

Charts are very funny things.

Some people swear by them; some people swear at them.

They may be the bane of one person's existence; they may be a boon to another.

Those whose records are on them, usually love them; those whose records are not, often hate them.



THE DARNELS (Bana 525)

"IN THE VALLEY OF THE ROSES" (2:14) [David BMI—Martin, Wax] The Darnels debut on the Bana label with a beautiful rock and roll ballad that could develop into a huge money-maker. Side is extremely commercial and has a pretty lyric and melody the youngsters will approve of. Watch this long shot.

B "MY LITTLE HOMIN' PIGEON"
(2:02) [David BMI — Bartel,
Kaye] Another solid ballad designed for the teen crew. Smooth blend.

MANNY LOPEZ ORCH. (RCA Victor 51-7366)

B "EMBRUJADITO" (2:15) [— Lopez] Manny Lopez and his boys cruise thru a smooth mambo item with Manny handling the vocal chores. Spanish locations should find this one good coin-collector.

"VAMO A VER" (2:21) [—Gil] Manny and Yoyo handle the vocal duties on this fast moving mambo item also designed to appeal to the latin disk buyer.

AL TAYLOR & THE POODLES (United Artists 105)

B+"THE SWIVEL" (2:15) [Criterion ASCAP—Greco, Davis] Al Taylor and the Poodles come up with a side that should have the teenagers hopping. It's a rhythmic R & R instrumental with a solid dance beat and a cute title. Could catch on.

"THE RIPPLE" (2:16) [Criterion ASCAP—Greco, Stevens]
The title on this side is different but the beat is in the same swinging mood. Strong rockin' stuff.

LONNIE DONEGAN (Mercury 71248)

B "I'M JUST A ROLLIN' STONE" (2:52) [Essex ASCAP—C. & A. Currie, Donegan] The "Rock Island Line" man, one of Britain's hottest disk salesmen, belts out a slow blues item with the aid of his Skiffle Group in the backdrop. Good change of pace for Donegan for Donegan.

B "MY DIXIE DARLING" (2:08) [Peer International BMI—Carter] This side is currently on the British best sellers. Spirited skiffle jumper that cuts along at happy clip.

JO MARCH (Kapp 208)

B+"JO'S RIDDLE SONG (I Gave My Love A Cherry)" (2:29) [Garland ASCAP — Arr. Hunter] Newcomer Jo March, a lark with a rich, warm voice, makes an excellent first showing as she offers a wonderful new interpretation of a beautiful old folk song Good change-of-nace disk folk song. Good change-of-pace disk to watch.

B "(With You) MY JOHNNY LAD" (2:05) [Sanga BMI—Brooks] This spirited bouncer sounds like a British wartime tune. Unusual number that'll appeal to jockeys interested in something a bit different. Miss March has a warm quality in her voice. Keep an eye on this girl.

With a tremendous chain of hits under his belt, including his current long-running smash "April Love," Pat Boone comes thru with another two-sided smash that should extend his unbroken line-up of smashes. For his latest offering, Pat takes hold of something old and something new. The oldie is the beautiful ballad "It's Too Soon To Know." Wonderful evergreen treated to a warm, sincere reading by the polished crooner. Class tune that should become an exciting new favorite of today's teenagers. Excellent Billy Vaughn accompaniment showcases Pat beautifully. The companion deck is a rockin' spiritual item dubbed "A Wonderful Time Up There." Strong religious material with a commercial beat. Side should attract tremendous play. Hot new two-sider for young Mr. Boone.

"THE LONG HOT SUMMER" (2:27) [Leo Feist ASCAP—North, Cahn] "OH-OH, I'M FALLING IN LOVE AGAIN" (2:15) [Planetary ASCAP—Hoffman, Manning, Markwell] JIMMIE RODGERS (Roulette 4045)

JIMMIE RODGERS (Roulette 4045)

Jimmie Rodgers, one of last year's most successful newcomers with two tremendous smashes "Honeycomb" and "Kisses Sweeter Than Wine" to his credit, comes thru with a potent new coupling that will start him rolling in the right direction for '58. One half is Jimmie's first ballad effort. It's the beautiful title song of the soon-to-be-released 20th Century Fox pic "The Long Hot Summer." An emotional, beautifully performed ballad which Jimmie sings in the film's sound-track. Class offering that grows prettier with each new listen. The companion piece, "Oh-Oh, I'm Falling In Love Again" is a rhythmic finger-snapper similar to "Honeycomb." Colorful ditty.

"WALKIN' HOME FROM SCHOOL" (2:36) [Vanderbilt ASCAP—Bradford, Lewis]

"Walkin' Home From School" should be the biggest record of Gene Vincent's career and could develop into one of the year's best sellers. From every angle it's a smash. The melody, lyrics and delivery of this lovely teenage ballad are just superb. To date, Vincent has been featured singing hard-driving material such as his "Be-Bop-A-Lula" and "Lotta Lovin'," two king-sized hits. "Walkin' Home From School" gives the performer an opportunity to display his talent on a ballad, and the results should lead to a fabulous new career for the songster. Listen in on this one. It can't miss. Lower lid is a hard-driving swinger dubbed "I Got A Baby." Solid jump stuff that'll keep the hoofers rockin'.

"BAD MOTORCYCLE" (1:56) [Thornett BMI-Williams, Browne] "SW'ET DADDY" (2:43) [Thornett BMI-Williams, Storey, Browne] THE STOREY SISTERS (Cameo 126)

Cameo Records has picked up a hot master that should develop into a tremendous teenage favorite and at the same time add a new adjective to our dictionaries. The number is titled "Bad Motorcycle" and is introduced by a new group called the Storey Sisters. The rockin' number has a fabulous sound and a hard-driving beat perfectly designed for today's bop dancers. But in addition to an exciting overall sound the Bad Motorcycle word coupling is something the kids will pick up quickly and use as a favorite expression. Bad Motorcycle refers to a guy who's on the ball, a sharp character, etc. The driving pace, that doesn't let up for a minute, is just out of this world. Kids'll love the side. Flip, "Sweet Daddy" is a good rockin' ballad.

Bobby Helms, an alumnus of the country music school, had a very successful '57 in the pop field with his long-running smash "My Special Angel" and the only new Christmas tune to click last year "Jingle Bell Rock." 

Letter To The Editor:

Trifero Reports On EP **Progress At RCA Victor**

Dear Sirs:

In your January 11th editorial, entitled "NEGLECTED MARKET," we noted the suggestions and conclusions proferred in respect to the status of the EP. As I have been Administrator of EP Planning and Marketing for the RCA Victor Record Division for over a year, I particularly feel that you would be interested in hearing a progress report on the EP in our company during the calendar year 1957. During this past year, we at Victor have had a concerted, organized, carefully thought-out plan to merchandise, promote, advertise and sell EP's. Our results have been extremely rewarding and encouraging.

In any business, the profit and loss statements determine the success or failure of a venture; therefore, the following sales break-down tells an important story: first, of the total album business during the calendar year 1957, EP is responsible for 30¢

632,000 SHIPPED DAYS

of every sales dollar; and second, for every dollar in single record sales, EP's correspondingly bring in 50¢.

With our all-out merchandising and sales efforts, the words "Extended Play" came into their own in '57, and we believe that the entire industry is now aware of this as we have found ourselves in healthy competition with

Late in '56 Victor decided to give the EP a quarter of a million dollar campaign and one of the most extensive advertising and promotion programs ever beamed to sell product. As a result, RCA Victor 1957 45 EP sales enjoyed a 173% increase over 1956. This impressive gain can be partially accounted for by the volume of 45 rpm record players sold but we feel it was mainly a result of the indoctrination of the public to the advantages of the 45 EP.

An important part of the planning for exploitation of the EP was the decision to put out special material suited to the record-buying public as well as the juke box operators, realizing how important time needs of the latter are. The result was a tailoring of the LP material, gleaning of the LP for the best material to fit the EP, and in many cases, the finding of new material, uniquely suited for the EP alone. Therefore, in reference to your editorial, we'd like to point out that Victor's 1957 45 EP campaign has already successfully carried out the suggestions made therein.

In some instances, the EP record was released simultaneously with the LP, as in the case of the Presley "Loving You" album. The dollar volume that this EP was responsible for pointed the way to the benefits of this practice. Another important experiment proved that 10 best-selling items produced especially for EP accounted for almost a million and a half dollars in dealer volume. These sales have been guideposts for future

In summation, it is not too strong to say that from our standpoint, 1957 was the year EP came into its own, and that we look forward to reaping the profits of '57's concerted exploitation in 1958. We were therefore anxious to inform you of our encouraging progress in this market.

Miss Vaughan delivers her usual easy on the ears sessions while receiving attractive accompaniment from her trio. "How High The Moon," "Just One Of Those Things," and "Stairway To The Stars" are among the goodies showcased. The issue should get the thrush's typical high sales treatment. Well done set.



"THE IMMORTAL HANK WILLIAMS"-Hank

The late Hank Williams, one of the all time great country singers, is heard showcasing twelve items with the capable assistance of his Drifting Cowboys. Williams, who was also one of the greatest country songwriters, lends his pleasant vocal chords to "With Tears In My Eyes," "Fly Trouble," "Please Don't Let Me Love You," and "California Zephyer." Should be well received by the songster's many faithful fans.

The popular songstress delightfully throws her-The popular songstress delightfully throws herself into the program with her pleasingly frank delivery. Supplying the slick instrumental backing is the orchestra of Don Redman. Some of the engagingly executed numbers are "Empty House Blues," "I'm Gonna Keep On Doing What I'm Doing," "You Got It Made" and "Who Me? I'd Love It." Miss Bailey's usual humorous inserts add a little spice to the punchy readings. Accomplished sessions.

Victor Young and company deliver a program of items taken from some hit motion pictures. The noted conductor leads his ork through its usual melodic string oriented readings. "Spellbound," "The Best Years Of Our Lives," "A Place In The Sun," and "My Foolish Heart" are included in the stirring interpretations. Young has composed scores to some of the finest motion pictures of our time. Chart stock.



"MUSIC UNDER THE STARS"—Robert Ashley and his Orchestra—M-G-M E3575 (1-12" LP)

Robert Ashley and his crew portray a number of selections that might be heard at some "pop" concert under the stars. The musicians have a zestful string oriented delivery that handsomely complements the happy tunes. The ten goodies that listener is treated to includes "Red Indian Snowman," "Brazilian Sleigh Bells," "Toy Carousel," "Elephants Tango," and others. Impressive listening fare. listening fare.



"PARDON MY ENGLISH"—The Blue Stars of France—Mercury MG-20329 (1-12" LP)

Designed to be of service to deejays as "fillers" that will take up one minute station breaks, the disk contains thirty ork selections, each of which is precisely sixty seconds in length. The numbers showcased are delightful miniature items and each receives the impressive ork stylings of the Jack Zimmerman crew. Unusual platter that could prove to be important to the record buyer as well as to the jockey. well as to the jockey.



"A MOMENT OF LOVE"—Trio Los Panchos-Columbia WL-112 (1-12" LP)

The Trio Los Panchos, sometimes described as a "Mariachi" group, presents a dozen Mexican love songs. The trio, while accompanying themselves with guitars, render "Un Minuto De Amor," "Dos Amates," "El Reloj," and others. Trio Los Panchos displays a fascinating delivery with its beautiful string work and smoothly blended vocal effort. Great issue for lovers of the music.



"CATCH THE BRASS RING"—The Sounds And Music of A Coney Island Carrousel—Mirrosonic SP-6001 (1-12" LP)

The pressing is the new diskery's initial release. "Catch The Brass Ring" was recorded from an actual Coney Island carrousel, complete with occasional children's voices. Some of the tunes enjoyably rendered via the happy sounds of the organ are "I'm Looking Over A Four Leaf Clover," "Whiffenpoof Song," "Apple Blossom Time," and "Over The Waves." The sound reproduction is beautiful throughout. Well done entry.



"ELEANOR ROOSEVELT" — In Conversation With Ben Grauer—Riverside RLP-7012 (1-12" LP)

The waxing is one of Riverside's "Modern Voices Series" issues. Mrs. Roosevelt in a most interesting and educational conversation with noted commentator Ben Grauer. Among the many topics discussed are, Our World Leadership, FDR's central philosophy, a woman as president, the D-Day crisis, and can there be permanent peace. A worthy item for the educator as well as the home. An important issue.



"DANCE PARTY"—Peppy Prince and his Orchestra—Dooto DL-240 (1-12" LP)

The set features Prince and his fourteen man crew issuing a host of tunes with a danceable beat. The musicians have a strong brass delivery, and are aided with occasional vocal inserts by Prince. Platter should prove appealing to the teen crowd. Tunes include "Sir Gallahad," a medley that includes "Solitude" and "I Cried For You," "Jack Pot," etc. Nicely performed dance issue.





"BONE & BARI"—Curtis Fuller—Blue Note 1572

Fuller's tasty trombone work and Tate Houston's baritone sax offer the listener six punchy readings. The two soloists are nicely backed by Sonny Clark's piano, Paul Chambers on bass, and drummer Art Taylor. Of the six selections rendered, four are originals by Fuller. The two evergreens are "Heart And Soul," and "Again." One of the standout originals is one called "Pickup," a swinging opus that the boys deliver in a winning style.



"OUT ON A LIMB"—Pete Rugolo and his All Stars—Emarcy MG-36115 (1-12" LP)

The LP is a follow up to Rugolo's last effort "Brass In Hi-Fi." The Rugolo All Stars consists of such notable jazz mainstays as Shelly Manne, Jimmy Giuffre, Maynard Ferguson, and Barney Kessel, and group-wise they portray some colorful sessions. The items include "Don't Play The Melody," a Rugolo original, "The Boy Next Door." "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," "In A Model Tone," "Sunday, Monday, Or Always," etc.



"AFTER MIDNIGHT"-Thad Jones, Kenny Bur-

"AFTER MIDNIGHT"—Thad Jones, Kenny Burrell, Frank Wess, Mal Waldron, Paul Chambers, Art Taylor—Prestige 7118 (1-12" LP)

The platter is dedicated to the blues and the jazz notables performing offer some feelingful interpretations. The selections, all Waldron originals, consist of a fast number "Steamin'," a medium beat opus "Count One," and two blues ballads "Empty Street" and "Blue Jelly." Thad Jones (trumpet) and Frank Wess (flute and tenor sax) offer some stirring solo work throughout the set. Well done. Well done.



"TOUR DE FORCE"—Roy Eldridge, Dizzy Gillespie, Harry Edison—Verve MGV-8212 (1-12" LP)


Three of jazzdoms foremost trumpeters unite their sounds to issue a disk loaded with good listening. Gillespie, Edison, and Eldridge come up with some convincing versions of "The Nearness Of You," "Summertime," "Moonlight In Vermont," "Steeplechase," and two others. The jazzists are accompanied by Buddy Rich (drums), Oscar Peterson (piano), Ray Brown (bass), and Herb Ellis (guitar). Important addition.

BRAHMS: Concerto in D Major The Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Rudolph Kempe, Yehudi Menuhin, violin—Capitol PAO-8410 (1-12" LP)

The musicians tackle the difficult Concerto with poise and authority. The famous composer's only violin concerto is portrayed superbly by the celebrated Menuhin, along with the brilliant accompaniment contributed by the Berlin crew. The violinist displays an intimate knowledge of the classics. Kemp's laudable conducting is a contributing factor in making the issue a standout classical addition.



STRAVINSKY: Suite from "The Firebird"—Suite from "Pretushka"—Leopold Stokowski conducting the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra—Capitol PAO-8407 (1-12" LP)

The waxing features the Berlin Philharmonic led by Stokowski, a constantly creative force in the classics. It convincingly captures the essence of the two pieces as he turns in a dynamic job of conducting. The disk is issued in a beautiful sleeve that has an impression of the head of Stokowski embedded in its front cover. Superbly done set.



BEETHOVEN: Symphony No. 3 in E-flat Major, Op. 55 ("Eroica")—Antal Dorati conducting the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra—Mercury MG-50141 (1-12" LP)

The master composer's brilliant work is melo-The master composer's brilliant work is melodically rendered by Dorati and the Minneapolis Symphony ork. "Eroica" is one of Beethoven's most beautiful compositions, and the conductor leads the musicians through a tonally exciting reading. The Symphony's third movement, "Scherzo," is especially well portrayed as the orchestra displays its dynamic range. The entry is a definite must for classical enthusiasts. Beautiful sound



OFFENBACH: Gaite Parisienne — Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra conducted by Felix Slatkin—Mercury PAO-8405 (1-12" LP)

Slatkin—Mercury PAO-8405 (1-12" LP)

The great composer's beautiful piece is vividly portrayed by the Hollywood Bowl ork. Slatkin displays an obviously intimate knowledge of the work as he tackles it with his usual authority. The pressing is housed in a very attractive booklike cover containing a complete description of the bright ballet. Offenbach's composition undergoes a laudable rendition as the ork's smoothly blended delivery is excitingly showcased through the disk's stirring sound reproduction.



Imperial Sells 3,000,000 **Records In December**

BEVERLY HILLS, CAL. — Imperial Records wound up 1957 with an all-time high of 3,000,000 disks sold for the month of December alone, it was disclosed by label prexy Lew Chudd. The same month was also highlighted by biggest single day dollar gross in the firm's history, with a total of \$200,000 worth of business recorded on December 21.

Chudd attributes a great deal of the hefty sales to three artists: Fats Domino, Ricky Nelson, and Ernie Freeman, all of whom had hot singles and albums in release. This, coupled with the biggest disk Christmas buying spree on record, accounted for the high mark.

Currently employing seven pressing plants to meet the heavy demand, Chudd this week is negotiating with two more plants for contract pressings to handle mainly singles.

"My biggest problem now," says Chudd, "is meeting distributor and dealer demand."

Toward this end, Chudd is offering plants immediate payment on delivery of pressing orders. Same arrangement holds true for printers and album makers.

album makers.

Chudd will be on the road for the next two weeks to hypo sales on Jackie Walker's new release, "Oh, Lonesome Me." He will also query dealers and distributors on lower priced album lines and their effect on standard priced album sales. From a survey just completed, Chudd announced that more record players were sold during 1957, than in any other year. This, from all indication, will assure the industry its biggest year in 1958, says Chudd.

The music publisher apparently stimulated excitement in England by pointing out that the lyric content of 'The Prince Of Players' was perfect for those A & R men who had been looking for a semi-religious song which avoided direct references to the Lord or "God," or non-subtle references to religioso language and which could be appropriately set to a teen-age music beat."

Carlton explained that his onemaster deal with English Decca did not necessarily mean he would tie up his entire line for all world markets with the Decca company.

Wurlitzer Electronic Piano Used For New Steve Allen LP

Other features of the new instrument are a sustaining pedal which holds tones like a conventional piano, built-in volume control, auxiliary amplifier and vibrato control, inputs for radio or phonograph plug-in enabling the player to accompany himself.

Ellington Celebrates Mr. & Mrs. Music 33rd Year Of Recording

NEW YORK—Columbia Records' new single release of Duke Ellington's "My Heart, My Mind, My Everything", commemorates his thirty-third year as a recording star. It also marks the premiere of a new Duke Ellington composition, "My Heart, My Mind, My Everything." This songs marks one of the rare times when the Duke created both words and music.

Ellington's first composition, in the early twenties, was "Soda Fountain Rag". His first recording was issued in 1925 on Perfect Records, "I'm Gonna Hang Around My Sugar" coupled with "Trombone Blues".

Since 1925, Duke Ellington has recorded over 1250 records for various companies, according to Leonard Feather's "Encyclopedia of Jazz". Further, Ellington has composed over 570 compositions as listed at American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers.

Ellington's achievements are particularly outstanding, for apart from his composing and recording, is the fact that in thirty-three years he has been able to survive scores of musical fads from the "Mickey Mouse" bands of the late twenties to the "Rock And Roll" thumpers in the mid-fifties. In his own jazz field he has remained a favorite through the years in spite of the fact that for the past twenty years there have been periodic preferences for many new personalities.

Montovani Receives Award For 8 Gold Record LPs

NEW YORK—Mantovani, Britain's celebrated maestro, received a magnificent gold record trophy last week, denoting eight different long playing Mantovani albums which had topped the ¼ million sales mark in the past year. The elaborate award was presented to the London Records' star by Harry Kruse, executive vice-president of London Records and by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Jr., who spoke on behalf of London president, E. R. Lewis, who was unable to come to the United States from England for the presentation. The award was made at a special party in Mantovani's honor held in the Pillement Suite of the Waldorf-Astoria in New York.

After an address by Kruse, Roosevelt read a telegram from E. R. Lewis expressing the latter's regret that he was unable to come to the States for this memorable occasion. The telegram highlighted the personality of

Mantovani and his great achievements as a recording artist.

Mantovani is in the United States for a concert tour covering 63 dates that will take him all across the country before the completion of the tour on April 1.

In 1955, Columbia Artists Management invited Mantovani to make a concert tour of the eastern states. In 13 dates, Monti played to 80,000 people and grossed over \$200,000. Last year his tour carried him from coast-to-coast and into Canada. He performed 64 concerts before 200,000 people and grossed over \$500,000. His current tour promises to be even more successful. successful.

The Italian born Englishman has The Italian born Englishman has been a tremendous success on records ever since his first hit single "Charmaine" established him as a U.S. favorite. Recently, his rendition of "Around The World" was a huge seller. But his greatest success has come from the field of long playing records. His eight Gold Record LP's include "Film Encores", "The Music Of Sigmund Romberg," "Song Hits From Theatreland," "Christmas Carols," "Immortal Classics," "The Music ols," "Immortal Classics," "The Music Of Victor Herbert," "Strauss Waltzes" and "Greensleeves" a collection of favorite waltzes. Guests at the Mantovani award party were given a souvenir set of the eight LP's that topped the ¼ million mark.

As a composer, he has written a number of compositions, most of them when he couldn't find something which already existed which suited the needs of his 40-piece orchestra. These have included "A Poem To The Moon", "Dance Of The Eighth Veil", a "September Nocturne" for piano and or-chestra, "Longing", and a long list of popular music under assorted pseudonyms. The most familiar of these was the "Cara Mia" which catapulted the English tenor, David Whitfield, to fame in America. A number of his tangos, also written under pseudonyms, have also become standards in English popular music.

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



NEW YORK:

George Goldner, currently presiding over Gone, End, Mark X, and several other labels, was discussing the current "bop" influence on teenage records. "This is more than an arranging trick. This is something new that started, as I can remember, with "Whole Lot of Shakin' Goin' On" by Jerry Lee Lewis and "Bony Moronie" by Larry Williams. The kids can do "The Bop" to it—and at this time I see a similarity between it and the Mambo and Cha Cha Cha. Not, of course, in the rhythm, but in the hold it has on the youngster. Before Mambo and Cha Cha Cha was taken over by the more mature dancers it was kept alive by the teener. It gave them a freedom of expression that was the basis of the Lindy, enabling the youndancers to perform in uninhibited fashion with or without a partner. This is again apparent in the new "bop" beat. The dance is developing, and through the TV screen focused on Dick Clark's "Bandstand" is spreading throughout the country." (Editorial note: We have heard New York youngsters say "We dance Philadelphia style. We picked it up by watching Dick Clark's "Bandstand".)

"If I am not wrong," continued Goldner, "this beat has to stay at least a couple of years and maybe more. Take Lindy, for instance. It goes back to Goodman and Miller, at least 25 years. Mambo and cha cha are around for ten. When a dance takes hold that intrigues the dancer it just has to stick around for awhile. Of course, you can't be certain when you are dealing with teenagers because they can switch from one thing to another at the drop of a hat. But, if they do work the bop into intricate dancing patterns, as prevail in the Lindy, Mambo and Cha Cha Cha, they will certainly be reluctant to drop them until time itself has worn the dance out." KBMS-FM To Introduce Multiflexing

GLENDALE, CAL. — Station KBMS-FM of Glendale, California, will introduce to the trade press and industry a broadcasting innovation called Multiplexing, January 31 at 2:00 PM at Frank Senne's Moulin Rouge Theatre-Restaurant in Hollywood. Multiplexing is a new technical achievement which enables one FM station to broadcast simultaneously, two or more different high fidelity programs, or two-channel stereophonic sound

One highlight of the multiplex demonstration will be the simultaneous broadcasting of two or more high fidelity programs from one transmitter for reception by the general public and for industrial uses. The main channel program will consist of varied programming (sports, concerts, opera, etc.) while the other multiplex channels can contain services of a commercial and industrial nature such as: facsimile, or background music, or slow-scan TV.

Another highlight will be the broadcast of two-channel sterephonic sound from one transmitter and reproduced by one receiver. Prior to this KMBS demonstation, stereo phonic broadcasts have been achieved only by the combination of two stations broadcasting simultaneously. This system necessitated the use of two FM receivers or an FM and an AM receiver. Now with Multiplexing, only one station and one receiver are required.

KBMS President, Al Schwartz, said that in addition to the demonstration for industry members and press on January 31, public demonstrations will be held in the weeks to follow. These will also be held at Frank Senne's "Moulin Rouge" Theatre-Restaurant, Hollywood.

"It's been a two-year development for us," said Schwartz, "and we feel proud of being the first station in the country to publicly demonstrate the 'miracle' of high fidelity multiplexing."

Schwartz has operated KBMS-FM, Los Angeles, for the past two years. In addition to being President of KBMS-FM, Schwartz is President of Planned Music, Inc., a background music service.

"As we begin our third year of operation," said Schwartz, "there can be no doubt that 1958 will bring to the FM industry a year of historic milestones. We are happy to take part in the development of this system which will greatly enhance FM and make it an even more important broadcast vehicle."

Art Kevin will be handling an-



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

NEW YORK — The New York World-Telegram & Sun ran a front page story reporting that the price of the famous Smith Bros. cough drops was increased from 5¢ to 10¢ a package. While the story was treated in a light vein, the publication thought enough of the increase to make it front page news—evidently under the impression that this product was the last in the country to go from a nickel to a dime. The comments should be particularly interesting to those operators still selling their products at a nickel: Talking of the 5¢ package, the writer said: "But it couldn't go on forever . . . but a nickel no longer was a nickel. Nobody, in fact, knew what it was". (Ed note: The U.S. Government statistics indicate that the 5¢ piece of 1939 is now worth 2½¢).

MIAMI, FLA.—In a talk to dealers meeting here for the National Automobile Dealers Assn. Convention, Benson Ford, vice president of Ford Motor Co., made some statements about the nation's economy which were highly interesting and stimulating. Ford told the dealers that there is nothing in the nation's economy to warrant pessimism or fear. He said: "too many people tend to forget that we have been thru such pauses before and then gone on to push the economy to the next highest notch." He pointed out that "fear can be dangerous because it is contagious and if we as a people lose confidence in our ability to maintain a prosperors economy, we could frighten ourselves into trouble." He said that there is evidence that many people who have had no reduction in buying power are sitting back, "waiting to see which way the economy will turn before they venture into the market place. If more and more people get nervous and back away", he added, "trouble could follow." Concluding, Ford said that savings accounts are at record high levels. "All evidence indicates", he stated, "that more reople have money to spend and are ingood credit position."

NEW YORK — We've reported a number of economic viewpoints for 1958 in this column over the past few weeks. We feel the annual business outlook survey by The Journal of Commerce, one of the nation's most respected business publications, merits consideration. This survey shows that the men who run American industry expect sales to be about 2.8 per cent higher than in 1957, with most of the gain coming from price rises, and that profits will stand 1.7 per cent over the 1957 showing.



Those are not red spots before your eyes. They're American dimes. At least, the size the American dime should be, compared to its actual 1958 purchasing power . . . $4\frac{1}{2}\phi$.

"This resulted in a closer and better understanding of each other's businesses.

"It brought us to the point where we could discuss overhead expense problems.

"Now that we are at this stage, we are arriving at a better understanding of each other's many problems, and this is bringing us to the point where, we believe, we will eventually work much closer with each other so that both of us can enjoy better profits from the machines."

Every one concerned unanimously agreed on one very important factor for a brighter, better future.

for a brighter, better future.

"We are", said one man, whose words could probably be used for all the others, "basing our statments on the fact that the manufacturers will give us the type of new equipment which will most definitely assure us of being able to obtain the greatest interest from the players and, thereby, enjoy peak play action while the location owners enjoy increased intake along with our own increased profits."



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Boston Operators Discuss Problems At Meet

Next Meeting Takes Place Feb. 12

BOSTON, MASS.—The legal battle to knock out the \$150 license fees set by the city of Boston and the State of Massachusetts featured the discussion at the last meeting of the Music Operators Association of Massachusetts at Beaconsfield Hotel, January 9. The next meeting set for February 12 at the Commonwealth Country Club, is expected to give members a progress report on the legal proceedings underway.

President David J. Baker reported that donations are coming in from opsindividually and op associations throughout the country. Many letters and checks were received from opswho said they had read about the fight against the "excessive" fees in The Cash Box. The largest donation so far is a check for \$1,000 from the Cali-

fornia Music Operators Association. With this and other donations from individuals and the MOA, a big fund is being built up for the battle.

individuals and the MOA, a big fund is being built up for the battle.

At stake is the music machine business in the City of Boston. At present, ops have to pay \$150 for each machine and \$10 federal tax, a total of \$160. The city gets \$50 for weekday license and \$50 for Sunday license; the State's fee is \$50 for Sunday license. This situation, now in its second year, is forcing many ops to chop their routes in Boston.

President Baker gave a talk on outlook of phono biz for 1958 and expressed his opinion that it would be a year of test in which ops would have to work harder to get the same returns they did in 1957. All, in all, however, he foresaw a good year ahead. He noted that there were still a large number of machines working on 5¢ play in Boston, and advised that ops should get more out of the phonos. He pointed out that 10¢ play is necessary for all ops to survive.

A big discussion took place over the rise in the cost of records. Some members were hot under the collar about the situation and suggested boycot-

rise in the cost of records. Some members were hot under the collar about the situation and suggested boycotting. President Baker nixed the boycott suggestions, pointing out that rising costs were all about and that ops also had to think about rising costs and push for dime play wherever the nickel still holds.

It was also suggested that Massachusetts legislators be made aware of the ASCAP situation, and that action be started on this fight front.



Cuba's Music Ops Battle **Exorbitant Fees Demanded** By Authors' Society

tors here are readying for a battle to save their businesses against the National Society of Cuban Authors. This society is known as SNAC (Sociedad Nacional De Autores De Cuba)

SNAC was created just two years ago. The Cuban music operators' association, known as ANOFA (Association Nacional De Operadores De Fonografos Automaticos) reports it was very pleased to see such a society created in view of the fact that, in the past, there were so many performing rights organizations making claims that the music operators were completely confused.

According to the members of ANOFA everything started out very well with the operators agreeing to terms and all seemed to be happy.

"Then", claims one leading ANOFA member, Morris Gran, "we were hit by one demand after another for higher and still higher fees. To the point where, today, if we were to have to pay the exorbitant fees being demanded of the music operators we might as well sell our phonographs and go out of this business."

"Not only that", he advises, "but such a move would hurt the entire Cuban economy. A tremendous number of the small storekeepers of this nation are dependent to a very great extent on the income from their phonographs. They need the money from the phonographs. They are the backbone of this nation's business."

SNAC, in the meantime, refuses to listen to any arguments. This author's society, which was created in 1955 without any contest or question from the music operators, was able to get a bill thru the Cuban government, Law Decree No. 1918, on its official creation.

The music operators claim that they did not want to contest this decree.

"We were very big fools", reports another well known music operator, "but", he adds, "we never dreamed that SNAC would ever ask for such tremendous and exorbitant fees. The size of which would simply mean that we have to close up our businesses."

In their appeal to the Commission appointed by the Cuban government, the members of the operators' association, ANOFA, will prove that many of the songwriters, lyricists and artists have complained to them that they do not get their due and just royalties for the records which are appearing in Cuba's automatic phonos.

The operators, thru ANOFA, will suggest to the Cuban government's commission that a stamp plan be used which will, once and for all, prove the most equitable as far as artists, songwriters, lyricists and phono operators are concerned.

ANOFA's members will purchase the stamps from SNAC. The stamps will then be placed on the records used in automatic phonos. The name of the tune and the artist will be written right on the stamp by the operator. In this fashion, the Cuban music ops claim, those writers, publishers and artists of the records actually appearing in the Cuban juke boxes will be paid their true royalty. They will be able to prove what is due them by the stamps bearing their tune and name.

At the same time, ANOFA points out, this will also prove most equitable as far as the Cuban music ops are concerned. The operator who has more machines and buys more records will pay more. Today, according to ANOFA, all operators, whether they have one or a thousand phonographs, have to pay SNAC a tremendous fee. Th's means, immediately, the end of the small operator.

"We are indeed a very, very sad lot of operators", an ANOFA member says, "because we allowed this Law Decree Number 1918 to go thru without even a contest.

"We believed SNAC would treat us decently. Today we realize that their greed is so great it will simply kill the goose that lays the golden eggs for their own membership. Their own members are against their methods "Therefore", he concludes, "we will fight for our rights because it means fighting for our business lives."

La Asociación Nacional de Operadores de Fonógrafos Automáticos, conocida como la ANOFA, ha dado a conocer que se halla muy complacida con la creación de tal sociedad, en vista de que en el pasado habían tantas empresas que exigían ciedad, en vista de que en el pasado habían tantas empresas que exigían derechos de explotación que los empresarios de música se hallaban muy confusos. De acuerdo con los miembros de la ANOFA, todo empezo muy bien, los operadores aceptaron las condiciones y todo parecía ser satisfactorio. factorio.

"Más tarde", alega Morris Gran, uno de los más destacados miembros de la ANOFA, "se nos exigieron constantemente derechos cada vez más altos hasta un punto tal que si hoy tuviéramos que pagar los honorarios exorbitantes exigidos a los empresarios de música nos veríamos obligados a vender nuestros fonógrafos y abandonar el negocio. abandonar el negocio.

Operators Ask:

Will Low Priced Equip't Increase **Number Of Part-Time Operators?**

See Low Priced Machines Bringing Part-Time Ops Into Field. This Will Upset Operating Arrangements for Established Firms

CHICAGO—"Of course we'd like to see all new machine prices drop 'way down," stated one operator of a group just shooting the breeze here at one of the leading Chicago distributor showrooms.

"But let's look at it this way," said

"But let's look at it this way," said another.

"Suppose," he conjectured, "that prices of machines did drop 'way down like everyone would like to see.

"Then," he questioned, "what would result? Would this be like what happened years ago? Would this bring in a flood of part-time operators. Those men who are, at present, laid off their regular jobs.

"And," he continued, "who also have uncles, brothers, aunts, and other relatives who own stores? Who could get these locations because they could purchase the lower-priced machines and their relatives would want to give them 'the break' of operating in their locations?

"Would this be the same thing so many of the established firms had to go thru years ago? Like cut comparisons?" Like now machines for locations?

go thru years ago? Like cut commissions? Like new machines for locasions that didn't deserve new machines so often?"

This old time operator, and many

more like him, are asking this question here and all over the country.

They are wondering whether lower-priced machines would, once again, swamp many areas of the nation with men who are, at present, waiting to return to their regular jobs and who would, even after they returned to their regular positions, continue part-time operations time operations.
Established firms, especially those

with location contracts, aren't easy to knock out of spots. But, where rela-tives are concerned, one way or an-

other is found to do so.

other is found to do so.

The resultant effect is that everyone in the area suffers because, to obtain the location, the "part-timer" will do everything he can in cutting commissions, promising new machines, and doing so many other things that no established operating firm can compete with, that the end result is chaos in many areas.

Operators here, and without doubt everywhere else, are in agreement that there is every possibility to zoom the number of operators nationwide should new equipment drop to former recession prices.

recession prices.

Those operators who have been arranging for location contracts for a period of years feel more or less secure. Those who haven't been able to obtain location contracts, or who have never tried to obtain them now have never tried to obtain them, now feel that there is every possibility they may lose some of their best spots should the part-time operator, due to lower priced machines, again begin to flood the field.

It's quite a question, as these operators admit. Yet, in almost every case, they agree that the part time operator can hurt their business to a very great extent if he is able to cut loose in their area.

The fact remains that, where so many are being laid off temporarily, some part-time operators are bound to result anyway.

But, as long as prices remain high, these ops feel that few such part-time ops will prove the case.

If prices plunge, they admit that a large number could come into being, and that these could "wreck any commission set-up in any territory, anywhere."

"There is no doubt," one well known operator here says, "that it will be up to the games manufacturers to bring us the kind of machines that will assure better income from all locations."

Like in past years, this operator and many others here, are of the opinion that the amusement manufacturers "will come thru like they always do" and that a series of new type games will result in better income from all the industry.

"Due to their flexibility and also due to the fact that they can come out more quickly than either the music or vending machine manufacturers with new products," one distributor here points out, "the amusements manufacturers have always been able to lead this field out of any economic morass."

Some of the old timers go back into history and point to years when conditions "were really bad" and yet, they state, the amusement game manufacturers always came up with a new type product that led the way to better times.

Amusements manufacturers report that they haven't halted for even an instant in trying for the new product wanted by the trade. Most interesting, of course, to all in the field is the way the operators, jobbers and distributors look to the amusement games manufacturers with complete faith and confidence that they will produce the new type products that will zoom up income for all the industry.

Nor does it seem that these men have misplaced their faith and confidence for, as the past weeks indicate, the manufacturers are present-

cate, the manufacturers are presenting new and more interesting games and are holding the price line regardless of general conditions.

Almost every amusements factory here is busy with ideas and plans and production of new games. They are all working into the wee hours in experimental departments seeking for the new product. Those that fail in tests around the country are pulled in and new machines quickly sent out from what has been learned during the test periods.

"We needed someone to handle the many promotional details of our firm which has continued to grow at a very remarkable pace.
"Howard Freer," Don Moloney said, "can take over the work that has kept other members of our staff occupied and he should be able to bring worldwide as well as domestic attention to the fine products our firm distributes."

Freer stated that he is taking a short vacation and will start to work in his new position with Donan on February 1, 1958.

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

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Coinbiz Adjustment **Period Continues**

Most Ops Seek More Equitable **Operating Arrangements. Point Out Need For More and Closer Cooperation** for All Machines from Location Owners and Employees to Assure Top Take for Ops and Locations. Believe Majority of Coinmen Will Find '58 Good Year if Businesses Made Sufficiently Flexible to Handle All Expected Changes

CHICAGO—The adjustment period continues. Many operators have found that they have to obtain a more equitable share of the gross intake from all of their equipment to insure their

Others, who have made as best an adjustment in this direction as they possibly could, now advise that they

possibly could, now advise that they are putting up certain facts to their locations which, they believe, are of great importance.

They are advising their locations that the owners as well as the employees of the location simply must cooperate to help assure greater intake for the machines in the locations.

This is the one and only way, most operators point out, that the locations can cooperate and can, at the same time, assure themselves greater income from the machines located in their place of business. In this way both the location owners and the op-

both the location owners and the operator will profit, they report.

It seems, from information received, that the problem of obtaining cooperation for their machines has become one of the most vital in the

Many operators claim that their locations became very lazy in this regard. The resultant effect is that intake has fallen off from lack of this type of cooperation that is so vital to increased profits.

Some operators complain that, at

this time, it has become very, very difficult to make more equitable arrangements of the gross intake. They explain that, with the take down in many instances, location owners aren't listening to their demands.

Yet, quite in reverse, other ops claim that they have been able to make more equitable arrangements, receiving a much better share of the gross intake because, they state, the location owners aren't as interested as they formerly were when the intake was at a high peak. take was at a high peak.

In addition to all this, operators agree that their businesses have to be completely flexible at this time, so that they can weather whatever economic storms may suddenly arise.

"Flexibility is extremely important", one well known operator points out, "because this means that, when our phonos aren't bringing it in, we have our games and vendors to depend on.

"Similarly", he continues, "it also means that we can change our operating methods without effecting our business to a serious extent.

"Sometime ago", he concludes, "we arranged for a more equitable share of the gross intake from all machines we have on location and now", he adds, "we have made our business sufficiently flexible to assure our continuance thru thick or thin."

See Greater Growth For Ops Co-Ops In'58

Many Smaller Firms Plan to Get Together Into Cooperatives to Assure Greater Efficiency, **Better Servicing and** Certain Profits Via 10¢

CHICAGO—"Unless we can get together on 10¢ play plus a more equitable share of the gross intake from our machines in this area", reports one operator, "we just won't be able to outlast present conditions.

"Furthermore", he reports, "ever since The Cash Box presented the idea of the smaller operators getting together into cooperatives, that is, merging for their own better, future welfare, many of us here have met a few times and discussed this possibility.

"Our discussions", he claims, "came to nothing, so far. But", he adds, "today, because of what has been happening in business generally, we are again thinking about cooperating with each other. To the extent where we can come together into a cooperative setup which will allow for

greater efficiency of operation, cut down on overhead expense, allow us to give better service, and for all to agree to 10¢ play plus a more equitable division of the gross intake with all locations in this area."

More and more operators are searching each other out in this regard. They are starting to talk about "cooperative operations".

They are of the belief that, by merging their interests, they can withstand competition as well as meet present economic conditions and bring about a better profit setup for all concerned.

"Believe me", one well known op-

"Believe me", one well known operator advises, "this isn't the easiest thing in the world.
"For example", he reports, "what everyone wants to do is throw in only their worst locations and retain their best areas.





"They seem to forget that a cooperative is based on complete cooperation.
"Yes", he opines, "it'll take a little more time, but", he believes, "they'll come together because they realize that a real cooperative can prove to be the solution to their problems."

One of the problems about which operators here have been concerned about for years has been the loss of playing time when locations televize sporting events. It was thought that with the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Dodgers moving out of town, many more hours of play time would be available for coin machine equipment. 

This will prove among the most effective means, leaders claim, for the operators to absolutely "kill this bill in committee."

The Phonograph Manufacturers Asrne Phonograph Manufacturers Association have published a booklet giving the entire story of the ASCAP-sponsored Senate Bill 1870 and just what it means to the nation's music operators and distributors. (This was reprinted here in The Cash Box, January 18, 1958, issue Page 64)

Distributors and operators who have anything at all to do with auto-matic music are being urged to im-

mediately contact every single one of their locations, employees, all those from whom they buy, civic, social and charity leaders in their communities and obtain letters and wires which should be triplicated and rushed immediately to the three Senators who are expected to sit in on the hearings February 19, 20 and 21, 1958.

"This is the most crucial period in all the history of the automatic music industry," one well known leader stated.

"If the operators don't act quick," he continued, "and due to the fact that ASCAP and similar such organizations have already been hard at work doing everything they possibly can to insure passage of this terrible Bill S.1870, this industry will find itself out in the cold."

Some operators have arranged their own petitions and are having these signed by everyone of their music patrons. Others believe that petitions are of no value in this instance. THE CASH BOX' Survey Now in Progress. **Reports Will be Forthcoming When Complications** are Completed

CHICAGO—It is now about a full year since The Cash Box conducted its last survey to learn just how deep 10¢ play had penetrated the industry. Having originated the idea for 10¢ play over 14 years ago, The Cash Box crusaded for its adoption and hoped, over the years, that it had taken sufficient effect to make dime play most outstanding in the industry.

After all reports were compiled last year it was learned that approximately 54.4% of the nation's 575,000 automatic phonos were featuring 10¢ play.

automatic phonos were featuring 10¢ play.

It was also estimated that about 62.5% of the nation's amusement machines were featuring 10¢ play.

The reason, it was learned, that there was a greater percentage of amusements featuring 10¢ play a against phonographs, was due to the fact that the amusements were changed so much faster on locations and, as new games were brought to the locations, dime chutes were being featured.

At the same time, operators of the larger bowling games advised that they were, at that time, adopting 2 for 25¢ play action. This was proving successful. Since then the "Two Plays For Two-Bits" idea has taken even stronger hold nationwide.

In the meantime, it is the belief of leaders in both the amusements and music fields, that the percentage of 10¢ play will show a tremendous increase over 1957 when The Cash Box' 1958 survey is completed.

Mailings are already on the way to the trade, It is most sincerely hoped that there will be a tremendous percentage of returns to these so that a very accurate estimate can be com-

percentage of returns to these so that a very accurate estimate can be compiled from the results.

Not only are operators interested in this 1958 survey by The Cash Box, but, even more interested are manufacturers and distributors. They point out this will indicate the path they should follow in forthcoming months for the new machines that will be introduced. introduced.
