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EDITORIAL Energizing Radio

Disco radio is coming of age. From scattered major market beginnings, dancing music has proliferated to more than one hundred stations. And that figure is deceiving because many more Top 40, AOR and black stations are playing the disco hits.

It's hard not to play them. One look at the pop chart shows that disco music has broad appeal. In fact, some promoters feel that it will be harder to break a rock and roll record on Top 40 stations than it will to break a new disco record in the next six months. There are still skeptics who doubt the viability of pure disco formats for radio. Some say it will work in a fast-paced urban environment like New York but not in their markets. Because of the newness of disco on the radio, no one really knows what will work. Time will tell is the cliché and the

truth.

Knowledgeable radio observers expect disco music to undergo a natural fragmentation into Top 40 disco, progressive disco, MOR disco and a plethora of other variations which will only intensify the penetration of disco as a whole. What is certain is that radio has embarked upon a daring experiment.

Disco has raised passions — pro and con. And isn't that what radio should be all about? Many radio observers have felt that radio in the 1970s was stagnant. Rock's crown was seen to slip. Disco is the upstart, the new sound.

Radio is big enough for rock and disco and beautiful music and jazz and . . . The point is that the choice enlivens radio.

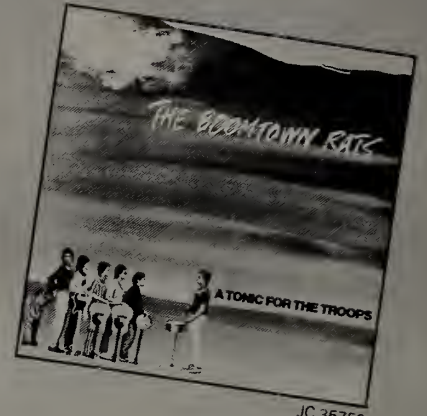

Promo Denies CBS Charges, Sues Ardens And Yetnikoff

NEW YORK — Promo Records, Inc. and its president, Morris Levy, recently filed answers and counterclaims to the suit filed against them last fall by CBS, Inc. and Jet Records (**Cash Box**, October 28). In addition, in its deposition with the State Superior Court in Trenton, N.J., Promo and Levy filed a separate suit against these third-party defendants: Don Arden, Dave Arden, Sharon Arden, Walter Yetnikoff, the Fireman's Insurance Company of Newark, N.J., and Billboard Publications Inc. The Ardens are affiliated with Jet Records, and Yetnikoff is president of the CBS Records Group.

CBS and Jet had earlier attempted to obtain a court injunction that would have prevented Promo from selling whatever remained in its possession of the 1.2 million ELO "Out Of The Blue" albums that the cutout distributor had purchased from the UA Music and Record Group (UAMRG). Although CBS and Jet did secure a temporary injunction in October, this was lifted two days later in New Jersey State Superior Court.

One of the key points in Promo's answers to the CBS/Jet suit is that "all 'Out Of The Blue' albums ever in the possession of Promo were rightfully its by reason of the UAMRG/Promo contract." In addition, Promo notes, all of the ELO records sold to Promo were credited to UAMRG subsequent to March 31, 1978, and therefore

Columbia Signs Paul McCartney

NEW YORK — Paul McCartney and Wings have signed a recording contract with Columbia Records, capping months of intensive negotiations and industry speculation.

Although specific terms of the reported multi-million dollar deal were not revealed, the contract is believed to be one of the largest ever signed by a recording artist.

Lee Eastman, an attorney who represents McCartney, stated that the contract includes the transfer of McCartney's Capitol Records catalog to Columbia Records in staggered stages, "when the distribution rights for the albums run out. The first catalog albums are set to be transferred to Columbia by the end of 1979," Eastman said.

Eastman also confirmed that the Columbia contract covered recording and distribution rights for McCartney product in the United States and Canada only. EMI will retain worldwide rights for future albums by McCartney and Wings.

Revised History

Promo's eleven counterclaims and the third-party suit, which together ask for hundreds of millions of dollars in damages, contain assertions about the disputed ELO albums that throw their history into a considerably different light than that outlined in the CBS/Jet suit. Disco Formats Spread Across Nation To 100 Plus Stations

LOS ANGELES — In the midst of an explosive period of expansion, disco formats continue to sweep the country with a growing number of AOR, Black and Top 40 stations switching to full or part-time disco programming. In the last six months, disco radio has expanded from a handful of major market stations to more than 100 stations across the nation.

In January, the following are some of the stations which switched formats to disco: WUNW-FM in Milwaukee, WZZD-AM in Philadelphia, WRPL in Charlotte, North Carolina, KLAZ-AM in Little Rock, KEYN-AM in Wichita, KDUK, KPJG, and KIKI in Honolulu, CHIC-AM in Toronto, Canada, KKSS in St. Louis, KJLA in Kansas City, KITT in San Diego, KTFM in San Antonio, WOKU in Pittsburgh, WOOO-FM in Statesville, N.C., WXKS in Boston, and WHSB in Alpen, Michigan.

MCA Purchasing ABC Label; Future Of ABC Staff Unclear

LOS ANGELES — The long-rumored sale of ABC Records was made official Jan. 30 with the announcement that MCA, Inc. had purchased the label. A joint statement by Sid Sheinberg, president and chief operating officer of MCA, Inc., and Elton Rule, president and chief operating officer of ABC, Inc., predicted that "the acquisition will be consummated in early March after compliance with certain regulatory waiting periods."

MCA will immediately take over the pressing and distribution of ABC Records. The future status of the ABC Records staff is unclear, but Jim Foglesong, ABC's head of Nashville operations, is expected to be in charge of the merged MCA-ABC Nashville operation. MCA's Nashville office has undergone major changes in executive personnel recently, but the combined MCA-ABC Nashville roster will make MCA the largest company in country music.

Steve Diener, president of ABC Records, issued a statement Jan. 31 reassuring retailers that, "The ABC-MCA agreement will not affect ABC Records' customers' ability to return ABC product. Proper returns of ABC product will continue to be honored by ABC Records."

ABC's Demise

ABC Records had a \$29.8 million operating loss in 1977, the last full year that totals have been released. Losses decreased in 1978, according to ABC, but not as much as the company had hoped. ABC had tried to turn its record division around by cutting

back its operation, including the sale of all but three of its distribution centers last summer. The fate of the remaining branches, in New York, Los Angeles and Indianapolis, is yet to be determined.

The status of ABC Records within the MCA structure is also unclear. Most observers expect the ABC name to be dropped, but whether the ABC roster will remain intact under a new name or join MCA Records or MCA's Infinity Records or be divided in some other way remains to be seen.

Irony

An ironic part of the MCA-ABC story is the current success ABC Records is enjoying on the charts. The label is now showing signs of breaking out of a long slump with a number of bulleting records on the pop, R&B, country and jazz charts.

For example, Poco's "Crazy Love" single is currently #37 bullet on the **Cash Box** Top

MCA Distributing Ready For ABC, Says Al Bergamo

LOS ANGELES — Since taking over as head of MCA's new distribution arm several months ago, Al Bergamo, president of MCA Distributing Corp., has completely revamped the way the company gets its records to market. This was done, he says, in anticipation of a deal the size of the recent ABC acquisition.

"Since last October, we've been making changes that would enable us to handle in excess of \$200 million worth of volume, although we didn't have it, anticipating the fact that things like this would happen," says Bergamo.

Among the changes instituted by Bergamo: expanding the number of regional sales offices to five from the previous four; relocating 16 of the existing MCA branches to larger facilities; and opening a new sales office in Dallas, with another branch slated to open shortly in Charlotte, N.C.

Executive Turnover

Besides the physical restructuring of the operation, Bergamo also made some sweeping policy changes. He says a top priority was establishing a pay program that was comparable to the rest of the industry at a time when MCA executives were

Acquired In 1978

Mogul and Rubinstein acquired UA last April from its former parent company, Transamerica Corp., and set up worldwide distribution agreements through EMI and Capitol Records.

Bang Records' roster currently includes Nigel Olsson, Brick and Paul Davis. Starflight Records features Freddy Fender and Tommy McLain.

Bruce Lundvall, president of the CBS Records Division, delivered the keynote address to the gathering at the Fairmont Hotel. He congratulated the organization for its achievements last year and outlined goals for 1979. In another announcement, Walter Yetnikoff, president of the CBS Records Group, informed company executives that Paul McCartney and Wings have been signed to the Columbia label (See separate story).

In addition to discussions covering all areas of field marketing activities, new releases on the Columbia and E/P/A labels were introduced in two product presentations, featuring addresses by Jack Craig, senior vice president and general manager of Columbia, and Don Dempsey, senior vice president and general manager of E/P/A. Columbia presentations were also made by Don Ellis, vice president of

national A&R, and Joe Mansfield, vice president of marketing. E/P/A presentations included remarks by Tony Martell, vice president and general manager of the CBS Associated Labels; Lennie Petze, vice president of national A&R and Larry Harris, vice president and general manager of Portrait Records. Several CBS Records promotion executives offered special product presentations, as well as featuring new singles releases that are scheduled to ship in the coming weeks. These presentations were made by Ed Hynes, vice president of promotion for Columbia; Paris Eley, vice president of promotion for CBS Records black music marketing and Joe Casey, director of promotion for CBS Records Nashville.

Another highlight of the convention were performances by ten artists on the CBS Records roster, including Columbia's Cheryl Lynn, Phoebe Snow, Gladys Knight,

Carnegie Report Rattles NPR

WASHINGTON, D.C. — More diverse programming, an emphasis on minority ownership and a better funding base are the goals set for public radio in the new Carnegie Commission report. And to achieve them, the report says, it will take 250 to 300 new public radio stations by 1985, bringing the total to about 500.

Other key recommendations of the Carnegie Commission on the Future of Public Broadcasting, in a report released last week, include a boost in public broadcasting funding from \$480 million a year to \$1.2 billion by 1985 (\$240 million for radio), and better insulation from political pressures.

The first Carnegie report, which virtually ignored radio in favor of TV, became the

Korvettes Buyout By French Firm In Final Stages

NEW YORK — A letter of intent has been signed by the Agache-Willot Group, a French retail and manufacturing corporation, to purchase controlling interest in Korvettes, the 50-unit retail department chain. The acquisition is expected to be consummated within the next two weeks, according to the principals in the transaction. The change in ownership would be the fourth for Korvettes in three decades (Cash Box, November 4, 1978).

Arlen Realty & Development Corporation has agreed in principle to sell 51% of Korvettes Inc. to Agache-Willot for \$30 million. Arlen intends to retain 49% ownership of Korvettes.

In the past year, Korvettes has narrowed its losses and increased sales. For the fiscal third quarter ended November 26, Korvettes increased its pretax earnings to \$609,000 from \$340,000 a year earlier.

Capitol Putting Big Push On McGuinn, Clark & Hillman LP

LOS ANGELES — Capitol Records is supporting the debut LP from McGuinn, Clark & Hillman with a wide-ranging campaign, including merchandising aids, a showcase tour and substantial advertising. The self-titled debut album from the former Byrds shipped Jan. 29.

Capitol executives say the label's spending on the campaign is equal to what is normally spent on established gold and platinum acts.

"The music on the album is what convinced us to give them the big push," explains Randall Davis, Capitol's director of merchandising and advertising. "We gave them the superstar treatment, with the best studio (Criteria Studios in Miami), and the best producers (Ron and Howard Albert), and they gave us a superstar LP. When we got the rough mixes the Tower staff exploded, and the momentum has been building since."

All of the advertising for the album refers to McGuinn, Clark & Hillman as "A new group on Capitol Records" because the label is trying to avoid representing the group as a return of the Byrds. A 1973 Byrds reunion album on Asylum did not sell well.

"We're not playing up the Byrds angle," notes press and artist relations director Oscar Arslanian, "but we're not avoiding it either. We're putting the full names of the trio on all the support materials so that Byrds fans and fans of their solo albums will recognize the artists."

King Appointed VP Of Promotion At MCA Records

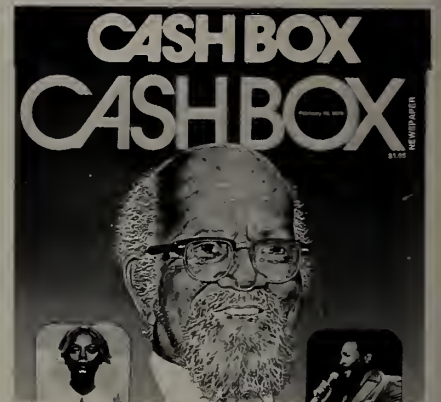
LOS ANGELES — Larry King has been named vice president of promotion at MCA Records.

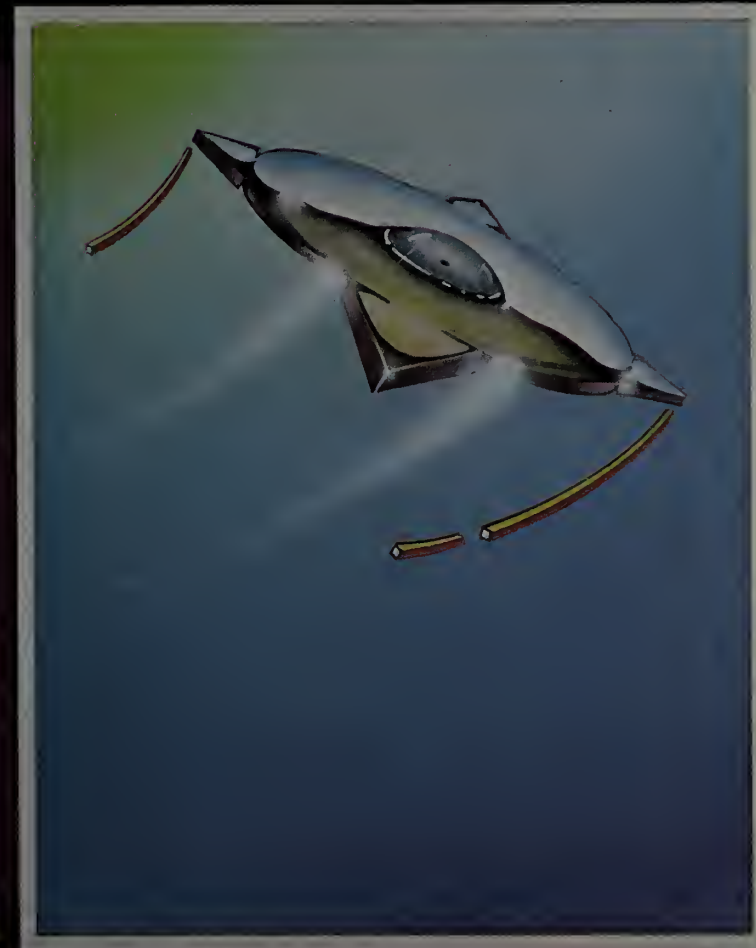

Fabulous Poodles

The Fabulous Poodles are the kind of group whose eclectic musical style and flair for tongue-in-cheek humor embody the best of the British music hall tradition. This appealing diversity is demonstrated on their new Epic/Park Lane album, entitled "Mirror Stars."

Though "Mirror Stars" is the group's first American release, it's really their second recorded work. In July of 1977, the group cut a self-titled album for the Pye label in England. That LP, produced by John Entwistle of the Who, was never picked up by an American record company.

In fact, recalling the way that the group hooked up with Brian Lane, manager of Yes, brings a smile to the face of Tony DeMeur, lead vocalist and chief composer for the quartet. Lane had asked his secretary to videotape Rick Wakeman's performance when the noted keyboardist appeared on Britain's Old Grey Whistle Test program. But, as DeMeur recalls, the woman fell asleep after Wakeman's set and, unbeknownst to the group, the Poodles' songs were captured live for Lane.

"The irony is that we were looking for a manager at the time," says DeMeur, a former gardener with a penchant for plastic pink glasses and polyester leisure suits. "We'd enjoyed some success as a cult band in pockets across Europe, but the dates were always arranged entirely at our own expense. It got to the point where our bass player, Richie Robertson, printed up a badge that read 'Can You Manage Us?' because we were so thoroughly frustrated."

DeMeur and violinist Bobby Valentino (a dead ringer for Clark Gable) formed the Poodles "out of sheer boredom" in the summer of 1974. Robertson and drummer Bryn Burrows later joined the group in 1976 after a series of personnel changes. John Parsons, the Poodles' unseen fifth member, co-writes the bulk of their repertoire with DeMeur. "Initially, we planned to call ourselves 'The New Beatles,' but agreed that it was a bit too much," the knock-kneed DeMeur observes; "We settled on 'Poodles' because they're such ridiculous dogs."

He notes that in the early stages of the group's development, the band frequently relied on the use of visual aids for their performances (similar to Ian Dury's use of props). DeMeur says he was particularly fond of the carrier bag he used to carry onstage filled with an assortment of trinkets, ukuleles, and plastic dog droppings.

"But the theatrics started to get in the way of our playing," he says. "We were also getting known as a gimmick band, which can be like death. So we had to prove that we didn't need the gimmicks."

DeMeur turned his energies instead towards the development of his songwriting with Parsons. "I like to think of the group as a modern day version of the Kinks," he says, "in that we're writing about everyday situations in a comical way."



Evie Sands

Evie Sands is something of a musical chef. "Making an album is like preparing a dinner. Some songs you boil and others you bake," says Sands. "Musicians can be assembled like ingredients."

On her new RCA album, "Suspended Animation," Chef Evie cooks with some of the finest herbs and spices available. Illustrious studio musicians like Buzzy Feiten, Richie Zito, Lee Ritenour and members of Toto all make contributions to Sands' musical feast.

The sultry voice and evocative lyrics that made her first two LPs, "Any Way That You Want Me" and "Estate of Mind" so appealing are still present on the new LP. However, "Suspended Animation" reveals Sands as a total artist. She has co-written all the songs, plays keyboard on all the tracks, handles all the lead vocals and is co-producer of her new album.

As a songwriter, Sands has had her songs covered by everyone from Barbra Streisand to Captain Kangaroo. A closer look into her past reveals a strong credit list: "Take It Or Leave It," by the Manhattans, "Love In The Afternoon," by Dionne Warwick and her song "I Love Making Love To You" has been covered 15 times by various recording artists. The new Dobie Gray hit "You Can Do It," which is currently #55 bullet on the **Cash Box** singles chart, was also penned by Sands.

As a musician, Sands, who plays guitar in addition to keyboards, has done session work with Thom Bell and the Spinners. Booker T., the most famous MG, once complimented Sands guitar playing by saying he wished he could get Steve Cropper to play guitar the same way she had on a couple of tunes.

Sands cover a lot of musical ground on the new LP. There are ballads like "As We Fall In Love Once More," rockers such as "Get Up" and even a funk number which is evidenced by "Brain Damage" on the "Suspended Animation" album. However, it is the sexually suggestive song like "You Sho' Look Good To Me" that is Sands' tour de force. "It's a sleazy song," says Sands. "A little sleaziness never hurt anybody."

In reference to her recent signing with RCA, Sands commented, "The company acknowledges me for what I do." Sands also added that the new LP marked the first time she was allowed total creative freedom by a label.

"Suspended Animation" is, indeed, a family affair for Sands. In addition to working with many musician friends, Sands put the album together with the help of long time confidant, Ben Weisman. Weisman, who has written over 50 songs for Elvis Presley, helped co-write all the songs on the album. Richard Germinaro, Sands' husband and the third party involved in the songwriting on the LP, designed and directed the album's cover and art work.

"When you're working with people you have affection for and are being creative, you can obtain that Houdini — that magic sparkle," says Sands. "I think it happened a lot on this album."

Polygram Starting Operations At New Edison, N.J. Facility

NEW YORK — Polygram Distribution will begin operations at its new eastern distribution center, located in Edison, New Jersey, on Feb. 13.

The move from the company's present depot in Union, New Jersey to the new facility will take place Feb. 8-12. As a result, orders will not be taken from east coast customers after one p.m. on Feb. 7 until the start of business on Feb. 13. Shipments will be made from Union through Feb. 7 and commence from Edison Feb. 13. The company urges its customers to order product in advance to cover the transition period.

The new Edison facility, which will operate under the direction of Dean White and his assistant, Alan Dorfman, includes 95,000 square feet of warehouse floor space (**Cash Box**, Sept. 30, 1978). Total inside space is 2,280,000 cubic feet, compared to 784,000 cubic feet at the Union plant.

New Telephone System

One of the many new features the Edison facility will offer is a telephone system with separate lines for order entry, customer service and credit. The phones will be equipped with a roll-over feature to automatically give customers the next open line. In addition, a device will be installed on the order entry phone so that customers can leave their name and phone number in the event that order lines are busy.

Upgraded computer equipment will be

operable in the new plant, including the Systems Three, Model 15-D computer, which is capable of performing simultaneous multi-operations (the computer is currently operable in Polygram's Sun Valley and Indianapolis distribution centers).

New System

A new Zone Picking System has also been developed which breaks down product into categories such as new releases and catalog goods for shipment in both boxed lots and loose quantities. According to Bert Franzblau, vice president of operations for Polygram, the new system will eliminate 85% of the walking time in picking orders.

Commenting on the relocation, Franzblau said, "We are truly excited about our new facility and believe that it will provide our customers with the highest level of service in the industry. We want to thank our customers in advance for their cooperation and support during this transition period and look forward to even bigger and better things in the future."

Record Number Of Gold, Platinum LPs Awarded Last Year

NEW YORK — A record 112 platinum record awards for 10 singles and 102 albums were certified by the RIAA in 1978. In 1977, the Association certified 68 albums and three singles as platinum.

In addition, the RIAA noted that it certified 61 singles and 193 albums for gold record awards in 1978, compared with 55 singles and 183 albums in 1977.

The certification requirement for platinum record awards, for which only recordings released on or after January 1, 1976 are eligible, is a minimum sale of two million copies of a single or one million copies of an album. For a gold record award certification, a minimum sale of one million singles or 500,000 copies of an album is required.

More Acts Set For Cuban Music Gig

NEW YORK — CBS Records has added Kris Kristofferson, Stephen Stills, Stan Getz, Maynard Ferguson, Freddie Hubbard and A&M recording artist Rita Coolidge to the list of American artists who will perform at the Cuban-American music festival in Havana March 2-4 (**Cash Box**, Jan. 27). Billy Joel, Weather Report, the Fania All-Stars and the CBS Jazz All-Stars (including Tony Williams, Eric Gale, Steve Khan, Jimmy and Percy Heath, Cedar Walton, Tom Scott, Willie Bobo, Woody Shaw, Arthur Blythe, Ronnie Foster, Hubert Laws and John McLaughlin) will also appear at the festival.

Among the Cuban artists performing will be Irakere, who made their American debut last summer at the Newport Jazz Festival. Their first album will be released on Columbia later this month. CBS will record three albums at the festival and release them in the late spring.

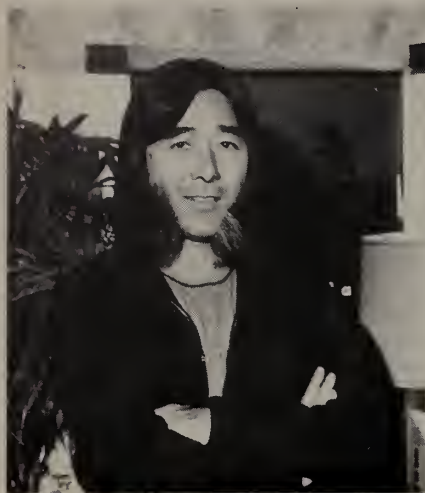

SPACE — George Benson — CTI 7085 — Producer: Creed Taylor — List: 7.98

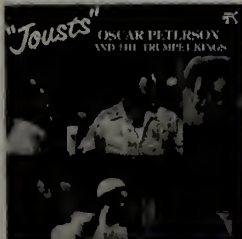
Though Benson has scored heavily at Warner Brothers, there are many who feel that the CTI LPs showed off his instrumental virtuosity to better advantage. This repackage contains three newly issued Benson performances, and there is a vocal on "Hold On, I'm Comin'" that will bring solid air play, but his guitar work on "Sky Dive" will be of considerable interest to fans of his playing. Should be a strong performance.

JOUSTS — Oscar Peterson & The Trumpet Kings — Pablo 2310 817 — Producer: Norman Granz — List: 8.98

The kings are Roy Eldridge, Sweets Edison, Clark Terry, Dizzy Gillespie and Jon Faddis. The accompaniment is by Oscar Peterson and no others. Actually this album works better than the five single LPs of a couple of years ago, because of the track-to-track contrast of the players. Exceptional work by all concerned.

FAMILY MAN — Jaki Byard — Muse 5173 — Producer: Fred Selbert — List: 7.98

Byard is a one-man encyclopedia of piano styles, and this album covers an extremely interesting and wide-ranging program. There is Ellington, ragtime, a five-part original suite and two other originals. Best is "Just Rolling Along," which was the pianist's set call for many years. Byard also plays alto and tenor here. His bass player doubles tuba and his drummer also plays vibs and tympani. This artist has a strong following in New England and California.



ME, MYSELF AN EYE — Charles Mingus — Atlantic SD 8803 — Producers: Ilhan Mimaroglu and Raymond Silva — List: 7.98

The death of Charles Mingus last month was a great loss to the world of music, but the great bass man left behind one last brilliant contribution. "Me, Myself An Eye" is one of his greatest works, despite the fact that it is the only Mingus album on which he doesn't play bass. Side one is a half-hour celebration that will stand as lasting evidence to the man's genius. The performances by a score of top players are exceptional.

WITH ALL MY LOVE — Bruce Cameron Jazz Ensemble — Discovery DS-793 — Producers: Dennis Woodrich and Bruce Cameron — List: 7.98

Virtually unknown out of its native San Diego habitat, the Bruce Cameron Jazz Ensemble should change this situation with its debut effort. Led by Cameron's emotional and lyrical trumpet, "With All My Love" offers a range of jazz styles from the sprightly pep of "Sunrise" to the tender, melodic title cut. The material is so strong, especially on side one, that it's hard to believe this isn't an all-star unit. In fact, it is, but most of the world just doesn't know it yet.

LIVE — Return To Forever — Columbia JC 35281 — Producer: Chick Corea — List: 7.98

Distilled from the limited-edition four-album set released last November, this live LP captures the highlights of two shows at the Palladium in New York City during RTF's 1977 tour. With Chick Corea, Stanley Clarke and Joe Farrell forming the group's core, it's no surprise that this LP contains some of the most sparkling moments yet recorded on a live LP. "Chick's Piano Solo" and "The Moorish Warrior And Spanish Princess" are particularly delightful.

Tobias Appointed VP Finance For Entertainment Co.

Boz Scaggs is also set for a special segment honoring San Francisco, as part of the Academy's annual salute to one of its chapter cities.

Grammys will be presented for Record of the Year, Album of the Year, Song of the Year and Best New Artist, as well as the latest inductees into the Academy's Hall of Fame, in recognition of recordings released prior to 1958.

Lieberman Named VP of SESAC

NEW YORK — Nat Lieberman, director of licensing for SESAC, has been elected a vice president of the firm. New York Consumer Dept. Tickets Karol For Price On Album

NEW YORK — The King Karol Records Co. of 126 W. 42 St. received 12 violation notices last week from the Consumer Affairs Department for allegedly selling copies of "Super Oldies of the '50s and '60s" (Trip) for \$6.79, more than 70% above the manufacturer's suggested retail price of \$3.98. A hearing has been scheduled for Feb. 12 in New York on the alleged violations. A maximum civil penalty of \$500 could be levied for each violation.

Consumer Affairs Commissioner Bruce Ratner said that his office was alerted to the store's pricing in July of 1978 when he received a letter from a Manhattan shopper. At a hearing, King Karol was fined \$50 "for failing to disclose that it was selling records in the 'Super Oldies' series for above the recommended list price" under the Consumer Protection Law, which requires retailers to clearly list the manufacturer's suggested retail price. A compliance check of the store's pricing last month, however, found that the outlet was "continuing its violation" of the consumer regulation.

Karol Comments

Asked to comment on the alleged violations, Ben Karol of King Karol said that the floor manager of the location in question ticketed the Trip records at \$6.79 according to the list price of \$6.98 that he found in the Schwann catalog.

"We were cited for overcharging based on a Springboard International catalog printed in California that lists Trip product for \$3.98," Karol explained. "According to the Schwann catalog, Trip product lists for \$6.98. I called Danny Pugliese (president of Springboard) and he told me that the company's catalog issued in California does not apply to the Eastern market. It's possible that we made a mistake; we're not perfectionists. But I think we can beat this thing."

Casablanca To Release New Simon Musical LP

LOS ANGELES — Casablanca Records will release the original cast recording of Emanuel Azenberg's presentation of Neil Simon's Broadway musical, "They're Playing Our Song" on Feb. 11. The release of the album coincides with the play's New York opening. The play stars Robert Klein and Lucie Arnaz, and features music by Marvin Hamlisch and words by Carole Bayer Sager.

Moody Blues Score Platinum With New LP

NEW YORK — "Octave," the latest LP by London recording artists the Moody Blues, has been certified platinum by the RIAA, for sales of one million units.

Her next album will reportedly be produced by **Nile Rodgers** and **Bernard Edwards** . . . **Talking Heads** set for Saturday Night Live Feb. 10 . . . **Leif Garrett** will have his own TV special on CBS . . . The next **Marshall Tucker Band** album, "Running Like The Wind," may be on Warner Brothers after all . . . **Desmond Child** and **Rouge** will be heard on the soundtrack of "Warriors," a new film about gang warfare in New York . . . **Barbara Cook** is booked in for the next two months at Reno Sweeney in New York . . . **Henry Allen's** latest discovery is a 12-year-old vocalist named **Stacy Latisaw** whom he has signed to Cotillion . . . **Rod Argent's** latest album is out on MCA in England, but nothing has been set for the U.S. The album, called "Moving Home," is stocked by JEM, which is also carrying the **Pere Ubu** album, "Dub Housing." In case you haven't heard, this new wave Cleveland band is garnering a great deal of critical support. Perhaps the most succinct definition of their music was offered by **Phil Page**, who called them "more normal than the Residents but weirder than Devo."

GIZMO-TALE — **Loi Creme** and **Kevin Godley** are probably most famous for their work with **10cc**. But that may change soon, because it turns out that these two musicians have also been hard at work inventing a device they call the Gizmotron. It's not an instrument, but rather something that can be attached to the strings of an electric guitar, enabling the guitar to produce sounds resembling an orchestral string section. The idea for the Gizmotron occurred eight years ago, according to Creme. "At first we were working with a guitar, an electric drill, and a rubber band," he said. "The result sounded like a finger nail going down a blackboard . . ." Undaunted, Creme and Godley kept working, and eventually they were able to receive technical help on the project from experts at the University of Manchester. "That was a windfall," Godley related. "We were able to get researchers to help us, as well as the use of the University's really excellent facilities." The completed item, Godley continued, "is not an electronic device. It's mechanical, as it is operated by a rotary plectrum. It releases a natural vibration for each string, and the musician has to learn to play the options on the Gizmotron." After obtaining a patent for their invention, Creme and Godley leased the Gizmotron to Musitronics, a New Jersey-based manufacturer that is now marketing the product through a Gizmo, Inc. division.

DOWN ATLANTA WAY — A promoters' war appears to be brewing on Peachtree Street as **Hank LoConti's** Agora Ballroom continues to make inroads into **Alex Cooley's** traditional turf. Cooley has decided to fight back, and will open up his own downtown Atlanta club, the Capri Theatre, very soon. Cooley reportedly feels there's only room for one major club in town, but other Atlanta observers aren't so sure . . . **Steve Cropper** and **Duck Dunn** have begun work on a new **Crimson Tide** album at Axis Sound Studios . . . And, a la the much praised **B-52's** from nearby Athens, the **Brains**, a new wave Atlanta band, are starting to develop a sizable local following.

QUOTABLE — **Harry Belafonte**, from an interview to air on WABC-TV in New York: "I am very pained at what has happened to much of the best that's in black music. Many of our musicians and artists and singers have opted to get into the arena of profit for profit's sake and have pumped out that music which will be accepted by white folks."

DO IT TO THEM, HERBIE MANN —

Herbie Mann will tell you out-front: "I'm an entertainer that happens to be a musician that improvises." Accordingly, he feels no compunction about "trying to understand public tastes and change my music to the taste of the time." And, as prima facie evidence, there's his latest album, "Super Mann," a stone disco record if there ever was one. Not that Mann hasn't dipped in that font before, if you remember "Hijacks." But this time, Mann put his product completely in the hands of Atlantic Records, who insisted that ace disco producer **Patrick Adams** handle things his way. By the time Mann got in the studio, "everything was on tape." Being a veteran musician, producer and executive, Mann said, "It felt weird. I felt frustrated sometimes, but I'm happy with the record. I trusted Patrick Adams, and I think we've got a good record. There's a lot going on, once you get past the bass out front."

PERSONALITY PROFILES — **Charlie Fach**, senior VP and general manager for Phonogram/Mercury, will be going to Nashville to form his own production company soon. McGUINN, CLARK & HILLMAN — Capitol SW 11910 — Producers: Ron Albert and Howard Albert — List: 7.98

Bringing together three of the original members of the Byrds, this album engagingly forges a musical style which combines the various country/folk/rock elements the trio has created, both together and separately, over the past 15 years. All three members have composed new material for the album, which ranges from delicate folk-flavored ballads to surging medium-tempo rockers. "Little Mama," "Don't You Write Her Off" and "Bye Bye Baby," among others, should receive heavy AOR airplay.

THE BEST DAYS OF MY LIFE — Johnny Mathis — Columbia JC 35649 — Producer: Jack Gold — List: 7.98

Having returned to major pop recording success with his "You Light Up My Life" album last year, veteran singer Johnny Mathis is back with a new collection of elegant pop/MOR ballads and moderate upbeat tunes. Lush orchestral arrangements embellish each song, providing a tender, sentimental backdrop for Mathis' vocal performances. Including his duet with Jane Oliver, "The Last Time I Felt Like This," the LP also features "As Time Goes By" and the title cut.

ST. VINCENT'S COURT — Kim Carnes — EMI America SW-17004 — Producers: Daniel Moore, Dave Ellingson and Kim Carnes — List: 7.98

About a year in the making, Kim Carnes' EMI America debut album is a memorable collection of intimate, passionate ballads, delightful upbeat pop confections and understated rockers. Carnes' expressive, slightly throaty voice comfortably handles all of the material here, which was mostly composed by Carnes and Dave Ellingson. Standout tracks here include the single "It Hurts So Bad," "Stay Away," and "What Am I Gonna Do." For pop, MOR and possibly AOR formats.

SUPERMAN AND OTHER GALACTIC HEROES — Meco — Casablanca NBLP 7136 — Producers: Meco Monardo, Tony Bongiovi, and Harold Wheeler — List: 7.98

Meco Monardo's latest disco/pop workout is his entry into the "Superman" cover sweepstakes. Side one of this LP is devoted to this producer/arranger's rhythmic interpretations of the "Superman" themes as composed by John Williams. Standout moments include the "Main Title Theme" and the "Can You Read My Mind" sequence. Side two contains disco renditions of other galactic heroes such as "The Caped Crusader" and "The Amazing Amazon."

CUT LOOSE — Bohannon — Mercury SRM-1-3762 — Producer: Hamilton Bohannon — List: 7.98

On his latest Mercury affair, Hamilton Bohannon has concocted another assortment of polished R&B/disco numbers. Bohannon as usual on this LP handles writing, arranging and producing duties, utilizing a number of crack instrumentalists and vocalists to execute his creative ideas. Standout tracks on this effort are "Cut Loose," "Mighty Groove" and "Let Me See How You Do It."

TAKE ME HOME — Cher — Casablanca NBLP 7133 — Producers: Bob Esty and Ron Dante — List: 7.98

This veteran singer/entertainer's debut Casablanca album marks her swing into the disco field, containing nine songs, six of which are thumping disco numbers, with the other three cuts being romantic ballads. Side one is devoted strictly to disco tunes, highlighted by the feisty title track. Throughout the album, Cher's vocal performances are aggressive, fluid, and more expressive than most of her recent recordings. For disco and pop formats.

LIFE IN THE FOODCHAIN — Tonio K. — Full Moon/Epic JE 35545 — Producer: Rob Fraboni — List: 7.98

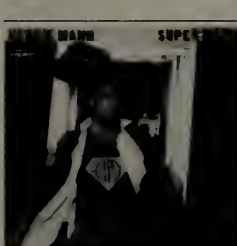
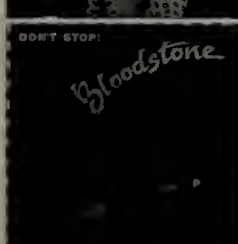
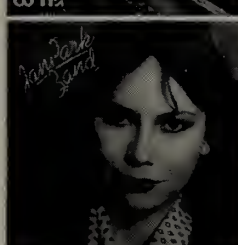
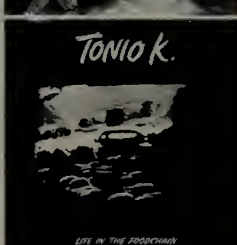
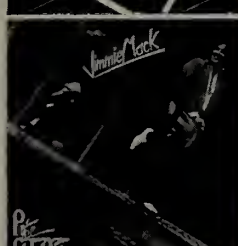
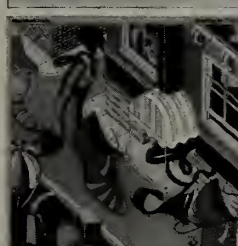
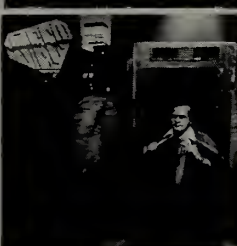
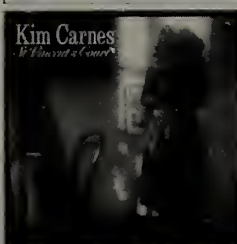
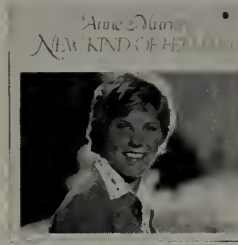
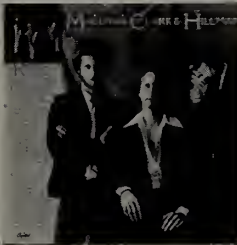
Tonio K. is a California rock 'n' roller who executes explosive rock licks, composes melodic compositions, and most importantly, displays his own fascinating personality. Side one of this humorous LP is titled "Life In The Foodchain," while the other side is affectionately called "Love Among The Ruins." Featuring such musicians as Earl Slick, Albert Lee, and Garth Hudson, this album boasts song titles like "The Ballad Of The Night The Clocks All Quit," "Willie And The Pigman" and "H-A-T-R-E-D."

THE AMAZING RHYTHM ACES — ABC AA-1123 — Producer: Jimmy Johnson — List: 7.98

The Amazing Rhythm Aces are a country-rock sextet who, quite simply, are not the least bit self-conscious about performing classic Hank Williams-tainted country swing with touches of Kansas City blues. Uncluttered stellar musicianship and arranging make this LP's superficially limited approach something quite altogether unique. In essence, the Amazing Rhythm Aces do for country what George Thorogood has done for electric R&B.

SUPER MANN — Herbie Mann — Atlantic SD 19221 — Producer: Patrick Adams and others — List: 7.98

Getting in on the current "Superman" craze, disco/jazz flute player Herbie Mann has issued this "Super Mann" album, which contains the charted pop single "Superman" and six other tracks. Mann's airy, bristling flute work effectively injects light jazz textures into the album's steady disco rhythms, creating an enjoyable sound that provides both dancing and listening pleasure. Other worthy cuts are "Etagui," "Jisco Dazz" and a "D-jango."



NEW KIND OF FEELING — Anne Murray — Capitol SW-11849 — Producer: Jim Ed Norman — List: 7.98

Back in the Top 10 pop charts again last year with "You Needed Me," this Canadian songstress has produced a tasty new 10-song collection which includes her fast-rising single, "I Just Fall In Love Again." An enjoyable mixture of tender ballads and feisty upbeat tunes, "New Kind Of Feeling" should further establish Murray's reputation as a stellar hit-making attraction in the pop/MOR field.

SLEEPLESS NIGHTS — Brooklyn Dreams — Casablanca NBLP 7135 — Producer: Bob Esty — List: 7.98

Brooklyn Dreams consists of three male vocalists (Eddie Swanson Hokenson, Joe "Bean" Esposito and Bruce Sudano) who are adept at composing and singing a variety of soul-flavored ballads and pulsing, synthesizer-laden disco numbers. Currently gaining widespread exposure due to its collaboration with Donna Summer on "Heaven Knows" (included here), this trio fully demonstrates that it can stand on its own as a versatile, exciting pop/disco configuration.

A TONIC FOR THE TROOPS — Boomtown Rats — Columbia JC 35750 — Producer: Robert John Lange — List: 7.98

Already a highly successful album in England, "Tonic" should be the LP that breaks the Boomtown Rats in the U.S. "Rat Trap" was a number one hit in the U.K., featuring its Springsteen-esque lyrics, bright, clean production and a crisp rock 'n' roll beat. The entire album abounds with witty, street-wise lyrics, colorful melodies and infectious lead and harmony vocals. A richly imaginative work that rocks from start to finish, this LP deserves strong Top 40 and AOR play.

DANCING IN THE CITY — Marshall Hain — Harvest ST-11914 — Producer: Christopher Neil — List: 7.98

There's something different and original afoot here. Marshall Hain, apparently, is a duo act: (Julian) Marshall excels on classically-trained piano and co-writes all the songs with (Kit) Hain, who sings with a full-throated depth and clarity light years ahead of most current female shouters. The rhythmic emphasis is on disco, but refreshingly rife with that charming Euro-rock approach that Abba and Boney M best exemplify.

SUSPENDED ANIMATION — Evie Sands — RCA AFLI-2943 — Producers: Evie Sands and Michael Stewart — List: 7.98

"Suspended Animation," the new album by Evie Sands, is a long time in coming. Her last Haven/Capitol LP, a much overlooked gem, was recorded in 1975. Happily, the new album is worth the wait. Her sultry voice should appeal to both rock and MOR tastes. Sands proves that she is capable of co-writing (with Ben Weisman) ballads and rockers as well as MOR songs. Several top studio musicians help enhance this long-awaited LP. For a variety of formats.

ON THE CORNER — Jimmie Mack — Big Tree BT 76014 — Producer: Elliot Scheiner — List: 7.98

Formerly lead singer and songwriter for the Earl Slick Band, Jimmie Mack has created an impressive follow-up album to his Big Tree debut last year. Mack possesses a distinctive, raspy voice, but it is his memorable compositions and full-bodied arrangements which make this LP a success. "On The Corner" contains a variety of musical styles, ranging from the jazz-tinged "Give It Away" to the guitar-rock of "Ain't Gonna Make It" to "On The Ice," a passionate ballad. For AOR and pop airplay.

THE JAN PARK BAND — Columbia JC 35484 — Producer: Eric Holtze — List: 7.98

Spearheaded by female vocalist Jan Park, this Midwestern-based outfit has released an inviting mainstream rock effort which amply displays the band's ability to perform a diverse set of material ranging from sensitive ballads, affectionate medium-tempo cuts and tough rockers. Composing most of its own material, the group's two central figures are guitarist Bartle and of course, Park. For a variety of formats.

DON'T STOP — Bloodstone — Motown M7-909R1 — Producer: Winston Monseque — List: 7.98

Bloodstone's latest Motown affair is a spirited set of stirring love ballads, peppy R&B tracks and briskly-paced disco numbers. "Don't Stop" boasts polished arrangements and stellar instrumental work by such musicians as Lee Ritenour and James Gadson, but the LP's most compelling ingredient is the quartet's vocal work. Bloodstone's lead vocal and backing harmonies here are consistently soulful and appealing. For R&B, oop and disco airplay.

THE BERMUDA TRIANGLE — Tomita — RCA ARL1-2885 — Producer: Plasma Music, Inc. — List: 7.98

Primarily employing various random movements by Prokofiev, electronic classicist Tomita takes us on a sonic journey to, through and beneath the infamous Bermuda Triangle. Utilizing a veritable electronic keyboard warehouse, the listener is forcefully drawn into an ocean vortex of sound to be left to his own feeble devices only to be swept away again toward visions of eye-blinding beauty. "The Bermuda Triangle" is a slice of contemporary classicism by a master of the art.

POINTS WEST

POINTS WEST — LENNY AND THE SQUIGTONES — Following the tremendous success of the **Blues Brothers**, a pair of TV comedians who used a hit series to launch a hit album, Casablanca showcased its latest signing at the Roxy Jan. 29. The act is **Lenny and the Squigtones**, featuring "Laverne And Shirley's" motley neighbors Lenny and Squiggy in front of a four-piece band, and judging from the duo's first gig they may well be the next big novelty act. Their material included such showstoppers as "Night After Night" ("about two nights in a row"), "Hey Mr. Bassman" (reminiscent of the Blues Bros. "Rubber Biscuit"), the dirty version of "Louie, Louie" and a love song about a creature without a head.

"I hate harmony, all it is is singing the melody wrong," noted Squiggy, and the duo backed him up with some of the worst harmonies ever heard in the Roxy. But the former Credibility Gap members Lenny (**Michael McKean**) and Squiggy (**David Lander**) were in control, and their act brings some much needed comic relief to the rock world. On hand to witness the debut were a long list of celebrities, including **Penny Marshall**, **Cindy Williams** and most of the rest of the "L&S" cast, **Henry Winkler**, Casablanca artists **Paul Jabara** and **Pattie Brooks** and such rock stars as **Bruce Springsteen** and **Daryl Hall**.

Lenny and the Squigtones are reportedly working on an album for spring release. Recurrent rumors that their album will appear on a new comedy label are repeatedly denied, but Casablanca president **Neil Bogart** is said to have left room for speculation on the subject of a new comedy line at the recent Polygram meetings.

CLASH LANDING IN VANCOUVER — British punk rock group **the Clash** made its North American concert debut at the Commodore Ballroom in Vancouver last Wednesday, performing an exhilarating 75-minute, 21-song set which had the sold-out Ballroom crowd in a rock 'n' roll frenzy by the latter half of the show. The London quartet is now heading down to California for dates at the Berkeley Community Theatre on Feb. 7 and Feb. 9 at the Santa Monica Civic. Surprisingly, very few hard-core punk fans were in attendance in Vancouver, but that didn't keep the packed crowd on the dance floor from pogoing the night away. With both the Clash and **Elvis Costello** coming to L.A. during the next two weeks, this promises to be the hottest rock 'n' roll month in recent memory. **Joe Strummer** of the Clash had this to say about Costello: "He's not bad, but everything he writes about is stuff we wrote about two years ago." Commented guitarist **Mick Jones**: "Actually, he's pretty good . . . for a four-eyed twit."

GRAMMY TIME — The 21st annual Grammy Awards Show is set to air Feb. 15 (9 p.m. ET) over CBS TV live from the Shrine Auditorium in L.A. **John Denver** will host the program, and **Boyz Scaggs** will appear in a special segment honoring San Francisco.

Bob Henry is producer/director, **Pierre Cossette** is executive producer.

The first names to appear on the show's all-star roster include **Donna Summer**, **Kenny Rogers**, **Lou Rawls**, **Chuck Mangione**, **Natalie Cole**, **Anne Murray**, **Martin Mull** and **Eubie Blake**.

ALL ROADS LEAD TO DENVER — Besides hosting the Grammy Awards, RCA's **John Denver** is keeping himself busy on a number of fronts. His new self-titled LP is already at #42 bullet only three weeks after release and the veteran country-rock star is supporting the album with numerous TV appearances. Denver represented the pop community at the program of contemporary American entertainment served up at 'Washington's Kennedy Center following the state dinner Jan. 29 in honor of Chinese Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping. That program was broadcast in the U.S. over the PBS network and was broadcast live via satellite in China.

And if state dinner receptions and the Grammy Awards aren't enough, Denver will host his own ABC-TV special Feb. 28 at 8 p.m. (ET). "John Denver and the Ladies" will feature duets with **Cheryl Ladd** and **Tina Turner** and guest appearances by **Cheryl Tiegs** and **Valerie Harper**.

MORE TV — And John Denver isn't the only major recording artist taking advantage of television opportunities these days. **David Bowie** was the featured guest on **Don Kirshner's** "Rock Concert" last weekend. Six songs taped during Bowie's 1978 World Tour were interspersed throughout the program . . . **Shaun Cassidy**, no stranger to TV audiences after his three-year stint with the "Hardy Boys," has been signed to his first starring role in a two-hour TV-movie, "A Very Special Love." The film, a love story about two mentally retarded young people, is now in production. Cassidy interrupted recording a new studio album for Warner/Curb to accept the role. Meanwhile, a live album recorded this summer is due out in March, and plans for a summer U.S. tour and some European dates are now being set . . . **Suzi Quatro**, who has parleyed her Leather Tuscadero character into a semi-regular role on "Happy Days," will appear on the hit series Feb. 6 and Feb. 13. Her next album, "If You Knew Suzi," is due out on RSO this spring . . . An hour-long **Henry Mancini** retrospective is slated to air on national TV in Ireland, Argentina and Sweden, and a three-hour Mancini special is now being produced by the BBC.

ON THE ROAD — **Kenny Rogers**, with special guest **Debby Boone**, is currently enjoying his first headline booking in Las Vegas at the Riviera Hotel. Opening night celebrities in attendance included **Mac Davls**, **Mike Douglas**, **Freddy Fender**, **Dottie West**, **Bill Medley**, and California Lt. Gov. **Mike Curb**, among others. Rogers and Boone did a free show Jan. 28 for more than a thousand Vegas cab drivers, also giving away copies of Rogers' "The Gambler" LP . . . **Jimmy Buffett** is going out on his first tour since the release of his double live album, "You Had To Be There." Supporting Buffett will be the **Amazing Rhythm Aces**. The first leg of the February-March tour kicks off in the South, opening Feb. 15 in Charleston, S.C. . . . **Moon Martln** is making his second overseas foray in as many months for a three-week "Moon's Over Europe Tour '79;" he started off with a performance in Dusseldorf, W. Germany, Jan. 31 . . . **Jackson Browne** and **Graham Nash** have completed a series of benefits on behalf of anti-nuclear power forces. Disco Formats Spread Across Nation To 100 Plus Stations

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ton, KMJQ in Houston and WBLS in New York but now we service more than 100 stations which consider themselves disco and the list grows each week."

As a result of this recent proliferation of disco radio stations, major markets such as New York, Philadelphia, Detroit, Chicago, Miami, Houston, Los Angeles and San Francisco now offer more than one disco radio station. Stations in secondary markets have also been quick to increase disco programming.

'Good Move'

"Disco is a truly viable format for the times," says Ed Cossman, executive vice president of S.J.R. Communications, owner of WKTU and KRLY in Houston. "I originally did not contemplate switching KRLY to disco but the Houston market was crowded with AOR stations and those conditions made disco a good move."

"It would have been foolish for us not to go disco in Los Angeles when the opportunity arose," says John Bayliss, president of the radio division of Combined Communications, which in addition to owning KIIS-FM in L.A. also owns WGCI-FM in Chicago. "Kent Burkhardt's and Ed Boyd's research indicated a switch to disco at KIIS would be successful. I'm not looking for KTU numbers because L.A. is a different market. But I think we will be able to go to the bank with the results."

"We are very enthusiastic about the move," says Boyd, general manager of KIIS-FM, which switched to disco Nov. 15. "Our demographics are primarily 25-34 but there is substantial 18-45 spillover. Disco is enormously successful."

Radio executives, programmers and disco industry spokespersons agree that a principle factor in the dramatic turnaround towards disco is the realization that the music cuts across previous boundaries of race, age and sex.

Chicago

Chicago is seen by Mac Allen, national program director of the radio division for Sonderling Broadcasting, as an interesting test market for disco. WGCI-FM, part of the Combined Communications chain was the disco forerunner in the market playing a mix of disco, R&B, pop and jazz in recent years. Last Thanksgiving, WGCI strengthened its disco programming with the introduction of "Studio 107" and the 24-hour disco format. Last December, WDAI-FM, an ABC-owned and operated station, enlivened the disco competition by switching formats to a "pure disco" sound. Allen is curious about the Arbitron spring book to see how Chicago's disco boom stacks up against Sonderling's black AOR station WBMX.

"I think Chicago is a good test market," says Allen. "Disco has broad appeal. But BMX was rated #1 in the January Mediatrend for 18-34. The spring Arbitron book will show how disco can do against real competition. It's good radio versus good radio versus good radio."

ABC has been interested in disco since KSFY in San Francisco switched in January 1975 from Top 40 to R&B/disco. Last fall following the success of WKTU, KSFY switched to a pure disco format. K101-AM in San Francisco recently went disco, airing sunrise to sunset. The addition of KCBS-FM playing disco at night has made San Francisco a lively disco radio market.

How To Compete?

With the expansion of disco-formatted stations, a new issue has been raised: how do disco stations compete with one another? Due to the relative newness of disco music, most disco stations are playing predominantly the same music.

"In the near future," says Jim Maddox, senior vice president of the Armature Group, "disco will begin to fragment the way rock and roll fragmented into Top 40, progressive, MOR and other pop formats. The fragmentation of disco will increase its penetration as each segment finds its level."

"Already people are asking if a disco format is Latino, Black or contemporary," says Bayliss from Combined Communications. "Disco is an extension of contemporary music and it will reflect changes."

"Because we (disco radio stations) are all playing basically the same records," says Wanda Ramos of Burkhardt/Abrams, "it's kind of scary. Stations have to find formats that are unique."

Live Mixing

WCAU-FM, a CBS-owned and operated station in Philadelphia, celebrates its third anniversary as a disco station this month. Program director Jim Keating feels that WCAU has a unique competitive edge because the station interweaves sweeps of live mixing during the day and goes exclusively live mixed from 8-12 p.m., a feature which was instituted a month ago. DJ Bob Pantano handles the mixing.

Live mixing which duplicates the flow of music in discotheque is virgin territory for most disco stations which have by and large retained Top 40 or AOR jocks after a switch to disco. Most stations rely on local research of hot records from the retail, club and disco deejay perspectives to build a playlist but then, many times, there is little consultation as to how the material should be assembled. The result in some cases is a less than smooth flow of songs.

"A lot of disco radio people do not know much about disco music," says A.J. Miller, president of the Southern California Disco D.J. Assn. "Disco radio can sound jerky if stations don't pay attention to the way records are put together. Disco is a total different experience from Top 40. It is a different language. I would hope that in the near future more real disco DJs are incorporated into radio."

Radio Is Not A Discotheque

While radio often lacks the expertise and knowledge of disco DJs regarding the music, many programmers are quick to

A combination mobile-stand-up piece and 2'x2' posters are now being distributed to retailers and at least two more merchandising aids are planned in support of the album. Advertising will include radio spots on AOR and Top 40 stations, trade ads, consumer ads and a billboard on the Sunset Strip. Press reaction has been favorable following two listening parties in New York and Los Angeles.

World Tour

McGuinn, Clark & Hillman are also going out behind the album on a three-part world tour. The first leg of the tour is a three-week series of showcase dates, beginning in Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 10 and ending with three-night stands at the Bottom Line in New York and the Roxy in Los Angeles.

"Groups often find out about international potential last, but this is a group of veterans and we've been able to work out something for them," says Joe Petrone, director of international marketing. "Domestically, groups like six or seven

weeks for a new LP to sink in, so we're taking advantage of that time to give Europe a taste. We've got television in Holland and England and we'll be bringing in foreign journalists to London for the dates at the Venue."

U.S. Tour Slated

Following the showcase tour, McGuinn, Clark & Hillman are set to tour the U.S. in March and April, and a Far Eastern leg is planned for late spring/early summer.

National album promotion manager Ray Tusken reports that AOR is going on the album with little resistance. The LP debuted on WNEW-FM/New York as part of an interview with air personality Pete Fornatale Jan. 24.

MCA Launches Media Promo For "Totally Hot" LP

LOS ANGELES — MCA Records has begun its Phase II marketing campaign for Olivia Newton-John's "Totally Hot" album.

The program, scheduled for four weeks, will kick-off with TV spots covering secondary markets combined with radio advertising in Top 40 and Adult Contemporary markets during the second week. By the end of the month, only radio and print advertising will be utilized, with radio spots carried in primary markets and print ads to be on a national level.

Elton John Picture Disc Released

LOS ANGELES — MCA Records has released a limited edition picture disc of Elton John's new album, "A Single Man." It is the label's second picture disc release, the first being the "Who Are You" album which was shipped in December.

MCA will press 50,000 units at a manufacturer's retail price of \$15.98 per unit.

Trans-American Video Pacts For Featurettes

LOS ANGELES — Trans-American Video has been retained by Homer & Associates to do the film transferring and editing of a four-minute filmed performance of CBS recording star Dan Hartman. TAV has also pacted with Jon Roseman Productions to shoot and edit Peaches and Herb promotions for Polydor records. The films will be used internationally in record stores and on TV shows like the "Midnight Special."

BILLY JOEL (Columbia 3-10913)
Big Shot (3:39) (Impulsive Music/April Music — ASCAP) (B. Joel)

"52nd Street" has topped the album chart and Billy continues to be a strong Top 40 powerhouse. This second single from the album is certain to receive immediate Top 40 attention. Tough-edged and sassy, the track has a dramatic arrangement of guitars, piano, horns and drums. The lyric is rich and Joel's singing is catchy.



LINDA RONSTADT (Elektra/Asylum E-46011)
Just One Look (3:20) (Premier Music — BMI) (G. Carroll/D. Payne)

Playful piano lines underscore this new single from Ronstadt's "Living In The U.S.A." album. The jaunty rhythm guitar work and excellent off-tempo guitar fills add an interesting tension which complement Ronstadt's saucy and enticing lead vocals. This is likely to be an out-of-the-box add for Top 40 formats.



BOB WELCH (Capitol P-4685)
Precious Love (3:12) (Glenwood Music/Cigar Music — ASCAP) (B. Welch)

"Three Hearts" is the name of Bob Welch's new album which follows the smash "French Kiss" LP. This first single is a bright uptempo rocker with fuzz-edged guitar work and sweeping strings. A solid beat, percussion embellishments and good vocals make this of interest to formats from pop to dancing.



CHER (Casablanca NB 965)
Take Me Home (3:26) (Rick's Music — BMI) (M. Aller/B. Esty)

"Take Me Home" is the name of Cher's new album and as this title track reveals, Cher has discovered disco. A danceable beat provided by shushing high-hat, steady kick and rhythm guitar is bolstered by Cher's dynamic singing. A whirlwind string arrangement adds emotion. Backing singers add punctuations. For various formats.

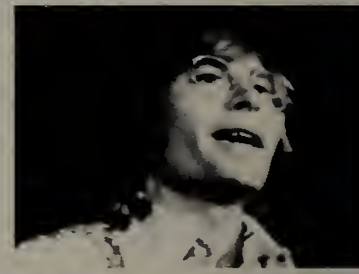
JOHNNY MATHIS/JANE OLIVOR (Columbia 3-10902)
The Last Time I Felt Like This (2:59) (Leeds Music — ASCAP) (A. Bergman/M. Bergman/M. Hamlich)

Duet singing became a popular pop mode during 1978 with several distinguished pairings. The combination of Mathis and Olivor ought to draw smart Top 40/AC action. This track from the "Same Time Next Year" movie has a classic Jack Gold production and fine singing. Gene Page handled the expansive arrangement. Check it out.



JOHN DENVER (RCA JH-11479)
Downhill Stuff (2:53) (Cherry Lane — ASCAP) (J. Denver)

If your vision of Denver is a lone acoustic balladeer croning to the sunshine, this first single from his new "John Denver" may necessitate some re-evaluation. Denver has assembled a rock 'n' roll band. Contained herein are some blistering sax and guitar licks. A fast shuffle beat and Denver's clear, effective vocals make this Top 40 material.



DAN HARTMAN (Blue Sky ZS8 2775)
This Is It (3:30) (Silver Steed Music — BMI) (D. Hartman)

Hartman scored with the vivacious "Instant Replay." This follow-up is characteristically exciting and uptempo with driving, danceable rhythms and bright overhead strings and party vocals. A garrulous sax solo adds pleasant texture. This song is a natural for pop formats looking for catchy, accessible dancing music.



THE FARAGHER BROS. (Polydor PD 14533)
Stay The Night (3:25) (Faraflap Music — BMI) (J./T. Faragher)

The Faragher Bros. sound like they are having a good time on this engaging, sounds-like-a-winner single. Silky falsetto chorus, perky keyboard line and almost recognizable melody make this likely to appeal to Top 40 programmers. The layering of vocals and simple musical backdrop make this excellent lulling pop.

SINGLES TO WATCH

ARPEGGIO (Polydor PD 14535)
Love And Desire (3:30) (Aliza-Thorah Music/On Beat Music — BMI/ASCAP) (S. Soussan/S. Barnes/J. Cash)

Produced by Simon Soussan, this song is already creating disco waves and the unusual ticking rhythms, splashing beat and excellent singing make this song a likely pop crossover success. The smooth rolling chorus is going to make this a hit. Watch.

TEDDY PENDERGRASS (Philadelphia Int/CBS ZS8 3669)

Life Is A Song Worth Singing (3:41) (Mighty Three — BMI) (T. Bell/L. Creed)

Funky keyboards and conga backing provide a rippling texture while strings add upfront brightness on this title track from Teddy's LP. Pendergrass' vocals build from a whisper to rousing levels. Suited to R&B, pop and dancing lists.

G.Q. (Arista 0388)
Disco Nights (Rock-Freak) (3:46) (G. Q. Publishing/Arista Music — ASCAP) (E. Raheim/LeBlanc)

This pulsing track is receiving wide disco response and substantial R&B reaction. It also has the ingredients to be a pop success. Tasty guitar work, backing synthesizer strings, steady danceable beat and silky and simple vocals make this a single to watch.

TODD RUNDGREN (Bearsville BSS 0335)
It Wouldn't Have Made Any Difference (3:41) (Earmark Music/Screen Gems-EMI Music — BMI) (T. Rundgren)

This live track from Rundgren's "Back To The Bars" album is a blast from the past for Todd fans and an excellent introduction for newer fans. With an interesting vibrato texture to his voice, this version differs from the original. Piano, words and medley coalesce for a fine pop moment.

POLICE (A&M 2096)
Roxanne (3:00) (Virgin Music — ASCAP) (Sting)

This rock ballad came out months ago and was widely overlooked. Not by everybody though. The track entered the Top 100 this week. The fast slashing rhythm guitar work, spacious arrangement and good singing deserve another listen. For rock lists.

JOE COCKER (Elektra/Asylum E-46001)
Lady Put The Light Out (4:45) (Big Secret/Almo Music — ASCAP) (G. Fletcher/D. Flett)

Cocker delivers a gentle and building ballad on this track from his "Luxury You Can Afford" album. Misty piano playing is joined by emphatic horns and bolstering rhythms. A mid-song sax solo is shimmering.

TOM SCOTT (Columbia 3-10914)
Beautiful Music (3:22) (Antisia Music — ASCAP) (R. MacDonald/W. Salter/E. Heath, Jr.)

Tom Scott is one of the hottest players around. This track shows why. The arrangement is a muscular interweaving of horns and driving rhythms. Scott's lyricon playing is catchy. For various formats.

TYRONE DAVIS (Columbia 3-10904)
In The Mood (3:48) (Content Music/Tyronza Music — BMI) (P. Richmond/D. Ellis/R. Locke, Jr.)

This single by Davis has a beautiful layering of keyboards, flute, guitars, horns and vocals. With a slow, sauntering pace and romantic lyric, this track is likely to appeal to R&B lists.

FATBACK (Spring/Polydor SP 191)
Freak The Freak The Funk (Rock) (3:40) (Clita Music — BMI) (B. Curtis)

Well, let's see. There is the Freak dance. And the Rock dance is currently sweeping east coast discos. It only goes to guess that this funky track ought to attract R&B and disco interest. Percussion embellishments, horns, party vocals and steady kick make it work.

SOLAR HEAT (ABC AB-12446)
Just Another Song (3:56) (Skyking Music (affil. pendg./Da Joye Music — BMI) (J. Barnes/S. Barnes/R. Tyson)

This outing by Solar Heat is a danceable, uptempo number with a vibrant arrangement of strings, horns and steady beat. Interesting keyboard solo and adventurous vocals make this suited to R&B and other lists.

JERRY BUTLER (Philadelphia Int/CBS ZS8 3673)
Nothing Says I Love You Like I Love You (3:42) (Mighty Three — BMI/Fountain Productions — ASCAP) (K. Gamble/L. Huff/J. Butler)

Jerry Butler has been an important force in music for many years. This title track from his album is an unabashed ode to love. Swelling strings, gentle keyboard and guitar touches make this of interest to R&B and MOR/AC lists.

DAVID OLIVER (Mercury 74043)
I Wanna Write You A Love Song (3:49) (Daleo Music/Grandniago Music — BMI) (D. Oliver/M. Gradney)

Oliver creates an almost haunting feeling on this song dedicated to love songs. Keyboards and strings shape a gentle, sensitive mood while Oliver's falsetto vocals soar overhead. Suited to R&B lists.

MAUREEN MCGOVERN (Warner Bros. WBS 8750)
Can You Read My Mind (3:27) (Warner-Tamerlane — BMI) (J. Williams/L. Bricusse)

Warner Bros. has been beaten to the punch with this song from the Superman movie. Casablanca and A&M have their own versions. However, an elaborate fantasy arrangement of strings and sensitive singing by McGovern help tip the odds. MOR/AC.

THE FUTURES (Philadelphia Int/CBS ZS8 3674)
Ain't No Time Fa Nothing (3:30) (Mighty Three — BMI) (J.B. Jefferson/C.B. Simmons)

Taken from the "Past, Present and The Futures" album, this single is an appealing R&B ballad which ought to attract a large audience. Layered vocals, circling strings, congas backing and clipping beat make this of interest.

HELEN SEXTON (Bee 45578)
Another Way Of Losng (3:54) (Bee Music — BMI) (T. Willingham/D. Bass)

A fluid mix of harp, piano, harpsichord and steady beat bolster Sexton's lead singing. Backing vocals add depth. This track is suited to AC lists.

AIR PLAY

CHANGES AT KHJ — Chuck Martin is the new PD at KHJ/Los Angeles. Martin, who formerly worked the 10-2 p.m. shift, replaces John Sebastian.

"AM without drastic changes is dead in Los Angeles," said Sebastian upon his departure. "RKO and I are apparently at odds on this belief, and, therefore, the direction that they wanted to go was not a system I could live with." Sebastian will pursue any viable FM station or 50,000 watt AM station in a major market, although he would prefer to stay in L.A. He can be reached at (213) 851-2665.

The resolutions states, "The NAB Radio Board believes that as a matter of national radio allocations policy, all broadcast stations (present and future) be authorized to provide full time service and in this connection urges the conversion of existing daytime AM stations into unlimited time facilities, and that this national allocations goal be accomplished without significantly diminishing service by other classes of stations."

commercial or noncommercial, that the Carnegie Commission proposals would effectively dismantle it even before it can be built."

More Stations

The report proposed that the system should be "substantially expanded" to allow near complete national coverage, and multiple coverage in larger markets. The goal for public radio, Carnegie II specifies, is to double the number of stations through "regulatory reform, financial assistance and purchase of existing stations."

If more AM's are added by reducing the bandwidth from 10 kHz to 9 kHz, as was suggested to the FCC last month, then Carnegie II urges that a substantial number of the new frequencies be reserved for public radio.

In some cases, the report concluded, the only way to expand the number of stations may be by purchasing existing commercial or under-used noncommercial stations. To help public radio along, the report suggested, the FCC might grant "right of first refusal" to qualified public groups at the negotiated price for the transfer of any license, giving them first crack at buying a station.

Diversity of funding is an important objective, the report stated. The federal government's share would be increased from 28% to 50%, with additional federal funds being raised by a licensing fee levied on all "users" of the public airwaves. This endorsement of the spectrum fee idea won praise on Capitol Hill from its originator, House Communications Chairman Lionel Van Deerlin (D-Cal.).

Under the Carnegie plan, the average public radio station budget would jump to \$310,000 from \$225,000. Much of that new money should be spent on better, bolder programming, the report said adding, "We urge the radio system not to repeat the mistakes of the TV system by enmeshing its creative people in a host of bureaucratic constraints."

Carnegie II also suggested that the FCC begin to crack down on colleges which use public radio stations mainly to train students, and urged better use of FM allocations now taken up by mini-10 watt stations. It concluded, "Diversity is not completely served by classical music or university licenses alone, no matter how laudable either may be."

Other Recommendations

Aside from recommendations specifically pertaining to radio, the Carnegie report urged that:

- CPB be replaced by a presidentially appointed nine-member Public Telecommunications Trust, responsible for planning but not for programming;
- a semi-autonomous "statutory

organization" be set up within the Trust, to be called the Program Services Endowment, to handle all program funding: This would provide another insulating layer between the Trust and any possible governmental interference;

• public broadcasting stations not be drawn into a national network, instead preserving "the fundamental unit of the present system — the local broadcasting station."

Here's the report's overall bleak assessment of today's systems: ". . . We find public broadcasting's financial, organizational and creative structure fundamentally flawed. In retrospect, what public broadcasting tried to invent was a truly radical idea: An instrument of mass communications that simultaneously respects the artistry of the individuals who create programs, the needs of the public that form the audience, and the forces of political power that supply the resources. Sadly, we conclude that the invention did not work, at least not very well. Institutional pressures became unbalanced in dramatically short time; they remain today — despite the best efforts of the thousands within the industry and the millions who support it — out of kilter and badly in need of repair."

National Public Radio Announces New Posts

WGTB/Georgetown U. Loses Airplay Rights

WASHINGTON, D.C. — WGTB-FM/Georgetown University has been taken off the air by the university's administration. The action is the result of a programming battle between the student station, which carried a progressive rock/new wave format and the school's administration board. The rights to the frequency are subject to review by the FCC.

being siphoned off by other companies.

"We had an incredible turnover in this company," explains Bergamo, "38% of our salesmen left last year because we weren't competitive in the marketplace.

'Autonomy'

"Another priority was to give our branches and our regions the autonomy to do business on a local level. With the structure of MCA before, if they wanted to run advertising or promotions or whatever, they had to come to this building (MCA headquarters in Universal City) to get authorization. That doesn't work.

"The next priority was to bring in people in a management capacity who could get these things rolling very fast." Bergamo feels that with the appointment of Sam Passamano to the newly created post of executive vice president and the appointments of Ron Douglas and Neil Hartley as vice president/branch distribution and vice president/national accounts, respectively, MCA's national staff is now in place.

Bergamo claims MCA will be the first major label with a black sales force. "All other labels have black departments," he says, "but they can only grow within their own area. To me that doesn't make any sense; a salesman is a salesman.

"We are going to have black salesmen in probably six of our major markets. And they are not going to be selling just to black accounts. They will be responsible for black and white accounts and will report directly to the branch manager, not to a special markets division."

Equal Time

Previously, the distribution division came under the MCA Records umbrella. The advantage of having a separate company to handle distribution, according to Bergamo, is that equal time can be devoted to each of MCA Inc.'s three labels — MCA Records, Infinity Records, and now, ABC. "You can't do that if your distribution division is controlled by any one of the labels," he says.

Bergamo says another advantage of MCA's present set up is that it gives control over release schedules to the distribution company. He feels this is the key to breaking new artists.

"The labels have to decide priorities, and we will respond to those priorities," he says. "At the same time, if all three of the labels want to bring out like product in the same release, we will back them off."

That's why, he adds "manufacturing reports to distributing. This allows us to dictate the product schedule."

\$200 Million Goal

The acquisition of ABC Records is a

major step toward achieving Bergamo's stated goal of tripling MCA's 1978 sales to more than \$200 million. He says the agreement will increase MCA's volume by more than 50% and bolster its artist roster in key areas.

"The ABC deal gave us jazz, which we didn't have, in addition to black music and a stronger country roster than we already had," says Bergamo.

With the addition of ABC, MCA has increased its market share substantially. However, Bergamo says he is in no hurry to overtake industry leaders CBS, Polygram and WEA.

"We don't want to be the biggest," he says. "We want to be the best.

"I think there's a point in the business where you get so large that you have a difficult time marketing records," Bergamo maintains. "You can't establish priorities.

"I think a good example of this is that CBS, which is the finest record company on the street, only broke one artist last year. You can't survive unless you break at least six artists a year."

Bergamo says it's possible that ABC Records will maintain its own identity, perhaps with a different name, rather than have its roster divided up among the existent MCA labels. His biggest concern now is that product released on ABC does not lose its momentum.

Smooth Transition

"Rufus is starting to break across the country," he says. "So our first priority is not to lose any of the records that are out there." To this end, Bergamo says he will meet with ABC president Steve Diener for the purpose of maintaining marketing continuity for ABC product in the field.

Bergamo acknowledges the vital role MCA Distributing will play in the future growth of MCA Inc.'s record division. "This has become a very aggressive record company," he points out. "Since October we've taken the Hot Chocolate single to gold, the Tanya Tucker album is now 200,000 units over anything she's done before and Olivia Newton-John is up to the million and a half figure, where her previous album did 400,000."

He adds, "I don't know if MCA could have handled that five months ago."

Yet Bergamo insists the distribution arm's biggest contribution toward increasing MCA's volume will be "in signing distribution agreements" with other labels. He denied, though, rumors that MCA has firmed distribution pacts with such prominent independents as Motown, Chrysalis and Arista.

"We have had no conversations with any of these people," he stresses. "Not that we wouldn't, but we haven't."

The ARB Analysis—

We are pleased to present a four book trend analysis of ARBITRON ratings, focusing on principal music selling stations in major American radio markets.

This analysis reviews the last four ARB reports in the following categories:

1. Average Quarter Hour Share (with bar graph)
2. Position in Market (Average Quarter Hour) for all demos 12 through 34

3. Cume Share Trends.

All displays are for Monday through Sunday, 6 am to Midnight. Please note that ARBITRON restrictions prohibit putting values in terms of numbers of people. The true story of any station's ratings is told in the ratio between Average Quarter Hour and Cume. Since this ratio cannot be calculated for these purposes, the reader will do well to read each station's Average Quarter Hour in full awareness of its Cume score.

Cume is the most consistent, least fluctuating rating value. Average Quarter Hour and all of the position in market figures tend to be more subject to fluctuation. For this reason, the Cume Trend tends to tell the most about a station's direction. Ratings tend to fluctuate from book to book. For this reason, most industry leaders agree that a trend studied over several books is the only way to understand a station's true position in the market.

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ON A&M RECORDS & TAPES

ARBITRON RESEARCH

If there is one thing Arbitron has clearly achieved in 30 years in the audience measurement business, it is credibility. When radio and television sales executives call on the top five hundred or the top twenty-five hundred advertisers and agencies with Arbitron, they don't have to spend time selling our credibility. They can devote all of their energies to the job they want to get done — selling themselves. This wasn't always the case with research, particularly radio research.

Over the years when radio revenues were increasing from about five hundred million dollars a year — a dozen years ago — to the current two billion dollars a year, Arbitron has been innovating every year to make sure we keep abreast of the needs of radio broadcasters; to anticipate the things that need to be expanded and improved, so we can continually upgrade the quality of our information to help radio grow.

Here are a few examples of what we are doing to help contribute to that growth:

The introduction of the Expanded Sample Frame after a testing period of some nine years, to include unlisted telephone households in the sample and to better represent all segments of the population not only by age and sex, but by race.

For years, Audience Research has been criticized for not having sufficient in-tab diaries for the under 35 age group and for measuring only listed telephone households. Expanded Sample Frame is a response to both of these items.

Arbitron has developed a technique of determining telephone numbers which have a high probability of being in service in residential households, and yet we know are not in the current telephone directory. We estimate that between 20 and 50% of all telephone households in any given metro area are not listed in the telephone directory. Previously, this significant population had to be ignored because we had no efficient way of identifying which telephone numbers would reach those households.

Now, with ESF, our audience estimates "fold-in" this never before included segment of the population, creating more representative listening estimates.

The addition of this population to the universe being measured is a significant improvement in the quality of research used for radio audience measurement. We are convinced that ESF is better research and at the same time, good for radio. Arbitron implemented ESF in eight top markets in October/November 1978. In April/May 1979, 14 major markets will have the benefits of ESF, and the top 30 by October/November 1979. We will continue to roll out additional markets until all Arbitron radio markets are being measured using the ESF techniques by

the spring of 1982.

The introduction of ESF is just one example that indicates the ways in which Arbitron has been working with broadcasters to provide the information needed for growth.

And radio has been growing and changing. For instance, in 1972 some 2,600 radio stations were listed in our market reports. In 1977, just three years later, the 2,600 grew to over 4,300 stations, an increase of 65%.

That increase has led to the need for more detailed information, so Arbitron is presently developing an entirely new product — Qualitative data. Called the Arbitron Radio Market Index, its purpose is to provide market-wide qualitative information about the radio audience, the audience's product usage and their demographic socio-economic characteristics. Our plan is to re-interview former Arbitron diary keepers to learn about shopping, fast food usage, automobile and home ownership, occupation, income and many other items. We want to demonstrate something all of us feel very strongly about — that radio in general and individual stations in particular are very effective in delivering an advertiser's target audience. We will have this valuable selling and buying tool in Broadcasters' hands in the near future.

Our testing of the Extended Measurement concept is still another example of how we are continually trying to upgrade our product to better serve the needs of Broadcasters.

The concept is a simple one — spread the diaries normally used in a four week sweep over twelve weeks, to minimize the effects of atypical events, such as "hypoing," and thus increase reliability.

An added benefit are the monthly programmer's guides, providing stations with trending information for decision making.

We have been using this method in New Orleans and Seattle since April of 1978, and will also include Indianapolis in April of this year. With the help of Broadcasters in these markets, we will "fine-tune" this methodology, and poll the industry at large to determine whether other markets would like to have Extended Measurement.

Arbitron has worked hard for radio — establishing credibility in both the national and local marketplace by showing documentation of the medium's performance. As a result of this credibility, radio revenues have grown significantly.

We have done a lot of listening in the past year and we know from that . . . at the very least . . . we must do a lot more. Let us continue to hear from you. Help direct us toward a service which will advance the purpose of radio.

He also acted as editor for Gospel Sound Magazine. **Mark Smith** has also joined the Savoy organization. He will be assisting Middleton with national promotion.

Triangle Records artist **David Ford** performed his album, "Peace Like A River," with full orchestra, at the Belmont Heights Baptist Church in Nashville Jan. 21. Former bass soloist for the Robert Shaw Chorale, Ford appears coast to coast in sacred concerts and oratorios.

The **B.C. and M. Mass Choir**, a Nashville-based Gospel Choir, will be featured on the **Carol Burnett and Dolly Parton** television special, to be aired Feb. 14. The choir presently records for Savoy Records.

Hob Records artist **Shirley Caesar** has been nominated for the second Grammy of her singing career in the category of Best Soul Gospel Performance, Contemporary, for the current Hob "First Lady" album. Caesar won a Grammy in 1971 for her rendition of "Put Your Hand In The Hand Of The Man From Galilee."

"Songs For The Flock," **Lamb's** first album in two years, was released at the National Religious Broadcasters convention in Washington, D.C. Jan. 21-24. **Mark Dayan**, vice president of sales and distribution, presented the album.

Messianic Records moved into its new office complex Jan. 25 at 7708 City Line Ave., City Line Center, Philadelphia, Penn., 19151. FOUND FREE — "Closer Than Ever" — Greentree: R/3530 — Producer: Jim Van Hook — List: 6.98

"Closer Than Ever," produced by Jim Van Hook and arranged by Don Hart and Rick Gibson, is superb, spiritual music. Van Hook, Hart, and Gibson have fused jazz and classical pop rhythms with a variety of vocal and instrumental inflections, but they have succeeded where so many other ambitious attempts at similar synthesis were simply confused collages of contrasting styles. There are several fine songs on the album such as "Closer Than Ever," "I Won't Turn Back" and "Stained Glass Window," but the real star of the show is the innovative production coupled with stellar singing by Found Free. This album has something for everyone.

THE JOY CHOIR — "FOUNTAIN OF LIFE" — Gospel Roots: 5034 — Producer: Kevin Yancey — List: 6.98

The "Joy Choir" of the Fountain Of Life Baptist Church, Chicago, is a score of musicians and singers under the direction of Kevin Yancey, and they do make joyous and soulful music. To try and categorize "Fountain Of Life" would be akin to describing life itself. Yancey uses seven different soloists throughout the eight-song album, except for one cut performed by the choir. There are uptempo, energetic selections such as "Lift Him Up," "Sign Me Up" and "I'm So Happy," and spirited, electric ballads like "Thank You," "Everything To Me" and "Serving God," but all are consecrated praise offerings.

Top Country Artists Honor Ernest Tubb On Double LP

NASHVILLE — Ernest Tubb is indeed a living legend. After 36 years as a member of the Grand Ole Opry, after 40 years of endless touring as an ambassador for country music and a member of the Country Music Hall of Fame since 1965, Tubb stands as an absolute giant in his field.

He was the first country artist to record in Nashville, and he was one of the first country singers to use an electric guitar on record and in his shows. In the '30s and '40s, country music was known as "hillbilly music." Through his influence, Tubb persuaded Decca Records to promote the music as "country and western." Soon, all record companies utilized the more modern term.

Back In Limelight

Though he still tours most of the year, Tubb has been somewhat ignored in the wake of the modern country music business. But this week, some of that limelight will again shine on Tubb with the release of a double album on Pete Drake's First Generation Records, "Ernest Tubb: The Legend And The Legacy."

Scheduled for release on Feb. 9, coinciding with Tubb's 65th birthday, this album is a musical tribute to Tubb from many of his old friends in the business. Pickin' and singing on 20 Tubb standards are such notables as Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Charlie Daniels, Loretta Lynn, Johnny Paycheck, Merle Haggard, Johnny Cash, Charlie Rich, Cal Smith, Conway Twitty, Marty Robbins, George Jones, Justin Tubb, the Wilburn Brothers, Vern Gosdin, Charlie McCoy and Chet Atkins.

Tubb had originally recorded a solo album of such songs as "Walking The Floor Over You," "Waltz Across Texas," "Soldier's Last Letter" and "Thanks A Lot." Through the help of Drake and without Tubb's knowledge, all of these artists came into the studio and overdubbed harmonies with Tubb.

On a recent Saturday night, backstage at the Grand Old Opry, Tubb talked with **Cash Box** and expressed his singular views on country music and his reaction to the upcoming tribute album. His point of view may seem somewhat outdated to those active in the current commercial musical arena, but Tubb speaks from the vantage point of surviving four decades as a leading singer of classic country music.

Tubb is inflexible on a vital point. He refuses to homogenize his music for the sake of commerciality. Consequently, two or three years ago, he experienced major differences with his old label, MCA, and failed to come to terms with other Nashville companies. Through Drake and Pete Drake Productions, Tubb recorded an album ("The Living Legend") on First Generation Records in his style. Following that release, Drake urged Tubb to return to the studio and lay down more tracks. At that point, Drake proposed the idea of recording some songs with Willie Nelson and Waylon Jennings.

First Generation Formed

"After I had gotten my contract back from MCA because of a misunderstanding with them, I recorded about 10 songs for Pete Drake," Tubb said. "Pete played this for various people who were interested in signing up Ernest Tubb. Each of them said, 'That's fine, but we want to re-record him because we have some new ideas.' I told Pete to forget about it. I'm not going to change my style and do something in the so-called modern fashion. So Pete created

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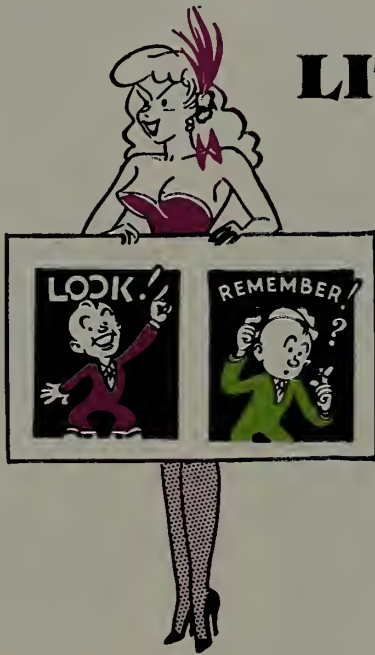

William Morris Agency's Nashville Business Increases 60% In 1978

NASHVILLE — The William Morris Agency, one of the premier management/booking firms, reported that business generated by its office here in 1978 was up approximately 60% over the previous year. The Nashville office is approaching its sixth year of operation, according to manager Bob Neal.

A major achievement of the local office last year was the filming of the two-hour television motion picture "Murder In Music City" by Frankel Films, which was seen on national television Jan. 16. Besides Sonny Bono, Claude Akins and other well known performers, top Nashville personalities were featured in cameo appearances. These artists included Ray Stevens, Ronnie Milsap, Mel Tillis, Barbara Mandrell, Larry Gatlin and Charlie Daniels.

Film Involvement

The agency became involved with the film when a representative of Frankel Films asked them to supply the personnel for the cameo appearances. According to Neal, many of the personalities contacted and supplied by the agency are not clients of William Morris. "We used two or three of our people and selected several other artists in the area," Neal said. "Our purpose was to get the best people we could."

The artists who appeared in cameo roles played themselves, rather than dramatic characters. But, Neal said, the demand for country artists to appear in dramatic roles is definitely increasing. He added that many of his clients are being tested for roles.

Neal said interest in Nashville as a location for filming television and motion picture movies is growing. He added that tentative plans include filming the pilot for "Nashville Beat," a police-type story, sometime in the spring.

Air Circuit

Another area the agency has been involved in is booking its Nashville artists in State Fairs. With the retirement of veteran agent Sidney Epstein, Dave Douds has been made national head of the Fair Department. In the past year, one or more William Morris attractions appeared at almost every major State Fair, as well as major independent fairs. "We also supplied hundreds of attractions for area and county fairs all across the United States and Canada," said Douds.

Concert tours were also a major area of activity for the agency, according to Neal. "More venues have opened for country artists," he said. "I feel the demand will increase even more this year. More and more people are requesting country artists that had not used them before."

Many of the agency's clients made guest appearances on television shows. A concert by Crystal Gayle and Ray Stevens was filmed at the Grand Ole Opry in October for the Home Box Office organization.

Among its Nashville clients, the William Morris Agency represents Crystal Gayle, Ronnie Milsap, Charlie Rich, Rex Allen, Jr., Bobby Bare, Ray Stevens and Dotsy.

Willie Nelson must have old masters stored in half the vaults in Nashville. RCA has released yet another album's worth of early Nelson material. Without a doubt there is good stuff here, but the question is how much longer can labels continue to find decent Willie material in storage? On this LP, Willie's pickin' and singing is not quite as good as it is today, but Willie at 3/4 speed is better than nearly anyone else running full blast.

Although Cristy Lane has charted well with each of her singles, she has a long way to go before she is a household word with country audiences. However, she is a talented vocalist, and if she continues to record albums of this quality, stardom might not be too far away. If Cristy can find 10 or 12 strong, individual songs for her next LP, she could find herself in the league with Dolly, Tammy and Crystal.

Saskia possesses a sweet, light voice which nearly goes unnoticed on first listen. But as with other delicacies, a generous helping of Saskia introduces the listener to deeper and richer textures. The entire album is a delightful blend of country and pop influences. "I Believe In Love," "Crying" and "Tennessee Waltz" are the best here.

Mayhew Re-Groups Little Darlin', Looks To Expand Beyond Country

NASHVILLE — Little Darlin' Sound and Picture Company, Inc., the independent record company that spawned the career of Johnny Paycheck back in 1964, is back in business again.

After shelving the company for a few years, Aubrey Mayhew, founder and discoverer of Paycheck, has opened new offices for the independent company. Mayhew's current Little Darlin' roster includes Stonewall Jackson, Bobby Helms, Hugh X. Lewis, Hoot Hester, Dugg Collins, Frank Myers, Buddy Spicher, Bobby Rainbow and Lloyd Green. In addition, Mayhew owns an entire catalogue of old Paycheck masters as well as other country, rock, jazz, blues and gospel material — all of which he plans to release, he says.

Singles released so far under the new Little Darlin' Label include Jackson's "My Favorite Sin," Hester's "I Still Love Her Memory" and Collin's "There's No Easy Way To Die." Last week, Little Darlin' released an album on Paycheck titled, "The Outlaw." An album on Jackson is also scheduled for release soon.

Beyond Country

With plans to develop a full-line album catalogue, national sales and promotion director Bob Holliday said the label will not operate solely as a country label.

"We are not going to function within the limitations of country music, in terms of product or merchandising," Holliday said. "Our goal is to become Nashville's independent counterpart to such labels as Casablanca, RSO and others. Our intention in 1979 is to establish a major status profile and back up our new image with product in all fields of contemporary music."

In addition to 30 distributors across the country, Little Darlin' plans to support each release through advertisements in print, television, radio and billboards. Holliday also said Little Darlin' maintains close ties with licensees in foreign countries.

According to Holliday, Little Darlin' feels

it has a goldmine in the old Paycheck masters. During 1964-71, Paycheck logged nine consecutive top-10 singles with the label, and many unreleased masters are in the vault. "To release these masters as anything but new, front-line product would be an insult to the great talent of Johnny Paycheck," Holliday said.

The session at Bradley's Barn was almost complete when Peggy's older sister, **Loretta Lynn**, dropped by to hear what Peggy had done. **Sissy Spacek**, the actress who will be portraying Loretta in the movie "Coal Miner's Daughter," was with Loretta. **Crystal Gayle**, Peggy and Loretta's sister, was supposed to sing some background harmony with Peggy Sue but she was detained by a snow storm in New York.

In what could turn out to be one of the most unusual "crossovers" in quite some time, **Porter Wagoner** unveiled his new disco show at the *Exit/In* last week in Nashville. With the addition of such touches as a synthesizer and a flashing disco light show, Porter's new act was quite a change in image.

"Change my image?" Porter quipped. "I'm putting on a few more rhinestones than normal. I've even had a hat made that's got them all over."

Artists Honor Ernest Tubb

First Generation and put out the 'Living Legend' album.

"Then Pete asked me to do some more numbers, and I recorded 10 more songs. About this time, Pete asked me what I thought about doing a record with **Waylon Jennings**. And he said Willie wants to do something with you. I told him I would, but it would have to be done my way with the *Troubadours*. Now, I have known both of them since they started in the business, and they are dear friends of mine. I said as long as we keep it country, I don't mind if they want to add different things with some of their musicians. Pete said, 'I will tell **Waylon** and **Willie** and see if we can work it out.'

'Complete Surprise'

"Well, it never got done because we were never in town at the same time," Tubb added. "Then Pete said he wanted some more numbers because he wanted to put out a double album. I went in one night and recorded some more songs. Now, Pete had not said anything more about **Waylon** or **Willie**. Pete asked me to come back and listen to the tapes we had done, and he started playing one that I had done on a session two or three months earlier. It started off — 'Waltz Across Texas' — and here comes **Willie** singing with me. I said, 'What are you doing.' Directly, here comes another song and another with a guest artist on each one. It was a complete surprise to me. I thought I would cry to think of these people coming in and doing this. And they did it so I wouldn't find out about it. I didn't know a thing about it until it was almost done."

As an original country stylist, Tubb holds definite views on the subject of modern country music. He bears no grudge against any type of music, but believes it is dishonest for someone to claim to be a country artist and aim his music at the pop market. However, **Willie Nelson** is one country artist that Tubb thoroughly enjoys.

"I've been a **Willie Nelson** fan way back before some of these people who like him now," said Tubb, who shared a syndicated television show with Nelson in the middle '60s. "I was a **Willie Nelson** fan 20 years ago when he had 'Mr. Record Man' and those things out. I love almost everything he has ever done. I was invited to play on some of those picnics he started down in Texas, but I was already booked. **Willie** is as country as anybody. He did 'Blue Eyes Crying In The Rain' more country than **Roy Acuff** did it 25 years ago. I see nothing wrong with what **Willie** and **Waylon** are doing."

"What I object to is some of these people singing with a 30-piece orchestra, saying they are country entertainers. If you remember **Ray Price's** 'For The Good Times,' this, to me, is as far as you can go. This is what I call modern country music. It is a little on the pop side, but accepted by the country music fan. I say, let's make it better, but keep it country. Don't overproduce it and fill it full of gimmicks. If you can't go out onstage and perform it like it is on the record, then I think you are overdoing it."

"If someone asks me what is the difference between a country song and a pop song, I give them this example," added Tubb, who idolized the late **Jimmie Rodgers** and whose first hit, 'Walking The Floor Over You,' is recognized as an all-time classic country record. "Mainly, a pop song and especially a rock song is sold because of the melody or beat. The lyrics are not too important. But in country music, the lyrics are the main thing, and the song has a story that people can identify with. Now, as long as it's not filled with too many progressive chords, minor chords, jazz chords and rock licks, you can use any instruments. If the story is there, the song is there."

"I like all kinds of music," Tubb said. "I

say don't mix it all together. You can't take a country song and please a jazz fan, a rock 'n' roll fan and a country fan all at the same time. You are going to disappoint somebody. If a country record sells in the pop field, that's great. But if you are making it for the pop field, saying it's country, then I think you are cheating the public. You are not being honest with yourself. If you want to go pop, go pop. But don't try to make a pop record and say, 'Oh, I'm a country boy.'"

Hectic Schedule

Tubb continues to maintain a travel schedule which would tax the strength of a much younger man — over 200 days on the road last year with a full schedule this year. But he is in good health, and he loves his work.

"I am doing what I want to do," Tubb said. "I would be lost otherwise. If I just stopped and sat down, I would go crazy. I'm not going to work up there in Ernest Tubb's record shop, and I'm not going to work in a publishing company or sit up in an office. I think traveling is what keeps me young."

Musicians can tell countless 'road' stories — both serious and humorous. But Tubb told of a letter he received a couple of months ago following an appearance in Iowa which is a simple, but effective illustration of why country music is a pure American art form which has reached the hearts and minds of this country for over 50 years.

Fan Letter

"As many miles as I have traveled every year, I feel like I have shook hands with everybody who has ever listened to country music," Tubb said. "But I received this beautiful letter that I have marked for my scrapbook."

"Back in November, they had a bad snowstorm up in Iowa. Our last date in a Northwest tour was in a small town in Iowa, and that night there warnings not to get on the highway because of snow and ice. Believe it or not, we had over half the auditorium full of people. This is now the letter read:

"My husband and I came in the snow and ice to see you. He had been an Ernest Tubb fan all his life and has every record you ever made. We had always made plans to come see you over the years, but something always happened and we never made it. We just couldn't miss your show this time, so we got there. That was the greatest thing for us because our 13-year-old son is an Ernest Tubb fan, and he was with us. The sad thing I want to tell you is that after the show, when we got home, he complained that he was hurting in his chest. Four days later, he dropped dead of a heart attack. He was just 53. I am so proud that this will be the most memorable thing I have. At least, we all got to see Ernest Tubb before he died."

"To me, that letter was very touching," Tubb concluded. "I wrote her a sympathy card and thanked her for the very beautiful and touching letter. This meant something to that lady, and this is what country music means to me, not just making the dollar. I would have played for nothing if I had known it meant that much to her."

GINO SOCCIO — Outline — RFC 3309 — LP — List: 7.98

Gino Soccio, a studio musician from Montreal, wrote, arranged and produced this first LP release from RFC Records. A progressive work, this LP is likely to be bubbling for months. "Dancer" has an overdrive rhythm section, good feeling changes, engaging female vocals and special effects to drive the popper crowd wild. The build is excellent. At 8:23 (129 BPM), this is an outstanding building record. "So Lonely" is sunrise on a fog-bound lake. At 2:03, a captivating tidbit worth playing around with. "The Visitors" at 143 BPM is a driving synthesizer track about space visitors. A punchy sax line leads into several keyboard explorations. Colorful. "Dance To Dance" on Side Two has silky layered female vocals, nice horn work and 135 BPM kick. The short percussion break has a few unusual flavors. "There's A Woman" has a grabber synthesizer "percolating" opening. The vocal is reminiscent of Gerry Rafferty. Interesting crossover possibilities with an edit. Stunning debut album by Soccio. Check it out.

SEVENTH AVENUE — Midnight In Manhattan — AVI-6057 — List: 7.98

Ian Levine is a talented producer. Fiachra Trench is an excellent arranger. Rick Gianatos is a mixer responsible for #1 records. The combination on this around-the-nation concept album yields predictable results: an impressive disco album which is certain to provide hot disco nights. "Midnight In Manhattan" has strong energy and silky chorus with a great change. A vibrant percussion break leads into "New York's On Fire," which has shimmering strings and a punchy chorus. Syn drums add a nice touch. "Miami Heatwave" opens with cow bell, kick, timbales, piano and layers up to dancing frenzy. "From Chicago To The Sky" has a rippling keyboard line, steady tambourine and silky vocals by Peter Butler, Paul Kinane, Alan Clark and Mike Pender. "L.A. At The End Of The Day" opens with powerful handclaps and high-reaching strings. Conceptually designed to flow from cut to cut, the LP does just that. It can be played from city to city without interruption.

While there are only a few new companies with three records on the charts, Dick Griffey, president of the label, attributes his fast success with having a solid relationship with RCA Records, which distributes Solar.

Griffey was previously involved in management and concert promotion, and met Don Cornelius who wanted to start a record label. The two became partners in Soul Train Records which did well, but Cornelius decided he did not want to be in the record business. Griffey decided to continue with the acts he had been managing and evolved the operation into Solar

Records.

Being totally involved with his artists including management and production, he co-produced the Shalamar LP with Leon Sylvers, who left his performing family to produce other acts. He also plans to expand his total business interest to include a management division and a concert promotion firm, as off-shoots of Solar Records.

In addition to Shalamar, Lakeside, theWhispers and Carrie Lucas, which is the present roster, the company is presently in the process of adding two additional acts to the roster. Leon Sylvers plans to return to the performing scene with two female and one male vocalist. The foursome does not have a name yet, but they are readying product to be released on the label in ap-

overlooks the fact that local public radio stations are far less able to raise funds than local public TV stations. For example, a public TV station is likely to be one signal out of four where the public radio station is likely to be one out of 40." Public radio is also without a *TV Guide*-type listing to inform the public of its programs, "yet the public radio stations must compete for the same funds as public TV," he said.

The FCC last week finally approved NPR's satellite distribution plan. However, Mankiewicz noted the irony that "in the same week that the FCC authorized the construction, by satellite distribution, of the first truly national radio network in 30 years,

"I don't see myself immediately producing a rock or country act, because I know more about the type of artists that I am presently dealing with than I do those areas. The label will definitely be getting into several different areas including jazz."

Camu Discusses Canada Star System, Future Of B'casting

(In the second part of an interview with the chairman of the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission, **Cash Box** discusses the Canadian star system and the future of broadcasting in Canada, with CRTC chairman Pierre Camu.)

The star system has been an integral part of American entertainment but in Canada it has yet to be fully developed, with the exception of Quebec, where it has been created for Francophone artists. As a native French-Canadian, do you see any reason for this situation?

Yes, you're quite right. The star system is a difficult thing to develop. It requires the cooperation and harmony between several differing mediums. First, you have to have radio to support the talent, then you have to have record companies supplying radio, and you have to have a press that allocates time and space to the promotion of these artists. In Quebec, you have such a system, and it was much easier to create, because of the language difference. In English Canada, it has always been hard to find a unique Canadian cultural identity. The easiest thing to do was to copy the American culture. But things are getting better. I think the Canadian content legislation (which compels AM radio to play 30-percent Canadian music) is helping to launch a Canadian star system, but it takes time.

The problem has also been that once a star

is created in Canada, he or she often heads for the United States. And in many cases, Canadians don't view their fellow artists with respect until they establish some international success.

Well, I agree. But it's the same with any culture. Once a star becomes an international success, he or she goes where the opportunities are the greatest for them. I can't support staying in this country, when opportunities don't exist in as great numbers as they do in the U.S.

How can this star system be created then, when its purpose is almost self-defeating? Once an artist gets big enough, it's off to the U.S.

Well, it's a difficult question. I think it's a matter of supporting the overall Canadian scene, until it can better develop. Then, maybe it will be easier financially for an artist to stay in Canada and make a living. More important, I think Canadians have a duty to keep Canadians here, to make them feel more appreciated, to support something uniquely Canadian, instead of going after imitative artistry.

Do you support, as the Canadian record industry has demanded, tax breaks for them to invest in Canadian musicians?

Well, we don't really regulate anything to do with taxation or capital. We are exclusively an overseer of the broadcast industry. So I can't say one way or the other about tax breaks. But I will say this, it is up to the record industry or producers to initiate change in policy. They have to go to governments and say they want a break. I don't think government will come to them. The machinery is set up to take advantage of government loans and grants. And there is a certain system everyone must go through.

What do you consider to be the important issues of the '80s facing the CRTC?

Well, the first one is satellite communications. Because it's going to revolutionize communications in North America. And it brings up the whole question of regulation. Who will control it? How will it be received? So, I think it will be of prime importance to the Commission in coming years. Second, I think the development of fibre optics (for the transfer of telecommunications) will be important, because it will mean an avalanche of televised information, as will satellite communications, for Canadians. But I think the Canadian content legislation will be an issue. We've got to get things straightened away with radio. They must be happy with the legislation. But, as I said, I don't think the regulations will be changed at all. And radio, in all its forms, will learn to live with it.

Is specialized radio the wave of the future? Yes, definitely so.

INTERNATIONAL DATELINE

Canada

VANCOUVER — Critical acclaim preceded the Clash's first North American tour, with the first date being a Canadian one, in Vancouver, B.C. Talking by phone to **Cash Box** in Toronto, the Clash's drummer, **Nicky Headon**, outlined the purpose of the first tour. "We're over here to show people that they've been suckered by boring bands," he said. "The new wave is much different than when you first got a listen to it," he claims. "At first, the British were buying any garbage that got released. Now, they've got better taste. They want some proficiency in musicianship. They want higher production standards. They want excitement and not too much violence. And they want to have fun." Certainly, the band's second album is one of the finest produced in the new wave genre. "Well, we don't like to compare the two albums, in terms of music. Both albums are played well, but the production on this new disc is much better. We took lots of time (six months) and did it in three different places. And we were very self-critical all throughout the album. We made sure we got it right." The band will only play a handful of North American dates, but is likely to be back shortly.

Klaatu has come out of hiding, at last. The three-year anonymity may have hurt their careers, but **John** (as he identified himself by phone) of the band says it's all part of a master plan. "I can say only this about the band. There are four of us. We are all Canadians." A fourth disc is in the works, with a first tour scheduled tentatively for 1980, at which time the band will most assuredly be revealed, unless they play

Australia

SYDNEY — The "Grease" soundtrack album has become the biggest selling album in Australian recording history. Sales currently exceed 520,000 for the LP, and the movie is still doing well at the box office. Another RSO hit, the "Saturday Night Fever" album, recently celebrated its first anniversary on the Australian charts. "Fever" has now sold 450,000 units.

Dragon's American tour has been a success due to two reasons. Following Halsey's successful MIDEM presentation, his company went on to offer a package of country music talent to tour throughout the People's Republic of China. Also included in Halsey's Chinese endeavor is an offer from Halsey's artists to lecture at Chinese universities and musical

societies.

"Country music is the music of the people and a style of American folklore that should be of special interest to the Chinese people," commented Halsey. "We, in turn, would look toward such an opportunity to learn something of the folk music in China."

"Because of the success of the 'Country At Cannes' gala, I feel sure that worldwide acceptance of country music is well on its way," concluded Halsey.

CONTROVERSIAL LYRICS — Lyrics with sexual or offbeat innuendoes often face resistance from commercial radio. **Musique's** "In The Bush" caused some squawk. **The Stones** prompted a boycott. The "Maximum" cut by **GB Experience** which contains the line "gonna make you come" is not impressing **Wanda Ramos**. WKTU won't play it. **Bonnie Pointer's** "Free Me From My Freedom (Tie Me to A Tree/Handcuff Me)" is another track Wanda feels is damaged by its lyric. "It's a great disco track," says Wanda, "but the kinky lyric restricts it." **RCA** is changing a controversial line in the song "There But For The Grace Of God Go I" by **Machine**. The change, encouraged by radio, is not aimed at eliminating a sexual reference but rather toning down a biting statement satirizing racism. The line "no black, no jews and no gays" is being replaced by the line "where only upper class people stay." A new **Machine 12"** was prepared for radio only. **Tony King** of **RCA** thinks the controversy is a good sign. "People criticize disco lyrics as meaningless. The reality of the lyric by the Machine proves them wrong."

NEW PRODUCT — Coming soon from TK is a "Hot Number" 12" by **Foxy** and a "Fly Me On The Wings Of Love" 12" by **Celi Bee**. **Jim Burgess** mixed the 9:35 track. that, after the "Out Of The Blue" returns were credited to UAMRG, "Jet was given the opportunity to purchase these albums at their then current market price, but declined . . ."

Another salient point, according to Promo, is that CBS and Jet had acquiesced to the contract under which Promo purchased the ELO albums for \$1.00 each from UAMRG before the deal went through. Regarding the CBS/Jet allegation that UAMRG and Promo had knowingly unloaded defective records on the market, Promo's deposition refers to the contract between the two companies, in which it is stated. "Buyer will not sell any defective item of the inventory unless buyer has conspicuously labelled said item as defective."

"Concurrent" with the agreement between Promo and UAMRG, Promo further contends, CBS promised to buy a quarter of a million ELO albums from Promo for \$3.00 each, "provided that Promo withhold distribution of the balance of the albums Promo purchased from UAMRG for a period of 90 days. Thereafter, in a continued and uninterrupted course of conduct, CBS made further demands upon Promo, engaging in a host of deceptive and misleading practices designed to prolong the withholding by Promo of the "Out Of The Blue" albums from the market for the duration of the Christmas selling season."

According to Promo, Jet offered to buy the remaining "Out Of The Blue" albums from Promo for \$2.50 each. Neither CBS nor Jet ever made good on their promises, the suit contends.

CBS and Jet also used other tactics to prevent the competing ELO albums from reaching the market, according to the

Promo suit. For example, says Promo, CBS and Jet filed "numerous frivolous, baseless, harassing discovery and other litigation motions in the California and New Jersey actions and accused Promo of distributing defective albums. They also threatened Promo's customers with lawsuits if they purchased any ELO albums from Promo; as a result, Promo claims, "orders were cancelled and customers refused to accept albums already shipped." Taken together, Promo maintains, these actions constitute state anti-trust violations and conspiracy in restraint of trade.

Libel Action

CBS and Jet, the suit continues, placed ads in a number of consumer and trade publications which stated that ELO albums without a CBS trademark on them were "unauthorized" and that many of them were defective. In Promo's view, these ads constitute grounds for a libel actions against CBS and Jet. Other evidence of slander against Promo exists, according to the deposition, in letters and telegrams to Promo customers that warn them not to buy imported copies of the ELO album which don't bear the CBS trademark.

The libel counts in the third-party suit are similar to those in the counterclaims, except that the Ardens and Yetnikoff are both named as defendants. In addition, Billboard Publications is accused of slanderous reporting of the incident involving the New Jersey injunction against Promo. And Sharon Arden is charged with destroying Promo property at a booth the firm had set up at the Midem trade show in Cannes, France.

CBS had no comment on the deposition by Promo.

100 Singles chart. Poco's "Legend" album is #52 on the **Cash Box** Top 200 Albums chart.

Other ABC LPs in the Top 200 include the two-album set **Steely Dan's** "Greatest Hits," #64; "Numbers" by **Rufus**, debuting this week at 142 bullet; "Carmel" by **Joe Sample**, debuting at #147 bullet;

It is on the country charts that ABC is making its strongest showing, with four singles, including two bulleting in the top 10, and seven LPs appearing. "Come On In" by the **Oak Ridge Boys** (CMA best vocal group of 1978) is #4 bullet on the singles chart and "Everlasting Love" by **Narvel Felts** is #9 bullet. Also represented on the singles chart are **John Wesley Ryles'** "Love Ain't Made For Fools" (#34) and **Saskia & Serge's** "Crying" (#94).

On the country LP chart, ABC has four albums in the top 20. They include "Ex-

pressions" by **Don Williams** (CMA best male vocalist of 1978), #5; "Moods" by **Barbara Mandrell**, #13; "Rose Colored Glasses" by **John Conlee**, #17 and "Room Service" by the **Oak Ridge Boys**, #19.

ABC is also strong on the jazz chart, an area where MCA has had little involvement. The **Crusaders'** "Images" stands at #19, while two members of the **Crusaders**, **Wilton Felder** and **Joe Sample**, are doing well with solo LPs. Felder's "We All Have A Star" is #12 and Sample's "Carmel" came on this week at #26 bullet. **John Klemmer's** "Cry" is #25.

ABC's current chart success, coupled with the change from ABC's branch-indie distribution system to the MCA Distribution Corp. headed by **Al Bergamo** and the end of ABC's pressing arrangement with CBS in favor of MCA, has encouraged some observers to speculate that the ABC Records operation will soon become profitable under the MCA banner.

Blizzard Of '79

Midwest Storms Take Toll On Coin Business

CHICAGO — Since the new year, the midwest, especially Chicago, has been reduced to one endless, unplumbed, maddening snow bank. A 20-inch blizzard fell on top of 12-inches of previous snow, prompting President Carter, on Jan. 16, to declare northern Illinois a disaster area.

The coin business mirrored this catastrophe in white; manufacturer, distributor and operator suffered almost equally.

At first, some Chicago manufacturers lost entire days of production. One company ran three to five days behind schedule. Another dipped to 15% of the normal daily production. Compounding the problem, the blizzard inopportunistly hit during the manufacturing of blockbusters such as "Playboy" and "Space Invaders," for which demand already far exceeded supply.

The company stance: whoever can come in, should come in and we'll do the best we can, a fatalistic approach. However, late in the blizzard week, the manufacturers kicked up their output and breathed an apparent sigh of relief. The sigh was short-lived. Interstate truckers, bogged down in the snow, couldn't pick up the machines now rolling steadily off the assembly lines, and the excess inventories choked shipping docks.

'Immovable Object'

Local distributors endured the same shortage-surplus syndrome. In the beginning they lacked games and feared that they couldn't fill the orders. But then a few interstate truckers and neighborhood customers were able to negotiate the drifts and pick up the equipment. Ironically, an

Gottlieb Releases 'Solar Ride', Its New Four-Player Pinball Machine

CHICAGO — "Solar Ride" is the latest solid state four-player released by D. Gottlieb & Co. and the factory's first new flipper for 1979. It's a model with the accent on distinctive graphics and abundant play action, according to Tom Herrick, Gottlieb's marketing vice president, who expects the game to rank among the top income producers in recent months.

"The spectacular, bionic horsewoman graphics on the backglass bring you over to see what all the excitement is about," Herrick enthused, "and then after you test the play action you're hooked. Action is what the artwork personifies," he continued, "and scoring action is what you get. The game has both a single and dual set of flippers and many playfield features, including plunger skill shots to pick up rollover multipliers in sequence before the ball enters the playfield."

Other Features

Another of the game's skill shots is a long diagonal to the upper right corner which returns the ball to the plunger for an additional shot at the top multipliers. The player can also advance the multiplier by knocking down five drop targets on the left, midway up the playfield. Knocking down the center red drop target last earns a replay, and when the ball is eased into a kickout hole at the left top of the game the player immediately collects accumulated bonus.

Solar Ride, which is currently in full production at the Gottlieb factory, is ad-

justable to three or five ball play and convertible to add-a-ball. The game will be on display at Gottlieb distributors around the country.

abundant supply and an insatiable demand separated by a seemingly immovable object — snow.

In the early part of the week, distributor staffs ran from 1/4 to 1/3 strength, working days four to six hours, and with phone and foot traffic virtually stilled, much of the day consisted of exchanging blizzard stories: walking four miles to work when the bus never arrived, waiting two hours in traffic when it did arrive; digging out buried cars, and pushing them into hopelessly clogged streets, measuring distances in feet per hour; shoveling roofs before they collapsed, and seeing the world's largest shopping mall closed except for one store which had a queue of 400 people, numbers in hand, waiting to buy snow blowers. In the latter part of the week, distributors struggled for a return to business as usual while operators grew increasingly im-

patient over delivery delays.

Local operators fared little better. They dashed between snowflakes into the distributor to buy emergency parts, but few were able to pick up new games or switch others between locations. One day an operator had his truck on the street for 8 hours, and it did nothing but get stuck repeatedly. A freelance mover was grounded for a week before he grit his teeth and finally began work on a ten-page backlog of moves. With impassable streets and alleys and drifts burying sidewalks, even if movers picked up a game at the distributor, they had no access to the location.

Initially collections tumbled considerably, but eventually operators partially recouped their losses through neighborhood walk-in traffic. At first arcades were empty, and then the city and suburban schools were closed all week so the arcades began to fill up. One weary operator declared it was like a perpetual weekend — noon to night each day. The local bars and bowling alleys and their game rooms also provided entertainment and escape from the snow. Business listed but, at least, it did not sink.

point out that the radio experience is not comparable to the discotheque experience. "Jerkiness" in the flow of the music is in fact seen by some as a positive feature rather than a drawback. Several spokespersons felt that smooth seguing on the radio could create boredom and that noticeable transitions were necessary to sustain interest.

"A lot remains to be seen as to how disco radio stations will compete," says Allen Shaw, president of the ABC-owned and operated FM stations. "The appeal of disco has not been completely determined for the radio. But mixing, jock posture, image and community involvement are going to play important roles."

While competition among disco radio stations is a relatively new phenomenon which has yet to be explored or documented by rating results, label disco promoters are elated by the broadening base of exposure opening for disco music.

"As a result of the growth of disco radio," says Ken Friedman, national disco director of Casablanca, "we are seeing expanded retail sales. Instead of the hard-to-know-where-from type of sale we are used to with discotheques, we are now instantly realizing sales from radio exposure. It is important to remember the names of songs are mentioned on radio but they are not in discos. Radio gives credibility, facts and figures for the industry to respond to."

Friedman also views the emergence of disco radio as the breakthrough to mass acceptance for disco personalities.

'Superstar Status'

"Disco radio alleviates the necessity for a black record to cross," says Friedman. "Gloria Gaynor does not have to go #1 R&B to go pop now. She can be snapped up immediately. Disco radio is the beginning of superstar status for disco performers."

There is considerable controversy within the disco industry as to the effects of the growth of disco radio on the importance of discotheques. Traditionally, discotheques were the breaking ground for disco records. Substantial sales of disco product were generated through clubs in areas such as New York without airplay. However, the expansion and exposure power of disco radio has altered that original proposition, according to Billy Smith, national disco director for London Records.

'Adverse Effect'

"Disco radio will have an adverse effect on the importance of breaking a record in a club. I won't have to promote my records through the majority of discotheques if I can get my record on the radio."

Typically, a record company will issue approximately 3,000 promotional copies of

a disco record to disco pools and individual DJs across the country to expose a new piece of product. "I won't have to do that," says Smith, "if I have access to disco radio. I would rather have my record played on KTU than at Studio 54."

'Disagree Completely'

"I disagree completely," says Ray Caviano of RFC/Warner Bros. Records. "Clubs are the barometer of trends. Clubs break and sell records. But disco radio which is the Top 40 of the 1980s will just speed up the whole process."

Boyd of KIIS-FM in Los Angeles feels that disco radio will complement the achievements of the discotheques.

"Clubs break the records in many cases but disco radio will give the songs mass exposure. We want to play what the people want to hear."

BMA Film Will Be Distributed By LCA

LOS ANGELES — The Black Music Association and The Learning Corporation Of America have entered into an international distribution agreement. Kenneth Gamble, BMA president, recently announced that LCA will be distributing the 30-minute film entitled "Black Music In America! The '70s." The film will be an overview of black music during this decade, and will explore the impact and influence black music has had on popular music, and how it paved the way for the emergence of disco. The film is scheduled to premiere at BMA's Founders Conference in Philadelphia, June 8-11.

National chairperson Jean Kennedy Smith added that over 500 handicapped children from all parts of the U.S. will be flown in for the event, in illustration of the theme "The International Year Of The Child." It also marks the singer's first appearance there.
