RALPH FLANAGAN ORCHESTRA (RCA Victor 20-4724; 47-4724)

- "I UNDERSTAND" (3:05) Here is a pretty ballad that is currently being revived and the Flanagan ork and chanter Harry Prime give it an added push. Could build.

SUNNY GALE & EDDIE WILCOX O. (Derby 796)

- "DO YOU CARE" (2:50) Chirp Sunny Gale offers an expensive reading of a good ballad while supported ably by the Eddie Wilcox ork. Songstress is building a following.
- **8** "MY LAST AFFAIR" (2:40) Another ballad is carried in top flight manner by the vocalist and ork with a resulting good sound.

 Not one, but two top flight vocalists get together for the first time on wax as Perry Como and Eddie Fisher turn out a delightful disk that could easily carry to the top. The top side is a light, lilting melody that moves along with a slow bounce and is projected with lots of warmth and skill by the vocalizing duo. Their individual efforts and the harmony are sure to make "Watermelon Weather" a forerunner of more of the same.



EDDIE FISHER

The Mitchell Ayers orchestra provides the necessary backdrop and helps add to the total infectious quality of the disk. Flip is another spright ditty that's delivered smoothly by the Fisher-Como combination and here too the boys have a side that should score. The waxing should break fast and with the following these two singers have it could really be big.

BUDDY DE FRANCO QUARTET (MGM 11250; K11250)

- "GET HAPPY" (2:38) The Bud-B dy De Franco quartet belts out its version of a fast moving oldie. Buddy's adept clarineting is highlighted.
- G"SAMIA SHUFFLE" (2:40) An original composition of Buddy's is sent soaring with a slow jump tempo and once again the lid features some fine woodwind playing.

BILL FARRELL (MGM 11256; K11256)

- "STAY" (2:44) A pretty ballad that could click is given good coverage by Bill Farrell. The Joe Lipman orchestra rounds the side out musically.
- G"BREAK THE BANDS THAT BIND ME" (2:51) A fair tune carried in a slow waltz tempo is delivered by the songster creditably.

DUKE ELLINGTON ORCHESTRA (RCA Victor 20-4712; 47-4712)

- "DANCERS IN LOVE" (2:17) An easy jump provides Duke Ellington with a chance to display some interesting piano runs. Alvin Raglin supports the ivories with his bass performance.
- "COLORATURA" (3:00) A slow item is jumped up in the middle and showcases the fancy trumpeting of William Anderson. The ork sets the solo off.

ERROLL GARNER (RCA Victor 20-4723; 47-4723)

- "STAIRWAY TO THE STARS" "STAIRWAY TO THE STAIRS (2:58) A lovely old ballad is given the stylized going over of piano virtuoso Erroll Garner. Result is smooth, mood music.
- "I CAN'T ESCAPE FROM YOU" (3:01) Another slow piano piece is dished up tastefully by the pianist.

EDDIE "PIANO" MILLER

(RCA Victor 20-4695; 47-4695)

- G"LONELY WINE" (2:26) A pleasant number is given an ok piano treatment by Eddie Miller. The soothing sound is listenable.
- G"SATURDAY RAG" (2:20) A good jump item is handled tunefully by the chord sweeper with a rhythmic accompaniment.

JOE KING & EDDY

(Rainbow 177)

- "HELLO EVERYBODY" (2:45) A song and dance vaudeville type presentation is banged out by Joe King and Eddy. The talk-sing presentation of the bouncer is listenable.
- CONEY ISLAND BABY" (2:49) A similar number is treated joyfully by the artists on the flip and should provide good bar room material.

NED HARVEY ORCHESTRA

(Rainbow 176)

- G"TRUE BLUE HEART" (2:50) A catchy tune with a moderate beat is enjoyably delivered by the Ned Harvey ork as Lee Rogers chants the lyrics.
- "TAFFY" (2:45) Ned offers a pleasing background as Bill Heyer and Taffy dish up a talk-sing vocal of a cute bouncy item.

JERRY WAYNE

(Derby 798)

- G"PEACE OF MIND" (2:55) A slow tune is smoothly treated by Jerry Wayne with the support of the choral group.
- B"TING-A-LING IN MY HEART" (2:46) Flip is a good presentation of a light, lilting melody as performed by the songster.

SKIP MARTIN ORCHESTRA (MGM 11248; K11248)

- G"(1 CONCONTRATE ON YOU" (2:39) The Skip Martin crew delivers a pleasing arrangement of a Cole Porter oldie with an easy jump
- "VILIA" (2:48) A faster jump "VILIA" (2:48) A faster jump item is given a rhythmic going over by Skip and the boys resulting in a listenable lid.

LEROY HOLMES ORCHESTRA (MGM 11247; K11247)





G "A MIGHTY PRETTY WALTZ" (3:00) Jeri comes through with a warm reading of a slow waltz item and here too the background is set up fittingly by the orchestra.

DOLORES GRAY

(Decca 28218; 9-28218)

B. "DIAMOND MINE IN MADA-GASCAR" (2:57) A pretty melody, an Armenian sound, and a wonderful vocal by Dolores Gray add up to a potent lid. Camarata supplies his deft musical assistance to the bouncy tune.

'DANCING ON THE GRAPES" B (2:15) Flip is a similar sounding number that moves along at a dynamic pace. The stirring reading by the vocalist and the lush backing make this a good one too.

SONNY CALELLO

(Jamison 5261)

o "WEDDING DAY" (2:36) Sonny Calello, supported fittingly by the Don Costa orchestra, handles a slow melodic number in pleasing

G"IN MY GARDEN" (2:24) Both vocalist and ork receive added assistance from the Robar Twins as they give all on a fair sounding tune.

RAY CURA

(Mercury 5856; 5856 x 45)

"DESIRE" (2:49) A slow romantic ballad is turned out appealingly by Ray Cura. His crooning and the lush backing compliment the tune expertly.

"BLUE BOY" (2:50) Flip is a pleasant item that once again is on the receiving end of Ray's impressive chanting.

BOB ANTHONY & LAURIE SISTERS

(Derby 797)

G "I JUST CAN'T CONTROL IT" (2:55) Bob Anthony and The Laurie Sisters harmonize on a slow ballad with the support of the Buddy Koster ork.

B "SHOULD YOU FORSAKE ME" (2:55) A pretty melody with a tango beat is presented smoothly by Bob and the girls while backed by the Koster crew.

Backing the songstress on "Auf Wiederseh'n Sweetheart" are fifty male voices comprised of soldiers and airmen of England. With Roland Shaw directing the orchestra and the entire ensemble the lid proves to be a mellow and beautiful proves to be a mellow and beautiful item that begs for continuous listening. Flip is another slow number with a pretty melody and here too the group, with Vera at the head, brings in a good end. The top one should build fast and ops are urged to get with it.

BURT TAYLOR

(Columbia 39754; 4-39754) -

"THERE'S DOUBT IN MY MIND" (2:39) Burt Taylor takes full advantage of the multiple voice technique as he chants the lyrics to a pretty ballad impressively. Percy Faith does a good job of setting the lid up musically.

"MORE OR LESS" (2:40) An-B "MORE OR LEGS (2. 12) other lovely ballad is given a feelingful reading by Burt and with the backing provided by the ork the lid winds up as a strong end.

AMES BROTHERS

(Coral 60751; 9-60751)

"CRAZY 'CAUSE I LOVE YOU" (2:05) A fast bouncer is belted out in sock fashion by the harmonizing Ames Brothers. The string backing stands out and adds to the appeal.

"STARDUST" (3:08) The wonderful old pop classic is worked over in the stylized fashion of the vocal group along with the Roy Ross orchestra.

EILEEN BARTON—BUDDY GRECO -PINETOPPERS

(Coral 60753; 9-60753)

G"YOU BELONG TO ME" (2:41) Eileen Barton, Buddy Greco and the Pinetoppers collaborate on a cute ditty that bounces along at a merry clip. A pleasant disk.

"RED ROSE WALTZ" (2:55) Flip is a slow waltz tempo item that carries easily via the combined effort of the artists.

EVELYN KNIGHT

(Decca 28227; 9-28227)

"IT'S BEST WE SAY GOOD-BYE" (3:20) Chirp Evelyn Knight wends her way through a slow and melodic ballad impressively while the ork presents a fitting backdrop.

B "PRETTY BRIDE" (2:37) The chantress deals up her vocal version of a cute ditty that's based on an old theme. The artist creates a "PRETTY BRIDE" (2:37) The good sound.

RALPH MARTERIE ORCHESTRA

(Mercury 5860; 5860 x 45)

B "IN A PERSIAN MARKET" (2:42) The Ralph Marterie orchestra offers a slick instrumental arrangement of a good jump item. The beat is projected forcefully.

B "STREET SCENE" (3:12) A grand old piece with a slow haunting melody is presented orchestrationally by the group with a cello solo by Ennio Bolognini. Good sound.

BUDDY COSTA

(Pyramid 900)





 Slim Whiteman reaches into the modern classics for his top lid waxing, "Indian Love Call," Slim warbles the romantic oldie with an easy delivery and smooth vocal.

The sincere reading and unbeatable material make a combination that is difficult to top and the western artist comes up with an effort that will win many coins for for ops who are discerning enough to get this disk into their locations pronto. Mountain echo sounds are used with good effect and help round out this fine etching. Flip side is a slow ballad with sentimental lyrics that Slim chants infectiously. The artist injects a light yodel into his rendition and it comes off in great style. Musical backing provided by the string band on both sides is solid and aids immeasurably in making both ends strong contenders.

JIMMIE OSBORNE (King 1066 and 45-1066)

G"WE CAN'T TAKE IT WITH US TO OUR GRAVE" (2:27) Jimmie Osborn drives out a fast moving item with a religious theme with spirit. Jimmie's nasal chanting is set up with a guitar backing.

G"HOW MANY HEARTS CAN YOU BREAK" (2:24) Flip is a sentimental weeper with Jimmie warbling a light bounce in slow tempo.

DOYE O'DELL (Intro 6048)

"THE MAN BEHIND THE THROTTLE" (2:25) A fast moving novelty is given a good vocal by Doye O'Dell who chants the beaty item zestfully.

"MABEL, MABEL" (2:30) Another cute, fast tempo novelty is belted out by O'Dell with contagious spirit. This is a live tune with infectious lyrics.

WADE MAINER (King 1074)

"STANDING OUTSIDE" (3:00) C A moderate beat religious item is taken for a bouncy spin around the wax by Wade Mainer. Wade's chanting is given an effective choral assist.

G"I'M NOT LOOKING BACK-WARD" (2:52) Another moderate beat gospel tune is chanted on this side by Wade. A similar arrangement and tune, but it comes out a better side.

60 "ON THE TRAIL OF THE LONESOME PINE" (2:23) With the assistance of wife, Betty Cody, the artist chants a moderate beat oldie. His smooth warbling and harmonizing with Betty make this a sock side.

TEXAS JIM ROBERTSON (RCA Victor 20-4710; 47-4710)

'PUT YOUR ARMS AROUND B ME" (2:20) Texas Jim Robertson sells a slow country weeper expressively with his deep voiced vocal. A fem choral backing helps him put the mellow tune over in pleasing style.

'LOW IN THE LEHIGH VAL-BLEY" (2:25) Robertson handles a change of pace in rollicking style as he sings the fast tempo tune in top flight manner.

JIMMIE SKINNER

(Capitol 2108; F-2108)

"DREAMING MY WEARY LIFE AWAY" (2:29) A slow sentimental piece is given the nasal treatment of Jimmie Skinner effectively. Jimmie's easy delivery of the sad lyrics is backed softly by atvings. is backed softly by strings.

I LOVE YOU" (2:36) Terry B Preston's feelingful delivery of the slow romantic melody makes this an engaging end.



MIAMI, Fla.—At last week's meeting of MAMOA (Miami Automatic Ing of MAMOA (Miami Automatic Music Operators Association) a resolution was passed condemning all pre-war juke boxes.

MAMOA will no longer service (or offer any association servicing) for any pre-war juke box on or after September 1, 1952

tember 1, 1952.
William Blatt, President of MA-MOA, reports that the resolution passed unanimously and that all at the meeting agreed this was a progressive step forward for the organi-

In the meantime, since the report of this meeting, and since the report of the ban from association servicing of all pre-war juke boxes by the growing Miami association, praise has been heaped on the organization by leaders of the industry.

One well known music leader stated, "This is one of the most progressive moves ever made by any group of

juke box operators.
"It means," he stated, "that the public in the Miami and Dade County area will be getting finer music, better tone, more beautifully attractive machines, and all will enjoy finer relationships in every regard."

All believe that this same step will be taken by other organizations throughout the nation where worn-out and old and battered equipment has won anything but good will from the public as well as from location owners.

The resolution is couched in such broad language that it definitely marks a new goal for all music operators everywhere to follow.

There is also no doubt that with this resolution more and more music operators from other cities and counties in Florida, surrounding the Miami area, will enter into the fold.

William Blatt stated, "In keeping with our policy to more closely co-operate with the automatic music manufacturers and distributors we feel that we should, most definitely, ban from any further service by our association any pre-war juke box."

What's even more interesting is that most of the work the plants here are taking on is in the electronics field.

The assemblers, engineers and, in fact, the average factory's entire personnel is well geared to this type of

There surely isn't anything as intricate today in electronics engineering as some of the products being produced in this industry, is the general

The manufacturers should be commended for their efforts in this direc-

It seems that there's just nothing they can't lick in electronics prob-lems This has won much commenda-tion for them. Both from Washington as well as from the large prime defense work contractors.

Almost every factory in the coin city. is engaged in defense work of one type or another.

Production lines are so arranged, in most cases. that the average coinman, who visits at one of the large factories here, doesn't even realize that a good part of these lines are onraced in an entirely different type of work than the regular domestic coin operated products of the manu-

For example, one plant, where only coin operated products are noticeable when the visitor enters, has more than half the rear part of the plant comrletely engaged in the production of defense materials.

Yet, the average visitor doesn't even notice this work. He sees only the coin operated machines coming off the production lines closest to his viewing angle.

In the meantime, regardless of all the greater volume production at the coin-plants here of new type coin orerated equipment, defense work continues apace.

Most of the manufacturers are taking on more and more war work each

ALLOTMENTS ON SCARCE MATERIALS

Mfrs Of Civilian Products Given Increase Above Current Levels. Steel, Copper and Aluminum Metals Still Tight, But Improved

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Henry H. Fowler, Administrator of the National Production Authority, Department of Commerce, this week announced higher allotments of controlled materials to manufacturers for the third

He attributed this improvement to Government material control measures since the beginning of the defense program and cooperation on the part of the industrial community in the conservation of scarce materials.

Fowler pointed out that many materials will continue in tight supply, altho some subsidiary metals may be decontrolled as their supply improves. "We must remember that the mobilization program is only half complete, and direct defense requirements for materials are still growing," he said.

Third quarter allotments for all household durable goods will be above current levels, and some will be substantially higher. In most categories of the durable goods division Aluminum allotments will be increased from 30% to 45% of the base period consumption from the 2nd quarter; and copper allotments will be 15% higher than given for the current quarter.

In the coin machine division, manufacturers of Automatic Merchandis-

ing Machines will be allowed the following percentage based on the base period: Carbon Steel 55%; Alloy Steel 55%; Copper Brass 35%; Copper Wire 40%; Aluminum 45%.

Manufacturers of amusement and other coin operated machines will be allowed the following: Carbon Steel 55%; Alloy Steel 55%; Copper Brass 35%; Copper Wire 40%; and Alumi-

Manufacturers of coin-operated phonographs will be allowed Carbon Steel 55%; Alloy Steel 55%; Copper Brass 35%; Copper Wire 40%; and Aluminum 45%.

Fowler, in releasing these allot-ments, noted that "authorization to many civilian industries will still be below their pre-Korean rate of use of the controlled materials, despite these welcome increases in allotments."

NPA also has set aside substantial amounts of steel and aluminum and some copper for distribution as supplementary allotments to relieve in-dividual hardship cases. NPA advised manufacturers who find that their third quarter allotments will work a hardship to file supplementary applications immediately, as these applica-tions will receive consideration in the order of their arrival.




