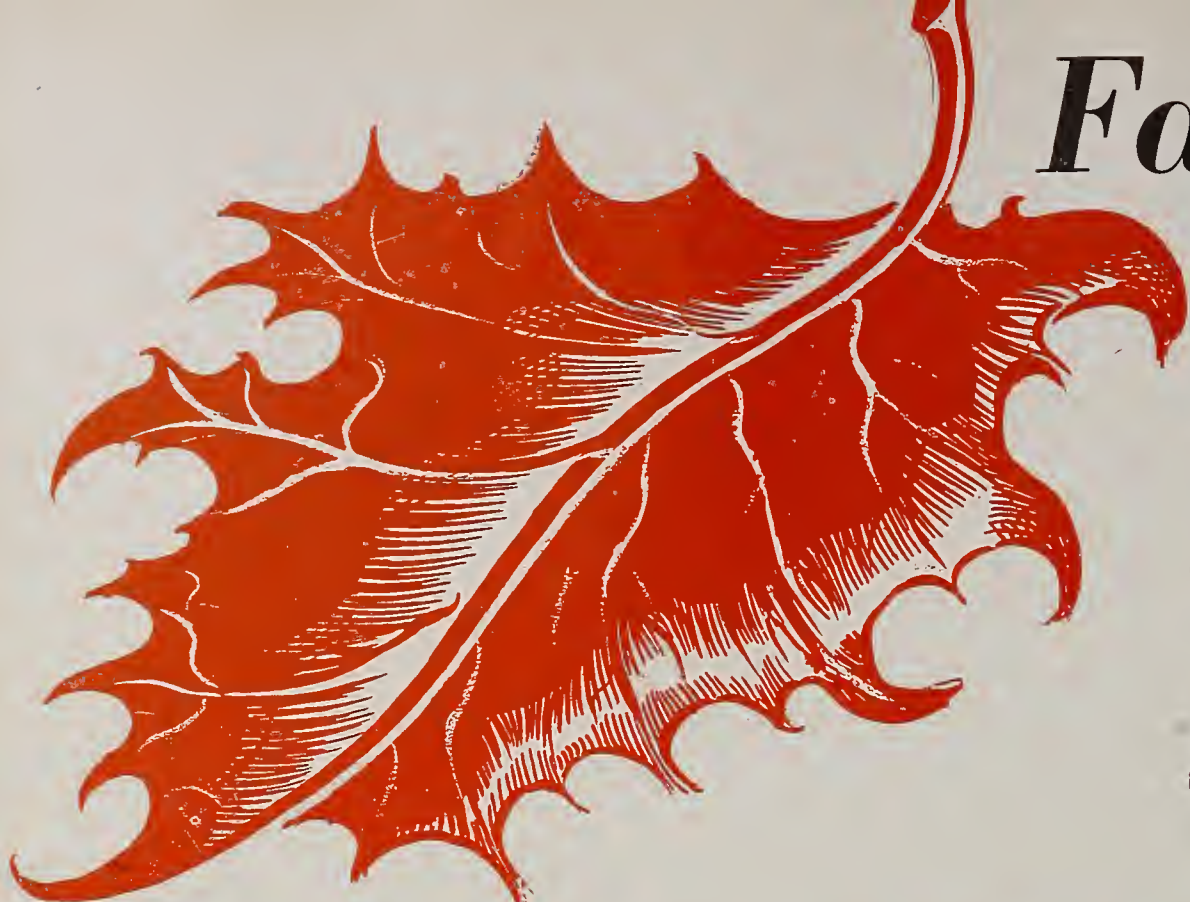

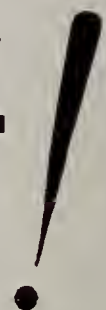

NEW MACHINE PRICES GOING HIGHER

Mfrs. Can't Absorb Further Price Increases as Raw Materials and Labor Costs Skyrocket. Hesitate to Introduce New Equipt. Build Conversions and Plan Simpler Machines in Effort to Hold Down Price. Increases So Far Well Accepted By Trade. Majority Hope Production Will Not be Curtailed by War Work.

This publication was the very first to inform the field that prices of new machines were on their way up.

This is due to the very close relationship which this magazine enjoys with the heads of the leading manufactories in this industry.

It gave many in the field much food for thought. The result was that some decided to buy more rapidly to arrange for whatever they needed to be on hand before the price rises occurred. Others waited to see whether such price raises would actually come into effect.

The result is well known thruout the entire industry today. Prices are going up and, what's more, will continue upward.

Manufacturers have been attempting, as best as they could, to maintain their present price schedules. They have absorbed increase after increase in prices of raw materials, components as well as in labor costs. They are, at least the greater majority of them, at the end of the rope, as far as further absorption of price increases is concerned.

Raw materials and labor costs are skyrocketing. There is nothing that the average manufacturer can do about this anymore. He realizes that he is actually "on a war basis" as far as raw materials are concerned.

Furniture and housing are demanding more and more and still more lumber. This has zoomed cabinet costs, and is continuing to shoot this cost ever upward.

Steel is almost impossible to obtain. The large steel suppliers have set up voluntary allocation systems. This means that manufacturers who need and want more steel, when they have a "hit" product, find it almost impossible to obtain any more steel than they are getting and, further-

more, are thankful for whatever they are getting at this time.

The same is now true of copper, tin, zinc and the alloys, as well as rubber. Shortages have hit more and more suppliers. Lead is short, and thousands of pounds of lead are used by manufacturers.

As everyone knows copper wire is used by the mile, as are other metals, in the coin machine industry.

The time has, therefore, arrived when the manufacturer is at the very end of absorbing any more of the raw materials and labor cost increases. He must get a higher price for his finished products.

Some manufacturers have entered into conversions in an effort to allow the ops to get the utmost out of older machines. Some are planning simpler machines, such as the penny counter games, so that ops will be able to get some equipment at low prices.

But, the majority are logically and simply stating that they cannot continue onward for very long at their present machine price schedules. They must obtain price increases if they are to stay in business.

So far price hikes have been well accepted by the average coinman. He realizes that with the government allocation system under way, and with the continued demand increasing for raw materials from all other industries, that the manufacturers in this field have done everything they possibly could to hold down price increases.

The only real problem troubling many in the field at this time, is whether the average manufactory in this business will be able to exclusively give its production to coin operated products.

The majority are of the belief that the big factories will soon be doing much war work, and that this will, in itself, tremendously curtail their present products' pro-

duction, even to the point where some factories may not be able to supply the needs of their distributors.

The war is cutting into raw materials reserves that are on hand. The government is doing everything it can to preserve, and even build up, present stockpiles.

It is best, then, that all in the field realize this as soon as possible, and plan accordingly.

Those who need equipment should order now. While they can. And get whatever machines they can at whatever the price will be.

No one knows just what may happen tomorrow, or the day after, as the Korean incident either expands into full fledged war, or is curtailed within its present limits.

But, regardless of what happens, the government will see to it that it is no longer caught short again on equipment and men, and will, therefore, curtail sales of critical raw materials, such as steel, lumber, copper, zinc, lead, etc.

The manufacturers are doing a tremendous job for the industry at this time. They deserve the unqualified support and commendation of all in the field. They are working at top speed manufacturing present products in an effort to be prepared, regardless of what might result in the near future.

Those who have been reading their newspapers, and listening to the news over the air, must realize that conditions are becoming ever more critical.

It is up to everyone in the field to cooperate with the factories so that, should the manufacturers be called to put aside their tools and dies for present products, and enter into the war materials effort, all will be prepared to ride along with Uncle Sam in whatever he may ask of them.

"HIGH ON THE LIST" (2:51)
 "LIFE IS SO PECULIAR" (2:51)
 BING CROSBY—ANDREWS SISTERS
 (Decca 27173)

● Pair of sides from the Bing Crosby epic "Mr. Music" have Bing and the Andrews Sisters off flying via this duo. Top deck is a sock romantic ode, with Bing and the gals splitting vocal honors. Tune rolls along in slow infectious time, and should grab heavy play. Flip side is a cute medium tempo'd item that will do well too. We like "High On The List."

"NO OTHER LOVE" (3:10)
 "HONESTLY, I LOVE YOU" (2:19)
 JERRY GRAY ORCH.
 (Decca 27180)

● Smooth dance rendition of this current pop ballad by the Jerry Gray ork should win added favor. Vocal echo by Tommy Traynor is effective, and blends well with the ork tones. Flip side is a straight ballad, handled easily by Tommy once again. Top deck gets our nod.

"ROBIN HOOD" (2:36)
 "ANGELINA" (2:41)
 LOUIS PRIMA ORCH.
 (Robin Hood 100)

● Music ops in the market for a pair of sock oldies can go wild with this pair. Both ends scored like sixty years ago, and always have been in heavy demand. Maestro Louis Prima's fresh version of these sides is still just as wonderful. Ops who have a call should load up.

"BYE BYE BLUES" (2:30)
 "CALIFORNIA HERE I COME"
 (2:32)
 EDDIE MILLER
 (Rainbow 40066)

● Honky-tonk piano work by Eddie Miller, and the set up of a pair of standards in the offing for music operators. Both tunes are well known, and should do more than hold their own—especially so in tavern locations. Eddie's unique piano work on both ends shines brightly—lend an ear.

"ORANGE COLORED SKY" (2:32)
 "CAN'T STOP TALKING" (2:30)
 BETTY HUTTON
 (RCA Victor 20-3908)

● First wax by Betty Hutton on RCA Victor has the chirp going away off the deep end on a couple of zany sides. Both ends have Betty giving her all in the way of comedy, which is sure to provoke loads of laughs as well as moola. Wax is the sort you have to listen to—we suggest just that.

"ALL AMERICAN GIRL" (2:27)
 "BETTY CO-ED" (2:27)
 RUSS MORGAN ORCH.
 (Decca 27174)

● This pair should find a market in locations that cater to a college crowd. Both tunes are oldies that have earned some heavy juke box play—this rendition by the Russ Morgan ork is good enough to repeat. Vocal work by the chorus is effective throughout. Ops should lend an ear.

● Fresh wax by balladeer Perry Como notches this featured spot again, with Perry coming up with still another double-header in this coupling titled "Patricia" and "Watchin' The Trains Go By." There are no A or B sides to this

one—both are equally as wonderful, and each have the spark and glitter of juke box winner about them. Top deck is essentially a girl tune, with Perry purring of the wonders of his gal "Patricia." Song rolls along in smooth easy going manner, with Perry's relaxing vocal style making you sit back and take it all in. It's a sweet side; one that Perry's fans are sure to go for in a big way. Coupling is a choo-choo story, and has the piper picking up the tempo. Lyrical expression echoes the title of the tune, with a vocal chorus adding to the gleam of the side immensely. It's the type of material that will find a ready audience, and is sure to win wide favor pronto. Music ops should latch onto this one!

"FRIENDLY STAR" (2:43)

● Plug romantic tune on the top deck is handled effectively by thrush Kay Brown. Ditty is from the MGM pick "Summer Stock" and should get a hypo as a result. Coupling is the oldie currently causing wide attention. Kay's pipes trill the tempting lyrics in smooth, graceful style. Nothing to shout about on this one, altho the disk is good.

"I'M IN LOVE WITH YOU" (2:53)
 "DON'T ROCK THE BOAT, DEAR"
 (2:32)
 MARGARET WHITING—DEAN MARTIN
 (Capitol 1160)

● Vocal duet by Margaret Whiting and Dean Martin on this pair of lightly intoned romantic ballads make for pleasant enough listening. Both sides weave in mellow tempo, with vocal honors split between Maggie and Dean. Top deck is more in the straight romantic side, while the flip leans on the novelty angle. Ops should listen in.

● Chirp Patti Page has the earmarks of another hot one in this blue ribbon winner. Upper lid is a slow infectious ballad which Patti purrs in pretty patter. Vocal chorus by the Tune Timers adds to the glamour of the side. Flip has Patti bouncing around a great standard in mellow rhythm style. Both ends are expertly handled—they rate a spot in music ops' machines.

"THERE'S NO USE" (2:37)
 "MISS YOU" (2:50)
 SAMMY KAYE
 (RCA Victor 20-3891)

● Smooth sentimental stuff by the Sammy Kaye ork, and the set up of some easy to take wax in this coupling of "There's No Use" and "Miss You." Top deck has the Kaye Quintet and Tony Alamo on a dreamy ballad, while the flip has Alamo taking it solo on the standard. Both ends are tailor made for the juke box trade.

"SWINGIN' DOORS" (2:46)
 "CINCINNATI DANCING PIG"
 (2:40)
 GENE KRUPA ORCH.
 (RCA Victor 20-3906)

● Novelty echo of the top deck might perk up and find some loose change around. Vocal flavor by Bobby Soots on this side is fair enough, with the light-hearted romantic lyrics weaving a fair enough story. Flip side has Bobby on deck again on the current pop rave. Rendition is there for the asking—ops take it from here.

"THIS IS MY COUNTRY" (2:33)
 "THE GREAT AMERICAN DREAM"
 (2:26)
 VAUGHN MONROE ORCH.
 (RCA Victor 20-3907)

● Orkster Vaughn Monroe on deck with a fresh pair, with this duo sure to be greeted favorably by Vaughn's many fans. Both ends have a patriotic theme, and are off the beaten track a bit. Vocal work by Vaughn is effective throughout. Material offered lacks commercial juke box potential, but should, nevertheless, earn its keep.

"I'M A DREAMER" (2:37)
 "TALKING TO MYSELF ABOUT
 YOU" (2:37)
 DEL CASINO
 (Arco 1260)

● Balladeer Del Casino comes up with a pair of smooth ballads that might attract some juke box coin play. Both sides weave in slow tempo, with Del purring lightly amidst a string ork background. Music is styled for the moon-in-June kids. While the wax won't stop traffic—it should hold its own.

"I'M FOREVER BLOWING
 BUBBLES" (3:00)
 "YOU'RE MINE, YOU" (2:33)

Severe Vinyl Shortage Looms

CAMDEN, N. J.—RCA Victor Execs disclosed here that they are frankly worried about the alarming vinyl shortage as a result of the strike in the chloride industry and the cut back in their allotments announced by the Bakelite Company.

The Bakelite concern revealed that the 250,000 pound cut on the vinyl material is a result of the highly increased war needs which they are forced to cope with.

Plattery chiefs here gloomily stated that the possibility seems to be that biscuits, particularly on the 45 r.p.m. speed, will have to be made with filler materials instead of the pure vinyl formerly used and that the color identification which they were employing may have to be abandoned for color changes in the labels alone.

Chances appear to be strong, in this first acute war shortage within the record industry, that only the Red Seal series will have coloring with all the rest using just the label coloring identification as formerly stated.

Victor biggies added that in expectation of the shortages their engineers have been experimenting with disks containing filler material as well as pure vinyl and declare that there is no difference in the quality of the records.

In addition to Victor, there is no doubt that other platteries will be plagued by the shortage. For one thing, Victor manufactures disks for other firms and in conformance with the cut back to them will have to reduce their output for the other concerns proportionately.

One recording firm is already negotiating with England for the purchase of 100,000 pounds of geon (a substance similar to vinyl) scrap. While the price is reputed to be as high as thirty-three cents a pound, the indications are that if they can make the purchase the company will go through with it.

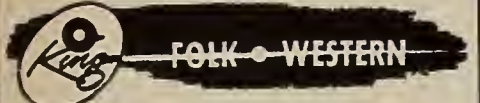

Columbia will employ radio, television, co-op newspaper advertising, and specially prepared display and point of sale material for the Kostelanetz Anniversary promotion. Mr. Kostelanetz will be featured on several CBS television and radio programs. CBS is giving its full cooperation to Columbia Records in this promotion. In addition to national activities, CBS will ask its affiliates and owned-and-operated stations to cooperate on a local level.

In the past year, as part of the Victor readjustment of talent, Sholes has released almost a dozen performers and has added, in addition to the three named above, Dolph Hewitt and Eddie Marshall.

Currently, Sholes is in Nashville to record all the country talent belonging to Victor in and around that city.

Arco Records In Bonus Disk Deal To Music Ops

NEWARK, N. J.—In a move similar to the one made by Mercury Records, Irv Berman, president of Arco Records, has announced an operator bonus plan whereby the operator will be awarded 250 free records for every 1,000 they buy; 100 for every 500 they buy and 10 for every 100.

The first two tunes that the deal will embrace are Savannah Churchill's "Can Anyone Explain" and the first Arco release by Del Casino.

The plan is slated to run through the entire month of September and Arco distribs reveal that advance comments indicate the bonus plan will be a tremendous hypo to operator business.

Jerry Simon Heads Signature Flack Dep't.

NEW YORK—Bob Thiele, president of Signature Records, this week announced the appointment of Jerry Simon as National Publicity Director for the diskery.

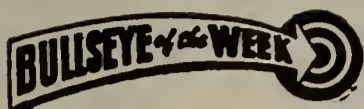

Capitol All-Out In Folk Field

CHICAGO—Capitol Records has announced that they will tee-off an all-out drive in the folk and Western music field.

The disclosure was made following a meeting held last week in Nashville and attended by the Capitol's country music biggie Dee Kilpatrick, Ken Nelson and former hillbilly chief Lee Gillette.

At the conference it was agreed that the plattery will concentrate on the rustic music field for the next few months. As part of the new campaign Kilpatrick has already signed Jimmie Skinner, previously on his own label named "Radio Artists." In signing Skinner, Kilpatrick was awarded control of 18 of the firm's old masters as well as 15 new ones that have not yet been released. Skinner has been inked as an Acuff-Rose writer.

Further, Kilpatrick has signed two singing groups, the Whipporwhills, who are currently touring the Ohio hinterlands and the Jordanaires, formerly with Decca Records and a featured harmony quintet on the WSM "Grand Ole Opry" show.

While Capitol will definitely not book talent the firm is putting their distribs and promotion men on the hunt for radio spots that can be filled by promising young Western talent from the Capitol stable.

Pinza to RCA Victor

NEW YORK—Ezio Pinza, top Metropolitan Opera star, former lead in the "South Pacific" musical, was signed to a wax pact with RCA Victor Records. The Pinza pact marks another "raid" by the Victor plattery on Columbia Records, the fifth in as many months. Pinza's pact is set to run for five years, and becomes effective when his present contract with Columbia terminates in November.

RCA Victor, Columbia Withdraw "Old Man Atom" From Market

NEW YORK—RCA Victor and Columbia Records this past week withdrew their recorded versions of "Old Man Atom," after pressure had been brought to bear on the firms complaining the song follows the "Communist Party peace line."

Executives of both organizations would not disclose their reasons for the action, but it was known that members of the Joint Committee Against Communism had made known their feelings of opposition to the song to the recording companies.

Ditty is published by Alamo Music, Inc., subsidiary firm of Hill & Range, and was penned by Vern Partlow, Los Angeles newspaper man.

Disk was originally released on the West Coast by ABC Records, and has since been recorded by a majority of major and indie recording firms. Columbia Records sometime ago bought the master from ABC and released the platter through their distributors. RCA Victor's rendition has been recorded by the Sons Of The Pioneers.

Withdrawal of the disk was greeted with mixed opinions in the trade late this past week. Many in the industry felt that the song itself bore an important message, while others went along with RCA Victor and Columbia.

New Label Bows

JERSEY CITY, N. J.—Gus Grant well known A&R man in the music field, this past week disclosed the formation of a new diskery slated to specialize in the rhythm and blues field. Label is tagged Triumph Records and will make their headquarters here. Distribution thus far covers the East and South.

VENDING OPS SEE BIG YEAR AHEAD

Big War Plant Employment of Men and Women Plus Increased Military Forces in Addition to Regular Business Employees to Create More Customers for Merchandisers

A survey taken by members of *The Cash Box* staff from among leading automatic merchandising machine operators indicates that the general belief is that this field will enjoy one of the biggest business years in its history in the months to come, beginning with Fall, 1950.

Vending machine operators were unanimous in their belief that the field would profitably feel the effect of the tremendously increased employment of men and women in war plants, as well as the fact that these employees would be earning larger salaries than ever before, since most of them are on an hourly wage basis.

The average operator also believes that, in addition to the huge employment of the war plants, the greatly increased military force will be a big sales factor for vending machines of every type.

This was proved during the past war when military posts were among the most profitable operating centers for vending machines.

At the same time, the operators point to the fact that regular business will continue along, even if somewhat modified, and that these people, being their regular customers whom they sell right along, they feel that they can still add some percentage of these latter sales to whatever increase they will enjoy from the war plants and military forces.

From all standpoints, according to what the majority of the merchandise machine operators believe, the forthcoming year should be one of the biggest in history.

Tho they have already begun to feel shortages in supplies here and there, as yet this has not halted operations to any appreciable extent. The belief continues that shortages will not drastically affect operating for some time to come.

Unless, of course, as the majority believe, this country is plunged into total war, then, the men state, they foresee the time when a great number of vendors will be without sufficient supplies and merchandise to handle non-essential business.

Generally, tho, the average automatic merchant is very optimistic about the future. He foresees it as one time when he will be able to meet and pay off the majority of the notes he now has for new equipment he has purchased and, at the same time, also believes that he will not only quickly amortize the cost of the new equipment, but will also enjoy good profits.

Automatic merchants foresee the greater majority clear of any indebtedness if the situation continues as at present and they are able to obtain merchandise and supplies.

In fact, a large number indicated that they are paying, and are willing to pay, cash for whatever machines they are buying at this time.

Most in demand are the drink dispensers and cigarette machines. Many believe that hot drink vendors, whether coffee, tea or soup, will prove tremendously profitable in many war plant locations.

Tie-ins are already being put into effect. Automatic merchants are tying in bulk merchandise vendors with their larger dispensers. Gum, candy, nuts, popcorn and cookies are most popular at this time.

One large automatic merchant explained he has had calls from some of the factory locations he now has for machines vending hot drinks and even sandwiches so as to take care of the second and third working shifts especially.

"These late evening work shifts," he explained, "are hard put to get coffee, milk, tea and even soft drinks, as well as food, because of the hours they work."

"Usually," he stated, "the average lunch room is closed at those late hours. The factory management, at the same time, gives the employees on the late shift more rest time so that, everything considered, they have been asking us to obtain machines for them which would satisfy their working crews in the late shifts especially."

Some ops are rather upset over the fact that they have found factories purchasing their own merchandisers. This was brought home by one well-known op who lost a war plant location to direct sales of the machines to this plant.

Most important, of course, and which this survey revealed, is the optimism which is running rife thruout the entire vending machine field.

Ops hope that the manufacturers will be able to continue to produce equipment in some volume and will also be able to continue to supply them with parts.

Some ops state that they have stocked more parts than ever before in their history.

Another, and very important factor, is that the average operator believes he is doing an important wartime job. He is concentrating his operations where they will prove most helpful to the war workers and the military.

As one op stated, "I don't know what the others are doing, but, I believe that everyone in the automatic merchandising industry should make it his business to help the war effort and the military in every possible fashion."

"I haven't raised the prices on my vendors," he stated, "and have also seen to it that they are located in or near war plants and the army base that we have here."

"In fact," he continues, "I have talked with the higher-ups in both the base and the factory and have told them of my intentions. They not only complimented our firm, but, have pledged themselves to help us continue on in business should supplies become difficult to obtain."

"I think," he says, "that this is the patriotic thing to do, and hope that everyone in the industry will make it his business to first help the war effort."

Spacarb Shows Hot Profits With Hot Drink Dispensers

Hot Drink Attachments Jump Volume Sales 10-25%

NEW YORK—I. Hayne Houston, president of Spacarb, Inc., declared this week that, "Location tests made during the summer have shown that where hot drink attachments are installed the volume of sales is boomed from ten to twenty-five per cent.

"While it is true that this has been a cold, wet summer, nevertheless, the terrific jump in sales volume is proof that operating hot drinks is definitely a very profitable enterprise and one

that no wide-awake automatic merchant will want to overlook."

Houston declared that the firm's stockpiles of steel are sufficient to guarantee production at the present high rate during the first half of 1951. However, he added that like everyone else who is manufacturing equipment at this time the future beyond the point of present supply is highly uncertain.

"In the last three months the Army and Navy have been gradually ousting theatres, terminals, schools as top users of cup drink and bottle vendors. Industrial locations are growing stronger and stronger every day. Another trend which is extremely marked is the one towards the use of hot drink dispensers." Houston, who is a distributor of the Mills Hot Coffee Vendor as well as of his own line of cold cup drink vendors, stated that he is highly pleased with the Mills Vendor and adds that field tests conducted by his own operations have shown the machine to be, "trouble-free and easily operated."

The Spacarb chief revealed that within thirty days he anticipates selling approximately one hundred hot drink units per month and disclosed that sales of the cold cup dispenser to the Navy are already averaging two units a day.

Pepsi Cola Adds New Size Bottle For Vendors

NEW YORK—The Pepsi Cola Company, this city, has announced the addition of a new eight ounce bottle to be used in bottle vending machines.

The firm's estimated net earnings for the past three months of this year, while they were slightly under those declared during a similar period of 1949, are a definite improvement over the first quarter when the beverage concern showed a net loss of \$100,000.

Executives of Pepsi Cola blamed the losses on disagreements between the parent company and its bottlers and declared that as these have now been settled they are confident that they will show even higher profits during the next quarter.

"Dr. Pepper" Appoints Special Vending Rep.

DALLAS, TEXAS—The Dr. Pepper Company, this city, has announced the appointment of Carl H. Boyle as special representative in charge of cup vending sales.

L. M. Green, president of the beverage firm, stated that Boyle's duties will be to build up the bulk syrup sales of the firm with vending machine operators.

Green stated that the Dr. Pepper Company has been watching the phenomenal growth of cup vendors with extreme interest and credited the gain in fountain sales for the first half of this year mainly to cup vending operations.

Boyle has been working with cup vending operators for the past two years, has addressed the N.A.M.A. on several occasions and is well known to many members of the industry; he has been with the firm since 1936.

Nut Suppliers Show Best Year Since '45

BROOKLYN, N. Y.—Sam Shuhda, president of the Shuhda Nut and Seed Company, has reported that, "This is the best year that we have had since 1945." Declaring that the season for contract roasted nuts is now at its peak Shuhda went on to add that all indications are that bulk nut vendors are going to enjoy one of the most profitable years in their history.

Shuhda's firm supplies pistachios, cashews, almonds, pumpkin seeds, chic peas and squash seeds to the trade as well as operating their own vendors. Shuhda stated that he has been adding new machines to his present routes and is "highly pleased" with the sales volume that the concern has racked up at present.

In the particular field of supplies in which the Nut and Seed company is engaged there is no difficulty in obtaining the goods since many of the items would be waste products for the farmers engaged in their production.

Shuhda's optimism in regards to the future of bulk vending closely echoes the general sentiments about this business that are being expressed throughout the industry.

Searles Mfg. Co. Quits Vending Field

CICERO, ILL.—Jack Horlock, president of the Searles Welding & Manufacturing Company, this city, has revealed that his firm has retired from the vending machine industry.

Cigar Vendors Set For Fall Boom

NEW YORK — Martin Berger, president of Cigaromat Corporation of America, this city, and Harry Weiner, vice prexy, declared this week that "Cigar vendors are now first starting to come into their own as one of the outstanding types of equipment that any operator can merchandise."

The Cigaromat executives disclosed the fact that surveys have shown that, "There are better than 175,000 locations throughout the United States which are ideal for cigar vending and which are just waiting for enterprising operators to move in with a cigar vendor."

Berger revealed that, "While the vending of single column 'one brand' cigars has been going on for almost fifteen years it was with the introduction of a vendor of diversified brands at different prices and taking any coin combination that gave the great impetus to the cigar vending field."

"Since the introduction of Cigaromat five years ago," Berger continued, "the activity in this line has become very strong and is gaining momentum at every moment."

Berger, who was formerly associated with Rowe, stated that, "Any location which now has a cigarette vendor is ideal for the placement of a cigar machine. The profits are as high as 35% and a serviceman can easily take care of forty machines in a day. In addition, the 'Humydrole' keeps the vended cigars fresher than if they were bought from a showcase window."

"This new innovation in automatic merchandising," it was stated, is one of the most interesting and lucrative to enter the vending machine picture in a long time. "Alert operators," according to Berger and Weiner, "can't afford to overlook a careful investigation of the possibilities of adding this line of equipment to their present routes."

Army Starts Candy Orders

CHICAGO—The upped demand for candy by the Armed Forces was dramatically highlighted here by the simultaneous announcement by the Bunte Brothers Candy Company that they have been awarded an Army contract for 559,590 pounds of hard candy and the statement of Lt. Col. Joseph S. Kujawski, commandant, Quartermaster Food and Container Institute for the Armed Forces, reporting that his unit is first teeing off on the procurement of candy rations to fill the needs of the services.

The statement was made during a speech by Lt. Col. Kujawski highlighting the dinner given during Candy Industry Day at the Chicago Fair. The National Confectioner's Association was in charge of the program.

Lt. Col. Kujawski stated that his unit is at present working on the procurement of 6,000,000 chewing gum tablets, 1,200,000 starch jelly bars and 3,600,000 chocolate bars. He reported that is the first of the candy requirements that his office will eventually be handling.

The Searles Company was manufacturing and distributing the Kalva 3-Way model bottle vendor. Horlock disclosed that the machine is now reverting to its patent holder, Fred Knowles, of Phoenix, Arizona. As yet, Knowles has issued no statements on his plans for the disposition of the vendor.

Cardboard Price Rises Hit Stamp Vendors

NEW YORK—Fred Ostrow, sales promotion manager of the Flatto Manufacturing Company, this city, announced that the fifty per cent rise in the cost of the cardboard used in enfolded the stamps dispensed by the Flatto vendors is causing the firm to hold up orders until they can notify their distributors and larger operators of the new price adjustment.

"Furthermore, Ostrow stated, "the cardboard manufacturers have notified the firm that in the future they will bill the stamp vendor concern at 'prices prevailing at the time of delivery.'" Ostrow stated that while the difference is not yet serious (it involves only one per cent of the total profit, so far) there is no assurance of what the future will bring and no guarantee possible due to the wording of the directive.

Ostrow declared that more and more operators are going into the vending of stamps due to the ease with which this business can be conducted. "A route of as many as seventy-five machines can be serviced out of a light briefcase carried by the route man. Top locations, drug stores and stationery stores, show a good profit to the operator and are easily managed by him," he added.

Universal Match Wins Safety Citation

ST. LOUIS, MO.—S. M. Rosenberg, vice-president of the Universal Match Corporation, this city, revealed that his firm has been awarded a commendation from the National Board of Fire Underwriters for its safety program.

The commendation was for Universal's sponsorship of book match covers stressing hotel fire safety, as part of the American Hotel Association's "Don't Smoke In Bed" educational campaign.

A. Bruce Bielaski, assistant general manager, National Board of Fire Underwriters, in a brief ceremony held in his offices in New York City, declared that Universal's safety program is "contributing substantially to the national effort to halt unnecessary loss of lives and destruction of property by fire."

The series of book match covers which gained the commendation for Universal contained six different designs, each pointing out the dangers and hazards of smoking in bed.

Cig. Op. In Rotary Public Relations Tie

COLTON, CALIF.—Arch Riddell, Jr., secretary of the Harmony Cigarette Service, Inc., this city, and Barney Regan, Los Angeles representative of the P. Lorillard Tobacco Co. cooperated here in a public relations tie-in for the Rotary Club of Pasadena.

At a recent "Automatic Merchandising Day" held in the Club Harmony installed one of the Electro's they operate in this vicinity and stocked it completely with Old Gold cigarettes that were donated by the Lorillard concern.

The entire proceeds of the cigarettes vended by the machine were donated to the Rotary Club's Welfare Fund.

FALL BIZ TO BOOM — BUT WAR PROBLEMS GREATER

Buying Of All Equip. To Keep Factories Rushed. Ops Look For Greatly Increased Play. Stepped Up Military Draft To Draw Off Labor. Scarcities Of Materials To Slow Up Production.

NEW YORK—Every indication points to September as the lead-off month for a boom the likes of which the industry hasn't seen in many years. However, at the same time, experts predict that taking September as a starting point, war and manpower problems will also become greater from month to month.

Manufacturers of coin operated equipment enjoyed the greatest summer sales in their histories. Music, amusement games and vendors all sold as rapidly as the factories were able to run them off their production lines. And yet, as tremendous was the demand for equipment, all know that starting with September, the demand for new equipment always jumps as operators thruout the country begin setting in indoor locations for the forthcoming fall and winter seasons. The reason for the great amount of buying this summer is attributed to several factors. The war situation is one; the exceptional quality of music machines and vendors, and the wonderful play appeal of the games is the other.

Altho manufacturers of music machines and vendors expect to continue with their present models (with the addition of Rock-Ola's "Rocket 50") orders on hand at the present moment, plus those that will be placed in the next few months, are sufficient to keep these plants busy day and night. In this division it's a question of producing enough equipment to satisfy the demand.

The game manufacturers state they have plans for the production of new exciting games that surpass anything seen in this industry. They too will be faced with the problem of being able to continue unhindered from war controls, materials problems and with sufficient manpower. However, all plan on going right ahead to the limit of their capabilities.

Naturally, with operator demand for machines, wholesalers will share in the expected business boom.

From the operator's point of view, having had experience from the last war to guide him, it is of utmost importance that he have sufficient and top machines to take advantage of the general conditions that will prevail from now on. Summer collections in music have been good compared with

previous years, and all look forward to greatly increased play. Games have done exceptionally well these past months, and operators are preparing for a record breaking fall and winter.

Automatic merchandise operators also look for greatly increased business. In addition to added collections on their regular locations, a great many new locations are now available, and many more will be opened.

However, while business will zoom, there is the other side of the picture to consider. Starting in September, the military draft will be stepped up, taking a great many thousands out of civilian life (the draft will be much more intense as the months go by). The many billions of dollars voted for defense preparation will begin flowing into industry with the opening of the Fall Season.

While all these changes will mean added coins for the operators, it will also cause some adverse conditions to spring up. From the operators side, many of them will be taken into the military, and some of their mechanics may leave for defense jobs.

From the viewpoint of the manufacturer, their problems are manifold. With prices of everything that goes into the manufacture of machines going up, there will be increases in the selling prices of equipment. With shortages of materials prevalent now, and sure to become more and more so; with manpower a possibility of becoming scarce; and with the possibility of the government taking over factories for war work either entirely or in part; it can be predicted that the amount of coin operated machines that will be forthcoming in the near future is sure to be limited.

Everyone in the business, from the factory to the operator, has had the opportunity to reflect upon the future, and the progressive firms have taken advantage of the warnings to bolster their businesses. The factories can do no more than supply as much equipment as possible. The operators can set themselves up for whatever may happen in the months to come so that they can remain active.

The coin machine industry, therefore, looks to the coming Fall and Winter seasons with mixed feelings . . . but all anticipate a business boom.

Congressman Cox (D.-Ga.) Suggests Bigger Slot Jackpots

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A sidelight on the discussions that took place in the House Rules Committee regarding the slot machine bill was reported by the columnist Robert S. Allen this week.

Rep. Eugene Cox (D. Ga.) and member of this committee offered a solution all his own for dealing with the bell machine. Allen reported a verbatim discussion that took place on the legislation in the Rules Committee as follows:

Rep. McSweeney (D.-O.)—"Do you think it is possible to legislate on morality?"

Rep. Rogers (D.-Fla.), strong supporter of the bill—"No, I don't."

McSweeney—"Well, isn't that what you are trying to do here?"

Rogers—"Not at all. What we are trying to do with this bill is wipe out the \$2,000,000,000 slot machine racket."

Cox—"Isn't the entertainment they get worth it?"

Rogers—"That is far from the point of this discussion."

Cox—"Not at all. Instead of curbing slot machines, I think we ought to compel operators of the machines to provide bigger jackpots. That's the way to handle this matter."

Cox, by the way, was the only committee member to vote against the bill.

N. J. Employment Rises - Earnings Higher

TRENTON, N. J.—A boon to New Jersey operators was the report made this week by the State Department of Labor and Industry to the effect that non-agricultural employment in the state has risen to 1,591,800 during July, and should show added increase during August.

The number of workers, excluding farmers, increased 5,200 above the June total, and was 44,300 more than in July 1949.

The department figured average weekly earnings of industrial production workers was \$60.74 during the month, an increase of \$4.19 weekly since a year ago.



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Slot Bill Passes House — Goes To Senate For Action

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The House voted on Monday, August 28, to outlaw interstate shipment of slot machines, except to states where they are legal.

The bill had already passed the Senate, but goes back there for action on House amendments.

The House specifically refused to permit the operations of slots in armed services officers' and enlisted men's clubs.

If the Senate passes the bill, it then will go to the White House for the President's signature (as we go to press, Friday, September 1, no action had been taken as yet). It is figured it will take from two to three weeks to make this bill a law if all vote favorably on it.

Twenty congressmen voted against the bill, with a number of others stating that they supported it for political reasons "just like I'd vote against sin" stated Boyd Tackett of Ark.

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Ristaucrat '45' Phono Brings Profits From Rentals

APPLETON, WIS.—Joe Cohen, top executive of Ristaucrat, Inc., this city, claims that the operators have found a gold mine for their "Ristaucrat 45" phono. "It is ideally suited for rentals with clubs and social groups," stated Cohen, "proving a definite source of revenue.

"Throughout the South in particular, operators from as far down as New Orleans have been enthusiastic with the results that have accrued from these rentals.

"The same reports have come from New York's 'Chippy' Maltz of Ristaucrat Distributors of New York, in addition its acceptance in that area in drug stores, ice cream parlors, luncheonettes, etc."

Cohen continued, "There are still a few distributing territories available, and we suggest that distributors communicate with us immediately as they won't last long."

The factory is working day and night to supply its distributors, Cohen stated. "It is surprising how rapidly the operator took to this small, low priced phonograph," said Cohen. "After experimenting with a few machines, they've found that their collections are exceptionally fine, and that the machine can be amortized in short order."

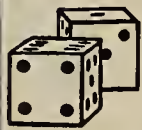

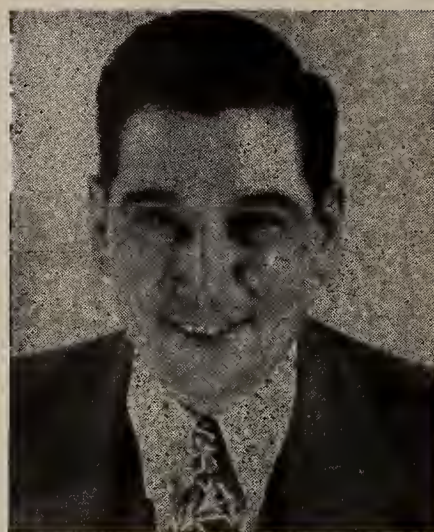

Market Confusion Grows In Zinc, Copper, Aluminum, Etc.

Metals Used In Manufacture Of Coin Machines Getting Scarcer And Prices Going Up

NEW YORK—Big industrial purchasing agents reported that the confused market conditions in non-ferrous metals became more scrambled this week than at any time since the last war.

New peak premium prices were asked by speculators offering scarce zinc, copper and secondary aluminum. In addition smelters said thousands of tons of imported copper scrap were now held off the market, further increasing copper shortages.

In peak prices cited, big galvanizers in this area were asked as high as twenty-five cents per pound for zinc, by sellers taking advantage of tight supply situations of primary refiners.

Non-ferrous foundries said demands for scrap aluminum were skyrocketing because of increased production orders for aircraft, electronic and communications equipment. Some plants here have started to work night shifts and Saturdays, but they fear incoming metals may not be adequate for these stepped-up schedules.

A 2½c premium on copper is being paid, on the spot orders, above so-called official domestic prices, according to buyers. Buyers seeking conversion deals, for refining scrap copper electrolytically, are having difficulty finding electrolytic refining capacity open for such orders. Copper scrap is available from Japan, Europe and South Africa it was stated, but buyers are urgently asking action by Congress to lift the duty.

It is reported that military authorities are studying the scarcities of materials available to war plant con-

tractors. Where production may be held up because of such scarcities, it is expected that reports will be sent to military procurement officials in Washington. So far, many such shortages have been eased by transferring scarce materials from reserve inventories intended for civilian product uses.
