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Optimistic Outlook!

The feeling among economists today seems to be that we've passed the worst part of the recession and that from here on in there should be slow but steady recovery.

When the economic downtown was first recognized, there was a tendency to panic in some quarters, predictions being heard on many sides that it could be the forerunner to a full fledged depression. Obviously these people were wrong and comparisons with 1929 are completely out of order. The very nature of our economy today — the built in controls and the continuing necessity for large defense spending — almost automatically precludes the type of depression we experienced then.

True, to a person who's unemployed, it hardly matters whether it is 1929 or 1958. He still has no income coming in. But in the past couple of decades, such accepted safeguards as unemployment insurance have mitigated the terror of unemployment and the government today shows every determination to strengthen these measures.

Although in the first three months of this year, almost all categories of business figures were down, when the final results are in, we may find that the decline was nowhere what some people imagine.

In our business, for instance, the record business, almost everyone agrees that despite the recession, January was one of the best months the record industry as a whole has ever experienced. Furthermore, now that the tax season is ending and Easter will soon be upon us, we can look for a definite upturn in record sales. What happens from there on depends, to a great extent, not solely on the nation's economic picture, but in good part on the kind of product our industry turns out, how well it gauges what the public wants, and how strong each company makes its own organization.

In times of great prosperity, businesses have the tendency to go along disregarding small difficulties because the general picture is favorable. It is in times of economic pauses, that businesses find the opportunity to be flexible. That is the time when they can switch and change—fast. And the time to build for tomorrow by tightening efficiency, correcting organizational setups, and better evaluating assets, both manpower and material.

We hope record companies have used the recession constructively to make themselves stronger. If they have, they have very little to worry about for the future.

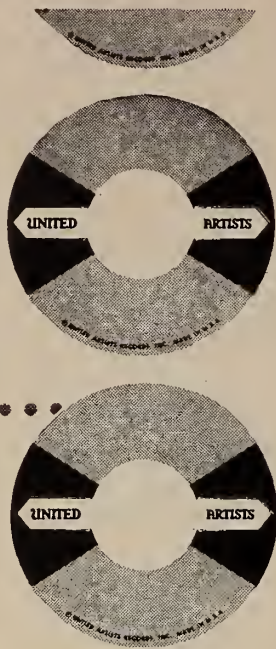

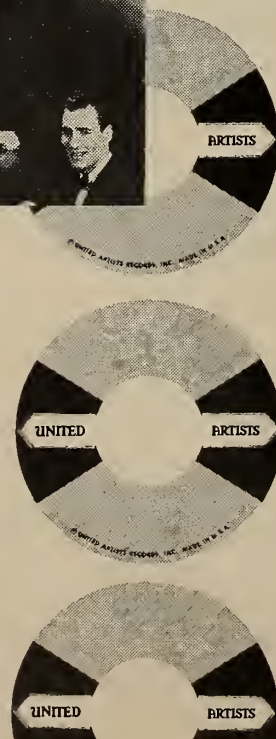

GUY MITCHELL
(Columbia 41146)

B+ "TILL WE'RE ENGAGED" (2:32) [Oxford ASCAP—Tromey, Wise, Thomas] Guy Mitchell is in the teenage groove with a good shuffle rhythm romancer that should enjoy a healthy run. Pretty arrangement with whistling, etc. Easy going deck.

B "HEY, MADAME" (2:38) [Livingston & Evans ASCAP—Livingston, Evans] A colorful romantic novelty from the hit musical "Oh Captain!" is happily pranced thru by Mitchell. High stepping ditty with a Parisian flavoring.

TONY MARTIN
(RCA Victor 7210)

B+ "SAY, DARLING" (2:22) [Stratford ASCAP—Comden, Green, Styne] The warm, smart title ballad from the B'way-headed musical "Say, Darling", is handled with charm by Tony. Martin's fandom will go for this number. Heavy play of the class side can be expected.

C+ "TRY TO LOVE ME JUST AS I AM" (2:21) [Stratford ASCAP—Comden, Green, Styne] Martin's mellow tones tenderly caress the lyrics of this touching romantic item. Side also stems from the "Say, Darling" musical.

WHISPERING PIGG
(East West 111)

B+ "DARLENE" (2:21) [Nor Va Jak BMI—Pigg, Petty] East West comes up with a weird novelty that could become a sensation. Featuring an artist with an unusual name, the side offers Pigg reciting in a hushed, eerie voice, lyrics that have a haunted sound as a combo supplies a thrilling instrumental backdrop that really rocks wild. Different enough to make it.

B "PENNIES FROM HEAVEN" (2:37) [Joy ASCAP—Burke, Johnston] Another "far out" opus is this new version of an oldie. Pigg again recites in a whisper breaking into an instrumental of varied tempos—swing, rock & roll, and back to swing. Imaginative waxing. Cool lyrics. Dee jays seeking an off-beat disk have "the end recording" in this one.

THE MERRI-MEN & LEE TALBOY
(Blue-Chip 013)

B "WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT" (2:15) [Sage & Sand BMI—Reeves] Lee Talboy and the Merri-Men drive thru a rock-a-ballad opus with a crude sound that the kids should enjoy.

C+ "GRADUALLY" (2:15) [Sage & Sand BMI—Shimick] Another rock and roll ballad chanted with sincerity by the group.

FOUR MINTS
(NRC 003)

B "HEY LITTLE NELL" (2:05) [Wonder BMI—Blackburn] The Four Mints, a versatile new group, bow on the disk scene with a hard hitting, staccato beat rocker that'll have the kids hoppin'. Swinging merchandise.

C+ "TEENAGE WONDERLAND" (2:33) [Lowery BMI—Pruitt] The boys have an entirely different sound on this end—a fish-beat ballad about the teenage world.

"WEAR MY RING AROUND YOUR NECK" (2:15)
[Rush & Presley BMI—Carroll, Moody]

"DONCHA' THINK IT'S TIME" (1:57) [Elvis Presley BMI—Otis, Dixon]
ELVIS PRESLEY (RCA Victor 7240)

● El Pres, who's been the recipient of front page publicity ever since his induction into the army, offers his first single as a Private and comes thru with a fantastic new swinger that could be his biggest hit since the 5,000,000 selling "Don't Be Cruel". Titled "Wear My Ring Around Your Neck", the number is a torrid jump opus—just about Presley's wildest performance since "Hound Dog". It's got a sensational beat that drives right from the first groove and builds in excitement as each spin runs its course. The kids'll go daffy over this sizzler. Flip, "Doncha' Think It's Time" is a slower rock-a-ballad with a hip-swinging rhythm. Another spirited performance by the man who's never missed.

"ALL I HAVE TO DO IS DREAM" (2:17) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Bryant]

"CLAUDETTE" (2:12) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Orbison]
EVERLY BROTHERS (Cadence 1348)

● The Everly Brothers, who came to the fore singing rhythm numbers such as the multi-million sellers "Bye Bye Love" and "Wake Up Little Susie", have another potential million-plus disk. But this time it's a ballad waxing dubbed "All I Have To Do Is Dream". It's one of the most beautiful teenage ballads to come past this turntable in a long while and the Everlys handle it superbly. Their soft harmony plus a slow latin rock-a-ballad tempo makes the side a standout. This side could be the team's biggest to date. Even the flip side is terrific. It's a thrilling rock-a-billy jumper with a great dance beat and some fabulous guitar work. Don't sell "Claudette" short. Kids have a great buy in this coupling.

"JOHNNY B. GOODE" (2:30) [Arc BMI—Berry]

"AROUND & AROUND" (2:20) [Arc BMI—Berry]
CHUCK BERRY (Chess 1691)

● Chuck Berry, still way up there with his "Sweet Little Sixteen", should add another hit to his chain of successes with his latest effort for Chess. The big side is the one in which Berry tells the rockin' tempo story of one of the Southland's greatest guitarists "Johnny B. Goode". The deck's got an exciting drive that starts with the very first groove and doesn't let up until the record has run its course. Sensational dance deck that should zoom onto the charts in short order. Flip, "Around & Around" is another good rockin' affair replete with Berry's guitar work. But the upper portion is the one with the dollar sign.

"RAGS TO RICHES" (1:56) [Saunders ASCAP—Adler, Ross]

"THE MAN ABOVE" (2:15) [Conley BMI—Jones]
THE RAYS (Cameo 133)

● Waiting to find the proper material with which to follow-up a hit record, rather than rushing out an inadequate piece of merchandise, is one of the smartest moves a company can make. Cameo has done just that with the Rays who zoomed into the big-time with the smash hit "SHhouettes". And we'll bet our bottom dollar that the general consensus of opinion will be that the follow-up was worth waiting for. The group's newest effort is "Rags To Riches"—the big hit that Tony Bennett sent sky high a number of years ago. The Rays, with Hal Miller in the lead, bring the swinger up to date by adding a strong rock and roll sound, hand-clapping and a number of additional gimmicks that the kids go for today. Great side that should be huge all over again. Flip, "The Man Above" is a dramatic inspirational ballad with a rock and roll beat. Watch the top half take off.

"TEEN-AGE DOLL" (2:30) [Central Songs BMI—Carroll]

"HAWAIIAN ROCK" (2:06) [Tri-Park BMI—Hammer, Samuels]
TOMMY SANDS (Capitol 3953)

● Capitol last week issued Tommy Sands' strongest release since his initial money-maker "Teen Age Crush". It's a sentimental fish-beat ballad with a touching lyric and goes under the title "Teen-Age Doll". Tommy does a dramatic job with the potent number and comes off with a side that's a cinch to make the grade. Vocal accompaniment in the backdrop is excellent. Flipside is a cute rock-a-hula ditty tagged "Hawaiian Rock". Contagious rhythm opus with a cute storyline and a swinging dance beat. Top deck is the one for the big money.

TONY BENNETT
(Columbia 41157)

B+ "CRAZY RHYTHM" (2:05) [Harms ASCAP—Caesar, Meyer, Kahn] Two exciting sides from Tony Bennett's LP, "Beat Of My Heart", in which he works with a number of jazz greats, are back-to-back on this single. Here, with Chico Hamilton supplying a thrilling drum-backdrop, Tony belts out a scat-singing, cool reading of a great oldie. Jockeys should enjoy this change-of-pace Bennett offering. Air play should be heavy.

C+ "THE BEAT OF MY HEART" (2:24) [Bourne ASCAP—Burke, Spina] The title song of the LP is refreshingly presented here. Ralph Sharon's ork, again with Hamilton's skin work, accompany.

JIMMY LLOYD
(Roulette 4062)

B+ "YOU'RE GONE, BABY" (2:01) [Coaxial & Kahl BMI—McAlpin] Jimmy Lloyd hands in a big rock-a-billy jumper that could be chart material. It's a potent wailer belted with gusto by the spirited performer. Socko teen stuff that could take off.

B "I GOT A ROCKET IN MY POCKET" (2:19) [Coaxial & Kahl BMI—McAlpin, Logsdon] Another torrid jumper rocked with zest and in commercial style by the songster.

ERNIE FIELDS ORCH.
(Jamie 1102)

B "ANNIE'S ROCK" (2:31) [House Of Fortune BMI—Mattola, Paige] Ernie Fields and his men drive hard as they send across a rockin' instrumental jumper with a fabulous sound. Side is great for dancing. Sax work is fabulous.

C+ "STROLLING AFTER SCHOOL" (2:10) [Forsite & House Of Fortune BMI—Mattola, Fields, Scott] Also tailor-made for dancers is this oozing, stroll-beat opus with a chorus singing only the title lyrics. Instrumental backdrop is terrific.

BIG BEN BANJO BAND
(Capitol 3951)

B "SWISS KANTON POLKA" (2:30) [Zodiac BMI—Oldorp, Rothe] A new polka ditty—that's just as charming as could be—is delightfully presented by Big Ben's Banjo Band and a chorus. Banjos are wonderful for this happy-go-lucky bouncer. Joyous dance deck that should become a favorite in many areas. Great item for tavern jukes.

C+ "HAPPY BIRTHDAY POLKA" (2:29) [Witmark ASCAP—Stolz, Gannon] The chorus offers a birthday greeting set to a polka tempo. Melody is completely different from the familiar "Happy Birthday To You" song.

JO-ANN CAMPBELL
(Gone 5027)

B+ "SHER-OO" [Figure BMI—Smith, Sherlock] Jo-Ann Campbell, a lark who's gotta make the grade one of these days, could turn the trick with this delightful rocker with a subtle cha-cha beat. Excellent novelty with a wonderful lyric, melody and top delivery by Jo-Ann. Watch this one.

B "WASSA MATTER WITH YOU" [RealGone BMI—Campbell] Another potent up-beat dance deck projected with spirit by the talented lark.

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LU ANN SIMMS
(Jubilee 5321)

B+ "THE MOOCH" (2:03) [Hecht, Lancaster & Buzzell ASCAP—Jacobson, Roberts] Lu Ann Simms has a good rock and roll beat novelty that could blossom into her biggest record to date. It's got a number of excellent gimmicks and a very funny lyric describing what a mooch is: a guy who won't go steady, but for someone's girl he's ready; a guy who goes stag, etc. Teen gals should get a kick out of this ditty.

C+ "BYE UM BYE" (2:15) [Hecht, Lancaster, Buzzell ASCAP—Jacobson, Roberts] A galloping tempo rocker with a happy air. Cute item on the light side.

JERRY WAYNE
(MGM 12622)

B "YOU CAN'T BE TRUE, DEAR" (2:15) [Biltmore ASCAP—Ebe-ler, Cotton, Otten, Griffin] Jerry Wayne, who sent this great oldie over the million mark many years ago, has re-recorded the standard for today's market, setting the number to a good R & R beat. And the results are commercial. Could catch again. Jockeys will find the disk a good conversation piece.

B "I CAN'T FORGET LAST NIGHT" (2:30) [Brunswick BMI—Sanford, Silver] The smooth-voiced songster hands in another pretty fish beat romancer. Polished side the kids should enjoy.

BOBBY NORRIS
(Capitol 3945)

B "ROCK - A - BYE ME MAMA" (2:10) [Sun-Crest BMI—Hoffman, Johnson] Capitol adds a rock and roller to its roster, Bobby Norris, who debuts with a hard-hitting, hand-clapping jumper. Solid dance deck.

C+ "I WENT ROCKIN'" (2:10) [Sun-Crest BMI—Winn] More of the same style of rockin' merchandise set to a similar tempo too.

TEEN QUEENS
(RCA Victor 7206)

B+ "DEAR TOMMY" (2:12) [Fred Raphael ASCAP—Collins, Mall] The Teen Queens of "Eddie My Love" fame, how on Victor with a pretty rock-a-ballad chanted tenderly. A male vocal group assists resulting in strong side that could become a teenage favorite.

B "YOU GOOD BOY, YOU GET COOKIE" (2:10) [Emes ASCAP—David] The cute title lyrics, which parents often use with little children, are repeated a few times in the introduction. Then the side breaks into a torrid instrumental rocker that'll keep the teenage feet hoppin'. Voices break in in spots with the title lyrics. Swinging sound.

PATTY & MARY SMALL
(Coral 61960)

B "THAT COULD BE LOVE" (2:45) [Patty Lou ASCAP—Small] Songstress Mary Small teams up with her daughter Patty, a gifted vocalist, to fashion a charming shuffle rhythm tale of romance. Contagious side dee jays and teenagers should enjoy.

C+ "ONE FIVE-SEVEN SINGLES" (2:50) [Coliseum BMI—Hackady, Gohman] Mary works alone on this end chanting a torchy ballad.

TONI ARDEN (Decca 30628)

● Toni Arden, considered by many in the trade as one of the greatest female vocalists in the business, has in her latest release a fabulous side that could give her the first smash hit of her career. It's certainly the strongest side the lark has cut in years and it has all the earmarks of a tremendous seller. The number is titled "Padre" and features the vocalist with a heart-rending tale of romance in a religioso setting. An organ and choir backdrop give the listener the feeling of being in a church while a young lover speaks of her woes. The latin tempo heard thruout is beautiful. Flipside, "All At Once" is a tender love song handled with warmth by the canary. Keep a close watch on the upper half.

"APACHE!" (2:24) [Marguerita ASCAP—Bass]

"DEE'S DREAM" (2:26) [Marguerita ASCAP—Bass]

CHIEFS (Greenwich 408)

● The new Greenwich label makes its first showing on the disk scene, and a more impressive debut couldn't have been possible. Featuring a group called the Chiefs, the label's first effort is an Indian rock and roll jumper called "Apache!". It's a thrilling side combining the efforts of the vocal group (singing without words) and a torrid instrumentation highlighted by some low down sax work. Tom toms set the war chant mood with a rhythmic backdrop as the chorus wails an Indian melody. The kids are sure to be wild over this one. And for dancing this hip-swinging rocker'll be tough to beat. Toward the conclusion a crude savage voice cries "one more scalp" and the Chiefs run thru another chorus. This gimmick alone could sell the record just as the phrase "one more once" made Count Basie's "April In Paris" so popular. Sounds like a hit from every angle. Flip "Dee's Dream" is a piano mood item with an R & R beat.

It's a wonderful lilting rocking version with a clean sound and a smart reading by the gifted lark. The cow-bell and choral accompaniment is a great showcase for the canary and the resulting sound is refreshing. Dee jays will give this one a tremendous send-off. It's the type of merchandise they like. The companion piece is a sultry romantic ballad dubbed "C'mon C'mon". Well written love tune projected with verve by the artist. Two class items.

The sound is wonderful. Bottom portion, "Juke Box" is a trigger-fast rocker.

The gimmick is the title lyric "Nee Nee Na Na Na Nu Nu" which popular TV comic Jonathan Winters uses when he impersonates a child's speech. The lyrics are daffy enough to capture the teeners' imagination. And as far as the instrumental segment is concerned, it swings. Coupling "Flip Top Box" is a zany vocal rocker out of the ghoulish category. Top deck is the hot one.

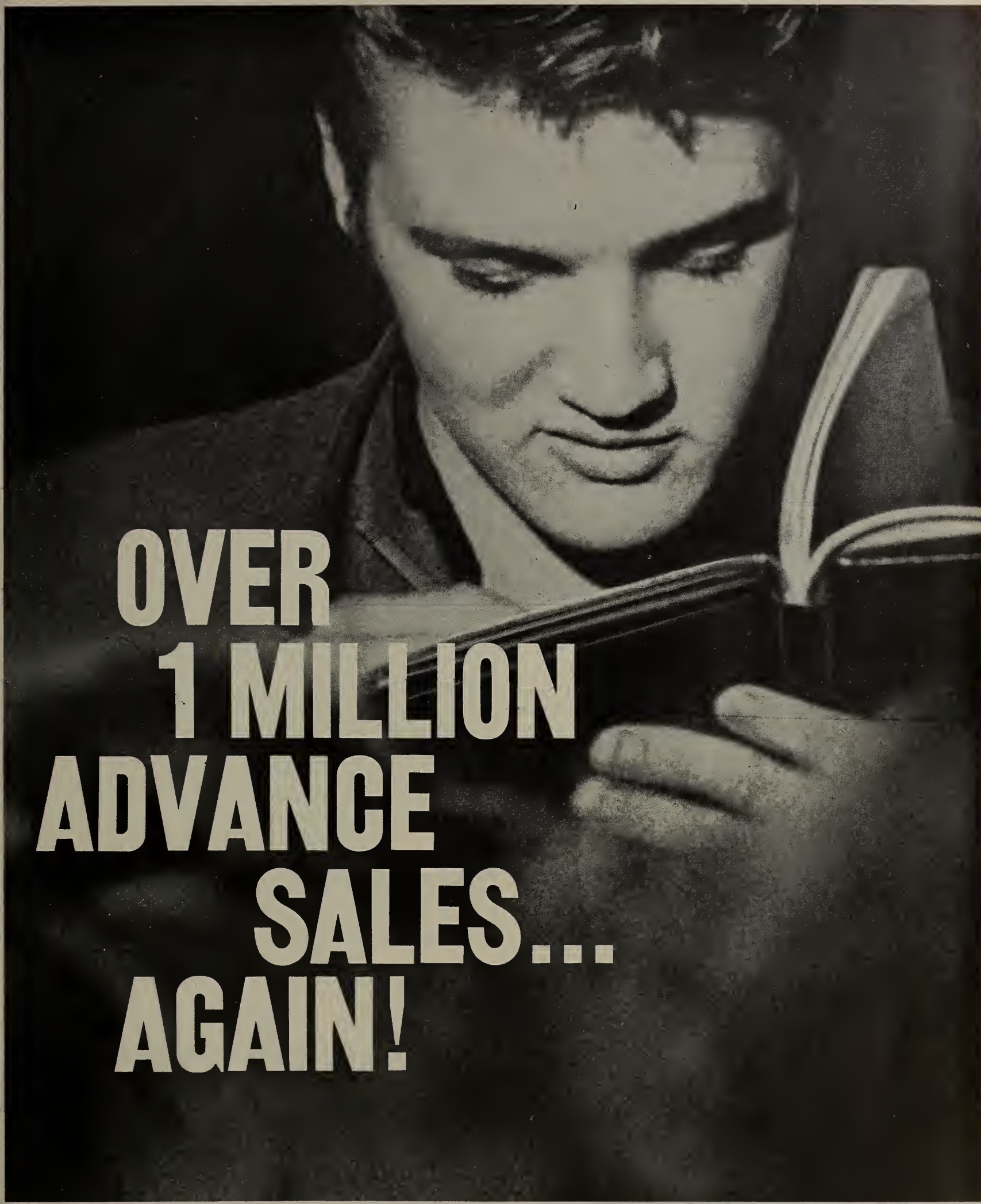

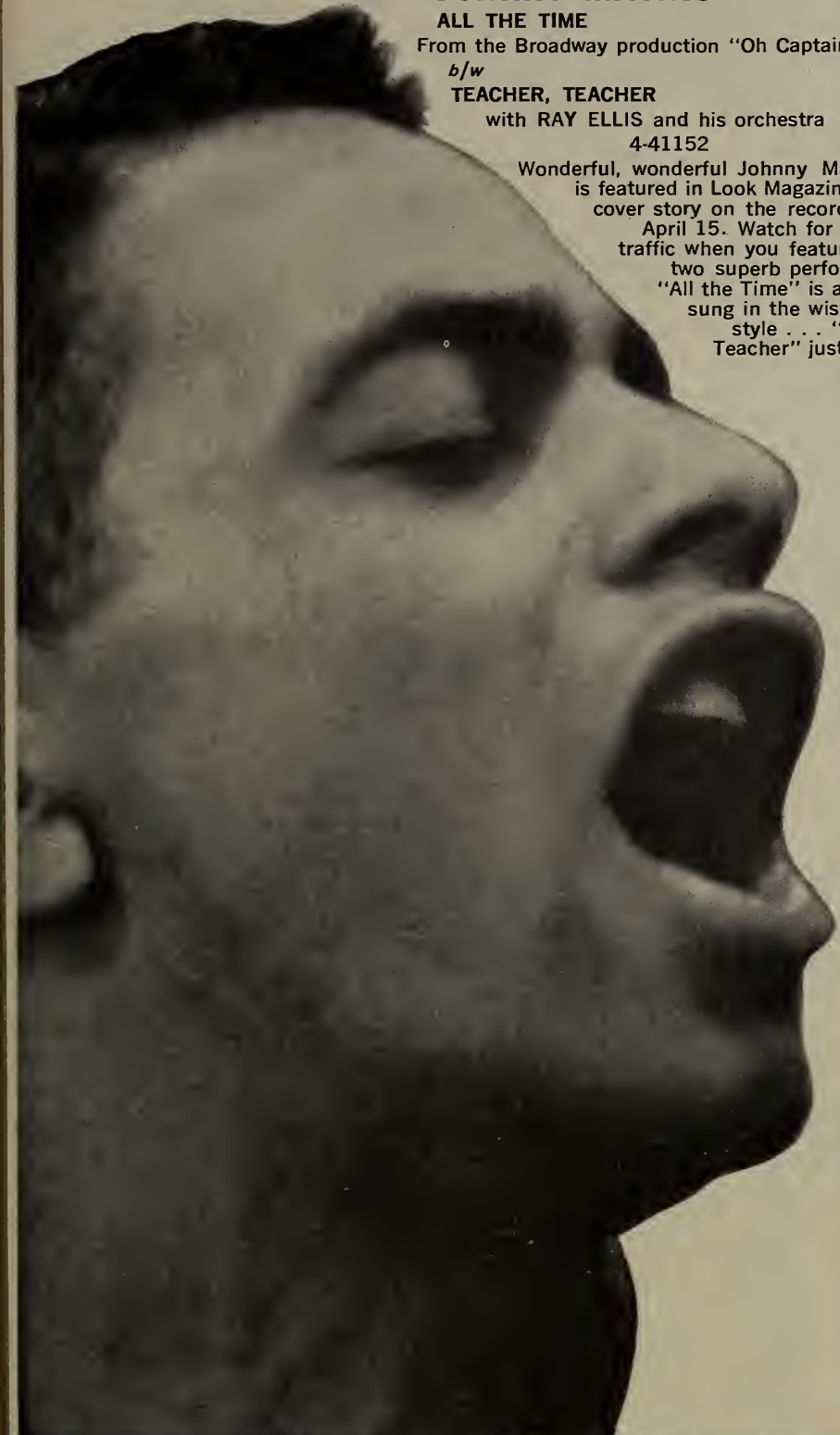

RCA Victor To Issue Stereo Disk. Will Not Offer Compatibles

NEW YORK — RCA Victor last week announced its plans to release a "true" stereophonic disk this coming summer, to be introduced at the Furniture Show in July.

At the same time George Marek, RCA Victor vice president, announced that this decision obviously meant that Victor, for one, would not release the much discussed compatible disk.

Marek stated that in his opinion and the opinion of the entire Victor staff, the compatible disk represented a compromise in quality and it would therefore be a step backwards.

In a demonstration at the RCA Victor Review Room last Tuesday, April 1, the compatible disk was played monaurally and stereophonically, and in both instances the true monaural and true stereophonic disks issued a clearer, more defined, less fuzzy sound. It was explained that Victor was certain the public would not accept a disk in which it was forced to compromise on the quality of the sound.

The problem of double inventory was admittedly a headache which the compatible disk would have obviated, but it was felt: 1) with the gradual introduction of the disk double inventory would not prove to be too much of a problem, and 2) it was preferable to that of issuing an inferior product.

Inexpensive conversion stereo cartridges, some already introduced, will enable the monaural set owner to get a better reproduction from his present monaural records and to start to build a stereo disk collection toward the day when he will change to more modern stereo equipment.

Most of the major and inde record

companies seem to be in agreement with the RCA Victor decision. However, Columbia, which last week, announced its compatible disk, and apparently has no intention of releasing it at this time, has made no statement as to its intentions in the true stereo disk field.

N. Y. Capitol Distr. Hot

NEW YORK—Vito Samela, Capitol Distributors, this city, reports that his Capitol Record line is at one of its hottest peaks in some time. In the singles department, Samela calls attention to Ed Townsend's "For Your Love" and "Torero," by Renato Carosone. "Both were broken in New York," says Samela, "which should put to rest for all time the popular misconception that New York does not break records."

Other singles selling in hit figures are Dean Martin's "Return To Me," Laurie London's "He's Got The Whole World In His Hands," "How Are You Fixed For Love" and "Nothing In Common," by Frank Sinatra, and Keely Smith and "Looking Back," by Nat "King" Cole.

In the album department, the New York distributing branch of Capitol lists "Mommy Gimme A Drink-a Water" by Danny Kaye, "Swinging On Broadway" by Jonah Jones, and "The Late Late Show" by Dakota Staton as the established hits, with three new releases creating great excitement. They are Renato Carosone's "Blue Italian Skies," Les Baxter's "South Pacific," and Joe Bushkin's "Night Sounds."

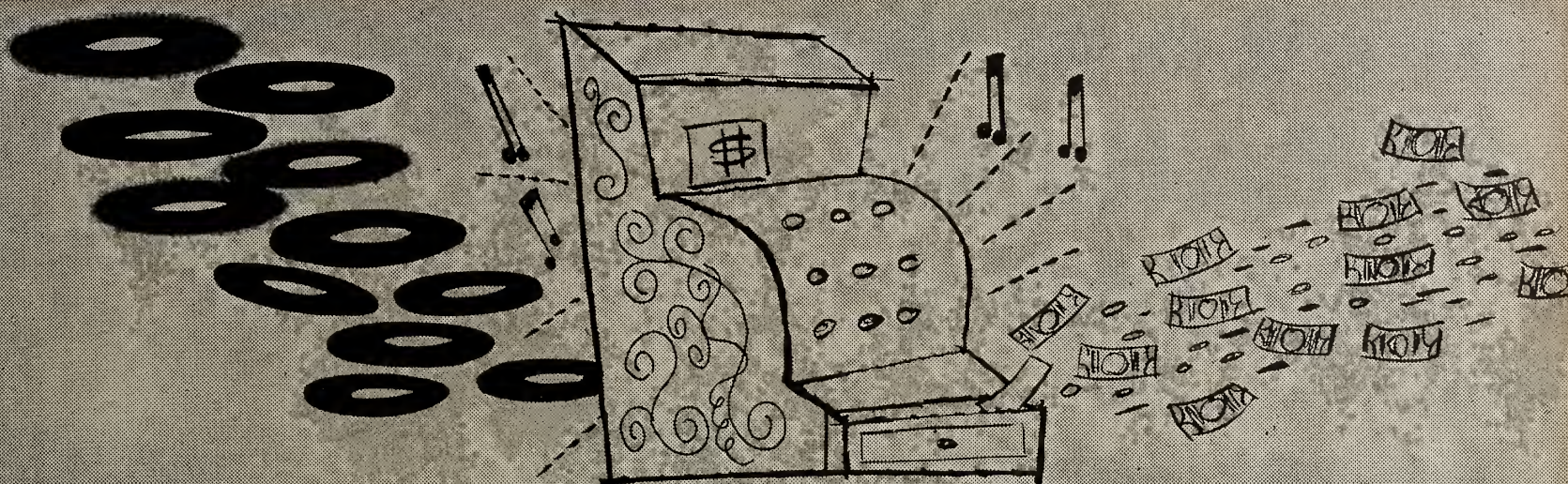

MGM Records Increases First Quarter Sales 53%

Bills Half Million Dollars In March

NEW YORK—MGM Records president Arnold Maxin has announced an increase in over-all dollar sales of 53% for the first quarter of 1958 as compared to the similar period of 1957. Long-playing records increased in sales by 9%. Single records and extended play sets showed 144% increase.

In the month of March, MGM billed one-half million dollars, the largest volume of billing in the eleven year history of the company.

Much of the single sales activity was accounted for by Connie Francis' "Who's Sorry Now", Joni James' "Nothing Will Ever Change", David Rose's "Swinging Shepherd Blues",

Sam (The Man) Taylor's "Big Guitar" and a high sales volume among a number of rock and roll releases issued since the first of the year.

Leading the way in the LP category were such albums as Joni James' Italian-English album "Ti Voglio Bene . . . I Love You", the three "Gigi" albums—the sound track, the David Rose instrumental, and the Dick Hyman jazz album, the Ray Charles Singers' "Winter Wonderland", and others.

Maxin's stepped-up sales pace will continue with extensive programs and special promotions scheduled for each month of the year.

Decca Releases "Mood Jazz For Hi-Fi" Series

NEW YORK—Decca Records last week announced the release of a new "Mood Jazz for Hi-Fi" series, the J 9200 series.

The first release consists of a selected group of nine LP's running the gamut as far as artists and instrumentation are concerned. The sets will carry a list price of \$4.98.

The entire Decca sales organization will be sporting handsome briefcase kits including all pertinent material throughout the month of April.

A heavy merchandising aid program has been prepared for the sales-

men as well as the retailer; plus two color forms illustrating the entire release, a bound litho book previewing the "New World Of Jazz Sound", a large window centerpiece, die cut mounted lithos, and a mounted insignia for counter use.

A strong advertising campaign has been prepared for use in trade papers, trade magazines and national publications.

All Jazz D. J.'s in the country will receive a special sampler with a letter telling the complete story of "Jazztime."

"Ten Commandments" LP Not Licensed For Radio Or TV Play

HOLLYWOOD—Randy Wood, Dot Records' topper, upon hearing that portions of the Dot album "The Ten Commandments" had been broadcast on radio and TV, announced in a special letter to dee jays and program directors that the music from the film has not been licensed for public performance on either radio or TV in this country or elsewhere.

Cecil B. de Mille, producer of the film, and the publishers of the music advised that any such public performance will be deemed to be an infringement of the copyright of the music and henceforth any further violations of these restrictions will result in the institution of legal proceedings for an injunction and damages.

London Singles To 98c

NEW YORK—Lee Hartstone, vice-president in charge of sales of London and Felsted Records, last week announced that the labels have raised the list price of their 45 rpm singles to 98¢. The change went into effect April 1.

Form Volcano Records

LOS ANGELES—Theo Allen, president of Theo Allen Enterprises, L.A., has formed a new record company called Volcano Records.

The label's first release, set for release next month, features Allen singing "I'm A Man And Not A Mouse" b/w "You Ain't My Gal No More"

Lutz To A&R Kaye And Ameche Albums

Seeco Readies First Stereo Tapes

NEW YORK—Sidney Siegel, president of Seeco Records, announced this week that sales manager Abbott Lutz will act as recording supervisor on the forthcoming Don Ameche and Stubby Kaye LP's.

Lutz has appointed Leo Israel, freelance writer and arranger, to prepare the Don Ameche material. The Ameche LP will be written in the form of an original musical and may be adapted later as a network spectacular.

Details on the Stubby Kaye package are not being disclosed but Lutz revealed that Bob Mersey, TV musical director and arranger, will handle the session under his supervision.

Siegel returned last week from a two-week trip to Spain, France and England on business for his firm.

Siegel revealed that he has closed a deal with Telefunken of Madrid, a subsidiary of the German company, to press and release the Dawn and Seeco catalog in Spain.

Test pressings of material that Siegel selected in London and Paris are now on their way to the New York office of Seeco, and a decision will be made on their release in the United States.

The indie diskery will be receiving three albums a month, throughout the balance of 1958, of Spanish material that Siegel okayed while in Madrid.

It was also announced last week that the diskery has gone into production on its first stereo tapes and will have them ready for release in April.

The successful Jose Melis and Elsa Maxwell albums, the Aldo Bruschi Italian LP, and the Triads Plus Two polka LP, which have not yet been issued, will make up the initial Seeco stereo tapes.

MGM Records Moves

NEW YORK—MGM Records, after eleven years at 701 Seventh Avenue, has moved to the Loew's Building at 1540 Broadway.

MGM Records will occupy the entire ninth floor.

This is in line with the plan of Loew's, Inc., parent company of MGM Records, to consolidate all branches of the MGM organization under one roof.

New Heartbeat Label

CHICAGO — Heartbeat Records, a new local diskery, made its debut last week. The newborn firm bowed in with "Peg O' My Heart" b/w "Tea For Two" by Seymour Schwartz, his orchestra and his trumpet.

The firm is jointly owned by Seymour Schwartz and Jerry Allan. Schwartz, has a long history in the record industry in many phases, retailer, broker, writer and artist.

Allan's background is varied. He handled promotion for Music Distributors, served as liaison man between record firms and talent and is prominent in publicity locally.

Allan stated that Heartbeat Records strives to produce "music with 'heart' and a 'beat.'" Allan further stated that the firm will press singles now and concentrate on LPs in the near future.

Schwartz said that the diskery is represented both in ASCAP and BMI through Sunny and Heartbeat music publishing firms.

Dario And Dorle Soria To Develop And Package Special

NEW YORK — Dario and Dorle Soria, who terminated a five-year association with Angel Records on January 1, 1958, will return to the recording field as independent producers, to develop and package for RCA Victor a special series of classical record albums, according to an announcement by George R. Marek, Vice-President and General Manager of the RCA Victor Record Division. Soria was President of Electric and Musical Industries U.S. Ltd.; Mrs. Soria director of artistic relations, press, advertising and promotion.

The series, of the "highest artistic and technical quality," will be drawn from every field of music. It will be recorded both in this country and abroad. Art design, documentary material and printed material will also utilize the resources of both continents. RCA Victor's technical staff and facilities will be used for all recordings. RCA Victor artists as well

as other available artists will be enlisted for specific recordings with which their talents have a special affinity.

The new series, "Presented by Soria," will be launched in the summer of 1959. It will be distributed through RCA Victor's regular channels including its record clubs.

The Soria-Victor agreement was negotiated just before Mr. and Mrs. Soria sailed on the SS Constitution (April 3) for Europe where they will combine a holiday with preliminary research for the forthcoming series. As previously planned, they will also spend most of May and all of June in Rome and Spoleto, assisting Gian Carlo Menotti with The Festival of Two Worlds which they helped to organize and which will take place in Spoleto June 5-29. They will visit the Salzburg Festival and other centers of summer musical activity before returning home in September.

Mercury Holds Second Annual Int'l. Convention In Paris

CHICAGO—Executives of Mercury will leave April 8th to meet with over thirty licensees of the Mercury Record Corporation for a three-day convention—seminar to be held in Paris this week end, April 10, 11, 12. The meeting will be conducted by Irving B. Green, president, and accompanying Green from the Mercury executive staff will be Wilma Cozart, director of the Classical division, Bob Shad and David Carroll representing the recording department. Bob Fine will represent Mercury as a recording and engineering consultant.

The purpose of the International Convention is to present to all licensees in attendance the many new developments that are constantly taking place in the recording industry. Engineering and manufacturing techniques will be thoroughly discussed with special emphasis given to the development of stereophonic tape and disks. Marketing, merchandising, promotion, and advertising techniques successfully employed in the U.S.A. will also be covered at the seminar.

The promotional high light of the three-day affair will be a special concert Friday, April 11th, at the famed Salle Pleyel Theatre. The members of the convention, as well as 1200 dealers throughout the country of France, will attend this concert which will feature the Platters, Sarah Vaughan, and Max Roach.

The musical director for the show is Eddie Barclay, one of France's leading orchestra leaders. The concert will be broadcast over Radio Europe #1. The broadcast will be recorded and the entire live show will be produced as a long play record for world wide distribution.

Representatives of the press from each of the organizations will be in attendance, for this will be the first time an American recording company has presented a free concert for dealers in a foreign land with a live radio show to be presented to the entire continent. As a piece de resistance, the Saturday meeting will be held during a boat trip on the river Seine. Madame Nicole Barclay and Monsieur Eddie Barclay play host to the entire International Convention for the three days.

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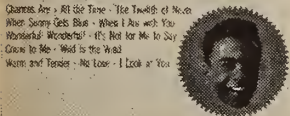

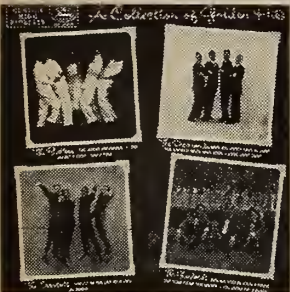
"JOHNNY'S GREAT HITS"—Johnny Mathis—Columbia CL-1133 (1-12" LP)

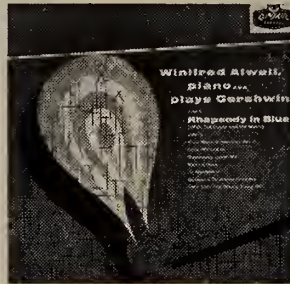
"SEA OF DREAMS"—Nelson Riddle and his Orchestra—Capitol T-915 (1-12" LP)

Miss Atwell programs a smartly rendered collection of Gershwin tunes. Side one of the disk is dedicated to the well known "Rhapsody In Blue", while the flip side has seven other items. The pianist is assisted on the major piece by the Ted Heath orchestra. Side two is done with the help of a rhythm section. Other Gershwin goodies include "Love Walked In" and "Summertime". Slick ivory work.



"JOHNNY RAY IN LAS VEGAS"—Johnny Ray—Columbia CL-1093 (1-12" LP)

The dynamic vocalist was recorded during a performance at a Las Vegas night club. Johnny Ray renders a number of old timers on this set, including the two songs that first brought him acclaim, "The Little White Cloud That Cried" and "Cry". Also on the menu is one of Ray's latest singles, "Just Walking In The Rain". Top flight entry from the popular artist. Will get high sales treatment from Ray's fans.



"MIDNIGHT SERENADE"—Sammy Kaye—Columbia CL-1107 (1-12" LP)

The maestro and his swing and sway musicians lend their persuasive delivery to a host of oldies. Kaye's orchestra is aided by the impressive vocal inserts from the Kaydets. Two tunes descriptive of the set are "It's Been A Long, Long Time" and "I'll See You In My Dreams". Could be a big seller. Good album.



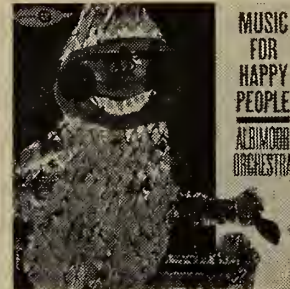
"SARAH VAUGHAN IN A ROMANTIC MOOD"—Mercury MG-20223 (1-12" LP)

The great songstress tags a liberal sampling of romantic goodies. Miss Vaughan, with some smooth orking behind her, shows why she is considered one of the most colorful vocalists around. "MUSIC FOR HAPPY PEOPLE"—Albinoire and his Orchestra—Jubilee JLP-1069 (1-12" LP)

The two late great bandleaders are featured on this pressing, one on each side of the disk. The tunes, some of which date back as far as 1945, all spotlight that verile brass delivery that was so much a part of the Dorsey aggregations. Items include "September In The Rain", "Keel Row" (Tommy Dorsey), "Star Dust", "Perdido" (Jimmy Dorsey), and others. Should appeal to all Dorsey fans.

"TWILIGHT ON THE TRAIL"—Bing Crosby—Decca DL-8365 (1-12" LP)

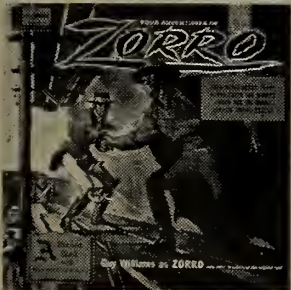
"FANTASTICA"—Russ Garcia and his Orchestra—Liberty LRP-3084 (1-12" LP)

"ZORRO"—Guy Williams as Zorro with other members of the cast—Disneyland WDA-3601 (1-12" LP)

The pressing is based on the current Walt Disney TV character. The issue features the fictional "Zorro" in four adventures, and is housed in the familiar book type cover containing captioned pictures. A well done effort that will certainly receive the hearty approval of the small fry. Okay set with excellent gift possibilities.

JAZZ



"WAY UP THERE"—Shorty Rogers and his Giants—Atlantic 1270 (1-12" LP)

Shorty Rogers takes his giants through eight self penned goodies. The giants consist of some of the best west coast musicians on the scene, Jimmy Guiffre, Shelly Manne, Barney Kessel, etc. Rogers and aggregation offer top brass readings with five assorted instrumental groupings. A set of extremely tasty jazz compositions. Lots of good swinging. Far out cover.



"ANITA SINGS THE MOST"—Anita O'Day—Verve MGV-8259 (1-12" LP)

This set, Miss O'Day's fifth outing for Verve, may well be her best to date. The talented thrush's jazz inspired arrangements make for one of the most colorful vocal jazz platters in a long while. Anita O'Day's vital, soulful treatments are transferred to such well chosen items as "Old Devil Moon" and "Love Me Or Leave Me". The songstress, one of the most influential on the jazz scene, is backed by a swinging group. Plenty of sales due.



"KENYA"—Machito—Roulette R-52006 (1-12" LP)

Machito's famous crew teams with such noted jazzsters as Julian "Cannonball" Adderly (alto sax) and Eddie Bert (trombone) to offer some swinging Afro-Cuban Jazz interpretations. One highly exciting selection is a tune dubbed "Frenzy", which features top percussionists Patato and Candido on congas. Could be Machito's biggest to date. Another top issue from the label's Birdland series.



"SOUTH PACIFIC JAZZ"—The Tony Scott Quartet—ABC Paramount ABC-235 (1-12" LP)

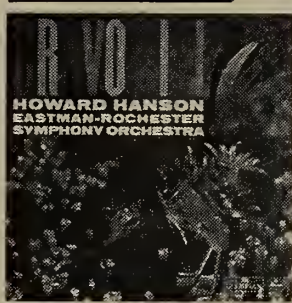
The top rated clarinetist and his group swing the tunes from the hit musical. Scott, in addition to his clarinet, tackles some of the songs with very impressive baritone readings. 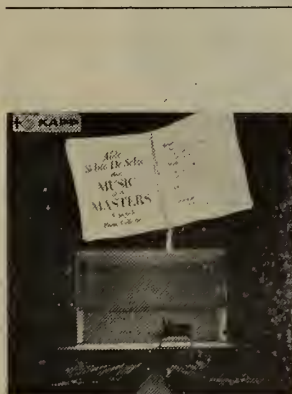

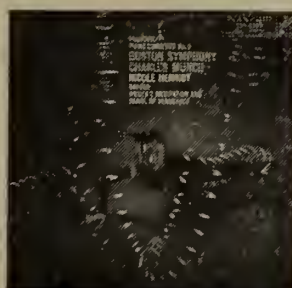

Chudd Arranging Latin American Distribution Of Imperial Line

LOS ANGELES—First step in plans to set distribution of Imperial Records in Latin America was completed last week with the announcement by label prexy Lew Chudd that Corporacion Nacional has been selected to handle Imperial in Mexico. Corporacion Nacional president, Luis Baston T., will press the entire Imperial line in the firm's Mexico City pressing plant, Chudd added.

Chudd is currently negotiating with firms in Brazil, Argentina, Panama, Chile, and Bolivia to handle Imperial and has set aside three weeks in July to visit these countries and finalize deals.

"The South American market has not even been touched," says Chudd, "and yet, the potential in certain countries is bigger than in many European countries."

Because South America is primarily a singles market, Chudd disclosed that Latin manufacturers are eager to handle independent labels which have been producing the bulk of single hits for the past few years.

Chudd also announced that Imperial will bring out its first stereophonic tape releases in June. All Imperial album sessions for the past year have been recorded in stereo, and the initial release, to be comprised of Ricky Nelson, Fats Domino, Slim Whitman, and Ernie Freeman tape packages, is being prepared now. Electronic jobbers, rather than record distributors, will handle the line.

Chudd will release two albums in May: "Ozzie and Harriet," vocal album by parents of Imperial's hottest artist, Ricky Nelson; and "Ralph Edwards' This Is Your Life" LP, featuring songs identified with stars who have appeared on Edwards' TV show. The recording of Alfred Hitchcock's "Music to Murder By" has been postponed because Hitchcock is out of the country.

Challenge Purchases White Rock Master

HOLLYWOOD—Challenge Records, swinging high with the No. 1 hit, "Tequila," last week announced the purchase of a hot master, "Down on the Farm," by Al Downing from the White Rock label, a Texas company.

The label also released this week an EP by the Champs, titled, "Tequila." Other selections include "Train To Nowhere," "Lollipop," and "I'll Be There." An LP album, "Go, Champs, Go!" will be released shortly.

Right behind "Tequila" in sales is the upcoming Challenge dinking of "Just Before Dawn," recorded by a new duo, Johnny and Jonie. The artists are currently on a nationwide tour to plug the record, climaxing with a shot on the Dick Clark ABC-TV show, April 17.

Johnny Thompson, the firm's general manager, also announced favorable initial reaction to The Kuf-Linx disk, "Eyeballin'." This is the follow-up to the group's "So Tough."

MGM will have albums in the stores on April 28th.

Featured in the show and album will be Red Buttons, Barbara Cook, Rise Stevens, Rudy Vallee, Paula Lawrence and Stubby Kaye.

MGM has tied in with NBC-TV and radio for coast-to-coast plugs, including an audio and video plug for the album at the end of the telecast.

There will also be advance spot announcements both on radio and TV and MGM will rush dubs to all NBC radio affiliates so that they may be played before and after the spot announcements for the show.

The album will retail for \$3.98.

"Piakukaungcung" Sold To Dot

NEW YORK—Bob Thiele of Dot Records last week reported he outbid four other companies and purchased from Sybil Carel and Lincoln Chase the master recording of "Piakukaungcung" released on their newly formed Lincoln label only three days ago in Cleveland, Philly and Pittsburgh. This new instrumental has received a "tremendous" reaction in these areas, with comments ranging from "terrific" to "shocking" to "weird."

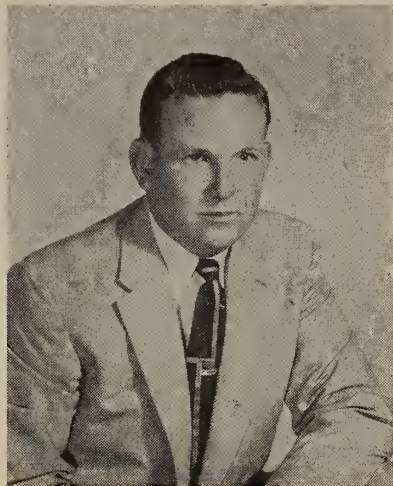

Eulogy To William C. Handy

By Paul Cunningham, A.S.C.A.P. President

We of the music and entertainment world join today the family and friends in our last farewell to a wonderful man and a talented one, William C. Handy. Since 1924 the Society of which I am president proudly numbered Mr. Handy as one of its most distinguished composer members, but in a larger sense all America has been proud of W. C. Handy ever since that magic day in 1914 when he wrote the immortal "St. Louis Blues."

Born in Florence, Alabama, the son and grandson of Methodist ministers, W. C. had a long road to climb to become the "Father of the Blues." From the beginning he had to overcome parental objection to making music his career. He worked as a school teacher and in iron mills. He organized quartets; became the bandmaster of Mahara's Minstrels and through all the years of struggle he carried within his heart and soul the emotions which he was to translate later into "Saint Louis Blues," "Memphis Blues," "Beale Street Blues," and many other songs.

Mr. Handy was a man full of honors. His home town in Florence, Alabama, built a handsome school in his name. The city of Memphis named a town square after him, and in St. Louis an annual scholarship fund for youngsters with musical talent was established in his name.

But, to his family and thousands of friends, as well as those of us in ASCAP, loved and honored Mr. Handy not only as a great composer-musician and musical artist but because he was a big-hearted, truly gentle man. He was always willing to give of himself and his great talents to help his fellow composers and musicians. The establishment of the W. C. Handy Foundation for the Blind

typifies his eagerness to serve mankind without regard to race or creed.

To his family and his friends gathered here today, I can truly say that Mr. Handy was a man to be proud of. As a composer William C. Handy contributed to the world's music something completely new and American. As Vice President Nixon wrote in a wire last November when we honored Mr. Handy at a birthday party: "Not only does his 'St. Louis Blues' more quickly mean 'America' to people all over the world than any other song, but Mr. Handy's research into religious and folk music has been of particular value in preserving music which might otherwise have been forgotten." Mr. Handy was a deeply religious man. He found in his religion the courage and strength to carry on through those times of trouble and difficulties. It is my hope that we who are left behind will take inspiration from the example of this great and good soul.

And now as we say our final farewell to him, we can do no better than to quote that line from his famous song, "I hate to see the evening sun go down."

'Hard Sell' To Be Theme Of 1958 Trade Show

CHICAGO—"Hard sell" marketing techniques to overcome sales resistance of recession-minded customers will be the overall theme of the 1958 Music Industry Trade Show and Convention July 21 to 24 at Chicago's Palmer House.

"This is the year of hard sell, as everyone agrees by now, and the big problem is to step up sales programs to reach potential customers and convince them to buy despite all the recession talk," states William R. Gard, executive secretary of the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM), which sponsors the annual trade show.

"All our field reports indicate that music retailers are feeling a softness in sales along with other business. But where there has been aggressive selling, there has been no slump," states Gard.

"No longer can a retailer wait for business to come to him; today he has to roll up his sleeves and go out after it. Our trade show this year will fully explore the art of salesmanship in this hard-sell year and we know that our retailers will benefit from the sessions we have planned on selling strategy."

In line with the emphasis on selling tactics, a featured speaker at the Palmer House show will be Jack Schwartz, who is a specialist in telephone salesmanship and author of the book, "How To Get More Business By Telephone." Schwartz, who himself sold \$10 million in insurance by "cold" phone-made appointments, will not only speak to the NAMM convention but will also demonstrate his methods. He will call customers and sell them music merchandise on a telephone specially wired so that the audience can plainly hear both ends of the conversation. Schwartz, during his selling career in insurance, averaged \$5.60 in earnings every time he lifted the receiver off the hook.

Schwartz spoke at the mid-winter Los Angeles management conference of the NAMM and there were so many requests for a repeat performance of his telephone clinic that NAMM executive secretary Gard arranged to have him at the national convention.

Gard commented on the business pictures in the music industry: "Our field reports indicate that music retailers haven't been as hard hit by the recession as some other businesses. In times of recession people spend more time at home and that helps music sales. A dollar spent in music has a lasting value. We can see some soft spots, and we feel that our trade show can help give the music business a worthy shot in the arm with some good old-fashioned selling talk.

"One selling problem I have discerned that certainly needs attention is better training for sales people. A recent survey of retail store managers by a Chicago ad agency showed that 90 per cent of all consumers felt they weren't welcome when they walked into a store. And to top it off, 80 per cent of store personnel felt that customers were a nuisance. This feeling is a hangover from the postwar years when sales people got lazy because they didn't have to push merchandise. The customers just came running to their doors to buy. But those days

are gone for a spell, it is evident. We've got to teach sales people selling all over again, starting from the fundamentals, such as going out and making personal calls on people."

Gard pointed out that dollar volume in the music industry had soared from \$39 million in 1945 to \$450 million in 1957, excluding television, hi-fi, radio, records and sheet music. "We've got a tremendous amount at stake, and we know everyone in the industry will be anxious at the convention to discuss ways and means to maintain and increase our peak sales volume of last year. We've simply got to go to work selling, even if it means starting from scratch in retraining people in sales techniques.

"The facts are that business just fell into our laps in the postwar years, that saw twice as many people playing musical instruments as before the war. Now we've got to chase after it. We're beginning to see consumer resistance to price as one factor in lagging sales. But with costs what they are, price cutting is not the answer to bolster volume. It's more aggressive selling, more hustle not only in stores but also out in the field through better promotion and advertising. We hope to fully explore the entire selling program of the industry at our Palmer House sessions and certainly no one in the music field will want to miss these sales clinics, so vital nowadays with all the recession talk."

Atwood, together with Dave Axelrod, Brad A & R chief, will remain active in the company. Puccio will participate in the firm which will be operated independently of Rip.

Brad's first release is "Everybody Happy" by the Addrissi Brothers, backed by "I'll Be True," has already hit best seller lists in several parts of the country. Brad's other artists include Jarry Wiggins and Jean Bryant.

Alan Jay, director of promotion and distribution for Rip, planned out last week on a two week, 18 city national tour to plug the Brad release in addition to a group of new Rip recordings including "Toodaloo Kangaroo" by the Four Ekkos, and "Endless Sleep" by the Jimmy Witherpoon band.

Garner Opens In Chi

CHICAGO — Erroll Garner opened a two-week engagement at the Blue-note in Chicago on April 2nd. This is Garner's first Chicago date since his European tour.

Within the past few weeks, Garner has been concentrating on concert performances, playing to sell-out houses throughout the East. In Boston, Springfield, Syracuse, and Schenectady, he set house records this season.

April 18th, Garner is set for a repeat date on the Garry Moore CBS-TV show.

April 26th, the pianist will appear in a solo concert at Kleinhans Hall, Buffalo.

Faro Records Stages 'Premiere' At Palladium

HOLLYWOOD—To promote their first single release, Faro Records, new West Coast independent label will stage a 'premiere' at the Hollywood Palladium. The first recording is "Zonshebe Blues" sung by movie and TV personality Ken Miller and it will be accorded the full Hollywood treatment at the Palladium, Apr. 7, the date of the national release of the disk. Faro has nine other artists under contract, and Eddie Davis, president of the company stated that they plan at least one single release every six weeks. Plans also call for a complete album line from the new company.

RIAA Reports 1957 Disk Sales At Peak \$360,000,000

NEW YORK — The year 1957 has again been a period of substantial growth and prosperity for the record industry. This was the opening statement of the RIAA's (Record Industry Association of America) annual report to the trade.

The report went on to say that for the second successive year, sales increased sharply over the previous twelve months and by the end of 1957 annual sales at manufacturers' billing price were in the neighborhood of \$275,000,000, equivalent to about \$360,000,000 at retail prices. This is more than three times the value of records sold in 1920 when radio and television had not yet put in their appearance as competitors for the consumers' amusement dollar.

The report also revealed that the number of record companies coming into the industry showed a tremendous increase and that the mortality

rate of the record companies was correspondingly high.

Outstanding developments of 1957 according to the report include: the first hint of stereo disk records; the further development of stereo tape; the entry of additional companies in the field of mail order record clubs; the ability of several relatively new companies to place records in the top position on charts of "best sellers" single pop records; the continued decline in popularity of 78 rpm disks; a broadening in the retail distribution of records thru entrance into the field of super-markets and other outlets not heretofore associated with musical merchandise—a count made during the year showed that over 600 organizations were engaged in the wholesaling of records in the U.S.; the promulgation of dimensional standards for all types of disk phonograph records in current use, for the first time after 60 years of record manufacturing.

During 1957, seven members withdrew from the RIAA and six new members were admitted bringing the total of RIAA members to 52.

The Engineering committee of the RIAA, following the adoption of Frequency Response Standards and then later Dimensional Standards for all types of disk records, took up the task of developing FRS for magnetic tapes and the RIAA feels certain that a recommendation in this regard will be ready this year. Currently of great importance to the Engineering Committee is the stereo disk situation.

The report covered such other events occurring during 1957 as: its various meetings, the suggestion of the establishment of an RIAA approved Gold Record Award, labor contracts, the formation of the National Academy of Record Arts and Sciences, legal and legislative activities, etc.

MGM Signs 6 Artists

NEW YORK — MGM Records has signed six artists. Joining the label are Georgie Shaw, Donny and The Duke, Don Cogan, Lew Prince, the Tophatters and Bernie Early, whose single releases will be issued during the month of April.

Seeco Signs Two

NEW YORK — Paul Livert, A & R man for the Seeco Singles program, announced this week that he has signed the La Plata Sextet and thrush Gloria Wilson to exclusive record pacts.

The La Plata Sextet will cut for Seeco and Gloria Wilson will record exclusively for Dawn.

Marshall Stearns And S. I. Hayakawa To Discuss Jazz At Newport Festival

NEW YORK — This year's Newport Jazz Festival also will hear from two language masters, Dr. Marshall Stearns and Dr. S. I. Hayakawa, when they meet in an open-air discussion of the role of jazz in our modern society. These two experts propose to discuss this subject at Newport during two morning sessions on July 4th and 5th devoted to the birth of the blues and the role of the jazz dance as an expression of our changing cultural neuroses.

Dr. Stearns master of "auld" English and noted lecturer, author and teacher, will lecture on the language of the dance as a cultural phenomenon. Based on recent research into the uncharted course of popular dance development, Dr. Stearns says, "I believe we have a new language here for American ballet—one capable of communicating almost any emotion, a language whose potential has never been fully realized".

Dr. Stearns will speak on every phase of popular dance growth from the Trot to Rock 'n Roll, giving brief background material on the psychological and cultural needs that nurtured such shockers as the Shimmy.

Leon James and Al Minns, the two kings of the Savoy Ballroom in the thirties and winners of the Harvest Moon Ball will assist Dr. Stearns by illustrating the various dance phases.

Spectators will listen to a well-known jazz band booked to illustrate Dr. Hayakawa's lecture on the history and origin of the Blues. Dr. Hayakawa, noted semanticist, will probe the pulse of jazz as it reflects changing currents in our culture from New Orleans' sizzling trumpets to present day progressive sounds.

Capitol Records Offers Plan For Dealer Participation In LP Club

HOLLYWOOD—A plan for dealer participation in the Capitol Record Club was disclosed last in a letter to the nation's record dealers.

In a letter from the Record Club, Glenn Wallichs, President, explained the theory behind the plan.

"In the past few months, we have been learning a lot about the operations of a record club. We have also learned a great deal, we believe, of what dealers want from Capitol in regards to their own participation and frankly, to some extent at least, it changed our own thinking and planning.

"Dealers tell us (almost unanimously) that they want just what they are getting from other Record Clubs—the same share of profit, and a similar method of operation to avoid confusion."

The letter revealed that the dealer participation plan took effect April 4 operating as follows:

Recognized record retailers are eligible to be appointed "Official Club Solicitors" by the Capitol Record Club. As dealers are appointed, they will receive a certificate entitling them to solicit Club memberships. Dealers wishing to become "Official Club Solicitors" are asked to request complete information and application from the Capitol Record Club, Inc., 100 Sixth Avenue, New York 13, New York.

Each time a Record Club member, signed by a dealer, buys and pays for a record from the Club, the dealer will earn a fee of 20 per cent of the selling price. "Official Club Solicitors" receive their fees twice a year, based on actual sales to Club members credited to the Solicitor.

Dealers appointed an "Official Club Solicitor", are asked to assist prospective Club members in filling out the special Membership Application Forms received from the Club and to send them to the Club. Everything else will be handled by the Club itself. Additional quantities of Membership Applications may be obtained merely by writing to the Club headquarters in New York.

Dealers were also reminded that they will benefit from the national consumer advertising program of the Club. In each space ad, there will be a place for the applicant for mem-

bership to indicate the qualified dealer to whom he would like the membership credited. This entitles the named dealer to the Record Club fee for each purchase, just as though the dealer had sent in the application himself.

It was explained to the dealers that each new member receives three records free which are chosen by the member from special lists the Club will provide the dealers. These three free records are shipped directly to the member by the Club after his application has been accepted. The member's only obligation is to purchase a minimum of four records at the regular price within the first 12 months. This is the price on which dealers will receive their fees. After a member has purchased four records, he receives free one bonus record of his choice for each additional two Club selections he purchases. Members receive bonus certificates which may be redeemed through the Club. Dealers receive their fees from the Club on each record purchased.

It was explained further that all members receive, every month, a new issue of Capitol Record Club Review and that additional copies will also be sent to "Official Club Solicitors". The purchase of the Review is to describe the selections available for purchase and the bonus records which members may select.

To further help dealers obtain new members, the Record Club will make available to all "Official Club Solicitors" special advertising material such as statement stuffers, circulars, counter cards and window streamers.

The letter pointed out that in addition to fees dealers receive from the Club, they may profit in another important way: "The record market is increasing rapidly. Club membership does much to stimulate consumer interest in recorded entertainment. Only a limited part of the top ranking Capitol catalog is available through the Club at any time. Thus, dealers may take advantage of the increased consumer interest by stocking and selling the full catalog of Capitol merchandise. Market research vividly points out that Record Club members visit retail stores more frequently to buy records and accessories than non-members."

MGM Pacts Downey

Ganim's Asia Minors were originally signed to do an album, but in the editing the Atlantic brass felt they had something special in "Daddy Lolo". The deck is out one week and the deejay reaction has been fantastic. Already sales are coming

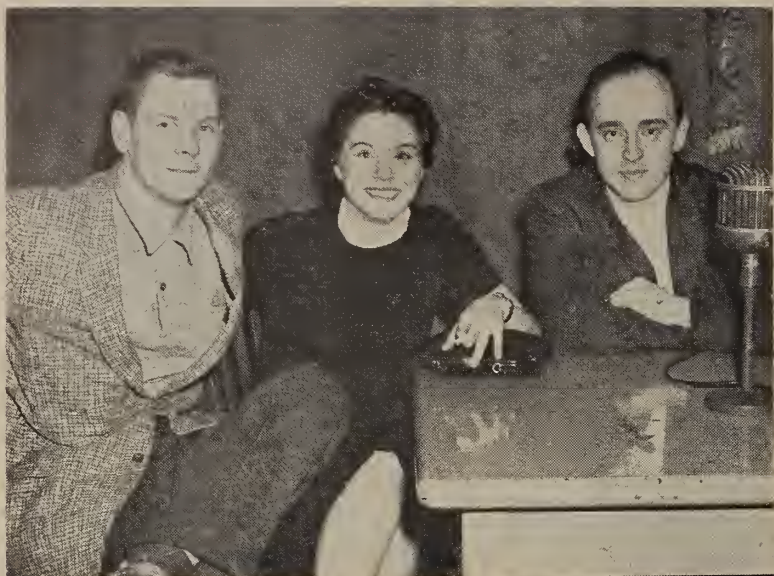

Jockeys can add class to their programming and still keep in the mood of the times. 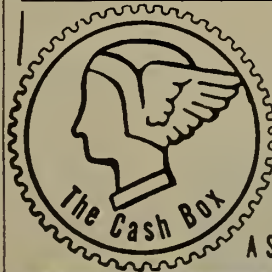

LONZO & OSCAR

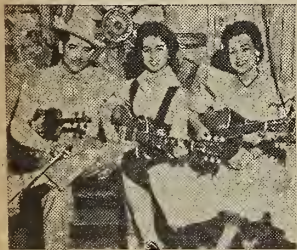

B+ "I NEED IT" (2:19) [Slim Willet BMI—B. Walker] Showcased by a terrific, pop-oriented vocal and instrumental backdrop, Gene Morris hands in a potent performance on a quick moving lover's lament. Strong pop-country chart contender.

B "THE RIGHT KIND OF LOVE" (2:11) [Slim Willet BMI—G. Morris, S. Willet] Lower lid is an emotion-packed rock-a-ballad that Morris, along with the ork and chorus, puts across with telling effect.

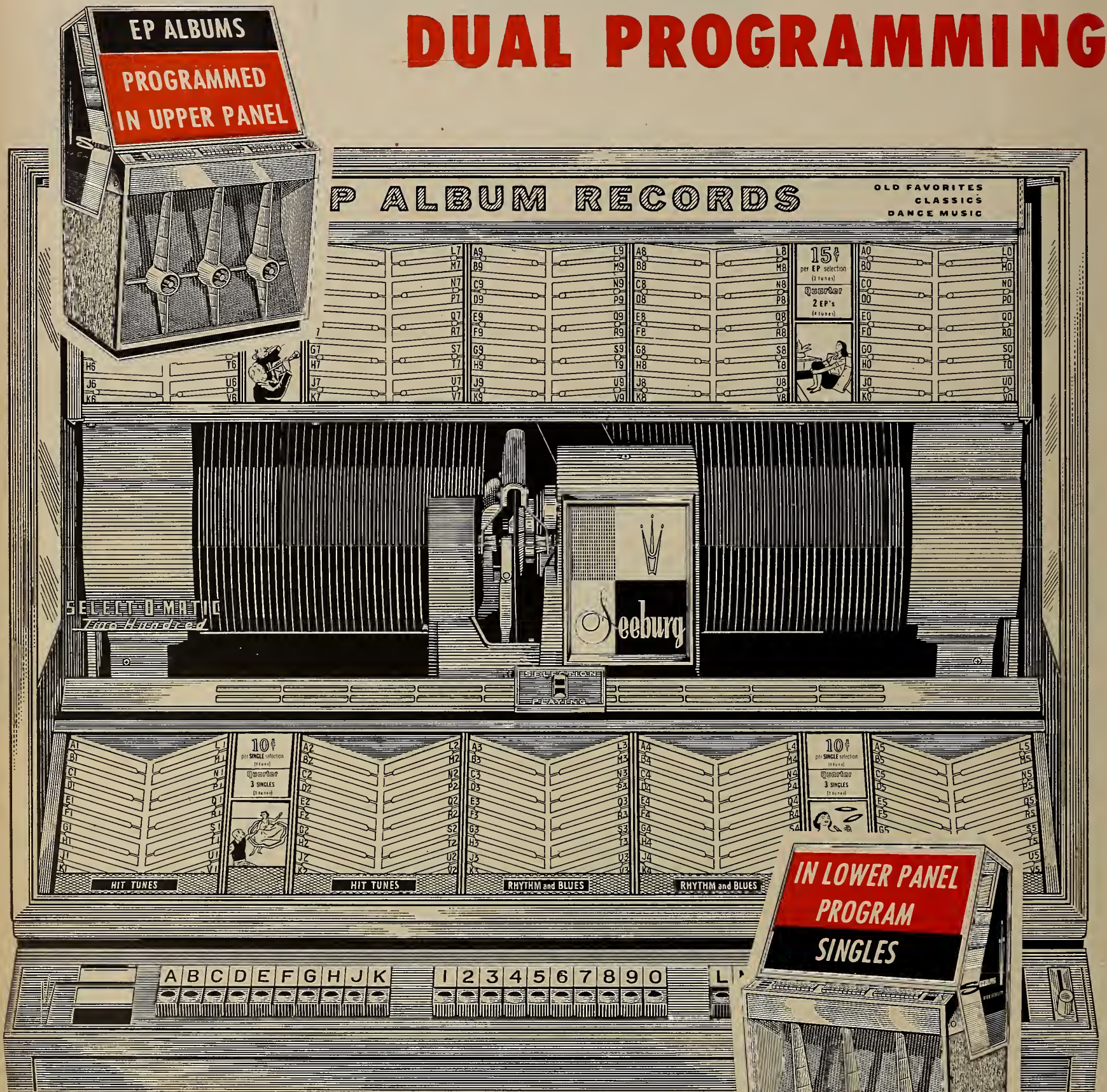

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Nation's Economists Foresee Biggest Inflation Jump as Government Adds Billions of Dollars Onto Present \$275 Billions Deficit in Effort to Aid Business and Boost Employment.

NEW YORK—Everyone connected with the coin machine business knows that our manufacturers continually keep producing new and improved machines, and are continually on the search for new ideas to incorporate into their future equipment. For these firms to stand still would result in their demise in a very short time. Other industries are faced with the same challenge. Charles M. Sievert, financial columnist for the Scripps-Howard newspaper syndicate, wrote: "From the annual reports flowing in from assorted industries, you can note almost at a glance that corporate eyes are definitely sighted on newness—in products, plant and equipment and methods. This kind of thinking offers assurance that our economy will have a healthy glow in the future. There's no room for sentiment in business these days, and even products which Grandma praised and Ma said she couldn't get along without are on a detour to a dead end." Our coin machine factories are keeping pace with the times—but what about the operator? Is he still running a route of older type machines—or is he keeping his route abreast with the new equipment which the public demands? And more important, is he still conducting his business with the methods used in Grandma's day? The warning in Sievert's column, that products and business methods of other years are outmoded, and those still using them are "on a detour to a dead end," seems to us to be directed at many of our operators. Operators would be well advised to review their business methods, and bring them up to date—particularly, "10¢ Play Plus A More Equitable Share Of The Gross Intake."

NEW YORK — Every little bit of encouraging business news is welcome—so we pass along a report by one of the nation's basic industries, machine tools. The monthly report of the National Machine Tool Builders Association last week stated the machine tool market is definitely firmer, and requests for quotations from customers are increasing. New orders in February for the second consecutive month, recorded a gain of about 5 per cent over January.

Regardless of whether Uncle Sam will, or won't, stimulate business to greater employment by pouring more billions of dollars into the economy, isn't the point of this editorial.

Nor is it the purpose of this editorial, or this publication, to offer any arguments, pro or con, as to whether the pouring of billions into the economy, or cutting taxes, is the right or the wrong method to stimulate business and, thereby, increase employment.

What this editorial and this publication is concerned with is the fact that, by pouring billions of more dollars into the present deficit economy, the nation's leading economists agree that this will most definitely zoom inflation to a new high mark.

This high mark is of interest to every single operator in the nation. This is serious to the operator's business welfare. It can mean the difference between profit and loss to him unless he quickly prepares to meet this inflationary jump.

In short, with billions of more dollars being poured into the nation's economy, in addition to the over \$275 billions deficit, how high a mark will inflation reach before the operator can grab some sort of control to assure himself and his business a profitable future?

Such a tremendous inflationary jump, like the nation's economists predict, can lower the nickel's purchasing power value from its present 2¢ down to 1½¢. (This will, similarly, lower the purchasing power value of the dime from its present 4¢ to 3¢.

This is serious. Very serious. Vitaly important to the future welfare of the nation's operators. Especially those operators who are continuing on nickel (2¢) play action at this time and are NOT obtaining a more equitable share of the gross intake from their machines. How much longer can such operators last with a 1½¢ nickel?

Even those operators who are now on dime (4¢) play action, and are still only working on

a 50%-50% commission basis, how much longer will they be able to continue in business with a 3¢ dime?

For many months now "The Cash Box" has advocated that operators must quickly adopt "10¢ Play Plus" to assure themselves remaining in business, regardless of what inflationary changes will occur in the nation's economy.

Operators simply must, to assure themselves continuing in business on a basis where they will receive some sort of decent return on their investment change to: "10¢ Play Plus A More Equitable Share Of The Gross Income From All Of Their Machines".

Whether it is more logical and more equitable for the operator to obtain front money minimum guarantee of \$5, \$10, \$15 or \$20 per week per machine, or whether it is more plausible and more equitable for him to feature 10¢ play plus 65%-35%, 70%-30% or 75%-25% commission basis, is up to him because he best understands his locations and the peculiarities as well as the economics of his area.

There is no longer any doubt that, as the Government plunges more billions of dollars into the nation's economy, in an effort to pump up business and create greater employment, this will mean a terrific upward curving zoom for inflation.

Such an inflationary jump can, very quickly and very easily, lower the value of the present 2¢ nickel to 1½¢ and the value of the present 4¢ dime to 3¢.

That's what the nation's operators, like all the nation's businessmen, will have to guard against. So that they won't be caught short and find themselves working at a loss instead of at a profit.

The one and only answer is what *The Cash Box* has been advocating these many past months for all the nation's operators:—"10¢ Play Plus A More Equitable Share Of The Gross Intake From All Machines".

COINBIZ IN STRONG UPSWING AS SECOND QUARTER OPENS

Advent of Spring Starts Off Domestic Business on Definite Upward Grade. Exports Become More Active. Amuse Mfrs Show New Games and Report Bigger Initial Orders. Music Mfrs and Distributors Advise Good Biz Upswing. Claim Better Trade-in Deals Have Loosened Music Market

CHICAGO—"There is a very definite business upswing under way in our industry as this second quarter gets going," reported one well-known manufacturer here.

He based his statement on the fact that initial orders for his new amusement games were much greater than at any time in the first quarter of the year.

"Furthermore," he stated, "with the warmer weather, it seems to me, the trade is again awakening to the many opportunities facing it and the operators thru their distributors are ordering in larger quantity."

He also points to the fact that even his export business has become more active.

"Our foreign distributors are cabling us to get more machines out to them faster than ever before," he says.

"We find that this lift in business, in addition to the general upswing in domestic business, means a very fine season ahead."

Music equipment manufacturers also report a definite uplift in orders as this second quarter gets under way.

They attribute much of this to the fact that the weather has calmed, that the operators have regained their optimistic viewpoint and are, because of this, buying new equipment to replace phonos in many of their spots.

"The fact remains," one well-known music machine manufacturer says, "that we also expect business to remain better all during the second quarter of the year."

"This is when orders taken by our distributors, after our showing during the first quarter, become most apparent."

Music distributors attribute the fact that business has started off on an upward swing to the fact that better trade-in deals are being offered to the operators.

This, combined with the fact that most replacements are made during the Spring season of the year, was bound to result in better sales.

This loosening of the market, these distributors state, is also attributable to the fact that the outstanding locations are requesting replacement of old machines.

The most important factor in the sudden business betterment, with the opening of this second quarter, is that operators have increased their orders for both the amusements and music.

In each case, factories have had to step up their production schedules, because this increased domestic business plus larger export orders, has brought about a generally better business atmosphere.

It is also noticeable that the operators are finding some of the lower-priced amusements more appealing. These are also reported to be outstanding profit producers. What's more, they seem to meet the players' demands.

"If business continues at the same pace for the balance of this quarter, as it has for the beginning," one well-known manufacturer reports, "we are going to find ourselves enjoying one of the most lucrative business quarters in our history."

"In fact," he added, "if the economists are right, and there is a general business uplift in the third and final quarters of this year, with business in our industry continuing at this second quarter rate, we may even be able to see another boom getting under way in this field."

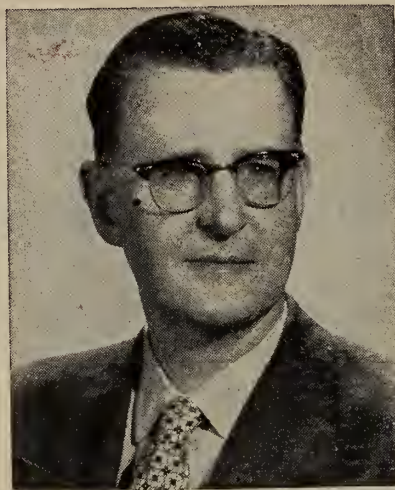
Westchester Ops Guild 7th Annual Banquet

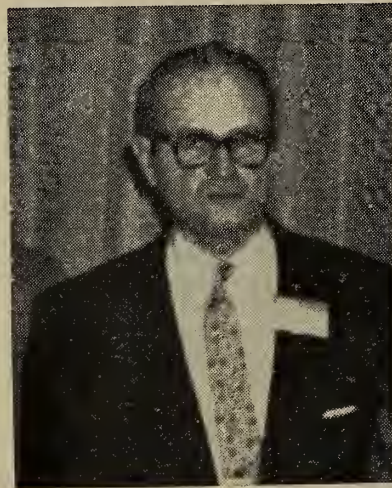

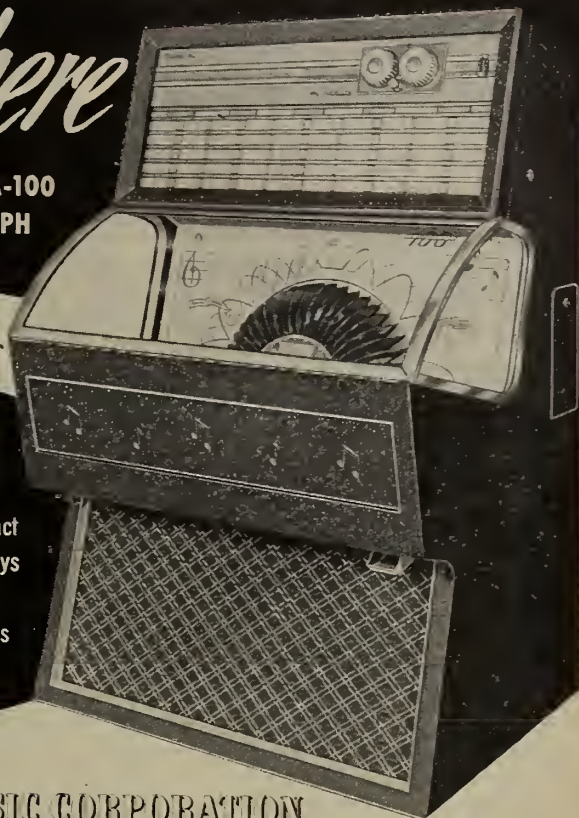

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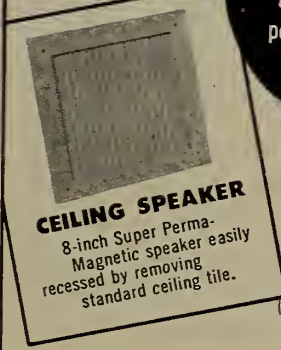

Ben Sterling, Jr. Observes:

The End Of The World Isn't Coming

MOOSIC, PA.—Ben Sterling, Jr., Sterling Service, this city, one of the industry's leading personalities, not only is a good operator, a philanthropist, and a human being, but he is also an optimist.

"So far," states Sterling, "our country has survived everything—wars, floods, typhs, Asiatic flu, little depressions, big depressions, recessions and what-have-you. It just seems we go from one extreme to the other.

"When 'Sputnik' went up, I think we were alarmed to the point of panic. Yet I didn't see what terrible difference it made. Russia compares very much to an operator we have here. We'll call him 'Mr. X.' We can't work with him—he operates contrary to every law we have found for good business and success. He disregards everything of human value and of human interest. As far as we know, we have never seen him do a good or kind deed for anybody. His word isn't worth a nickel and yet, in spite of these things, he seems to thrive! Russia, too, has disregarded every law of God or man that was ever made and still they seem to reach ahead and accomplish the impossible. Whether they will be successful in conquering the whole world, nobody knows. One thing is certain—no

country can remain conquerors unless it wants to be.

"So far as the depression is concerned, in 1936, when things were the gloomiest and the bluest, we went to work and purchased a park nobody wanted. To us, it has been very successful. It has given us a living and I believe it is true with any amusement enterprise. The distributor or operator who will go out and solicit business and give the best deal he can, will still make a fair and honest profit for himself.

"The park owner who will keep the park clean and add a new feature every year; serve the people when they come; make them feel as though they are wanted and send them away with the feeling they are wanted, are going to call back and see you again. Ours is a country park where we have no transit trade. We believe 1958 is going to be a good year, and as soon as some of these manufacturers are out of useful inventories, they will have to start up the plants again to supply the demand (and I think it will be in the near future), a lot of people will be called back to work.

RESULTS OF 10c PLAY SURVEY

66.9% OF U.S. PHONOS NOW FEATURE 10¢ PLAY (12.5% INCREASE OVER 1956)

70.8% OF U.S. GAMES NOW FEATURE 10¢ PLAY (8.3% INCREASE OVER 1956)

CHICAGO — With this latest survey on 10¢ play, which was begun in January, 1958, completed to the extent that the greater majority have answered the survey forms that were sent to them, many surprising and stimulating factors have come to light.

In the first place, and as far as the automatic music division of the industry is concerned, a very healthy gain of 12.5% over last year is indicated in the number of U.S. phonos now featuring 10¢ play.

It can also be recorded, according to information received, that a good majority of the operators of the 66.9% of U.S. phonographs now featuring 10¢ play, are also obtaining a more equitable division of the gross intake.

In short, even if based on the figure of 550,000 phonographs now on U.S. locations (and not 575,000), this would mean that there has been an increase of about 68,750 phonographs changed over to 10¢ play this past year for a nationwide total of 367,450 automatic phonographs featuring dime play.

This 12.5% increase this past year (from the 1957 survey of The Cash Box to this present 1958 survey) is truly remarkable. It most definitely indicates that dime play is becoming more and more nationally accepted by the general public and, what is more, that the music operators are aware of this fact. They are changing over to 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play, at a faster rate than ever before in automatic music history.

This past year, due to inflation and, as many report, also due to the editorials which have appeared in The Cash Box, many realize that it was absolutely necessary to change over to 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play.

In fact, this publication has and still is urging all music operators to go one step further. Not only to change to 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play, but, even more important, to arrange for a more equitable division of the gross intake from all of their phonos, regardless of 10¢ play.

This publication has pointed out that the 1958 dime is worth but 4¢ in purchasing power, compared to the 1939 dime. What's more The Cash Box has also shown what tremendous increases in operational overhead-expense the music men are enduring.

More and more music operators are reported to have heeded these editorials in The Cash Box. The fact that there has been a 12.5% increase in 10¢ play phonos in the U.S. is every indication that this is the case.

With this gain of approximately 68,750 phonographs now featuring 10¢ play over last year, and with an estimated minimum of 367,450 phonographs nationwide now on dime play this, in itself, indicates that 10¢ play is growing faster every week.

Very few are of the belief that there will ever be a period when automatic music will be 100% on 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play. Whether this will, or will not, ever happen, there is every belief that the time is not far off when better than 90% of the nation's automatic music will be featuring 10¢ play.

There is every indication that The Cash Box' survey, which will again be conducted in early 1959, may reach to better than 90% of automatic phonos nationwide on 10¢ play.

GAMES: As far as amusement games are concerned, and just as was the case in last year's survey by The Cash Box, the amusements lead automatic phonos in 10¢ play.

Last year the survey indicated that 62.5% of the nation's amusements featured 10¢ play. There has been a gain of 8.3% this year to reach the point where about 70.8% of the nation's amusements now feature 10¢ play. Even this figure is expected soon to be surpassed.

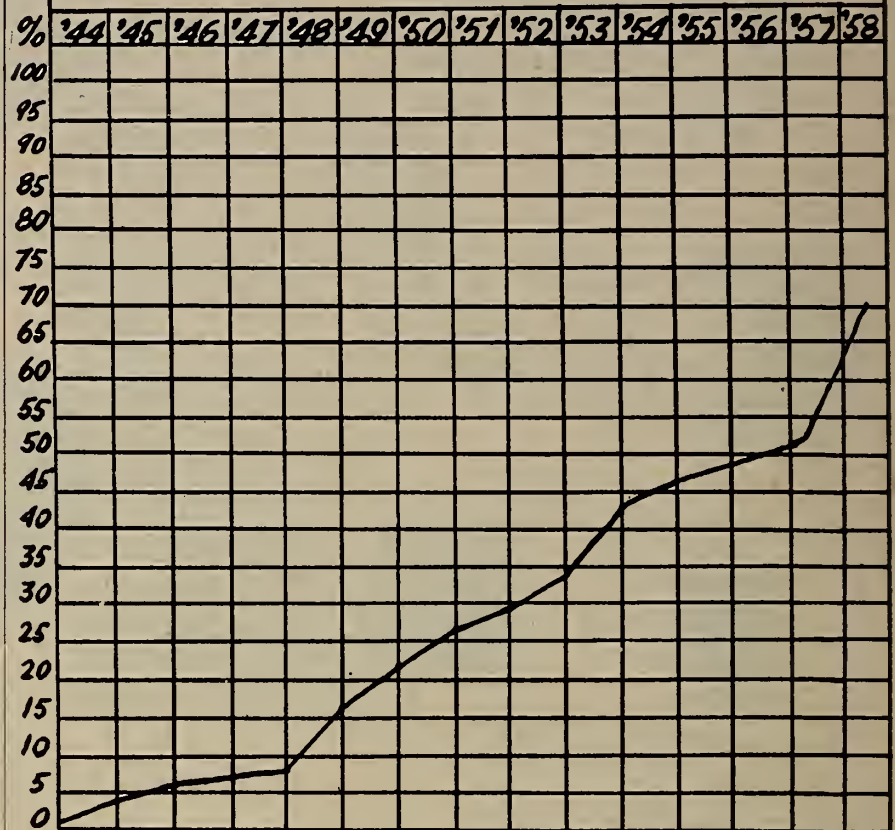
Many attribute the great growth of dime play in amusement games to the fact that the manufactories have made it their business to ship games with 10¢ play chutes. In short, the factories have adopted the dime chute as "standard".

When taking into consideration the fact that there are reputed to be more than twice the number of amusement games than automatic phonos on U.S. locations, the figure of 70.8% becomes extremely impressive from any angle.

What's more, as the factories continue to produce ever higher priced amusements, there is no doubt that 10¢ play will be the accepted standard and the growth of 15¢, 2 for 25¢ play will also come right along at a fast pace.

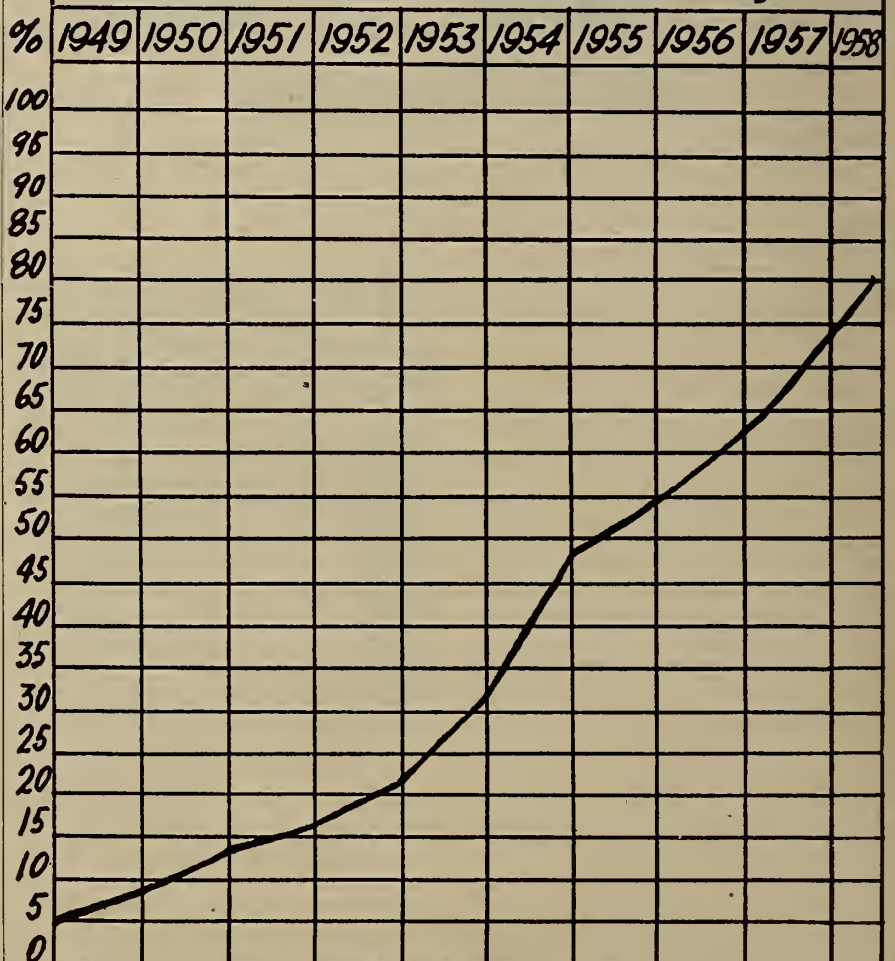

Growth of 10c Phono Play



The above chart indicates the growth of 10¢ play in the U.S. percentagewise, ever since a strong campaign for all music operators to adopt 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play, was originated by The Cash Box in 1944, and has been strongly campaigned for by this publication ever since. Today, approximately 66.9% of the automatic phonographs in the U.S. feature 10¢ play. This growth of 10¢ play has been gaining ever greater speed since 1950.

In the case of amusements, The Cash Box' chart is based on 1949. This is the year when the first shuffle alleys and kiddie rides were introduced. At that time, it is believed, only about 5% of the nation's amusements featured 10¢ play. Today, as the survey indicates, 70.8% of the amusement games in the U.S. feature 10¢ play. This growth is truly remarkable, especially when considering the fact that there are reputed to be more than twice the number of amusement games on U.S. locations than there are automatic phonographs.

10c PLAY GAINS IN CANADA

69.8% of Canada's Phonos and 48.3% of Canada's Games Now Feature 10c Play

Almost 80% of Quebec's Phonos on 10¢ Play. Ontario Close to 75%. British Columbia and Manitoba Surpass 80%. Nova Scotia 50%.

Quebec Leads With About 65% Games on 10¢ Play. Manitoba, Nova Scotia Near 50%. Ontario About 40%. British Columbia Low With 10%.

CHICAGO—For a long time now Canada's operators have followed along the lines suggested by the many editorials which have appeared in The Cash Box since 1944 to change over to 10¢ per play, 3 plays for 25¢, as far as music and amusements are concerned.

During the past five to six years, Canada's operators, with even greater effort than shown by the U.S. ops, began to change to 10¢ play and have continued to do so at a very outstanding pace.

In fact, many of Canada's best known music and amusements operators are of the opinion that they absolutely cannot operate profitably today for less than 10¢ per play.

Letters from Canadian subscribers to The Cash Box over the past years, many of which were published, indicated that these operators were more intense in their efforts to change to 10¢ play than were U.S. operators of music and amusements.

It is also heartening to note that Canadian music operators, especially in smaller towns and in isolated areas of this great Dominion, have switched more rapidly to 10¢ play than have their brother Canadian operators in the larger urban centers.

For example, such communities as Peterborough and Stratford in Ontario report 100% of the phonographs on locations feature 10¢ play.

Yet, so outstanding a city as Ottawa, reports but 60% of its phonos are on 10¢ play.

Montreal also reports that 60% of the phonos in this city to be on 10¢ play.

Vancouver, among the larger centers, is the only one to report that its phonos are 100% on dime play.

The very fact that 69.8% of all the automatic phonos in Canada are now featuring 10¢ play is of greater import than what is the case in the U.S. It definitely proves that Canada's operators are extremely progressive.

As yet the amusement games operators of Canada lag behind those of the U.S. This is attributed to the

fact that the newer type games aren't as yet as prominent in Canada as they are in the U.S.

At the present time, the survey just completed indicates that approximately 48.3% of Canada's games feature 10¢ play action.

From all reports received it seems that more and more games are starting to feature 10¢ play in the Dominion and that, eventually, the games percentage figure should equal and may even surpass that of the automatic phonos.

In both the case of automatic music as well as amusements, Canada's operators are reported to be driving progressively ahead to institute not only 10¢ play but, what is even more important, a more equitable division of the gross receipts.

There are, as yet, many older type automatic music machines and amusements in Canada than there are in many areas thruout the U.S.

Yet Canadian operators report that they have been able to obtain better operating percentage arrangements than have their U.S. brother ops.

In the matter of 10¢ games action, the large urban centers thruout Canada, seem to be able to do better than the smaller communities.

For example, Ottawa operators report that 90% of the games in this city feature dime play.

Montreal ops advise that about 80% of the games in their city feature 10¢ play.

Leadership in 10¢ play action, as far as amusement games are concerned, goes to the Province of Quebec where approximately 65% of all games feature 10¢ play. Nearest to this are Manitoba and Nova Scotia with about 50% of their games on 10¢ play.

Amusement games operators have found that it is possible to introduce new machines with 10¢ play much easier than ever before.

Furthermore, it must also be taken into consideration, amusement games are introduced with much greater frequency than automatic phonos. Where only one new model phono will be introduced by a manufacturer during the period of a full year, better than 100 different types of amusement games will be presented during that same period.

This gives the amusement games operator the opportunity to present, during the year's period, a new game almost every other week whereby he can arrange for dime play. And this regardless of the fact that he has, or has not, changed his music equipment to 10¢ play in the every same location.

What is even more understandable, as far as amusements are concerned, the awards continue along whether the play is on 10¢ or 15¢ or 3 for 25¢ or 2 for 25¢. In short, four free plays at 10¢ or four free plays at 15¢, mean the same four replays to the player, regardless of whether he invests 10¢ per play or 15¢ per play.

With amusement game manufac-

turers continuing on the basis that all of their products feature the 10¢ chute and, in some cases of larger and more expensive products, feature 15¢, 2 for 25¢ play, the growth of dime play nationwide continues to increase at a faster rate.

Hawaii 80% Dime Play

80% of Both Phonos and Games in Hawaii Feature 10¢ Play. Believe This Will be Increased to 90% by End of '58.

HONOLULU, T.H. — Reports received by the survey conducted by The Cash Box indicated that the Territory of Hawaii's games and phonos are 80% on 10¢ play.

In fact, Wahiawa, Oahu, T.H., according to operator Charles W. Tashima, 90% of both phonos and games are now on 10¢ play. It is Charles Tashima's hope that, eventually, he will be able to report this as a 100% dime play area.

In the meantime, play action at 10¢, it is reported, has helped Hawaiian operators to enjoy much better returns and business has been on the upgrade ever since.

It will probably prove interesting to many to note how most of the states line up regarding 10¢ play.

GREAT BRITAIN GOSSIP

The first of the Bal-Ami 200s have been appearing on British locations. They are being built at the firm's Ilford, London factory, and it is reported will be in quantity production in about six weeks. Says the firm's C. H. Jones: "We are already certain from reports received that we are on a winner. . . . Three of the furthest-travelled operators attending the P.O.A.A.G.M. on Monday were from Scotland, and not a Scottish name among them. They were Mr. Praeris (of Greek extraction), David Coiai and Mario Loperini (both of Italian extraction). But judging by the business they are enjoying the Scots don't seem to mind. Maybe it's just the English who find business hard going North of the Border. . . . In addition to the Secretary, Mrs. L. Shaw, there were five ladies present this year—Mrs. A. B. Winbush, Mrs. M. E. Smith, Mrs. L. Piggott, Mrs. M. G. Coughtrey and Mrs. E. Clark. . . . Having secured music rights (including the taping of American hits) in France, the firm of Musicmatic has its tape juke-box now in full production in Paris. The main record companies in Britain are still opposed to allowing the taping of their records but the genial giant, Tommy de Wertheimer, who is in charge of the British end of the firm thinks he may have a major ace up his sleeve, and hopes to play it shortly. The revolutionary box was shown to operators in London recently. . . . When he applied at Torrington (Devon) Magistrates' Court for a music and singing license for a juke box operator W. J. Jury of Torrington, told the court: "I hate the darn things myself." But he stressed that the juke box would be a means of attracting trade. Jury asked for the license on seven days a week from 8 A.M. to 10 P.M., but the Clerk (I. P. Llewellyn Jones) pointed out that the law did not permit the use of the juke-box, officially known as a coin-operated phonograph, on Sundays. Sergeant K. Alway, on behalf of the police, said there was no police objection to the application. The magistrates granted the application after Jury had given an assurance that he would be responsible for controlling the volume of the juke-box.

The date has already been fixed for next year's Amusement Trades Exhibition in London. It will be held a week later than this years, and will be on for three days, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, February 3-5. . . . Leeds (Yorkshire) Corporation Highways Committee has given notice to 21 shopkeepers to remove a total of 26 automatic machines which, it is contended, obstruct pavements outside the shops. The vending machines affected are bubble gum, chewing gum, cigarettes, and chocolate. . . . Frank Manzi has been appointed chairman of the Amusement Trades Association. He succeeds Mark Kraft, who has completed two years in office. The election was unanimous, as it was for Vice-Chairman Harry Oliver. William Green of British American Novelty Co. was re-elected President. John Holloway continues as honorary treasurer. The new committee is the same as last year except that Danny Robinson of Blackpool succeeds Stan Condor, who did not seek re-election.

Britain's Phono Ops Assn 2nd Annual Meet Draws Capacity Attendance

LONDON, ENGLAND—A capacity attendance at Britain's Phonograph Operators Association's second annual general meeting held at the Kingsley Hotel, this city, heard Chairman C. H. Jones report that the Association would take up, on a nation-wide basis, the vitally important matter of government and local council laws and by-laws affecting music operators. The organization's solicitors have begun work on the matter, and initial reports, in the form of leaflets, showing details in areas and towns, will be in the hands of members very soon.

Approximately 100 members of the Association had travelled from all over the British Isles for the meeting, and many of them had their say in a lively meeting, which lasted just over four hours.

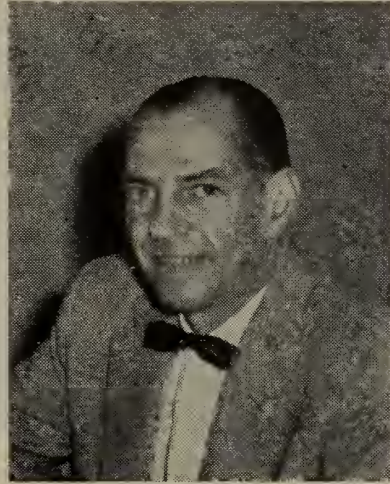
Other matters discussed included the possible moving of the date of the A. G. M. to coincide with the Amusement Trades Exhibition; the appointment of Area Secretaries throughout Britain; and the reported poaching of sites.

The meeting began with the election of four Council members in place of the four who have to retire in accordance with the Articles of the Association. 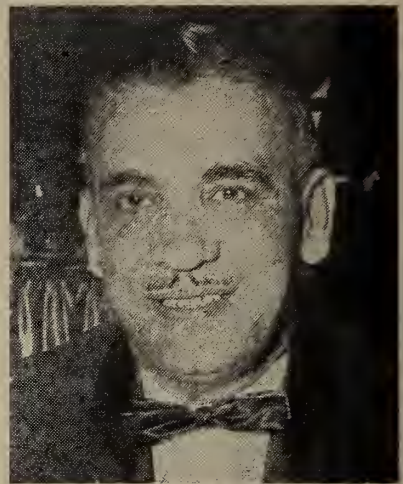
Coven edged Singer 2 of 3. Frank Sciakitano dropped 473 pins for Coven and H. Walczak scored 513.

"Operators Must Receive Larger Share Of Gross"

BOSTON, MASS.—David J. Baker, president of Melo-Vending Company, Inc., as well as president of the Music Operators Association of Massachusetts, reports on his operating situation, as well as making several important suggestions to operators throughout the nation.

"Collections on juke boxes in this area have been off approximately 25% since the first of the year," observes Baker, "and there are no indications that we can expect any improvement in the near future."

"In spite of shrinking revenue, cost of operation continues to rise. My considered opinion is that 1958 will prove to be a very trying year for the juke box operator in New England."

"This poses the question, what can be done to remedy the situation. Additional revenue must be found if we are to survive. The only way this can be accomplished is for the operator to receive a larger share of the gross, either through front money, minimum guarantee, or bigger percentages. The old concept of 50-50 must be discarded."

"In order to be able to bring this about it is necessary for every operator worth his salt to join his local organization. By attending the meetings, he will receive information as to conditions and trends and can compare notes with people who have the same problems as he."

"No longer can the operator go along with his head in the sand like an ostrich. His livelihood is being menaced from all sides. Increasing taxation will drain his income. Most important of all is the threat of ASCAP. Unless we all pull together, the operating business, as we know it, will soon be extinct."

"Everyone connected with the industry should make a supreme effort to attend the coming MOA Convention in May. If he does, he will learn first hand of the problems besetting his business, and what is being done to combat them. Nothing before or since has been of such primary importance to the juke box operator, and unless he can be made to realize the fact, we are all in trouble."

"I strongly urge any man who makes a living from this industry, no matter what you may do, be sure to attend the MOA Convention in May, and help us help you save your business."

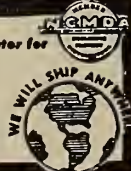

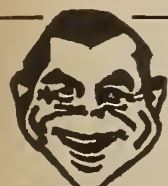

Some prices do not change for months. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

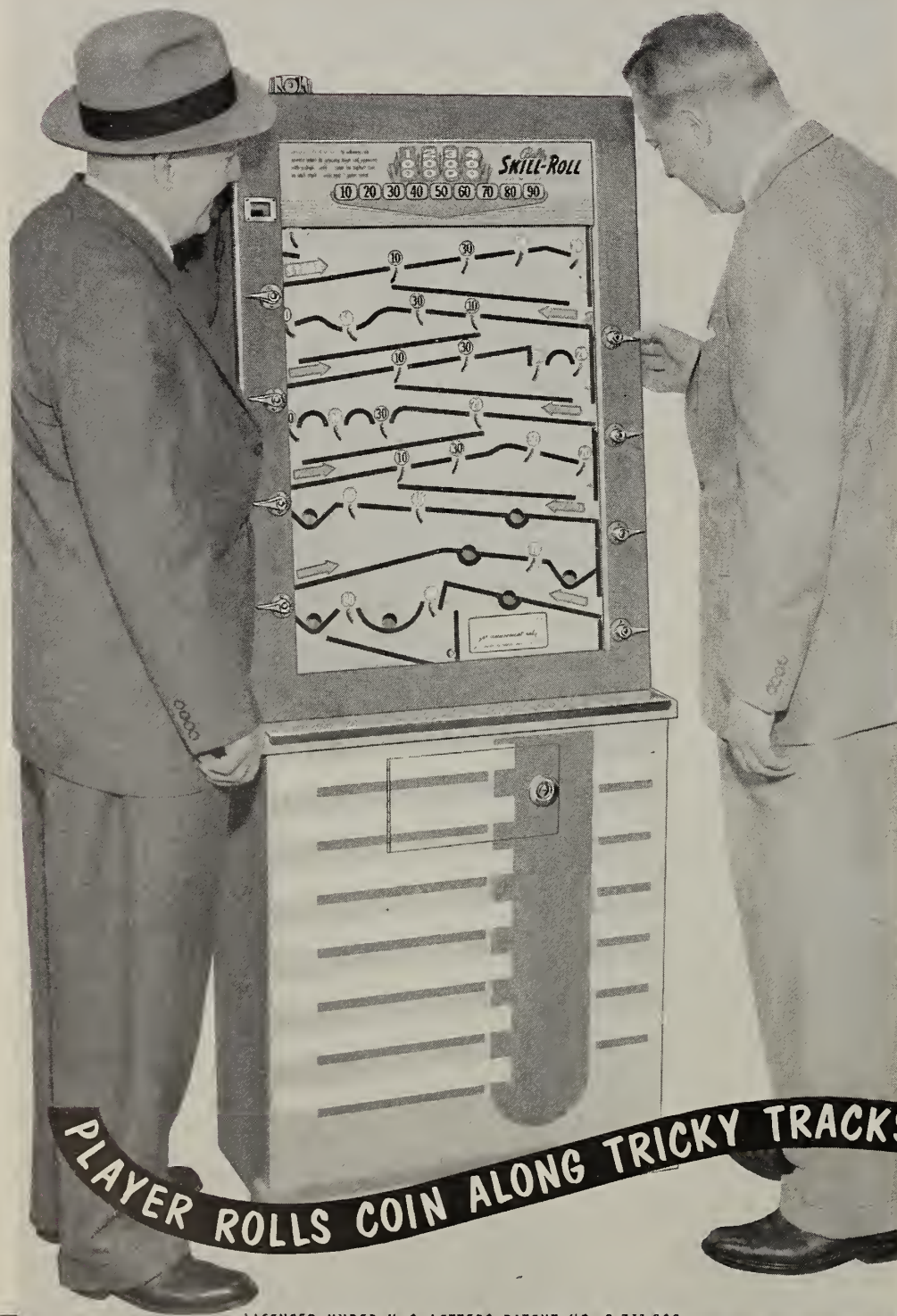
