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THE CASH BOX covers the entire coin machine industry all over the world. Operators, jobbers, distributors, manufacturers and suppliers of automatic music vending, service and amusement machines are covered.

THE CASH BOX coverage extends to finance firms, loan organizations, factors, banks, and other financial institutions, expressly interested in the financing of coin machines of all kinds.

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Despite all the dire predictions to the contrary, the record industry is enjoying what may well be the biggest boom in its history. Not only are albums selling, but the volume of single records is approaching the phenomena. So heavy is the pressure on pressing plants, that most manufacturers with hits are finding it difficult to get enough records.

It all started about a week or two before Christmas, just when retailers were despairing of doing any kind of Christmas business with the predictions of what would happen after Christmas ranging from bad to disastrous.

However no disaster has happened. Instead the increase in volume which was felt just before Christmas has increased steadily for the past several weeks until today it is virtually an avalanche.

What's even more impressive is that this prosperity is being distributed throughout the entire industry. Almost every company of any size has some strong record going, and many have several on the charts at the same time. In several cases, record firms have more hits going at once than they've ever had before. So wild has the situation become that there have been several instances in the last couple of weeks where firms have had to deliberately neglect a hit or an obvious potential hit, because other hits they had took all their facilities and available time.

Why this sudden burst of activity? It's hard to say. But what can be said is that obviously the record business does not necessarily follow the pattern of other businesses. Because things may be slow in general, it doesn't follow that the record business will be slow also.

We've all been aware for several years now that we are in an expanding situation as far as the record industry is concerned. New markets are opening up all the time. Improved methods of exploitation and consistently better products are attracting more and more people from the area of potential record buyer to actual record buyer. And as popular music and the entertainers it brings to the American public gain continuously greater acceptance, as our teenage population continues to increase, and as the record industry itself learns to accept its growing stature in the entertainment world, we can expect to see the sale of records not only increase, but perhaps reach heights which we don't even think of today.

Therefore it's incumbent upon everyone in this industry to think in completely positive terms. We cannot think as though we were in another business and we cannot let a temporary economic problem lead us to less than positive action. Despite what's happening in other businesses, the record industry is indisputably enjoying a boom. Our attitudes—our fears or our confidence—will play a large role in determining whether that boom will continue and grow even greater or whether it will fade away.





Record Reviews

MARTY WILSON & STRAT-O-LITES (Decca 30544)

B+ "I'M ALL WOKE UP" (2:21) group offers an instrumental reply to "Wake Up Little Susie". Built around some of the opening guitar work from the Everly Bros.' "Susie" smash, Wilson and his boys rock thru a hard-hitting dance item that moves. Watch this sleeper.

B "SUPER SONIC" (2:30) [Lark BMI—Mure] Another swinging instrumental rock and roller with an opening take off on the Sputnik beep. Side really cuts along at a swin₇-sational pace. The Strat-O-Lites as-sist vocally, singing without lyrics. Right in line with what the kids want.

BOB NEBLETT (Cornell 3002)

C+ "A LOVER ALWAYS RE-TURNS" (2:43) [Mills ASCAP —Morgan, Brandt] An inviting bal-lad is chanted smoothly by newcomer Bob Neblett. A chorus accompanies the vecalist the vocalist.

C "DU-BOD-LY-DU" (2:15) [F. W. Fisher ASCAP—Barovick, Good-man, Rose] A rockin' item about a new dance designed to follow in the footsteps of the "Bunny Hop" and the "Hokey Pokey".

WAYNE HANDY (Renown 104)

B+ "BETCHA' DIDN'T KNOW" (1:35) [Renown BMI — Handy] Wayne Handy, who attracted consid-erable attention with his original waxing of "Say Yeah", could make big noise with this thrilling rock and roller. Side has a good sound and beat that the kids'll go for. Watch this side—it could take off.

C+ "DON'T BE UNFAIR" (1:56) [Renown BMI—Handy] The ver-satile songster sings with heart on this end as he presents a sentimental ballad. Sincere delivery.

RONNY WADE (King 5099)

C+ "I'LL SAIL MY SHIP ALONE" (1:55) [Lois BMI—Burns, Mann, Thurston, Bernard] A good rock and roll ballad is chanted with emotion by Ronny Wade. Side has a solid dance tempo. Chorus assists.

C+ "ANNIE, DON'T WORK" (2:14) [Jay & Cee BMI—Glover, Mann] The artist breaks loose on this end and tears thru a high speed rocker.

FRANKIE LAINE (Columbia 41106)

B+ "ALL OF THESE—AND MORE" (2:46) [Sunbeam BMI—Harnick, Bock] Frankie Laine hands in an ex-citing interpretation of a well-written show tune from the B'way bound "The Body Beautiful". Exciting, gal-loping tempo item in the well known, dramatic style that has made Laine a favorite.

B "ANNABEL LEE" (3:00) [Melo-Art ASCAP — Corpora, Lerner] Another extremely emotional piece. This one opens with a lengthy, slow tempo segment and at mid-point be-comes a galloping beat song. Lyrics are from the famous poem of the same name. same name.

The original recording by the song's composer, Frank DeRosa, has been purchased by Dot. The MGM waxing stars Sam "The Man" Taylor. Irving Ashby is starred under the Imperial banner. And Owen Bradley's Quintet interprets the song for Decca. All four recordings feature fabulous sax work plus a big guitar sound. And all four are sure to share in the earnings. The teenagers, who seem to be going for the low-down instrumentals in a bigger way every day, will flip over this tune. Take your pick.

Taylor's coupling is an up-to-date R & R treatment of the smash Charlie Barnett oldie "Cherokee". Bradley's flip "Sentimental Dream" is a melodic rocker. Ashby's companion deck, "Motatin'" is another low-down blues rocker.

"SMOOCHIN'" (2:28) [Hill & Range BMI-Deane, Allen, Granahan] "OOOH WHAT A DOLL" (2:20) [Studio BMI-Mascari, Wenzlaff] MARGIE RAYBURN (Liberty 55120)

• Margie Rayburn, whose long running hit "I'm Available" is still on the charts, has a fabulous new follow-up disk that should have no trouble topping the success attained by her break-thru hit. The song is a sensational rock and roll novelty dubbed "Smoochin'." And the canary handles the song in top ten fashion. Accompanied by a tremen-dous instrumental backdrop, Miss Rayburn works with multiple voices and comes up with a swinging side the kids'll be nuts about. The lyrics rank with some of the best written for teenage tunes. Watch this one take off. The coupling, "Oooh What A Doll" is a colorful bounce-beat ditty with a happy, light-hearted air. Fine companion piece. But the upper end is the one to watch.

THE TWIN-TONES (Jim & John) (RCA Victor 7148)

• The Twin-Tones, Jim and John Cunningham, are two young rock and roll performers destined for stardom. And their latest Victor single should be the one to bring them fame. The boys currently have one of the nation's best selling EP's, appropriately titled "The Twin-Tones", and the twin, blond, teenagers have been sensations in their public appearances. They are also the composers of one of the nation's best sellers, "Jo-Ann", a tune in their EP. One side of their new single, "My Dear", is an excellent R & R ballad right in line with what the kids want today. And the song was also penned by the boys. Terrific deck. The companion piece, "The Flip Skip" is another R & R item dealing with the rapidly gaining Stroll dance. More ultra-commercial material. Watch this disk.

THE CARDIGANS

(Mercury 71251) **B**+ "YOUR GRADUATION MEANS GOODBYE" (2:15) [Shannon BMI—Alday, Shoemate] Tailor-made for the teenage market and the cur-rent mid-year graduation season is this teardrop R & R ballad chanted with feeling by the Cardigans. Strong new group with excellent debut mate-rial. Watch this one.

C+ "BO-WEEVIL ON THE MOUN-TAIN TOP" (2:18) [Shannon BMI—Schreiner, Farrell] An up-beat rocker with a spiritual flavoring. Good finger-snapper.

DORIS DAY (Columbia 41103)

B+ "TEACHER'S PET" (2:36) [Jay-of an up-coming Paramount flick is happily shuffled thru by Doris Day and a chorus. Side has a contagious melody and a cute teenage lyric. The youngsters should go for this one.

B "BLUES IN THE NIGHT" (3:45) [Remick ASCAP—Mercer, Arlen] The film star does a wonderful job with this great oldie. Slow, moving bluesy reading that dee jays will be spinning often. Great stuff for late hour programming.

VERA LYNN (London 1773)

(London 1773) **B**+ "ACROSS THE BRIDGE" (2:20) [Piccadilly BMI—Bernard, John, Phillips] Ace British vocalist Vera Lynn hands in a stirring interpreta-tion of a dramatic love song with an unusual accompaniment that could make it catch on. Exciting song chanted with great emotion against a fascinating backdrop. This is one of Miss Lynn's most interesting press-ings in quite some time. Deserves attention.

B "IF I WERE YOU" (2:15) [Har-per, Martyn] The lark sings an excellent new ballad in fine style. Class love song with a lilting instru-mental accompaniment.

MARTY GOLD ORCH. (Vik 0315) **B**+ WELL TO ARMS'" (2:27) [Leo Feist ASCAP—Webster, Nascimbene] Marty Gold's orchestra drifts thru a beautiful arrangement of the love theme from the much heralded Selz-mick pic. Superb mood item with strings and voices blending to per-fection. Side could really take off when pic hits the local theatres. "SHOW ME" (2:22) [Southern


B "SHOW ME" (2:22) [Southern ASCAP—Stahl, Skylar] Another lovely romantic piece. First half is a beautiful choral-ork effort. And at mid point the chorus comes front and center singing the lyrics. Fine com-panion deck.

BING CROSBY (Columbia 41104)

(Columbia 41104) **B** "STRAIGHT DOWN THE MID-DLE" (2:59) [E. H. Morris AS-CAP—Cahn, Van Heusen] Two songs which Bing offered on his recent golf TV appearance, are issued on wax by Columbia. This half is a cute rhythm item about a golfer describ-ing his tee-off. Buddy Cole's ork sup-plies the accompaniment.

C+ "TOMORROW'S MY LUCKY Heusen ASCAP—Van Heusen, Burke] Another amusing ditty about a golf-er's woes. Lilting novelty that should get a chuckle out of the millions of golf fans.

It's the title song from the Paramount flick "Desire Under The Elms." Composed by Bernstein, the wistful theme is an enchanting piece of of mood music that becomes more beautiful with each new listen. The Bernstein orchestra treats the fragile, sentimental melody with warmth and finesse. Could be one of the nation's next big film items. The companion piece, "The Flaming Rose" is in the idiom of the film from which it stems, "Spanish Affair." A string filled latin tempo romancer neatly executed. Top deck is probably the pretiest new instrumental to cross this desk in many, many months.

The class ballad has a wonderful lyric that tells a touching romantic story. Top grade merchandise that should attract tremendous air play sure to result in heavy sales. With "Passing Strangers" and "If I Can Help Somebody" proving that Eckstine is still a favorite, his "Gigi" waxing could be his biggest in years. The big side is "The Prince Of Players"—a dramatic rock and roll ballad with an inspirational theme. Frederick has a thrilling lead voice that stands out brautifully. The Carlton diskery is on the right track with an initial platter tailor-made for today's market. The lower lid, "I'm Not Pretending," is another R & R ballad with a romantic storvline. storyline.

C+ "THE PATTY CAKE" (2:14) [Andrea Music-Gibson, Townsend, Kovacs] Another good rocker with a big dance beat. Miss Bradley has a pleasing voice that's tailor-made for this type of rock and roll fare.

IRVING FIELDS TRIO (Mark 112)

B "SYNCOPATED SADIE" (2:20) [Crest ASCAP-Fields] Versatile keyboard star Irving Fields is in top grade honky-tonk form as he bounces thru a wonderful novelty. At mid-point a chorus joins in with a lyricless vocal mentioning only the title from time to time. Refreshing change of page poyelty pace novelty.

B "RAGTIME ROCK" (2:04) [Crest ASCAP-Fields, Saffer] This end has a joyous polka flavor. High-stepping hoopla novelty full of spirit. Should do well in tavern jukes.

WALTER SOLEK ORCH. (Dana 2124)

B "JULIE ANNA—Polka" (2:05 [Dana BMI-Solek] Walter Solek and his men dance happily thru a joy-ous polka novelty with a humorous English vocal about a plump but attractive miss. Donald Duck type vocal toward the end adds further color. Solid polka merchandise.

C+ "HAPPY DAY" (2:10) [Dana BMI-Solek] Another English vocal is spotlighted on this equally happy, carefree polka ditty.

THE LENNON SISTERS · (Brunswick 55051)

B "HIDE YOUR TROUBLES BE-HIND A SMILE" (1:45) [Rem-ick ASCAP-Huddleston] The Lennon Sisters bounce thru a cute tune with some smart advice. Happy ditty smoothly styled by the gals' inviting bland blend.

C+ "TO KNOW YOU IS TO LOVE YOU" (2.23) [Northern ASCAP-Carey, Mancini] A tune from the up-coming U-I flick "Summer Love," is handled in inviting shuffle R & R style.

DENNIS HERROLD (Imperial 5482)

B "HIP HIP BABY" (2:01) [Com-modore BMI-Dickerson] Dennis Herrold, one of the latest additions to the rock-a-billy roster, makes a strong first showing as he tears thru a swinging teen tune. Side has a potent beat and Dennis can belt.

Jeffrey Kruger, who, in addition to being an agent, also has the Florida Music Company, would appreciate hearing from any publishers with material not placed in this country. Kruger guarantees a 100 per cent exploitation.

HOLLAND: The Phillips Company is about to launch a new record vendor. This new automatic machine will carry a selection of ten of the top pops at 45 rpm and will be hung outside record dealers stores so that

customers can buy records after closing time from the machine. This looks like a most interesting addition to the record business and can only help to increase the sale of disks in years to come. No further details have been announced. As soon as more details are released I will report more fully on this new automatic machine.





A full-color sleeve for the record carries photographs of Audie Murphy, Michael Redgrave, Claude Dauphin and Giorgia Moll, who are starred in "The Quiet American."

Warren Miller, a 20-year-old vocalist and composer, makes his bow for UA with "Everybody's Got a Baby But Me," his own song in the rock-abilly manner, and "Say You'll Be True," a teen-age sentimental ballad by Stuart Rodkin. The new record is packaged in a colored sleeve with a full picture of the handsome singer.

UA's third disk for 1958 will introduce Al Taylor and The Poodles, a newly-organized vocal-instrumental group, in two rock and roll songs, "The Swivel" and "The Ripple." Armando Greco and Mike Davis penned the first number and Greco and Randy Stevens wrote the flip side tune.

United Artists Records was launched as a subsidiary of United Artists Corp. at the end of last year.

"I didn't even know what he looked like, but I knew I wanted this record for my first release." Carlton said. "We had a carefully-planned operations time-table set to introduce the firm and a series of planned records already cut. But these will all have to wait now." Carlton is backing his speculation with a reported initial pressing of 100,000 records. Promotional records have already been sent to disk jockeys, and mail-ing pieces and trade ads are being rushed. Other artists to be offered by the company are Kenny Rogers and Tex Curtis, Johnny Brantley and his All-Stars on a tune called "The Place," and a disk by newcomer Johnny Foster. 1. Country material is to be han-

dled by Brad McCuen in New York and Chet Atkins in Nashville.

3. Sacred music will be recorded by Brad McCuen in New York, Chet Atkins in Nashville and Paul Michelson in Hollywood.

4. Children's records are to be done in New York by Brad McCuen.

Sounds fine-but what happens if a certain competitor with another version of the same tune sets up camp outside the Epic offices with his trusty b.b. gun.

Addition To Gibson **Girl Splicer Line**



Know as the Gibson Girl "Hobbyist" H-4, the unit consists of a tape alignment guide and a special curved blade, similar in appearance to a single edge razor blade. The tapeguide has self-stick adhesive on it for mounting directly on or near a tape recorder. (See cut above.)

Directions for use of this unit are extremely simple: Tape to be spliced is placed in the tape guide in overlapping position. The blade is pressed down to cut a diagonal butt in the tapes-splicing tape is applied and the curved blade is again pressed down to cut and trim the splicing tape and the edges of the recording tape in the professionally approved indented

manner. The "hobbyist" is manufactured and distributed by Robbins Industries Corp., Bayside 61, N. Y. It retails for \$1.75 list including a spare cut-for ter.



Howard said, "ours is the only record store that carries a complete line of orthodox as well as unorthodox records."



Tribute To Berlin

NEW YORK—Guy Lombardo today announced he will record an album of forty Irving Berlin compositions on the Capitol label for release later this year, Berlin's 50th anniversary year as a professional song writer. "The most difficult part of this project is to eliminate some of the great songs Berlin has written in order to narrow it down to the forty we'll record," Lombardo said. ""White Christmas, 'Easter Pa-rade,' (God Bless America,' and 'Al-ways' will definitely be included in the album because it would be impossible

album because it would be impossible to leave them out and still call it an Irving Berlin album. However, Ber-lin has written at least 70 songs which I consider to be popular American classics, which makes it a difficult task to pick out only forty," Lombardo stated.

Lombardo said that although his forthcoming album is in the nature of a "tribute" to Berlin, "actually Berlin needs no tributes from myself or anyone else in the music business. His great music speaks for itself and will outlive us all. I consider it a privilege to have been able to play his music over the years."

"I wish there were some way I could induce Irving Berlin to write more frequently. Irving allows too much time to elapse these days between his songwriting efforts. There is a crying need today for more and more Irving Berlin music-music that is melodic, meaningful, and beautiful."

Fidelio On Gold Label

NEW YORK-Decca's Gold Label January release is devoted entirely to Beethoven's only opera, "Fidelio." The recording features such vocal stars as sopranos Leonie Rysanek and Irma-gard Seefried, tenor Ernst Haefliger and baritone Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau. 





Jubilee TV Show Enters 4th Year

SPRINGFIELD, MO. — Hand in hand with the mounting influence of Country music on the entire nation's musical taste, ABC-TV's weekly "Country Music Jubilee" has risen to a position of great prominence in the field. This Saturday, January 25th, the hour-long show enters its fourth year on the network.

Some observers say that the Jubilee's success is keyed to its formula of "nothing frantic, phony or too frilly." But all are in agreement that much credit is due the show's durable star, Red Foley. The veteran performer began as a professional entertainer nearly 30 years ago, won stardom a few years later on Chi-cago's famed "National Barn Dance," progressed on to headline Nashville's "Grand Ole Opry" for seven years, and then entered television on Jan. 22, 1955 under the guidance of Country Music pioneer Ralph Foster, president of Crossroads TV Productions, the firm which produces the Jubilee. Both Foley and Foster cite with pride the fact that the same basic staff has stayed with the show since its beginning. John Mahaffey and "Si" Siman have served as executive producers from the start, with Les Kennon and Bryan Bisney still at their original posts as network liason and producer-director, respectively. Additionally, the assistant producer-floor director, writer and other principal behind-the-cameras personnel have remained constant.

"When the little red lights on our cameras flashed on for the first time 3 years ago," says Foster, "we weren't kidding anybody that we knew what television was all about. But what we did know from long experience was Country music; all of our people were veterans in producing this kind of entertainment for radio." Prior to their entry into TV, the Foster-Kennon-Mahaffey-Siman team had produced more than 2,600 individual episodes of Country music shows, both network and transcribed, starring Tennessee Ernie Ford, Smiley Burnette, George Morgan and others. In fact, this phase of their operation still flourishes under the name of RadiOzark Enterprises. More than 220,000 persons have attended the Jubilee in person at an admission of \$1 each. As many as 40 different states are likely to be represented in any Saturday night's audience. Most recent statistics indicate that 97% of the show-goers are from outside Springfield, while 86% are from outside the State of Missouri. Because of the Jubilee, Saturday night is traditionally "boom night" for the area's 60 motels, 27 hotels

and numerous restaurants. It is often necessary to order Jubilee tickets up to 7 weeks in advance.

A trade mark of the homespun show is the "song of inspiration" Foley presents to close each week's program.

Audience signs were first seen on the Jubilee. The show has always made a practice of panning its cameras across the auditorium at several points in each Saturday night's program, and a Jubilee staffer admits to having started the fad by distributing small, political-convention type "state" signs to the audience one night early in the show's history. The idea caught on and before long scores of hometown signs were to be seen every week. As might be expected, the biggest sign to date was a handsomely lettered "TEXAS!" measuring nearly 40 feet across and spanning a lively party of visitors from Dallas. Among the "personalized" messages which have found their way into the camera's view from time to time were "Be home Monday. Love, Iıma," "Wonderful vacation," and the ever-present "Hi Mom!" Perhaps the most unusual sign was that of a resourceful couple from Ohio this past summer, who brought a banner reading "Joe's Texaco Service Station," and included both the street address and an insignia of the gasoline firm.

During the three years the Jubilee has been a coast-to-coast television feature, its regular performers have played personal appearances in nearly every state of the 48, most provinces of Canada and in Alaska. The kind of places at which they appear in a week's touring range from a oneroom school house to a 10,000-seat auditorium or state fair grandstand. Headliners from the show have been featured during the past year at both Madison Square Garden and the Canadian National Exposition.

In addition to the nighttime Jubilee, the same cast is involved in the production of NBC Radio's Saturday noon-hour "Red Foley Show," packaged for the Dow Chemical Co. by RadiOzark. The radio program is now in its second season.

A booking office, Top Talent, is maintained to set the personal appearance dates of Springfield-based talent, and another Jubilee adjunct, Earl Barton Music, is an active BMI affiliate.

Crossroads TV recently made its entry into film work, shooting quarterhour "dealer movies" for Dow and the Ford Motor Co.

The Jubilee's first half-hour (7:30-8 EST) is sold locally by ABC affiliates on a co-op arrangement, and the latter segment is sponsored alternately by Anacin, through the Ted Bates agency, New York and by Dickies work and casual clothes, via Evans and Associates, Dallas.

Guests for the Jan. 25 Jubilee will include Victor recording artists Johnny and Jack and Decca's Kitty Wells.





BOSTON, MASS.—Forecasting 1958 business by economists and business leaders is standard practice at this time of the year. A number of individual predictions, as well as poll results have been reported here in past issues. We would like to quote another, and being a habitual optimist, hope this fellow is right. Dr. Gordon W. McKinley, director of economic and investment research for the Prudential Insurance Co. of America, says the nation's economy will be moving upward in March. Speaking before the 19th New England Sales Management Conference, McKinley said his analyses indicated total spending in 1958 will increase 13 billion dollars above the 1957 figure, with the advance being accomplished in the last three quarters of the year. He said he wasn't predicting a boom year, but added, "those economists who have predicted a decline in total spending for the full year 1958 compared to the full year 1957 are going to turn out very wrong." Concluding, he stated, "If there are some who choose to call 1958 a recession year, I would say it will be the most prosperous recession this country has ever experienced."

NEW YORK - While some areas thruout the country have been affected with unemployment, labor experts are eyeing the future with great optimism. Alice K. Leopold, assistant to the Secretary of Labor, told a convention group representing the National Retail Dry Goods Assn. that a labor force of 79.2 million will be active by 1965-representing a gain of 10.3 million from the current level. Every phase of labor, she stated, with the exception of farm and unskilled workers, will show increases. Highly trained workers, professional workers, technical workers, skilled craftsmen and semi-skilled workers will show the greatest gains.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Census Bureau released some interesting information this past week. There were 3 million more people in the United States with the advent of 1958 than there were at the opening of 1957. The total population, at this time, according to the Bureau, is 172,800,000.

INTERNATIONAL YEARS

From all indications internationalization of this industry is well under way.

Many agree with this publication that the next ten to fifteen years will find this a most completely internationalized industry.

By that, these leaders mean, operations as well as sales and manufacture will be truly international in scope.

In that period, speedy commercial jet planes are expected to fly from Chicago to New York in one hour, and on from New York to London or Paris in another few hours.

Foreseeing further along this line, and due to the fact that the helicopter is expected to become the fast freight work horse of that period, delivering from factory direct to the buyer's rooftop, delivery from a Hamburg or London factory to the roof of a Chicago distributor is not a far-fetched dream.

This jet plane speed, this elimination of time and distance, it is believed, will bring European and Far Eastern manufactures for sales in the U.S., just as U.S. manufacture will be more quickly sped on ahead for sales in Europe, North, Central and South America as well as the Near and Far East, and all areas in between.

Each month finds more visitors from all the world's markets in the U.S. These men also discuss the possibility of selling products manufactured in their countries to U.S. distributors and operators.

The coin machines field is no new industry to Europeans. Europe produced the first coin operated weighing scales, games and vending machines.

American manufacturing ingenuity took over and, by efficient mass production methods, as well as a wealth of raw materials and components along with outstanding designers and engineers, plus a love for novelty entertainment and speedy, automatic merchandising, assumed complete leadership of the coin operated machines industry.

With so many millions of dollars worth of coin operated products being imported by the world's markets from the U.S., plus the fact that manufacturers in Europe and the Far East are now well on the way to complete recovery, many can foresee games, music and vendors eventually appearing for sales in the U.S. market from foreign factories.

A few feeble attempts have been made in past years to introduce European products to U.S. ops. These were premature. Nor were they able to compete with the beautifully designed, more efficiently produced American machines.

Furthermore, leading European and Far Eastern manufacturers are, at this time, much too busy satisfying domestic demand. In a shorter time than many now believe possible these huge plants will be ready to manufacture additional products to retain their highly industrious and efficient staffs of employees and engineers.

It must also be remembered that there is a tremendous difference in work hours and wages between European, Far Eastern and U.S. factories. This, too, is expected to make itself felt when foreign products are eventually offered for sale here in the U.S.

There is no doubt, especially among those who have carefully studied all facts obtainable and logically aligned them for their own future welfare, that internationalization of this industry is already under way.

LOOK TO NEW GAMES & PHONOS

Believe New Games and Phonos Can Zoom Averages as More People Meet in More Spots Due to Layoffs. Ops Foresee Good Chance for '58 to Prove Banner Year. Want Lower Priced, Big Play Appeal. New Equipment to Help Boom Industry.

CHICAGO-If there ever was a

CHICAGO—If there ever was a chance for the operators to zoom up their averages and, thereby, bring about a boom for all the industry, it's right now, according to many leaders. These men report that they are finding more and more peoples con-gregating in their locations. They claim that this is due to the layoffs that have been taking place. They are also of the belief that if these people were given new equip-ment with great play appeal that there is every possibility for operators to find their averages going up to new marks and that this could lead to a boom for the coinbiz. Many recall past recession periods and state that, during such times, op-erators were able to increase their averages and, generally, bring about better conditions thruout all the in-dustry. Some even point back to the de-

dustry.

Some even point back to the de-pression times and claim that during those days the operators enjoyed

those days the operators enjoyed greater play than ever because there were more customers in locations. "What we do need," claims one well known operator, "are lower priced games. But games with really great play appeal. Not just made over ma-

play appeal. Not just made over ma-chines. "We need new games," he insists, "and at lower prices, so that the op-erators will have a chance to amortize them more quickly, and all will be able to buy in bigger quantity. "This," he concludes, "is bound to bring boom times to the entire in-dustry." Many other operators are of the

Many other operators are of the same opinion. They, too, believe that the manufacturers should now bend

every effort to producing lower priced games and phonos. They feel that the lower prices, al-

lowing them to amortize the cost so much faster, will result in greater buying and will, at the same time, bring better averages to all the op-erators everywhere in the country.

Some operators already report in-creased averages. They attribute this to the fact that locations are getting more patronage with the result that they are getting a goodly share of this increased patronage. "1958 can prove to be a banner year for this industry," reports one

year for this industry," reports one operator. "With more people patronizing more locations," he claims, "there is no doubt that play will step up pro-vided, of course, that we are able to obtain the kind of new and appealing machines the players want." He also points out that the average operator, around the country has

changed to 10ϕ play. For the larger bowling games, he says, many are featuring two play for

For our larger bowing games, he says, many are featuring two play for twenty-five cents. "In short," he advises, "there is every chance for the operator to get ahead during 1958 if all other factors in the industry will work with him to give him the opportunity to cash in. "As long as there is more patron-age in locations," he continues, "we will get more play action. With our phonos and games on 10e play, and some even on better coin play action, and with prices of the new machines kept down to a point where they can be more quickly amortized, there is every chance for a banner year in 1958."

Britain's Phono Operators Assn. Holds Emergency Meet To Fight PRS Fee Increase

Decide to Confer With PRS (Britain's Version of ASCAP) Before Court Action

New Copyright Act of 1956 Permits PRS to Set Fees of Own Choosing

LONDON, ENGLAND-The moderates won the day at the emergency meeting of the Council of Britain's Phonograph Operators Association called to discuss the Performing Right Society's proposal to raise the fees charged to operators.

Society's proposal to raise the fees charged to operators. Despite predictions of total war, possibly by a court action, it was de-cided that another attempt should be made to obtain terms acceptable to members, including a long term agree-ment at moderate fixed fees. Said Chairman C. H. Jones, after Monday's meeting: "Obviously the Society's letter is not acceptable as it stands. But we have reason to believe that the door is still open, and that certain counter-proposals we have pre-pared may be acceptable to P.R.S." The "representations" referred to were at the end of October last, when a delegation from the P.O.A. visited the P.R.S. and had a long meeting to request better terms for members. The scale of fees that had previous-ly been proposed by the Association as acceptable to members had been as follows: 1-2 machines ______f15. 15. 0.

solicitor Mr. New several points of considerable general interest relative to the new Copyright Act of 1956 arose, They included these (on which he said he had taken best possible Counsel's advice): (1) Operators are not themselves liable in any way for fees to either P.R.S. or Phonographic Equipment Ltd. They only own boxes, which they farm out.

hable in any way for fees to either P.R.S. or Phonographic Equipment Ltd. They only own boxes, which they farm out.
(2) Location owners are liable in both cases, because they make use on their premises of the boxes.
(3) An interesting point that has emerged is that members of the public who play the boxes could probably also be proved to be liable to both organization because they actively cause to be played the music and records controlled by both organiza-tions. But this is largely academic, as collection from the public would ap-pear to be impossible.
(4) The amount of the fees charged however, is a different matter alto-gether, and as nothing is laid down under the Act, it is a matter of what is considered proper, taking into ac-count the various relative factors.
(5) The act provides for an inde-pendent tribunal to arbitrate on fees (which would include a high court judge and other nominees of high standing) and site owners could, if it came to the bit, go before the tribunal, backed by the Association, after which the Association could also appear as an interested party. As far as is known this machinery has not yet been used by anyone since the Act went through.
Other points raised by the solicitor were important but must, for the mo-ment, remain confidential.
A letter is being sent at once to P.R.S. from P.O.A. outlining changes in their proposals that would be ac-ceptable and suggesting further meet-ings. As these may take some months, a letter is being sent to members of



If I may say so," he said, "I consider that the P.O.A. delegation was both wise and lucky to visit us when they did. We were just on the point of raising fees, and the discussions cleared up some important points.

"Although some of our directors felt strongly that as the Society's music was now being played all day on many boxes, and therefore there was ground for a considerable increase, we were able to point out to them that, on the other hand, there are marginal sites which do not pay off so well to operators.

"I would also like to point out to operators that we are not, as some appear to think, ogres who want to

Belgium, Germany, Austria Lead **Import Parade for Used Shuffles and** Bowlers. Look to Italy, France, Switzerland, Holland, Denmark to Follow Suit. England Hopes for Licensed Manufacture or Can Buy **From Irish Factories**

CHICAGO—Imports of used bowl-ers and shuffle games are growing all over the European continent. For sometime European coin ma-

noted the success these bowling ma-chines were creating thruout the U.S., did not believe that they would "ever take hold in Europe." Today, because of a daring few im-porters who decided to "take a chance" and import some of the early model used bowlers and shuffle games be-cause of the low prices quoted, they have found a veritable bonanza. Exports of used shuffles and bowlers have been growing at a tremendous pace.

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

From all over Great Britain distributors report a lull in business as everyone waits with somewhat bated breath for the mysteries of the Amusement Trades Exhibition in London January 28, to be revealed. Business on locations, however, continues good in most areas . . . Disc-jockey impressario George Elrick is busily engaged in preparing one of the most ambitious gramophone records ever produced. Details will not be available until the Spring, so intensive are the preparations, but the entire proceeds will go to the Heart Club for Under-Privileged Children of The Variety Club of Great Britain . . . So keen is Cyril Shack on maintaining his reputation as the best juke-box record picker in Britain that he is having American singles flown over to him weeks before they are due for release in Britain. Cyril is a director of one of London's largest distributing and operating companies, and he also runs a highly successful British one-stop. . . . Mr. F. Walker, of the long-established London distributing and operating concern of Ruffler and Walker, 33/37 St. John's Hill, London S.W. 11., tells us that an advertising phrase which is successfully moving Bal-Ami boxes in quantity is "it pays while it plays." 25∉-50∉ Play Action Grows

More Bowlers and Shuffles Featuring 2 Plays 25¢. More Phonos Feature 50¢ Chutes. Believe 25¢ and 50¢ Play Will Grow Even Greater

CHICAGO — "The percentage of 2 for 25¢ play games we are selling continues to increase tremendously over straight 10¢ play," reported one well known shuffle and bowler manufacturer.

He also stated that this trend became noticeable during 1957 and has continued to grow greater ever since.

"I firmly believe," he said, "that the intelligent operators everywhere in the nation agree with us that they can just as easily obtain 2 plays for 25ϕ on location as they can 10ϕ play.

"Of course," he added, "it takes time to prove this point so our games are all equipped with optional 10¢ chutes as well as with whatever chute play action the buyers desire."

This increase in 2 for 25ϕ play has been noticeable nationwide. Many are of the belief now that the majority of the larger bowling games will, eventually, all be featuring 2 for 25ϕ play as against former 10ϕ play action.

One reason for this, as operators point out, is the higher cost of these games. Also the fact that, where these bowlers can be located, the difference between 10ϕ and 2 for 25ϕ is not that much noticeable at least as far as the players are concerned.

The playing time, according to most ops, is the same on 2 for 25ϕ play as on straight 10ϕ play.

"In short," as one op puts it, "the players don't mind, when playing against each other, whether they insert two dimes or one quarter.

"They take just as much time to play the game.

"But," he adds, "that extra nickel, as far as we operators are concerned is the difference, in many cases, between profit and loss.

Therefore, according to reports being received from many operators, as well as from distributors and manufacturers, the 2 play 25ϕ bowlers and shuffles are proving most popular.

In the case of the automatic phonos, the 50ϕ chute has grown up. The operators report that, today, there are just as many half dollars in their collections as quarters. They attribute much of this to the

fact that with the 50ϕ coin chute they are in the position to give the players a real bargain. At the same time, they explain, because of the fact that there is an overlap of similar tunes, they enjoy greater profits with 50ϕ play action.

"It used to be," reports one well known operator, "that we could find a growing number of quarters in all of our dime play phonos.

"Since we have started to feature the 50c chute we now find just as many half-dollars.


"This," he advises, "is proving to us that the half-dollar play action, where we can give the players a real bargain in most cases, appeals to the point where collections are better and that means profits are growing in many of our locations."

It is also noticeable that all manufacturers are adopting the 50ϕ chute ever since this increase in collections of half-dollars became noticeable.

The operators who have been featuring the 50c play action feel that this chute is bound to grow in importance nationwide.

In short, with more and still more quarter and half-dollar chute action noticeable everywhere in the country, there is every belief that the new bowlers, shuffles and other games, along with the new phonos are pointing a better profit path for all the operators everywhere in the country.



HAMBURG, GERMANY — Alfred W. Adickes, Nova Apparate-Gesell-schaft, this city, advises that he looks to 1958 with great optimism for business thruout the entire European area.

"As far as phonographs are concerned", states Adickes, "the American industry still stands a very good chance to maintain its share in the European markets, with all due respect to German - produced phonographs, which have succeeded in taking over a pretty high percentage of the demand, due particularly to the advantages they enjoy in price; freight, duty, and free access to most of the Soft Currency Areas. Speaking for our well-introduced Rock-Ola's, I feel pretty confident that we shall not only maintain, but even increase their share in the markets due to quality merits and an excellent Sales Organization which not all other firms can claim."

Reviewing the amusement machine. situation, Adickes, who claims he was primarily responsible for the re-introduction of American-made equipment to the market, "particularly in com-petition against German-made pay-off machines," commented "This un-dertaking was not an easy one, and a number of firms have benefited from this pioneer work this pioneer work. "The pinball bu

a number of nrms have benefited from this pioneer work. "The pinball business in Germany was already about to assume fairly good proportions", he reports, "when a temporary brake was put on the business by the imposition of the revised Federal Laws restricting the use of pinballs in Arcades, which are still a major outlet for these games in this country. It is, however, my opinion that within a few months we shall recover the best part of our present loss in "turnover in pinballs due to special efforts. "In addition to pinballs, shuffle alleys are beginning to take hold on the market, and the Germans are te-coming very shuffleboard-minded par-ticularly in the Western part of Germany that is universally known

American zone. "We put the machines in American Canteens, then into places fraternized by a lot of American GI's, and then the Germans themselves gradually took a liking to the games. Since about six months ago, we have hardly been able to fill the demand for reasonably priced used American shuffle alleys, and we have been im-porting a fairly good number every month. It appears that this popularity is going to last for some time, altho the trade will have to be pretty care-ful not to invest too much in high-priced games because the American market has definitely proved that apart from the incomparable oppor-tunities in placing these games, the operators, generally speaking, have not fared too well in the long run in buying too many high-priced alleys, particularly due to the rapid change of models and drop in second hand values. values

"It is also interesting to note that Austria is gradually opening up to American pinballs. It is a slow, but apparently successful beginning. It is still slow particularly due to legal restrictions existing in a number of Counties in this otherwise so lovely little Austria."





Most of the pages are devoted to items of interest to locations, among these short quotations from the classics, both serious and humorous, lengthy stories on the purposes of the association; how to use television to advantage; and reprints of The Cash Box "Juke Box Poll" for 1957. Also included is a poem by Stout "Little Things Mean A Lot," pointing out the necessity of dealing courteously with customers.

The most important item is a double page headed "ASCAP STILL DE-TERMINED TO RUIN JUKE BOX INDUSTRY." Stout reviews the situation, clearly explaining the purposes of ASCAP, and detailing in length the juke box operators' position. In the concluding paragraph, Stout asks for the cooperation of the public, "You, whoever you are, have a duty to yourself, if you would save for yourself the right to have juke box music in public places. MOA needs your help. Won't you write in and protest the adoption of ASCAP's amendments to the music copyright law. That is all you would need to do."

Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quan-tity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstand-ing firms, having a reputation for shipping com-pletely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quo-tation exactly as it is made and depends on the sub-scriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price auoted.
