Atari has slashed the price of its handheld Lynx games machine by £50 to £130, slap bang in the middle of the year's prime selling season.

The move is being seen as proof that the firm overpriced its remarkable colour machine at launch, and that buyers are not prepared to pay £180 for a handheld games machine – no matter how good it may be.

Atari is spending millions of pounds advertising the stereo pocket arcade system on television, and youngsters are clearly hooked by the machine's capabilities. But, in the current economic blizzard, parents are finding it difficult to justify the asking

price – especially as a mono handheld from Nintendo costs less than half the price.

Atari privately feels it is promoting its superior product to the advantage of Nintendo.

The timing of the price cut is remarkable, even for unpredictable Atari. Pricing policy for the Christmas period is usually set in the summer, and deviancy is a rarity.

Clearly, youngsters who own Atari Lynx machines will find themselves popular in the playgrounds in the new term. Atari is hoping that its drastic manoeuvre will convince parents that the Lynx is a realistic Christmas treat.

Game hits town



Remember the incredibly addictive metropolis construction game Sim City? Now publisher Infogrammes is plotting to hook yet more people with a sequel, due to be launched late next year.

According to the firm's marketing manager Dominique Cor, Sim City II will be "more precise, powerful and colourful"

than the original. The "completely new" title is being built by French development team Maxis.

Sim City allows you to build a city from scratch and organise leisure and transport facilities. The challenge, is to make the city attractive enough for inhabitants and profitable enough for business interests.

Sky high simulation

Would-be pilots with a PC can take to the simulated skies and learn flying skills on their computer, thanks to a new aircraft simulation package.

Bristol-based RC Simulation is preparing to launch a realistic flight

program, with cockpit-style foot pedals and joystick, by mid-January.

To design the program the company drafted in an RAF pilot with 22 years of flying experience and it says the software could cut down flying time for learner pilots and give armchair users a taste of life at the flight control panel.

"It's more than just a game," said Bob Sidwick of RC Simulations. "The closest thing to it is simulation programs used by real pilots, but those have little entertainment value."



Bush chips in

Intel has received a National Medal of Technology from US president George Bush, for its work in the development of large scale integrated memories and microprocessors.

The Santa Clara based developer of the 386 and 486 chips was among eleven companies to receive the coveted awards.

Another computer related winner was Jack St Clair Kilby of Dallas, who made

"significant improvements to the silicon thermal print head". A Bush aide pontificated: "I join with all Americans in

join with all Americans in congratulating these people for their remarkable achievements which have so profoundly changed our world."

Computer cuts road deaths

While most areas of the country are continuing to experience an upturn in fatal traffic accidents, Suffolk has managed to reverse the trend.

The Suffolk Constabulary has enlisted a sophisticated computer analysis system which has helped reduce the road death rate by 24 per cent.

Suffolk police feed information of past accidents into the mainframe including day, place and time of crashes as well as the number of police in the area. The computer has picked out areas and crucial hours of the day when more patrols are needed.

This, in turn, has triggered a reduction in the incidence of drunk drivers, boy racers and other dangerous drivers.

Representatives of the famous family were at the recent Comdex Show in Las Vegas to announce the joint project, and to make enthusiastic noises about emerging technologies.



The idea is to create a technology which will allow people to "walk into a music video" using the Power Glove and ubiquitous VR goggles. The scheme is at an early stage, although the triumverate says it has developed software and a digital chip which will make these capabilities affordable for the home.



Home computer owners eagerly awaiting a 16-bit version of the *Bit Bopper* graphics sound-to-light system will be disappointed to learn that the project has been mothballed.

Tecnation, which developed the amazing top-end system, says it has neither the time nor the money to concentrate on a home computer version. The company says it has more crucial plans which require attention.

Bit Bopper is a £40,000 system which uses audio information to drive visual effects. In this way music is transferred into graphical or even real video images. It has already been used to great effect by bands such as Public Enemy, Soul II Soul and Mantronix in live events.

Tecnation had hoped to offer home users a cut-

down version for about £50, but it now says that such a program would cost too much in development and marketing costs.

Boss Alex Blok is working on a mysterious new hardware system which he claims will be of greater importance to computing than the launch of the Apple Mac. He commented: "My ambition has been to work on this computer since I was at college in the 1970s. It's a machine that will change people's lives. I think the technology has finally arrived."

He said he could not possibly spend time on a program for home computers, but hoped a heavyweight company would step in and license the *Bit Bopper* technology. "It would have to be someone like Amstrad to market such a program effectively," he said.





Adrian Crichlow told Express: "If we sell 2,500 programs then we can kit out 12 homes, and if it's a success we'll try and concentrate on a different area of the country next Christmas." Acorn will double whatever he raises.

Crichlow became involved because he runs a free computer tutorial for the Hawthorns kids. Most of the youngsters are not yet in foster schemes and are in the homes on a short-term basis.

Crichlow added: "Computers are good for children because it gives them a hobby and a distraction. It's something they can get involved in "

The idea of emulation isn't new. Many years ago the super computer mainframes of the large corporations fought wars with big blue IBM.

IBM established its own ponderous standard and forbade the addition of any software or peripherals that weren't its own. Before the lawsuits in the US, the only choice for the corporate computer user in the US was to stay with the up market high priced IBM upgrade path or go to alternative markets where smaller companies offered machines that could emulate IBM's ponderous and pedantic machinery.

Often the emulators were

better specified than the machines they were copying and IBM fought tooth and nail through the courts to protect its monopoly.

After litigation came new laws and companies could make boltons and upgrades for mainframes. This effectively killed the emulator market which went to sleep for thirty years to awake again in the late 1980s. Again the target was IBM, but this time the desktop replaced the air conditioned mainframe hall as the emulation arena.

The ST and the Amiga are well specified machines but with MS-DOS hogging the world serious software standard it was

Setting the standard

The emulators are claimed to be either XT or AT emulators. The IBM XT was a 8086/88 based PC with a hard disk drive. The IBM/AT was the first 80286 based IBM and also had a hard disk drive. The extensive cloning of the IBM standard has caused the definitions to become blurred.

Currently, anything running an 8086/88 series chip is known as an XT clone and anything running an 80286 is known as an AT clone. This isn't strictly accurate as the XT and AT specification demand hard disk storage.

To complicate matters, there are several display options for a PC. There is a text only screen made up purely fom characters in the ASCII set and the IBM extended set. Graphics screens come in several manifestations, but for the purpose of emulation, there are three. CGA, EGA and VGA. Most emulators are CGA (Colour Graphics Adapter) which is a pretty blocky four colour mode, but some emulators are now aspiring to the prettier and multi-colour EGA (Enhanced Graphics Adapter).

The light shining from the end of the display tunnel is VGA (Video Graphics Array) with its high resolution and well specified palette. No one has done it yet but at least one manufacturer claims that it will be with us in 1991.

EMULATIONE

With the announcement of a 386SX PC emulator for the ST, it would appear IBM clone wars are all set to invade new territory - the ST and Amiga markets. Keith Pomfret ditches TOS and AmigaDos to explore the mass of MS-DOS being made available.

a case of even though you can beat 'em, you've still got to join 'em.


Every week we hear of a new emulator or upgrade for an existing emulator. It seems that everybody wants the power, games and graphics of the 68000 based machines with the ability to do serious PC things as well.

UP FOR GRABS

The cheapest solution is always the software emulator. A disk (or disks) contain programs which make the ST or Amiga behave like a PC. The two best known are PC-Ditto for the ST and Transformer for the Amiga. Both run slowly and are fine as a method of putting the MS-DOS prompt on the screen to show that it can be done. Anything faster than a real time snail simulator is liable to have them puffing and panting and even curling up their toes.

The more expensive and more elegant solution is through hardware. A board contains all the processing power of a PC with all its associated circuitry and mates this with the input and output of the ST or Amiga in order to run a pseudo PC at a realistic speed.

The ST plays host to PC

Speed, an IBM PC/XT board, AT Speed from the same manufacturer based on a 286 AT processor and the Vortex AT once board, again a PC AT board.

In Amiga land there are two separate 'divisions' – those which fit into an expansion slot in the 2000 series and above and those designed to squeeze into an A500.

Commodore started the ball rolling with its A2086 bridge-board. This is essentially a full PC on a card and fits comfortably into a slot in an Amiga 2000. It is based on the PC/XT

and introduced a lot of people to machine emulation. An AT bridgeboard followed and relatively high speed PC processing was possible on the high end Amigas. The A500 grew its first hardware emulator when Bitcon announced the KCS Power PC Board to fit in the memory expansion slot underneath. Just announced is the Amiga A500 version of the AT Once from German hardware specialist Vortex.

EXPANSION

One of the desirable features gained from owning a PC is its

Software v Hardware

There are two kinds of emulator - those based purely on software and those based on hardware, but needing software to run. No-one has yet perfected a bolt on (or in) that does the job automatically.

Software emulators are essentially a program that reconfigures the machine to behave like a PC. Because they have to overlay MS-DOS on an existing operating system they are slow and prone to crashes. They can only ever run 'well behaved' software that remains within the MS-DOS specifications. This leaves out most games which address the PC direct, taking short cuts past the operating system. The single advantage to software emulators is that they're cheap.

Hardware emulators are a set of chips on a board which duplicate a PC in its entirety. All the PC jobs are done on the board and only the input/output is handled by the ST or Amiga.

Hardware emulators generally run a good quantity of software and as they have a PC processor on board they can fair whizz along. As they amount to a PC on a card, they are expensive. The cost can be anything from £200 to a princely £700 or so for some of the whizzier bridgeboards for the top end Amigas.

Emulation or duplication?

There must be a point when emulation stops and duplication begins. If you built the internals of an ST, Amiga, PC and Arch into a workstation it would be duplicating rather than emulating.

In the true sense, emulation should mean using the existing machine to replicate another. This definition has been stretched to include those 'emulation' boards that do all of the operating system work and leave the host machine only the interfacing jobs.

EXPLOSION

expansion capability. Cards can be placed in expansion slots in a matter of a couple of minutes by a non-technical person and the system can easily be built up to the required specification. When an emulator card is added to an ST or Amiga, it brings with it all the hardware features of the PC, but there is no facility to add PC expansion cards. This leaves the ST/Amiga PC person with a bare PC able to run PC software, but losing out on the expansion capabilities of the PC.

It is possible to get a PC emulator in an Amiga B2000 to address on-board PC cards, but this is currently the exception rather than the rule.

COST

When the cheapest PC came in at well over £1,000, the ability to turn a home computer into a fully functioning PC would have been a financially wise as well as desirable option.

With companies selling fully functional off-the-shelf PCs for under £300, the financial wisdom isn't a factor and indeed many would say that a cheap £300 PC with its expansion capabilities would be a better bet.

Even the existing Amiga or ST owner couldn't upgrade their own machine to full PC status for that price and even if they could, they wouldn't have the expansion capability of the PC. An added advantage would be that having a PC and an Amiga or ST would mean that it would be possible to run both machines simultaneously, thus increasing productivity.

The problem of transferring data and work from one machine to the other could be solved by about £4 worth of PD comms disks and a null modem cable costing less than a fiver to

make. The cost of buying a bare A500 Amiga and the cheapest PC would come to around £800 including a colour monitor for the Amiga. The 520 STFM solution would come in at about £720.

THE VERDICT?

Software emulators offer a considerable saving over buying an extra PC, but are only really good to prove that your machine can produce the elusive DOS prompt. The cheapest £200 hardware emulator would beat the combined machine price by about £100 in both cases. Some of the expensive ones would make it a more expensive proposition to emulate than to buy the

machine that is being emulated.

But if the prices seem way too high why not settle for just a PC/AT 102 keyboard?

While the ST and Amiga keyboards are a close match, they aren't renowned for being the most pleasant to type on. Third party manufacturers and software developers have awoken to this and there are already a couple of ways around the problem for the ST.

One solution is a software patch that allows a PC keyboard to be attached to the serial port of the ST. Dedicated PC keyboards for the ST and Amiga have been threatened but we haven't seen them yet.

It isn't only about cash

Other machines

Crazy as it may seem the 8-bit Beeb Master can do a passable imitation of a PC. The Master 512 is a board that attaches to the Master and does wonderful PC type things via the Beebs I/O ports. The Archimedes has a software PC emulator that chugs along at a reasonable gait and is happy to run software that keeps the MS/DOS operating system rules. Serious software poses no problem to it and it becomes surprisingly fast when running on an upgraded Archie that has the ARM3 processor. This makes it the only software emulator to approach hardware speed.


Macintosh owners with a large lump of memory to spare and the desire to ditch friendly icons for the austere CLI can go for Soft-PC.

The Future

Hardware emulators have shown that it's possible to put an entire PC on a card. This being the case, it shouldn't be too difficult to put any machine on to a card. There could be a situation in the future where you go to a computer dealer, buy a generic computer I/O box and slot in cards of the machine of your choice. You might, for example, start with a bare box and add a PC, hard drive and a Spectrum console box for the kids.

A compatibility interface could make null modems and media problems a thing of the past and as your system grew you would be able to mix and match different machines to suit your requirements.

It may sound a little far fetched now, but who believed in a hand-held super computer a year ago? That arrived this year with the promise of a pocket mainframe by mid 1991.

though. There's a certain status attached to owning a computer with the power to do things hitherto only managed by other machines.

An Amiga running the PC version of Autoroute or an ST happily crunching numbers of a spreadsheet like Lotus 1-2-3 is a desirable machine to own.

The mystique of persuading your machine to do something several miles above and beyond its brief is a situation that most serious ST and Amiga owners will aspire to.

In short, it's the current trend and, co-incidentally, it has practical uses too. Now there's a refreshing change!



Japs get tough with hackers

An upsurge in the Japanese computer crime rates have led to calls for harsh new penalties to be enforced against hackers.

If the Japan Information Processing Development Association gets its way, hackers will face sentences of up to one year's hard labour.

The IPDA is urging the Japanese Government to crack down on hackers who are wrecking computer networks just for fun. It wants to maintain "social faith" in the country's massive computer system.

The creation of computer viruses would also carry similar punishment as hacking.

A spokeswoman for the Japanese Embassy in London said that hard labour in Japan is "pretty tame" adding: "You know we're not talking about Siberia."

Intel trounces the Japanese a it l

200,000 THANTH

A computer capable of previously unthinkable speed, power and storage has been launched by Intel. The Delta System is based on a total of 528 i860 processors working concurrently to provide a peak speed of 32 billion floating point operations every second.

It beats the record held by the NCube 2 Scalar supercomputer for the past 18 months (Express 35) and, according to Intel, it provides twice the performance of Cray's top-end machine at "one tenth the price".

But Delta is merely a prototype for a monster of a machine which will effectively be nearly 2,000 times faster than the NCube 2. Due to be launched in the summer, the Sigma will consist of at least 2,048 processors and will be able to handle an astonishing 150 billion floating operations per second, or 100,000 million instructions per second (MIPS). The NCube runs at 60 million MIPS while a home computer, such as the Amiga or ST, can barely deliver one MIP.

It boasts a memory of 64 gigabytes, which equates to 64,000 Mb. There's also a storage capacity 0.5 terabytes

available in what can loosely be described as a 500,000Mb hard disk.

In order to get a grip on what these figures mean, we compared the tech specs to those featured in various home computers.

SPEED

The i860 chips are extremely powerful as single units, but they are relatively inexpensive. It's possible to buy one as a booster chip for a cheap IBM compatible. A games console based on one of these chips would blow away anything in existence.

But the Sigma operates by linking all the chips up to 'work together'. Since Intel unveiled the first parallel supercomputer in 1985, concurrent supercomputers have overtaken traditional machines in speed and market share.

Compare the astronomical operating speed of 100,000 MIPS to the Amiga's 0.5 MIP mathematical power.

The Sigma is 200,000 times faster than an Amiga. If you laid 200,000 Amigas end to end they would reach from London to Cambridge. Put it another way, in Amiga terms, the Sigma would

Number cruncher

A Weitek daughter-board has been launched which incorporates a normal maths co-processor and the Weitek Abacus 3167 chip. It's being aimed at power PC users who need total number crunching ability.



It could randomly generate fractal landscapes quickly enough to fly a 2,400 mph military flight simulator through it. So the landscape is created faster than the aircraft is moving.

If, in the game Stunt Car Racer the featured vehicle runs at 70 miles per hour, it would clock up 14,000,000 mph on the Sigma. Theoretically, your stunt car could zip around the circumference of the earth 300 times in half an hour. That is about one fiftieth of the speed of light.

MEMORY

With 64,000 Megabytes of RAM on board the Sigma is the equivalent to a quarter of a million Amstrad PCWs. Stacked on top of each other the machines would reach 48 miles into space – about eight and a half times

the height of Mount Everest. It could run 150,000 different word processors simultaneously, or hold 500 million copies of *The Satanic Verses* as document files.

STORAGE

The 500,000Mb hard disk has the same storage capacity as 20,000 average hard drive PCs. That amount of kit would cost you £10 million (plus VAT).

Using Intel's own digital video compression techniques, the hard disk could store 555 Hollywood movies – enough to keep you in front a screen for an entire month.

PRICE

The processors alone are worth £28 million – the property value of a medium sized housing estate in Milton Keynes. However, as Intel manufactures all components itself, the price, which will be arranged on a made-to-measure basis, will be considerably cheaper.

Intel will be selling its machines to universities, governmental institutions, military installations and space exploration agencies.

They will be working on com-

plex climatological modelling, satellite manoeuvring calculations and geological analysis.

The firm is confidently predicting that processing power will continue to double every year until the end of the decade.

MANDELBROT TEST

Readers of the original NCube story will remember our comparison between that machine's time to calculate the Mandelbrot equation – only a tenth of a second, compared to the six minutes for an Archimedes and 12 hours for a BBC.

 Amiga 2000: It had been hoped that the machine would be upgraded to become a 'budget Amiga 3000', but the firm says it will only be offering the A2000 with a 40Mb hard disk as standard.

Prices currently start at £1,200, and that is likely to rise a few hundred pounds.

A Commodore spokesman offered: "We want to

reposition the A2000 as an audio and graphics workstation, but the technical specifications will stay the same. We're not going to be changing the processor but we might throw in some software."

Many had predicted that the new generation A2000 would come with the 68020 processor instead of the slower 68000, as well as the Enhanced Chip Set featured in the impressive topend Amiga 3000.

Commodore's unimaginative "repositioning" is bound to rankle with Amiga watchers, who had been hoping for something special.



year's Commodore Christmas Show was the sixteenth of its kind in consecutive years, writes Sean mon - the fact that Commodore Masterson.

Since 16 years ago the company was known for its high powered programmable calculators, having previously been somewhat less renowned for making typewriters, you have to acknowledge that Commodore has come a long way.

The fascination with these annual Novotel affairs was justified by one of the dealers who was going through his own annual ritual, that of box shifting. He observed that unlike the expensive Olympia and Earl's Court venues, razzmatazz is absent from CBM's Christmas bash. What you get instead, he

claimed, is an unusual situation where those who are there as visitors have one thing in comcomputers play a significant part in their lives.

Old timers ICPUG would have agreed. The ultimate user group for all things Commodore has been making its presence felt for years at these shows and this year they turned out with high and membership. However, they're no longer the only visibly active Commodore users. The heavyweight fanzine Just Amiga Monthly (JAM), edited by former Amiga Computing editor Jeff Walker, dug in on the upper floor with its own stand and soon found itself under siege by users at large.

Commodore itself was as

aware of fresh blood as any of the user groups. Whereas the latter followed the usual course of friendly membership recruitment, Big C itself hit the mark with an arcade at the end of the lower exhibition hall, filled with Amigas and C64GS machines. As numbers of visitors rose steadily through the morning, this enclosure seemed at least as popular as the bar.

Apart from the top end MIDI technology being flaunted on Roland's stand, there was little in the way of new hardware. Commodore's stand was lined with new Amiga A1500s but attracting as much attention were the TV screens which were running Commodore's two new advertisements. Commodore is now running these in major ITV regions, on Sky and BSB and in cinemas across the country. The campaign will run until December 22nd and, along with its newsprint element, will cost Commodore £5 million.

Steve Franklin, Commodore's UK boss, said that the ad agency had been briefed to produce adverts that would reinforce the company's brand name image, rather than endorse specific products.

He said the one thing he admired about Alan Sugar was that the Amstrad boss had already achieved this aim. His only other statement, that Commodore that week had sold its half-millionth Amiga in the UK, went unheard on the exhibition floors.

The users busily scouring the stands and parting with cash at a healthy rate wouldn't have cared if CBM had only sold half a dozen.

Crossed Lines!

While looking through my old issues of Express, I noticed an article about phone phreakers and how they have been ripping off British Telecom. Well, I have just received my quarterly bill, and not surprisingly, feel the need to tell you how BT have been ripping off the British Public.

The cost of one unit of phone time is now, and has been for many years, 5.06p. Therefore, phone charges have remained at the same level for many years, right? Wrong. BT have been sneakily reducing the amount of phone time you get per unit. For example, one year ago, a local call during the cheap rate period would have units of six minutes in length – now you get four minutes. This means that a 30-minute local call to a bulletin board, or indeed your grandmother, would have cost you 25p, whereas it now costs 40p. This is particularly naughty, as Parliament did rule that BT couldn't raise charges for a few years.

You may have seen BTs new advert, informing us how fair it is for them to charge 43.5p for a call to Directory Enquiries. They say they will make it up to us by reducing phone charges by 6%. They forgot to tell us that they have just increased them by 50%.

Well you've certainly got a BT in your bonnet, haven't you Owen? Shame you haven't quite got your facts right.

For a start, BT reduced the cost of one unit of phone time (including VAT) from 5.75p to 5.06p in 1986. And a local call, cheap rate has 5.5 minute units, not

6 minutes as you say.

True, you will be spending more on your local calls at cheap rate – a year ago, that 30-minute call to a BBS would have cost you 27.59p, but it will now cost you 37.59 pee. But the local cheap rate calls are only one part of the service that BT provides – charges for standard and peak rate calls remain unchanged.

That bit about Parliament making rulings is just not correct, either Owen. Between 1986 and September 1989 BT took a voluntary price freeze, and is now regulated by OFTEL which prohibits BT from raising its main prices by more than increases in the Retail Price Index (RPI). Currently a 'RPI minus 4.5' limit is being applied – which means that the maxi-

mum BT could put its prices up after the June 1989-June 1990 rise in inflation of 9.8% is 5.3%. And this 'RPI minus 4.5' formula will hold true until 1993.

And while being charged 43.5p to ask BT for a number so that you can dial it and pay them some more money for a call does seem well iffy at first glance, BT's line on the matter is quite solid. Apparently, half of BT's customers never use Directory Enquiries, and three-quarters 'hardly ever' use the service. Some people, however, abuse the service – telemarketing companies, for instance. Some of them make as many as 100,000 calls to Directory Enquiries in a week – just so they can telephone you, get you out of the bath and try to sell you double

glazing. I don't see why my dear old Mum who has got all the phone numbers she is ever going to use written safely in her diary should have to fork out for these telemarketing chappies. Do you?

Oh, and before you ask - I haven't got any shares in British Telecom - I just like to see fairness and accuracy.

2) EASE OF USE. When it comes to serious work, I find the admitted primitive +3 environment more useable that Workbench (or MS Dos for that matter). I admit, however, that this is a matter of personal preference and I might be a bit biased, having owned a Spectrum in some form since late 1984.

When it comes down to it, the best machine is not necessarily the one with the best specifications, but the

one that offers you the most in terms of useability at an affordable price.



and-held consoles have been round for years, but they have always been limited. For a start they would only play one game – a bit tedious after a while. Another major problem was their display: the tiny black-and-white LCD left a lot to be desired for serious gameplay.

Last year Nintendo made the first move to set things right with the Gameboy. This machine featured plug-in cartridges allowing you to swap games easily. Unfortunately it still had a black and white screen (albeit a sharp and clear one) so games lacked a certain something. Nevertheless the Gameboy has been a smash hit.

Then came Atari with the Lynx. This revolutionary hand-held featured the same tiny colour LCD screen which has featured in pocket TVs like the Sony Watchman. The demand for the Lynx was so great that when it first went on sale in a couple of stores in New York and Chicago they sold out within hours.

Since then Atari has very much had the hand-held market to itself. Despite rumours, the gaming giants of Nintendo, Sega and NEC remained

curiously quiet. Then rumours began to circulate of new hand-helds; machines based on the already successful technology of consoles like the Sega Master System and PC Engine. Preview models began to be shown at the major American consumer electronics fairs, stirring up a lot of interest (and front page stories in *Express*).

move into December, these new colour machines are beginning to appear, unofficially imported into this country. We have got hold of a Sega GameGear and NEC's handheld PC Engine, and have given them a thorough playing with. We would have given the same treatment to the Atari Lynx, but Atari has yet to give us an evaluation machine!



Despite their obvious differences in the looks department, the two machines are extremely similar in operation. The LCD screens are the same 3-inch devices, both feature the now obligatory rocker joypad on the left to fit snugly under your thumb, and the two fire buttons are arranged diagonally to the right hand side. Both feature volume and brightness controls on the side and allow 3.5mm headphones to be plugged in to save your companions' sanity. The GameGear is slightly heavier at 600 grammes to the PC Engine's 450 grammes, but both are light enough to be comfortably carried around.

Both machines offer a cable link system to let you attach several consoles together to indulge in multiplayer action. The GameGear can link two machines, while the Engine can join four players. These links are particularly good for racing-type games, where your opponent appears on the screen.

The PC Engine version will cost about £50 and attaches to the right hand side of the machine. It offers the usual colour and contrast controls. The Sega tuner screws on to the back of the GameGear and operates in much the same manner.

similar; both use an 8-bit chip, but they are linked up to dedicated video silicon which controls the LCD screen so their performance is better than you might expect.

PORTABLE PC ENGINE

The portable Engine is made of tough grey plastic. It has a recessed 2.6 inch screen with a speaker sitting centrally below it. The unit weighs around a pound and measures 185 x 109 x 45mm.

It has the standard joypad to the left with buttons one and two diagonally to the right. Below them are turbo option sliders and select/run buttons. The left side houses volume and brightness controls, ear jack and mains input, the right side the tuner input jacks. The power on/off is on top of the unit whilst cards slide in to a recessed back panel.

Hidden to the front is a 'comlink' jack which allows up to four players to play simultaneously.

The unit has a good solid feel and is stable even in the middle of a good thrash. The picture is good, but with detailed games like *Alien Crush* (a pinball sim) you do lose detail because of the small screen size. The sound is excellent – the speaker can blast away the six channel music and effects with great gusto.

A key advantage of the hand-held PC Engine, which goes a long way to making up for its high price, is the fact that you can use standard PC Engine games cartridges. Thus anyone who already has an Engine can save a fortune in software costs.

PC Engine games are expensive (£30 or more is not uncommon), but they are good, and the ability to play the same game on the move and on your home console is not to be sneezed at. Dozens of titles are available in PC Engine format already.



THE WHOLE UR HANDS

Colour hand-helds are the future of portable gaming. We look at two new machines all set to give Atari's Lynx a run for its money.

However when it comes to screen specifications there is no comparison; the PC Engine wins hands down. For instance in the colours department the PC Engine has two modes; a 320 x 224 pixels resolution mode with 256 colours, and a lower resolution 312 x 238 set-up with a huge 512 colours on screen – that's comfortably more than STs, Amigas and VGA PCs can handle from a device less than five inches across! The GameGear on the other hand offers the same number of colours as its carpet-bound parent the Master System – 16 chosen from a possible 4,096. In the GameGear's favour is its screen resolution, with 480 x 146 pixels.

Grey imports of both machines will soon be reaching the shops; outlets like Cybertech and Active Consoles will be offering the GameGear for around £180 and the PC Engine will follow shortly.

In Japan the PC Engine sells for just over twice the cost of the GameGear – 45,000¥ to 19,800¥. The British launch of the GameGear is due in the spring, and although Virgin Mastertronic is reticent about the pricing it is rumoured that it will come in at around £100.

It is unlikely that the hand-held PC Engine will be officially launched in this country – its been three years since the console version was first sold and NEC is still not interested in bring it to these shores. The US and Japanese versions of the machine are slightly different and will not run games from the other version, so be careful when buying grey imported machines and games that they match.

It seems likely then that there will be a premium to pay if you want to get hold of a PC Engine. Equally it seems that it will be worth paying; the PC Engine is an amazing piece of game playing technology.

THE SEGA GAMEGEAR

The GameGear is dark grey with a black central window containing the 3-inch LCD screen, with a speaker on the left-hand side. It is slightly heavier than the PC Engine, measuring 103 x 210 x 40 mm.

The joypad is located rather high and to the left of the screen, with the start button and two fire buttons on the right. The top panel contains the volume control, headphone jack, on/off switch, power adapter socket and a connector for linking two machines. The screen brightness control is on the right hand side.

To get the best view on the screen you have to hold the machine at a pronounced angle, but the joypad and buttons have been positioned so they sit naturally when you are using them.

The screen is not sharp and rapid motion becomes blurred. On a racing game like Super Monaco Grand Prix this is actually an advantage as the smearing of the background as you twist and turn gives the illusion of extremely smooth scrolling. With a shoot-'em-up though it might be difficult to see the targets clearly.

The sound on the GameGear is reminiscent of a CPC or ST – not brilliant, but passable. It features three stereo channels and a noise channel.

Unfortunately the GameGear cannot use standard Master System games. At the moment only three titles are in circulation – Super Monaco Grand Prix, Pengo (the classic block sliding game) and Columns, a sort of Tetris clone. Games cost around £15 in Japan.

Although games are limited at the moment, a company with Sega's muscle will soon ensure that there is plenty to be had. Already promised are titles like Wonderboy, Pro Baseball and Dragon Crystal.





Its Kick-Pascal system is a fully integrated programming environment that allows you to write, compile and run your Pascal programs from within a nice friendly editor – not unlike the approach adopted by HiSoft's successful BASIC system.

Kick-Pascal offers full support for the Pascal standard, but also offers complete support for the Amiga's own unique capabilities. Applications programmers are at last offered an alternative to the acceptable standards (C and Assembler) with a programming language that even fully addresses both 2.0 and ECS. Even if you don't possess an in-depth knowledge of the Amiga ROM Kernel, Kick-Pascal includes many in-built functions for such tasks as opening screens and windows, managing input etc. Kick-Pascal costs 189DM.

Amiga assemblers have always been the subject of dubious naming – Argonaut set the challenge with its ArgAsm system, but Maxon has beaten them with its latest release, Kick-Ass.

Just like Kick-Pascal, Kick-Ass offers a fully integrated programming environment that gives fully access to a powerful text editor, monitor, debugger, tracer and linker from within a nice friendly front-end. Never again will have have to enter meaningless command line arguments to get things moving.

Users of Kuma's hideous K-Seka will be pleased to know that not only is Kick-Ass Devpac compatible, but it will also accept K-Seka source files without modification. The assembler includes full optimisation options, coding sectioning (chip, data, bss) and even automatic syntax checking after each line is entered. Kick-Ass costs 89DM.

Finally, it looks like Inovatronics's acclaimed Power Windows has finally met it's match. RCT (Requester Construction Tool) is a powerful Intuition source code generator that will allow you to generate attractive Intuition displays without a minimal amount of hassle. The results can then be saved in a multitude of different languages including assembler, C, AmigaBASIC and even GFA-BASIC. RCTcosts 129DM.

BOOKS FOR 2.0

None of us actually have it (apart from those lucky enough to own a 3000), but already the book publishers have started pushing their new books covering the new release of the Amiga's operating system. Thanks to those ever so nice people at Adamsoft, I've just received copies of two publications – Amiga Printers Inside & Out and AmigaDOS Inside & Out.

Printers have always been a source of much frustration for first time users, so Abacus's latest is sure to receive a warm welcome. It covers the basics beginning with how printers work, setting up a printer using dip switches and plugging everything in. Then it's on to actually installing the printer on your system. The book details both the current 1.3 preference settings and even the new Workbench 2.0 Preferences (which is vastly different), how to copy across printer drivers. It also offers a number of extra tricks and tips which are supplied on a free diskette which is bundled with every copy (no, you don't have to pay extra!). For printer owners, this is a

Next up is AmigaDOS Inside & Out which has been revised once again to cover the new commands within Workbench 2.0. HARD DRIVIN' ON THE A1000

I've had quite a few people contact me regarding a tip published within Express' sister publication Amiga Format.

The tip claims that the A590 hard drive (which was designed for use on the A500) can be plugged in and used on an A1000 without need of any form of interfacing. Most seemed naturally rather sceptical, but the truth is that this is entirely correct – the A1000 can indeed use the A590, and many other peripherals that run through the expansion bus.

It's a little known fact that the A1000 and A500 expansion buses are virtually identical. The only difference between them is that the A500 has an extra 7MHz clock signal that isn't present on the A1000. In reality though, very few A500 peripherals actually seem to use this extra line, so compatibility is high.

In truth, the only major difference is the orientation of the connector itself. Whilst the A500's bus resides on the left hand side of the machine, the A1000 has its expansion bus hidden away on the right hand side.

This basically means that any peripherals designed for the A500 must be plugged in reversed – in the case of A590, the front panel faces

You will also need to support any A500 devices by placing something like a book underneath it (the A1000 connector is higher than its A500 counterpart).

A word of warning, though. Be careful when plugging devices such as the A590 into your A1000 - the connector must be pushed in as far as it will go or the drive will fail to be recognised. I had quite a lot of fun trying to get an A590 to work on my A1000, just because I hadn't lined up the connectors correctly.

If you've got an A1000 and you're after a hard drive, then my advice is to buy yourself an A590. Just like the A500, you can also add RAM to your

system by inserting RAM chips inside the A590. At current discounting, the drive can be picked up for as little as £250- which is hundreds of pounds cheaper than even the cheapest dedicated A1000 drive!

Hard drives aren't the only devices that can be used with the A1000. I've been using an A500 'Mini-Megs' 2Mb RAM expansion on my A1000 for the past couple of months now (kindly donated to me by George Thomson Services), and it has performed faultlessly.

Indeed, I can quickly disconnect the card from my A1000 and then plug it straight into an A500 in a matter of seconds - now that's what I call connectability!

IZZY WIZZY LET'S GET SCSI

Technomatic is about to take delivery of the first batch of its new SCSI boards. These little beasts behave in much the same way as all the other SCSI boards currently available, but do so with the latest three-chip technology and, according to Technomatic, faster than any of the competition. For the £179 price tag, you also get full Acorn compatibility and, of course most importantly, an extra icon on your icon bar.

I must apologise for referring to a 'SCSI interface' last week, I do know what the 'I' stands for really! While talking about Technomatic, I might as well mention the new version of the TechnoSCAN software. For a shade over 20 notes, you get a pretty little ROM (complete with snazzy silver writing) and a disk with a new !Scanner application on it. Users of the the old version will have no trouble at all getting to grips with the new one. New features include a set-up menu allowing the size of the scan (width and height) to be altered as well as the image resolution - true 400 dpi monochrome scanning is now supported as well as 8and 16- level grey scale.

A time out can be set to switch the scanner's LEDs off if the scanner is inactive. This protects the LEDs and prolongs their life. An option is provided for rotating scans, but you still cannot scan horizontally. The save sprite menu has been improved, allowing the sprite name to be altered as well as the filename. There is still no support for scanning multiple images and saving them in one file, they must be transferred into !Paint to do this. A Print menu has been added to dump scans to a printer without the need of transferring to !Paint. All version 1's features are still available - scan zooming, clipping and rescaling but all have had that extra tweak to make this a worthy sequel.

FLYING IN A BLUE DREAM

The 4th Dimension's rival to Interdictor has finally arrived and is well worth the wait. Interdictor II may well be a 'full force model' and 'a near perfect

simulation' but until it looks as if you are actually flying, i.e. until the landscape looks realistic with real contours, you can see out of your plane in any direction and watch your flaps moving and they make lorries that don't drive across the lake, I'm afraid that all this realism is rather lost.

Full marks to the Simis team for their dedication to producing an accurate game, not many for producing a fun and interesting game. Enter, please, Chock's Away. Here, the reverse is true, you control your tiger moth biplane with up, down, left, right, faster and slower. Rudder? What

But that isn't really important, Chock's Away is actually fun. You can play with two players (the screen is split into two views), you can view the game from outside your plane, there are three maps, a flight recorder, a practice mode, a dogfight mode and, most importantly, 20 missions that can be played solo or with 2 players.

In true Aviator style you have an inverted 'T' gunsight, you can fly between the rugby posts and the plane even settles backwards onto its rear wheel after landing. The explosions are pretty and the smoke clouds convincing.

What's wrong with it? Well, a few things, the shadow is always plotted at sea level unless you are actually on the ground, so it suddenly jumps when you touch down on the aircraft carrier. The perspective goes rather 'violent' sometimes when you are close to objects, the front end is rather inferior, having the seemingly obligatory 4th Dimension character definitions, varying mouse speeds, peculiar nonstandardised menus and the occasional annoying screen flash.

DRIVING MAD

I have to admit that driving games are my weakness, racing games even more so. Which is why two new games, from Accolade and Gremlin respectively, were ripped out of their Jiffy bags before anyone else in the office could get their thieving hands on the post.

Accolade's Grand Prix Circuit has all the makings of a Lawton favourite. First of all, it's about Formula One, the greatest sport in the world. Secondly, you get to drive on all the world's famous circuits in your bid to become champion. Thirdly, you can even choose which team you drive for.

This last choice is a bit of a poser. Now, you could go for the Ferrari. It handles like a dream, but it's a bit short of speed down the straights. Or there's the McLaren, which goes like anything but corners like a battleship. And then there's the Williams – maybe this one's got the compromise of speed and handling that you need?

Great – a game that features all the famous names and cars of Formula One racing. Now all we need's a digitised Murray Walker and James Hunt…!

The trouble is, it all falls down once you get on the track. Well, not falls down precisely, but begins to pale.

The graphics are colourful enough, but just too slow. I'm afraid it's Test Drive 2/The Cycles all over again, a combination of sluggish screen update and oversensitive control. Although that's perhaps a bit misleading. The trouble is that you have to work so hard to correct one slide you create another one twice the size. More like trying to get a ten-year-old Skoda round a greasy roundabout that guiding a thoroughbred, race-tuned rocketship around the Nurburgring...

That said, Grand Prix Circuit does run a tad faster and smoother than its predecessors. It's still not enough, though, to turn it into a decent racing game. When you're qualifying it would seem to be impossible to come in better than last, while during the race, as long as you can storm to the front in the first few seconds. (Just take to the grass to get past the pack).

There are other gameplay problems too. It's a shame, as the principle of the game and the factual content are great. And I was looking forward to a brilliant season's racing, too

By contrast, Gremlin's Lotus Esprit Turbo Challenge looks anything but slow. This one only came in this morning (literally), so I've only been able to play it for a short time. Being programmed in four-colour mode it doesn't look quite as pretty as Grand Prix Circuit, and the split-screen display (there's a simultaneous two-player option) leaves you with a wide but very narrow (from bottom to top) playing window, but in one-player mode the things moves like greased lighting. Two players slow it down quite a lot, but it's still extremely playable. Best of all is when you come up behind your opponent's car and give him or her a nasty surprise by belting past - the first they know about it is seeing your car suddenly appear in front of them.

Like I say, I haven't had the chance to play Lotus Esprit Turbo Challenge much yet, but I get the feeling I'm going to. Look out for the full review real soon!

COUNTING THE COST

It's been a few months since ABC software from sunny Weston-super-Mare produced the easy-to-use Small Business Accounts package, but boss Andy Constant hasn't been idle. His latest project, Costmaster, is aimed at self-employed types needing a fast and efficient way of costing their jobs and turning out estimates.

The program lets you store customer details on a database, ascribe regularly-used items to single keypresses (for example, the price of housebricks) and calculate costings. In common with Small Business Accounts, you also get your last ten 'moves' recorded so that you always know what you've done.

The program does a lot more that there isn't really space here to describe – suffice to say that it's hard to imagine any costing job it couldn't handle. The only thing is, the manual is there to guide you through the program, not tell you how to run up costings. For that, you need other advice.




these advertisements will then be more likely to buy one of their machines than any new fridge they might need. This may prove to be correct.

The rest of the Commodore Christmas Show was about as lively and enjoyable as you'd expect one to be after 15 years' practice. Peripheral manufacturers, user groups and fanzines and software and hardware dealers filled two exhibition halls in the perennial Hammersmith Novotel venue. However, perhaps slightly more noticeable at this show was the bite of hard economics. A few dealers never made it to the stands they'd booked and that can only mean they're in extreme financial difficulty. Without getting sidetracked too much here, I'd bet that we'll see a handful of the mail order outfits and small electronics companies that support the C64 go out of business in 1991. Such speculation didn't spoil the weekend, however, of the few visitors who spoke to me.



SMOOTHING IT OUT

There has been a utility on the Apple Macintosh for some time now called Adobe Type Manager. This remarkable widget generates screen and printer fonts on the fly from PostScript fonts, and is now available in a version for Microsoft Windows 3.

Being able to create instant screen fonts means that text on the screen is always smooth-edged and clear, no matter what point size it is in. There is no need to have dozens of screen fonts knocking about, ATM generates its own as and when you need them.

Even better, ATM allows you to generate printer fonts on the fly too. Anyone who has a LaserJet will know the vast amount of hard disk space that even a few take up, and when you get into desktop publishing, large fonts can take up many megabytes. With ATM you can use PostScript outline fonts instead, which take up only 40K or so per family - that's every point size your software allows you to use.

ATM is simple to install and completely transparent in use; a small loading icon appears when you launch Windows and that's about all you ever need to know. An application program

allows you to install new fonts and to select the size of the RAM cache which it uses to store the fonts it generates in a session.

Considering that it has to calculate the fonts afresh each time you need to use one ATM is surprisingly fast, even on an unexceptional PC. I haven't yet fully explored its printing options, and I'll report back when I have.

ATM costs a mere £79 including three free PostScript fonts from Adobe on 071-627 1000.

FRESH BATCH

Batch files are deadly slow, but then, they're free. One of the reasons they're slow is that MS-DOS insists on going off to disk for each new line. You can prove this easily enough by running the sample file below and releasing the disk part way through.

practice but it does illustrate the process rather well. Every time the disk comes out the printing stops, MS-DOS tells you how upset it is at not being able to read the disk and you're asked if you would like to Abort, Retry or Fail (or something similar depending on the version of MS-DOS you're using.

This is obvious enough but it has some consequences when building batch files to run things from floppy disks. If your batch file includes instructions to change disks then it absolutely has to be running from somewhere other than the disk being changed. That's the reason that hard disk owners often find batch files hanging around on their hard disks after installing software. The first thing the installation routine has done is to

copy a batch file to the hard disk and transfer control. Now you know.

One of the major reasons that batch file compilers speed things up is that they run everything in memory - not from disk. This has the added bonus that with a compiled batch file you can run it and immediately change disks everything keeps right on rolling. If you want to build batch files that necessitate disk swapping buy a batch file compiler - you often get extra commands thrown in too - many of them quite useful. One final tip. Don't use ANSI.SYS commands in batch files you plan to hand out - not everyone bothers to install it and the without it ANSI commands make a complete hash of the screen.

It's good to see the Spectrum isn't getting passed over in favour of 16-bit machines when it comes to the glamourous, exciting and usually rather memory intensive world of flight simulation. Due out for our machine in the near future is the long drooled after F-16 Combat Pilot from Speccy users fave producers of software of a distinctly flight simmy nature, Digital Integration. I've raved about this a few times over the years and it appears it's finally ready. At least with Digital Integration you can bet the delay's been caused by their fanatical attention to detail or tireless game testing rather than trying to find a celeb to endorse it or something.

It promises to be a flight simulator of the old, more authentic school where purchasing the farm, as we pilots say, is a regular occurence and the list of controls runs to a chunky handbook full, rather than the new upstart breed of more action based affairs. There should be enough action in F-16 for even the most experienced of Speccy fliers though with ground targets, varied armoury, day and night flying, a strategy mode and a profusion of devilish MiG 29s trying to 'prang your kite'. I'm dusting off my goggles and silly leather hat even as we speak.

Digital Integration isn't leaving Speccy types out of the fun with its next game either, I'm glad to report. The sequel to the excellent Advanced Tactical Fighter is planned for Speccy release in January and I think we should all salute these wizard chaps for their continued support above and beyond the call of duty. Watch out for the definitive reviews in a future Your Sinclair.

TECH TALK

I've heard lots of good things about the rather technically titled SC_ASSEMBLER for the SAM Coupé which comes from the rather homely titled Steve's Software of 7 Narrow Close, Histon, Cambridge CB4 4XX. Unfortunately I'm too thick when it comes to complicated things like assemblers to confirm this but I can tell you that the latest incarnation, version 1.2 has just been released.

Improvements are numerous and include a faster Keyscan editor so you can type at finger endangering speeds, an auto insert command which lets you insert extra lines, the ability to assemble to different parts of the SAM memory, and best of all a bonus freebie program called SC_SPECLONE. This turns out to be another Spectrum emulator which goes a long way further than the official bundled utility and apparently achieves an estimated 99 per cent compatibility with 48K Speccy programs.

It's menu driven making it pretty easy to operate and options to use a printer are included. As well as that excellent and thoroughly worthwhile bonus, the 512K version of the SC_ASSEMBLER comes with a trendy desk top published manual that's a lot fatter than the one you get with the plain vanilla 256K one.

The author, Carol Brookshank (who writes for the respected FORMAT mag) makes the harsh forbidding world of assemblers a little bit clearer and it's a pity weedy underpriviledged 256K owners don't get a similar publication to guide them through the copious features of the assembler. The other benefit 512K owners get in this case is obviously more space for source code and the like. SC_ASSEMBLER Version 1.2 costs £10 for the 256K SAM and £12.50 for 512K Coupé owners.

Steve's Software generously offers free upgrades from previous versions to anyone sending the original assembler disk, customer number and SAE. You can also upgrade to the bigger 512K version for a measly £2.50. Both version come with the aforementioned bargain copy of SC_SPECLONE. A bargain eh?

COPY IT

The clever bloke who wrote all this, Steve Nutting, also let me have the following excellent SAM tip. "You might be interested to know there is a way to speed up copying disks on SAM DOS 2. First you will need to find out on the disk you need to copy the last track the programs use, then



PC SPEED PRICE PLUMMETS

If you have to use a PC contemptible at work and would like to work at home too, you're probably wondering whether you can use your ST.

The answer is, it rather depends. More recent STs can read from and write to PC formatted disks, so if your work is mostly word processing you can use your ST word processor and create an ASCII file (ie one that doesn't have lots of additional control codes in), then load it into your PC word processor at work.

If, however, your work involves any kind of graphics or other stuff that can't be done in ASCII files – database or spreadsheet work, for instance – you're going to have to get yourself PC'd up.

What, you say, buy a second computer when I already have an ST? Er, no actually. Buy a PC emulator, a little piece of kit that contains the guts and gubbins of a PC but enables your ST to act as keyboard and controller.

Believe it or not, such a device costs less than £200. In fact, with the recently announced price cut of one of the most popular PC emulators, it now costs less than £100. Now that really is quite something.

PC Speed is distributed in this country by the recently established UK branch of Compo, the German manufacturers. Boss Neal Onions explained to me that this remarkable price chop is down to German technical wizardry, though this is of course complete poppycock (how can German technical wizardry suddenly make it profitable to sell the same piece of hardware at half the price it was previously costing?).

Anyway, ours is not to reason why, ours is but to call Compo on 0480 891819 for more details of the amazing £99 PC Speed.

SHOW BUSINESS TIME

Actually, a better way to get your hands on PC Speed is to turn up at Wembley Arena between December 6th and 9th, where you'll find the *Computer Shopper* Show in full swing. Compo will be there, as will hundreds of box-shifters offering bargains of all kinds.

Entry is a fiver, but this isn't expensive. In fact, it's bloody

outrageously expensive, and I demand the resignation of the organisers immediately.

SHOW BUSINESS II: THE REVENGE

If you're too busy trying to cope with C*****s and all that shenanigans to make it to Computer Shopper, there's always the 16-bit Computer Fair from 4th to 6th January.

All the big guns of the ST universe will be there, including Silica, Microdeal, Gasteiner, Power Computing, 2-bit Systems and Hybrid Arts

And also present are expected to be German companies GE-Soft, Protar Electronics and Manfred Carle, as well as Americans Double Click Software, responsible for superb programs DC Desktop and DC Utilities.

More details of this show a little nearer the time.

MASTER SOUND REVAMP

Speaking of Microdeal – and I was, if you look carefully – Master Sound, one of the best of the new generation of ST budget samplers, has undergone an update, if that doesn't seem like a contradiction in terms.

The latest version includes all kinds of exotic-sounding features, such as an oscilloscope, 3D display, filter, shrink and cuddly toy, I shouldn't wonder.

So now you can incorporate samples of your own choosing into your musical twiddlings. Just think: it doesn't have to be James Brown or John Bonham all the time, it could be... well, Kylie or Bros (quick joke: Knock, knock! Who's there? Bros. Bros who? That's show business!).

VIRUS ATTACK

that's the message it flashes onto your screen.

If you have ever found your ST doing strange things - your mouse behaves as if it's upside down, for example; or a part of the screen is suddenly inverted; or your ST gets up, blows a raspberry and walks out on you right in the middle of a game - it's more than likely that you've been hit by a virus.

For those who don't know, a virus is a destructive program that can seriously damage your disks, written by a total and utter *@!&! who hasn't got the brains to know he's got none and is incapable of writing any more complex piece of code or washing or getting a girlfriend. Usually a virus silently and secretly copies itself onto other disks, thereby spreading the


One of the most dangerous kind is a boot sector virus, named because that's the part of the disk it writes itself to. And that's the danger of such viruses - of which Green Goblin is one - because if one gets onto a commercial game, it ruins it. You can't load it.

I understand that the ST User virus got onto the disk at the duplicator, Stanley Precision, after it was instructed to make a change to the mastered disk. This strikes me as bad practice.

What's also rather odd is that this is not some new, exotic and unheard of virus, but one discovered 18 months ago.

So I thought I'd just remind you of the steps you should take to protect yourself from these nasty little buggers.

Firstly, get yourself a decent virus detector and killer - CRL's aptly named

Virus Killer is probably the best and certainly the best known (£9.95 from 081 533 2918), though most public domain libraries have a few good ones in stock.

Secondly, use it. (WARNING: do not use it on games. It'll detecting the autoloader in the boot sector and destroy it, causing as much damage as the worst virus.)

Thirdly - and if you don't already have a virus killer, this could well be the most crucial step for you to take right now - make sure the write protect tab on all of your disks is in the on position except when you need to write to disk.

Most games, for instance, don't need you to write to disk, and should therefore never be exposed to the risk of infection. In plain terms: if you can see

through the little hole in the corner of your disk, you're OK.

Fourthly, when you're inserting a disk into your drive, first of all turn off your ST for 30 seconds. (That way, any viruses in your ST's memory will be killed.) It's a pain in the burn, but it's a hell of a lot better than finding your entire disk collection infected.

Sixthly, make a back up of any important disks and put the originals away safely. Never use an original if you can use a back up.

This has been a public service announcement.

A MOUSE WITHOUT BALLS

A fortnight ago in this column I raved about Golden Image's new £150 scanner, which also features the highly rated Touch Up software.

Now the same company has come up with a rather intriguing item: a mouse that works by light. Usually, as you'll know, a computer mouse has rollers that detect movement via a little ball.

Problem is, the little bugger invariably gets clogged up with the dust and general grunge that accumulates on your desktop. Golden Image's solution: a mouse that detects movement by light.

I've been using one for a while now, and it works perfectly. The only problem is that you need to use a special mouse mat (supplied) that has a regular dot pattern that makes it easier for the mouse to "see" movement. It's OK, but just a little bit constricting, especially if, like me, you have a white table that the mouse finds it difficult to "read."

Anyway, it's got to be better than the crappy old mouse that came supplied with your ST. It costs £39.95 from Golden Image on 081 518 7373.

AUTOROUTE PRICE CUT

Last year the word was NextBase was going to kill the ST version of Autoroute, the computerised map program, due to piracy. Well, I'm glad to say rumours of its death were greatly exaggerated, and it's still going.

Indeed, it's just taken a price cut down to £70, which is less than half its previous tag. If you clock up a good few thousand miles a year in the old motor, it may well be worth giving NextBase a call on 0784 460077.

OOPS

There have been some unexpected consequences of Apple's decision not to include a maths co-processor into the Mac Ilsi as standard.

The Ilsi is the only member of the Mac II family not to contain this chip, and some applications are getting rather confused by the fact. Studio/8, an extremely popular 8-bit paint package, refuses to run on the llsi, as does Microsoft Excel, a spreadsheet which, it is claimed, nine out of ten Mac spreadsheet owners use. The manufacturers of both applications were quick to realise the problem, and Microsoft already has a free bug fix, while there should be a llsi-compatible version of Studio/8 available by the time you read

Users who actually want the increased speed that the maths coprocessor will provide will have to wait until the Ilsi NuBus adaptor card arrives it's scheduled to start shipping some time in December.

PROBLEMS, PROBLEMS

As if that wasn't enough, it transpires that System 6.0.6 (the version shipping with all the new Macs) is... er... well, 'not astonishingly robust' might be a polite

way of putting it. System 6.0.7 is already shipping in the United States, but Apple has said that it will not be bundled with machines sold outside the USA. Instead, Apple are supplying a bug-fixing INIT. It's the first time in my memory that Apple has not released a version of the System simultaneously around the Englishspeaking world. So watch out if you intend to buy a Mac in the States: there shouldn't be any incompatibility problems. but who knows?

TROUBLES IN THREES

What, more? Yes, more. We saw our first production Ilsi here a week or two ago (which at least proves that they are shipping), and we were rather surprised to discover that HyperCard 2.0 was not included. To get the product, you have to fill in a little card, and it will be sent to you. Why? Who knows...

And anyone who wants to use the new Macs to develop HyperCard stacks for other users can think again. It seems that System 6.0.6 and later will only run HyperCard 2.0 and later. Now, stacks created in HyperCard 1.2.5 (which over 95 per cent of Mac users have) can be used in version 2.0, but stacks created in 2.0 cannot be run on 1.2.5. So, until a hell of a lot more people start to upgrade

to version 2, you won't have much of a market for your product.

Of course, this raises the whole question of compatibility, which is (or was) at the centre of Apple's philosophy. "As long as you stick to our programmers' guidelines," it said, "we guarantee that anything you write will work on any new Macs which we bring out." But since HyperCard 1.2.5 (which is written by Apple) won't run on System 6.0.6, hasn't Apple broken its own guidelines somewhere?

In fact, Apple is now having to face the fact that lots of software written for System 6 will not run on System 7 when it arrives, even if the software had been written to follow the Apple guidelines. According to one American developer I spoke to, this has to be the price that we pay for progress; no gain without pain, as they say. But this means that Apple will have to work even harder to persuade people that System 7 is a good thing: after all, would you upgrade your System if doing that meant that you had to upgrade all of your applications as well?

MACUSER SHOW

Talking of talking to people, the MacUser show was held on November 7-10. Sadly, there weren't many whizzy new products on show - and precious few Mac Classics and Ilsi's, either. The whole Macintosh scene seems to have slowed down recently; it's almost as if people were waiting to see what the new Macs were like before deciding whether to support them in the future.

Well, now they know. And while there weren't many new products actually at the show, many of the people I spoke to said that they had new stuff waiting just around the corner. So, while some companies are switching part of their attention to developing software for Windows on the PC, the vast majority are still supporting the Mac with a vengeance.

What was at the show in large quantities was multimedia equipment. One stand had what must have been hundreds of thousands of pounds-worth of synthesisers, Macs, U-Matic video machines and editing equipment. And the stuff that they were producing was truly incredible. Suddenly, a fair bit of the power of systems like Quantel's Paintbox is in the hands of Mac users - for a fraction of the price.

YUPPIE CORNER

One product on display at the show is a must for all you yuppies out there. Called Dynodex, it's an address book program with a difference. Unlike most programs of this type, where data can only be exported to a word processor or printed out on standard sheets of paper, Dynodex is designed to output to special, pre-punched paper which can then be put straight into your Filofax (which is, of course, a registered trademark). It needs a laser printer or 'non-impact' printer to work (ie not a dot matrix), and it really is rather good. The database features are fine, it's easy to look up phone numbers and things on the computer and having a





SHOCK WAVE HITS THE US

Shock Wave is the name of a new US computer and games console magazine which, from its press release issued last week, sounds like it plans to cover almost all of the games/console industry in some depth.

Edited by Antonio Barnes, the first issue of the magazine is being offered free of charge to US residents, so the inclusion of a few international reply coupons from readers of *NCE* in the UK should obtain the first free ones on this side of the Atlantic. Barnes is enclosing a half-price subscription voucher with the first issue — making the magazine well worth sending off for.

Included in the first issue is a 'hands-on' review of the Super Famicon and Super Mario Bros, as well as a review of the Game Gear, Sega's new hand-held games console. On the computer front, the magazine includes reviews of several of the latest games for the Atari ST and Commodore Amiga.

STATUS BBS GOES INTERNATIONAL

Status BBS in Auckland, New Zealand, has hooked up to the X.25 packet data network, meaning that subscribers to the BT PSS and Dial Plus packet data networks, as well as the Mercury 5000 packet network, can access the service on a local phone call basis.

While the cost of placing a call to Status is rather less than dialling direct to New Zealand, the charges can mount if you pipe a lot of data over the link.

Callers should place a packet data call to Status via the network user address (NUA) of A9-5301-9500-0013-

 On connection, callers will see the response 'Paxus Faxnet' and should log in using the Visitor option, and register as normal.

APPLE V APPLE

Remember the *Express* story regarding the legal row of the use of the Apple logo a few weeks back? According to the ST report on-line newsletter, if Apple Corps wins its lawsuit against Apple Computer, the latter may have to pay up to \$200 million in royalties to Apple Corps, and may have to stop selling much of the Macintosh line of computers.

MOTOROLA ON A WINNER

Motorola has unveiled an radio frequency LAN system that will allow wireless computer networks to be installed in corporations and businesses. Called the Wireless In-building Network – WIN for short – the system uses standard radio signalling techniques to transmit data throughout a LAN.

A key feature of WIN is that different types of computers can be connected using the system. WIN is also billed as being 50 per cent faster than the industry standard 10 megabits/second Ethernet system.

Don't ask the price, as WIN isn't out yet - shipment is expected early next year, by which time the price will have been firmed up.

WORDPERFECT 4.1 FOR ATARI ST

As previously reported in this column, WordPerfect has released version 4.1 of its word processing software for the Atari ST, the package is effectively an 'engineering' re-work of the previous edition, and includes several new features, as well as sorting out a number of bugs in v4.0.

Amongst the many new features are: support for large screen monitors; full directory listings for all disk types, including Ram disks; improved F-Sel support; and inclusion of the complete document path and name is now displayed in the window title bar.

Registered WordPerfect Atari users in the US are being encouraged to obtain the updated edition of WP for the Atari ST for \$15 plus \$3 postage and packing. Since I'm not too sure when the version will be shipping on this side of the Atlantic - if at all - it might be worth giving the company a call on 0101-83-800-222-9509 if you're at all interested.

SPECIAL OFFER ON GRAPHICS

Version 2.0 of Seurat, a graphics program for the Atari ST, will be launched towards the end of this year. A special pre-release edition of the package – two disks plus a 34,000 word users manual on disk –has been released by SK-Ware One for just \$35.

The package allows users to create and edit Degas, Macpaint and Gem Img files of any size, and includes zooming and panning facilities within the editing module.

Other key features include support for a wide variety of printers, either integrally within in the program or – for the less well-known printers – as a separate printer driver modules.

Also available is a self-collating twosided printing routine for printing the 34,000-word User's Manual on the Hewlett-Packard Deskjet and other printers in draft mode. The routine adds \$3-00 to the package price.

AMIGA ADD-ON ON HOLD

As previous reported, a German company called Medusa has developed an Amiga add-on unit that accepts Atari ST Rom chips – much as the A-Max add-on for the Amiga does. The cartridge unit effectively allows the Amiga to run all Atari ST programs as normal.

According to the ST Report on-line newsletter, Medusa was scheduled to show its product at the recent World of Amiga in Chicago, but was 'advised' by Atari that legal action was likely if the system were sold at the show.

While Medusa withdrew from the show, the company promised to release a reworked edition shortly that would be function much as the Spectre Mac emulator for the Atari ST works – the user buys the emulation cartridge and then plugs in his or her own ST Roms.

Watch this space for further information.

FAX INTO VOICE MESSAGES

Berkeley Speech Technologies of New York has obtained a US patent for a new system that can translate incoming faxes into voice messages. While this new development will probably enjoy widespread use by visually impaired users of fax machines, it can also be used with the variety of voice mail services which are springing up around the world.

BST is planning to release a software package early next year that converts E-mail and fax messages in the spoken word. No pricing on the system as yet, but watch this space!

Also in the pipeline is a custom chipset that BST plans to sell to fax manufacturers. When used, the chipset will, BST claims, allow fax machines to speak the ASCII text from a fax page directly to the user!

CLEAR THINKING HITACHI

Hitachi Japan has developed a 10-inch thin-film transistor colour liquid crystal display for use in workstations. The screen has 870,000 pixels or three times as many as existing types.

According to the Japanese giant, the screen is as clear as cathode ray tube technology and is capable of displaying up to 4,096 colours on-screen at once.

As WWW went to press the price was not available, but Hitachi is in active discussion with a number of computer manufacturers. Expect to see the technology in use by next summer.

AT&T PHONE GOODIES

AT&T has announced a digital, tapeless telephone answering machine. The System 1337 costs \$139.99 and comes in a case with a footprint of 10 x 10 inches and a height of six inches.

As supplied, the unit can record up to seven minutes of spoken word, and allows users to play back, repeat and skip messages without the need to wind the tape in either direction.

The unit is on sale now at AT&T phone shops in the US. Sadly, this writer wasn't able to buy one at Comdex earlier this month, despite phoning round more than a few stores.

What I did get, however, was a \$89.99 unit called the CLI 64, a battery-powered calculator-sized unit that uses the caller line ID system - available on a growing number of a PABXs and planned for service on some BT exchanges 'real soon now,' to display the originating phone number of people calling you, while the phone is still ringing.

CLI works by generating a modulated signal on the phone line between the first and second rings, giving the phone number of the person calling, together with the date and time of the call. The AT&T CLI 64 stores data on the previous 64 calls.

If the calling phone number is on an exchange that does not support CLI, the unit displays an 'out of area' signal, or a variety of other messages, as circumstances dictate. Needless to say, the AT&T CLI 64 is not approved for use on BT or Mercury circuits in the UK.

hether you are prototyping a program or implementing a known algorithm, you will soon reach the point where you have a piece of code that works – almost. Whether the faults are obvious errors or subtle problems found by obscure test data, the techniques are the same. Few programs are written without at least one bug that needs fixing, but some simple guidelines can make the process a little less painful.

Testing and debugging a program should not be a last minute process, or even separate from the central development of the code; most bugs should be corrected or removed before the program is run. Bugs only remain in the program because the programmer doesn't know that they're there. If you notice a bug before you try to run the code, you should correct as you develop the code; if you don't find the problem until you run the code, correction of a bug seems more like improving the code.

The actual syntax errors and error codes produced by a faulty program will be specific to the language and the environment, but most bugs fall into general categories. Many bugs will be the result of a typing error, but some mistakes may reveal fundamental errors in the program. The level of support offered for debugging varies with languages and environments and it is worth using any debugging facilities available. Removing one bug, especially if it is a syntax error, is likely to reveal several more!

If a bug is caused by a typing error the problem will usually be reported as a syntax error – the language obeyed by the computer has a very strict form or syntax and any command errors will cause problems when translating into machine code. Many languages will report the location of a syntax error and this is the point at which the compiler or interpreter ran into problems, not where the actual error will be found.

COMMON MISTAKES

In the code example (see box), the missing quote is after the word "world" on the third line, but the parser in the compiler or interpreter reading in the code will take the words "hello world print" as the print statement and will then complain about the second "hello" as an unknown quantity; an undefined variable or constant may be reported, rather than a syntax error. Some environments may complain about the third quote as unmatched or offer intelligent syntax editors that can detect and supply missing punctuation or constructions which can be a great help.

Another common mistake, especially in languages that allow lengthy variable names, is the incorrect spelling or typing of one occurrence of a variable. Again, some parsers will detect unique variable names that are used only once in a program (often known as singleton variables). If a function or procedure is changed, it is easy to forget to update all calls to the procedure, leaving some with incorrect variables and parameters.

BEAT BHAT BUG



Don't tear your hair out or stay up all night trying to make your program work – see what Mary Branscombe recommends for those killer programming blues.

Some bugs are due to incorrect specification of mathematical functions or the misuse of built in functions. The write or print statement in many languages has an parity of one (it accepts only one parameter, although this can be a list) – specifying multiple arguments for such write statements is a frequent mistake. Confusion between real numbers and integers can also cause problems when using mathematical functions.

An incorrect loop to print a greeting ten times:
FOR I:= 1 TO 10
PRINT "HELLO WORLD
PRINT "HELLO READERS"

An incorrect listing to add a column of ten figures and print a running total:

FOR I:= 1 TO 10
PRINT "INPUT NEXT NUMBER"
READ NEXTNUMBER
NEXTTOTAL := TOTALSOFAR +
NEXTNUMBER
NEXT I
PRINT NEXTTOTAL

Although omitting punctuation like commas may be a simple typing error, missing out or misplacing closing brackets may indicate that you are not quite certain about the flow of data and control within a program. If parts of constructions are omitted or misplaced (misplacing the end of a loop or the alternative command for a conditional selection is particularly common) this may indicate a fundamental misunderstanding of the control flow.

The second box shows a fragment of a code listing to add a list of figures and print a running total, but the print statement has been left outside the loop. If you put a command outside the loop, when you actually want it to be obeyed every time the program goes through the loop, then you are not sure what you

want repeated, or you have not understood how a loop works. In either case, a diagram of the flow of control for the program is the best place to start.

The classic picture of debugging depicts late nights, strong coffee, fluorescent marker pens and a sheaf of computer printout. Printouts are certainly helpful, if only because it is often easier to read a listing at length on paper than on screen. Similarly, you can use a flourescent marker to highlight the location of the variable that holds the value that you are interested in, so that you can see the flow of data through the code. This may seem trivial, but problems occur because the programmer cannot visualise the program in action.

TAKE A BREAK

If looking at the code and considering what is going on in the program does not enable you to solve the problem within half an hour or so, then get another listing or another cup of coffee, or simply stop for a few minutes. Leaving the program overnight is advised if you come to a standstill as mistakes are much easier to spot with a clear mind.

Some simple mistakes can be remarkably difficult to see, perhaps because you expect the punctuation to be in the correct place and find it hard to see that it isn't there. Showing the listing to another programmer is usually the best way to solve this problem. If the problem is more complex, explaining what the program is supposed to do, and what it actually does, to someone else will again help.

If none of these methods provide a solution, then you must clarify your mental image of the program. The behaviour of any program is determined by the flow of control – which of the possible commands in the program will be executed next – and the flow of data – what values are in what variables. If you predict the order of commands to be executed and the values to be found in the variables at each stage, you can then compare the

prediction to the computer's execution of the code. Thus the bugs will be found where your predictions are wrong. Whether the code is not doing what you believed it would do or your prediction was incorrect, you will located the bug and can start trying to solve it.

If the output of the program is not what you expect or the program terminates unexpectedly, then you should run the program on different data to compare the outcome. If the data causes the problem, then run the program on a subset of the data and run the data through a subset of the code, to see where it is.

DIFFERENT VIEWS

Good environments will offer various debugging tools, geared to the peculiarities of the language that you are using and it is well worth learning how these work. Most of these are based on the notion of breakpointing – setting points in the program where the contents of the computer's memory and registers are displayed. Code animation provides similar information from various viewpoints while the program is running.

Perhaps the best way of dealing with bugs in your code is to write clean, simple structured code, so that any mistakes can be seen easily.

DEBUGGING TIPS

- A bug is only a bug when you don't know what or where it is. Most can be solved by looking at the program and going through it more rigourously.
- Most bugs are due to simple error and mistyping.
- More complex bugs may reflect some misunderstanding about what the code is supposed to do or how a construction works.
- Syntax errors are rarely where the machine thinks they are.
- One bug leads to another; as soon as you have fixed one bug, you will often find that five more appear!

# CIRCUIT CITY



A trip to sunnier climes on the overland bus brings you on board movies, hot drinks and even cooked food. A close examination of the latest Neoplan coach revealed that instead of hanging huge generators off the frame, the mains power was provided by a set of inverters.

With these coaches costing huge (at least six figure) sums, it isn't the cost that dictates the power supply but the size and reliability. The Express budget didn't stretch to a skyliner coach, but with the help of Maplins we were able to gather up an inexpensive kit that will turn the stuff from under the bonnet into the stuff from

To make this magical transformation, the inverter takes the 12 volts direct current from the car's electrical system and inverts it to alternating current.

A 20:1 transformer boosts it up to mains voltage of 240v. Swings and roundabouts dictate that you'll not be able to run a 20,000 watt sound rig from the inverter. A 60w output is about the most that can be hoped for unless you beef things up by using more batteries and

In a simple in-car system, the 240 volts from the inverter might be used to run a computer, or any of the many low current drain appliances.

For an in-car installation, it's a good idea to add an extra battery to the car and have the two batteries interchangeable between inverter and car electrics. A simple switch will then allow you to interchange between charging the battery on the car's circuits and discharging on the inverter's.

The kit comes complete with everything that's needed except for a box and costs £64.95 including VAT. It isn't a simple kit and should only be undertaken by a competent electronics DIYer or someone who doesn't mind wasting the £65 or so.

An inverter produces mains current so remember

when you're testing the finished product that it can bite - you should treat the completed inverter with the same respect as you treat any live 240v socket that you're working on. If in doubt ... don't.

The kit comes in a box with a constructors guide and all of the necessary parts bagged ready for the job. There's a list of components and before you spread them all over the bench you should get several bags ready to place parts in as you check them off the list.

Open each bag separately and note the contents. Tick the parts off the list as each bag is checked place the parts from it in a fresh bag and keep the bench clear. If anything is missing, check the bags again. If it's still missing, contact Maplin before you continue.

For this job you'll need the normal pliers, screwdrivers, wiretrimmers etc, and a multimeter to test everything. Also make sure that the requisite volts amps and watts are as ordered. A soldering iron with a fine bit, good light and a supply of patience will see you through.

For a full in depth look at how to go about constructing any of the Maplin kits, there are a series of books available that go through the rudiments and theory as well as the soldering. The £2.95 that the appropriate book adds to the cost is well worth the investment. When building the kit, I found the book indispensible.

First things first, take the PCB that comes in the kit and examine it for signs of damaged tracks or 'shorts'. It is a fairly simple single sided PCB and the quality of the review sample was good, with no whiskers or breaks. The integrity of the circuit board was fine when connections were checked using diagnostic equipment so I was ready to warm up the iron.

The parts that are attached to the PCB were scrutinised and with everything intact the job was laid out on the bench.

To allow any one that wants to build it in tandem with Circuit City, I've unplugged the iron and I'm going to sit and twiddle my thumbs for 14 days to allow you time to send the Christmas money to Maplin to get your



# EXPRESS EXTRA

This is the second of our regular monthly round-ups of second-hand prices, compiled from Shopping *Express* and already some interesting trends are becoming apparent. Read on for those bargains...

hile Shopping Express is undoubtedly the perfect way to track down the best bargains in the computer world, many people are still, perhaps understandably, wary of buying products through mail order or through personal ads. This is mainly because you usually cannot see the item you are buying before you hand over your money.

We do everything in our power to make sure that all the advertisements we run are above board. But here are a few tips designed to take the risk out of buying through the post or over the phone:

- Be precise in describing what you want to buy. Leave no room for error. Feel free to go overboard in doublechecking details – make, model, specifications, colour, size, the page number and name of the magazine in which you saw the advertisement etc.
- Confirm the price you are supposed to be paying. If

As usual, just a few points to bear in mind:

you are phoning a company check whether there are any hidden extras, such as postage and packaging.

- Check how the item will be delivered to you and how long it will take. This is especially important with the reader ads where delivery details are rarely mentioned.
- If you are writing off for the product keep copies of all correspondence. If you are phoning note down details of when you phoned and who you spoke to.
- If possible, enquire about guarantees and servicing. Check the supplier's policy on returns and refunds. With reader ads, it is probably best to make the effort to see the item before you hand over any money.
- It is best to pay by credit card, especially for items over £100, as this provides extra cover under the credit card companies' own insurance schemes. Otherwise use a crossed cheque or postal order. Avoid sending cash at all costs.





arcade game Pipe Mania. Your aim is to build a pipeline to contain the flow of some sticky, gooey substance.

To do this you use a variety of pipe segments including horizontal and vertical straights, bends and cross pieces. You plonk them down with the aim of forming one continuous length of piping. The snag is that you have no control

over which pieces you are given. You have to work with what you get.

More often than not there's a gap left in the pipe you're building but you just cannot find the right shape with which to fill it. Meanwhile the fluid continues to flow relentlessly, and you have to get rid of the pieces that don't fit by putting them down elsewhere, then wait for one that does.

A window showing the next few pipes appears on the left of the screen. The trick is to position these in places where they'll come in useful later on.

The graphics are more than adequate and the music is good too. All in all it's an extremely polished piece of public domain software.

Pipeline is a very addictive game. I'll confess that I haven't actually progressed any further than the first level yet, but I'll keep on trying...

Three other games come on the same disk. Jeopard has had a mention before in these pages, but for those who missed it here's a short description.

Basically, Jeopard is a computerised version of the famous board game Risk. Players take charge of armies, each with the aim of conquering the world.

The main advantage the computer version has over the board game is that there's none of that messing around with playing cards and fiddly bits of plastic.

Also on the disk is a version of another famous game, Mastermind. In it the computer sets the code which the player has to crack using logic and deduction before they run out of a limited number of turns

The game runs from the workbench and can be clicked on and off with ease. This makes it useful to have on your own



What starts off looking very simple indeed is, in fact, extremely difficult and frustrating. 

# ■ HELP! Atari drive extra

I have just acquired a pair of elderly 5.25inch floppy disk drives and I need some information to enable me to use them with my 520STFM.

The drives are Mirropolis model 11151V. They are large, old fashioned looking (single side?) American beasties. The power supply connections (+12, +5, 0V) are self explanatory, but what I need is the pin out for the PCB edge connector. It has 17 underside connections which are all common (ground?) numbered odd (1-33) and top contacts (2-34) even numbers. I need to know which contact number to wire to each of the 14 pins of the Atari connecting plug.

I would be most grateful for any information you can give me about these drives. Also do you know of a supplier of Atari type 14-pin plugs or leads.

The 5.25-inch drives you possess aren't in any of our catalogues although the connectors seem to be normal. Get a competent computer repairer to check the pin outs for you and check the capacity. Even if they're a strange capacity it may be possible to use a software patch to run them, but with extra ST drives only costing £45.50 (if you look hard), it may be that the cost outweighs the benefits.

The plugs and leads that you are after can be obtained from RSD on 0992 584205.

# **■ HELP! Address printer**

The only job that is truly computerised in our office is printing the sticky labels to go on envelopes. We address 600 envelopes a day and at the weekend, the same sticky label program is used for our weekly stock update.

The problem isn't so much the weekend when there is only one person using
the printer, but during the week when our
printer has to be taken off line and be
adjusted for the labels. During the time
that the labels are being printed, no one
can have access to the printer for letters,
reports and such like.

It wasn't too bad initially. We are a well organised company and we allocated time slots to every use of the hardware. As business increases, the leeway between those time slots is gobbled up and we currently have to allocate ten hours of

overtime per week in order to get the labels set and printed.

We know that we must get another printer and we have an XT clone that isn't used and could be set up purely to drive a dedicated printer for labels. With space at a premium, I wonder if you can recommend a simple printer that could do the one job of labels.

I am loathed to recommend a printer specifically for one job. The situation that you have described is a small fast developing company. If your main printer goes pop and the only other alternative is the one that you use for labels, you will be wondering where the paddle is if your label printer can only print labels. My advice would be to invest in a good brand name printer that may be slightly over specified for the job, but would be a good emergency back up for the main one if that blew up or otherwise chose to take a day off.

If your needs were slightly different and you had redundancy already built in to your printing requirements, I would suggest a nippy little widget from Seikosha. The Seikosha Smart Label Printer is a teeny little software driven dedicated printer that takes up very little space, doesn't make a lot of racket and can do labels, bar codes, and all the other sticky jobs that a printer is usually needed for. It comes with its own software and will run on any IBM PX XT, AT, PS/2 or true compatible. We tried it on half a dozen machines around the office without any problems.

# HELP! Virus insight

Could you recommend a book on viruses that isn't too heavy on the brain, will give me an insight into the problem and can tell me what to do about them. I already have information on Solomon's virus service but want to try something different.

What's wrong with Dr Solomon? We've always found him to be more than adequate, easily comprehensible and very approachable. If you honestly don't want the country's leading virus-fettler's advice I suppose you have your reasons.

The current book catalogue lists several virus specific books, but the one

that comes closest to your needs is *The Computer Virus Handbook* by RB Levin. It is published by Osborne McGraw-Hill and has the number ISBN 0-07-881647-5. It's an American import with a cover price of \$24.95, but as with all US books, shop around for a good price. WH Smith says that it can get it easily enough but we couldn't find anyone local with it on the shelves so be prepared to wait the statutory 14 or so days after it's ordered.

# ■ HELP! Piracy again

I have bought an Amiga second-hand and it came with some useful utilities. Amongst these was a program called *X-Copy* which I used to back up all my friends' games. I got a virus on a disk and it has trashed most of my games disks and made them unplayable.

Unfortunately, X-Copy was trashed too so I can't start again. I only have about 30 games left. What should I do?

You should get a good solicitor. If you copy games you are breaking the law. If you had bothered to put an address on the letter we would have been able to send Bob Hay and the team from FAST (Federation Against Software Theft) along to lend a helping hand with the cataloguing of your remaining illegal disks.

The only thing that you can do now is get a good Virus killer (Virus X or suchlike) from a PD library and go through your disks checking them for nasties. The games with their copy protected loaders will have to be trashed because the virus killer will mistake their non-standard bootblocks for viruses and render them unusable. Still that's not a great price to pay as you didn't pay anything in the first place!

# ■ HELP! driver diversity

I have two printer orientated questions I wish to ask.

Firstly, I have recently bought a Citizen Swift 24 colour printer for connection to an Amiga 500. After getting familiar with the highly complex menu system which this printer employs, I now have to contend with software difficulties.

I am having particular problems with my trusted word processor, ProWrite version 2.0. I can get my Citizen to print both NQL and draft covering all 80 columns, but when I want something printed in the standard print mode, used for coloured graphics with text, the printer then starts printing the output half way across the page. When the print head reaches the furthest right hand position it makes a very disturbing growling noise then jumps to the middle of the next line.

I have tried everything to stop it altering the built in menu, printer drivers, preference settings, even repositioning the paper, but all have failed to solve my problem. I am desperate.

My second printer problem concerns a Watanabe X-Y Plotter model MP1000. It's a serial printer with a standard RS232C interface. My problem is I know of no printer drivers, no software or anything enabling me to use this plotter.

In desperation I wrote a short program on Amiga basic telling the plotter to print the letter 'A'. After running it all I got was a load of numbers and letters, none of which made any sense. I hope you can help me with both these problems.

You've hit the nail on the head when you say that the problem is one of printer drivers. The Amiga is well specified in that department with dozens of PD libraries clambering over each other for the honour of filling your needs.

You could choose any that are advertising in the computer press, but here's one to start with: Amiganuts, 169, Dale Valley Road, Southampton.

# HELP! Amstrad extra

I have recently bought a second drive for my Amstrad PPC640S and after fitting it in accordance with the instructions and powering up the computer both drives were recognised by the computer, but a message "put system disk in drive A" appeared. No matter what I did this message still came up. If I put a disk in each drive then the computer tried to access drive A ten times before the message appeared.

After fitting the new drive in place of the original drive and not connecting the second drive the computer worked OK recognising the system disk.

Have you any suggestions, please? Arthur Wilkes, Durham City.

Sounds like you've got a dose of "Whoops, I ssem to have forgot to send the drive select jumpers properly" syn-

drome. Most drives have jumpers that can be set in four positions (0,1,2,3) Drive A is 0, Drive B is 1 and so on. Make sure that you've got this sorted. If it still doesn't work, there could be jumpers or DIP switches on the controller or board that need setting. Check your manuals foer the correct setting, finally, make sure that your connectors are clean and that you are trying to connect the correct things together. (Manuals again!) There, it works now, doesn't it.

# ■ HELP! PCW rainbow

VGA monitors get talked about in all of the PC magazines and the pictures of them are better than the PCW display. How do I add a VGA monitor to my PCW? The local computer shop was unhelpful, telling me to upgrade to a 9512 for a a paper white mon-

# ■ HELP! On line on-line

Most of my reports are typed on the train going to or from meetings. The disk from my Tosh is given to a secretary and after spell checking etc, the report is output through a Laserjet. From time to time, I'm away from the office for a couple of weeks and the only way to get the work done without any outside help is to post or courier the disk back to HQ.

There must be a more satisfactory way to do this and I'm wondering if I can connect a portable phone to my tosh and send the data back to the office that way. Allan Maudslay, Coventry

It's possible, but it isn't quite as simple as you think. We've tried several ways of getting data to and from remote locations and it can be difficult.

The first attempt was using an acoustic coupler and a portable modem. This allowed us to log on to an on-line service, but the acoustic connection allowed a lot of corruption to get on the line. It worked from the top of a big hill at a quiet time of day, but on the train and a

National Express coach, it wasn't so clever. From the passenger seat of a car on the M25 we had slightly better results but in order to guarantee error free communication, stronger medicine was called for.

A telephone call to RACAL, the nice vodaphone folks, confirmed that they do a dedicated cellphone modem that will connect to certain portable phones and uses a system akin to packet radio with stringent checksumming to ensure data integrity. What this means is that the data is collected into 'packets', an algorithm checks its content and is attached to the packet. This is squirted along the cell phone radio signal and 'caught' by a receiver that 'opens' the packet of data, checks what's in it against the checksum and if all's well, places it in a received file. If there's a problem, it sends a signal back to the transmitting modem and asks for the packet again. This carries on until the packet is received without error.

Using this system, your document should get there without corruption. RACAL is on 0635 503236.

That however is only half of the story. Once you've got your mobile system up and working, you'll have to have a method of receiving data. The simplest way would be to have a modern attached to a spare PC in the office and have the PC running host software. This would work like a private BBS with you pinning your messages on to the board and your secretarial staff taking them off.







# **GAMES ON THE CHEAP**



Gone are the days when compilations featured games about as appealing as the green socks your granny gives you on Christmas morning. For around £30 you can now buy some of the year's biggest titles. So here's a quick run down of some of the more notable compilations available in the run up to Christmas

Domark's Wheels of Fire compilation features last Christmas's big car racing games: Hard Drivin', Chase HQ, Turbo Outrun and Powerdrift. The C64 version of the compilation includes the much-awaited Hard Drivin' which has never previously been available on the C64.

Beau Jolly's Power Pack comes with the classic Xenon II, Bloodwych (a 2-player adventure), TV Sports Football (an American football simulator) and Lombard RAC Rally (yet another racing game).

Certainly the best of the compilations is UBI Soft's Challengers which features tennis, aircraft, football, car and ski simulators in the form of Pro Tennis Tour, Fighter Bomber, Kick Off, Stunt Car Racer and Super Ski. Not bad for £29.99.



# SIM CITY: FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

Fed up with playing Sim City? Bored by the similarities of each game? I prescribe a dose of the Sim City architecture disks.

They replace the graphics already supplied with the game so that you get a completely different set of residential zones and commercial or industrial zones. They also give you more problems to watch out for and some new scenarios. However, the game is still the same so if you're starting to feel that *Sim City* is a little like building a town out of Lego bricks you're not going to lose that impression after playing with the architecture disks.

There are two new disks available each coming with three different scenarios. The first is architecture disk one set in the distant past. The first scenario is ancient Asia where farmers and craftsmen must be encouraged to thrive in their little villages. The second, set in medieval times places you in the role of king of the castle, thriving on the high tax revenues collected from your

people. The last scenario is set in the wild west in 1849. You need to develop a community to support the gold-digging miners and watch out for such disasters as contaminated water, rattlesnakes and jackals.

Architecture disk two is based firmly in the future. The first scenario puts you in the USA during the 21st Century. The city is highly commercialised and you

now need to buy spaceports to transport passengers and goods on interplanetary flights. Instead of ordinary power stations you now have a choice between nuclear fusion or fission and must be ever careful of the likelihood of thermo-nuclear pollution.

In the second scenario you're placed in Europe in the year 2155. The continent is united and your job is to build a new capital for Europe, encouraging international research, trade and production. A monorail transport system and space ports make life more appealing in the new Europe but disaster is just around the corner.

The last scenario on this disk puts you on the moon where mining resources and reduced gravity enable you to grow quickly. However, extra-terrestrial life-forms, plagues and lack of oxygen threaten to disrupt your progress at every turn.

The architecture disks aren't going to miraculously eradicate the problems with the original Sim City but they are set to make it interesting enough to keep you addicted a little while longer – at least until Sim City 2 comes out next year.

## MORE TURRICAN MAGIC

After repeatedly stating that *Turrican* would never make it onto the ST, Rainbow Arts has released an ST version this month. It's hardly had time to climb the charts before Rainbow Arts announced plans to produce a follow-up called *Turrican 2 – the Final Fight*, though how final it's likely to be must surely depend on its success.

If you found the original Turrican difficult then pre-

pare for some mega torture in Turrican 2. I've had a chance to play Amiga and ST demos of the first level and it's something of a monster. The shoot-'em-up action greatly has enhanced by some tremendous visual effects. In level one you walk through waterfalls which behave like waterfalls, over bridges that flex


under every footstep and through a nightmarish battle against wind which unrelentingly tosses you backwards.

However, what Rainbow Arts is most excited about are the sound effects. Lively sampled tunes not only introduce each level but have been correctly synchronised to come in at exactly the right moment. Sampled speech and other complimentary sound effects accompany the real action.

Besides ST and Amiga formats, *Turrican 2* is being released on the C64, CPC and Spectrum. All are due out early next year. ■

# STRIDER 2: HACK 'N' SLASH WITH LASER GUNS

Arcade conversions and movie licences reign supreme over the Christmas period. The story of *Strider 2*, though, is an interesting paradox. Instead of being a feeble attempt at reproducing hit arcade gameplay, *Strider 2* has actually been devised on 16-bit machines and the intention is to produce an arcade game out of the idea sometime next year.

The original Strider game was one of US Gold's biggest ever hits. It succeeded in collecting coveted awards after its release last year and was widely acclaimed as one of the most impressive interpretations of an arcade licence.

In Strider 2 you play with the same acrobatic hero armed with a sabre which you can use to hack the heads off of anything that comes your way. When the action gets too intense, simply leap majestically into the air and sail over your enemies head. But there are many new additions Strider 2.

First off there is a challenging exploration element to the sequal. Instead of confronting a scrolling level in which one legion of enemies after another is tossed into your path, you have to find your way around a multitude of platforms and pathways in a bid to discover the end of the level. In level one you simply need to advance horizontally but by the time you reach level two you're in for some serious headaches.

The two towers level is arranged as two indivdual columns comprising sets of platforms and lifts. The idea is to scale the platforms and climb to the top of the first tower from where you cross to the second. You then have to try to climb down to the ground.

In other levels you must constantly attempt to sail

downwards. When you reach the end of each level you then have to confront a massive enemy sprite which must be totally obliterated before you can to proceed to the next.

To help you overcome the end of level bad guy you can transform into a robot providing you have collected enough pods on your travels. Each pod collected buys you more time as a robot. Whereas Strider's sabre only has a short range, when you change into a robot you are armed with a laser gun which fires across the entire length of the screen. It is so powerful it can wipe away the end of level bad guy after just a handful of well-directed shots.

One drawback is that the robot is only capable of moving horizontally so you can't use it to scale platforms. However, it does offer limited protection against enemy bullets so it can very worthwhile changing into a robot when you get the chance.


Strider 2 is a very competent arcade-style game. The animation is smooth, the levels are colourful and varied and the extras give it the edge over more straightforward scrolling games.

In the year since the release of the original Strider game, though, we've come to expect much more from our games. In the 16-bit arena particularly, shoot-'em-ups have become much faster, visuals damned near enormous and sound effects positively brilliant. Strider 2 doesn't have any of these ingredients and as a result has a very dated feel to it.

If you buy every arcade game that hits the shelves, Strider 2 is going to be an absorbing challenge. But if you only buy one arcade game every six months, hold out for something better.



 Complicating the action in Strider 2 are all manner of new obstacles from laser doors to lifts. Can you get to the top of this installation in time to pick up those bonus pods?

his December you won't have to go to a pantomime to enter an Aladdin's cave, according to the organisers of the second Computer Shopper Show. Blenheim Database Exhibitions promises visitors a high-tech wealth of wonders "with exhibitors slashing prices to the bone in the light of the expected volume of sales."

This is only the second Shopper Show, but the inaugural event last December was such a runaway success that the show is already a major date on the computer exhibition calendar.

This year's show takes place at the Wembley Conference Centre from Thursday December 6 to Sunday December 9 and a massive 40,000 visitors are expected to pour through the doors over the four days. And with 280 exhibitors ranging from independent retailers to major names such as Acorn, Atari and Commodore, few would dispute Blenheim's claim that: "This will be the world's largest pre-Christmas computer

shopping spree."

The show is indeed the perfect place to pick up Christmas bargains. "Intense competition is the key to it all," according to Michael Meakin, Blenheim's head of organisers. "Exhibitors realise that people come to the show to save money on purchases and are reacting accordingly."

An exit poll of attendees at last year's show revealed that as many as 95 per cent reckoned they had made substantial savings. Although the 1990 show is so close to Christmas it will also be the UK public's first opportunity to buy or try out up to 100 new products ranging from software such as *Colossus Bridge* and *Final Conflict* to the Olivetti PC/S range of small business machines.

The computer companies see the show as the perfect opportunity to make contact with their customers. "Shopper is ideal for both sales and promotional purposes," reckons Atari's Bob Katz. "It is perfectly timed to attract record crowds in that all important period immediately prior to Christmas. Of equal importance to us is that it provides the breathing space in which to do business."

The console giants, Sega and Nintendo, are also keen to exploit the show in the run up to what they see as the "Console Christmas." As Philip Ley, Sega Marketing Manager, explains: "The event is perfectly timed to play a key role in our overall seasonal push for Christmas. We view the show as being an integral part of maintaining the highest profile at this most important time of year."

If with all these glorious opportunities around, you feel a bit in awe and at a loss as to what to buy, fear not. Go to the advice centre where experts will dispense free unbiased guidance on buying computers and peripherals. Additionally, both the London Chamber of Commerce and the DTI will be present to help people with small businesses. And, of course, user groups will



Nintendo is hoping to whip up some Turtle mania to promote *The Mutant Machine*, its christmas bundle for this year. The package combines the Nintendo

Entertainment System with Konami's new game Teenage Mutant Hero Turtles. There will be be a whole host of other Turtle promotions including a special launch offer for The Mutant Machine allowing Show visitors to buy it for just £79.99, a full £20 less than it will cost in the shops.

Another kids favourite, *Mario* – reckoned to be the most famous computer generated character in the world – will be on hand for personal appearances.

Nintendo is also taking the opportunity to show off its Game Boy hand-held console. Mike Hayes of Serif, Nintendo's distributor in the UK, explained: "When we launch Game Boy we will not be indulging in large television advertising so the *Computer Show* will be the first time that many people in this country will have seen this exciting new product."

Although Sega's rival product, the GameGear, is not yet officially available in the UK, Virgin

Mastertronics, Sega's UK distributors, will be on hand with demonstration models of the latest Sega consoles on its stand. And doubtlessly a few unofficial GameGears will find their way into the show.

#### SHOPPING AROUND

Making its first appearance at the show will be the ARC's Cyber Assault, billed as "the first accurate simulation of a humanoid figure travelling in an unrestricted 3D world."

More 3D action comes from Mandarin Software which will be promoting *STOS 3D* which allows the creation of 3D objects and space in STOS.

Also of interest to Amiga and ST users will be new games from Impressions, including *The Last Starship, Striker* and *Win A Billion*, and CDS, including *European Superleague* and *Tank Attack*..

For Amiga fans in particular there will be a number of products available in Amiga versions for the first time,

including Flexidump from Care Electronics and a doublepack from Microtec consisting of Bugbash and Nucleus. An improved version of LCL's Micro English educational package which now covers oral communication and corresponds to the 1991 syllabus will also make its first appearance.

There are also plans for Commodore's long delayed CDTV to have a viewing at the show, but with the yet another announcement from the company about the postponing of a launch date, the exact form its appearance will take, if it appears at all, remains uncertain.

ST devotees can look forward to new products for their machine. B Bytes will unveil several, including the B Write wordprocessor and the art package Kid Paint. Version 1.4 of Supercharger which allows the ST to run all MS-DOS applications at 8MHz will be launched by Condor Computers while Kuma will be revealing K-Spread 4, an accounts package, and Adimens 3.0, a relational database.

### HIGH FLYING WITH ACORN

Acorn is offering a unique flying experience to all budding pilots at the Show. Built into the Acorn stand will be a realistic fighter plane cockpit complete with ejector seat, joystick and flightdeck instruments.

Once in the cockpit, visitors will experience the thrills and spuills of the Archimedes flight simulator *Interdictor* displayed on a large screen. A real Concorde pilot will also be on hand on the Saturday morning to take on all challengers, so you can see how you match



hen you first get a computer with a floppy disk drive it seems such a luxury. Compared to cassettes, disks work at the speed of light. Unfortunately you soon hit their limits – principally the small amount of data they can store.

If you ever use a computer with a hard disk drive you will never want to use a floppy disk computer again, it's as simple as that. Hard disks have three great advantages. First, they can hold vast amounts of data and huge programs. Second, you can have all your programs accessible instantly instead of having to find the relevant disks. And third, they are extremely quick.

The smallest hard disk you can get can hold 20 megabytes (20,971,520 characters); the largest common floppy disk drive can squeeze in 1.44 megabytes (1,509,948 characters). An ST floppy disk can be tweaked so it will hold 800K (819,200 characters) so you can see that the leap to a hard disk is a major one – and that's the smallest hard disk drive. You can get drives with upwards of a gigabyte (1,073,741,824 characters) of storage!

The vast spaces of a hard disk allow programs to become more sophisticated as the size of the program code is no longer restricted by the size of the disk. Programs such as desktop publishing applications can be much more powerful – for instance the leading program PageMaker is over 1.5Mb long in its latest version and simply cannot be run off a floppy disk.

Hard disks are very fast. Most programs load in a couple of seconds at most, instead of minutes of disk swapping you have to endure with a floppy. Data files can be loaded in a flash.

So they're a valuable addition to your computer armoury. But what should you look for in a hard disk drive?


#### **SPECIFICATIONS**

There are four measurements associated with hard disk drives:

- Storage capacity. Measured in megabytes, this is the amount of data you can store on the disk. 20Mb is the smallest commonly available size, and the norm is rapidly becoming a 40Mb disk.
- Access time. Also called 'seek time' this measures how long it takes the disk to find your data, on average.
   An access time of 70 milliseconds is slow, many disks operate at 40ms, and 20ms and below is lightning fast (and very expensive).
- Data transfer speed. Measured in megabytes per second, this records how quickly the disk can read data into the computer's memory. For average sized files the access time is more important than transfer speed.
- Interleave. As the platter of the hard disk spins around the hard drive reads data from it. Unfortunately most computers can't handle data as fast as it pours off the disk. To get around this most drives space the data out so that it comes in at a more reasonable pace. The interleave is a measure of the gap between successive blocks of data, and is expressed as a ratio of data to space. The space is not wasted several pieces of data

# HARD DISKS MADE EASY

Hard disks are expensive beasts, but is it worth investing in extra storage? Express investigates . . .

are placed alternately on the disk to fill up the disk. A 1:1 interleave hard disk is the fastest on paper, but if your computer cannot cope with the data that fast it will actually be slower than a 1:3 or 1:5 disk.

#### **BUYING A DISK**

If you have a PC you can shop around and get a disk with the attributes you need. ST, Amiga and Archimedes users are much more limited in their choice, and devices that are in essence the same as a PC hard disk can sell for double the price.

Check through the small ads in Shopping Express – you'll find a number of disks on offer. Compatibility is no problem with ST, Amiga and Archimedes drives; if it's stated that the drive will work with that machine then

you'll be all right. One feature to look for is 'autobooting'; some disks require you to insert a special floppy before the hard drive will get up and running, autobooting machines just require you to flip the on/off switch. Always choose an autobooting disk if you can.

PC owners have a much more complicated life. Besides having hundreds of drives to choose from, they need an extra gadget called a hard disk controller to get the thing up and running. Unfortunately there are several different kinds of hard disk controllers, which support different kinds of disks. Abbreviations like MFM, RLL, EDSI, IDE, SCSI and ST106 make life harder. In a future article we'll explain what these terms mean, but the important thing is to make sure the controller card matches the disk drive. If you are buying a disk and a controller get them from the same supplier and make it clear you expect them to work together. If you already have a controller get as many details about it as you can and include them with your hard disk order.

You can get around these problems by buying a hard card – that's a hard disk physically welded to the back of a hard disk controller which just plugs into an expansion slot. It's the easiest way, but is a bit more expensive and the drives tend to be low performance models.

Whatever you do, a hard disk is well worth the investment and you'll find your computing life is revolutionised by these superfast disk drives.

#### WHAT'S INSIDE A HARD DISK?

Hard disks consist of rigid ceramic disks, called platters, which spin at several hundred rpm. Devices called 'heads' are controlled by motors that move them around the disk surface reading and writing the data.


Because the hard disk is solidly constructed to high tolerances, it

can pack much more data in than a floppy disk. That, combined with the multiple platters and the high rotation speed, gives the hard disk its performance edge.

Because of these fine tolerances, hard disks are notoriously fragile; an Express hard

drive died after being driven five miles to the photographer's and back! Although this is improving all the time, if you buy a hard drive it will come with a 'parking' program which stores the heads neatly out of the way for moving it. Ignore this program at your peril!

If you've got an Amiga and envy some of your old adversary's software, the best emulator yet produced for your machine is now available. Jason Holborn defects to the other side...

T emulation certainly isn't anything new on the Amiga - MacroSystems' Medusa ST Emulator card has been happily running Atari software for a couple of months now, but that did have one slight disadvantage - the price. Coming in at just under £200, you could easily pick up a real Atari for just a few pounds more, which defeated the object of buying an emulator in the first place. Thankfully though, Maxon's Chamäleon ST emulator doesn't suffer from this problem. It works equally as well as the Medusa Card, but still manages to sell for around £100 cheaper than it's rival. Why? Because it's software only.

In many ways, there was no real reason why Medusa needed that ridiculously small PCB - Macro Systems itself admitted that the board handled nothing more than I/O, so it wasn't exactly a crucial part of the Medusa system.

#### LEGAL EAGLE

Chamaleon comes to you on two disks - one for the Amiga and another in Atari format. Also included is a fairly comprehensive manual that covers the basics of what Chamaleon will and won't do, how to install it and even how to use the Atari desktop. The packaging contains the oddest

illustration I've seen for quite a while - a camel changing from green to orange. Don't these people realise that a Chamaleon is a

lizard? Just like Macro Systems emulator (and indeed, every other

under the world), emulator Chamäleon isn't just a boot up and go affair (surprise, surprise). As always, things are far more involved than that. The first

thing you must do is to find a friendly Atari user and talk them into allowing you to extract the operating system from their computer. Sounds painful I know, but the whole process is actually done through software (thankfully).

Here then, is where we encounter the first problem. Maxon doesn't actually supply such a utility with the Chamāleon package, so it's up to you to source a program that will do the job. This isn't really surprising, as rumour has it that Atari is clamping down hard on emulator manufacturers. According to a source in the US, Chamaleon is already the subject of investigation by Atari's lawyers, so it may be wise to buy your copy now. It's a familiar story. Atari isn't the first company to object to emulators - Apple has been trying to ban Mac emulators for years now. The funny thing is though, Atari seems perfectly happy to advertise the fact that you can run Mac software on an ST (with an emulator such as HiSoft's Spectre GCR). One cannot help but think thatperhaps Atari should practise what it preaches (after all, impersonation is supposedly the sincerest form of flattery!)

#### COMPUTER MONGREL

Once you've sourced such a program (these are generally available from ST PD libraries, although I used the GETTOS.PRG program that came with the Medusa emulator), all you have to do is to copy the resulting TOS.IMG file onto the supplied ST disk. Once this is done, you're ready to get your first taste of Tramiel computing on the Amiga.

All that now remains is to turn on your Amiga, insert the program disk into the internal drive and Chamaleon then starts to boot. Once you're past the fancy loading graphics, Chamaleon then asks you to insert the Atari-format disk containing the TOS.IMG file. If everything is OK, Chamaleon then reads this file into memory. From here, you can then choose the resolution which your hybrid ST is to work in - all three ST resoluprograms that fix certain well-known programs to work with Chamäleon. These include programs such as GFA-BASIC, Signum Script!, etc. Just click on the appropriate patcher program and the application is automatically fixed. Obviously it goes without saying that you should only feed back-up copies of your Atari software through these patcher programs, otherwise you could well end up with an Atari program that won't even work on a real Atari!

There are, of course, some programs that most definitely won't work under Chamaleon. For starters, Atari games won't work. Some PD games that don't 'bash the metal' might just run, but the general rule is that games are a non-starter. This isn't exactly suprising. After all, no matter how advanced the Amiga hardware, the fact is that it isn't an Atari. As the old saying goes, nothing runs Atari software better than an Atari.

#### JUST THE THING

So there we have it, an ST emulator at a realistic price.

It certainly works - for people that want to run serious ST software without having to fork out for a second machine, then it could well be just the thing. Indeed, there are really only two things I don't like about Chamaleon. The first is that Maxon hasn't included a utility to rip TOS from an ST. Secondly, the Chamaleon boot disk uses a special disk format that basically means

that it can't be installed on a hard disk. This could make it somewhat less useful for professional users.

> Gripes aside though, Chamăleon is an impressive achievement in software design. It's highly compatible, fast and above all, relatively cheap. If you already own an Amiga and yearn to get a

taste of what the other side is up to, then Chamäleon is the answer. All in all, Chamaleon comes highly recommended.
