EDITORIAL If The Price Is Right

New artists are the lifeblood of the music business. This hackneyed phrase is certainly valid, but the practical application of this philosophy is not being developed to its fullest potential.

Young, talented artists are being signed daily by small and large record companies alike. Millions of dollars are being spent on putting these talents to vinyl, and sometimes an extensive marketing and promotional campaign follows. Realistically, no record company can be expected to commit substantial sums of money for every album that is released. But, we believe that there is a way to increase exposure and sales of records by these unknown artists, while at the same time encouraging the consumer to be more willing to take a chance on lesser known acts.

We propose a sliding scale of suggested retail list prices to cover the various career stages that artists

pass through. The easiest way to establish such a scale would be to base it on the sales history of the respective act.

For example, a completely unknown artist might list for \$6.98, a proven 250,000 unit seller would list for \$7.98, a gold album achiever for \$8.98 and platinum artists for \$9.98, and so on. The categories may not have to be defined so closely, or they may be broken down even further.

The basic concept is to make the struggling artist a more attractive purchase. As it now stands, these aspiring artists are not only competing for the same airwaves, but the same dollars against Fleetwood Mac, Eagles, etc.


If new artists are truly the lifeblood of the business, let's give them a needed transfusion of life.

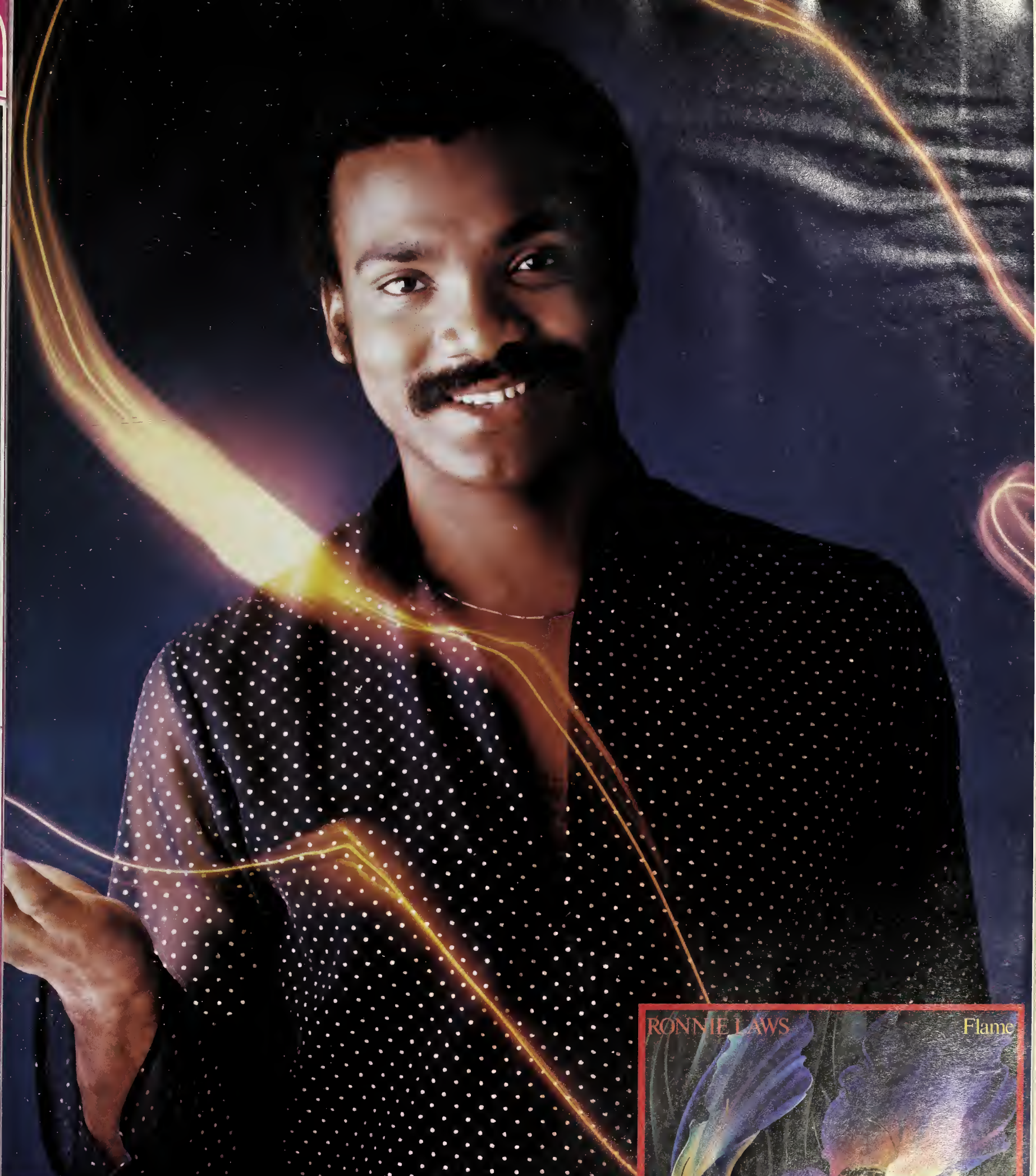

Springboard Socks Pickwick, AmCan With Antitrust Suit

NEW YORK — Springboard International has filed two separate federal lawsuits charging violation of U.S. antitrust laws and unfair competitive practices against Pickwick International, and the firm's parent company, American Can. The suit against Pickwick specifically names Pickwick's president, C. Charles Smith and its general counsel and secretary George Port as defendants. The suit, filed by the New Jersey-based firm on September 21 in the U.S. District Court of Newark, New Jersey, asks for a total of \$77 million dollars in damages.

The suit against Pickwick contends that the firm presently controls about 80% of the market for the recording, manufacture, distribution and sale of budget records, and 24% of the market for the sale of all record albums, both budget and full-priced. By comparison, Springboard has only two percent of the retail market for the sale of budget records, according to the deposition.

The suit states that on or about August, 1977, George Port was hired away from Springboard, where he was the vice president of business affairs and general counsel, to become the secretary and chief legal officer of Pickwick. Springboard claims that Port was hired because of his knowledge of the business secrets and affairs of Springboard, to "assist Pickwick in its conspiracy and plan to drive Springboard out of business," and that both Port and Smith have "actively participated in the aforesaid conspiracy."

The suit charges that, in June, 1977, Pickwick entered into illegal, formal, exclusive licensing agreements "with several major labels, among them United Artists and ABC Records, and that "all other

budget record companies including the plaintiff (Springboard) were thus wholly foreclosed from licensing the rights to any recording owned by these record companies." Additionally, it is alleged, Pickwick entered into similar, but unwritten agreements with other companies like Capitol and RCA. The suit further charges that Pickwick, in order to obtain those agreements, promised preferential treatment to these companies in Pickwick's retail outlets.

The suit also maintains that, since Springboard could not obtain the right to license much recorded material, the firm

Labels Readying 'Best Of' & Live Albums For Fall

LOS ANGELES — In an attempt to maximize record sales during the Christmas season, many record companies will emphasize the works of their best selling artists with a flurry of greatest hits album releases. In addition, some labels have slated a large number of live albums for the fall release schedule.

More than 30 greatest hits collections are being issued this fall, with Columbia leading the way with 12 albums, followed by Capitol with seven and ABC with five. Also, more than a dozen live albums are scheduled for release, including three each by Columbia and Warner Bros.

Although Motown is issuing only one greatest hits package this fall, a single LP by the Commodores, the label is launching

NAB/NABOB Mgmt. Meet Draws Black Station Owners

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The third annual management seminar sponsored jointly by the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) and National Association of Black Owned Broadcasters (NABOB) drew more than 30 black station owners to Washington last week. The conference coincided with the Congressional Black Caucus meetings and social activities over the weekend (Sept. 29-31), which many of the participants also attended, and was highlighted by speeches from Rep. William Clay (D-Mo.) and Frank Washington, legal assistant to FCC Chairman Charles Ferris.

Seminars covering advertising, audience measurement, financing for station acquisitions, a review of the FCC's '77 report on minorities in broadcasting, the rewrite of the Communications Act and a presentation by the FCC broadcast bureau filled out the agenda.

Conference Highlights

A high level of frustration was apparent from several outspoken black station owners attending the advertising panel discussion. Moderator, and president of the National Black Network, Eugene Jackson

summed up the problem: "To the extent that advertising doesn't accrue to us, we are in big trouble..." Representatives of advertising agencies, (including Robert Beatty of Ross Roy Inc., New York, who is one of five black vice presidents in the major ad agencies), stressed the importance of data, while admitting the audience measurement services are outdated when it comes to evaluating black media.

Larry Cole, senior VP and media director of Ogilvy & Mather, said, "You should relish the job of documenting the strengths of black radio." Beatty called for "an immediate and vast overhauling of the rating services, starting with ARB." And Joan Yonkler, vice president and media director of Henry J. Kaufman & Associates, Washington, told the group, "you should

Musicians, Friends Of The Late 'King' Cast Doubt On Validity Of 1st Elvis Record Story

NASHVILLE — Controversy continues to swell surrounding the recently released single, "Tell Me Pretty Baby," which Texas writer/producer Andrew Lee Jackson alleges is the first record the late Elvis Presley ever recorded — cut in a Phoenix, Az. recording studio in the early months of 1954 with a local group called Jamie Falco and The Red Dots.

Jackson and Hall Freeman, president of Cin/Kay Distributing Co. here which is distributing the single, continue to maintain their belief the singer is Presley. In addition to affidavits produced at a Sept. 17 press conference in the Cin/Kay offices, both Jackson and Freeman claim more evidence will become available proving Presley indeed recorded in Phoenix in early 1954. And the two are openly challenging anyone to prove otherwise.

However, in researching this story, **Cash Box** has acquired information from sources in Nashville, Memphis and Phoenix which indicates the young Presley was never in Phoenix in the early months of 1954 as alleged by Jackson, Pete (then Jamie) Falco and Don Reese, a former DJ who (in a sworn affidavit) says he was present in the Phoenix studio at the time Presley allegedly recorded "Tell Me Pretty Baby."

A seven-page document distributed at the Sept. 17 press conference alleges Presley, 19 years old at the time, came to a local club in Phoenix in early 1954, visited with the band (Falco and The Red Dots) and remarked he was a singer looking for work. The group invited Presley to a recording session at Audio Recording Studio the next

day, and Presley ended up recording "Tell Me Pretty Baby," which was written by Falco. The document also states Presley was paid \$15 for the session, which Falco has said was actually a demo record made for the purpose of placing the song with a record company.

Years later, through a series of circumstances, Falco re-discovered the alleged tape and sold it to Jackson. According to the document, Jackson played the tape for several people who had known Presley in his early career and took the tape to Dr. John H. Godfrey at The Callier Center for Communication Disorders in Dallas, Tx. for a sound spectrograph comparison test.

Jackson reportedly provided Dr. Godfrey with a tape of the RCA Presley release, "Ain't That Loving You Baby," for comparison. An affidavit stating the singer of the two songs were probably the same, and signed by Dr. Godfrey, was distributed also at the press conference. However, the affidavit also stated positive scientific determination is not possible.

Felton Jarvis, Presley's producer since 1965; Vernon Presley, Elvis' father; Gladys Tipler, along with her husband, the owner of Crown Electric Co. in Memphis where Presley worked during 1954; and Scotty Moore, Presley's first guitar player, all con-

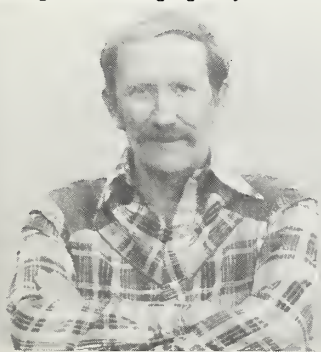

Moody Blues Set Tour In November

LOS ANGELES — The Moody Blues, who have not performed on stage since 1973, will begin their biggest tour ever Nov. 3 at the St. Paul Civic Center.

The 30-city tour will include concerts at the Chicago Stadium, New York's Madison Square Garden and the Los Angeles Forum. Prior to the U.S. dates the group will perform four concerts in Europe. The tour will help promote "Octave," the band's first studio album in five years, which was released in June on London Records.

London's merchandising campaign behind the tour will include 60-second radio spots in each city; 50,000 four-color posters depicting the eight Moody Blues albums; 50,000 four-color "Octave" posters; 1,000 4x4 ft. blow-ups of the album cover and 10,000 special distributor tour kits, which will include posters and easel-backed album jackets that double as mobiles.

Best Display Award

A trip to Hawaii for two will be awarded for the best retail display of the entire Moody Blues catalog. In addition to this grand prize, store owners with the best window display in each city will be able to compete for 30 color television sets.

Licensing Amends Proposed By The Copyright Office

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Proposed amendments to the interim regulations covering compulsory licensing for making and distributing phonorecords, as well as public hearings on the matter, were announced by the Copyright Office last week.

Nov. Hearings

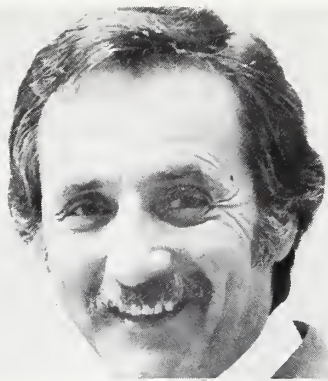
The amendments will be effective 30 days after publication of the fact in the Federal Register (9-28). Hearings will be held Nov. 28 and 29 at the Copyright Office and will employ special rules of procedure; an independent accounting consultant will join the Copyright Office officials on the hearing panel and cross-examination of witnesses will be allowed.

Participants in the technical discussions to nail down the mechanical rights rules have so far been the RIAA, the National Music Publishers Association and the Harry Fox Agency. Concessions to each were made in the amendments put forward by the Copyright Office.

Requirements

Briefly, the amendments would:
 Require a statement of the fiscal year of the person or entity wanting a compulsory license;
 Require the name of the principal recording artist or group — not all the names of group performers;
 Where the address of the copyright owner is unknown, compulsory licensees will be required to file a Notice of Intention to obtain a compulsory license with the

Jane Fonda Pairs Politics & Music To Aid Solar Energy

by Randy Lewis

LOS ANGELES — Jane Fonda is involved in a campaign to ensure that control of solar power is kept in the hands of the public. And she feels that benefit rock concerts offer the perfect method of financing the campaign.

"Politicians can go to self-interest groups and get the \$10,000 or \$20,000 they may need, but then they are beholden to that special interest group," Fonda told **Cash Box**.

"That's the beauty of concerts. We want to raise money in a democratic way and not owe anything to any special interest group. What better way then to have 3,000-10,000 kids contribute 'X' amount of money and get an evening of entertainment in return?"

The issue Fonda is fighting, along with other members of an organization known as the Campaign for Economic Democracy (CED) is to keep the solar industry "decentralized and democratic," as she puts it.

Utilities Companies

"We saw that the big utilities companies were looking at solar and we began to find out their game plan," she said.

Their fear was that public utilities companies interested in solar potentially might stifle competition by forcing smaller, independent manufacturers of solar collectors out of business. This, in turn, could result in those utilities companies administering solar power the same way they have electricity, liquefied natural gas (LNG) or telephones through the telephone company. The end result might be that energy companies would rent, rather than sell, solar collectors to consumers and even put meters on the collectors to measure and charge for the amount of sunlight used, she said.

But since the CED has become involved, a number of bills have been introduced and passed into state law which will prevent any monopoly of the growing solar industry.

A number of concerts benefiting solar energy have been staged over the past year, or will be shortly, featuring such acts as Jackson Browne, Bonnie Raitt, Danny O'Keefe, Norton Buffalo, Taj Mahal, Little Feat and the Doobie Brothers. She also hopes in the future to involve Emmylou



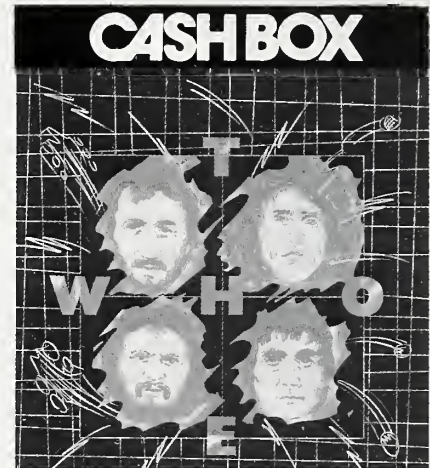

Leo Sayer 'Returns To The Roots' On Sixth WB Album

TORONTO — "Some of my older fans have at times accused me of selling out," says Leo Sayer, "but I find it's really more challenging to go through a series of different types of music, than to just stick to one."

The diminutive British pop star has gone from being the painted Pierrot clown/vaudevillian onstage, to the introspective songsmith, to a pop/disco luminary. Now, on his sixth Warner Bros. album, "Leo Sayer," he finds himself "returning to the roots. I don't find myself in a period of transition right now, any more than I always am. But the new album is a radical, different step for me."

The disc, the third in a row produced by Richard Perry, "is more intimate, more naked musically and production-wise," Sayer states, coming on the heels of the commercially-disappointing "Thunder In My Heart" album of a year ago. "I was very much disappointed after the last album," says Leo. "It was one of those albums that didn't come out as well as expected. It had been recorded as a soul album, something I had always wanted to do. If one could strip away the strings and horns, hear it as it was supposed to be heard, it would be a fairly punchy sort of record, like an old Wilson Pickett or Otis Redding album."

Undoubtedly, the failure of the album was in part due to the pressures of producing a smash follow-up to "Endless Flight," which spawned three singles hits for Sayer — "You Make Me Feel Like Dancing," "When I Need You," and "How Much Love." Sayer recorded the new disc at the same time that "When I Need You" was a #1

single. "There was a lot of pressure to follow up 'Dancing.' It fell on deaf ears for me, but I think it had quite an effect on Richard. He sort of went crazy with strings, and it got kind of a disco flavor, which I never really intended."

On the new album, Sayer says Perry and he have worked out the problems satisfactorily. "Naturally, when two strong personalities like Leo Sayer and Richard Perry work together, you're going to have differing opinions. But I feel that Richard has introduced me to a whole different side of music, which I must admit interests me quite a lot. He's taught me to write with commercial intent. He's also taught me to make records that are not only written well, but sound good, which I was not doing earlier in my career."

As for the new disc, Sayer is "quite pleased. We managed to avoid the mistakes of over-production of 'Thunder,' but kept the sound fresh and uncluttered. There's a different kind of singing than before. I'm sitting down and being serious, rather than playing with my voice. It's a radical departure, in some ways, and it shocked the record company people so much that we had to include a couple of reworked songs to add contrast. There's much more of a raw feeling to the album, and I like that a lot."

The 30-year-old Sayer (Nee Gerald Hugh) was born in Shoreham-by-Sea England, and began working first as a commercial artist before embarking on a musical career, as a blues performer primarily. In 1972, he was discovered by Adam Faith (his manager to this day), and

Tenor saxophonists Pete Christlieb and Warne Marsh possess highly individual sounds and styles of their own, yet both served long apprenticeships with other players. Marsh was a student of the "cool school" purveyed by Lennie Tristano in the '50s; and Christlieb has been a member of the "Tonight Show" band for the past ten years.

A mutual camaraderie and respect recently brought the pair together for the recording of "Apogee," a spirited new Warner Bros. album for "tenor freaks" everywhere.

The son of a celebrated classical bassoonist, Christlieb grew up in a musical household. His mother sang opera, and frequent visitors to his home included Stravinsky, Boulez, and Stockhausen. After studying the violin for about nine years, he took up the sax. Most of his influences on the instrument were black men. Christlieb cited his friendship with the late Cannonball Adderley as one example. "He was an important inspiration to me because of the vitality he put into his sax. He knew how to make me feel good, and I try to emulate that quality when I play."

Though Warne and Pete first met on the west coast more than a decade ago as members of pianist Clare Fischer's group, it was not until 1976 that the tenor men cut a duet album for a Japanese label that Marsh had previously recorded for. Unfortunately, that LP never saw the light of day.

But during the sessions for the recording of Steely Dan's "FM" title track (on which Christlieb solos), he played a tape of the Japanese album for Steely Dan co-founders Walter Becker and Donald Fagen, whose affinity for traditional jazz harmonies is well known to the group's followers. Like Christlieb, the Dan like to swing when they rock, as in their salute to Charlie Parker ("Parker's Band") and the reworking of Duke Ellington's "East St. Louis Toodle-Oh" for pedal steel guitar. More recently, their examination of what makes jazzmen tick in the cerebral "Deacon Blues" (from the "Aja" LP) features a gloriously smooth-flowing tenor solo by Christlieb.

"I reached more people in those 16 bars than anything I ever recorded," he said. "It really got the ball rolling for me. So when they said that they wanted to produce Warne and myself, how could we lose? Those guys know how to move records!"

"Warne and I usually just start playing whenever we get together," Pete said, "but the new record meant laying out set patterns, quotas, and endings instead of blowing right off the top. We still managed to leave enough room to expound on the 'magna-tism' that exists whenever we play."

Christlieb noted some of the stylistic differences that distinguish his playing from Marsh's. "Warne likes to put his sound together theoretically and methodically. I just like to fly by the seat of my pants." And though a 20-year age spread separates the two men, there's never any rub. "I'm certainly not afraid to ask questions, or stupid enough to think that what I have going is the answer. But when I want to learn something, Warne's the guy I turn to."



Molly Hatchet

A few weeks ago Molly Hatchet, Epic's new six-man Southern rock outfit, was leaving Macon to go out on the road in support of their self-titled debut album when the bus they were riding in came out of gear on top of a hill. The bus began to roll down the hill, gathering speed until it crashed into a line of parked cars, totalling five or six of them before finally coming to a halt.

For many groups the accident would have been a disaster. But for Molly Hatchet the accident was completely consistent with their juggernaut image. It took them years of dues paying at local clubs in the South to get to the top of the hill, and now that they're rolling they're ready to crush anything that stands in their way.

"We're ruthless, we like to kick ass and don't take any guff," says group founder and lead guitarist Dave Hlubek. "We're headed for the top and God help anyone who gets in our way."

Beneath the street-tough, macho veneer, Molly Hatchet is really made up of six friendly, if rowdy, guys. Besides Hlubek, the lineup features Danny Joe Brown on vocals, Duane Roland on lead guitar, Steve Holland on lead guitar, Banner Thomas on bass guitar and Bruce Crump on drums.

The group first started to take shape around Jacksonville seven years ago, where various members of Molly Hatchet learned their trade along side members of Lynyrd Skynyrd, Grinderswitch and .38 Special. About three years ago the current lineup started to take shape and on New Year's Eve 1976 the sextet was complete.

Last year the band caught the ear of engineer Tony Reale, who turned producer Tom Werman on to Molly Hatchet.

"We passed up a \$500 gig to go and do a private show for Tom, but it was worth it," understates Dave. Werman was enthused by the band's performance and by the end of the year they were signed to Epic.

Epic put the group in the studio with Reale and Werman and the result is one of the hottest debut albums to boogie out of the South in a long time. Every member contributed at least one song to the album, which also includes Gregg Allman's "Dreams I'll Never See." The triple lead guitars are out front throughout the LP, cleverly intertwined with hard-driving rhythms and Danny Joe's strong vocals to produce a dynamic rock 'n' roll sound that transcends the "Southern boogie" style.

The group took its name from the 17th century murderer Hatchet Molly. The cover of the debut album features a Frank Frazetta painting of the Executioner poised on horseback with his bloody hatchet in his hand. The group considers the cover to be indicative of the slashing, throbbing-guitar based music inside.

Molly Hatchet is spending most of its time out on the road now, building a reputation the group hopes will give them a foundation for a long career.

"We're real excited about the tour," indicates Danny Joe. We'll be playing with people like Bob Seger, Foreigner and REO Speedwagon. Our management is getting a lot of people out in front of us and giving us the chance to do our thing — play kick-ass rock 'n' roll."

Steve Gold's Style Of Mgmt. Is Far Out, But It's Successful

LOS ANGELES — "The artist's music always comes first. I don't have to love my artists, just their music."

This philosophy is the crux of Steve Gold's theory of management. Gold, a 49-year-old partner in Far Out Productions (which handles such acts as War, Tanya Tucker, Lee Oskar, Lonnie Jordan, Ronnie Laws and Eloise Laws among others), is known within the industry as an outspoken personal manager unafraid to go on record with controversial opinions. He is a man who shaved his head in a long hair age and named his big act War during the height of the peace movement.

Gold and his Far Out partner, producer Jerry Goldstein, recently made headlines with an indictment of white promotion men and record executives who artificially separate black and white music.

"This is the most racist period in the last 20 years in American music," says Gold. "What used to be 'progressive' radio is now regressive — playing all white music. I think promotion staffs have created the problem by not working records till they're Top 10 R&B."

"Crossover is the biggest insult that's been laid on black music," Gold insists. "It implies that black music is less than white music. And because of the limitations put on black music, white artists can steal black sounds and give derivative music greater exposure than original music. If The O'Jays, for example, got the shots on white radio that the Bee Gees do on black radio their popularity would be similar."

As a manager, Gold is involved with his artists as much as possible. He is a firm believer in the talent on the Far Out roster, often saying that only the major record companies have stronger rosters. "My

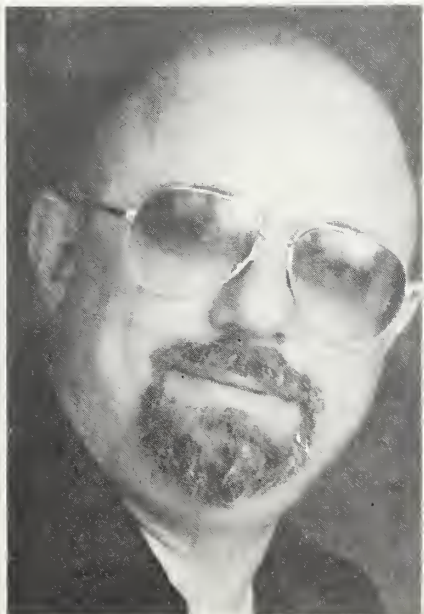
freedom in working for a small company like Far Out is that I don't have to work with a single artist that I wouldn't buy a ticket to see."

Far Out's Origin

Gold was a CPA in 1957 when a friend approached him with the idea for a record company. From that moment on, Gold has been a part of the music industry. A short time later Delphi Records, with Gold as a principal, had a hit with its initial release by Richie Valens.

In 1964, Gold met Jerry Goldstein in New York where Goldstein was working with a group called the Strangeloves. Three years

'Hot Child' Set To Become Chrysalis' First Gold Single

LOS ANGELES — Chrysalis Records is celebrating this week the label's first gold single, "Hot Child In The City," by Nick Gilder which is positioned at #5 bullet on the Top 100 Singles chart. Sal Licata, senior vice president and Stan Layton, national sales manager for the label consider the success of the Gilder and James McCulloch composition to be a statement of health for the label's independent distribution network.

"We have been with the independents two years this month," says Licata. "We stayed with this single and the distributors are excited because they rightfully feel a part of this success. This is only the beginning too. This album ("City Nights") looks great. The new single 'Here Comes The Night' will be out in October and it is going to be fantastic to have two singles on the chart at one time."

The gold certification, which is awaiting successful completion of an RIAA audit, marks a five month upward climb for "Hot Child." Shipped in April, the record got its first substantial airplay in New Orleans, Phoenix and Anchorage. Layton credits the Pickwick branch in Atlanta with helping the record's momentum.

"They really got on it in the beginning," says Layton, "and it is fitting that they came with the re-order that pushed the record over the top." Because of the single's success, Layton notes that Gilder's name has been established.

"Initially people would ask for 'Hot Child' but now consumers are asking for Nick Gilder. That important name identification has been established. We are now getting re-orders — 3,000 last week — for Gilder's first album which before this had been lost in the shuffle."

Gilder's first Chrysalis LP, "Nick Gilder" contains the song "Roxy Roller" which was a number 1 song in Canada and an incentive for Chrysalis to sign Gilder two years ago.

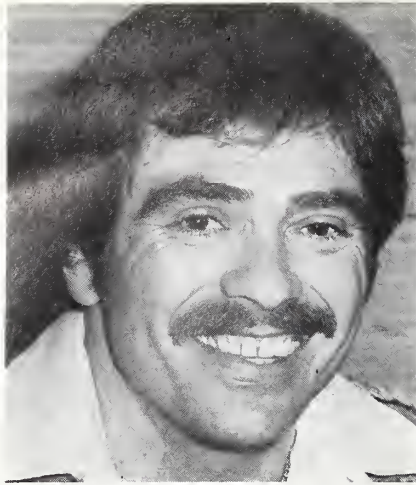
"'Hot Child' still has a lot of strength," says Licata. "Acceptance of the record has come at different times across the country. WNOE in New Orleans had it months ago and they are ready for the new single but KHJ here just added it fairly recently."

Based on the strength of the single, Gilder is in the midst of a national tour. This week he will be appearing in Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago and Madison, Wisconsin. Gilder has appeared on Don Kirshner's Rock Concert, Midnight Special, Merv Griffin and American Bandstand with Dinah! scheduled for an upcoming appearance.

In addition to Gilder's gold certification, Chrysalis anticipates gold certification for Jethro Tull's new double LP "Bursting Out."

In addition to the national special projects program, Lieberman also plans to open one or two more one-stops after the first of the year.

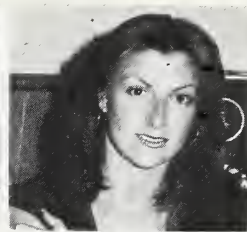

Task Force Formed To Boost New York Music Business

NEW YORK — Manhattan borough president Andrew J. Stein has formed a Music Task Force here in an effort "to bolster the Big Apple's lagging reputation as a world music capitol by improving business, economic, and operating conditions for the industry in the city."

Commenting on the formation of the organization, Stein said that "a viable, coordinated plan to assist New York City's music industry is long overdue. The industry's economic and cultural contributions to our daily life are incalculable."

The Task Force will consist of two committees, according to Stein. The first one will be led by promoter Ron Delsener, who will organize both financial and celebrity support for the project. The second committee will deal with the "cultural side" of the Task Force's programs. Ron Marino, executive director of the borough and Georgeanne Heller, the cultural director, will head this committee, whose membership presently includes concert promoter Sid Bernstein; Howard Beldock, music industry attorney with the law firm of Javits & Javits; Jack Tessler, international editor of *Billboard Magazine*; and Stephanie Barber, a founder of the Berkshire School of Jazz.

Stein said that the long-range goal of the Task Force will be to develop plans and resources for the establishment of "Music Center New York," a central facility that will bring together "those active in the composition and production of all kinds of contemporary music."

One of the program's first projects is a borough-wide contest that will be open to all amateur contemporary musical groups. Preliminary competition will be held in four separate sections of Manhattan and will be limited to groups and individuals performing contemporary music. Eight finalists will tentatively perform before Christmas at Radio City Hall where the winner will receive a recording contract with Private Stock Records, according to company president, Larry Uttal. Judges for the competition will come from recording and publishing companies, radio, television, and the musical theatre.

Grammys Air Feb. 15 On CBS-TV

LOS ANGELES — The 21st Annual Grammy Awards ceremony will be televised by CBS television Feb. 15, 1979. The awards presentation will originate from the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. It is being presented by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and Pierre Cossette Productions.

Manilow Gets Gold

NEW YORK — Barry Manilow's "Copacabana" single has been certified gold by the RIAA. The record is the second gold single culled from "Even Now," his recent platinum Arista LP.

know the products, demographics and market" before making media presentations to national ad agencies, and urged the group to maintain a high degree of professionalism.

NAB board chairman Donald Thurston said the task force on minority ownership, created a year ago with the goal of doubling the number of minority-owned broadcast facilities, will soon be asking the industry for funds to set up an investment pool. NAB is applying to the Internal Revenue Service for the creation of a charitable trust to administer the fund to assist minority ownership, he told NABOB. "We expect to be able to leverage over \$100 million of broadcast acquisitions," Thurston said.

Communications Act

Edwina Dowell, staff counsel to the House subcommittee on communications, and Henry Geller, head of the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), addressed NABOB on the subject of H.R. 13015 — the rewrite of the 1943 Communications Act.

Dowell explained that the current bill will die when Congress adjourns Oct. 14, and will be reintroduced in the 96th Congress after much tinkering in the interim. The EEO and ownership provisions of the bill are of special concern to NABOB.

Among the controversial points which, she said, will be reconsidered: removal of EEO authority from the FCC (to be taken up by the EEOC or other agency); minority ownership loan program — the \$2 million annual seed money and a fund to provide up to 50% of the amount needed by minority groups to buy stations, are all flexible amounts and percentages, Dowell said; the spectrum license fee (Dowell promised the subcommittee will come up with something more specific); the ownership limit to five TV and five radio stations and the "grandfathering" of current ownerships will get another look; the concentration of network control needs rethinking, she said, and the "public interest" standard will be more clearly defined in the process of deregulating radio.

NTIA's Geller gave his agency's reasons for thinking the bill is flawed. First, "we like the idea of a spectrum license fee, although the money it generates should not be used to fund public broadcasting nor rural telecommunications," he said.

Geller favors the elimination of the FCC's comparative hearing process and supports the elimination of the "public trustee" concept in radio — "It's been a joke for a decade and caused First Amendment strains," he said. The bill should spell out what it means by "public interest standard" and EEO authority should be kept by the FCC, he said.

Dowell spoke for many in the industry as well as government when she predicted that "some much more modest legislation will pass" eventually. One key reason:

members of Congress in general have personal feelings when it comes to broadcasters. "Many think that, but for the Fairness Doctrine, they wouldn't be in Congress now," Dowell observed.

Congressman Clay

As co-chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus subcommittee on communications, Rep. Clay pledged his efforts to take whatever legislative action is needed to safeguard black-owned media holdings and to change the advertising situation in the black community.

Rep. Clay called the 60 currently black-owned stations, "a drop in the bucket," and noted that while broadcasting generally is considered recession-proof, many black owners are in a weaker position.

The group's priority, he said, must be to fight for black people trying to enter the industry before fighting for white women trying to advance within the industry.

'Junk Food Programming'

Clay deplored what he called "junk food" types of radio programming, which is empty of educational value, and warned that the new Communications Act will "turn on the question of accountability... We won't allow Congress to pass a bill that ignores the public trust."

The FCC's Frank Washington told the group the idea of broadcasters as public trustees can't be an "absolute concept" as long as vast cultural and social differences exist between broadcaster and audience.

Washington expressed the thoughts of his boss, FCC Chairman Ferris, on the proposed deregulation of radio, as prescribed by the rewrite bill: Ferris believes an increase in minority-owned outlets must happen first, he said.

In conclusion, Washington said, he has watched the formation of NABOB and detects "a durable and lasting interest" in keeping the appropriate decision-makers under pressure to achieve the group's goals.

Copyright Office;

Internal Revenue Service rules will not be considered in the question of "recognized sales." The office agreed with RIAA's argument that this would result in royalties being finally payable immediately upon shipment and said, "this would be inconsistent with Congress' intent that our regulations recognize the practice of unsold phonorecords being returned to the compulsory licensee."

Adjust the definition of "permanently parted with possession"; and

Open the records of the Copyright Office to the filing of monthly and annual statements of account where the compulsory licensee does not know the address of the copyright owner.

However, the office says, "we do not believe it would be proper to require the filing of statements of account in these cases." The amendment states the Copyright Office will not accept any royalty fees submitted with statements of account and — in line with RIAA's argument — no filing fee will be required.

Those interested parties wanting to testify at the Nov. 28-29 hearings must file requests with the general counsel of the Copyright Office before Oct. 20. The record will remain open until Dec. 29 for additional written comments.

RIAA, which strongly opposed the IRS accounting methods as a way of determining monthly mechanicals payments, may count the amendment as a victory. However, this point is the center of debate and the amendments are likely to be reworked after the scheduled hearings.

HOT STREETS — Chicago — Columbia FC 35512 — Producers: Phil Ramone and Chicago — List: 7.98

Ten-year-old Chicago undergoes some urban renewal here. Absent are the late Terry Kath, Jim Guercio's production and even the old numerical titles. In their place are the highly talented Donnie Dacus — a certified matinee idol in recent concerts, another production triumph for Phil Ramone and playing and singing inspired enough to merit the title's "hot." "Alive Again" is the single and Chicago fully proves it here with this multi-format success.

COMES A TIME — Neil Young — Reprise MSK 2266 — Producers: Neil Young, Ben Keith, Tim Mulligan and David Briggs — List: 7.98

After the intense desperation of the "Tonight's The Night" and "Zuma" LPs and the raw, rollicking "American Stars 'N' Bars" last year, the pendulum swings back towards the center with "Comes A Time." Young's latest album offers some of the same reassurance, optimism and overall comforting tone of "Harvest," his best selling album to date. The title track, "Human Highway" and "Motorcycle Mama" are the most likely singles and should help bring the album heavy Top 40 as well as AOR action.

I'VE ALWAYS BEEN CRAZY — Waylon Jennings — RCA AFL 1-2979 — Producers: Richie Albright, Waylon Jennings and Duane Eddy — List: 7.98

Although the title song has once again brought Waylon to the familiar position at the top of the country singles chart, this album represents perhaps the biggest change for him of any LP in the last five years. The change is primarily in his voice, which he is now using with greater control and variation than in the past. The material blends new Jennings compositions along with tunes by Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard, and a Buddy Holly medley, which hopefully will get AOR on this one.

THE MAN — Barry White — 20th Century-Fox T-571 — Producer: Barry White — List: 7.98

Barry White has achieved consistent success as a composer, arranger, producer and performer, and on his latest LP he shows no sign of letting up. "The Man" features several new White compositions, his stirring bass vocals, and meticulous production values. Also included here is a soulful rendition of Billy Joel's "Just The Way You Are." Containing a number of disco gems, this album is for pop, disco and R&B formats.

ALL FLY HOME — Al Jarreau — Warner Bros. BSK 3229 — Producer: Al Schmitt — List: 7.98

On the heels of an acclaimed live album, this singer/composer should be assured of continued success with "All Fly Home." Al Jarreau's fluid, evocative vocals easily handle this assortment of tunes ranging from "(Sittin' On) The Dock Of The Bay" and "She's Leaving Home" to several original compositions. Boosted by the sensitive, flowing backup support of Lee Ritenour and Freddie Hubbard, among others, this LP is headed for heavy jazz and pop action.

CRUISIN' — Village People — Casablanca NBLP 7118 — Producer: Jacques Morali — List: 7.98

This third effort by the disco Village People features the crisp production and compositions by Jacques Morali, with lighthearted lyrics by Victor Willis. The album's first single is "Y.M.C.A.," which is boosted by an upfront beat and dark synthesizer runs. Other numbers such as "Hot Cop" and "The Women" are surefire dancefloor favorites. "My Roommate" exhibits the group's characteristic humor. Headed extensive for disco and pop action.

THE BRIDE STRIPPED BARE — Bryan Ferry — Atlantic SD 19205 — Producers: Wachtel/Marotta/Puxley/Nye/Ferry — List: 7.98

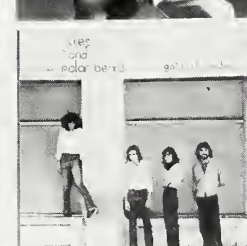
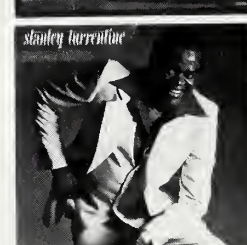
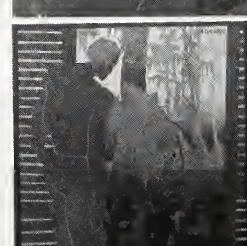
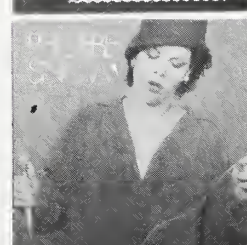
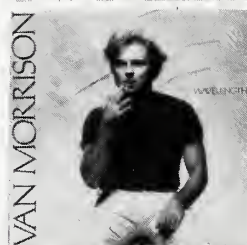
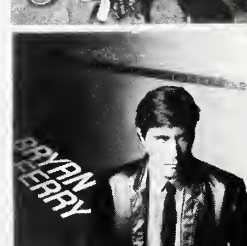
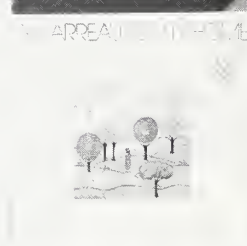
Although Ferry may still be best known for his fascinating works with Roxy Music, this is his fifth solo album and another strong outing. Equally divided between Ferry's innovative compositions and intriguing cover versions of such classics as "Take Me To The River" and "That's How Strong My Love Is," "The Bride Stripped Bare" highlights Ferry's quivering, instantly recognizable vocals and a strong supporting cast of musicians.

LEVON HELM — ABC AA-1089 — Producer: Donald "Duck" Dunn — List: 7.98

Levon Helm, formerly the drummer and one of the vocalists for the Band, has concocted a convincing second solo effort. Backed up by such stellar musicians as Steve Cropper and Willie Hall, "Levon Helm" contains nine cuts, all of which features Helm's resonant, grainy vocal interpretations of classic rock and R&B numbers. Top tracks include "Ain't No Way To Forget You" and "Sweet Johanna." Also noteworthy is Tom Malone's spirited horn arrangements.

JACK TEMPCHIN — Arista AB 4193 — Producer: Pete Carr — List: 7.98

Formerly a member of the Funky Kings and the composer of "Peaceful Easy Feeling" and "Already Gone," Jack Tempchin proves himself to be noteworthy solo performer of this album. Many of Tempchin's L.A. cohorts assist him on this effort, including session support from Glenn Frey, Jackson Browne and Jennifer Warnes. The LP also features songs Tempchin co-wrote with Tom Waits and John David Souther. Top tracks are "Peaceful Easy Feeling" and "Skateboard Johnny."



BURSTING OUT — Jethro Tull — Chrysalis CH 2-1201 — Producer: Ian Anderson — List: 11.98

Jethro Tull is one of the rare English rock bands that has been able to stay together and keep producing top selling albums. Finally, Ian Anderson and company have come out with a live album, and the two-LP set is an excellent microcosm of the group's career. It includes selections of early, middle and recent Tull albums, highlighted by a 12-minute rendition of "Thick As A Brick." "Bursting Out" makes a perfect history of Jethro Tull and should be a giant seller.

ROSS — Diana Ross — Motown M7-907R1 — Producers: Various — List: 7.98

With this Motown LP and the upcoming release of the film, "The Wiz," Diana Ross should be the recipient of extensive media attention and chart activity this fall. Hot off her engagement at the Universal Amphitheatre, this songstress on "Ross" has produced a varied, sleek recording which contains several pulsing disco numbers and a couple of sultry ballads. Of keen interest is Ross' slow, tasty rendition of the Four Tops' "Reach Out, I'll Be There." Also effective is the disco "Lovin', Livin' & Givin'."

WAVELENGTH — Van Morrison — Warner Bros. BSK 3212 — Producer: Van Morrison — List: 7.98

The Belfast Cowboy is firmly back in the saddle and on the trail to what should be his biggest success in years. That's because "Wavelength" is his most artistically consistent and commercially accessible LP possibly since "Moondance" in 1970. Even with two and possibly three solid follow-up singles to the irresistible title track, the highlight of the album is "Take It Where You Find It," a nearly nine-minute long epic which is as autobiographical as anything Van's done and ranks as one of his most powerful songs ever.

REUNION — Peter, Paul & Mary — Warner Bros. BSK 3231 — Producer: David Rubinson — List: 7.98

Having launched their highly publicized reunion with a successful concert tour this past summer, Peter, Paul & Mary's "Reunion" album should receive heavy out-of-the-box airplay and chart action. The trio's sparkling harmonies remain intact here, and original compositions and their selection of cover material is also solid. Of special interest is Peter, Paul & Mary's reggae cover of Bob Dylan's "Forever Young," plus "Ms. Rheingold" and "Like The First Time."

GREATEST HITS — Marshall Tucker Band — Capricorn CPN 0214 — Producer: Paul Hornsby — List: 7.98

The Marshall Tucker Band stands alone atop the list of Southern rockers, largely because the band has been able to consistently come out with infectious hit singles. These eight hits date back from 1973 to last year. Toy Caldwell is a fine songwriter whether the style is rock, western or even ballads, and the group supplies stinging guitars and a powerhouse musical punch. Should be a big holiday seller.

AGAINST THE GRAIN — Phoebe Snow — Columbia JC 35456 — Producers: Phil Ramone and Barry Beckett — List: 7.98

Phoebe Snow has assembled a fascinating collection of her own highly personal, bittersweet ballads and songs from five other writers that stands as her most consistent and provocative album to date. From "Poetry Man" on, Snow has been a unique song stylist and on "Against The Grain" she is backed by some top session players. The highlight of this classy pop effort is Paul McCartney's "Every Night," which should be the first single.

ON THE EDGE — Sea Level — Capricorn CPN 0212 — Producer: Stewart Levine — List: 7.98

With its third album, Sea Level focuses upon its proficient instrumental numbers, as witnessed by such inviting tracks as "Fifty-Four" and "On The Wing," plus the instrumental breaks on each of the songs. Effectively fusing keyboard textures, bristling rhythms and Southern-flavored rock for a tasty formula, "On The Edge" is a flowing, upbeat work from this septet, which features former Allmans Lamar Williams, Chuck Leavell, along with Jimmy Nalls and Randall Bramlett.

WHAT ABOUT YOU! — Stanley Turrentine — Fantasy F-9563 — Producer: Stanley Turrentine — List: 7.98

Already receiving steady jazz and pop chart action with this LP, Stanley Turrentine continues to grow as an artist from both a commercial and artistic standpoint. "What About You!" contains an equal assortment of exciting uptempo tunes and glistening, more moderately-paced pieces. Turrentine's sax work makes each track work, from the bouncy "Disco Dancing" to the serene "Feel The Fire" on through to the stormy "Heritage." Includes full-bodied arrangements by Richie Rome.

GOT NO BREEDING — Jules And The Polar Bears — Columbia JC 35601 — Producers: Larry Hirsch, Stephen Hague and Jules Shear — List: 7.98

On its debut album, Jules and the Polar Bears have issued a colorful rock album which spotlights the lead singing, imaginative songwriting and striking personality of Jules Shear. Supported by the invigorating playing of the Polar Bears, Shear introduces a diverse array of lyrical themes as displayed on such tracks as "Shadows Break" and "You Just Don't Wanna Know." For AOR and pop formats.

REED SEED — Grover Washington, Jr. — Motown M7 910R1 — Producer: Grover Washington, Jr. — List: 7.98

On his debut album with Motown, this saxophone player also makes his production debut, and the results are satisfying. Recorded in Philadelphia and featuring Locksmith, his touring band, "Reed Seed" contains seven intricate, energetically-executed numbers, including "Do Dat," "Santa Cruzin," and Billie Holiday's "Just The Way You Are." Washington's virtuosity on soprano, tenor, alto and baritone remains imaginative and richly communicative.

BARE BACK — The Temptations — Atlantic SD 19188 — Producer: Brian Holland — List: 7.98

Led by stalwarts Otis Williams and Melvin Franklin, the Temptations have again joined forces with Brian and Eddie Holland on the group's second Atlantic outing. As can be expected, "Bare Back" features polished, clean production and arrangements, and the Temps create a soulful groove with their versatile vocal interpretations. Includes the title track single plus "That's When You Need Love" and "Wake Up To Me."

WET DREAM — Richard Wright — Columbia JC 35559 — Producer: Richard Wright — List: 7.98

As equally unheralded as David Gilmour's release, Pink Floyd keyboardist Wright opts for "sound mountains" which offer aurally what a mountain range does visually... soaring highs and lows, if you will. Vocals are at a minimum, but so are self-indulgent keyboard pyrotechnics. So much so, in fact, that one of the most memorable highlights of the album is the guest spot by everyone's favorite progressive British sax man Mel Collins. For AOR, late at night, and with headphones on as well.

A CANADIAN TRIBUTE — Elvis — RCA KKL1-7065 — Producer: Wayne R. Jordan — List: 8.98

This album serves as a tribute from RCA to Elvis' Canadian fans. With the exception of a few brief spoken interviews with Presley, this consists of previously released material. Songs covered by Elvis composed by Canadian writers include Gordon Lightfoot's "Early Morning Rain" and "For Lovin' Me," Hank Snow's "I'm Movin' On" and Paul Anka's "My Way." Primarily geared toward Elvis collectors.

78 IN THE SHADE — Small Faces — Atlantic SD 19171 — Producer: Kemastrl — List: 7.98

First off, this second effort by Marriott & Co. is just that... a Steve Marriott solo album which bears about as much stylistic similarity to the Immediate label Faces as Peter Frampton does to Humble Pie. Yesteryear's pop-pizzazz persona is now just so much collector's nostalgia fodder. "78" is so loose it rattles, but with that uniquely British drunken lout charm few can convincingly pull off. It's four characters out of England's loony-bin pop scene, rocking and rolling for all they're worth because it's too late to go back to art school now.

SNAKE, RATTLE & ROLL — Crawler — Epic JE 35482 — Producer: Gary Lyons — List: 7.98

Crawler are no longer the rag-tag semi-British R&B outfit that the late Paul Kossoff whipped together through its first American tour. No more boozy blooze rockers from these blokes; it's all tight, crisp and well-modulated pop-rock music from here on out. A sure bet for those stations Elvis Costello raged against earlier this year.

FACE TO FACE — Richie Lecea — United Artists UA-LA914-H — Producer: Robert Appere — List: 7.98

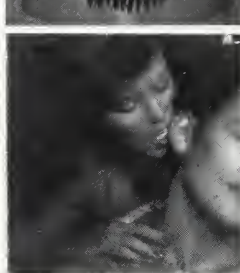
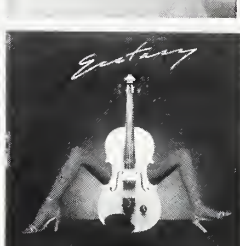
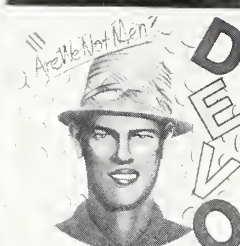
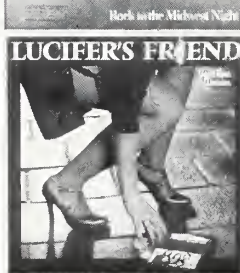
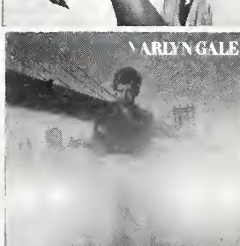
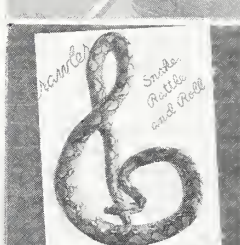
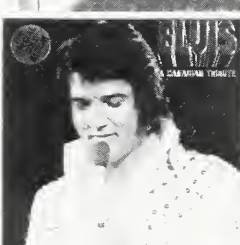
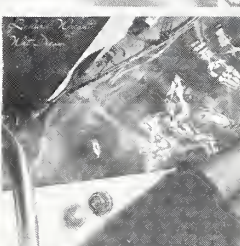
Richie Lecea is an accomplished songwriter and guitarist, but what immediately makes this album stand out is his unusual singing approach. Lecea interchanges a fluid falsetto delivery with an aggressive chest voice, and the effect is invigorating. Backed by an array of familiar musical names, such as Jim Keltner, Russ Kunkel, Dee Murray and Davey Johnstone, this LP contains mostly Lecea originals plus an occasional cover version like the Rascals' "Groovin'."

BACK TO THE MIDWEST NIGHT — Arlyn Gale — ABC AA 1096 — Producers: Mike Appel and Luls Lahav — List: 7.98

Since former Bruce Springsteen manager Mike Appel now manages Gale, and because this singer/songwriter slightly resembles The Boss both musically and physically, comparisons to Springsteen will obviously be made. Nonetheless, Gale emerges as a promising artist in his own right. "Take The Night Flight" and other tracks showcase jazzy keyboard textures and sophisticated percussion work. Suitable for AOR and pop formats.

GOOD TIME WARRIOR — Lucifer's Friend — Elektra 6E-159 — Producers: Peter van Asten/Lucifer's Friend — List: 7.98

The logo/mascot for Lucifer's Friend is a corpulent, bald-headed, feisty looking midget with a Capt. Hook hook protruding from the left sleeve of his shabby overcoat. This about sums up the very sound/image these veteran German rockers project as well. Domestically active since '73, Lucifer's Friend has indeed seen both fat times and crippling lean times on sundry abortive labels. Now on Elektra, this LP is polished, razor-sharp and ready to go for the AOR jugular.



ROAD TO RUIN — Ramones — Sire SRK 6063 — Producers: T. Erdelyi and Ed Stasium — List: 7.98

With the release of its first album three years ago, the Ramones hit the rock scene with a primitive yet exhilarating sound that served as a key influence on the flurry of punk and new wave outfits which have emerged since then. Now on its fourth effort, the quartet combines its explosive four-chord delivery, street-wise, teenage humor and infectious melodies for a winning formula. Deserving of extensive AOR and Top 40 airplay, the Ramones reaffirm its position as America's top new wave band.

TOTO — Columbia JC 35317 — Producer: Toto — List: 7.98

Consisting of such noted session players as Jeffrey and Steve Porcaro, David Paich and David Hungate, Toto is a sextet which has released a collection of accessible, sophisticated pop-rock confections. Needless to say, this album boasts clean, crisp instrumental work, but Toto also possesses several capable lead vocalists. The single "Hold The Line" is receiving chart action, and such songs as "I'll Supply The Love" and "Georgy Porgy" are also worth investigating.

DEVO — Warner Bros. BSK 3239 — Producer: Brian Eno — List: 7.98

Devo, a five-piece new wave act out of Akron, Ohio, is one of the most acclaimed groups in the genre. The group's debut album, produced by Brian Eno, shows why. The album is basically a vinyl copy of Devo's outrageous live shows, featuring incessant guitar riffs and urgent lyrics. "Jocko Homo," with the band's trademark lyric, "Are we not men? We are Devo!", and "Mongoloid" best represent Devo's de-evolutionary rock.

ROUGH — Tina Turner — United Artists UA-LA 919-H — Producer: Bob Monaco — List: 7.98

Remember, Miss Tina never does nothing nice... and easy and on her United Artists solo debut she rocks rough and randy enough to make her pop and soul competitors quiver in their lizard skin tennis shoes. Turner mixes the intensity of the gospel choir with the promised pleasures of the turned-down bed to great effect on 11 covers of artists ranging from Elton John to Dan Hill. As a result, Tina's new thing is hot to go for AOR and black contemporary.

GRAB IT FOR A SECOND — Golden Earring — MCA 3057 — Producer: Jimmy Iovine — List: 7.98

This is the fifth MCA album by Holland's finest which attempts to prove that "Radar Love" wasn't the best they could do. "Grab It" wholeheartedly succeeds in this venture. The album is expertly infused with a palpable hook-laden substance and a near punk raw power rarely present in Golden Earring recordings since their sadly overlooked album which contained "Wall of Dolls" in 1970. For AOR and possibly pop formats.

ONE NIGHT — Arlo Guthrie — Warner Bros. BSK 3232 — Producer: John Pilla — List: 7.98

This concert recording of sessions in Raleigh, North Carolina is a good argument for seeing Arlo live. Woody's son honors the folk tradition here with his flawless picking and the four-part harmonies of his backup combo, Shenandoah. Side Two incongruously pairs a 16-minute intro to a one-joke ditty about man-eating clams with a reflective anti-war song. A strange brew, but packaged to go for AOR and progressive country formats.

ECSTASY — Michal Urbaniak — Marlin/TK 2221 — Producers: Michal Urbaniak and Aki Aleong — List: 7.98

A versatile instrumentalist who is adept on violin, lyricon, tenor saxophone, Michal Urbaniak creates a fiery, powerhouse sound that can appeal to jazz, R&B and pop listeners. In addition, Urbaniak can comfortably perform more delicate, articulate compositions. Highlighted by the single "Body Rub," "Creation" and the title track, this album also features the vocal work of Urszula Dudziak, Kenyatta and Calvin Brown. For a variety of formats.

SKULL WARS — The Pirates — Warner Bros. BSK 3224 — Producer: Vic Malle — List: 7.98

The follow-up to last year's "Out Of Their Skulls" is appropriately titled because The Force is definitely with The Pirates. With nary an overdub in sight, Mick Green clears a musical trail with his slashing lead guitar work while Johnny Spence's bass and Frank Farley's percussion thunder at his heels. Three of the 12 tracks here are live and the new recording of "Shakin' All Over," the song which nearly broke the group 15 years ago, might do it again. Real rock for AOR and powerhouse Top 40.

DISCO LOVE BITE — The Tee Cees — AVI Records 6048 — Producer: Trevor Rabin — List: 7.98

"Disco Love Bite" includes four lengthy cuts, all of which launch into a funky disco groove that never quits. The title track integrates the synthesizer theme from Michael Oldfield's "Tubular Bells" into a full-bodied arrangement that should be a dance floor winner. Produced by Chrysalis artist Trevor Rabin, this LP features zesty percussion work and capable female vocals. Other tracks include "The Machine," "Ecstasy" and "Solid And Cool."

Horizon/A&M To Issue Three LPs

LOS ANGELES — A&M Records' new Horizon label has scheduled three albums for release on Sept. 29, including Dr. John's "City Lights," Neil Larsen's "Jungle Fever" and Mark-Almond's "Other People's Rooms." The release marks Horizon's transition from its strictly avant-garde jazz format into a new, broader musical emphasis.

Dr. John LP

Dr. John's "City Lights," co-produced by Tommy LiPuma, Horizon president, and Hugh McCracken, features the playing of Steve Gadd, Will Lee, Richard Tee, John Tropea and McCracken. The album showcases eight Dr. John compositions, ranging from blues to New Orleans boogie.

Larsen, who has contributed session keyboard work to albums by Gregg Allman, George Harrison, Gary Wright and Dusty Springfield, is releasing "Jungle Fever," an instrumental work produced by LiPuma. Mark-Almond's "Other People's Rooms" is also produced by LiPuma, and features eight original songs by Jon Mark.

Tour activities planned in conjunction with the Horizon releases include a national tour beginning October 12 for Mark-Almond as the opening act for Jean-Luc Ponty. Tour plans for Dr. John and Neil Larsen will be announced shortly.

Warner Bros. Anticipates Success With New Ten-Record Set By Keith Jarrett

NEW YORK — Despite inherent marketing obstacles posed by Keith Jarrett's new ten-record solo piano set, "The Sun Bear Concerts," which will be released October 15 with a list price of \$75, ECM and Warner Brothers Records executives are nonetheless optimistic that the package will be a sales success.

"I've been in the record business twenty years, and I've never handled a ten-record set at \$75 before," commented Ed Rosenblatt, vice president of national marketing for Warner Brothers, "but we do plan to launch a marketing attack at all levels, and I can tell you that we won't release an album unless we expect it to make money."

To enhance the "The Sun Bear Concerts" marketability, ECM and Warner Brothers have designed an elaborate package for the set including photos, a text, and individual record jackets for each of the ten albums. In addition, a one-album "sampler" will be made available to radio stations and retail outlets, and, from October 15 to 29, Jarrett will support the

release with a 12-city tour.

Word-Of-Mouth

Although a print campaign focusing on more "sophisticated" print media like *The New Yorker* and *Esquire* has been planned, Bob Hurwitz, director of ECM Records in the U.S., stressed the importance of word-of-mouth to promote "The Sun Bear Concerts." "It's essential to remember," Hurwitz said, "that Jarrett is the type of artist who has a loyal following, and those people are likely to enthusiastically play the album to their friends."

Hurwitz also cited the success of Jarrett's previous solo piano works, "The Koln Concert," a double-album set and "Solo Concerts," a three-record release, as successful precedent setters for "The Sun Bear Concerts." "Nobody expected those albums to sell well," Hurwitz recalled, "but 'Solo Concerts' is up to 200,000 units sold internationally, and worldwide sales for the 'Koln Concerts' are approaching 400,000."

Two other marketing avenues for the album, the college and classical markets, were cited by Andre Perry, national marketing manager for jazz and progressive music for Warner Brothers. "Both those markets are naturals for Keith,"

LOS ANGELES — Donna Summer's "Live And More" album on Casablanca Records and Village People's self-titled LP on the same label have been certified gold by the RIAA.

Billboard Broadcasting Fined \$10,000 by FCC

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Billboard Broadcasting Corp., licensee of WLAC-AM-FM/Nashville, was slapped with a \$10,000 fine by the FCC for "repeated failure to log commercial broadcast matter and to identify sponsors." In September 1977, the FCC was informed that the station had written to various record companies and talent agencies soliciting free talent in exchange for airing records during WLAC's "Music Week '77."

An FCC investigation found that 246 records not previously logged as commercial matter were corrected on later logs. However, the commission held that the corrections were not sufficient to relieve the station of liability. The matter is being handled by the FCC's complaints and compliance division.

MUSEXPO To Feature New Videotape Facility

LOS ANGELES — A 24-hour, continuous Video Showcase facility, displaying videotapes of artists' performances and record company promotions, will be featured by MUSEXPO at its Fourth Annual International Record and Music Industry Market, to be held Nov. 4-8 in Miami Beach. Using the closed circuit video/TV system of the Konover (MUSEXPO '78 headquarters) Hotel, the videotapes will be transmitted throughout the hotel, including office/booths, hotel rooms and corridors which are equipped with TV set monitors.

Irving Re-signs Jennings

LOS ANGELES — Songwriter Will Jennings has signed an exclusive songwriting contract with Irving Music, Inc., as a renewal of his previous four-year deal as a staffwriter at Irving Music. Jennings is best-known for his writing collaborations with singer/songwriter Richard Kerr. Jennings and Kerr wrote "Looks Like We Made It," which was a hit for Barry Manilow.

Tour Mgmt. Co. Opens

LOS ANGELES — Richetta Osborn has announced the formation of Behind The Scenes, a new tour management company. Services will include the hiring of road crews, complete travel service, t-shirts and other promotional aids, budget coordination, publicity and promotional parties.

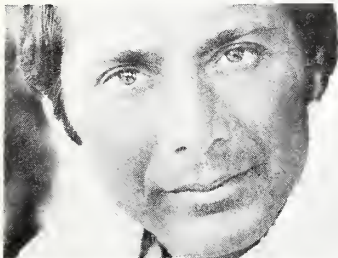

FRANKIE VALLI (Warner/Curb 8670)**Save Me, Save Me** (3:15) (Stigwood Music (Unichappel Music — Admin.) — GMI) (B. Gibb/A. Galuten)

Taken from the "Frankie Valli Is The Word" LP, this track was co-written by Barry Gibb and Albhy Galuten. With a solid dancing beat, fine melodic line, dashing strings and horn charts and a catchy hook, this song could follow in the footsteps of "Grease." Well-suited to Top 40 lists.

**ERIC CLAPTON** (RSO 910)**Promises** (3:00) (Narwhal Music — BMI) (R. Feldman/R. Linn)

Clapton is still working on his new album (tentatively titled "Backless") but RSO has released this first single. With a gentle country/rock shuffle beat, this track has a mellow arrangement which grows on you the more you listen. Marcy Levy adds sparse and pleasant backing. A soothing guitar line provides brightness. Top 40 hopeful.

**PAUL ANKA** (RCA JH 11395)**This Is Love** (3:35) (Camerica Music — ASCAP) (R. Tepper/M. Sunshine)

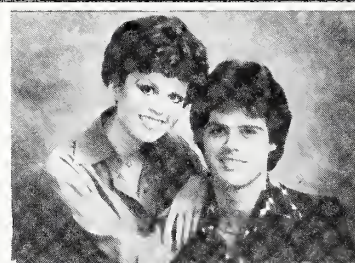
This second single from the "Listen To Your Heart" album is this week's highest debuting single. A gentle electric piano opening sets an emotional mood. As Anka joins in, the strings move in softly. The chorus is emphasized by a stark drum beat. Fine arrangement. Suited to Top 40 and AC/MOR.

**DAN FOGELBERG/TIM WEISBERG** (Epic 8-50606)**The Power Of Gold** (4:34) (Hickory Grove Music — ASCAP) (D. Fogelberg)

The "Twin Sons Of Different Mothers" album is #7 bullet on the album chart and this single ought to provide more momentum. A tale of lost souls and the lust for gold, this track has uptempo piano and guitar work. The production has considerable depth. Top 40 bound.

D & M (Polydor PD 14510)**On The Shelf** (3:38) (ATV Music — BMI) (S. Voice/P. Yellowstone)

Donny and Marie have a high media profile and this single taken from the "Goin' Coconuts" album is slated to receive a sizable Polydor push. A moderate danceable beat bolstered by congas underpins a lush arrangement of horns and strings. Donny and Marie trade off lead vocals and come together for pleasant harmonies. Light and fluffy, this is suited to a variety of pop formats.

**NEIL SEDAKA** (Elektra/Asylum 45525 — C)**All You Need Is The Music** (3:22) (Kiddio Music/Don Kirshner — BMI) (N. Sedaka/H. Greenfield)

This title track from Sedaka's latest album testifies to his ability to stay contemporary. Fast and funky rhythm guitar opens; R&B influenced backing vocals set the stage. Neil's voice smooths out the groove and makes it acceptable to various pop formats.

**LORI LIEBERMAN** (Millennium 622)**Let Me Down Easy** (2:59) (Touch of Gold Music/Crowbeck Music/Stigwood Music — BMI) (J.C. Crowley)

Taken from the "Letting Go" album, this track is about a love that is bigger than two. Lieberman is not widely known; this song may help expand her following. A broad chorus, fine guitar line and rich and evocative singing make this a Top 40 possibility.

**RAMONES** (Sire 1025)**Don't Come Close** (2:44) (Bleu Disque Music/Taco Tunes — ASCAP) (Ramones)

The Ramones offer a simple structure, hard driving rocker from the new "Road To Ruin" album. The production values emphasize clear guitar lines. Joey's lead vocals are effective and reminiscent of early British rockers. This track is not too hard. Pop playlists.

SINGLES TO WATCH

DOROTHY MOORE (Malaco/TK 1052)**Special Occasion** (3:49) (Unichappel Music — BMI) (S. Dees)

For those who may not be aware, Moore is a fine singer. This ballad shows her at her best — authentic and engaging. Jazzy guitar touches, strings, gentle horns and subtle percussion embellishments make this a winner for R&B lists. Pop potential.

PAUL HORN (Mushroom M-7037)**Witch Doctor** (3:30) (Scherzo Music — BMI) (L. Shifirn)

Taken from the "Dream Machine" album, this track has a funky bass and rhythm guitar bottom which provides textured backing for Horn's melodic flute work. Brass also ride the wave. If "Feels So Good" made your playlist, this interesting track may be of interest to you.

CHILLIWACK (Mushroom 7038)**Never Be The Same** (3:15) (Chilliwack Music/Mushtunes — BMI) (B. Henderson)

Taken from the "Lights From The Valley" album, this single opens with gentle acoustic guitar work and sensitive vocals. The pace picks up and electric guitar lines spice up the backing and add solid solos. Fine vocals and harmonies. Well-suited to Top 40 formats.

PAUL STANLEY (Casablanca NB 940)**Hold Me, Touch Me** (3:40) (Kiss — ASCAP) (P. Stanley)

The members of Kiss have branched out with four solo albums backed by big dollar Casablanca promotional support. This first single by Stanley is a ballad about love. Piano, acoustic guitars and strings and layered backing vocals underscore the romantic message. Nice electric guitar solo. Pop potential.

ACE FREHLEY (Casablanca NB 941)**New York Groove** (3:01) (Island Music — ASCAP) (R. Ballard)

Reportedly a 12" is coming out for disco action for this first single from Frehley's solo album. Solid handclap, drum beat holds down the bottom of this back in NYC celebration. Funky and rough rhythm guitar sits atop the beat. Suited to pop formats.

STARZ (Capitol 4637)**So Young, So Bad** (3:25) (Maximum Warp Music/Rock Steady Music — ASCAP) (M.L. Smith)

Taken from the forthcoming "Coliseum Rock" album, this first single by the five piece band takes a hard rocking tight lick drive. The guitars provide rough edged power chords for this story of life with a fake ID. Three chord rock, this track ought to attract AOR and pop attention.

MICHAEL STANLEY BAND (Arista 0368)**Baby If You Wanna Dance** (3:29) (Bema Music/Michael Stanley Music — ASCAP) (M. Stanley)

Guitars and synthesizer keyboards provide the overdrive for this single about taking things a little too far. High energy rock 'n' roll with understandable vocals, this track is suited to AOR and rock formats.

THE MEMPHIS HORNS (RCA JH-11393)**Party Line** (3:28) (Free Delivery Music — ASCAP/Wah Watson Music — BMI) (Burke/Ragin/Abrahams)

Swirling and spacy keyboards open this track from the "Band II" album. Funky guitar and percussion backing and crowd excitement tell the story of the party line. Soaring and fluttering horn work. Good R&B groove that may attract pop interest.

CHIC (Atlantic 3519)**Le Freak** (3:30) (Chic Music — BMI) (N. Rodgers/B. Edwards)

Chic proposes a new dance "Le Freak" on this single. Noted for "Dance Dance Dance," Chic delivers a handclapping disco song bolstered by solid bass work and airy vocals. Strings sweeten. Suited to R&B and dancing formats.

JERRY BUTLER (Philadelphia Intl./CBS ZS8 3656)**(I'm Just Thinking About) Cooling Out** (3:35) (Mighty Three Music — BMI/Fountain Prod. — ASCAP) (K. Gamble/L. Huff/J. Butler)

The album's name is "Nothing Says I Love You Like I Love You" and this first single is about searching for what you think you want. Perky beat, conga backing, strings, female singers and good lead vocals. R&B, pop lists.

MOON MARTIN (Capitol P-4639)**Hot Nite In Dallas** (2:59) (Rockslam Music — BMI) (J.M. Martin)

Moon's album is entitled "Shots From A Cold Nightmare" and this first single provides hot shot guitar work. Tough and gritty, the rhythm and lead guitar lines are well executed and commanding. Martin's vocals are supported by good backing vocals. An abrupt ending makes this a snappy track for Top 40 lists.

SAIL (UA-X1249-Y)**You're So Beautiful** (3:40) (Bounty Music — ASCAP) (V.C. Esposito)

Taken from the "Steppin' Out On Saturday Night" album, this first single is a smooth ballad spiced by jazzy guitar touches and congas. The vocals are gentle and sensitive. Suited to MOR, AC and other formats.

BETTYE LAVETTE (West End 1213)**Doin' The Best That I Can** (3:10) (Leeds Music/Sugar N' Soul Music — ASCAP) (M. Sameth)

This new track by LaVette has a moderate danceable beat and an arrangement of strings and percussion touches and backing singers. Bettye's lead vocals are effective. Suited to R&B and dancing formats.

A.M.O.S. (Brown Day BD 553)**Wally's Theme** (2:59) (Brown Day Publ. — ASCAP) (L. Forestiere/B. Rose/L. LoPresti)

This cookie man theme has a moderate groove with the goodies loaded on top. Fine, easy jazzy guitar work, nice horns and appealing accompanying vocals. This track is fun and suited to Sesame St., R&B and pop lists.

ALLAN CLARKE (Atlantic 3522)**I'm Betting My Life On You** (3:35) (Intersong Music/Timbote Music/Midsong Intl. Music — ASCAP) (A. Clarke/G. Benson)

Allan Clarke is well remembered as the voice behind the hits of The Hollies. Out on his own, this third single from his "I Wasn't Born Yesterday" album has smoldering pedal steel licks, piano backing and nice upward movement. Strings broaden the production. Top 40 potential.

AirPlay

LICENSING CONTROVERSY — The U.S. Court of Appeals ruling last week overturning an FCC decision to renew the license of Cowles Communications' WESH-TV in Daytona Beach, Florida may have far-reaching effects on the whole broadcast industry — including radio. The key point in the case is that broadcast license renewal, heretofore almost automatic unless a station has committed serious offenses against regulations, must be based on the incumbent's superior qualifications for maintaining its license compared to its challengers. The Court ordered the FCC to reconsider its decision in favor of renewal because giving the license to the challenger, Central Florida Enterprises, would have been consistent with the FCC's stated positions on the issues of diversification, integration and minority participation in broadcasting.

What the case means to radio, if it is upheld on appeal, is that the FCC's comparative renewal procedure will be substantially altered. No longer will stations have an automatic leg up on license renewal challengers based solely on their current possession of the license. The ruling is a blow to chain-ownership, but by the time the appeal process is completed the Communications Act Rewrite may have made the whole matter academic.

STATION TO STATION — **KCBQ**/San Diego and Wolf & Rissmiller Productions are jointly putting on a special **Foreigner** and **Walter Egan** concert at the San Diego Sports Arena to help rebuild the Aerospace Museum and Hall Of Fame and the Old Globe Theatre, both of which burned down last winter in two separate fires believed to be arson-related. **KCBQ**, programmed by **Joel Denver**, is planning to buy some of the tickets to give away as promotional items. Both acts are playing the date free.

WLEE/Richmond will send one of its jocks underwater wearing a special helmet, where the morning dive jock will broadcast live from the Virginia State Fair . . . New **KSFO**/San Francisco morning personality **Gene Nelson** has the unique distinction of having worked every shift at the station in his ten years there . . . **KWKI-FM**/Kansas City has been sold.

SYNDICATION INDICATIONS — On the subject of disco's continued growth, Studio West in Newport Beach, California has become the first programmer to offer a syndicated disco format to stations. Studio West's "Disco Fever" supplies stations with a disco library, weekly and monthly updates and customized station image packages. **KHNY**/Riverside is the first station to take advantage of the service. 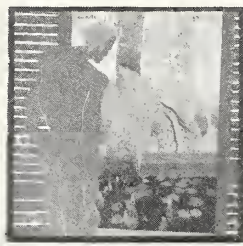

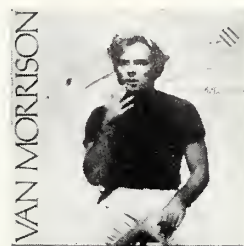

Springboard Socks Pickwick, AmCan With Antitrust Suit

increased its recording and manufacturing of "cover" budget records, and that, in reaction, Pickwick "recommenced the production of cover records to compete specifically with the cover records produced by Springboard. The suit further charges that Pickwick refused to purchase a single copy of a Springboard-recorded cover record of "Star Wars," which was nominated by NARM as the best-selling budget album of 1977. Later on in the year, it is alleged, when Springboard followed up with a cover of "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," not only did Pickwick again refuse to purchase a single copy, but within a month had produced its own cover version. The suit charges that "utilizing Port's knowledge of the confidential business affairs of Springboard, Pickwick has consistently produced cover records virtually identical to cover records produced by Springboard, subsequent to their production by Springboard," while refusing to purchase Springboard's product for their own retail division.

According to the Springboard suit, Pickwick also offered a higher royalty rate than Springboard to a potential licensee — one that in fact would have resulted in losses for Pickwick simply to keep Springboard from obtaining the license. Also, Springboard charges, Pickwick has used single Springboard albums to front for far less desirable Pickwick records in a Pickwick "pre-pack" of budget records.

Finally, the suit charges that "on or about August, 1978, Pickwick, through the defendant Smith, informed Springboard that Pickwick had adopted a blanket policy of refusing to purchase, for purposes of distribution or sale, any and all records produced by Springboard."

In the separate suit against American Can, Pickwick further charges that "in or about June, 1977, shortly after the purchase by American Can of all of the stock of Pickwick... American Can simultaneously terminated the employment of four key members of the management of Pickwick, namely the president, the chairman of the board, the president of distribution division and the executive vice president. These individuals were replaced by American Can with individuals who understood, sympathized with and agreed to carry out the defendant's plan to restrain interstate trade and specifically to drive Springboard out of business."

A Pickwick spokesman responded, "We at Pickwick and American Can deem the suit to be totally without merit and will defend the suit vigorously."

However, the label this fall will bypass a singular greatest hits program in favor of initiating individual campaigns for each of the albums. Capitol's greatest hits releases include two-record sets from the Band, Leo Kottke, Brinsley Schwarz, Renaissance and tentatively Be-Bop Deluxe. A top priority release is a single album, 14-song collection of the best of Steve Miller. Also, the label has slated a Sylvers "best of" album and a two-record live set by Helen Reddy titled "Live In London."

CBS Records will release a number of greatest hits albums, particularly stressing its country releases on both Columbia and Epic. NARM Sets Contest For Best Radio Spot

Entries to the contest, which must be submitted to the NARM office no later than November 5, 1978, are being solicited from the 3,000 members of the Radio Advertising Bureau in addition to NARM's regular membership.

The number of categories and awards in the competition will be left to the discretion of the panel of judges and representatives of the NARM Radio Advertising Committee, co-chaired by John Marmaduke (director of Western Merchandisers, Amarillo, Texas) and James Tyrrell (vice president of marketing, Epic, Portrait, and Associated Labels).

Some of the probable categories will be "Store Image," "Price and Item," "Special Sale," and "Artist Introduction." The number of categories and awards will be determined by the number and quality of the entries, which will be presented by NARM to a panel of judges selected by the Radio Advertising Bureau.

The winners will be announced on March 25 at the 1979 NARM Convention at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Florida, during a business session devoted to radio advertising. An audiovisual presentation on the subject will incorporate some of the commercials submitted to the contest.

Commenting on the awards, Joe Cohen, executive vice president of NARM, said that the program "will spotlight the importance of the use of radio to the merchandiser as a vehicle for establishing store image and promoting sales volume."

Amid a myriad of sound problems, the Brothers and their eight piece band made every attempt to put on a good show, having to stop several times to complain about the sound problems. The hard working band/dancers were really the show savers for the Brothers, being that their sound could not properly be judged.

Their hits were very well received by the audience with lesser known product slipping away because of the sound. Bass player, Lewis Johnson was most assuredly the highlight of the show playing an excellent solo, from his display of talent on the bass it is very understandable why he is nicknamed "Thundering Thumbs" as he constantly picks the bass as if it were a guitar.

On a whole the show was energetic, dramatic and visually balanced. The choreography was interesting, and held your attention when the sound left you hanging.

The Sylvers Enchantment

THE APOLLO THEATRE, NEW YORK — The Apollo Theatre continues to undermine its comeback attempt with a ten-dollar ticket top, but the sparse audience who attended the show headlining the Sylvers and featuring Enchantment were treated to a show that nicely balanced adult and adolescent entertainment.

Casablanca recording artists the Sylvers, are a family group who have followed the Osmonds' and especially the Jacksons' pattern of growing up and into a self-contained band. Their sprightly, pop-soul disco sound coupled with their adolescent performing style — which charmingly combines equal proportions of awkwardness and grace — make them front-runners in the Saturday Night Fever sweepstakes. This is embodied by lead singer Edmund Sylvers, whose highly stylized approach to dancing and singing makes him a perfect cross between Michael Jackson and John Travolta. Particularly outstanding contributions were made by Foster Sylvers, whose bass playing is the band's hidden strength — and who effectively offsets Edmund's pop charm with his brooding cool — and the strong, soulful vocals of Angie Sylvers. The group essayed a variety of material, ranging from their own oldies like "Hot Line" to contemporary standards like a Bee Gees medley, to their current hit, "Don't Stop, Get Off."

Enchantment, a Roadshow recording group, opened the show but displayed the kind of talent worthy of headliners. The band boasts exceptionally tight harmony, and front man Emanuel Johnson has one of the most compelling voices extant. His singing really stood out on the group's hit ballads, "Gloria" and "Sunshine." Johnson's stirring, howling falsetto was further enhanced by the mellow vocals of tenor Joe Thomas. Thomas fronted on "It's You That I Need," which unfortunately suffered from a weak live arrangement. That notwithstanding, Enchantment emerged as a group to watch closely.

Talking Heads

THE ROXY, L.A. — Dada met deco on Sept. 20 when the Talking Heads played the third of four sold-out performances at the Roxy. The date marked the fifth anniversary of the fashionable Sunset Strip bistro and the high spirits of the 500 clamoring Heads fans were well fueled by drinks on the house.

Talking Heads is a vehicle for lead singer and guitarist David Byrne's expressionistic reaction to American life and character. There is alienation in his lyrics as well as a gripping belief in the power of the artist to reshape that estrangement into redemptive art pieces. The quartet demonstrated that process with fifteen songs culled from their two critically acclaimed Sire releases, "Talking Heads '77," and "More Songs

About Buildings And Food." All fifteen songs featured Byrne's unique singing — a vocal amalgam of styles ranging from rockabilly war cries to a scat note wandering akin to the later Syd Barrett. Jerry Harrison traded between rhythm guitar and keyboards while Chris Frenzt drummed and Martina Weymouth exercised a stoic image and urgent bass lines.

The Heads closed the regular set with their notorious "Psycho Killer," and then returned three times for encores. Included was Al Green's ubiquitous "Take Me To The River" — the band's current single, and a final, near-perfect L.A. song: the Heads' own "Found A Job"; which does for television writers what Elvis Costello did for Top 40 radio programmers. Audience efforts for a fourth encore were met by the house lights.

Bill Chinnock

THE BOTTOM LINE, NYC — Bill Chinnock waited fifteen years for a shot at fronting a big-league rock 'n' roll band on a major label. And now that the singer/guitarist has signed with Atlantic, he's out to prove that his time has not been wasted.

The New Jersey rocker has developed a powerful repertoire of original material that can be heard on his label debut, called "Badlands." The LP blends the singer's rambling street imagery with a healthy dose of R&B muscle. It should be no coincidence then that back in the late '60s, Chinnock and Bruce Springsteen used to jam together when Chinnock fronted the Downtown Tangiers Rock & Rhythm & Blues Band in Asbury Park. (Springsteen, in fact, took over the group when Chinnock left the city to play the Southern blues circuit).

Beneath the sound of his band's crisp rock bite, Chinnock is a fine blues guitar stylist in concert. And, though the band primarily played up-tempo tunes such as "Outlaw," "Badlands," and "Lion In The Park," Chinnock's incisive instrumental breaks revealed that he had indeed learned from his apprenticeship with Muddy Waters, Albert King, and John Lee Hooker. But Chinnock is also a fine harp player, and he showcased that talent during a rousing encore of a new song entitled "Baby, Look What They've Done To Me," which featured excellent tenor support from sax men Sam Hall and Steve Fazio.

While Chinnock's music cries out with the poetic urgency so vital to songs that relate personal experiences, one can't help but make lyric comparisons to Springsteen. For instance, Chinnock's interpretation of Robert DeNiro's "Taxi Driver" monologue that Springsteen adapted onstage three years ago was a little too close for comfort, as were his references to Harleys, switchblades, snakeskin boots, and Chevrolets. Clearly, Chinnock will have to look beyond the blues to find his own style.

Maynard Ferguson

ROXY, LOS ANGELES — Maynard Ferguson brought his 14-piece band into the Roxy recently where they showed what contemporary big bands can do with a range of material stretching from TV and movie themes to jazz standards to opera. The only disappointment during the third of

six sell-out performances was the absence of an encore, despite the audience's resounding applause and cries for the theme from "Rocky," which was a hit for the trumpeteer two years ago.

Ferguson played five extended pieces during his hour-plus set, featuring different members of his excellent band throughout. Besides Ferguson on front-and-center trumpet, the band included four more trumpets, three saxophones and two trombones as well as guitars, drums and keyboards. But the white-haired trumpet player wearing a white jumpsuit at center-stage was clearly the star of the show, cleverly spicing the material with his clear, bold and challenging blowing.

Opening with "Birdland" and closing with a Pagliacci excerpt, Ferguson varied his program while still featuring much of the material off his new Columbia album, "Carnival." The high point of the evening may have been the theme from "Battlestar Galactica," the new series that brings the "Star Wars" concept to television.

The hundreds of Maynard Ferguson fans got an extra treat in the form of the opening act, a delightful scat-singing swing-rock combo known as Grover, Margret and Za Zu Za. The quartet (including lead, rhythm and bass guitars and drums) climaxed its set with a medley of swing classics like "It Don't Mean A Thing If It Ain't Got That Swing" and left the crowd howling for more.

Hoyt Axton

PALOMINO, L.A. — Sporting a pair of bib overalls and supported by a nine-piece back-up band, Hoyt Axton performed a polished set of his most widely-recognized tunes which spanned the pop, rock and country spectrums and underlined how well-rounded his songwriting talents are.

Axton even joked about how well-rounded a talent he is, saying, "I don't know how long I can play tonight, it's hard to hold my stomach in for too long."

Aside from the appeal of Axton's growling baritone and his knack for writing intelligent lyrics and infectious melodies, one of the most engaging aspects of his shows is his humorously roguish stage personality. Axton's apparently spontaneous, witty asides were heavily sprinkled throughout his hour-and-a-half show and managed to keep a collective smile on the face of the enthusiastically appreciative Palomino crowd. One of the funniest moments of the evening was Axton's delivery of a somewhat lengthy harangue about a trash bag full of drugs, delivered in a quick-tongued style similar to the approach used by Axton's buddy and fellow tale-spinner Arlo Guthrie.

Included in the night's repertoire were renditions of Axton's "Flash Of Fire," "Evangelina," "Never Been To Spain," "Joy To The World" and "The No No Song."

Axton left the spotlight midway through the show for three songs to allow his two back-up singers, Carol Hunt and Jana Lee and guitarist/harmonica player Mark Dawson to sing one song each. Hunt's treatment of Gram Parson's "She" was particularly moving.

Jana Lee delivered a spirited rendition of "Someday Soon," which was popularized by Judy Collins and Dawson sang a rollicking "Stagger Lee."

Magician Martin Lewis opened for Axton and immediately hushed the crowd with a captivating potpourri of prestidigitation, card and rope tricks. Lewis' quick wit and zany delivery were as entertaining as his magic.

CLASSICAL CLIPS

NEW YORK — **Julius Rudel**, director of the New York City Opera, makes his conducting debut at the Metropolitan Opera on October 7 in the season premiere of Massenet's "Werther," starring **Elena Obraztsova** and **Placido Domingo**. He replaces **Richard Bonyngue**, who had to withdraw from his fall commitments due to illness. **Joan Sutherland's** husband, may, however, conduct "Werther" starting in January, according to a Met spokesman. . .

Beverly Sills, who is scheduled to become co-director of the City Opera with Rudel in 1980, is about to shoot the pilot for a 90-minute late afternoon variety show on the CBS-TV network. For the past two years, she has hosted an NBC-TV New York series called "Lifestyles."

IN THE BLACK — That's the enviable situation of WNCN-FM in New York, which is expected to show a nice profit this year. Two years ago, the classical station was swimming in red ink when it was purchased by GAF Corp. from the Starr Broadcasting Group. Earlier, in 1974, the station had been doing so poorly that Starr had tried to convert it to a pop format. Listeners successfully fought that change, and the station's improved financial position seems to prove that a properly managed classical format can support itself. Today, GAF is so confident of WNCN's future progress that it has budgeted more than \$250,000 for the construction of a large, modern studio in the station's Manhattan headquarters by the end of this year. . .

AWARDS TIME — The International Record Critics Award committee, organized by High Fidelity magazine and meeting under the auspices of the Salzburger Festspiele, made its eleventh annual selection of the year's best recordings. Four grand prizes were awarded for 1978: The London recording of Beethoven's complete violin and piano sonatas, performed by Itzhak Perlman and Vladimir Ashkenazy; Janacek's "Katya Kabanova," conducted by Charles McKerras (London); Verdi's "Simon Boccanegra," conducted by Claudio Abbado (DG); and Dvorak's complete string quartets, played by the Prague String Quartet (DG), which is not yet available in the U.S.

The Koussevitsky Award, given to a living composer for an orchestral work recorded for the first time during the award year, was

presented to Jesus Villa Rojo for "Formas y fases," conducted by Antoni Ros-Marba. . .

MUSIC AND WAR — Pianist **Ruth Laredo** has been appointed visiting artist at West Point for the 1978-79 season. On October 15, she will lecture the cadets on the fine points of Rachmaninoff and will also play works by that composer. Asked why West Point has invited Laredo to be a visiting artist when the military academy doesn't offer music courses, Major Robert Whelan, Officer in Charge of the Cadet's Fine Arts Forum at West Point, said that the future officers want to learn how to appreciate music. "Also," he added, "we're very interested in her because of her own commitment to her profession. We see some relationship between the commitment she has shown and the commitment we would want our young men to demonstrate to their profession."

UNUSUAL NEW RECORDINGS — Previously unreleased tracks by the late **Marla Callas** continue to roll in from Angel's vaults. Earlier this year, Angel paid tribute to Callas with the release of a two-disc opera anthology, appropriately titled "La Divina — Her Greatest Recordings." Now two more documents have been made available: "Maria Callas — The Legend" and "Maria Callas — By Request." The latter recording was originally released in 1972. "Maria Callas — The Legend" contains arias from "La Sonnambula" that were recorded in 1955. From 1964 Verdi sessions comes one aria each from "Un Ballo In Maschera" and "Il Trovatore." And from Callas' final Angel sessions in 1969, two arias from "Il Corsaro" are presented. . .

Meanwhile, ECM, the Warners-distributed modern jazz label, has just released "Music For 18 Musicians" by **Steve Reich**. Reich is the composer of such esoteric, non-linear works as "Drumming," "Four Organs," and "Music For Mallet Instruments, Voices and Organ" (available on a DG set). The fact that ECM is behind his latest recorded effort may signify an awareness that this kind of music, like **Phillip Glass's** has an appeal that extends beyond the usual classical audience. Currently, Reich is on the road promoting the album, and in March, he and his ensemble will embark on a U.S. tour. . .

FRANCK: Sonata For Cello And Piano In A Major; DEBUSSY: Sonata For Cello And Piano In D Minor, "Minstrels" From Preludes, Book I, and "Minuet" From "Petite Suite." Daniel Shafran, cello; Anton Ginsburg, piano. ABC WG 8360. List: 3.98

This is the same team that brought us wonderful performances of Beethoven's cello and piano sonatas on an Odyssey/Melodiya release last year. Shafran's warm tone and deep sensitivity recall his great compatriot, Rostropovich, while Ginsburg provides sympathetic accompaniment throughout. Of special interest is the cello transcription of Franck's lovely A major sonata for violin and piano (which has also been recorded with a flute taking the solo part).



BARTOK: Concerto for Orchestra. Chicago Symphony, Fritz Reiner, Conductor. RCA AGL 1-2909. List: 4.98

The late Fritz Reiner's reputation has continued to grow over the years, and this re-issued stereo recording of the "Concerto For Orchestra" shows why. In the first movement, for example, meter and tempo changes are completely subordinate to the musical rhetoric; the brisk tempo of the Allegretto brings out its whimsical character; and Reiner's version of the Presto finale has a ferocious energy that evokes Bartok's folk music sources. All in all, one of the best available recordings of this work.



BACH: St. Matthew Passion. Haefliger, McDaniel, Ameling, Finnlae, McCoy, Luxon, Ambrosian Singers, English Chamber Orchestra, Johannes Somary, Conductor. Vanguard VSD 71231/4. List: 31.92

Somary leads a very idiomatically and neatly executed interpretation of the St. Matthew Passion with an excellent cast of soloists. Haefliger, who has portrayed the Evangelist in this work more than 600 times, makes his second recording of that role here.

Old Friends, New Faces Spark 21st Monterey Jazz Festival

MONTEREY, CALIF. — The Monterey Jazz Festival celebrated its 21st birthday with some new faces, some old friends and plenty of good sounds from both, as founder Jimmy Lyons had promised for the five concerts Sept. 15-17 (Friday through Sunday).

Those artists making their festival debut included Maynard Ferguson, Billy Cobham, Dexter Gordon, Ruth Brown, Scott Hamilton, J.C. Heard, John Hammond, Arnett Cobb, Al Haig, Kenny Burrell, Arne, Domnerus, the Hi-Lo's, the Grover Mitchell Groove band and Johnny Griffin.

They were joined by returning veterans such as Dizzy Gillespie, Milt Jackson, Ray Brown, David Friesen, James Moody, Mundell Lowe, Thad Jones, Mel Lewis, Eiji Kitamura and the festival's musical coordinator, John Lewis.

The 32,988 paid admissions (three of the five concerts were sellouts) generated a box office of \$222,916. By comparison, the 30,250 paid admissions last year produced a \$208,600 gate.

Broad Spectrum

As Lyons also had promised, this year's lineup was more in tune with the broad

spectrum of sounds that characterize modern jazz. The commercially-potent crossover movement which was represented by the Cobham and Ferguson outfits, was juxtaposed with the post-bop mainstream stylings of expatriates Gordon and Griffin.

In addition, Willie Bobo and his 10-piece band exemplified the Latin jazz idiom at its fiery, rhythmic best.

Any discussion of outstanding artistic achievement at this year's festival should

JAZZ ALBUM PICKS

MR. GONE — Weather Report — ARC/Columbia JC 35358 — Producer: Josef Zawinul — List: 7.98

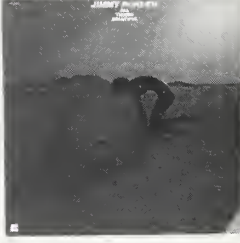
With each successive album since its inception in 1971, Weather Report has reaffirmed their pre-eminence in the field of jazz-rock fusion. And this LP, their eighth, is no exception. While the triumvirate of Zawinul, Wayne Shorter and Jaco Pastorius at times (on the title track, for example) lean toward the conventional concept of soloist over a rhythm section, the overall complexity of the ensemble work reveals that the Weather Report axiom of continuous soloing by each musician is still intact.

OUT OF THE WOODS — OREGON — Elektra 6E 154 — Producer: Oregon — List: 7.98

Oregon is a band which defies classification. Their music is spacy yet melodic, gentle yet intense, and rhythmic without swinging. Their first Elektra LP features a typical mixture of original material with reedman Paul McCandless and guitarist Ralph Towner soloing over shifting rhythm. Should be popular with the college crowd.

THERE WILL NEVER BE ANOTHER YOU — Sonny Rollins — ABC/Impulse IA-9349 — Producer: Michael Cuscuna — List: 7.98

This live recording of a 1965 Rollins performance at New York's Museum of Modern Art consists mostly of well-known ballads, given fresh meaning through offbeat rhythmic patterns and Rollins' unique improvisational style. The rhythm section, augmented by a pair of drummers (Mickey Roker and Billy Higgins), provides the perfect backing for Rollins' well-conceived solos. Choice cuts include the title track and "On Green Dolphin Street."



JAZZ: The 50s Volume 1 — Pacific Jazz 892H — List: 7.98

United Artists' decision to revive the Pacific Jazz label is a happy one. This is one of four recently issued anthologies featuring Gerry Mulligan, Chet Baker, Bud Shank and other kindred souls of the California jazz movement of the mid '50s. Tracks are well chosen and performances are of a universally high quality. More than nostalgia, the music sounds remarkably fresh today.

APOGEE — Pete Christlieb-Warne Marsh — Warner Brothers 3236 — Producer: Becker/Fagen — List: 7.98

A pair of ex-Super Saxmen team up here for a wild ride through the land of tenor sax bebop. Despite Marsh's strong (and well deserved) reputation, it is Christlieb who blows everyone away here. The rhythm is fine (Lou Levy on piano) and the sound is good. Well done all around and deserving of an encore.

ALL THINGS BEAUTIFUL — Jimmy Ponder — LRC 9322 — Producer: Sonny Lester — List: 7.98

Ponder's crisp guitar licks and mellow, reflective style are traceable to the Wes Montgomery school and well-suited to this collection of pop/funk tunes. He gets the full production treatment here, including voices and strings, on excellent arrangements by Brad Baker. The supporting musicians are also top flight, including trombonist Urbie Green who contributes a memorable solo.

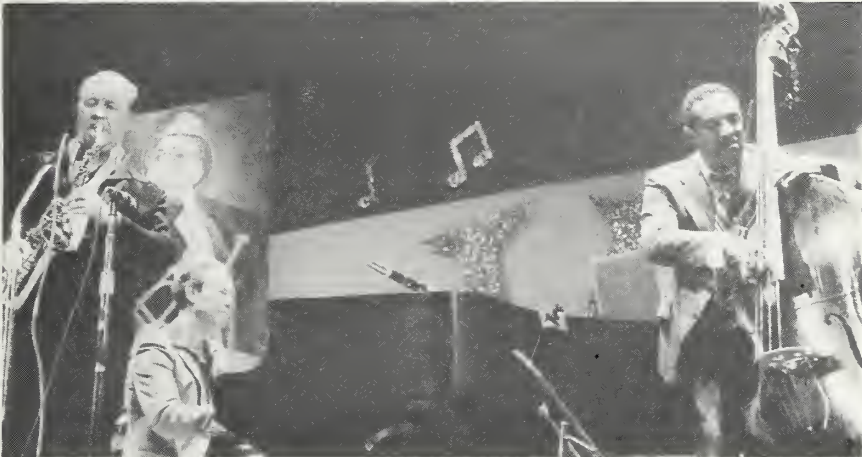

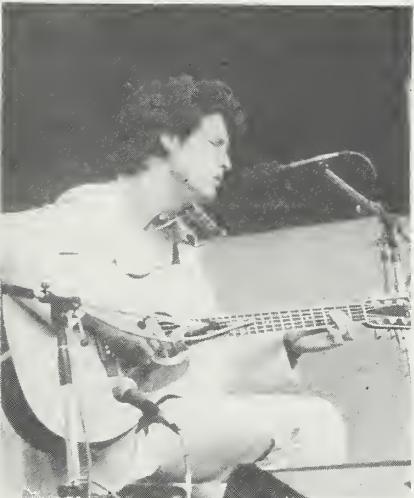

include a nod to 18-year-old Matt Catingub, whose dynamic "Monterey Suite" chart was performed by the California High School All-Star Jazz band. Catingub, who plays first alto sax in the band, was chosen to represent the all-stars during the upcoming mini-Monterey Festival in Tokyo, Japan.

Billy Cobham, whose powerhouse drumming is readily identifiable with the brand of music known as fusion, was the opening act on Friday. Propelled by an electric guitar,

bass and synthesizer, he got things off to a rousing start even before most of the audience was seated.

Performing without the services of its clarinet player, the group probably lost any mainstream adherents in the crowd who were contemplating crossing over. In any case, Cobham and his sidemen are excellent musicians who forcefully got their point across.

Bob Dorough, a vocalist/piano player in the Mose Allison mold, performed outside the arena curtain at various times while the stagehands changed sets. Bill Takas on bass provided the ideal accompaniment for Dorough's whimsical compositions.

Backed by the Monterey Jazz Festival Quartet, Ruth Brown scored with the emotional blues standard, "Mama He Treats Your Daughter Mean." Although the voice is not as powerful as when she began singing 30 years ago at the Apollo, her delivery is still masterful and provocative as she showed on "Skylark" and "Yes, Sir, That's My Baby."

Acoustic Jazz

Dexter Gordon's presence reaffirmed the joys of acoustic jazz. Opening with an original entitled "Fried Bananas," the towering tenorman showcased a superb tone, complex phrasing and depth of feeling that have marked all his live performances since his triumphant return to the States from Copenhagen, Denmark.

Fronting a trio that included George Cables on piano, Rufus Reid on bass and Eddie Gladden on drums, Gordon followed with the tenor classic "Body And Soul" and the Charlie Parker-Jay McShann line "Jumpin' Blues."

Grover Mitchell's big band did an admirable job of filling in for Stan Kenton, who was booked to perform at this year's festival but had to cancel on doctor's orders. With a supporting cast that included a bevy of former Basie sidemen, Mitchell's outfit certainly lived up to its name — Groove.

Buddy Collette on reeds and flute, Al Aarons on trumpet and Benny Powell on trombone shared the solo spotlight on textbook swing charts by Mitchell, Ellington and others. The smooth ensemble passages were the perfect backdrop for these soaring solo flights.

Saturday afternoon's concert was billed as "Really the Blues," and it was just that —

featuring a variety of styles and settings that ran the gamut from boogie woogie to urban Chicago to Louisiana Zydeco.

Opener Frank "Sun" Seals and his band set the tone with a traditional blues set built around Seals' soulful electric guitar licks and gritty vocals. His stirring rendition of "Call Me On The Phone" had the audience on its feet and dancing in the aisles.

Albert Collins, another master of the blues guitar, maintained the festive mood with the able backing of Mike Henderson's four-piece band. A pair of instrumentals — "Albert's Bounce" and "Frosty" — were sandwiched between timeless blues selections such as Jimmy Reed's "Baby, What You Want Me To Do" and Collins' own "Don't Lose Your Cool."

Diverse Stylist

Next up was Little Willie Littlefield, a diverse stylist whose barrelhouse approach to the piano will never go out of style. He saved the best for last, closing with his own classic "Kansas City," accompanied by 7,000 inspired patrons on hand claps.

John Hammond's influences include Robert Johnson, Muddy Waters and Big Joe Turner. A premiere 6- and 12-string guitarist, Hammond prefers playing alone with a harmonica holder around his neck a la Bob Dylan.

But his music is pure blues, with lyrics, timing and delivery that reveal a deep understanding of the idiom and all its subtleties.

Clifton Chenier is the foremost exponent of Zydeco — a rollicking dance music derived from Cajun dance tunes, R&B and blues. Along with a five-man group that included his brother Cleveland on rub board, he brought the crowd to a state of near frenzied hysteria with a lively set featuring tunes sung in English, French and Creole patois.

Playing accordion and dressed in a red suit and silver-studded headband, Chenier was clearly the toast of the afternoon, drawing the concert's only encore.

Saturday night was set aside for the inimitable Dizzy Gillespie, who opted for an all-out jam session with the help of some very special friends including Arnett Cobb, Buddy Tate, Milt Jackson, Ray Brown, James Moody, J.C. Heard, Al Haig, Arne Domnerus, Bengt Hallberg and Trummy Young.

Club-Type Setting

As the curtains separated to reveal a small club setting with the musicians seated at tables sipping drinks served up by a waitress, Gillespie's quartet played a couple of tunes before the guests began to step forward.

First up was the Texas tenor tandem of Cobb and Tate. Both men are acknowledged masters of the instrument, with Tate's mellow tone and restrained phrasings providing a nice counterpoint to Cobb's hard-driving aggressive style.

Each successive guest contributed to the continually changing texture of the music — from Moody's plaintive sax work on "Around Midnight," to Brown's effortless bass lines on several numbers and Jackson's dazzling vibes solo on "Night In Tunisia."

The show-stopper, though, was the voice of Sheyvonne Wright. Only 22, she is the perfect clone of a young Nancy Wilson, with the vocal range and control, phrasing, poise and sensual delivery that has made Wilson one of music's most enduring talents.

The one-two combination of "You Go To My Head" and "Stormy Monday" — the former a tempting ballad and the later a bluesy standard made famous by Billie Holiday — showcased Wright's uncommon versatility as a vocalist to be reckoned with in the future.

Willie Bobo's Latin Jazz Band closed the

jam session in dramatic fashion. Boasting perhaps his hottest combo ever, the veteran percussionist introduced material from his new Columbia album, "Hell Of An Act To Follow."

The band consists of a four-piece horn section, electric keyboards, guitar and bass and drums, as well as Bobo's sizzling timbales and vocals. And it proved to be a well-disciplined, highly charged unit on songs like Bob James' "Westchester Lady," "Summertime" and "Oye Como Va," in addition to the new tunes.

Clincher

The clincher came when Dizzy took over on congas and then joined Bobo for a modified version of the Mambo, which was the perfect ending to a fun-filled night.

Sunday afternoon featured the California High School All-Star Jazz Band with guest appearances by bassist David Friesen, Thad Jones, Mel Lewis and Kenny Burrell. The performance included new compositions written especially for the festival by Friesen, pianist Bengt Hallberg from Sweden, as well as unpublished charts under the direction of Jones and Lewis.

The Listen quartet, a Bay Area group led by saxophonist Mel Martin, kicked off the final concert on Sunday evening. The most striking performer in the group is pianist Susan Muscarella, who has the potential to become another Marian McPartland.

Tenor Summit

Buddy Tate and Scott Hamilton, the highly touted 24-year-old tenorman from the east coast, traded fours during a revealing summit session in which Hamilton seemed somewhat in awe of his more experienced partner.

In the meantime, Gryphon — the new Norman Schwartz label — bows in with **Mel Torme-Buddy Rich** ("Together Again for the first time"); **Barry Miles** ("Fusion Is") and Buddy Rich and the big band ("Class of '78").

Inner City ready to launch new series of East Wind (Japanese) and Black & Blue (French) in a coming release of a dozen albums.

Joe Fields of Muse Records gets into the licensing game via a deal with Timeless Records, a young but outstanding European catalogue featuring the likes of **Tete Montollu**, **Art Blakey** and **Cedar Walton**. LPs will share a joint logo.

Famous Door and Dream Street, two small labels with similar philosophies, each have new albums. "Tarrytown Tenor" by **Carmen Leggio** is on the former, while

Griffin Returns

Tenor player Johnny Griffin, making his first U.S. concert appearance in 15 years, offered a well-received set that showed his chops are still in excellent shape. Walter Davis on piano, Kenny Washington on drums and Tom Barney on bass provided competent backup support on selections such as "Autumn Leaves," "Monk's Dream" and "When We Were One."

Memorable Debut

As a follow up to reuniting for their first LP after 17 years, the Hi-Lo's made their festival debut a memorable one. Opening with "Georgia," they moved through a 10-song set that drew repeated ovations for their beautiful four-part harmonies.

Tenor Clark Burroughs is the featured voice, with Gene Pureling, Bob Morse and Don Shelton rounding out the unparalleled vocal quartet.

Maynard Ferguson's note-shattering big band closed the festival with a bang. Before showcasing material from his new "Carnival" LP, Ferguson began with a soaring rendition of Josef Zawinul's '70s classic, "Birdland."

Accessible Music

The set, which leaned heavily on the crossover/fusion side of Ferguson's repertoire, was punctuated with some straight ahead blowing by the leader and his expert associates as they essayed one of the most accessible directions in modern music.

The entire event was broadcast live by KBCA-FM in Los Angeles, KJAZ-FM in San Francisco and KOCN-FM in Monterey. In addition, the three-day quintessential jazz festival was taped for later airing by the Voice of America and the Tokyo Broadcasting System.

"Lady Be Good" by **Butch Miles** and **Bucky Pizzarelli** is on the latter.

Attention jazz promotion people: The October issue of *Musician* magazine has the most thorough exposition of current jazz activity ever collected. The 116-page report hits every state in the country and also Puerto Rico and Canada. Check it out and update those mailing lists.

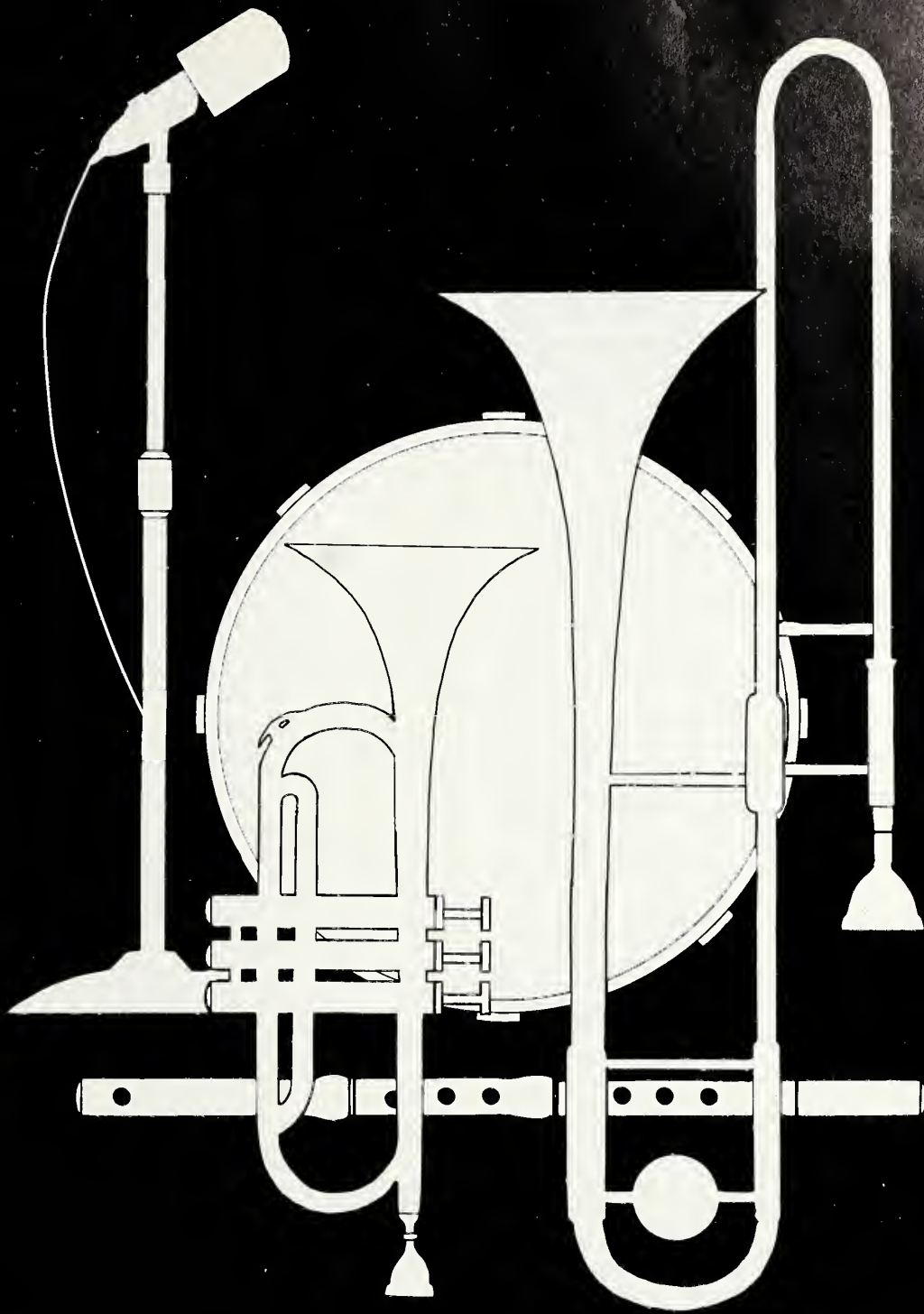

the retail level to backup airplay in a given area.

'It's Radio First'

"If radio can support us, then we have an obligation to make sure that we're supporting them," Gidion continued. "That means making sure the records are in the stores, the displays are up, and spots are on the air. Ultimately, it's radio first, anyway. That's where it's got to start, because without it, we really don't have everything we can work with."

In addition to the company's five regional reps, a total of 19 local promotion personnel will report to the executives. Selected by the regional reps themselves, the field staff was hired away from 15 different record companies, including most of the majors.

Another important step that Gidion and Swig took was to fill two national secondary posts at the company. Gidion explained that, by dividing the country in half, Andrea Ganis and Mark Alderman can better concentrate on specific markets where a record was breaking. Ganis will be based in New York and report to Gidion, while Alderman will work on Los Angeles and report to Swig.

Handpicked Staff

Infinity's regional reps were handpicked by Gidion and Swig in what Gidion termed an "exhaustive" search. "We've hired five very aggressive people who bring a knowledge of both local and national radio promotion to their positions." The company's regional representatives are: Frank Horowitz, who will be based in New York and coordinate activities in Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore/Washington, and Hartford/Buffalo; Bob Osborn, who will cover Charlotte, Nashville, New Orleans, and Atlanta/Miami, based in Atlanta; Wayne McManners, covering Dallas/Oklahoma City, Houston, and St. Louis, based in Dallas; Jim Taylor, who'll oversee operations in Detroit, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Minneapolis, and Chicago, where he'll be based; and Joel Newman, who will head the Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle/Denver areas. Newman will be based in Los Angeles.

Gidion pointed out that he would like to



keep his operation flexible enough so that eventually each area rep will be able to cover the same geographic locations that MCA uses in its regional setup.

As soon as the company's logo is designed, Gidion said, Infinity will release Robert Johnson's first single, "I'll Be Waiting," with his LP to ship at the end of October. A new single from Hot Chocolate, entitled "Every 1's a Winner," will also precede their first release later in the month. Product from Dobie Gray will follow soon after.

"We feel very strongly about our music right now," Gidion concluded. "We've got some things that we've lived with for the past four months, and now it's time to get them out. It's great to have people sitting behind desks who say 'let's put displays in these stores' without ever having a clue as to what it's like to be out on the street. That's why it's so important to have regional reps with a working street knowledge of what's happening at radio and retail. And we picked the best street criminals we could find."

First Seals & Crofts Golf Tournament Set

Jane Fonda Pairs Politics & Music To Aid Solar Energy

Dance" slated for Oct. 31 at the Stardust Ballroom in Los Angeles. Some of the celebrities scheduled to attend include, in addition to Fonda, Boz Scaggs, Tanya Tucker, Billy Joel, Thelma Houston, Cher, Stephen Bishop, Kristy McNichol, Cheryl Ladd, Peter Fonda, Mark Hamill, Karen Black, Susan Blakely and B. Mitchell Reed as emcee.

Fonda said the event will be advertised as a benefit for solar energy and that literature would be available at the dance. But there won't be any big speeches she said, that might turn the party into a political rally.

In discussing the solar project specifically, Fonda talked in general about the "marriage" of music and politics.

She said all the artists she has been involved with for the campaign have been "extremely supportive," but added that the degree of support often "depends on the issue."

People Get Conservative

"Any business that's as transitory and insecure as the entertainment industry tends to make people very conservative," Fonda said.

"The solar issue is not particularly conservative," she said. "There were people 10 years ago who would argue against the Vietnam war and feel they were right. But I have not yet met one artist who supports the monopoly of the sun."

Although she feels an artist may not be taking as much risk with his or her career in this issue compared to those who were early critics of the war, for instance, she still views it as a step in the right direction.

"The more people that get involved with benefits and see that they aren't getting ripped off, that they didn't get hurt or get burned, the more willing they will be to stick with it when (the issues) get a little bit rougher," Fonda said.

She also said she thinks the solar campaign is a perfect issue to be supported by people involved with the arts. "The sun has been the heart of religions, the source of art, health and songs throughout history," she said.

Lots Of Time

Fonda said she usually first contacts artists' managers about getting them to participate in a benefit show and that it can take anywhere from one to five months to set up firm arrangements for a concert.

"I lean on managers a lot because it can mean giving up a lucrative date, or plugging up a day off for a show which produces no money. Then if the artist agrees we have a meeting with the whole band so they all know what's going on and it doesn't wind up one guy supporting the cause and everybody else doesn't care.

"Most of my time as a political activist is

spent doing this," she added.

By next year, she said, the issue of solar energy should be won." At that time, the CED plans to establish a cancer commission to study various kinds of environment-related cancers and how they might be eliminated.

Responsibility

She also plans to involve both music and movie celebrities in fund-raisers for that venture. This is because she shares the feeling of other artists that they have a responsibility to use their fame to bring attention to important political and social issues.

"Entertainers have an important role in the forming of consciousness," Fonda said. "Especially with younger people who just sit and really concentrate on an album or film. We are always giving messages, whether it is 'go out and dance all night' or 'go for yourself' or just 'be happy.'"

"I'm not saying every film or every record has to have 'a message,' but I think people should pass through it stronger than when they entered it. We should use our art to make people happy or sad; even anger can be positive. But they should feel bigger than when they went in."

Spring Signs Douglas In Pop Market Move

LOS ANGELES — Spring Records, traditionally strong in the R&B field with artists such as Millie Jackson, the Fatback Band and Joe Simon, is planning a major campaign to penetrate the pop/country market, according to the firm's principals, Roy Rifkind, vice president, Bill Spitalsky, vice president and Julie Rifkind, president. To that end, Spring has signed TV personality and singer Mike Douglas, who hosts a daily network show on CBS-TV.

First Release

Douglas' first release on Spring will be a narrative ballad, "Alone At the End of A Rainbow," written by Alan Bernstein and Ritchie Adams and produced by Joel Diamond.

Friends, Musicians Doubtful Of '1st Elvis Record' Story

tend Presley never left Memphis before he recorded his first sessions for Sun Records in July, 1954. In addition, Floyd Ramsey, who has owned Audio Recording Studio in Phoenix since 1947 and engineered all sessions in the studio until the late 50's, stated he never remembered hearing the name Elvis Presley in conjunction with his studio. And he said he has never heard of Jamie Falco and The Red Dots. Also, Lee Hazlewood, who was a d.j. in Phoenix from 1953-57 and produced such acts as Duane Eddy in Audio Recording Studio (Hazlewood is now a producer and writer in Los Angeles), stated he never heard of a group at that time named Jamie Falco and The Red Dots.

In the Presley biography, "Elvis" (Simon and Schuster, 1971), written by Jerry Hopkins, and in other biographical data, certain facts in Presley's early life are documented. Presley graduated from Humes High School in 1953 and worked briefly for Precision Tool Co. of Memphis. He then started working for Crown Electric Co. sometime late in the summer of 1954 and drove a truck for the company up to his first recording session for Sun. Until road dates began to occupy most of his time, he continued to work for Crown Electric.

First Demo

Presley cut his first demo (for his mother) in the summer of 1953 at Sun Recording Studio. On Jan. 4, 1954, Presley cut another demo for his mother, and this marked the first time Sun owner Sam Phillips had heard Presley. Presley's first recording session for Sun was on July 6, 1954 when he cut "That's All Right Mama" and "Blue Moon Of Kentucky." Scotty Moore and Bill Black accompanied Presley on the session.

Jarvis, close friend as well as producer of Presley for 12 years, has heard the record and strongly denies it is Presley. Jarvis said Presley never left Memphis until he began traveling with Moore and Black after he began recording for Sun. Jarvis also said the recording quality on the record is much better than anything recorded in 1954.

"I have heard the record and there is nothing on it that sounds like Elvis," Jarvis said. "First, in 1954 there was no echo of the type used on that record and No. 2, Elvis Presley never left Memphis before he recorded for Sun. His father says the only

place he sang was at school and at church. That was it. And he was driving a truck for Crown Electric so it was impossible for him to be in Arizona where he was supposed to have recorded this. All they are trying to do is get as much publicity as they can. I know The Tennessean talked to Mr. Presley (Sept. 23 issue) because I talked to Vernon after that. Now to take some old guys' word against Vernon Presley is ridiculous. I have talked with Mr. Presley and he totally denies that Elvis could have been in Phoenix at that time. He simply said it was a lie. He worked for Crown Electric driving a truck right up to the time he did his first session for Sun in July of 1954.

"It is simply ridiculous," Jarvis added. "Just listen to the record. If you are an Elvis fan, you will know it is not Elvis. It doesn't take a genius or a sound expert. It is not even a close imitation. I am guessing, but I think the record was made since he died. Why didn't they put it out before when Elvis was so hot? Why didn't they put this out in 1957 or 58 when he had four records in the Top 10. Why did they wait until he was dead so he couldn't come back and deny it? Listen to the echo on there and tell me how it was done? There was only mono in 1954. There was no 2-track, no stereo. They could say, 'We added the echo later.' But it would have been on everything. There wouldn't be a little bit on this and a little bit on that. And back then they didn't use background voices. Elvis didn't know anything about voices. None of his Sun Records ever had one voice on it besides his. They used slap-back echo and that is different than what is on this record. They had to echo everything. That is why Bill Black's bass had that clicking sound and how Scotty's guitar had that funky sound."

Moore claims he was approached by Jackson approximately a year ago to endorse the "Tell Me Pretty Baby" record and declined. He also said Presley never left Memphis.

"I was approached about a year ago by Andrew Jackson, and he told me he had a record which was Elvis and would I endorse it," Moore said. "I told him it wasn't Elvis. He told me he bought this from Pete Falco and he had all these affidavits and so forth. I only listened to maybe 15 bars, and I told him there was nothing to it and he should

RCA Sets Waylon Campaign

NASHVILLE — In support of Waylon Jennings' new album, "I've Always Been Crazy," which is the first country album ever to be certified gold upon initial shipping release, RCA Records here is planning a massive marketing campaign. In addition to four-color mobiles, posters of various sizes, consumer and trade advertising along with radio spots, RCA will also employ a four-color inner sleeve in the album illustrating the entire Jennings catalogue.

Some Jennings catalog albums have received new cover graphics for the program, and a poster-sized reproduction of the album sleeve has been readied for retail store use. A 4 x 4 ft. board of the album cover, a five-foot Waylon standup cutout and a four-color poster of the standup will also be utilized in support of the album.

Video Cassette

In addition, a video cassette of a live Jennings performance (filmed on The Grand Ole Opry stage during a special show) will be serviced to accounts with video facilities and a large billboard will be erected on Sunset Strip in Los Angeles to coincide with the beginning of the Christmas season market upturn in November.

Also planned are special caps employing the orange and black Waylon logo which will be shipped to radio and retail personnel. To bolster airplay, a 12-inch version of Jennings' "Don't You Think This Outlaw Bit's Done Got Out Of Hand" backed with a Buddy Holly medley has been serviced to AOR stations.

Since May 30, 1976, when Jennings' album, "Wanted: The Outlaws," was certified gold (Jessi Colter, Willie Nelson and Tompall Glaser shared billing on the album), Jennings has earned RIAA Awards for six gold and three platinum albums in a two-year span.

On Nov. 24, 1976, "Wanted: The Outlaws" became the first country album ever to be certified platinum. "Ole Waylon" (the first album ever to debut at #1 on the Cash Box Country Album Chart) earned a platinum award on Oct. 7, 1977. And the "Waylon & Willie" album, which was certified gold on Feb. 3, 1978, went platinum on April 11, 1978.

"Dreaming My Dreams" was certified gold on March 24, 1977, "Are You Ready For The Country" reached gold status on Aug. 1, 1977 and "Waylon Live" earned a gold plaque on Jan. 13, 1978.

 get his money back.
 "Elvis couldn't have been in Phoenix," Moore added. "In the first place, he was working at Crown Electric, and he couldn't have very well left his job and kept it. He also wouldn't have had enough money to get out of Memphis."
 A number of people contacted cited the close relationship between Elvis and his mother as another reason to suspect his leaving Memphis to go to Phoenix at age 19. "His mother was so protective, she wouldn't let him go out of Memphis," Scotty Moore said. "There is no way he would have been going off to Phoenix or anywhere else at that time."
 Mrs. Tipler, who spoke of Presley as a "fine worker and beautiful child," said the Presleys were too poor for Elvis to have traveled to Phoenix.
 "He started working for us at Crown Electric right after he graduated from high

school, and he drove a truck," Tipler said. "He never went to Phoenix before or after he was working for us. He was too poor. His daddy was sick for awhile with back trouble, and he wouldn't have left his mother. He had to work to supplement the family income. That boy couldn't afford to go to town, let alone Phoenix, Az."
 Contacted at Audio Recording Studio in Phoenix, owner Ramsey told **Cash Box** he had never heard of Falco and the Red Dots.
 "I have lived here all my life, and I started a small recording studio here in 1947," Ramsey said. "I don't remember Jamie Falco and the Red Dots. I say I don't remember but that has been 24 years ago. If they were a big group here (the Red Dots were characterized as "one of the best groups in town" in the seven-page document telling the history behind the record) I was never aware of it. I don't remember hearing anything about Elvis or hearing the name around the studio. The way I feel, even if he were not known and he was in the studio, in a couple of years when he got hot, I surely would have remembered doing some sides on the guy. If they came in and did something as a group, it is possible I would not know all of the group artists. If they could come up with an invoice or bill, maybe. We were accurate and sent bills out on everything we cut. but we don't have records which go that far back."
 Hazlewood, who once produced Nancy Sinatra and owns Criterion Music in Los Angeles, also claims he has never heard of Falco and the Red Dots.
 "I was the only guy in Phoenix trying to make commercial records at that time, and I knew about any record anybody was doing in those days," Hazlewood said. "Recording in Phoenix right up to 1960 was basically me. I knew most of the groups around there, and I have never heard of Jamie Falco and the Red Dots."
 Last week, Freeman said some 60,000 copies of the single, which has the same song on both sides, have been pressed at Rainbow Pressing Dallas, Tx. Freeman also said no copies had yet been shipped to

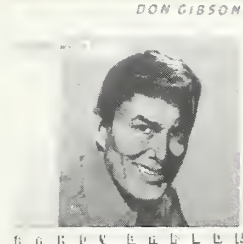

Fargo utilizes the songs of Barry and Maurice Gibb, Billy Joel and Barry Mann and Cynthia Weil, but she also includes five of her own songs on this LP. Recorded in Nashville, this album employs many of the slick production techniques associated with Los Angeles and New York studios.



LOOK WHO'S BLUE — Don Gibson — Hickory — HB-44014 — Producer: Ronnie Gant and Wesley Rose — List: 6.98
 Don Gibson is an old pro who has had his ups and downs in the music business. But aspiring country singers and writers would be wise to study the spare, smooth style of Gibson. Programmers should take time and listen closely to this album because it is excellent in every respect. Gibson has also included two classics: Leon Payne's "I Love You Because" and Mickey Newbury's "Baby's Not Home."



FALL IN LOVE WITH ME — Randy Barlow — Republic-RLP-6023 — Producer: Fred Kelly — List: 6.98
 Randy Barlow is a relative newcomer to country music, but his name is beginning to show up on a regular basis in the charts. There are some flaws on this album (a couple of weak songs), but on the whole it is a fine LP which should chart well. Best cuts are "Slow And Easy," "No Sleep Tonight" and "Fall In Love With Me."

While **Pres. Jimmy Carter** was talking Mideast peace, **First Lady Rosalynn**, along with brother **Billy** and his wife **Sybil**, were talking country at the White House. The occasion was a salute to NASCAR stock car drivers, and the hosts joined **Willie Nelson** on stage for a chorus or two of "Goodnight Irene."

The recent surprise **Grand Ole Opry** appearance of RCA's **Waylon Jennings** and CBS' **Johnny Cash** was only a warmup for shows they have planned together at two Tennessee college campuses. The former roommates will team up Oct. 18 at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro and Oct. 19 at Tennessee Tech in Cookeville.

Lucille Ball also visited the **Grand Ole Opry** House to tape a CBS special, "Nashville International," to air sometime this fall. Among her guests were **Mel Tillis**, the **Oak Ridge Boys** and **Tom T. Hall**. Hall sang "Old Dogs, Children And Watermelon Wine" and joined **Lucy** in a comedy skit.

The World's Oldest Rock Stars Together (WORST) performed for some 800 people Sept. 26 as part of a benefit on behalf of the Nashville chapter of the National Academy of the Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS). The show was highlighted by a dance contest, a costume competition and a WORST car giveaway. The benefit was just one way the NARAS Nashville chapter raises operating funds. Some of the funds will also be used to set up a couple of scholarship funds.

ABC's the **Oak Ridge Boys** broke all attendance records at the Tennessee Valley Fair in Knoxville Sept. 11 only to come back the next night and break their own record. They seem to have records everywhere. Their latest single, "Cryin' Again," is still climbing at #6 with a bullet this week, and the only place they are not hot is on the baseball diamond. Behind the pitching of ABC's Nashville president **Jim Fogelsong** they recently lost 17-16 to booking agent **Jim Halsey's** All Stars. The game was played as part of a kick-off party for **Roy Clark's** Fourth Annual Celebrity Golf Classic in Tulsa, Ok.

Ronnie Prophet set a 1978 attendance record at the London Western Fair in London, Ontario, when 17,500 fans turned out to see two performances by Ronnie and his band, "Whiskey River." He also hosted the Big Country RPM Award Show from Regina, which was aired live on Canadian network television. In October he plans a trip to England to tape two television specials for the BBC, one of which will be a Christmas special with guests **Larry Gatlin** and **Barbara Fairchild**.

Donna Fargo is preparing for a late fall tour to coincide with the release of her new Warner Brothers album, "Dark-Eyed Lady." Her syndicated TV show premieres in over 125 markets this fall and her single, "Another Goodbye," is #18 in the charts this week.

Singer/songwriter **Walt Wilder** just signed with Door Knob Records. Door Know president **Gene Kennedy** also announced the label's second release from **Sandra Kaye**, titled "One More Time."

CBS-TV's special, "A Country Christmas," is slated for a mid-December airing. Stars of the 60-minute spectacular include **Roy Clark**, the **Oak Ridge Boys**, **Loretta Lynn**, **Dennis Weaver**, **Lynn Anderson**, **Roy Rogers** and **Dale Evans**, **Jim Stafford** and **Minnie Pearl**. Minnie brings her country friends together for an old fashioned Christmas gathering. Scenes show each star en route to the party where they all join together at the end to sing favorite holiday songs. Families of the stars are also introduced.

MCA's **Jerry Clower** humored a crowd of 18,000 at KCKN Radio's "Day in the Country" in Kansas City, Kan., a free concert promoted by the station for its listeners.

Just across the river in Kansas City, Mo., **Tom T. Hall** and the **Storytellers** headlined the Fourth Annual Truck Drivers Country Music Awards Show. Also appearing on the stage at the Music Hall were **Marljohn Wilkin** and **Joe Sun**. A tape of the show was replayed over Nashville's WSM.

Joe Sun's "Old Flames" is enjoying a 15-week run on the charts and Joe has just released his second single on Ovation, "High And Dry," written by Michael Kosser and Curly Putnam. His "Old Flames" album will follow.

R.W. Blackwood has just signed with Scorpion records and his first release is scheduled for Sept. 29.

Glenn Barber walked into the offices of Century 21 Records, asked for a contract, and got it. His first session utilized 26 musicians and was produced by **Nelson Larkin**, arranged by **Ron Oates**. "What's The Name Of That Song?" is the name of Glenn's new record which is #63 bullet this week.

B.J. Thomas has returned to Nashville studios where he is completing work on his third album for MCA. Produced by well-known independent **Chips Moman**, this package is one of the first MCA projects since the appointments of new MCA officers **Jimmy Bowen** and **Eddie Kilroy**. Final marketing plans are underway to map out a complete campaign to encompass all aspects of product promotion. Particular attention will be paid to creating a heavy appeal in the pop marketplace where B.J. has continually scored since "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry" in the mid '60s.

Talent Buyers Seminar Set For Oct. 13-15 In Nashville

NASHVILLE — Seventeen acts, including **Ray Stevens**, **Jim Ed Brown** and **Helen Cornelius**, and **Tommy Overstreet**, will showcase their talent here Oct. 13-15 for the Country Music Association's (CMA) seventh annual Talent Buyers Seminar. RCA's **Charley Pride** will give the keynote address before the 400 expected participants who hire talent for state fairs, theme parks and other recreation areas throughout the country.

Don Romeo, president of the Don Romeo Agency in Omaha, Neb. and co-chairman of this year's seminar along with **Shorty Lavender** of Shorty Lavender Talent Agency here, said the three-day seminar will combine serious discussions of the problems associated with trying to gauge the public's taste as much as a year in advance with a showcase of established country acts.

"Purchasing talent to perform at major events through the nation is becoming an increasingly complex business," said **Romeo**, who along with **Lavender**, is a member of the CMA board of directors. "Today's talent buyer must be acutely aware of trends in the entertainment world. He must keep in touch with new acts destined for stardom and at the same time be an astute businessman. To be successful, you must combine the qualities of a P.T. Barnum and a Wall Street executive."

Seminar Expanding

Romeo added the seminar is expanding and drawing more participants each year because "this is the one time each year

when these professionals can come together to listen to experts and discuss mutual concerns with their colleagues."

This year's seminar will include presentations on the record company's role in promoting new acts, the obligation of the talent buyer to the public and to one another, and the relationship between the agency, artist and manager. Panel discussions will utilize music executives from trade publications, the music licensing organizations and major disc jockeys.

"The President's background enables him to know firsthand how country music can be a part of one's life," Walker said. "Like so many Americans, he grew up with country music and retains those strong ties with heartland America."

Country Discography Planned

NASHVILLE — The Country Music Foundation has announced plans to publish a massive country music discography, covering all country music up through and including 1942. Calling the work "a landmark in country music research," **Bill Ivey**, executive director of the Country Music Foundation, noted that although there have been works of similar scope in blues and jazz, this will be the first such effort in the field of country music.

The project has been aided by a \$7,500 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts which has allowed noted British discographer and editor **Tony Russell** to spend three months in the U.S. researching the discography.

10 Years In The Making

Russell, the editor of the British publication "Old Time Music" and author of the book "Blacks, Whites, and Blues," has been carefully compiling such a discography for over 10 years, and will be completing the most difficult and obscure sections while in the U.S. He will be doing the bulk of his research at the Country

Music Foundation Library and Media Center, which will also be his headquarters. In addition he will be doing some traveling to verify information and will be checking his older data for accuracy.

The discography will cover country recordings from the very beginning up until 1942, documenting the dates, places, personnel, and release numbers of all country records made, both released and unreleased. Obviously not all of this information is available, but it will reflect the current state of knowledge of the subject, and will for the first time bring all this scattered and unpublished information together in a set of volumes.

"We're very excited about this project," said **Ivey**, "and are particularly happy that the Arts Endowment liked it enough to give us some financial support. We hope that it will stimulate a new era of country music, both in the discovery of older performers who are still living, and in the reissue of important early discs."

The multi-volume set will be published by the Country Music Foundation Press.

BMA Prepares For Nov. Meet To Set 15-Month Priorities

LOS ANGELES — The Black Music Association is presently in the "gearing up" stages for their upcoming Board of Directors meeting Nov. 17-19. The board, which consists of 24 members, will discuss the BMA's priority goals, and their 15-month projected game plan of organizational issues.

The four divisions having representatives at the meeting will be: recording, headed by LeBaron Taylor; the performing arts divisions headed by Smokey Robinson; the communications division headed by Rod McGrew and the marketing/merchandising division headed by Calvin Simpson.

Recording head LeBaron Taylor said, "Our main goal will be to establish some achievable objectives. One of the main focuses will be on the BMA school of management, which will be in position to offer scholarships to students in and out of the organization."

Ed Wright, co-founder of BMA said, "The

game plan of the meeting will be to set up priorities, to establish short-term and long-term timetables so that we are in alignment with our goals. We now have a membership drive going into effect through the trade publications, that will put us in the correct position in that area. Like the Country Music Association, that has certainly done its job to perpetuate country music for the last 20 years, the BMA is certainly in a very good position to do the same. Wright also explained, "Certainly we have a different set of problems than does the CMA, but in our efforts to perpetuate the positive meaning of black music around the world, we are well on our way to getting the job off to a good start."

Jo Walker, CMA executive says, "The BMA is certainly in a better position than we were 20 years ago, we were at the stage where there were few country stations, and people just weren't playing country music at all. Top 40 music had such a hold on the industry at that time, we had a very hard

JOE LOUIS BENEFIT — Muhammad Ali, Frank Sinatra will host a benefit dinner for Joe Louis at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas Nov. 9. Over 1,500 are expected to attend the \$500 a plate dinner for the former champ. Many notables in the entertainment industry have agreed to participate, to make this event a memorable one. Proceeds from the dinner will go directly to the Joe Louis International Sports Foundation, which in addition to assisting the former champ, will also funnel funds into worthy youth programs and scholarship programs.

TAX BREAK — Last week marked the first time the FCC has issued a tax certificate, under its new policy of encouraging minority broadcast station ownership. The tax certificate was issued to Raymar Communications Inc. in connection with the sale of WYCH-FM in Hamilton, Ohio to YCH Associates, a minority owned firm. Raymar was having some difficulties with the commercial policy at WGGH-AM, Marion, Illinois and had been advised by the FCC that its renewal may be set for hearings unless some adjustments were made. Raymar decided to sell to YCH Associated for \$600,000.

MEETING WITH JAGGER — Rev. Jesse Jackson, head of Operation PUSH has called a meeting between himself, Mick Jagger of the Rolling Stones and Ahmet Ertegun, president of Atlantic Records, that is slated to be held at the end of October in New York. Bill Cherry, director of special projects for PUSH says, "The topic of the meeting will mainly discuss the controversial lyrics on the Stones latest LP 'Some Girls'."

MORE FROM MELBA — Melba Moore has a new label in Epic records and a new LP entitled "Melba". The LP features Melba's first effort as a writer, having written a cut on the LP entitled "Together Forever." The single from the album, will be the Bee Gees tune, "You Stepped Into My Life," that they had previously not allowed anyone to record. Melba is presently embarking on a sixty-city promotion and concert tour. With the possibility of also having "Purly" go on the road again with its original cast, which of course includes Melba.

ASHFORD AND SIMPSON TOUR — Nick Ashford and Valerie Simpson will embark on a 24-city tour in October. The tour will start Oct. 6 in Baltimore and end at the Tower Theatre in Philadelphia December 1. The highlight of the tour will be a special five-day engagement at the Belasco Theater in New York City Nov. 15-19.

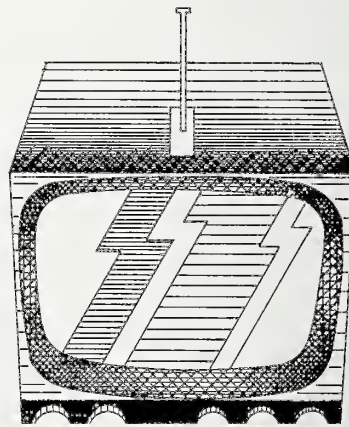

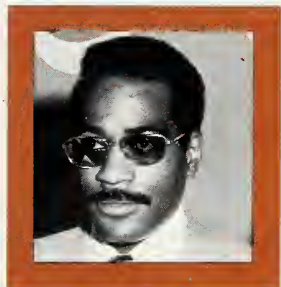

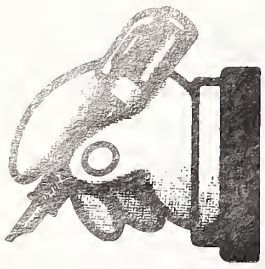

signed to a recording contract. After three critical successes, Sayer latched on to commercial accomplishment with Perry on "Endless Flight."

"The album and the singles have really changed my life," said Sayer, "particularly in my stage show, which I consider to be my forte. All of a sudden I've got an anthem ("When I Need You"), and my life has really taken a turn for the better. I wasn't ever sure that I was going to make it. After the third album ("Another Year"), Adam Faith came up to me and said, 'I think we've blown it on this album.' I thank a lot of people, among them Richard Perry, for helping me make it.

"I'd really like to do a live album next. I feel like I'm ready for it now. There was pressure to do one before, but I didn't feel like I had enough material to merit a live recording. Now I do. Whether it's old songs, or an entirely new set of songs, I'd like to have it all recorded live.

"But I don't feel as if I've accomplished what I want to yet. Every day I find new things that I want to do. Film appeals to me, but there's lots of time for that. Mainly what I want to do is to convince people that I am for real. I think that people who come to see me in concert know that. But I always feel as if there's a huge audience out there that I have yet to capture."

later they found themselves together at UNI Records, an MCA subsidiary about to go under. They decided to leave together and go into the poster business. Soon their poster business was thriving and the duo moved back into the record business, putting together Eric Burdon and War and getting them a deal with MGM Records.

'Spill The Wine'

The group's first single was "Spill The Wine," and it was only the first in a long line of hits that is continuing today with the group's latest LP, the soundtrack from the movie "Youngblood." Burdon left the group early in its career, but War has continued to earn gold and platinum records with regularity.

With War as an established base, Far Out has grown into a large management and production company. Goldstein handles primarily the production area, while Gold's main business is management, but they work as a team when it comes to decision making. Gold says, "We do everything together except make love, and that's only because we have different tastes."

Outspokenness

Gold has a quip for most every occasion and he has developed a reputation as one of the record industry's most colorful characters. But he doesn't believe his outspoken stance damages the artists he represents.

"My outspokenness doesn't hurt my artists as much as conformity would," explains Gold. "I'd rather put a slight dent in their economic career than a large dent in their artistic career."

Gold has often clashed with record executives over their handling of Far Out artists. As he sees it, the artists provide the industry's stability and the executives supply the instability.

'Executive Ego'

"Executive ego is the motivating force in the record industry today," says Gold. "There are exceptions, people like Joe Smith and Jerry Moss who make honest commitments to their artists, and they prove themselves with consistent success. But if a label president knows his job and reputation depend on performance over the next 90 days, too many of them are willing to sacrifice artists' careers to get phoney billings to keep their gigs.

"Record companies deal in quarters, we deal in artists. At least artists have their music as a basis for integrity."

To get around the problems they have

had with record companies, Far Out formed its own record label called LAX. Gold says that LAX is becoming a force outside the U.S., but he adds there hasn't been enough time to build the right team to operate the label domestically. Gold and Goldstein are both kept extremely busy handling the careers of Far Out's current roster, which includes Charles Miller, Howard Scott, Jimmy Witherspoon, Ike White, Aalon, Redbone, Linda Creed and La Costa as well as War and its solo acts, Tucker and the Laws siblings, Ronnie and Eloise.

Motion Pictures

Gold has found time to get involved in a pair of film ventures. One, "Youngblood" featuring a soundtrack by War, is currently in theatres around the country and the other is a film about the final tour of the Jimi Hendrix Experience leading up to the great guitarist's untimely death.

"Aion Communications, 'Youngblood's' producers, asked us to see the film and the guys in War wanted to do the soundtrack," notes Gold. "Lonnie Jordan is a personal friend of Lawrence-Hilton Jacobs, one of the movie's stars, so there was also that incentive. But the producers were so anxious to have War do the soundtrack that they gave up a percentage of the film to the group, but we didn't give up any percentage of the proceeds from the soundtrack album."

The Hendrix film has been an ongoing project for Gold since the legendary guitarist's death eight years ago. Litigation has held it up for most of that time, but now Gold says nothing stands in the way of the film's release except for completing the final editing process. Gold traveled with Hendrix for the last few months of his life. In fact, the last time Hendrix played in public was with Eric Burdon and War. Gold predicts the finished Hendrix film will be in theatres sometime next year.

A Crazy Guy

Gold often refers to himself as a crazy guy. Judging by the work load he has given himself, between handling negotiations, management, and doing publicity for the Far Out roster, running LAX Records, supervising the completion of the Jimi Hendrix film and keeping abreast of the ever-changing music industry, it is easy to see why. But being crazy doesn't keep him from taking care of business.

"Of course I'm crazy," laughs Gold, "but that has no bearing on the validity of what I say."

Soon to be made available internationally by EMI/Angel is an LP of Baroque music by the National Iranian Radio and Television Orchestra. Formed in 1967, shortly after the National Iranian Television began operation, the orchestra has a broad repertoire ranging from baroque through 20th Century music. They have toured Europe and the Soviet Union. Their album, slated for November release, was recorded in the Throne Room of the Golestan Palace in Tehran; and, while this locale may not improve the sound of their Vivaldi, it certainly adds to their zest appeal...

Finally, Telarc is releasing what is claimed to be the first commercial classical disc to be recorded in the U.S. via digital processing. The album features **Frederick Fennell** leading the Cleveland Symphonic Winds in a program of Holst's Suites No. 1 and 2. Handel's "Music For The Royal Fireworks," and Bach's Fantasia in G. Recorded in Cleveland's Severance Hall, the audiophile LP lists for \$14.95, comparable to the price on direct-to-disc recordings.

BMI CONTEST — A total of \$15,000 is available to young composers in the 26th annual BMI Awards to Student Composers competition. Established in 1951 in cooperation with music educators and composers, the BMI Awards project annually gives cash prizes to encourage the creation of concert music by student composers of the Western Hemisphere and to aid them in financing their musical education. Prizes ranging from \$300 to \$25,000 will be awarded at the discretion of the judges. To date, 231 students, ranging in age from eight to 25, have received BMI Awards.

The 1978-79 BMI Awards competition is open to student composers who are citizens or permanent residents of the Western Hemisphere and are enrolled in accredited secondary schools, colleges and conservatories, or engaged in private study with recognized and established teachers anywhere in the world. Entrants must be under 26 years of age on December 31, 1978. No limitations are established as to instrumentation, stylistic considerations, or length of works submitted. Students may enter no more than one composition.

Friends, Musicians Cast Doubt On 'First' Elvis Record Story

stores or distributors, although he said he is receiving a large number of orders for the record. Freeman said Jackson plans to retail the single for \$4.95 because he feels it is "so unique." Freeman has mailed out copies to reporting stations, and he named several large and medium-market stations which he claims are playing the record.

Freeman, who in an earlier statement said he was still skeptical himself if it was or was not Presley singing "Tell Me Pretty Baby," admitted he now believed the singer on the record was Presley. He also said new evidence is still being discovered which would prove the authenticity of the record. "I believe it is legitimately Elvis."

Freeman said. "We have affidavits by many people who knew and played with Elvis during the early days saying the record sounds like he did then. A man named Herbert Johnson, who works for the Mobile County News in Mobile, Ala. and who used to work for WAIP radio in Mobile, read about the record and heard it. He claims to be the first person who ever booked Presley before Col. Parker or anyone else did. And he said that is the same guy who used to come sleep on my couch down here. He is sending us a letter. Being a business man, if this was a scam, why didn't they take the 30 or 40,000 records down to Memphis last August and get \$10 apiece from all those fans who were standing in line crying tears? What would have been a better opportunity to make a big poster, take that car they have parked in my front lawn, and go to Memphis and say we have found Elvis' first record. Why didn't they do it? They were too busy authenticating this record as much as they possibly could.

"If I was not totally satisfied, I would kill the product," Freeman added. "I put out the Nashville rip-off book. That book has been

accepted by CBS 60 minutes as a guideline for shows they are doing. If anyone wants to claim this record is not Elvis, let them do it."

Jerry Bradley, head of RCA Records Nashville office, said, "I listened to about 15 seconds of the record before I turned it off. It's not Elvis. I played part of it for several people and no one believes it is Elvis. So I have just turned it over to our legal department in New York."

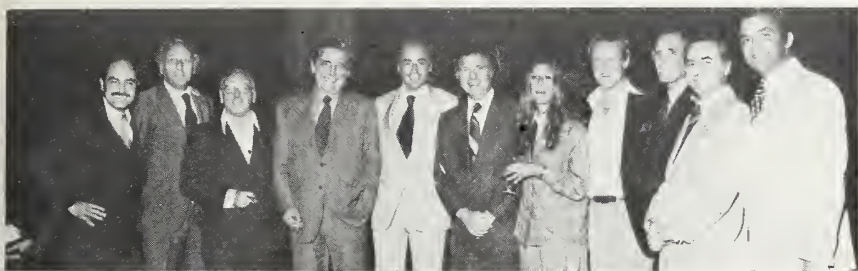

RCA Records Int'l Holds 3-Day Convention In Lisbon

LOS ANGELES — Accelerated worldwide growth (including establishment of new subsidiaries), the most aggressive licensed repertoire acquisition program in the company's history and a multimillion dollar commitment for acquisition and development of artists with international acceptance potential were the objectives set forth by RCA Records executives at a three-day international convention in Lisbon held by RCA Records International for the company's subsidiaries and licensees from 22 countries.

The meetings were chaired by Arthur Martinez, division vice president, RCA Records International, and were highlighted by an address by Robert Summer, president of RCA Records, who told those present that "We are assembling the resources to mount the most aggressive growth program in the company's history." Summer urged them to "play the game hard. At the same time, let's maintain our tradition of respect for the arts and apply the highest standards of business conduct."

In opening the convention, Martinez said, "I am happy to report to you that RCA Records, globally, has never been in finer shape, with a 50 percent contribution to sales and earnings being made by international subsidiaries and licensees."

Market Share Growth

Martinez further said that RCA's share of the world market was growing steadily, helped greatly by the breaking in the United States of such new acts as Toby Beau, Evelyn "Champagne" King, and the emergence of Bonnie Tyler as an international superstar. Martinez added: "However, I am not content to wait for that inevitable flow of successes from the United States. We will embark, under the general direction of Kelli Ross (division vice president, international creative affairs, RCA Records International) upon one of the most aggressive product acquisition programs in the history of this company. I intend to supplement and complement the flow of United States product with signings of artists and labels that have demonstrated commercial opportunity."

Martinez cited the Average White Band, which performed at the convention, as a perfect example. In order to support this period of expansion, Martinez told the dignitaries that he has embarked on a program to rejuvenate and energize his home office organization so it can provide maximum support to subsidiaries and licensees.

In the third major address of the convention, Kelli Ross said, "We are willing to spend time, energy and dollars in order to give you as much good music as is possible."

Ross gave verbal commitment to "more assistance in tour support, video taping and film, marketing and promotional items, pre-production sampling, advertising and press on product with potential no matter where it comes from, and any other form of support needed."

She noted that in the past year RCA acts from a number of countries had had their hits spread internationally, citing Bonnie Tyler (Great Britain), Lucio Battisti (Italy), Baccara (Germany) and Laurent Voulzy (France) and that the commitment and support from the home office is given with the intent to continue to develop international artists with worldwide capabilities.

Tyler Gets Award

Conference events included general sessions, artist & repertoire meetings, marketing sessions, and a gala showcase at Lisbon's Casino Estoril at which acts performing were Toby Beau, Bonnie Tyler and the Average White Band. Following her performance, Bonnie Tyler was presented a gold record award from Brazil, the first ever awarded a foreign artist by that country.

The convention was held at the Ritz Hotel in Lisbon with delegates present from RCA's subsidiary or licensee operations in Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Israel, Italy, Mexico, Norway, Portugal, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, Yugoslavia and the home office in New York. Publishers were represented from France, Germany, Italy, Spain, the United Kingdom and the United States.

Tellectra, RCA's Portuguese licensee, acted as technical host in arranging the complex convention.

Stiff Schedules Train As Key To Promotion Tour

LONDON — In a return to the 'package tour format' of the sixties, new wave label Stiff Records is sponsoring a nationwide tour by five of its artists. All five acts will have albums simultaneously released as the entourage travels around the UK by train to concert venues across England. An arrangement has been made between Stiff Records and British Rail Exhibition Trains division to ferry Stiff artists Wreckless Eric, Mickey Jupp, Jona Lewie, Lene Lovich, Rachel Sweet for the tour which runs from Oct. 10 to Nov. 19.

Sponsors from different areas of the music business will contribute to the cost of the train, which will have facilities to exhibit sponsors products as well as Stiff publicity material on the side of the exhibition car (one of seven forming the Stiff train).

Record dealers and the media will be invited on board the train as it arrives at the local stations on the circuit.

CBS Germany Celebrates Its 15th Anniversary At Parley

LOS ANGELES — CBS Schallplatten GmbH, the German subsidiary of CBS Records International celebrated its 15th anniversary recently during its annual convention at the Hotel Maritim in Braulage. Founded in 1963, CBS Germany has grown dramatically in the last few years, changing from a small company with 50 employees to a 300-person strong organization with a 1500% sales growth since its inception, according to CBS spokespersons.

20% Growth

In his keynote address to the convention, managing director Rudolf Wolpert praised the company for its accomplishments in the last year. Despite general stagnation in the singles business, he announced, sales for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1978 will be a healthy 15-20% above 1977. Wolpert cited big pop album sales as the main reason for the increase with gold album status being achieved by "Jonathan Livingston Seagull" by Neil Diamond, "Crime of the Century" and "Even in the Quietest Moments" by Supertramp and the double "Moonflower" album by Santana. "Santana's Greatest Hits" achieved a platinum award.

Wolpert also painted a bright picture for the future of the company. He cited the recent expansion and modernization of CBS Germany's distribution and data processing system as important aids in meeting future goals. The new distribution center recently inaugurated in Dietzenback near Frankfurt is connected to an equally new data processing system that can handle everything from incoming orders to outgoing bills, while at the same time serving as a vital communications center for all departments of the organization. Furthermore, the

new computerized system can now provide instantaneous information through video readout terminals.

New Signings

In the national A&R sector, Rudolf Wolpert announced the signing of long term worldwide exclusive contracts with the artists Denny Blue, Cisco Silver, Ingrid Peters, Wolf Biermann, Tina Rainford, Marianne and Michael, Ricky King, Paola, Lake, Costa Cordalis and Red Baron.

Wolpert also predicted that new albums from Bob Dylan, Meat Loaf, Boston, Neil Diamond, ELO, Nina Hagen Band, Supertramp and "War of the Worlds" "should easily sell 100,000 units, reaching gold status or better in the coming months."

1978 was a year of organizational consolidation in CBS Germany's marketing area. In the sales department alone, new sales manager Michael Anders created four new sections: sales administration with telephone sales, sales planning, customer service and sales development. In close cooperation with the promotion offices, sales offices were opened in various sections of the country. Centralized customer service was restructured under assistant sales manager Gerd Hilzbrich. In marketing, too, the organization was refined by assigning to deputy marketing director Uwe S. Fendt overall responsibility for product management, promotion (with Gerd Gebhardt for radio and Franz von Auersperg for TV) and press and advertising (with Stefan Droeger). Under Karlheinz Jost, the children's and folk music departments, special products, repertoire development and television projects are consolidated into a special sales division.

"In this way, we've been able to adapt our organization and personnel in the shortest possible time to the demands caused by our enormous growth in the last three years," explains marketing and sales director Gerhard L. Maurer. "We'll now be able to devote ourselves completely to expanding the sales potential of our superstars and helping new artists break through in the German market. Special attention will be paid to building up our domestic artist roster, applying completely new methods of marketing and promotion. It's my fixed purpose to make the CBS marketing organization the most creative and product-oriented marketing team in Germany."

Radio Lux. Sets First Live TransEurope Show

LONDON — Two of Radio Luxembourg's major networks are combining transmissions for a never before attempted live European concert.

The concert, a performance by American funk and soul band Rose Royce, at the Paradiso, Amsterdam, Holland, will be transmitted live on Sept. 23 and will be heard throughout Britain and Europe on 208m medium wavelength. Throughout Germany, the broadcast will be heard on VHF.

According to Tony Prince, Radio Luxembourg's program director, who has engineered the broadcast, "Each of the three major RTL Services (English, German and French) are extremely powerful in their own territories. My eventual aim is to provide listeners with prestige musical events as they happen on all three services. The broadcasts are live and the estimated audience — 100 million, taking in every conceivable area in Europe. Once the French service has re-scheduled its programming to facilitate these broadcasts the RTL network will function for the first time in its history. Needless to say the record industry is showing great interest, as the exposure is phenomenal."

Prince hopes to make live transmissions on a monthly basis, hooking up with major tours anywhere in Europe and using land-line facilities.

England Dan & John Ford Coley will begin their first overseas tour in Japan on Oct. 31 for five dates and continue on to Hong Kong on Nov. 6.

Barry Manilow has been set for his first European concert tour, starting at the London Palladium from Oct. 9-14. After London, Manilow will appear in Amsterdam, Brussels, Paris, Copenhagen, Hamburg, with his final concert in Munich on Nov. 3.

Paul Anka will be embarking on his third concert tour of Japan, Oct. 11-21, performing nine concerts in five Japanese cities including Tokyo, Kyoto, Kanazawa, Fukuoka, and Osaka.

WEA International's New Product Road Show Travels to 15 Countries

LOS ANGELES — WEA International, in the middle of the most successful year in its history, launched "International Road Show 1978." Essentially a new-product presentation, the show includes four individual videotape programs specially designed for this global tour by WEA International, Warner Bros. Records, Elektra/Asylum Records and Atlantic Records. The traveling "troupe" that delivers, introduces and discusses the presentation consists of top executives from the four companies.

The itinerary includes the WEA companies of seven countries in Europe, five countries in the Far East, and Canada, South Africa and Brazil. The idea of an international road show was conceived and inaugurated several years ago by Nesuhi Ertegun and remains unique in the international record industry.

Currently, Ertegun and his executives are en route to Brazil and South Africa to wind up the tour.

The one-hour international segment of the program was assembled and produced at WEA International's own audio-video center in Montreux, Switzerland. The facility, which has no counterpart among the competing international companies, is headed by Claude Nobs. The special segment consisted of music and footage submitted by WEA companies in twelve countries around the world (but not including the United States). It was directed and scripted by Stan Levine.

In his introductory remarks, Nesuhi Ertegun said, "In some cases, the performances are considered to have international potential. In others, a glimpse of local successes is designed to offer you an insight into markets other than your own. In all cases, the variety of talent gathered here is proof positive that WEA International is growing, that WEA International is progressing, and that WEA International is truly international in both product and perspective."

LONDON — Phonogram International will now distribute Rocket product throughout all the territories of the world, excluding the U.S.A., Canada and South Africa. This announcement follows the recent disclosure that Rocket terminated its agreement with EMI.

Negotiations took place between Aart Dalhuisen, vice president for pop product, Phonogram International in Baarn, Holland, John Reid, chairman of Rocket Records and David Croker, managing director of Rocket Records.

According to Reid, "We at Rocket are all very enthusiastic about the new association between ourselves and Phonogram. We believe that the alliance of this European-based organization with its aggressive marketing expertise and our own promotional activities will be of mutual benefit to both our companies."

The first Rocket album under the new deal will be the new Elton John LP, "A Single Man," to be released Oct. 20.

25 Entrants Picked For 9th World Song Festival

TOKYO — Twenty-five entrants from 17 countries have been selected after preliminary judgements for the 9th Annual World Song Festival which is expected to be held in Tokyo for three days beginning Nov. 10. CBS France Sets Strategy At Meet

by Claude Monnet

PARIS — At the CBS convention held in the Ury's Novotel, Jacques Ferrari, president of CBS France-introduced the company's short and long term targets which will include a new head office for the beginning of 1979, and the strengthening of the marketing, commercial and artistic structures of the company.

Jacques Ferrari unfolded in detail his new marketing outline; district by district will be co-ordinated henceforward by regional managers who will ensure use of point-of-purchase materials as well as utilization of regional medias. This ambitious scheme will be highlighted by the creation by the company of a marketing assay office to analyze public reactions on the company's products. In a move to emphasize its ascendancy in the French market, the company will restructure the sectorization of the field merchandising representatives, and create new appointments to allow more frequent visits to the stores. A product by product work system has also been established to allow better concentration of efforts between services.

On the other hand, newly appointed artistic managers will be in charge to co-ordinate the development of artistic careers in a short and long term. After Ferrari's speech on the new CBS orientations, Mechel Delorme, introduced the new products and priorities of the company which include: Dave, Joe Dassin and Anny Cordy's new albums in the national catalog; and Boston, Santana, Chicago, Aerosmith and Stephen Stills' new albums in the international category. Video will play an important role in international acts' promotion, he said.

At the dinner-party at the Maiesherbes Castle which ended the convention, Jean Paul Gastineau, marketing director awarded Alain Droz with the best representative of the year award and Michel Maudry, best regional co-ordinator award.

1977 represent 132 million units which is an increase of 22 million from the year before. Album sales were up by 23% and cassettes registered a 50% increase.

Some of the media and trade people state that this expansion is furthered by the disco boom which only started in this country some 20 months ago.

In addition, exports reportedly increased 43%. According to a customs statistics, exports represented 215 million Francs which means an increase of 43% in comparison with 1976.

In spite of numerous problems such as a 33% tax rate and a radio system in turmoil, the French record business seems in good shape.

Andre Hacklere, general manager of the Francis Day/EMI publishing company announced the visit to Paris of **Dolly Parton** on Nov. 13 for a live performance at the Mogador theatre and an extensive promo campaign organized by both RCA and the publishing company. All of Dolly's own work is represented by Francis Day/EMI in France. **George Lang**, night man on RTL radio station, long term fans of Miss Parton's talent is already dedicating special tributes on the air to kick off the event...

Yvan Pastor, general manager of the classical repertoire for Decca announced the appointment of **Helene Montussac** to the position of national promotion manager for the IPB/Decca classical catalog.

Ibach recording artists, the **Paradise Birds**, who sold last year over 200,000 units of their latest record "Back to America" will be the French entrant for the Yamaha festival in Tokyo in November, with their new single "S.O.S." which has just been released by Ibach Records distributed by Discodis. An album entitled "I Am A Song" is set for release for the beginning of October.

Daniel Petan, ex-Island label manager for Phonogram moved from there to Panache Publishing which is Island's publishing company in France.
