when the guns commence firing. Get up the left slope, and destroy the guns with a sudden burst of thunder magic. Once the enemy appears again, fire the thunder and get back to the indent. Whenever you see the guardian, retire to your safe zone! Remember to watch your dragon's power, or he'll be luncheon meat! Your grotesque enemy takes a phenomenal amount of hits before dying.



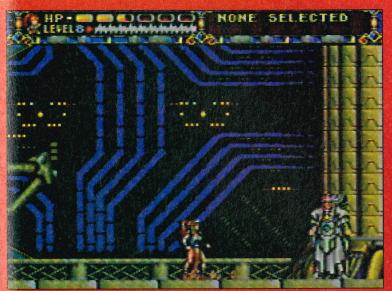
STAGE 7

This guardian takes at least 15 minutes to beat, so it's advisable to take a break before tackling him! Use Ball o' Fire, as he's virtually indestructible compared to the others, and will provide you limited protection. The enemy will appear hovering in the centre of the screen, so move as far right as possible. Jump, duck or dodge his projectiles and move to the centre of the screen. Four unfriendly aliens will appear. Kill them all, but watch out for the fourth

one. He'll spit something rather unpleasant at you which must be avoided. The main guardian will reappear on the far side of the screen, and (yes, you guessed it!) the cycle is repeated. Easy but time consuming! Once destroyed, guide Alisia to Baldour's Palace and progress onto the next stage!







STAGE 8

Before you can tackle Baldour, you must first destroy his servant, Ornah. Once again, Ball o' Fire is the only guy that will survive this onslaught.



When Ornah appears, walk under him and he'll move to the right. Stay where you are and jump over the lightning he fires at your feet. He'll move right, and once again fire lightning at you! Avoid this and move to the opposite end of the screen, where Ornah will now shoot out a white snake-like creature. As it explodes, jump or duck the shrapnel, but do not, under any circumstances, shoot it! This will be closely followed by another one (Ornah only

ever shoots them out in pairs!). A few well-placed shots later, and Ornah is no more!

Once Ornah is destroyed, the real task of taking on Baldour, the prime of all things evil, awaits.

Baldour will

appear to your right, and will go straight to the far left. Move to his right and blast him. He will initially shoot some worms at you one by one. When they come towards you, move right, then left, then jump over them. Baldour will then fire two shots of his red laser at you (easily jumped), closely followed by a multitude of small fireballs which may be jumped or dodged. He'll now alternate between the worms and the fireballs until you've destroyed his right side. Once done, move to his left and dodge even more fireballs! Periodically you'll see four red balls shoot up into the air; when this occurs, move to the opposite side of them, so as not to be trapped underneath them. This will go on until you've destroyed his left side. Once you have, he will move slightly move to the side with the most floor space, as Baldour will occasionally try to ram you himself! Dodge this, and keep blasting, and he'll soon explode and sink into the floor.

Now you can sit back, relax and watch the credits. You've completed Alisia Dragoon!



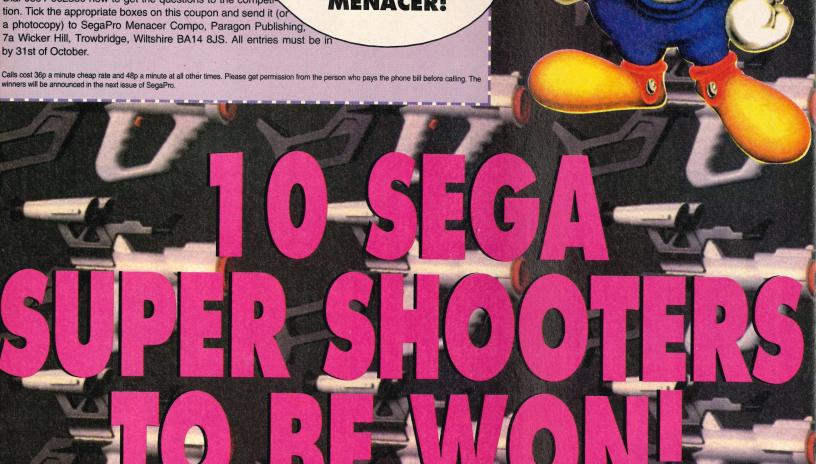
