Pool tournament is nation's largest

All across Ohio, a \$25,000 coin-operated 8-Ball Tournament is under way. Sponsored by U.S. Billiards and Shaffer Distributing Company with offices in Columbus and Cleveland, this event is considered the nation's largest, with 29 operators and 200 taverns, bowling alleys and arcades participating.

A nine week qualifying tournament is now under way at each location, with the winners meeting for the \$25,000 Tournament Playoff in Columbus on October 1st and 2nd at the Columbus Hilton Inn.

Ohio coin operators participating include: Hughes Music Co., Springfield; Supreme Novelty, Springfield;

Van Brackel & Sons, Defiance; Automatic Music Co., Painesville; Falcon Vending, Washington C.H.; Roy George Music, Painesville; Elum Music Co., Massillon; Bell Music Co., Akron; Ace Amusement Co., Dayton; R.C. Music Co., Lancaster; Hopkins Music Co., Galion; Big City Game Room, Columbus; Castle Music Co., Akron; Celina Music Co., Celina; Acme Miami Vending, Dayton; Robison Music Co., New-

ark; W K Corporation, Columbus; Captain Fantastic, Columbus; Laughlin Music Co., Athens; Sanborn Vending, Nelsonville; Tora Music Co., Columbus; Gem Music Co., Dayton; and Findlay Music Co., Findlay.

According to Chuck Farmer, Shaffer Director of Marketing, operators report that locations are enthusiastic about the increased business and the state-wide tournament is boosting pool table revenue significantly.

Trophies, pool cues with carrying cases and elaborate Tournament Kit supportive literature have been distributed to all the participating locations throughout Ohio.

Seeburg sale planned

Seeburg Industries, Inc. has reached an agreement in principle to sell the business and certain assets of its Chicago-based products division.

Louis J. Nicastro, chairman of Seeburg, said the company would retain ownership of the products division's Chicago plant together with its machinery and equipment, and that all of these would be leased to the purchaser.

The products division manufactures coin-operated phonographs and post-mix vending equipment.

The purchaser, Nicastro revealed, is a company that will be organized by a group of independent Seeburg distributors. Under the terms of the agreement, the group will acquire approximately \$7.3 million of products division assets for cash, notes, and assumption of current liabilities.

According to Allan Meltzer, an attorney handling the case, the purchasing body has not yet formed under a corporate name or elected a leadership. "The buyer," he said, "is still somewhat an amorphous body, and the company officials are also semi-anonymous."

The transaction, which is subject to the execution of definitive agreements and, finally, to ratification by the Seeburg board of directors, will not affect Seeburg's other operations. Seeburg will continue—through its Choice-Vend, Williams Electronics, Qualitone, King Musical Instrument, and entertainment divisions—to manufacture and market bottle and can vending machines, coin-operated amusement games, hearing aids, and musical instruments, and operate a theater-in-the-round.

AMOA schedules mechanics schools

With the recent success of three other mechanics schools, the AMOA has scheduled two more schools for Indiana and North Carolina.

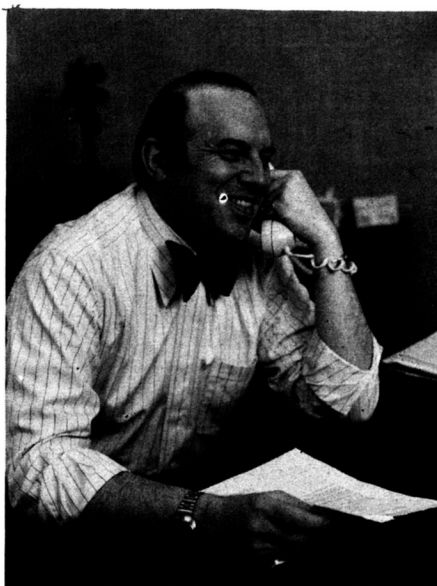
The Indiana school, which is currently in progress, is running from September 12-21 at the Best Western Motel in Indianapolis, Indiana. The North Carolina school will be held later this month in either Raleigh or Charlotte. Dates on that school have been set for September 26 through October 5.

Don Miller will be the instructor for both sessions. He has over 30 years experience in coin machines and was formerly owner of a coin machine school in Denver, Colorado. The AMOA schools will specialize in schematic reading and how to apply that knowledge to the machines.

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Caras resigns from Atari

C. Marshall Caras has resigned his position as director of marketing at Atari to accept a position as vice president of marketing at Gottlieb Company.

Caras, who has been active in the coin-operated game industry for over twenty years, had joined Atari earlier this year, leaving behind a general manager position at Rowe International in Dedham, Massachusetts.

A graduate of Harvard University, he holds a master of business administration degree from that school.

Caras has been actively involved with the International Association of Amusement Parks and Attractions.

Change company reports growth

Changer Service, Inc. (CSI) of Redwood City, California, a service organization for coin and bill changers, has reported its fourth consecutive year of increase in the compound average sales volume.

The firm, which is only four years old, experienced a 54 percent increase in sales volume over the previous year and a 41 percent increase in the company's profit.

According to the firm's president, Jim Sedam, the company anticipates another record year during 1977-78. This projection is based upon CSI's expanded facilities, increase in personnel, and a larger range of services offered.

Changer Service has branch offices in Redwood City, Atlanta, and Dallas.

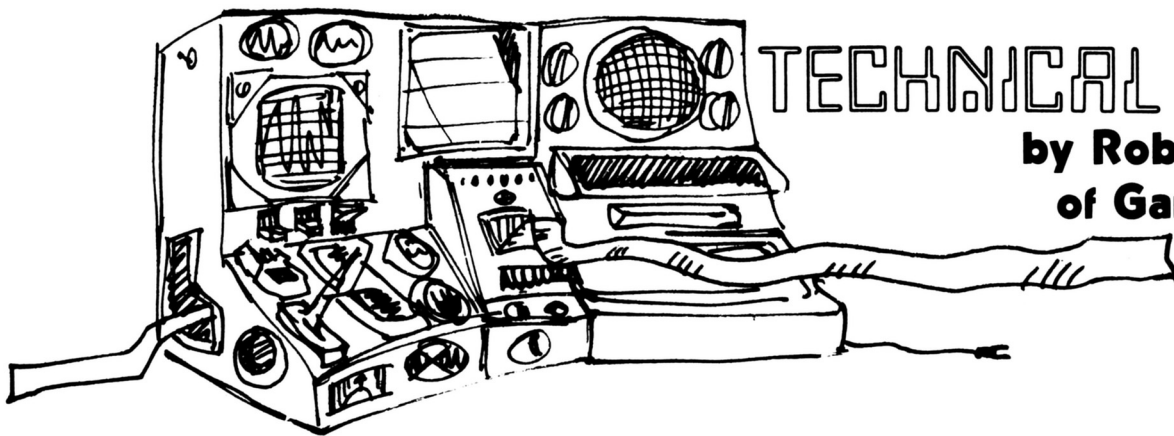

Fixing your steering boards

For those of you who still have doubts about fixing your own steering boards, this little circuit may help you get the job done by letting you know if the infrared light emitting diode is working or not (See Technical Topics Update July 1977). The basic circuit is almost identical to one channel of the steering board itself with the inclusion of a visible L.E.D. to indicate the condition of the output.

CONSTRUCTION

I built my detector on a six pin edge connector. Since Atari uses the Molex connector for interface

with the games themselves, using an edge connector lets you pick off the five-volt and ground signals to power the detector, while leaving the steering board connected to the game.

The photo-transistor is mounted on the end of a pair of wires so it can be placed in front of the L.E.D. in the steering board. If the L.E.D. is working, Q1 will see the I.R. beam and start to conduct. This will bias the amplifier transistor Q2 so that it too begins conducting. The visible L.E.D. on the output will then be energized so you can easily see

when the photo-transistor is receiving a light source.

It's a good idea to mask the photo-transistor, leaving just a small hole for the L.E.D. to shine through. This will keep ambient light in the room from causing erroneous indications.

Awakening to solid state

Well, it looks like the industry is finally waking up and getting to know something about solid state electronics. As an increasingly larger percentage of the equipment goes to digital control, operators have been forced to get hip to the repair scene or suffer outrageous repair bills from local (or not so local) distributors. Dependency on outside circuit board or monitor repair can cause downtime of weeks or months; so a blown board really means blown income.

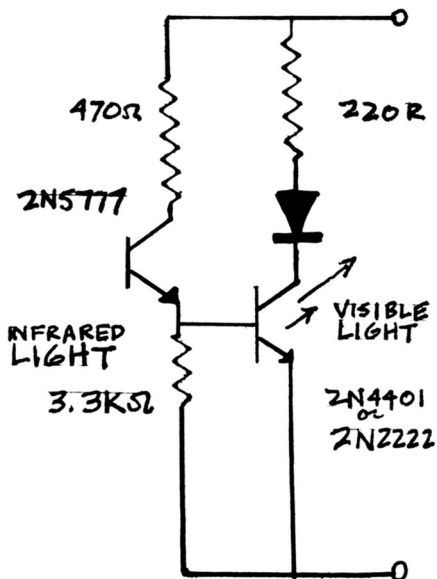
As a result of this equipment modernization, smart operators have been paying big bucks for technicians to do solid state repair. This often involves \$2,000 or more in shop equipment, but the investment is well worth it when you consider the total cost of the equipment being operated. There is however, a missing link in the business of keeping things running. When a logic board or monitor fails on location, can you fix the game the first time out without having to return to base for a replacement board or monitor? Short of carrying a spare board for every game being

operated, the only logical answer is in-field printed circuit board repair.

Repairing boards on location is not only feasible, but highly practical. If a serviceman has to make two trips to repair a solid-state machine (one to diagnose the problem and a return trip to install a new board), then there is room for improvement in present day maintenance and repair schemes.

Instead of taking your problem to the technician (with the inevitable delays involved), why not send your expert to the problem? Since the majority of P.C.B. repairs are simple things like power supply problems or shorted input buffers (coin switch, start button, joy sticks, etc.), fixing a board on location is often a simple matter of making a quick diagnosis and replacing the defective component(s). I've had a great deal of success doing P.C.B. repair using only a logic probe, a V.O.M. and a handful of common chips.

Hopefully, it won't be long before the field mechanic becomes a skilled technician and replacing a bad I.C. as common a field repair as changing a burned coil.

Tomorrow's Favorites

I'm vacating the premises. I'm leaving. I need a break from everything that has to do with work. As many writers say, "I'm burning out." This term has to do with having no ideas left. The mind becomes a total blank. Writer's block if you will.

So, I'm packing up a few good friends, my wife and my sailboat, and heading off towards Catalina Island. The trip will take us about six hours. Catalina Island is a paradise that one can only reach by boat, and since it is a good trip as far as time is concerned, not too many people flock over there. What is to be found on the island? Wild buffalo, boars, wild mountain goats, and hardly any people. And, by the same token, hardly any civilization. No stores. No fresh water. No television, and no music. So I'm making a tape to take along with me on the trip.

And luckily I got some very good music to bring along, in the way of singles I can tape. Below, I'm going to list my favorites of this month. And there's no reason why you can't put any of them in your jukeboxes...they might very well become your customer's favorites...

Waking Up Alone—Paul Williams/A&M Records 1961

This is a newly-recorded version of this tune. If my memory serves me right, this tune is not new, and by that I mean a couple of years old...not just a few months. I liked the album version much better, but Paul has still retained the original music, the only thing that has changed is the arrangement. It's a bit faster, and a bit "slicker." This is a fine tune for all you middle-of-the-roaders. Paul's voice hasn't changed one bit over the years, and for his public, I think it's great. Some artists try to change their style too radically, and end up losing admirers. This tune is super.

No One Remembers My Name—Burt Bacharach/A&M Records 1960

Hmm...we haven't heard from Burt for awhile, I wonder if the title of this song has something to do with his comeback. The only memorable thing I can remember about Burt lately is his television commercial for Martini and Rossi (on the rocks).

Anyway, he is great, and always has been. Hal David's lyrics, combined with Burt's tunes are simply wonderful. There is no genius here, but there is pure enjoyment. This nostalgic song has only one fault...and that's no credit given for the vocalist. Great tune, great arrangement and great lyrics. What else can I say? On the flip side, we have the title track from the lp, FUTURES. The single number is the same as above...

Futures is still a definite Bacharach tune. I don't care for it as much as the previous tune. But this one still has its merit. It's totally instrumental, with some fine horn solos. The arrangement is "super-slick" and flies. It's quite a trip.

One can imagine a sailboat cutting the water, or a plane flying through a cloud bank...whatever your mind desires. I would buy this record for the other side, and as an added bonus, you get the tune Futures.

If You're Not Back In Love By Millie Jackson/Spring Records 175

I've always been very fond of Millie Jackson, but the frustrating part is that the only other people who seem to like her are the record companies that put out her singles. I don't recall her ever having a big hit. And it's a shame. She is a very talented lady. This number is a soul song, like most of her material (She does jazz tunes very well too) and punches a great story right on home to anyone who has ever had a break-up with a lover. The lyrics remind me of the type you would hear in a country song. Very honest. Very frank. This tune has a complete horn section, and lush strings. It is a tear jerker, and for those die-hard romantics who patronize your jukeboxes...this is a must.

I'm going to finish taping now. And believe me, all of these tunes will be playing as I head out of the harbor towards Catalina Island, reciting my favorite poem, "I must down to the sea again, to the lonely sea and the sky, And all I ask is a tall ship and a star to steer her by..."
