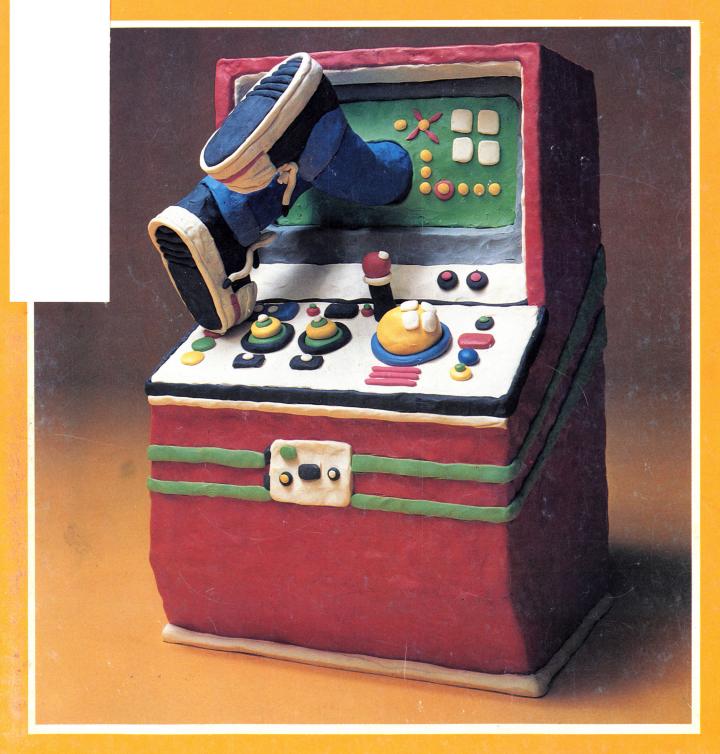

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### From the Editor

It seems like every time you turn the TV set on, read the newspaper, or turn the radio on, all news you see, read, plus hear is bad news. Admittedly, bad news sells. But why so much emphasis on the bad news by the national media? Surely good news sells, also. Perhaps it is to attract more attention and thereby gain more readers, viewers, and listeners. 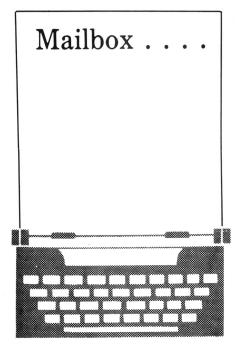
2. The problem of "gray area" equipment is affecting all levels of the industry. It is because of these pseudo amusement devices, that major conflict has arisen within the AMOA and between major games manufacturers. These one-armed bandits in disguise are also presenting problems at the local level. Many industry observers rightfully feel that legislative action against gray area equipment may end up including pure amusement games as well.

3. Ultra high interest rates and runaway inflation are putting a pinch on everyone's finances. From the largest manufacturers to the smallest operator, everyone is going to feel the pinch. Long term financing is almost obsolete. Yet in order to survive, operators have to keep buying new equipment. A great many operators are going to find themselves in a financial dilemma that they are not equipped to handle.

On the other side of the coin, there's a lot more good news out there.

- 1. Operator revenues and profits are up. Amusement operators are making more money than ever before. Better equipment has made for better earnings.
- 2. Pinball is making a very strong comeback after suffering a mild setback last year. Fifty-cent play will become a reality in 1981.
- 3. Video is as strong as ever. American-made games such as *Battlezone*, *Defender*, *Berzerk*, *Star Castle*, and *Spectar* are all doing exceptionally well. It's going to be another great year for video.
- 4. More and more people are playing amusement games. National industry studies have shown that the player population is steadily increasing and is showing no signs of slowing down. A major contributing factor to this trend is the increasing popularity of consumer electronic games.
- 6. The Amusement Operators Expo has become a reality. The AOE is coming back to New Orleans (March 12-14) for the second staight year. This operator-oriented trade show will again feature a hard hitting seminar program focusing in on all the various legal, economic, and technical problems facing the nation's operators. To stay ahead in the '80s we suggest you come to New Orleans in March.
- 7. This is PLAY METER's annual Directory Issue. The Directory section in this issue is removeable and can be used as a handy reference source throughout the year. Use it with our best wishes for the best year you ever had. May all your news be good news!

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### Pool tables' 'critical issue' the cost and availability of slate

Pool table manufacturers entered 1981 faced with a potential shortage of slate, a chief ingredient in the tables. Some table producers in America had slowed or stopped production for some periods of the last few months of 1980. All of those contacted by PLAY METER said they foresaw a price rise on the table, following "substantial" hikes in the raw material cost.

Depending on the material supplier, the cost of slate was rising by 25 to 35 percent, said one manufacturing official, although negotiations are periodically made on price of slate. The problem arose out of northern Italy, where the main quarry sources of slate are found.

The problem was compounded by Italy's steep inflation rate, the shortage of qualified labor to work in the quarries, the allegedly limited natural supply of the raw material (which has comparatively little mining activity in the United States), and recent strikes into "bad veins" of

poor quality slate in Italian quarries, said various coin-op industry sources.

Competitive bidding against the coin-op industry for the table material, as by department store marketers of home-use tables, also apparently contributes to the hiked price of available slate.

Richard Simon, executive vice president of U.S. Billiards, compared this economic situation to the problem of energy sources. He termed it a "worldwide bidding war" for the material which also sees use in the construction industry for fireplaces, blackboards, tiles, and so on.

He added that he was confident of his own long-term supplier and had built up sizeable inventories of slate for the Amityville, New York pool table manufacturer.

Others of the major table makers saw no difficulty in their near-future acquisition of slate—but the price increase may soar "geometrically upward" in 1981, as one put it.

Some table manufacturers have had production slowdowns when slate appeared in short supply

#### **Cartels**

Some suggested the problem of higher prices may be created by a monopolistic "cartel" of 26 companies running the quarries south of Genoa, Italy. Allegedly, new quarries have been opened at San Remo, where there lies "high-quality slate for years to come." The Ligurian slate syndicate (Consorzio Ardesiaco Ligure) in that area reputedly controls 60 percent of the slate sold—with the supposed aim being the standardization of quality of this export.

Once the slate is mined and ready for sale by the several companies, "it is phenomenal how close the pricing is," said one source who wished not to be identified. He suggested the asking price for the raw product is "fixed" in a way that is unlawful in the U.S. economy.

But any alternative material will be costly to come by, judged U.S. Billiards' Simon and other firms' representatives. And if an alternative material were developed, Simon commented, "you have the psychological factor of telling a guy he's playing on something other than slate. He may not do it."

Irving Kaye Co. partner Howard Kaye said, "There's no way to know if it's a real shortage or not." But a shortage to the American manufacturers may be felt acutely in the first quarter of 1981, he indicated. If, in fact, the available raw material is running out in Italy, then the price increase by the supplier may be "justified," he said.

Quarries in the Fontanabuono area, a valley flanking the Gulf of Tigullo, where the slate is mined, are leased from the Italian government. It appears the shortage is not with the fossil material but rather with labor to harvest the resource. The Italians' social welfare system apparently makes it more appealing to take state-paid sick leaves than to work the strenuous job of a quarry worker, said one observer.

While the price rise for other materials and transportation are added inflation factors for the pool table, an independent source estimated the coming increase from



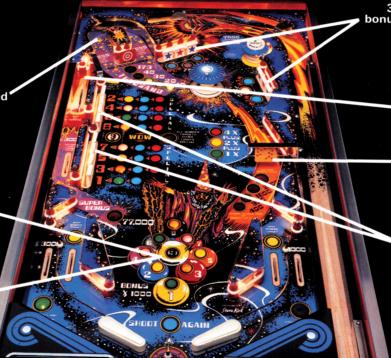
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©1980. Stern Electronics, Inc. All rights reserved. slate prices alone at \$100 for the operator buyer of a table. (Manufacturers themselves declined to estimate the projected table price increase at year's end.)

Mark Struhs, marketing director at Dynamo Corp. termed the slate price rise "incredible...and projections indicate there will be a drastic increase next year." Struhs said he saw no effect on the demand for tables, however.

#### Effects on an operator

While price is "the most critical issue we face," said Charles Milhem, president of The Valley Company, he analyzed the operator's position in a time of rising table cost this way: "From the operator's point of view, the value of his existing tables will increase — re-sale value will increase— to where there are some benefits to him.'

Over the long term, tables will retain more "intrinsic value," in other words.

The strategy of the table operator should be to go to 50-cent play at this point in time when there is cogent reason to do so, he suggested. Valley, as other manufacturers are coming to do, is shipping its tables set for 50-cent play. The operator will have to take active steps to change back to quarter-per-play.

The point was made that slate of the smaller dimensions is more readily available, but that the popular movement in pool tables is to the larger models, requiring larger dimensions of slate—therefore the more costly raw product in their manufacture.

Milhem suggested the operator stress the larger table, however, because "players want it," and it can be a better draw for 50-cent play than the small billiard tables.

Coupled with this, however, must be the price-conscious fact that "there has been some disjointment" in the slate cost at the larger-cut sizes.

Alan Schafer, vice president for finance at The Valley Co., said "the burden" in this pinch is on the manufacturers. Valley had required some three weeks' plant shutdown over a four-month period, he said. But he foresaw a harder shortfall on "the smaller manufacturers."

Echoed around the coin-op tables industry was the complaint that pool table production has frequently been "behind" with the material shortage.

For the operator, though, the tables remain "a super investment,"

said Simon at U.S. Billiards.

"Pool tables are slow selling, although their income has increased somewhat," said Simon at U.S. Billiards. "Even if there's a forced price increase, they're still a super investment because of their low service requirements and excellent income," he continued.

An irony in the picture for American manufacturers was noted by Schafer at Valley. One domestic source of slate, a Pennsylvania quarry, was closed several years ago by the U.S. OSHA agency for onthe-job safety.

In addition to the available foreign raw material's cost comes the cost of transportation to U.S. manufacturing facilities such as Valley's at Bay City, Michigan; Irving Kaye's at Stamford, Connecticut; and Dynamo's at Grand Prairie, Texas.

Alternative natural materials, such as marble or granite, are judged by the manufacturers not to have slate's stability. The other rocks are less brittle, say the producers of pool tables. But the cost hike in slate has made manufacturers take another look at alternatives—which one firm reports has cost half a million dollars to research as viable table-top material, in the past 15 years or so.

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### Jukebox fee hiked...

Commissioner Berg: "My concern was for the small jukebox operator."

Royalties society official: "The rate from 1987 on... will increase significantly."

The AMOA's stand on the jukebox licensing fee issue took its most severe setback December 10 when the Copyright Royalty Tribunal resolved to fix fees to jukebox operators at the \$50 level, phased in over a seven-year period, after which the fee given an "inflationary adjustment"—doubtlessly upward—to be based on the change in the consumer price index over that period.

The AMOA, in arguing the fees issue before the CRT in 1980, stood for no increase in the present \$8 per box fee. The association, through its attorneys, won a Pyrrhic victory only—in that the \$8 fee will remain in effect for 1981. On January 1, 1982, however, the fee set by the CRT will rise to \$25 per jukebox; as of 1984, the \$50 fee level will go into effect and last until 1987, at which time a rate will be determined to go into effect with the inflation adjustment included.

The AMOA issued no comment on the decision of December 10, pending its publication in the Federal Register, which had to be done by December 31. The association (or any other party in the matter) had until January 10, however, to appeal the CRT action to the U.S. Court of Appeals, noted AMOA Executive Vice President Leo Droste.

Quick to comment on the CRT ruling were officers of the three performing rights societies— ASCAP, BMI, and SESAC. Each was pleased with the fee structure, which will produce copyright royalties for performers registered with their agencies, and the only discordant note was a comment from ASCAP General Counsel Bernard Korman that, if BMI had joined with the other two in their stand for a \$70 annual fee, the levy "might wellhave started in 1981. Otherwise he said the jukebox operators had "fared very well. Their counsel (Nicholas Allen) got a very good result, with a very weak case."

ASCAP's Korman also commented, "The operators and establishment owners can well afford these modest rates."

AMOA's position before the CRT in month's-long hearings was that a decline in jukebox activity over the past few years should convince the arbitrating panel to freeze the fee at \$8

A public vote by the CRT disclosed a shift from a scale of \$30 in 1982, \$60 in 1984 to the lower scale approved by commissioners Berg, Brennan, and Coulter.

Commissioner Mary Lou Berg explained, in a conversation with PLAY METER, her motion to reduce fees from the \$30/\$60 level. "My concern was and remains for the small jukebox operator. I tried to approach that problem with a graduated scale."

Her original proposal, which found no support among the other commissioners, was for a three-tiered scale: one fee set for operators of less than 60 jukeboxes, a midrange fee for the operators with more than 60 but less than a given number, and the highest fee per box for the largest set of operators.

"There was no initial support for this, but I continue to believe that it is the most fair and equitable approach," said Berg. Without support for this scheme, she motioned for the \$25/\$50 fee phase-in which passed.

Of the decision as it stands, she said, "I'm sure there will be an appeal. All our work this year is precedental in nature. In any cse, you can't please all parties." She noted that a CRT decision on distribution of cable television royalties is already under appeal.

Other commissioners could not be reached for comment, or declined to elaborate on the decision until it became a part of the record in the Federal Register. Berg, however, conceded that the fees set were in the form of a compromise within the commission.

The fees were not, however, a compromise between the differing amounts of \$30 per box, sought

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### copyright owners 'pleased'

by the BMI, and \$70 sought by ASCAP, she stated; the fact that \$50 falls directly between those sums was "coincidental," she said.

At BMI, General Counsel Ed Chapin on being told the CRT's decision, said, "We're generally pleased we got close to \$30 in the initial \$25 fee, and that it is raised from \$8."

For SESAC, which received some \$60,000 in 1980 as its share of approximately \$1 million collected from jukebox fees, its Vice President Albert Ciancimino said he had a mixed reaction that there was not a higher fee immediately. To the extent the Tribunal at least initially decided to allow \$25 in 1982 and '83, we are somewhat disappointed—but I'm pleased the Tribunal is in effect phasing in a \$50 rate, an apparently realistic figure.

"I think the rate from 1987 on is satisfactory to us and ASCAP because it will increase substantially," Ciancimino added.

He also noted AMOA General Counsel Allen's "difficult row to hoe" in the case which resulted in a "compromise," in the SESAC officer's term. Ciancimino said Allen presented "a good argument to the Tribunal to phase in the higher figure."

He added that, although the royalties society sees the new fee scales as a "more realistic rate," it views a higher fee justified by the years before 1978, when the jukebox royalty fee first went into effect.

The effect of higher fees on jukebox sales may well be depressive, a spokesman for Rock-Ola Manufacturing said. "Any increase has got to affect the jukebox operator's philosophy," the officer said, but he declined to comment at length on the CRT ruling. (Rock-Ola personnel gave time and testimony in the hearing process before the CRT in Washington, D.C. during 1980, supporting the case of the operator and the AMOA.)

The added cash for performing artists was argued by ASCAP on the basis of "marketplace analysis," or what jukebox operators and the performing rights organizations would theoretically negotiate face-to-face, if there were no Copyright Tribunal involved.

Last year, the major rights organizations approximately divided the \$1 million collections in equal parts, with five percent going to SESAC for its members. That sum was based on 1978 collections.

The licensing agency for the jukebox is the Licensing Division of the U.S. Copyright Office, Library of Congress. That division's chief, Walter D. Sampson, Jr., appealed to jukebox operators to comply with the requirements to register. Renewal applications were to be mailed in the last week of December to operators licensed in 1980—135,000 machines. Also, his office seeks "potential operators," who are not known to be jukebox operators but who show up on the larger U.S. cities' lists of licensees for vending.

Sampson said he expects to mail a total of 500,000 forms asking compliance with the registration fee requirement. That is the estimated total number of jukeboxes in operation. (However, the results of the 1980 Play Meter Annual Subscriber Poll showed slightly over 320,000 phonographs in actual operation in the United States.)

Collections from fees at late 1980 were nearly matching, or slightly exceeding the \$1 million-plus revenue from 1979 collections.

The licensing division chief told PLAY METER, however, "We get calls from operators saying, 'the guy across the street isn't licensed—what are you going to do about it?'"

The Copyright Office itself has no enforcement powers; compliance with the licensing law is, effectively, voluntary. Action against those in non-compliance is left up to the performing rights societies to take to court. That continues to be done, as operators in alleged non-compliance

are found by agents of BMI and ASCAP.

In 1981, a computer was scheduled to be utilized by the Licensing Division. It will pair operators licensed in 1980 with those returning the renewal form by the January 31, 1981 deadline—to produce a printout of potential unlicensed machines in operation.

Sampson in October told PLAY METER that follow-up mailings to operators licensed in 1979 produced a number of responses of "out of business."

The question apparently had not been settled by early 1981, but a measure of enforcement rests in Washington, beyond the Copyright Office's door. By one observer's interpretation, copyright infringement as defined by the 1978 law is a federal offense. It mainly provided protection for the copyright owner to take civil action in court, but technically the U.S. Justice Department can prosecute alleged violators. While such action has not been reported, Justice Department officials have investigated the possibility, said Sampson.

As a matter of record in the Copyright Office, fewer jukeboxes were licensed in 1979 (136,000) than in 1978 (144,368).

The funds taken in by the License Division are invested, and after the operating expenses of the division are deducted, the remainder is turned over to the Copyright Royalty Tribunal to distribute to the performing rights societies.

The chairman of the CRT, Clarence James, declined to comment for publication on the reasoning of a particular per-box dollar amount assessment until the Tribunal's actions were registered in the federal record.

The ruling was the resolution of the verbal battle that began in hearings during spring 1980. With an AMOA appeal possible, the end to the issue was not yet in sight as the new year approached.



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### **Addictive New Solid State Counter Game from U.S.B.**



An intriguing new solid-state counter game is now being field-tested by U.S. Billiards and should be mass-marketed early in August. Called 'React', the compact item (measuring 7½" x 7½" x 9") offers players the challenge of measuring their reaction response level at five tries for a quarter.

The idea is simple, but much fun. You pop in your quarter and wait until the LED number appears on the game's display. Then you immediately push the button on the end of the cable to stop the number (which runs from zero to wherever, measuring your reaction ability in thousandths of a second). That's it, but it's like eating peanuts. There's an addictive nature to the game and you keep wanting to try again and again.

Naturally enough, there's a competitive nature to the game. Bar patrons will surely want to match reaction ability with their friends (there are many games they will probably make up, including booze-testing, for example, harking back to the old Booze Barometer games).

The real fun, however, is simply improving your score. Each "push" of the button stops your clock. Then after five tries, all those thousandths of a second are added up and displayed as your final talley. If you jump the gun and push before the numbers start to roll, your game is invalid.

Skill is amplified on 'React' due to a random timer. There may be as much as ten seconds (maybe more) before a number pops up and you have to push. Then, the next number just might appear instantaneously. You have to concentrate, and if you're talking to someone at the same time, you damage your chances of making a good score (scores are measured from "Lightning" all the way down to "Small Snail" depending on your speed.

The game can be purchased along with a free promotion pack. The pack includes ten table tent cards plus a master score sheet (see photo). Idea is for the location to register the best score of the week and award a prize, if it so desires. U.S. Billiards' Sales Director Len Schneller advised RePlay that a prize program may be forthcoming which will include watches, pocket computers and the like. Meantime, if a location wants to put anything of its own choosing up as a prize (where legal), it's up to him and/or his operator.

Playing for a prize is always great fun, but this factor shouldn't detract from the 'React' game's basic appeal. It's fun all by itself. (One trade wag said it's a great item for the hyper-nervous. "They're so jumpy, they're bound to get great scores.")

The presentation of the piece is top shelf. The steel cabinet feels like a safe, and while light enough to carry under one arm, it's heavy enough to need two hands to pick up. In the event some wayward customer just may want to "take the 'React' home with him," U.S. Billiards has a hasp on the back for chain-mounting.

Inside, the game has one logic board, two plug-in wire harnesses, a meter and the coin acceptor. Aside from the cash pan at the bottom, that's the works. Priced roughly at one-quarter the cost of a new video game, Schneller says tests have shown the piece to "give a better return on investment."

"The operator who really wants to entertain his customers has got to put a 'React', two or even three 'React' games into his bars," said Schneller. "I wish long life to the game and I believe it's there. But when moving time comes, how sweet it is to unlock the chain, pick it up and run it down the block on the front seat of your car. I think U.S. Billiards has one heck of a money-earner here and I invite everyone to contact us or their local U.S. Billiards distributor and find out how to cash in on what might be called the 'React Craze'. This could be that 'mighty mite'," he added.



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### Five Years Ago in Play Meter's Pages...

January, 1976

This month in PLAY METER's past, the gold lettering of the cover flashed out: "1976 Directory Issue." That was the introduction to the most complete guide available, listing all the manufacturers, distributors, and various support companies that served the coin-operated amusement machines business.

Five years later, the Industry Directory continues to expand, and it is incorporated in the present issue

Coinman of the Month, January of 1976, was Jon Brady of Brady Distributing, Charlotte, North Carolina. That state's coin-ops were otherwise prominent in the news pages that month.

With the involvement of Milton Hobbs, president of the N.C. Coin Operators Association, a potential \$500,000 in new pool table business was "found"—after the state alcoholic beverage control board was convinced to re-classify certain

locations with pool tables as not being "pool halls." Business then opened up for cafes and restaurant locations in North Carolina.

In Michigan, a new law had gone into effect that made winning free plays on pinball legal for the first time since 1945, PLAY METER reported ....United Billiards Inc. was formally changing its name to U.B.I. Inc., recognizing that "we are no longer solely a billiards company," said its President Scott Daddis....Meadows Games of Sunnyvale, California had ended its second year with strong growth records. It had four videos in the works for January, 1976 distribution....Fletcher Autovend Ltd., a British firm, was preparing to distribute "honky-tonk" coin-op player pianos equipped for stereo.

In other new product news, January, 1976: Playmatic S.A. of Spain was introducing its *Fantasy* and *Fairy* flipper games to the U.S. market....The video Q-and-A game *Trivia* was bowed-in by Ramtek....

Bally was debuting its Bow and Arrow four-player flipper....Toledo two-player pinball game was coming from Williams Electronics....Chicago Coin came out with star appeal in its Hollywood pingame....And Play Master, billiards table manufacturer, had introduced a new concept, "black light billiards," based on the idea of using specially treated balls and cloth that react to ultraviolet light.

Play Meter Publisher Ralph C. Lally II editorialized in the five-yearsago issue: "We begin the second volume of PLAY METER and the new year with a great deal of anticipatory eagerness because we think 1976 offers some rather interesting changes and challenges, not only for us, but for the entire coin-operated amusements industry.' The next year was predicted to be a "buyers market" for the operator, with many new manufacturers entering the field, armed with microprocessor applications to new games.

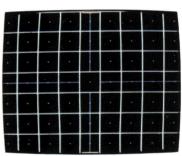

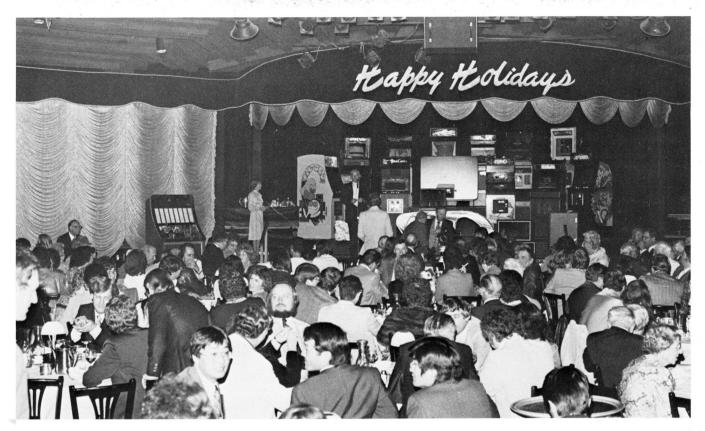

### Advance Automatic previews

Arcade and route operators tested their skills and evaluated the earning potential of thirty video games and nine pinball machines featured at the show. Music filled the dinner club while operators were also able to inspect other machines, including a bill changer, cigarette dispenser, and a hot and cold drink machine.

Pinball machines manufactured by Bally, Stern, and Williams were available for play while the companies producing the video games available at the show included Atari, Cinematronics, Centuri, Data East, Exidy, Gremlin, Nichibutsu, Stern, Universal, and Williams. Numerous representatives from these companies attended the show and answered operators' questions about the new games.

The large number of games at the

show gave operators a challenging selection, and one route operator commented, "These days, there's so many games, you don't know what to get." But in general, the games most often mentioned as potentially profitable were the pinball machines Xenon, Flash Gordon, and Black Knight and the video games Defender, Berzerk, Space Tactics, Pac-Man, and Battlezone.

Advance Automatic Sales President Chet McMurdie welcomed the group and thanked operators for their support, saying, "We're only as successful as our customers, and we are genuinely appreciative of the support of the operators. It's a privilege to serve you."

McMurdie put the crowd at ease with his lighthearted remarks, but he also spoke seriously about the coinop business and gave some advice to operators.

He pointed out that one game,

Asteroids, averaged \$250 in collections a week and said, "If you multiply that around the country, there's been \$500 million worth of business on that particular game. There's never been a movie made that's grossed \$500 million. That should give us pride in the success of our business and some idea of the extent of our business."

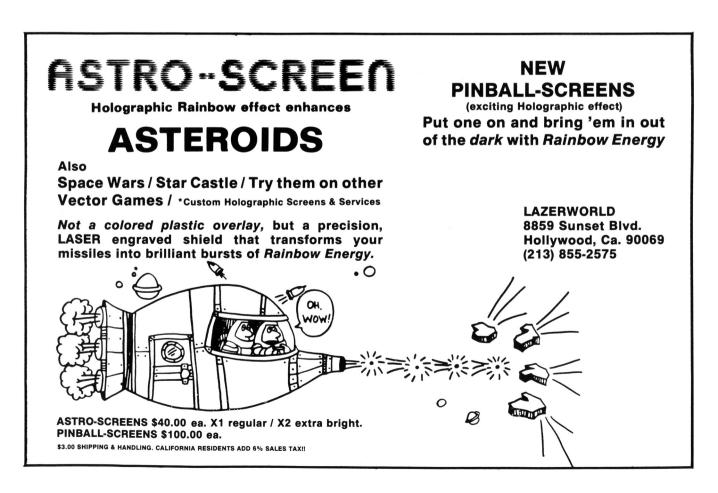
While acknowledging the success of the industry, McMurdie also pointed to the tremendous costs involved as well, such as maintenance, interest rates, and labor strikes. Considering these costs, he told the audience: "It's time to do something about improving collections."

"It's a tragedy when people are making less that \$75 a week in collections," McMurdie continued. "It's time to grow up and see these games as an investment. Don't think it's out of line to get front money or a percentage of the equipment, and get a faster return. And I think you will be saving a lot of money if you can pay for equipment in six months."

Finally, McMurdie suggested that people in the business take a harder look at the options other investors use to make money. "You should find out about depreciation," he said. "You should find out about tax advantages. Sometimes we lose track of this."

"We're riding on a high in this industry right now and we should take advantage of these opportunities," McMurdie concluded.

Following McMurdie's talk, Will Laurie, office manager and vice president of Advance Automatic Sales conducted the drawing for door prizes which included such items as a Panasonic color television set, Canon cameras, and Swiss clocks.

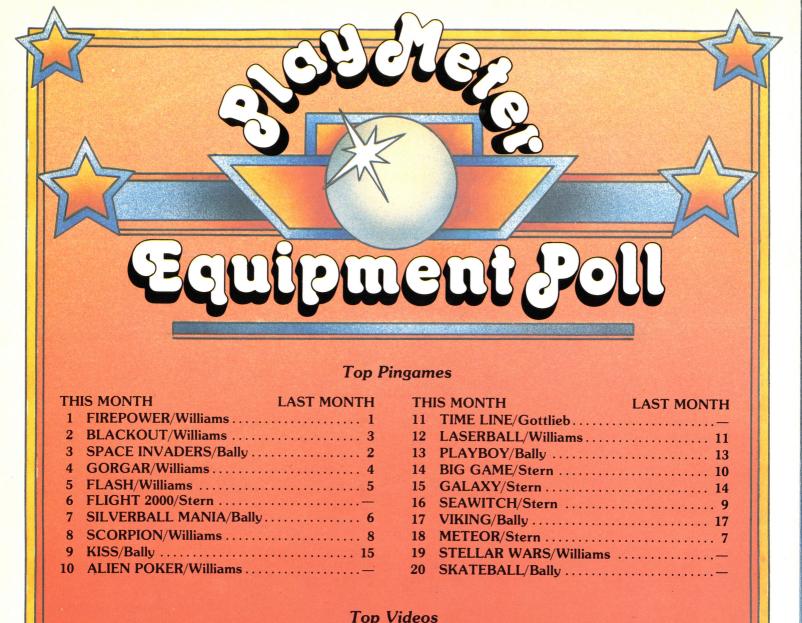

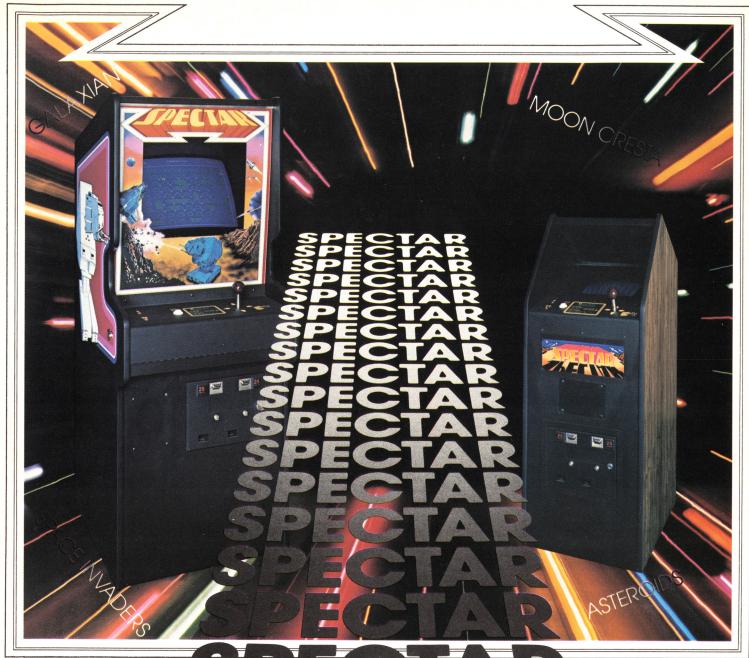

### Nintendo opens on Broadway

NEW YORK — Nintendo of America, Inc. has recently appointed Alan D. Stone and Ronald J. Judy as marketing managers for its newly established U.S. headquarters in New York, according to Minoru Arakawa, president of Nintendo.

Stone and Judy will be in charge of the marketing and distribution operations for Nintendo's full line of electronic video games sold in the United States and Canada. Both will work out of the New York office. Prior to joining Nintendo New York, Stone and Judy were representing Nintendo's products in the U.S through Far East Video, Inc. in Washington state.

Arakawa stated that, "due to the favorable response to our products in the U.S. over the past 18 months, and a high number of incoming orders, we have established local offices and staff to provide fast, efficient and closer communication between our company and our customers, to be able to serve their needs directly."

Judy indicated that Nintendo will soon be distributing products from distribution facilities on both the east and west coasts. He also said that there is now a parts and service center on the East Coast to serve the entire U.S. and a West Coast office is being planned for the near future.

Nintendo of America's electronic video games are being sold by distributors around the U.S.

### 75% Game Plan stock buy betters financial picture

On October 31, 1980, pursuant to a stock sale agreement Interscience Systems, Inc. and Summit Systems, Inc. each purchased 37½ percent of the issued and outstanding capital stock of Game Plan, Incorporated from AES Technology Systems, Inc. AES now holds 25 percent of the issued and outstanding capital stock of Game Plan.

Game Plan's development, manufacture, and marketing of slot machines, video amusement games, and pinballs will be continued "substantially unchanged," said the stock buvers.

In a letter to Game Plan's suppliers, explaining the stock transaction, its President Darrel G. McCollough wrote: "Our program to return financial strength to Game Plan is continuing in a positive direction."

He also said a new color video game, *Intruder*, is in the works, "has field tested well on location and will be available for shipment in early January."

In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1980, Game Plan had revenues of approxi mately \$8.1 million and a net loss of approximately \$5.5 million.

Prior to the closing of the stock purchase, AES contributed to the capital of Game Plan substantially all of Game Plan's indebtedness to AES, amounting to approximately \$10.5 million.

The amount paid by each of Summit and Interscience for the shares of stock acquired was \$750,000—of which \$281,250 was paid in cash and the balance was paid by a non-interest bearing promissory note secured by a pledge of the shares of Game Plan stock that were purchased. Cash paid by Summit and Interscience was obtained from working capital.

Along with the stock purchase, Interscience, Summit and AES entered into a separate loan and security agreement with Game Plan for the loan of up to \$750,000 from Summit, up to \$750,000 from Interscience, and AES' loan of up to \$500,000 to Game Plan on or before March 15, 1981.

The stock sale agreement provides that in the event any Game Plan shareholder is found unsuitable for licensing in the gaming industry by either Nevada or New Jersey, the other shareholders shall have the right, on a pro rata basis, to purchase the non-licensed shockholder's interest in Game Plan at a price equal to the original cost of such interest. Game Plan holds a gaming license in Nevada and has applied for a gaming license in New Jersey.

The agreement also requires Game Plan to enter into a two-year consulting agreement with AES at a consulting fee of \$100,000 per year.

### Dunn heads Game-A-Tron

Game-A-Tron Corp. announced the appointment of Lawrence Dunn, formerly a manager with Arthur Young & Co., an international public accounting firm, as president of the Connecticut-based corporation. Dominick Sanzo, founder of Game-A-Tron and its former president, remains as chairman of the board.

Game-A-Tron is debuting a new game called *Space Bugger* which was to be in production and released for sale in January along with a new concept in its *Draw Poker* game.

The company was also awaiting licensing for its cash payout slot machines for Nevada and New Jersey and anticipated a successful year in the gaming industry.

Also added to the staff of Game-A-Tron was Steve Smith, comptroller, formerly with Arthur Young & Co. And a new production head for the company is John Wasik, formerly with Times-Mirror Cable Television.

"Our sales staff is also being enlarged and will soon be able to cover all areas domestically and internationally to fulfill requests for our games in a shorter period of time by setting up a new distributorship network," said Irv Jeffries, director of marketing and sales. "We're moving right along with our research and development, our sales, and our ideas. We're right on schedule in our progression and look forward to a fast-moving, successful new year."

### Ad Posters exec recalls advances

Walter L. Pyrek, vice president and general manager of Advertising Posters, Inc., Chicago, retired on December 31, 1980, after 45 years' service with the company, a specialty silk screen design and printing firm. Pyrek joined the company in February of 1935 as a helper, sanding boards.

### Pin restrictions are challenged in Toronto

TORONTO—Image problems for pinball arcades have produced a zoning law restricting arcades, and that local ordinance is being challenged by an operators association, Toronto Star newspaper reported recently.

Teenagers who hang around the "pinball parlors" are cited as the "cause of vandalism, rowdy behavior, and street violence," a Toronto alderman said in an Ontario Municipal Board hearing.

Alderman Pat Sheppard told the board that pinball parlors are "a continual problem" in the city, and in his ward are the source of most complaints he's received in his four years as alderman.

Sheppard said his more recent complaint came from senior citizens on two streets who said they are afraid off walking by a pinball parlor which recently opened less than 100 feet from their apartment.

(The solution, it would seem, is an old remedy: Clean up the arcade, boot out the rowdies, and improve the image of amusement machines and their players.

—Ed.)

The alderman urged the board to approve a new Toronto bylaw to restrict the establishment of pinball parlors to the industrial area south of the Gardiner Expressway or the "slaughterhouse district" of the city.

The bylaw is being challenged by the Metro Amusement Association, which is made up of about 60 proprietors, owners, and operators of pinballs.

### 'The Mini-AMOA' draws coin people to C.A. Robinson, Los Angeles show

Chicago is too far away for many operators, especially for those on the West Coast. So the annual AMOA Show that's held in Chicago in the early fall has been, for many of the operators, something to read about, rather than to attend.

As for the sneak previews of the new equipment, they wait instead for the various distributor showings which start popping up in late November and go through December.

On the West Coast the biggest such ditributor showing is sponsored by C.A. Robinson and Company of Los Angeles. Because of the large number of equipment lines C.A. Robinson represents, the company's annual showing has become something of a mini-AMOA Show of the West. In fact, sensing the need for such a show on the West Coast, C.A. Robinson has been billing its show for years now as the "Western Amusement Games Exhibit."

Though the label, Western Amusement Games Exhibit, may sound a bit too presumptuous to some, the fact is that the annual C.A. Robinson showing has well-earned such a distinctive moniker.

The 1979 attendance at the Exhibit climbed over 800. This past year, the figure topped 1,000 and may have gone much higher, though there were no actual totals available.

Additionally, and notwithstanding the nature of this being a new game premiere for many West Coast operators, the Western Amusement Games Exhibit is a bona fide buying show. That's why manufacturers turn out in force for the annual event on West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles.

No, the significance of the C.A. Robinson showing has not been lost on the manufacturers. No less than seventeen manufacturing concerns were represented on the floor during the December 5 show this time around. And included in that number were nine presidents or chief executive officers. There were also visiting distributors from as far away as Philadelphia and Chicago.

So the night before the showing, out-of-town visitors were feted by Al Bettelman and company at a lavish sitdown dinner. It set the stage for the big things to come the following

The next day the show lived up to its billing, not only with regard to its attendance but also with the high quality of equipment on display. Nearly all the top games that were shown at the AMOA convention a month earlier in Chicago were on show for the visiting operators.

Included were such video game hits as Midway's Pac-Man, Atari's Battlezone, Cinematronics' Star Castle, Stern's Berzerk, Gremlin/Sega's Space Tactics, Data East's Mad Alien, Centuri's Eagle, Universal's Zero Hour, Exidy's Spectar, Taito's Polaris, Electro-Sport's Tomahawk Missile, and Nichibutsu's novel Crazy Climber.

Pinball was also well-represented

at the showing with Bally and Stern products on display. Included were Bally's Flash Gordon, Xenon, and Frontier, and Stern's Flight 2000 and Nine Ball.

Ira Bettelman of C.A. Robinson was effusive after the show. "It was definitely a success," he told PLAY METER. "I think there were a lot of things to take note of here, and I don't just mean the games, and I don't mean in the number of people attending, either.

"I think the manufacturers saw for themselves that operators are genuinely interested in what is new and currently available. It showed that operators are aware that they can't survive in the future with past games.

"And I also think it showed the manufacturers' desire to meet that challenge," Bettelman added.

When asked what it was about the showing which he thought was the most significant aspect, he turned to the matter of pinball. "Interestingly enough, I was shocked to see the amount of interest in pinball again. It was a very promising sign indeed," said Bettelman.

It was a valid observation. While videos still dominate the buying consciousness of operators and garner the most attention, it was noteworthy that there was always a crowd around the pinballs, too—a fact that is due largely to the pinball makers taking the bull by the horns and trying to make a more competitive product.

Greenman, with experience in operations, distribution, and manufacturing, held major coin industry posts with Sega in Redondo Beach, California, Associated Coin Amusement in Los Angeles, and Color-Sonics in Boston.

"It is part of our overall plans for continued growth that we are adding the varied talents of Greenman to our corporate structure," said Simon. Midway intends to take all legal action necessary to protect its proprietary rights against all copiers of the PAC-MAN™ video game and the sellers of such infringing games.



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### FRANK'S CRANKS

### A technical view of new games from the operator's standpoint

The purpose of this column is to look at each game on its design features, both positive and negative; player appeal, graphics, and style will not be mentioned—that is the area of "Critic's Corner" and the Play Meter video reviews.

As an operator for the past 11 years, I am aware of the problems facing the operator due to cabinet and game design. It is my intention to ask questions, disassemble and reassemble games on location under varied types of operating conditions, to make comments in praise of the manufacturers for their improvements, implant new ideas and suggest future improvements. If followed up, this can and will benefit the coin-operated amusement industry.

My initial impression regarding the games' design engineers was a feeling that their actual field experience was limited. Cost was, and is always, a major guideline we must all live with. What I did not know was that many of the design engineers were not informed about common, recurring machine problems. Game after game, model after model is produced, carrying with them the same deficiencies that have plagued the operator.

Please take my comments seriously but not as a personal attack. The engineers have done well, very well in fact, in meeting operators' needs. But let's not be complacent. There is yet more to be accomplished.

eliminates the loose crystal problems so common to Space Invaders.

The joy stick control has been improved for longer wear. A leather washer, replacing the standard plastic or metal types, will also aid in lubrication.

The coin door has remained the same. Pennies can still be put up the coin returns. Although kits are available to modify this defect, it still takes the operator's time to install. All that need be done is to bend the flaps down to a 45° angle and place a spot weld to secure the flap in that position. I have banged the flaps down with a hammer only to find that someone just banged them back up from the outside. The Midway coin return is hard to use. If the door becomes bent, it's almost impossible to readjust the coin return buttons so they will operate smoothly. Also, many times the coin door molding screws become loose. They could easily be secured with nylon hex

PAC MAN/Midway

This game retains many of the positive aspects of past Midway hits: (1)Easy removal of front control panel, held securely by two latch mechanisms. This greatly reduces the serviceperson's time to clean a control switch or free a "stuck" button. The panel remains seated securely in position because there is little chance of the latches coming loose. (2)The control switches and buttons are among the best in the industry; I rarely have to clean a Midway switch. (3)Coin box is large enough and is built-in, making it difficult for an "un-fully equipped thief" to remove.

(4) The hand grip indentations on the top, back portion of the cabinet are very useful to the averagestrength operator attempting to tilt the game back onto a hand truck or to gently lower a game from a tilted position on a hand truck.

The main cabinet improvement is that now the line chord can be fully placed inside the cabinet for horizontal shipment. (Yes, there are still operators out there who move games in vans, each time destroying the line chords and plugs.)

The general illumination lights are still incandescent lamps. These burn out at least once per month because they are very sensitive to vibration. The flourescent lights used on past games are more efficient.

The power distribution center, located on the floor of the cabinet, is fully exposed to those little round creatures-called quarters-that somehow always seem to find their way there and cause electric havoc. Midway had a good idea on past cabinets, to completely separate the coin section from the power board areas—but did not go far enough. In Pac Man, however, a thin piece of masonite has been used to block the cash box from rear access. For both security and service reasons, it would be best to fully separate these two parts of the game.

Pac Man has a feature that enables a serviceperson to put credits up that will not register on the coin meter. The on/off safety switch now has an L-bracket mount so it will always be mounted in the correct position. All piggy-back boards are strapped in.

The crystal on the logic board is soldered in, bent 90° until it is parallel with the board and glued. This

SPACE ENCOUNTERS/

This game is very well built. That was my impression after going through the whole steering wheel assembly and front panel. The common problem with having a button on a steering wheel, as with the game Star Fire, is the frequent breaking of the wires at all stress points (usually the ends). Midway has solved this problem by running the fire-button wire through a flexible, tightly wound spring. A new type of button that is both larger and more durable than its predecessor was utilized.

The two mechanical stops on the steering wheel consist of a hard rubber cylinder slipped over a hardened steel rod and secured by an E-ring. Should it crack, the rod is easily removed.

Early Space Encounters had a problem with the strobe light. This large red bulb was burning out because a resistor and a capacitor on the strobe control circuit (located on the same bracket as the strobe) were underrated. These were replaced by

a 310 ohm 20 w resistor and a 22 microfarad 250 volt capacitor. Both are now installed in each production

game.

As with the Pac Man, Midway has installed key mounted safety switches for the back door. The button will now be seated tightly against the back door and be virtually immune to game shut-off by vibration.

Both the monitor yoke and the chassis extend beyond the cabinet's back, so the back section had to be extended. This is bad news for the operators who must move their games in a horizontal position.

Ideas for game improvement: Install incandescent light so the serviceperson can see what he's doing—as Rowe did with its coffee machine.

#### SPECTAR/Exidy

Exidy's latest game is greatly improved, from a service point of view, over its last game, Targ. The joy stick button is much stronger and will not wear itself out as did the control on Targ. The Targ control had metal slamming into metal. The Spectar control is made of hardened steel incorporating small ball bearings. Only time will tell just how long the control will be trouble-free, but it seems Exidy has solved a major problem.

The control buttons used on Spectar are smaller than those of other manufacturers but are sealed well, reliable, and actually self-cleaning. The control panel is held down by bolts with wing nuts. This is not the best way, as the wing nuts can vibrate loose in a matter of hours. The operator would be best advised to replace the wing nuts with self-locking nylon hex nuts.

The line chord can be fully placed inside the cabinet when moving the game. There is no on/off switch on the outside of the cabinet. It's really a bad scene when a location owner has to move a game, bang it around, and scratch it, to get around the back so he can yank on the line chord to shut

off the game, either when it's out of order or when closing. The operator will naturally have to replace the plug many times.

The cash box is readily accessible from the back door, as is the case with most video games.

The power distribution center is mounted on the right side of the cabinet, making it less likely that a stray quarter might fall onto it.

The coin door is the same as Midway's door. This type is discussed above in the *Pac Man* overview.

#### BATTLEZONE/Atari

Atari's latest piece is very well designed internally. The statement "easy access to everything" applies. The monitor is mounted to a wooden shelf which is then mounted to the cabinet frame. The shelf is of the same width as the cabinet frame—so the monitor just slides out, instead of falling on your toes, as was usually the case in the past with most manufacturers' monitors.

The controls may be a problem if the players are extremely rough on them. These controls are plastic but did not break down when bent slightly. (I didn't want to break my own controls, not having any spares.) The pins which activate the control micro switches are now made of a hard, durable plastic instead of the hard steel pins which gave problems in the original *Sprint* and the *Sprint II* games.

Atari says it believes these pins will be trouble-free. The micro switches are mounted to the control bracket with screws and nuts. The operator will appreciate this, I know because we had to put our own nuts and screws on most of the former Atari control micros when the plastic threads became stripped. And just try to find screws and nuts that small in a pinch!

Battlezone was designed for the new, larger Atari cash boxes (which this game definitely requires) but the machines were delivered with the old, smaller cash box. The cash box is still readily accessible from the "back door."

The molded plastic on the front monitor cover is held in with six allen screws and appears easy to pry off. The bathtub sealer on the cabinet was adequate but not up to typical Atari quality.

The coin return moldings on the coin door (two 1" X 1" square frames) are plastic and are already broken off on our game. The coin return flap has also disappeared.

All other spects of the coin door are satisfactory.

#### FLIGHT 2000/Stern

Stern cabinet designs should be noted. (1) A plywood section has been placed under the cash box area. Since the front and sides are flush with the cabinet bottom, the cash box would be difficult to get at from the bottom. (2) Two extended brackets have been welded to a bracket scanning the top, back side of the head display glass. The function of these brackets is to keep the backglass in position when the head lock slips (as it always seems to do). This will help the operator retain his backglass as well as his circuit boards.

(3) The transformers and power module are still located on the bottom of the cabinet under the playfield. This is a good location, since the heat generated will be somewhat dissipated before reaching the circuit boards in the head. The connectos on the power module are the same as in past games (both Bally and Stern). The illumination ground wire connectors, in particular, will heat up and burn because the surface area is too small to carry the current flow. How many times have I seen pinball games with no head lights, no playfield decoration lights, or worse yet, no playfield lights at all.

The cash box is the same but satisfactory. It is sturdy, positioned snugly, and it is easy for the collector to slide it open and shut without cutting himself. I feel it is the best pinball cash box in the industry.

Flight 2000 has some interesting mechanism improvements.

The coin lockout rod travels freely but there is little chance of the rod

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coming off the track and causing coins to be returned when the game is on. There is no need for the operator to disconnect the coin lockout mechanism on this game.

All plunger coil rods are now connected by a hard plastic link instead of the old fiberboard link. Wear should be cut down substantially, and pivot friction should be reduced.

The flipper shoe has a small rod riveted to it. This rod, encased inside a small plastic cylinder, opens the flipper break blades at the end of the flipper plunger travel. Now there is no need for insulation paper on the break blades. This paper wears away after a short time, and this can cause the 5-amp fuse on the rectifier board to blow. Replace the fuse, and all is well—for a short time.

Stern has used this same type of plastic to make the pop bumper rings, pop bumper yokes, and the pop bumper brackets. Pop bumper power has not been decreased, and it's too soon to tell how much longer this plastic will hold up, compared to the metal types.

A memory-clear switch is located on the front door and the volume pot is still near the speaker, and can easily be reached from the front door.

All the playfield mechanisms are

satisfactory except for the small frame supporting the spinning target. This frame is too close to the playfield glass; an angry or devious player can pound the glass and sometimes bend this frame, causing the target to jam. (He can also break the glass in the process.) Sometimes the spinner contact points can be positioned to give away free points by using the flippers or just banging the cabinet. At any rate, it's a problem. The spinner frame used on Sharpshooter is the best I've seen to date.

For some unknown reason, there were no ceramic disc capacitors on the pop bumper switches. All of the other switches, excepting rollover switches, had them. The purpose of these capacitors (manifesting itself on bulls-eye targets) is to ensure scoring and coil action for short duration switch closings. Could the capacitors have broken and fallen out through the holes in the bottom of the cabinet?

#### XENON/Bally

This pinball game has some playfield mechanism improvements, but the big change has been to the power module and digital display connectors. The transformer and rectifier board or power module is now located on the bottom board of

the cabinet under the playfield instead of in the head. The slots on the bottom of the cabinet have been retained for improved heat dissipation, but loose parts always seem to fall through these same slots. When I look for missing nuts or disc capacitors that have fallen off the playfield board, they just aren't inside the machine. A thin grate cover from the inside would solve this problem.

The harness connectors on the power module have been modified. The plug connectors are now circular (on past models only one side of a square pin made contact)—providing enough surface contact area for the current load. The digital display connectors now have two-sided surface contact areas for each wire connection. An auxiliary lamp driver board has been added. All this leads up to less service problems for the operator and a longer life for the game

Bally has increased the gauge of the wire gate on the playfield, which must be able to withstand direct hits from the ball. The spinning target bracket is too close to the glass and will bend if the glass is pounded. (See 'Flight 2000' comments.)

A solid plastic armature takes the place of the metal and plastic extension for the playfield kickers.



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A longer plunger rod is used on the flippers, and the fiberboard link has been replaced by a plastic pivot wheel that fits into a grooved section of the plunger rod. I have encountered friction problems in this area but found them to be easily remedied by smoothing out the pivot wheel with a very fine file. The flipper shoe section that opens the flipper break blades is insulated with a very thin plastic band. This started to wear after only one month of

operation.

The black phillips screws that hold the flipper coil stop brackets are unchanged. These screws shear, leaving the serviceperson with a 10-to 15-minute job of removing the remaining threaded section. I have probably replaced 300 of these screws in the past year. The flippers coil still vibrates in the bracket. The wires connected to the flipper coils and to the break blades—especially the break blade wires—break frequently due to vibrations. These wires should be changed to some type of flexible, antivibration cable.

On Xenon, the head door is now hinged, making it easier to gain access to the circuit boards. This type of door was used on Night Rider and the earlier models of Evel Knievel. I'm glad to see it used again.

A volume control pot has been added to the front coin door, which saves the operator time. Next step would be to add a memory-clear

switch similar to Stern's.

My Xenon somehow found itself out in the field without first getting its playfield plastic overlay put on. After only three weeks on location, the playfield paint was coming off. I thought this problem was corrected after Six Million Dollar Man and Playboy.

The posts onto which the playfield decoration plastics go, along with the small white rubber caps are now threaded, with *Xenon*, and the caps won't be vibrating off as easily. The rubber caps can be removed and replaced by hand, thus giving the operator added incentive to change worn rubber rings.

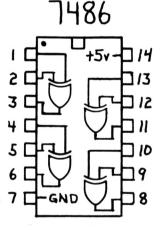
The cash box is the standard Bally type. The cover can be easily pried off, even when a cash box lock is employed. The collector has a difficult time sliding the cover on and off the box as both the tracks on the box and on the cover are easily bent. Once bent, they are difficult to realign.

# Building a logic comparator

Editor's Note: We receive many requests for reprints of technical articles from PLAY METER's past issues. And one of the more popular has been a 2-part series from February and March 1977 by Robin Minnear, which is reprinted here complete in one article

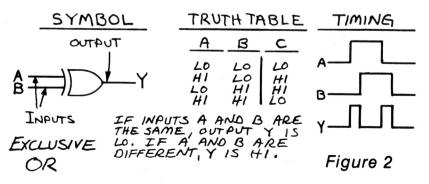

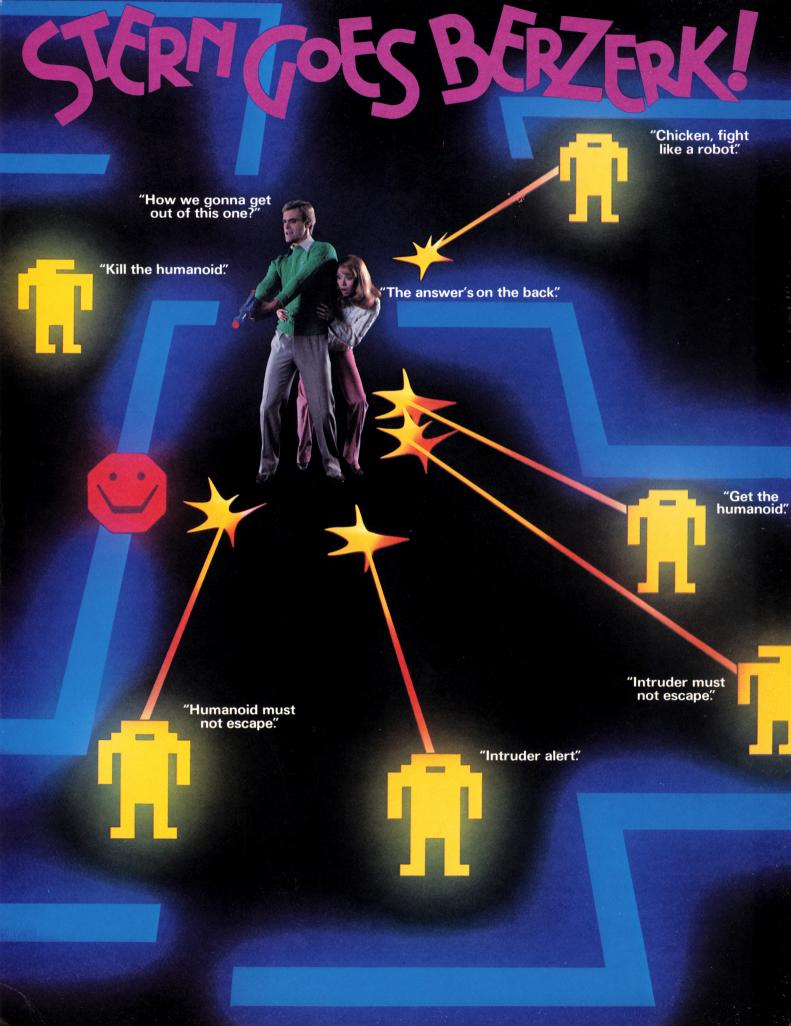
You could go out and buy a logic comparator for \$400 to \$600. And even at that price you may find it extremely useful.

But, here we will describe how to build a functional logic comparator. First will be a discussion of the actual logic comparing circuitry and next will be pulse stretching and indicator circuitry.

A logic comparator is a device that will allow you to determine if a chip is bad on your logic board by comparing it to a known good chip of the same type.

All you have to do is plug a good chip (the same type as you wish to check) into the socket provided on the comparator. Next you attach the test clip from the comparator to the





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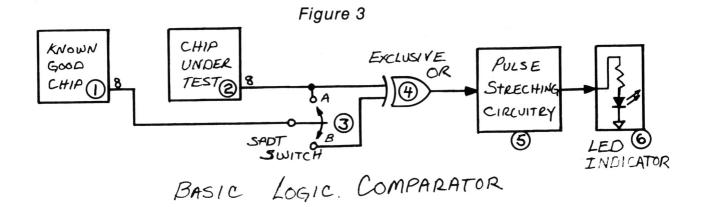
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chip on your logic board that you wish to test. Attach power leads from the comparator to the logic board. Power up the logic and the comparator will tell you if the chip is good or not.

The actual comparing portion of the logic comparator uses a TTL 7486 chip. A 7486 is a Quad Exclusive OR device. This means that there are four individual exclusive OR devices in one package as per Figure 1.

Each exclusive OR gate is made up

of two inputs and one output. According to the truth-table in Figure 2: if the information on its inputs are the same, both HI or both LO, the output is LO. If the information on its inputs are different, one is HI and one is LO, the output is HI.

By taking the input information of the chip you are testing and applying it to the same inputs of the known good chip, you can determine if the chip under test is good or not.

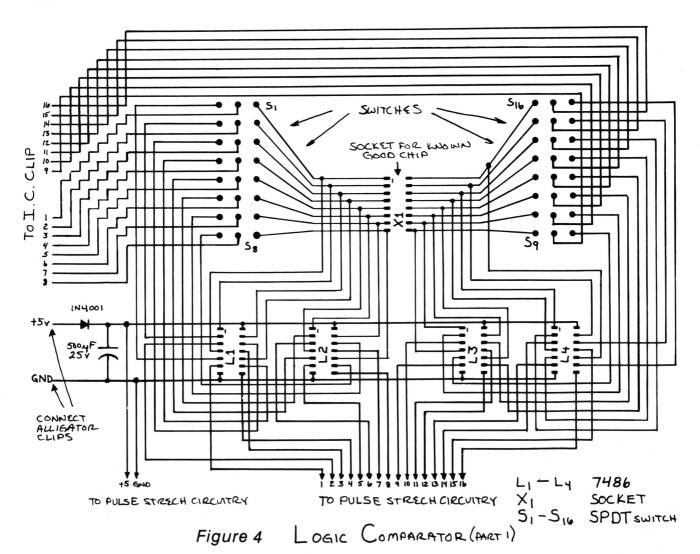
The logic comparator design

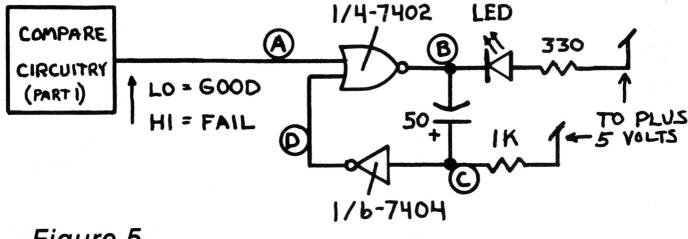
presented in these article is good for checking TTL and DTL devices up to sixteen pins. This can be easily expanded if you desire.

The basic comparator circuit is illustrated in *Figure 3*. As you can see, the logic comparator consists of six basic parts.

1. This is a socket on the comparator where you place a known good chip that is the same type as the chip you want to test.

2. This is an IC clip that connects to the chip under test on your logic

board. The clip makes contact with all sixteen legs of the chip and is connected to the comparator via cable.

3. This is a SPDT switch. Its purpose is to program the comparator function. Our logic devices consist of inputs and outputs. If pin 8 in Figure 3 is an output pin, you want the switch to be in position "B." This will allow the outputs to be compared by the Exclusive OR. If pin 8 in an input (or power) pin, then you would put the switch in position "A." This would put the same signal conditions that are on the device to be tested, on the corresponding input of the known good chip. This places the known good chip under the same circumstances as the one on your logic board. You would also disregard the comparator reading of this pin.

4. This is the Exclusive OR gate that compares the two chips outputs. Its output is LO when its inputs are the

same or the compare is "Good." Its output is HI when its inputs are different or a "Bad" compare.

5. CIRCUIT DESCRIPTION: The comparator described in this article is good for checking TTL and DTL chips up to sixteen pins. For checking chips with more than sixteen pins, you can add more compare circuits as in Figure 3.

Since there are sixteen pins to test, you need sixteen Exclusive ORs, sixteen switches, etc.

Exclusive OR gates come four to the chip. So you need four 7486 chips. *Figure 4* is the comparator schematic part one. The 7486 packages are marked L-1 through L-4.

As per Figure 1, the outputs of the 7486 are pins 3, 6, 8, and 11. Each of these outputs correspond to a pin on the ship under test. These outputs go onto the pulse stretching circuitry which is discussed next.

The 7486's are powered up by connecting alligator-clips to the logic

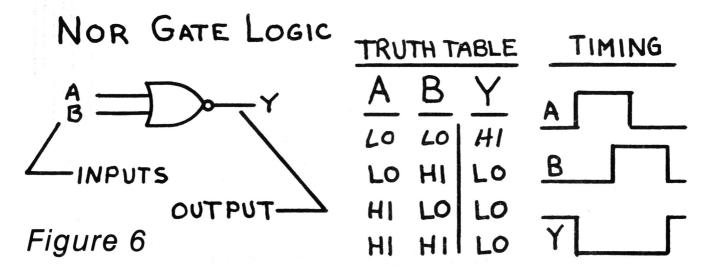
board five-volts and ground. The 1N4001 diode and the 500 mfd capacitor are added for protection.

S-1 through S-16 are SPDT switches which determine which pins are being compared.

The reasoning behind this is simple. If you take two chips of the same type and subject them to the same exact set of input circumstances, the corresponding outputs should be the same. If they are not, one of them is bad.

The logic comparator derives its power from the logic board under test. The chip under test is connected to the comparator via an IC clip and cable.

Pulse stretching circuitry and indicating circuitry. The important thing to know at this point is that the compare circuitry is going to put out a logic LO when the compare is good and a logic HI when the compare is bad. Therefore, we want to make an indicator "light-up" when the



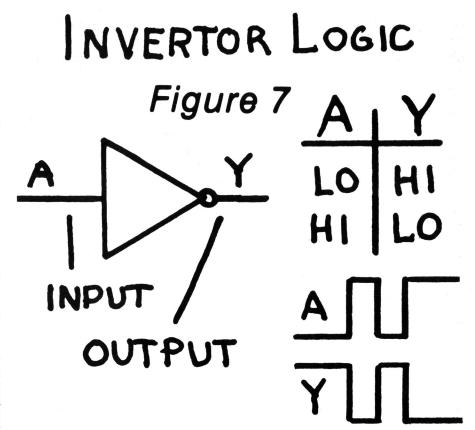
compare is bad or a logic HI appears from the compare circuitry.

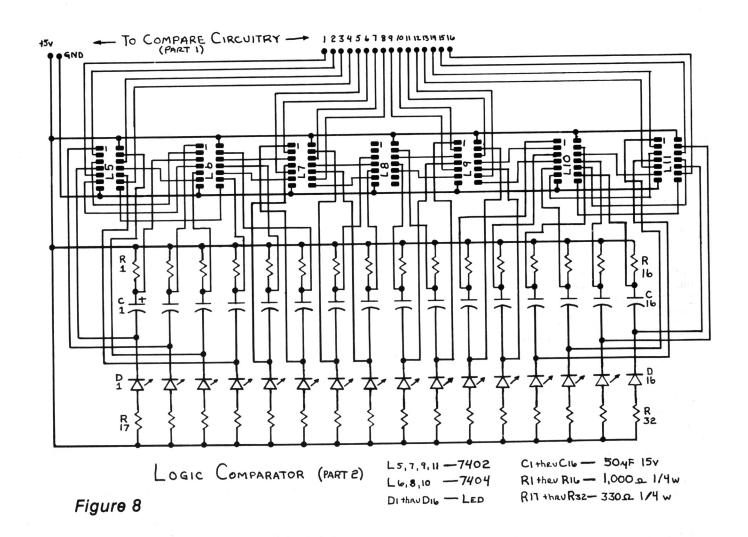
The pulse stretching circuitry is important in making the comparator give you correct information. As we have seen, a high output from an exclusive OR indicates a failure. This HI pulse will eventually turn on a light-emitting-diode (LED). This is also when a problem occurs.

It takes a certain amount of time before the LED will light up. This is known as response time. If the HI fail pulse is very short, the LED won't have time to light up. So we stretch the short pulses long enough to be able to see the LED turn on.

A schematic of the pulse stretch and indicating circuitry is shown in Figure 4. Keep in mind that this circuitry has to be duplicated sixteen times to be able to look at sixteen pin chips.

Å bad chip will cause a logic HI to appear on one input of the 7402 Nor gate. According to the truth table in Figure 5: if input "A" or input "B" are HI, output "Y" is low. So if a bad compare or logic HI appears on the input of the NOR, its output, point





"B", goes low. A logic low at point "B" causes current to flow in the LED which in turn causes the LED to light. The 330 ohm resistor limits the current that the LED can draw.

The moment that point "B" goes low, point "C" is pulled low through the 50 uf capacitor. A low at point "C" causes a HI to appear at point "D". Figure 6 shows the symbol and truth table for the 7404 invertor.

A high at point "D" causes a low to still appear at point "B". This will keep the LED on regardless of what point "A" does. As point "B" stays low, the 50 uf capacitor starts to charge. When point "C" charges up to about 2.4 volts, point "D" is forced back to low. Now if point "A" and point "D" are both low, point "B" goes back to a HI and the LED turns off.

The amount of time it takes for the capacitor to charge up to 2.4 volts is about one-third of a second. So even a very quick pulse, as fast as .0000003 seconds or 300 nanoseconds can be recorded and the LED will stay on for one-third of a second. It is very easy to see an LED flash of one-third of a second.

#### Construction

Figure 7 is the second half of the schematic. This combined with Figure 4 is the complete comparator.

Since we want to make sixteen individual circuits, we need sixteen 7402 NOR gates. These 7402 NOR gates come four per package so we need four packages of chips.

We also need sixteen invertors.

Since 7404 invertors come six per package, we need three packages. Note: device L-8 has two unused invertors.

Above is a complete parts list for the comparator.

It is generally not a good idea to use "rats nest" type wiring on test equipment. The best possible mode of construction of electronic gear is to use a printed circuit board. ‡

### Moratorium on location licenses

The city council in Oakland, California, passed an ordinance in December placing a three-month moratorium on granting permits for *new* locations offering "coin-operated mechanical amusement or skill devices and operations (such as pinball machines, pool tables, and electronic video games) in the city of Oakland."

The ordinance grew out of a confused proposal that would have required licenses for existing coin-op businesses although it provided for no licensing procedures. The proposal also would have prohibited minors from playing pinball, video games, or pool in the city—and came after some parents complained to the council that their children were cutting school to play the games or were being exposed to illegal activities in some arcades.

Attorney Marvin Ellenberg, representing Oakland Cigarette Company pointed out to the council that since the series of ordinances in the proposal were passed as "urgency measures," there was no notification to the industry and no

opportunity to respond.

He argued with the council that the industry should have input into the ordinance "before they put everybody out of business."

The 90-day moratorium period will be used to study the entire situation and for the council to receive industry feedback.

### Coin Controls warns 'copiers'

Coin Controls, British manufacturer of coin handling equipment, has entered the "copycat fracas." The firm has issued a warning that it "will take advantage of our patents protection wherever we find examples of copies," said a Coin Controls director, Colin White. He said the copying had been particularly prevalent with Coin Controls' \$10 Front Plate and Door Assembly.

"Our design team's efforts have

been so successful that near-exact reproductions of our equipment have been found in countries as far apart as Japan and Spain, the U.S.A., and Italy. Yet the copies don't compare in quality, a point that should be obvious to the discerning. The copiers go for instant price appeal with the attraction of interchangeability of form and junction while cutting corners as far as engineering principles are concerned," according to Coin Controls' director White.

### Pins play for Easter Seals

The first-ever pinball tournament staged for Easter Seal Society fundraising was held November 15, 1980 in Albany, New York, with cooperation of Time Out Family Amusement Center at Northway Mall, Albany.

Nearly \$2,000 was raised by the tournament participants to help support Easter Seal services for the handicapped in the Capital District including therapy at its Speech and Hearing Center for over 600 children and adults yearly, plus equipment loan, building ramps, and other items funded through Easter Seals.

Norm Gerber, Easter Seal Society spokesman, said the tournament was "a good first-time effort and a guide for the future." Other offices of Easter Seal in New York and western states have shown interest in their own tourneys for fundraising.

More than 100 pinball players were involved in the Albany tournament, entering by either paying a \$5 entry fee or securing pledges. Prizes ranged from a T-shirt for a \$25 pledge-raiser to a Williams Alien Poker pingame—which went to Barry Abramowitz, student at the State University of New York, as first prize for his top pledge raising of \$527 in donations. The brand-new machine was provided by Williams Electronics, Inc.

Participants in the tourney play on five games: Firepower, Gorgar, Flash, Space Invaders, and Astro Fighter in competition for trophies and prizes. Over 25 prizes were given in the tournament for individuals raising the most money in sponsor donations, for highest scores, and from a drawing.

# Carnival, Digger false game credits

In certain areas, it has been found that some *Carnival* and *Digger* games may give a false credit if a static charge is applied. To alleviate this problem, the following modification is recommended by Gremlin/Sega.

Turn off the power and remove the photo-coin assembly board, located inside the coin door. Locate IC U1: it is a 555 IC on the photo-coin board. Turn the board over and cut the etch between pins 2 and 6 of U1. Carefully solder a 100K resistor from pin 8 to pin 2 of U1. Then solder a 12" length of wire from pin 2 to the top of the photo-coin board. This wire should form a loop. Next, take a 22 ohm resistor and solder it between pins 6 and 7 of U1. Re-install the photo-coin board: this will alleviate and problem involving a credit from a static charge. (See Diagram A.)

In games using the dual VIC logic board, some boards use a 74C245 at position U47, and other boards use a 74LS245. The 74C245

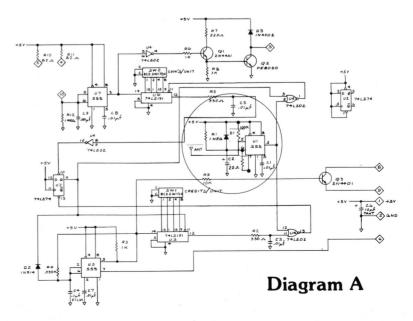
should be replaced with a 74LS245 for better circuit operation.

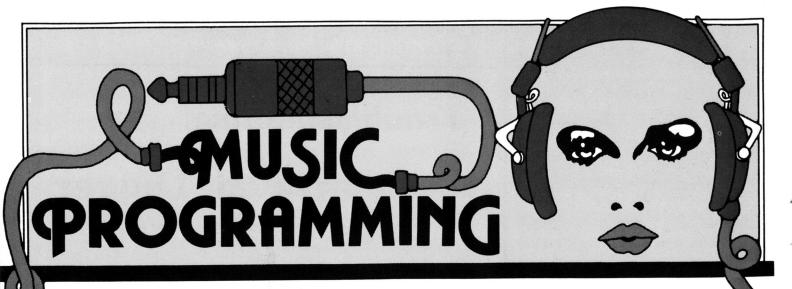
If the 74C245 does not cause any problems, it may not be necessary to replace it. However, Gremlin/Sega recommends using the 74LS245.

Some Carnival games use a slightly different logic board than the standard VIC board. The other board is the Extended ROM board #800-0032, which is like the dual VIC board #800-0058 except that it does not use a VIC chip.

Schematics are available from Gremlin for the Extended ROM board for operators who need them. Either logic board will work in the game, and no modifications are needed. If the operator receives an exchange board that is different from the one he sent in for repair, he should not send it back. It will work in place of the original one.

We've all lost a best friend. John Lennon's music will live for more than a lifetime.

### The reviews for the opening of '81

Same Old Lang Syne—Dan Fogelberg—Full Moon/19-50961

The poet of the new age sets to music a tale that anyone can relate to. Finding love in unlikely places is what romance is all about. If Dan Fogelberg had lived back in the days of Edmund Spenser, he would have been looked upon as one of the most respected Romanticists. The song and lyrics are beautiful; Fogelberg's vocals, bittersweet. The whole thing is culminated with a very clever use

of that New Year's standard. Rated 10 out of 10 right into 1981.

**Need Your Loving Tonight**— Queen—Elektra/E-47086-A

It's not rock-a-billy. It's not funk. What it is, is Queen at their rockingest best. Acoustic and electric guitars provide a powerful rhythm track; bass and lead electric carry the song through. Freddie Mercury is in rare form, fronting the band on vocals on this definite show

stopper. Short in duration, but long on energy: 9 out of 10, at least.

I Can't Stop The Feelin'—Pure Prairie League—Casablanca/NB 2319

A very jazzy guitar and percussion begin this latest single from one of the comeback groups of 1980. Breezy is the best way to describe this merger of excellent instrumentation and vocals. Friends tell me this is one of the best acts one

can see live on stage, and after listening to a good bit of their stuff, I'd agree. This record is very representative of their sound and is earmarked for success: 8 out of 10 or better.

### *Heartbreak Hotel*—The Jacksons —Epic/19-50959

No, it's not the old Elvis hit. It's the new Jackson hit. A great horn and string arrangement highlight this extra danceable effort from the family that put everybody back on the dance floor where they belong. Michael Jackson co-wrote and sings lead vocals on this, the second release from the appropriately titled *Triumph* lp. Once again that Jackson hand-slappin' feelin' is the drivin' force behind the song. Very interesting, yet effective arrangement; 10 out of 10 on highest chart.

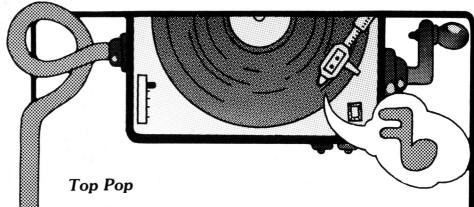
### *My Mother's Eyes*—Bette Midler—Atlantic/3771

As outrageous as she seems, inside her beats the heart of a sentimental lady and singer. What Bette has done is taken a song written by folkie Tom Jans and given it new meaning. The strings have been added to a tear-stained piano accompaniment and the record has been recorded live to add a touch of sharing in the lyrics. Not so much Top 40 hit material as it is a fabulous recording—one that will cause those coins to fall. Rated 7 out of 10, maybe.

### **Keep On Loving You**—REO Speedwagon—Epic/19-50953

This could very well be the record to take this group, which has been around more than a decade, to the forefront of Crossover appeal. REO...has always been an AOR (Album Oriented Radio) favorite, but it's Top 40 time with this one. And the funny thing is their sound isn't any different than, say, five years ago. I think it may be the melody and structure of the song more than anything. Or maybe it's the position of the stars in the heavens: 8 out of 10 or better, at any rate.

The records are rated as follows: 10 out of 10 — Top Ten peak; 9 out of 10 — Top 20 peak; 8 out of 10 — Top 30 peak; 7 out of 10 — Top 40 peak; 5 or 6 out of 10 — somewhere in Top 100; 4 or less — forget it, loser, break in half.

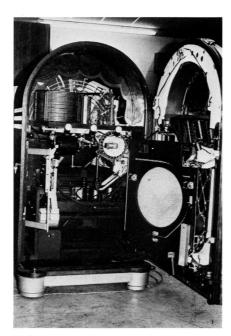

### Museum Pieces

You know an object has attained, shall we say, maturity when people are referring to its class of things as antiques. To have antique coin machines is, by this date, nothing new. But one Louisiana operator has plans afoot to erect a museum for coin-operated antiques, which has grown out of his long term love of the older amusement machines.

Gerald Goudeau, of Gerald's Amusement Machines, Lafayette, Louisiana states his goal like this: "To compile a history of early coin machines—that is to preserve Americana. The United States was made out of a freedom to venture into new fields suppressed in most countries. Where else could it have happened?"

Originally, beginning in 1948, Goudeau's route operated games alone; jukeboxes were incidental for about nine years. But his sense of preserving antiquity was active even then, and in that year he bought four vintage boxes including a Rock-Ola 1422, which is still in his possession.

In the intervening years, Goudeau has picked up some antique gems of jukeboxes, primarily from older operators. "I found them just sitting, stored in all kinds of conditions," he said. Restoration of these machines has been a hobby and more for Goudeau, aided by his sons who work for him.

Among the prize pieces are a Wurlitzer 1015, vintage 1947, which Wurlitzer copied in the limited edition 1050 Nostalgic, issued in 1972; a bicycle chain-driven, first edition Mills machine, in which each record has its own turntable; a Seeburg Symphonia Regal from the 1930s; and a Wurlitzer nickelodeon believed to be a 1907 model.

And the route which Goudeau wants to take these and other antiques—gained from barns and garages and warehouses—is a museum to be located on 26 acres of campground at the Interstate 10 exit near Lafayette, Louisiana,in the Acadia bayous area.

Goudeau has warehoused many of the collected pieces for the three to four year period he expects it to take for the museum project to see completion. Time demanded by his coin operation delays the tasks of building the museum and restoration of machines (and his antique cars, but that's another story). But he continues to find coin-op items he's "not even seen pictures of. These are

part of coin machine history. I have to grab them where I can," said Goudeau.

Not all the machines are gathering dust until their "home" is built. In his operation's headquarters, he has on display one restored Wurlitzer 1015, complete with its colorful face of carbon tetrachloride bubbles behind tubular plastic; another 1015 with its playing mechanism restored; a Rock-Ola Play Ball vintage pingame; and other working models among a huge stowage of dated amusement machines—making the Goudeau shop a kind of museum at present.

Among the gleaming pool tables in the front shop, a visitor can drop a nickel in a 1907 player piano (engraved, "Made by The Rudolph Wurlitzer Co."), and it will tinkle out the songs, "Home on the Range" and "Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight" and other tunes. Goudeau has aided the compression in the vintage piano's bellows with a vacuum cleaner motor, and the music roll comes from a reproduction source in New Jersey.

As a hobby, machine restoration and the finding of new treasures has just about replaced hunting and fishing for Goudeau. "I'm preserving something that will be there forever," he said during a visit by PLAY METER. The museum would be expected to support itself, but the project is "not profit motivated," said Goudeau. Having made a living from the coin-op amusement machines, he wants to give them a place in posterity. In this he is supported by his son David, who said, "I'd like to see it materialize," and that he is concerned with preserving the workmanship evidenced in the vintage machines.

Of the historical place of coin machine entertainment, the senior Goudeau said, "We're providing something the world was in dire need of, especially during the Great Depression."

In the business of operating, he is joined by two other sons, Jonathan and Guy. The route covers four parishes in Louisiana's bayou country, from Lake Charles to Lafayette and surrounding area.

Goudeau explained that he rotates a jukebox on his route once a year, compared to once every five or six months for pinballs. "Phonographs have more holding power; they captivate a player more than they used to," he observed.

### A look at some deductibles

#### The Horseless Carriage Can Be Deductible

The automobile is to today's American what yesterday's horse was to the wild west cowboy-a means of transportation. The care and feeding of the horse's replacement—the automobile—is like everything else that is modern: It is infinitely more complex. Listing the differences between the two modes of transportation, physical and otherwise, would probably make a hilarious parlor game. The fun would most certainly stop if anyone suggested that no portion of the automobile or any of its operating expenses could be deducted on your income tax return. Whether you call it horse sense or nonsense, that is exactly the position of the IRS if you do not follow the rules.

Now is the time to determine how to best handle your 1980 expenses of an automobile in your operation. With costs of fuel and maintenance expenses, together with the price of the horseless carriage itself skyrocketing out-of-sight, the tax payoff is worth examining. The following item should help get you started. But for the best results, you should discuss your situation with your professional. (Buy him/her lunch. It's deductible!)

The rules in a nutshell: Automobile expenses are dedectible if the automobile is used in connection with a trade or business or an income-producing activity. The deduction is allowed only for that part of the expenses attributable to business or income-producing use. The portion attributable to personal use is not deductible. In order to claim the full amount of automobile expenses incurred as a deduction, you must meet strict substantiation requirements. If you can establish that your automobile has a useful life of at least three years, you may claim an investment tax credit.

Sounds easy? Well, it is if you know the rules and follow them.

Who can deduct automobile expenses?...In a word, everyone. But only the business portion. For

this purpose you will fall into one of four categories.

#### 1. COMMUTERS—

The cost of commuting—going to and coming from work—is personal, and such expenses are not deductible.

(Rev. Rul. 76-453)

#### 2. EMPLOYEES—

Employees are allowed to treat local transportation expenses as business expenses as long as they are connected with the employee's job.

(Rev. Rul. 55-109)

#### 3. SELF-EMPLOYED, PART-NER OR CORPORATION—

The Internal Revenue Code (Section 162(a)) provides that "traveling expenses while away from home and in the pursuit of a trade or business" are included among the types of "ordinary and necessary" expenses that are deductible. This language includes all forms of business, whether incorporated or not. Of course, the automobile when used away from home is specifically covered in this language.

When an automobile is used for business purposes as local transportation (NOT away from home), Section 162 governs under the ordinary and necessary expense rule if "paid or incurred in carrying on any trade or business."

4. AUTOMOBILE OWNED BY EMPLOYER—

a. And You Are A Stockholder/ Employee:

A corporation is not entitled to claim deductions for expenses attributable to the personal use of the auto by the stockholder/ employee. The examining revenue agent will probably extract two taxes if that happens: first, when he disallows such portion to the corporation; and, second, when he taxes the same portion to you, the stockholder/employee, as a dividend.

b. And You Are Not A Stockholder: The revenue agent has the right to add the personal portion of the auto expense to your taxable income (the corporation gets its deduction anyway, as compensation to you.)

#### Inflation: The Tax Cost Can Kill You

Got the money shorts? More clients continue to bang on my door looking for an explanation of why they are short of spendable dollars. Only the government comes out ahead when you combine inflation with our progressive American tax system. An all too-true-to-life example tells the story:

Five years ago, Joe Exec earned \$40,000; last year he earned \$60,000—a 50 percent increase. Assume an inflation factor of 40 percent (a bit low, in fact) over the same five year period. Let's see how Joe comes out in terms of spendable income.

You can change the numbers, but not the theory. Inflation is a hidden tax.

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### Pinballs, handicapped meet on campus

In a fall conference of more than 40 colleges' student representatives, a lap-held device to allow wheelchair-bound persons to play pinball was demonstrated at Rampo College, Mahwah, New Jersey.

Randy Fromm, Play Meter technical writer, sent the specially built lap control panel from California. As a result, several people in wheelchairs could play pinball for the first time in their lives.

In the November 12, 1980 conference, college reps came from as far as the University of North Dakota. For an afternoon session on "Recreation for Handicapped Students," Frank Seninsky, president of Alpha-Omega Amusements, Inc., Edison, New Jersey, and Mary Jo Lasora, a senior at Montclair State College, Montclair, N.J., majoring in teaching techniques for handicapped students, demonstrated and discussed developments in the coin machine industry for the handicapped.

(Ed note: Seninsky is a contributor of a technical review elsewhere in this issue. The lap panel for handicapped play on pinballs was detailed by Fromm in "Technical Topics," PLAY METER, December, 1980 issue, page 126.)

One of the participants stated the problem and one solution: "People in wheelchairs just can't reach the controls. But now with this easy-to-hold control panel and this lower level pinball game, it's all fun."

The panel is made with parts that

are standard in the amusement industry and can be used on any pinball machine and most video games that have button controls, Seninsky explained. The panel's coils are held in place over the game's control buttons through the use of brackets attached to magnets. A wheelchair's batteries can be used to energize the coils which activate the flippers and plunger on pinballs or the controls on a video game.

Each panel also comes equipped with a rechargable battery and a battery charger for those persons who don't have battery driven wheelchairs.

Others exchanged ideas on how the lap panel could be improved to encompass a greater proportion of handicapped persons' needs. The panel, when refined and mass-produced, could be available to every college game room, if not every games area in the world, said some of the collegians.

### Pinball Must Be True to Itself

There is a certain feeling in the air. One of excitement and interest which has been sorely lacking for all too Long. The ground swell is admittedly happening very slowly, but it is happening. Walk into an arcade and you'll see people watching. Not unusual, but they're watching pinball being played and even playing a little when the machine is open and the curiosity has been piqued.

Somehow it always seems to be this way—history repeating itself just like clockwork, with situations and even the times changing, but not much else in terms of events. Those who were writing pinball off, hadn't done their homework. They should and would have known that pinball is an industry unto itself, where change and innovation are born out of adversity. No one dares rock the boat when the tide is moving smoothly along, but come a few waves and there are more than enough volunteers, not ready to abandon ship, but rather to rebuild it so that it can stay afloat. And so it is as we get further into 1981.

There were, and still will be, hard times—no one is discounting that or even suggesting that anything more than the bend in the road has been traveled. Much still remains, and so it is that this writer feels compelled to take the moment and seize it before everyone has become entrenched in something that may well become counterproductive.

One needs perspective, however, when looking at the evolution of pinball. Much of the discussion and background regarding this point was covered in last November's "State of the Industry" issue where PLAY METER directed attention to the shift and growing awareness of pinball. The basic detracting problem is that pinball (and I've made this point many times in the past) is not competing, per se, with video. Once that fact is accepted things can be far easier to deal with realistically.

Unfortunately, this seemingly vital point is largely ignored or not agreed

upon, so that the two parts of the coin machine industry really find themselves in a battle where there can be no winner or loser. But if the cashbox is the thing that is getting everyone's attention and showing that video is drawing bigger bucks than pinball—fine. But on the investment for any business, isn't the fact salient that both types of games are earning reasonably on their own? Sure, a video may pay for itself faster, but any establishment needs both to attract the players out there. Because, let's face it, there are video players, pinball players, and those who will play both.

The two games tend to strengthen each other, and if an operator is smart in selecting his pinball machines, he can maximize his earnings and have profitable machines.

But this isn't the reason for this writing. Any operator who has a feeling for his business, knows what his customers are going to like and what they're probably going to pass up on. Sometimes there's surprise because a machine does better or worse than expected, but no one

said the business was an exact science. More important is to be prepared for what is happening to pinball since it's reflective of the entire industry, including video, and symptomatic of why things happen the way they do and why they will continue to be done in much the same manner until enough of you make your feelings felt.

The copying reaction

Simply, the industry on the whole is reactive. You see a video theme and type of game play and that's all that's wanted—hence the number of take-offs appearing year after year. The few standouts spawn imitators and suddenly there's a category of equipment that can be lumped together such as Space Invaders or Galaxian-type games, Head-Ontype, or maze games, and so on and so on. With pinball it's much the same. You see something that's different from all the rest and immediately the need is for more of the same, until people grow tired of the redundancy and demand something new again. And so the cycle goes.

In pinball the problem of this complacency (described this way because that's really all it is, along with the fear to try something different) is that a good idea such as personality tie-ins on backglasses can suddenly be taken for granted, with its impact lost, only because it gets done too often. That became the case not so long ago. The reaction to a tie-in was "So what" and "Let me take a look at the game," which might not be so bad except that the point was lost and hence this form of recognizability.

Selectivity and timing would have done well given an industry that might have accepted one or two games a year which stood out from the crowd in terms of backglass theme and promotional possibilities. But the well was gone to once too often, and so an idea dies for at least the time being.

Given the recent history of pinball it is surprising that the status quo has been held to for so long and yet it's almost good since the reactive quality always exists. One of the major stumbling blocks to development has been the pressure put on manufacturers by some of their larger customers to inhibit game design and innovation. If you can get X number of orders for a machine

that has such-and-such characteristics, why take the risk of coming out with Game Z which may ultimately be better but won't be initially accepted as readily as the "safer" version.

And so the games stagnate, falling victim to the whims and ultimatums of a select few who dictate what should be released next.

Taking this a step further one can see that it really isn't anyone's fault, but just the way the industry has been allowed to carry out its business over the years. The fear, however, is that with the issue of the newest games a stampede has occurred which might prove devastating to pinball and its future if it is allowed to continue in the direction it could very well take. Much of this concern is predicated on the release of *Black Knight* and the impact it has had on everyone who has come in contact with it.

#### Dilemma

No two ways about it, the game is an exceptional effort that combines the best of everything and then some. But the fact that it is so exciting and is generating income and interest on the player level is something that goes beyond this one effort. You see, the industry is faced

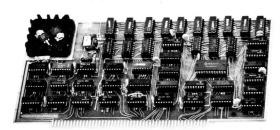
with a dilemma because of its nature to be "reactive." And so it is that everyone under the sun is coming out with their own versions of double level or multi-level or whatever you want to call this variety of machines.

Flash Gordon was at the show in Chicago and has been hitting the street; other games have undoubtedly also surfaced, although at this writing much is on speculation as to what the climate will be in two and a half months. But I know the industry too well not be able to project and forecast the current and future events unfolding.

And this is not to suggest that when there is a standout effort, everyone shouldn't jump on the bandwagon. But it has to be done objectively and thoughtfully and not just for the sake of being done. A perfect case in point is to look at multiple ball play-not every game can be designed to incorporate it, not is it a written law that a game that doesn't have it is somehow an inferior machine, doomed to fail. There's a time and place for everything, but the constant factor has to be what pinball is all about and why people play it—not the sometime players who will go to whatever is new, but rather the hardcore following that will always

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be faithful to pinball if the games are faithful to what they must ultimately provide.

And what is this elusive quality that sustains pinball? Well, it's the idea of man versus machine, the sense of controlling a rolling ball on a field by interacting with the game physically and mentally through hand and eye coordination and intense concentration, and it's the end-all gratification of accomplishing some given task by supplying an amount of skill to gain whatever is desired from playing. And that, with a few other variables thrown in, is what the basics of pinball are all about to that unknown quantity the player—out in the street.

Now, admittedly, there are degrees to just how far this admiration and enjoyment will go if, for arguement's sake, the public is given the same rehash time and again. Yes, interest will wane. And it will rise when something worthwhile is offered that poses a challenge and tests one's skill. And with this continual enigma goes the responsibility and understanding that the public will only take so much within a given period of time and that for the sake of change isn't something that's relished or greeted with open arms,

let alone coins in hand.

What this is all leading to is the very real concern the since Black Knight has been taken by storm and Flash Gordon has also garnered its fair share of attention—that every game from here on out will have to be multiple levels of some type—two, three, four, who knows where it stops. And that's not the nature of pinball, and shouldn't be.

Here we have a good concept that runs the risk of being diluted to the point where it is no longer special and interest-creating. And that seems to be the direction we are headed, unless a few sane people prevail to put everything in its place. Let's admit that multi-level play and design is good; but only for that particular game where it works and not so that the manufacturer and designer are locked into believing that this single concept is what it takes to sell machines. It isn't and there are too many negatives working against it.

#### Pinball basics

After all, there are only so many ways to break up a playfield and segment areas above, below, or whatever. And although it is an

exciting breakthrough for pinball it isn't the total answer. You can play a Black Knight or Flash Gordon for only so long (as a player, a true player) before you feel that need to break away to something more comfortable and laid-back. Games such as Frontier, although not exceptional, or even something like Alien Poker, offer that semblance of order when pinball can get back to its basics.

And that's the key: a mix that provides the opportunity to innovate, grow and change, but not the reasoning that all the old ways are abandoned just because a few people dictate it should be that way. Pinball must remain true to itself and its essential character. The novel idea is great if it is taken for what it is, but a return to the fundamentals is critical for the survival of this form of entertainment, no matter what it is competing against.

What the rest of the year and the future hold will be decided by how you accept or reject the notions I've tried to explain. Pinball, as we know it, may hang in the balance. Hopefully, everyone will see the light of day and not mimic change, but rather continue to explore, discover, and take chances. But only time will tell what the results will be.

# Future Shock

Things keep racing along regarding pinball, most of it for the good and the rumors continue for future games yet to hit the scene, which may well be in the news by the time you're reading this. Some of my own personal fears have already been voiced in another story in this issue, but suffice it to say that for the most part I am excited by the prospects for pinball this year and its ability to once again become a more viable earning piece of equipment in locations everywhere. We have entered into yet another turning point for the industry and pinball in particular as it strives to once again attract attention and player's interest. So far the battle seems to be going well with public reaction piqued by the hottest games to happen in quite a while. Two of those responsible for the excitement are on view this time around in the Corner, which supply the total package of what pinball is about in many ways: Xenon and Black Knight.

In fact, in looking at the recent evolution of pinball and the landmark games which have had an impact on the growth and direction of the industry, one would have to start with Allied Leisure's Dyn'O Mite and Mirco's Spirit of '76 to begin with because of what they offered in terms of solid state electronics and the potential of this new technology to be integrated into the old electromechanical scheme of things. Next would be Eight Ball and the progression of memory and recall within the framework of a multi-

player game having the intrinsic playability of the old one-player machines and the concept of buildup of action and points during the course of a game. From here we can glide to The Atarians and the recognition that playfield size could be changed, whether into a widebody format or the newer big game size or even into the cocktail table craze that kind of came and wentwith pinball at least. Move next to Flash and the integration of cosmetics to pinball, flashing lights and innovative sound treatments to say the least, and pinball was off and running.

Add the capability of speech introduced on Gorgar and you get a feel for some of the thinking that the manufacturers were going through on a very superficial leve. Then with multi-ball reintroduced and modified for today's electronics, one found Firepower taking center stage.

And now comes the time for the double level game and its ramifications with the unveiling of Black Knight at the AMOA. Along the way one can be a purist and look at in-line targets, memory drop targets, seven digit scoring, the utilization of time as a pinball feature, and other nuances to get an overall sense of how far pinball has really come in five short years. It is astounding to think of the everpresent developments and their ultimate impact on the playing public. Unfortunately, for pinball at least, the overwhelming success of video the past few years has tended to envelop and shroud, even minimize, the strides pinball has taken, so that much isn't truly appreciated. But it should be and maybe a new day is dawning for pinball and the opportunity to get back part of the audience that left it because many of the changes were just too subtle for the average player to recognize or understand. Any way you look at it, things are swiftly hitting and all we can do is try to catch our breath and watch as the present and future unfolds itself.

As for the games this month, it's an interesting mix that tends to once again point out the directions at least three of the majors are taking with pinball development and technological refinements. So let's take a closer look at the newsmakers and see where and how they succeed or fail.

#### Gottlieb's TIME LINE

Not deterred by the somewhat lukewarm reception to James Bond, this company is back with a better utilized "time" game that incorporates a few different things in trying to keep a parity with the rest of the industry.

PLAYFIELD: The action begins with a top left side game-within-a-game set up that's called the "Atomic Time Zone" with five drop targets and two little flippers. Then it's down to a left side target that means extra ball when lit. Just below this and toward the center of the field is a four-droptarget bank of yellow drop targets. Back to the primary field there's a center opening that leads back down to the plunger and is sided by a five-drop-target bank and a right side set

up of three targets and a right side short lane. In the middle is an array of three thumper bumpers for space that's otherwise fairly wide open. Another target is at the right at midfield before leading down to a bottom that features a double lane set up on the right side as well as a gate for getting back to the plunger when it's activated, while on the left side is far left kick-back kicker (shades of Bally's Future Spa) and a middle drain lane with a single lane leading down to the flippers.

ANALYSIS: The action of Time Line is interesting because the beginning finds the top set of flippers activated. but not the bottom, for the player to try to get out that enclosed set of targets before the time elapses. The basic play of the game is to complete target banks and hit other targets around the field in order to fill out the tic-tac-toe set-up in the middle of the field; doing so builds up multiplier values as well as lighting specials and extra balls. Many of the shots throughout the board are nice and long with a good assortment from left to right and right to left and even reverses to most points on the board. For this size playfield, the layout (for the most part) works effectively given what Gottlieb has done in terms of technology and not having multi-ball play, which some have suggested might have helped, an observation not held by this

GRAPHICS: Lights flashing and a slew of sound effects have brought this game into the present along with some innovative uses of the backglass for scoring out-hole bonus values. But there are attract modes for getting the game alive and tied into some good artwork by industry standards, let alone this company in general, Time Line succeeds at attracting the eye and ear with a modern effective pinball machine. PLAY: The scoring is a big (if not the biggest) problem with Gottlieb games since the macnufacturer hasn't acknowledged the necessity for a seventh digit or even a million light for the scoring potential of this machine as well as its others. It is vital in this day and age not to monkey with the scoring values on the playfield, but at least to have the capability of not walking into a location and seeing 999,990 as the high score to date after a machine

has been out on location for a couple

of weeks. The adverse reaction by

the players is incredible and must be

vital since this company is the only

one that hasn't switched over to

some way of denoting seven digit scores.

However, what is offered for the levels for extra ball play is something like 600,000 and 900,000 points, and for free play maybe 750,000 and 1,000,000 points. Two limits seem to be all this game can take and a general trend in the industry on some of the newest machines.

PROS & CONS: Outside of the scoring, I really don't have too many problems with Time Line. In fact, I like the way it plays and the shot possibilities, although it might have been nice to have some other access point to those targets at the top left playfield, especially since that center shot to the plunger is a real bitch. But all in all, the game has some good variety and shots that can be very satisfying to accomplish, but without the seventh digit, or some other method of showing scores that can climb past a million, the game belongs in the dark ages, unless high score to date is changed daily.

#### RATING: ###

#### Ballu's XENON

Well, here's the machine that at the the show in Chicago had people asking what the price was for the displays as well. The game is ready, "kiosk-less," but striking nonetheless for what it offers.

PLAYFIELD: The playfield begins with four little roll-overs on top that are reminiscent of those on Odds and Evens and Hi-Deal. There's also a kick-out hole before one gets down to a four-thumper-bumper area in the middle of the field. Over at the left is a spinner for access to the top. Farther down on the left are two yellow stationary targets which are balanced off by a four-drop-target bank at the right side. Also at the right is entry to the innovative addition of the game's elevated "transport tube" which leads across the field and over to the left side where there's a roll-down to a kickout hole and access through a gate back to the field. The bottom is a conventional wire lane leading down to flippers set up and that's the basic game.

ANALYSIS: Initially, Xenon looked like the basic two-shot game of a tube shot and a spinner but on playing it more and more, one can get into the subtleties of the design and the variety of play that's possible. The top roll-overs can trip down the appropriate drop targets in that right side bank which build up in value from 2X to 4X to points and

extra ball and special on any given ball. The other part of the game is the inclusion of multi-ball play that's activated by landing in that top kickout hole enough times to light the tube for captive ball and then build to getting both balls locked before they're released. And what's nice is that everything has a value, including the tube shot and the kick-out hole at the left side which has its own "Mota" value that builds up by increments from 5,000 to 90,000 points and specials. Add to this the spelling out of X-E-N-O-N by hitting the lit targets at the left and getting the kick-out hole at the top and there's hold-over values of 20,000 or 40,000 points and special for super bonus points. The play is good from the obvious right to left and left to right but there are also some good reverses, even for the tube shot and the attraction of great sound effects and speech (Bally's first effort, complete with female voice) and a package that is complete unto itself. GRAPHICS: Xenon is truly a remarkable effort cosmetically, taking a cue from the success of Space Invaders and adapting it in blues and bright colors for a sensational backglass effect and a field that's equally attractive with its flashing lights and mixing of shades and strong tones.

PLAY: "Welcome to Xenon" is the beckoning overture that leads a player to a machine that has caused guite a bit of excitement on all levels. And as to the playability and scoring potential, points are available in quantities if a player can build up values from ball to ball, since the basic thread of this game is to have the continuity throughout the play with mega-points hopefully coming at the third ball. For limits with the seven-digit scoring in extra ball areas you might want to try a 500,000 point start and follow it with 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 point levels. On free play you should be able to get by with increases of about 250,000 to 400,000 points for each depending upon what you're retaining in the memory and whether you're building up the tube shot value by double increments rather than one at a time (double is far better.)

PROS & CONS: Bally has gotten itself back on track with their last few games and especially Space Invaders, Skateball, and now Xenon. They're innovating, trying different things, and the results are showing their moves to be sound. In terms of packaging, this effort has it all and tends to make the game more



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than the intricacy of play. The tube, which is the "new level" of play other than an actual double level to come with Flash Gordon, is something that's eye-catching and playable as is the use of two-ball, multi-ball play when the values have been built. The shots are there and can be found in time, and with the extra digits players should keep at this game trying to top the imaginary phantom wizard. It's just good basic pinball that's been dresed up and shimmers with the effects of the cosmetics.

RATING: ####

#### Williams' BLACK KNIGHT

What can you say about a machine whose impact of introduction is still being felt and will continue to be the standard for the immediate future, while taking its rightful place in pinball history? As Mike Stroll asked me at the show, "If the top is a four then *Black Knight* has got to be a five," and in many ways he's probably right, if I were to bend the rules—but on to the review of this exceptional machine that has so much to offer.

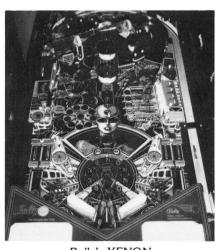

PLAYFIELD: Even though Black Knight is a double-level game, one can view it almost as a single playfield that has a part that's elevated. And so I'll try to do the rundown accordingly. The action begins with the ball coming out at the top right and leading down to two flippers and ramps between the two and over to the right leading down to the bottom level of the field. Also on top is a three-drop-target bank at the right and another bank of three at the left with one lone thumper bumper in the middle. Add a loop from the left flipper and around to an area for stacking balls for multiple ball play. Move down to the lower field and there is a three-drop-target bank at the middle of the field as well as a kick-out hole just to the right of this set-up. Move over to the left of this and there's a little loop for bonus multiplier. Also over at the left is a spinner for access back to the top and a left side drop target bank of three more targets. The bottom, on the surface, is a conventional wire lane and flipper configuration, although there's a lot more going on here than meets the eye, not the





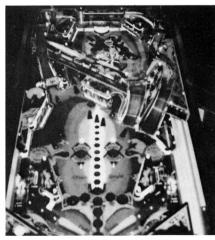

least of which is the addition of an extra set of buttons on the side of the cabinet and a couple of orange arrows on the playfield just above the lanes.

ANALYSIS: Where does one begin with Black Knight? Maybe, the best way is to say that in addition to multiball play, which can be accomplished on top and by the kick-out hole on the bottom, one can get two or three multi-ball play with double or triple point values on the field for the duration of the multi-ball play, so that if a target is worth 5,000 points it can be worth 10,000 or 15,000 points during multi-ball play. Okay, that's one thing. How about the drop targets? Well, in front of each bank are three arrows, blue and red. Finish off three times, and both sets on top and an extra ball value lights at the turn of the arc at the top of that left side spinner lane. Finish off the bottom and finish the entire set, and there's another extra ball possible from the multiplier loop shot as well as special possibilities.

Now, for the exra gizmos that truly make this a breed apart and are a tribute to Larry, Steve and the rest

of the people who had a hand in getting the whole package together —the first to look at is the continuity of thought, to think through a game and design and program it accordingly. Go down the right lane to the flipper and the spinner value is lit for gonzo point possibilities. Go down the left to the left flipper and that interior ramp back to the top offers a mustery score that can really bring big points, especially during multi-ball play. And all of the features—drop targets, spinner being lit, and mystery value—are tied into time, a matter of seconds before values are turned off or incomplete drop target banks are reset waiting to be hit again.

And along the time lines is the innovative "Magna Save" at the top of the lanes which is lit when banks of targets are completed and can be activated to save, or possibly save a ball that might be draining out the sides. It's timing, getting comfortable with the extra buttons on the cabinet and a great addition to keeping the player involved from the moment the coins go in the slot. The shots are pure from left to right and right to left on the bottom, as well as some good reverses and at the top it's a matter of speed and timing to try to lock up balls and get drop targets, while also trying to keep the ball on this part of the field. In fact, as I told the man who has almost single-handedly changed the face of pinball in recent years, Steve R., it is the only game so far that I've personally played where I've gotten a physical rush from playing it. You can't be passive and laid back in attacking Black Knight. there's no way. You have to be wound up and get into the flow of things and keep the action hopping. It's that simple.

GRAPHICS: The artwork is eyecatching, not space-themed or even anything that dramatically different from good pinball artwork, but it's the total package that makes everything shine—from flashing lights, running displays of two's or three's, the integration of speech that doesn't detract from the game but enhances it, to Larry's "sword effect" that's a sight to behold if and when you get lucky enough to fill up the out-hole bonus complete with multiplier. An outstanding, thoughtful game that shows the time that went into the planning, conception, and ultimate package.

PLAY: When talking about limits, it's time to get into yet another part of the game that's innovative and the result of players doing a player's game. How about "Last Chance" that lights on the out-lanes during the last ball in play if a player has locked up one or more balls during the last ball. Go out the side and the balls due the player are released for (just as the name implies) one last chance of getting the points and features necessary for an extra ball or special. Now, if that weren't enough Black Knight has even more.

When there's more than one player playing, or even one player playing two or more games at once, Black Knight does a great thing at the end of the game. Whatever player has the highest score is awarded a "Bonus Ball" for being the best score and the chance to play all three balls at once or any combination thereof in the hopes of getting each drop target bank down at least once for the opportunity to light that multiplier loop for an extra ball and, of course, even more points to the score. So, with all this great stuff going on, bells, whistles, hoof beats, flashing lights, dancing numbers, etc., where you put the limits for extra ball play or even the timer for the bonus ball since you may want to run this at 30 seconds or 40 seconds, is something that the operator is going to have to decide when the machine comes in since there are more than enough adjustments possible. Well, on extra ball play and even for free play, two limits should suffice since the game has so much going for it. For the former, try a 600,000 point start and follow it with 1,200,000 points. On free play you might want to go directly to the 1,000,000 point plateau, depending upon the calibre of your players and how liberally you've set your timers on the field, and follow it with 2,000,000 points. PROS & CONS: Black Knight has it all and then some, with subtleties that are profound for the purists, not the least of which is that continuity of the right lane light the left spinner and the left lane lighting the right side mystery score ramp. In total, the game is a joy to play that's not cheating anyone at the 50¢ play. three for \$1 it's going to be going out on. There's more than enough to sustain the price increase.

The important thing is that the

game, mechanically, is doing all that it should and that it's level and isn't cheating the player out of anything, because if you keep it going the players are going to keep on coming back for more and more. And more than that, people are going to watch the game being played. It takes time to get comfortable with it, which might be a turnoff to the real novice, but once the nuances are mastered all that remains is mastering the shots—no simple task for even the skilled player on a regular basis.

An exceptional, dramatic breakthrough for pinball. On the one hand I want to shout about Black Knight but on the other I fear what I wrote about in the other feature I did in this issue of PLAY METER, that some may feel that a pinball machine will have to be multi-level to be viable or successful. Wrong. For this effort it works, even for Flash Gordon (upcoming in a review) and some of the others on the drawing board the concept of multi-level play can be intriguing and even exciting, but it can't be a replacement to all other aproaches for valid pinball machines. Single level games, innovatively and thoughtfully designed and programmed can still earn the bucks, believe it.

For Mike Stroll and many others who have asked, let's keep the ratings on the same level as usual and think of Black Knight as at least:

RATING: ####+

And that's the games this time around around. An interesting mix of equipment that shows Gottlieb is trying to get back to parity, and Bally becoming far more aggressive in its machines, while Williams rolls along, astounding and making inroads far into the realm of what pinball can be. Next month more good stuff, including a sleeper that's a pretty fair game, Bally's Frontier, which shouldn't slip by everyone's attention, Gottlieb's attempt at multi-ball play called Force II, and some other goodies that are soon to break as of this writing, not the least of which is Flash Gordon, to come in these pages. Just keep going with the flow, know that every location is going to need at least one Black Knight, Xenon, and Flash Gordon from the recent efforts and who knows what else regarding what's about to break.

Until then, as always, be well and prosper.



### Force II moves out

Force II, Gottlieb's new multi-ball machine, is being shipped to Gottlieb domestic distributors after a highly successful field test period, according to the the company's sales vice president, Tom Herrick.

"Test samples were flowing into the field right around AMOA show time," said Herrick, "and although it is usually wise from a marketing viewpoint not to talk too much about a game until production is just around the corner, word of the great performance of the game on test has spread through the industry in a big hurry."

Force II features unlimited multiball, letting players explode into this feature again and again during each game. Red-white-blue rollovers light their corresponding spot targets, any of which activate the second ball launching system. Docking the first ball in either of two kick-out holes begins the multi-ball phase with a burst of sound and light effects.

The dazzling playfield of Force II is packed with 17 targets, rollovers, kickout holes, and two extra flippers opposite strategically located banks of drop targets. Special highpowered pop bumpers and highenergy flippers speed the game to a fever pitch with dramatic deep-space graphics and powerful new sound system.





### Sets sights on space

The first product to be marketed in the United States and Canada by Nintendo of America is Radar Scope, a new coin-operated electronic video game engineered for flexibility of operation.

Radar Scope is available in three designs: Cockpit, upright, and cocktail table models. It has a Sanyo full-color monitor that produces outstanding visual images plus "dynamic sound effects to enhance the action on the screen," said

product literature.

Radar Scope's space adventure offers one or two players the opportunity to control an existing fight between spaceships and enemy fleets of UFOs that appear from the ends of the cosmos in a bright, dramatic image on the radar screen. Enemy spaceships and space mines attack from the darkest corners of outer space. Racing at cosmic speeds, their mission is to destroy the player's spaceship.

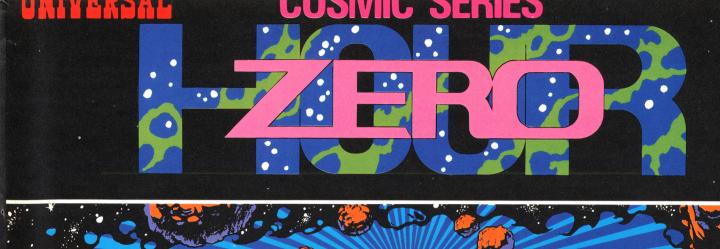
The player defends his spaceship with rapid-fire laser shots from his vehicle. When a given number of points is attained, the player will earn an extra spaceship to entend his

amount of playing time.

The five highest scores achieved are stored and continuously displayed on the radar screen next to the player's name. This option allows the high-scoring player to insert his or her own name, up to 12 characters, into the machine.

Radar Scope provides the operator with flexibility of control not found in many similar machines. Depending upon players' skill, the operator can control the degree of difficulty of the game. Adjustable coinage from 25¢ to \$1.25 can be set. Up to four games may be played in succession. The operator can select to award the extra spaceship to players at one of four different point levels: 7,000, 10,000, 15,000 or 20,000. The number of free spaceships that can be earned in each game is also adjustable at 3 to 6.

Nintendo is a 90-year old company that has been manufacturing electronic video games since 1973.









### Face up to Pac-Man

Midway's one- or two-player cocktail tables, including the *Pac-Man* video, feature a flip-flop screen for "face to face" amusement that both men and women enjoy. The compact sit-down cabinet measures 29" high, 32" wide, and 22" deep. A base accessory is available that raises the cocktail table model to a height of 38" for upright, "stand-by" play.

Pac-Man is a game that is practically created for cocktail table play. The player, using a single handle control, guides the "Pac-Man" about the maze, scoring points by munching up the dots in his path. Four Ghost Monsters—Inky, Blinky, Pinky, and Clyde—chase after the "Pac-Man," trying to capture and deflate him.

The "Pac-Man" can counterattack by eating the big Power Capsule that enables him to overpower the monsters for additional score. After all the Dots are gobbled up, a new labyrinth appears, and *Pac-Man* continues for another round.

Players start with three Pac-Men. An additional Pac-Man is awarded for 10,000 points.

Pac-Man is also produced in standard arcade and in Midway's Mini-Myte style.



### Extends Talk-A-Phone

Long distance intercommunication to extend the range of the intercom to meet new needs, is being offered as an optional feature by Talk-A-Phone Co., of Chicago.

For use over cable lines of from 2000 feet to 40 miles without loss of volume, the "LD" feature can be added to any Talk-A-Phone Chief or Chief Redi-Power master station, which can then also be used for communication with master and staff stations at conventional distances. The long distance feature is automatically provided when conversing with other "LD" masters, and normal operation automatically resumes when conversing with non-LD masters and staff stations.

The "LD" feature, which extends the working range of the intercom, can be added to any Talk-A-Phone Chief master station on order, or upon return of an existing master to the factory. Talk-A-Phone systems in use can be expanded or changed to meet new conditions, without the need for users to replace present equipment, said the manufacturer.

A popular use of the "LD" models is communication between branch offices, or offices and warehouses located in separate buildings, or even in towns which are miles apart. Of particular advantage with the "LD" models is the ability to also utilize masters and remotes at normal operating distances, which enables the same equipment to be used for both long distances and normal intercommunication. Installations at maintenance stations are especially suited for this product.

A built-in feature of the "LD" models enables controls to be locked into the transmit position on one unit so that other units, miles away, can monitor a desired location.

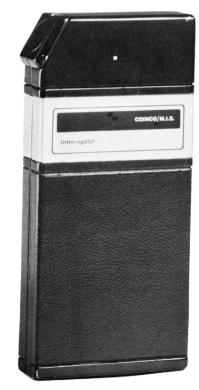
### **Electronic key**

Coin Acceptors, Inc., of St. Louis, unveiled *The Coinco Interrogator* at the National Automatic Merchandising Association Convention in Kansas City. "The Coinco Interrogator is the key to electronic vending technology and to our entire Management Information System," said Claude Trieman, president of Coinco. "It's the key to handling computerized vending which we all know is just around the corner."

The Coinco Interrogator, the link between vending machines on location and the computer in a vending company's office, is slightly larger than a pocket camera and simple to use, taking no more than two seconds to record data from a vending machine. The recorded data provides the owner with a checkand-balance Cash Accountability system that measures the sales of the vending machine against the money in its cash box.

It also provides instant sales analysis by dollars and units, for each vending machine, bank, and route. The data furnishes owners with an accurate daily, weekly, or monthly record of activities of routemen and servicemen. Finally, *The Coinco Interrogator* records a history of service data on a vending machine, allowing for the better planning of

manpower and parts requirements.



### Tilting on multi levels

Williams Electronics, Inc. introduced its much-awaited Black Knight pinball game at the AMOA convention. Excitement and enthusiasm greeted the first multilevel, multi-ball pinball game.

Black Knight's playfield is constructed on two separate levels connected by three ramps giving fast access to and from the top level. Two separate sets of flippers enable players to manipulate the ball on both playfield levels. Skillful maneuvering of the ball between the multi-levels is a must for players to accumulate high scoring.

To begin scoring possibilities that can break into seven digits, players concentrate on the diverse ways to get Multi-Ball which can be achieved on either playfield level. The Multi-Ball eject hole accumulator on the upper level will hold up to three balls; the bottom playfield eject hole, one ball. Locking up a ball in each eject hole (the first ball sunk must be on the top playfield) will give a player two balls in play which achieves double scoring on all playfield accomplishments. Three balls in play gives triple scoring and can be attained by making two balls on top and one on the bottom or getting all three balls in the second level Multi-Ball lock-up in one turn.

If a previous player has sunk balls in the eject holes, balls will continue to pop out until the current player accomplishes Multi-Ball on his own merit. Black Knight's exclusive digital score animation flashes 2 or 3 on the score displays so all players will know when the balls in play are achieving double or triple scoring.

Since the ball speeds up and down the three ramps from level to level, Williams' Magna-Save becomes a vital feature for players—a playercontrolled saving device operated by two red buttons on the side of the cabinet just forward of the flipper buttons. Skillful players can use Magna-Save to prevent the ball from leaving the playfield via the outside lanes. The use of Magna-Save is earned whenever any one bank of the four drop target banks is made. All of Black Knight's drop target banks operate on a timing device.

If these challenges don't keep players on their toes, Black Knight offers additional tests of skill.







### Video war: No Man's Land

The 1980 AMOA Show was the forum for unveiling No Man's Land, a new combat video game from D. Gottlieb & Co., which is demonstrating its fully committed entrance into the total amusement game business and video in particular, its officers said.

Robert Bloom, Gottlieb president and CEO, said, "This is a major manufacturing and marketing effort that has been in the planning stages for many months. I think it will become apparent at once to the games industry that we are jumping into video with both feet and on a permanent basis. The character of the first game in its upright and cocktail table configurations should offer solid evidence that we intend to become a major producer in this segment of the industry.

'We chose not to enter the field until we had built up a backlog series of video games to maintain a continuity of production models once we started manufacturing. Initially we will go the licensing route which will probably be continued indefinitely. However, we have a manpower pool of inventive engineering and a modern new plant that will be totally dedicated to video games. In a short period of time we fully expect to be a major factor in the video game business.

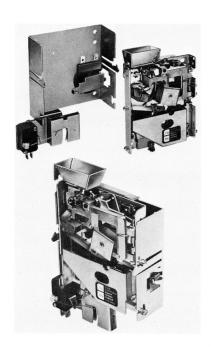
Bloom concluded, "We are extremely happy to be able to offer this new line of video games to our existing distributors—all of whom have concentrated so faithfully on Gottlieb pinball over the years. Our distributor network is worldwide, and Gottlieb upright and cocktail table models will be marketed internationally."
