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Let's Not Forget Singles!

The watchword in the record business today is stereo.

Everyone is thinking stereo—concentrating on its introduction and wondering how it will affect the record market.

It is our suggestion that while all this is taking place, we do not neglect a part of the market that we know, and the part that very often provides the gravy of the record business—singles.

There is often a tendency, when some new product is being introduced, for an industry to devote so much energy and brain power to it that there is sometimes little left over for the established products. We hope that this doesn't happen in the record industry.

Of course we are all vitally interested in stereo and what it will mean to us, but let's not forget that no matter how big the album market may grow, there will always be a market for singles—and a profitable one at that.

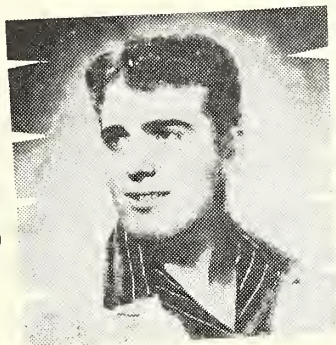
This part of the market—the making and merchandising of singles—requires constant concentration, constant supervision. The people involved in it must be attuned to the slightest change in attitudes, conditions and emotional reactions. It is a much faster moving field than albums for very often there is just no time for planning. Sometimes records must be made on the spur of the moment and the reason that they can be made that way is that there is a day-to-day involvement on the part of the people who make them. Any relinquishing of this constant contact must necessarily result in a lower percentage of hits.

Naturally no one in the record industry wants that. But sometimes we just slip into a procedure whose end result turns out to be something we don't want. Therefore it is up to everyone in the record business not to neglect either the new stereo market nor the established markets but to give to each all the energies and abilities available so that each may prosper and progress.

Record Reviews

ACADEMICS (Elmont 1002)

B+ "SOMETHIN' COOL" (1:54) [H & K BMI—Fisher, Luth] The new Elmont label gets off to a terrific start with a winning rock and roll jumper that could blossom into a teenage favorite. Dave Fisher in the lead hands in an extremely commercial vocal. Watch this sleeper. It could take off.

C+ "DRIVE-IN MOVIE" (2:18) [H & K BMI—Ganter, Greenberg] Marty Ganter handles the lead on this rockin' opus. Swinging dance stuff with a good beat and a cute lyric.

WILLIE NELSON (Liberty 55155)

B+ "NO DOUGH" (2:15) [Assembledly BMI—Norwood, Brandel] Ricky Nelson's cousin Willie hops on the disk bandwagon and makes a promising first showing under the Liberty banner with a good teenage rocker that could catch on. Side has an exciting dance beat the kids'll go for.

B "SUSIE" (2:55) [Assembly BMI—Leahy] A slow rock-a-ballad is chanted in commercial fashion by the youngster. Instrumental accompaniment is good.

JODIE SANDS (Chancellor 1023)

B "SOMEDAY" (You'll Want Me To Want You) (2:30) [Duchess BMI—Hodges] Jodie Sands takes hold of a wonderful standard, adds today's popular R&R ballad beat, and chants a meaningful version of the tune. Good side that could step out.

B "ALWAYS IN MY HEART" (2:43) [Southern ASCAP—Lecuona, Gannon] The beautiful latin standard is treated in pop ballad style by the canary. Pretty performance.

RANDY SPARKS (Verve 10147)

B+ "STRANGE ARE THE WAYS OF LOVE" (2:41) [Leo Feist ASCAP—Tiomkin, Washington] From the sound track of the upcoming film, "The Young Land" stems this beautiful Randy Sparks waxing. Lad has a sweet voice that lends itself perfectly to this western-flavored ballad. Keep a close tab on this tune. It could make it big. String backdrop is beautiful.

B "KING COTTON" (2:24) [Sparrow ASCAP—Sparks] The versatile lad penned this story about a stranded child who became King Cotton. Fast-moving toe-tapper with a catchy sound and tempo. Hot coupling.

FRANKIE LAINE (Columbia 41230)

B "MAGNIFICENT OBSESSION" (2:46) [Mello—Art ASCAP—Laine, Karger] Frankie co-authored this emotional love song which he chants in his familiar dramatic fashion. Fine crooning job by the veteran.

B "RAWHIDE" (2:00) [Erosa ASCAP—Washington, Tiomkin] The songster is at his bull-whipping best as he chants an exciting "Mule Train" type, galloping tempo number. Song is the title number from the CBS-TV production "Rawhide."

● Duane Eddy, the man with the twangy guitar who sent "Rebel-Rouser" into the winner's circle, has another exciting instrumental item that should follow suit. Dubbed "Ramrod", the side sports a torrid hipswinging rock and roll beat and features wails from the Rebels who accompany the guitar ace. Wild stuff the kids'll eat up. Coupling, "The Walker", is a slow, funky instrumental rocker. Top side is already making it.

● It looks as tho we may have another cha cha smash to follow the route paved by "Patricia". It's

a fabulous recording of the ever-green "Tea For Two Cha Cha" superbly executed by the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra starring Warren Covington. The choppy tempo is great for dancing as is the entire instrumentation. Terrific bit of arranging that'll have the dee jays spinning this number often. The cha cha enthusiasts, in all their glory in the warm weather months, are in constant search of a good new dance record. Well this is certainly it. Flip has Covington handling the vocal as the ork shuffles thru another oldie. Top side is already breaking. Watch it closely.

● Fats Domino is in top form once again as he intros a new song that should give him his biggest money-maker of the year. Titled "Young School Girl", the smooth rock-a-ballad item is perfectly timed for the return of teenagers to school. Humorous side which has Fats calling, "Hey school girl, get up! Vacation time's over and you gotta get back to school". Kids'll get a kick out of the lyric. Flip is a typical Domino rocker that falls easily on the ears.

CREW-CUTS

● The Crew-Cuts, who played an important role in the rock and roll boom, issue their first platter under the Victor banner and come up with a swinging effort that could take off. The side with the potential is "Hey, Stella", a torrid foot-stomper with a great beat and a number of terrific gimmicks. Hot deck to watch closely. The companion deck is a pretty rock-a-ballad, "Forever, My Darling". Big arrangement of a hot teenage love tune.

SHEB WOOLEY (MGM 12704)

B+ "MONKEY JIVE" (2:01) [Cordial BMI—Wooley] Sheb Wooley, still on the charts with his "Purple People Eater" smash, has another cute novelty about a monkey, that could also attract considerable attention. It's got a solid rock and roll beat and some humorous sound effects that could catch on.

C+ "THE CHASE" (2:14) [Cordial BMI—Wooley] The songster works against a speedy backdrop as he recites a description of an auto race. Lyrics are delivered at a trigger fast pace.

RICKY SHAW (Golden Crest 505)

B+ "GOTTA (Have Your Love)" (1:50) [C. F. G. BMI—Hoffman] Golden Crest could have a big coin catcher in this folk-flavored opus sporting a good romantic lyric. Shaw does a fine job in the delivery and gets excellent support from a group. Watch this sleeper.

B "THE RIDDLE" (2:27) [C. F. G. BMI—Galehouse] This lovely folk song, referred to by many as "I Gave My Love A Cherry", is handled in warm, convincing fashion by the songster. Latin beat backdrop is exciting.

JOHN BUZON TRIO (Mills 777)

B+ "TZENA, T Z E N A, T Z E N A, T Z E N A" (2:23) [Mills ASCAP—Parish, Miron, Grossman] Mills' first single release is a thrilling instrumental arrangement of an Israeli favorite by the Buzon Trio. Organ work is in the spotlight with a fabulous sound that makes you wanna stamp your feet. Exciting hora from beginning to end. Side could reap a heavy sale in Jewish populated areas.

C+ "BLUES IN MY HEART" (2:32) [Gotham ASCAP—Carter, Mills] Organ, sax and drums combine on this end to give the listener a slow, hip-swinging blues item. More exciting listening.

THE EXCITING VOICES cond. by EVELYN FREEMAN (Bel Canto 722)

B+ "DIDN'T IT RAIN" (2:10) [Morrisania ASCAP] One of the most thrilling arrangements of this gospel classic we've ever heard is this one by the Exciting Voices. Sensational bit of wailing by lead voice (which is obviously coming from the heart) should attract considerable attention. One of Bel Canto's rare single releases and it's a great treat. Dee jays looking for a top gospel deck have a gem here.

B "SWING LOW SWEET CHAR-I-OT" (1:56) [Morrisania ASCAP] Here Miss Freeman's group offers another great gospel standard—but this time the number sports an exciting rock and roll beat. Powerful coupling.

THE EMERALDS (ABC-Paramount 9948)

C+ "I'M DREAMING" (2:32) [Pamco BMI—Pazman] The Emeralds, a group with a Hill-toppers' sound, debut on Am-Par with a pretty rock-a-ballad reminiscent of "I'm Trying". Commercial teen fare.

C+ "CONFESS" (2:08) [Oxford ASCAP—Benjamin, Weiss] An easy-going rockin' tempo accompanies the group thru this romantic opus.

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GORDON MacRAE
(Capitol 4033)

B+ "THE SECRET" (2:37) [Day-win BMI—Lubin, Roth] Gordon MacRae could have his biggest money-maker in years in this commercial latin beat romancer. Pretty teenage love song that becomes prettier with each new listen. Lyrics are right up the teenagers' alley. Strong crooning job.

B "A MAN ONCE SAID" (2:19) [E. H. Morris ASCAP—Shapiro, Livingston] The crooner couples the top side with another potent latin beat romancer sporting a dreamy melody and a dramatic love lyric. Working in a more subdued manner (as he is on this coupling) could shoot the star onto the charts again.

THE MAJESTICS
(N.R.C. 502)

B "PLEASE DON'T SAY NO" (2:12) [Wonder BMI—Dixon] The Majestics debut on wax with an emotional rock-a-ballad. Lead voice has an effective sound and gets good R&R vocal support from the others in the group. Right up the teenagers' alley.

C+ "DIVIDED HEART" (2:03) [Wonder BMI—Lambert] The boys break this side open with a gimmick-filled R&R intro and follow thru with an up-beat jumper.

ROYAL HOLIDAYS
(Carlton 472)

B+ "I'M SORRY (I Did You Wrong)" (2:45) [Terrace BMI—Williams, Scott] Carlton has another potential money-maker in this exciting fish-beat ballad chanted effectively by the Royal Holidays. Smooth rock-a-ballad stuff for disk buying set.

C+ "MARGARET" (2:08) [Terrace BMI—Williams] An up-beat same tune gets a spirited reading from the combo.

RAY STEVENS
(Capitol 4030)

B "CAT PANTS" (2:18) [Central BMI—Carroll] Ray Stevens hands in a humorous rock and roll novelty about a hep new piece of teenage attire. Good beat opus.

C+ "LOVES GOES ON FOREVER" (2:09) [Lowery BMI—Rainwater, Powell] A dramatic rock-a-ballad is chanted effectively by the versatile talent.

BABY DOLLS
(RCA Victor 7296)

B+ "CAUSE I'M IN LOVE" (2:20) [Flip and Skip BMI—Johnson, Brown] A cute rock-a-cha-cha ditty introduces the Baby Dolls on wax. The gals have a charming teenage blend and a delightful, clean-cut novelty for their first showing. Side could make noise.

B "TUTTI FRUITTI (POP-PI)" (2:10) [Ketchy BMI—Kane, McCoy, Kirkland] Here the gals rock and roll thru another cute lilter sailor made for the youngsters.

Teeners and tots oughta find this to their liking. Flip has Rusty reviving the evergreen "You Can Depend On Me" to a rock and roll beat.

It's a warm, tenderly treated love song that has all the ingredients of a long-running, steady selling, money maker. And with the exposure the star can give it on his show, we can expect an immediate reaction. Good material tailor made for the polished crooner. Flip is a smart rhythm item handled in free swinging style.

It's a charming romantic finger-snapper titled "Promise Me, Love" that has Andy displaying his best multiple track harmony to date. Catchy side with that money sound. Flip is a slow, touching, folk-flavored opus.

● Tony Bennett is one of the few artists in the business who clicks with consistency singing "smart" material. "Just In Time", "Ca C'est L'Amour" and his "Young And Warm And Wonderful" are three good examples. His latest effort "Firefly", is another chic rhythm opus with an adult lyric. Tony hands in a refreshing vocal performance against a good Ray Ellis backdrop. Free swinging Dixielandish item that jockeys will be spinning often. Bottom portion is a pretty love song.

OSCAR HART
(Sage 269)

B "ONE AN'A TWO AN'A THREE" [Sage & Sand SESAC—Pearl, Hart] A charming bouncer with a light, infectious melody and lyric is delightfully handled in multiple track fashion by Hart. Cute item reminiscent (in parts) of "Bonaparte's Retreat". Smooth commercial deck that could catch on.

C+ "TOO MANY TEARS" [Sage & Sand SESAC—Pearl, Hart] The songster has a country feeling as he chants a sentimental romancer set against a soft shoe tempo.

AURELIO FIERRO
(Columbia 41223)

B "NEL BLU DIPINTO DI BLU" (2:50) [Robbins ASCAP—Modugno, Migliacci] Another charming authentic Italian version of the smash hit is issued on Columbia by Aurelio Fierro. Spright, bouncy treatment with the Trio Joice accompanying.

C+ "TU VUO FA' L'AMERICANO" (2:48) [Beechwood BMI—Nisa, Carosone] Renato Carosone co-authored this colorful bounce item chanted in Italian.

JOHNNIE PATE
(Federal 12332)

B+ "REVIVAL" (2:43) [Yvonne BMI—Pate] "Revival" is an appropriate title for this handclapping gospel beat instrumental. Side really swings. Flute and sax work is exciting. Good hip swinging stuff by the man who clicked with "Swinging Shepherd Blues". Watch this side closely.

C+ "STROLL SOME MORE" (2:45) [Yvonne BMI—Pate] Another Pate composition, this number sports a good stroll dance tempo. Commercial teenage material. This side has the sax in the spotlight.

JACKIE DEE
(Liberty 55148)

B+ "BUDDY" (1:52) [Buna BMI—Dee] Jackie Dee, a lass with a potent rock and roll voice, belts out a torrid jumper tailor-made for teenage tastes. Swinging effort that could make grade. Gal can really belt.

B "STORLYPSO DANCE" (1:50) [Buna BMI—Dee] The lark sounds like a female edition of Paul Anka as she gives her all for a tearful latin beat rock-a-ballad. Commercial teenstuff that deserves watching. Jackie also penned both sides herself.

DAVID ALLEN
(World Pacific 654)

B "CAN'T HELP IT" (2:14) [Marvin ASCAP—Fisher, Segal] David Allen bows in under the World Pacific banner with a good free-swinging vocal romancer. Smooth effort that lilt along at an inviting pace. Class stuff.

B "IMPOSSIBLE" (2:48) [Rosemeadow ASCAP—Allen] One of Steve Allen's best compositions to date is handled with warmth and sincerity by the crooner. Warm vocal effort.

ANITA BRYANT

(Carlton 473)

B+ "DANCE ON" (2:26) [Southern ASCAP—DiMinno, Conley] Anita Bryant, a lass with a polished voice, bows in on wax with an excellent multiple track vocal performance of a good cha cha beat romancer. Contagious number that grows on you. Good side jockeys should enjoy programming.

C+ "BE GOOD, BE CAREFUL, BE MINE" (2:45) [Camelot ASCAP—Rubens, Terker, Clarkson] The lark chants a torchy romantic opus on this end. Monty Kelly's ork sets up an exciting backdrop with a good beat.

MARK TAYLOR

(Hi 2006)

32 Albums In Coral's "10th Anniv. Sell-Ebration" Fall Release

NEW YORK—Coral Records unveiled its fall product simultaneously with its Tenth Anniversary at a press gathering held at the executive offices of the Decca-Coral building, last week.

The plan, which is a varied collection of 32 long playing albums, (including four stereo disks) was presented via a pre-recorded script and samplings of the LPs.

Norman Wienstroer, Coral General Sales Manager, who touring Coral branches, and distributors throughout the key areas in the country, was heard introducing the package line via the recording. Several of Coral's key artists were also heard, including Eddie Lawrence, whose short address (written by Norman Wienstroer) was the light touch that lent an entertaining as well as commercial aspect to the whole affair.

The sales theme being used in conjunction with the entire release is tagged "Coral Records 10th Anniversary Sell-Ebration".

Wienstroer spent a busy two weeks (August 5th thru 15th) heading sales meetings in key areas thruout the country introducing the label's special "Sell-Ebration" package. The first meeting took place on August 5th in Montreal, Canada. On August 11th, the Eastern Divisional meeting was held at the Warwick Hotel in New York City. Wienstroer left immediately for meetings in the following cities: Cleveland, Ohio, August 12; Chicago, August 13; and Los Angeles, August 15.

Wienstroer informed distributors that the special "Sell-Ebration" disk (which has artists introducing their own LP's) is available for salesmen's use as well as a regular demonstration disk containing the same music exclusive of narrative. Handsome litho binders, which include a complete Coral and Brunswick catalog, are also available to salesmen as selling aids. Special order forms and dealer brochures containing the new releases and complete catalog, are also available.

To give further impetus to this program, an extensive promotion and advertising campaign has been planned, exceeding any previous presentations.

The plan for the fall program goes into effect on August 18, continuing through September 12. Back orders and deliveries will be made up to and including September 30. A 10% discount is being offered to any dealer who places an order for the new releases, as well as catalog merchandise totaling \$200.00 or more. As an added incentive dated billing is also available to accredited dealers, allowing payment to be made in thirds on the following dates; First payment due on November 10, 1958; Second—December 10, 1958, and the Third on December 26.

The new Coral and Brunswick releases offered in the "Sell-Ebration" include the following—under the Coral banner:

"Lawrence Welk Presents Keyboard Kapers"; "Exciting"—George Cates; "Sophisticated Lady" — Manny Albam; "Front Row Center"—Barbara McNair; "Steve Allen Plays Neal Hefti"; "Picnic — Dorothy Collins Sings Steve Allen"; "Kingdom of Eddie Lawrence"; "Sugartime"—the McGuire Sisters; "Greetings From The McGuire Sisters"; "Soft Swingin' Jazz"—Joe Newman Quartet; "Scarlet Ribbons"—Carolyn Hester; "Time Out For Teresa"—Teresa Brewer; "Guys And Dolls Like Vibes"—Eddie Costa Quartet; "The Four Knights"; "Alan Freed Presents the King's Henchmen"; "Colette Renard — The Girl From Montmartre"; "Pianorama"—Jerry Carretta; "We Like Girls"—Various Artists; "We Like Bands"—Various Artists; "We Like Guys"—Various Artists; and "Kane is Able"—Jack Kane.

On Brunswick: "Lawrence Welk Presents the Lennon Sisters"; and "Lawrence Welk Presents Dick Kesner."

The following albums are also available in stereo: "Champagne Dancing Party" — Lawrence Welk; "Kane Is Able"—Jack Kane; "Lawrence Welk Presents Dick Kesner"; "A Gallery of Gershwin"—The First Modern Piano Quartet; and a previously released Welk album, "The World Finest Music".

Earlier this year Coral released "The Civil War," its first album in the new "Citation Series". The series retails for \$4.98 and features a beautifully bound book type album containing insert pages of photographs and written material. A new addition in the "Citation" album catalog is "Reunion In Hi Fi." The Former Glenn Miller Singers, Marion Hutton, Ray Eberly, Tex Beneke, and The Modernaires, were flown into New York expressly for this recording date. The original group has never recorded previously in Hi Fi. They were all a part of the Miller organization, when the band was at its peak.

Another "Citation" package is "A Gallery Of Gershwin" by the first Modern Piano Quartet featuring Dick Marx, Eddie Costa, Hank Jones and Johnny Costa, with Manny Albam. Backed by a 30 piece orchestra conducted by Manny Albam, the group performs some arrangements written by Manny and Irv Joseph.

The third "Citation Series" release is "Blues Is Everybody's Business" by Manny Albam. This is a jazz suite written by Manny in which he utilizes all the artists used previously by him on the Coral "Jazz Greats" albums, and allows each to employ his writing ability.

New Capitol-EMI Classical Label Debuts With Extensive Release Featuring Top Names

HOLLYWOOD—This month Capitol Records introduces to the American public a third classical catalogue. The label for this new line will bear the insignia of one of the world's largest recording companies, Electrical & Musical Industries of Great Britain. The initial release consists entirely of new high fidelity recordings not previously available in this country.

The names featured on Capitol-EMI's first release include 15 featured soloists and conductors representing seven nationalities: German, English, American, Russian, Greek, Italian and Spanish. Every one of them has appeared in America, some of them very frequently, the latest being Erika Koeth whose coloratura was heard for the first time in North America (Montreal and Los Angeles) in fine notices earlier this month.

Although the German conductor, Rudolf Kempe has been heard at New York's Metropolitan Opera, his initial Capitol-EMI albums will present him as a symphonic director. Mstislav Rostropovich, the Soviet Cellist, along with his countrymen David Oistrakh and Emil Gilels, is ranked as one of the great living instrumentalists, and his performance of the Dvorak Cello Concerto is expected to be among the foremost albums on this release in attracting the attention of critics and consumers, according to Capitol.

Sir Eugene Goossens, long associated with the musical life of the United States by virtue of his one-time permanent conductorship of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, has just returned to the recording studios

after nine years while he was permanent conductor of the symphony orchestra in Sydney, Australia. Robert Irving, famous for his past experience as musical director for the Sadlers Wells Ballet Company (now The Royal Ballet) and heard throughout this country on their many tours, has just been appointed to the same post with the New York City Ballet.

Sir Malcolm Sargent, Anatole Fistoulari, Efrem Kurtz, Sir Adrian Boult and Anthony Collins, are all conductorial names with whom the American public is extremely familiar from both personal appearances and recordings, and the same is true of Yehudi Menuhin and Gina Bachauer, while Fernando Germani fills Capitol's long desire for a top organist in high fidelity. The Dutch organ on which this artist has made his first Capitol-EMI album was constructed in 1638 and is an absolutely authentic instrument of Bach's own time.

Two more names among the luminaries are Sir Thomas Beecham, Bart., and Victoria de Los Angeles, conductor and soprano. Sir Thomas' name is one of the most respected in all music today, after a long life of service to it. Victoria de Los Angeles' voice has meant the SRO sign almost everywhere she has sung. Her first Capitol-EMI album is Puccini's one-act opera, "Suor Angelica".

Subsequent Capitol-EMI releases will introduce still other top artists, and will include from time to time reissues in new album designs of well known HMV sets (e.g. the de Los Angeles "Madame Butterfly" and "Barber Of Seville").

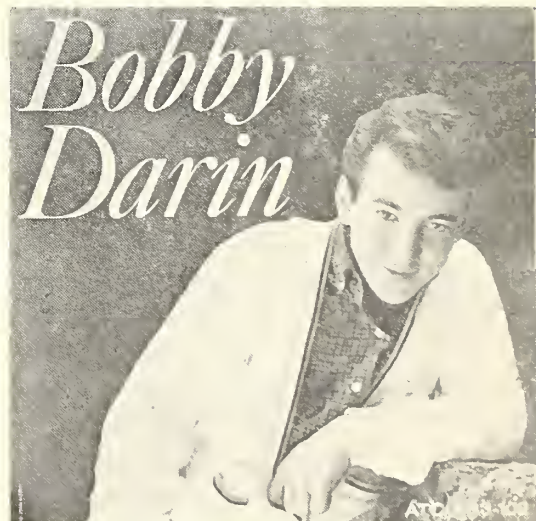

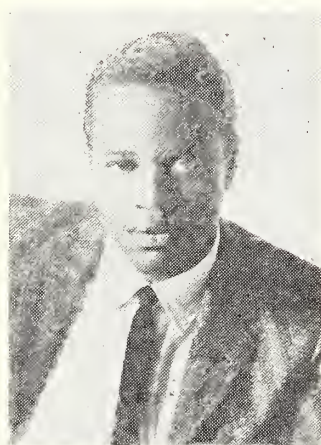

Dot's Fall Plan Allows Dealers 10% Discount For Early Purchases

HOLLYWOOD — Dot's 1958 Fall plan, announced last week by president Randy Wood, includes the allowance to dealers of a 10 percent discount on all packaged goods purchased between August 1 and September 15, both catalog and new releases, including all LP's and EP's plus the new stereo albums making their initial appearance in Dot's production program.

During the specified period of the plan, Dot will not allow the additional 10 percent to rack jobbers. Billing for all Fall plan purchases will be spread over three monthly installments, October, November and December. Dot's customary exchange privileges will continue in effect.

Dot's initial stereo-disks, consisting of 12 packages, will be released the end of August. 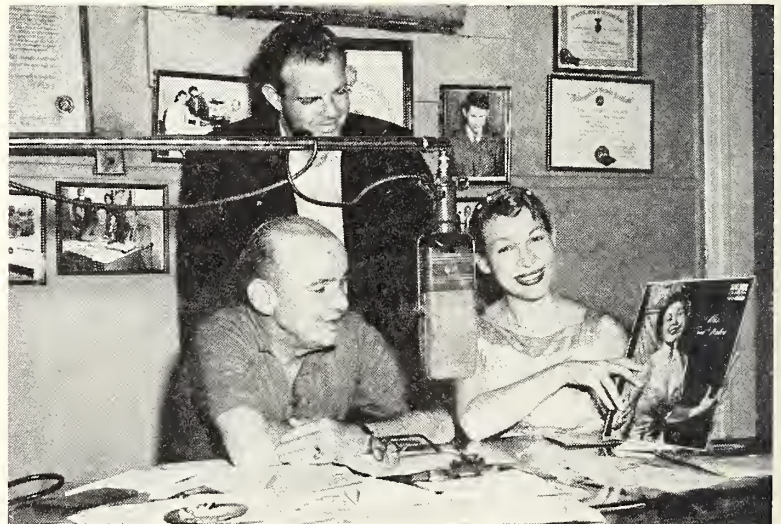

Hour Long "TV Music, U.S.A." To Feature Green Ork-Goodman

HOLLYWOOD — Composer-conductor Johnny Green and his 60-man orchestra will be joined by Benny Goodman, his famous quartet, and other well known music personalities in a special musical program, entitled "Music, U.S.A.," to be presented by the Westinghouse Electric Corp. over the CBS Television Network Monday, Sept. 8.

Participating with Green will be such names as Andre Previn, Shelly Manné and his trio, and Sheb Wooley. The 60-man orchestra which Green will conduct is the largest ever to perform from Television City, Hollywood, where the program will originate, "live."

"Music, U.S.A." will be the first non-dramatic production to be sponsored by Westinghouse in a decade of network telecasting.

Selections to be heard on "Music, U.S.A." will trace the career of Johnny Green, including his association with the Hollywood Bowl, where he has been conducting during 10 years of "Symphonies Under the Stars."

Goodman and his group will perform, for the first time on television, some of the numbers they recorded at the American Theatre at the Brussels World's Fair.

Capitol Gross Highest In History

HOLLYWOOD—The highest gross sales in its 16-year history is reported by Capitol Records, in its annual report for its fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, copies of which have been sent shareholders.

President Glenn E. Wallichs revealed the gross sales figure totalled \$43,694,818. The net income for the company was \$2,777,755. The sales figure represents a 24 per cent increase over the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, when sales of \$35,108,401 was reported. The company's net income for the year, ended June 30, 1957, was \$3,239,362.

The decline in net income resulted largely from the launching of three new enterprises, Capitol Phonographs, the Capitol Record Club, and Angel Records plus an increase in general operating costs.

President Wallichs indicated the increase in sales during the period covered by the report resulted from a higher volume of sales in every major line of the company. He pointed out this greatly increased volume of business has required an expansion in the distribution facilities, as well as the personnel, including major branch expansions in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. He pointed out that to meet increasing production demands, a new Los Angeles plant is being developed on a four-acre site at Fletcher Drive and San Fernando Road, on property purchased earlier this year for \$403,000. Improvement of this property, tentatively estimated at \$500,000 is expected to be completed during the company's current fiscal year, he said.

In a letter to shareholders of CRI, Wallichs outlined the company's new activities in the fiscal year just closed.

"The fiscal year just completed was one of unusual growth and development for Capitol Records. Three new major activities were launched during the year:

"Angel Records: Capitol's purchase of Electric & Musical Industries (U.S.) Limited, importers and distributors of the 'Angel' brand of

classical records, brought with many new opportunities. Our efforts have been directed at maintaining a high level of excellence in the product and its packaging while expanding the merchandising and sales activity to gain greater volume. Results in the six months since date of acquisition, January 2, 1957, are most encouraging, and there is every indication that under the Capitol management, Angel will attain an even more important position in the classical field.

"Capitol Phonographs: A complete line of phonographs was launched under the Capitol trademark in August of 1957, ranging from low priced portables to luxurious consoles. Product acceptance of our product was excellent, and in the face of severe competition we were able to establish a new line with gratifying sales. Our 1958-59 line with the emphasis on stereo is now on the market, and preliminary reports indicate that product is in a favorable position competitively.

"Capitol Record Club: Despite aggressive competition from two other major record companies in this country, Capitol launched its own record club late in 1957. Considerable expense was involved in this activity but the impact of Record Club advertising is expected to produce compensating earnings."

In looking ahead to the new fiscal year, Wallichs disclosed to shareholders that on August 18 this year Capitol will represent the world-owned HMV label in the United States, which will be released in this country on the new EMI-Capitol label. He announced the new series of high fidelity classical recordings will present many of the leading European artists under contract to Electric Musical Industries, Ltd., England.

In his closing comments to shareholders, Wallichs also recounted that both Capitol and Angel will be leasing stereophonic records starting August 18 and regularly thereafter.

Also, Bud Katznel, Director of Publicity, Public Relations and Mel Turoff, National Promotion Mgr. will attend

the L.A. and Chicago meetings. The same presentation will be made at all three meetings.

WHAT-Phila. To Program Jazz 12 Hours Nightly

PHILADELPHIA, PA. — Philadelphia Radio Station WHAT ventured into the field of jazz programming, Monday, August 11, 1958. From 6:00 p.m. till 6:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday each week, WHAT-FM will devote 12 solid hours of time exclusively to Jazz on FM. At 1:00 a.m., the AM show, "Sounds in the Night", which had been carried regularly, has now merged with the FM until 6:00 a.m. in the morning. Simultaneous broadcasting of AM-FM operations continues with the exception of 6:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. when the FM programming takes effect, extending the amount of Jazz programming to 12 hours a day.

The Independence Broadcasting Company has set up an entirely separate FM programming department specializing in Jazz. Sid Mark, a man well-known in Eastern Jazz circles, has been engaged to do the major portion of the program which is called "Jazz at Ninety-Six Point Five".

Cap Album On Nautilus

HOLLYWOOD—Through the efforts of Webley Edwards, creator of the internationally - broadcast "Hawaii Calls", who also presents Capitol Records' "Hawaii Calls" series of Hawaiian music albums, the officers and crew of the U. S. atomic submarine Nautilus enjoyed this Hawaiian music while making their history-making, half-way-round-the-world undersea voyage from Hawaii under the North Pole to England recently.

Before the Nautilus submerged just outside Pearl Harbor to start the history-making voyage, Edwards was conducted on a tour of the famed submarine by Commander William R. Anderson, skipper of the undersea craft. During this tour, Edwards was greatly impressed with the excellent hi-fi record playing equipment in the sub, which prompted him to present the commander with a complete set of the Capitol "Hawaii Calls" high fidelity albums to be played over the hi-fi system to entertain the men while traveling under the oceans of the world.

MGM Philly Distributor Has Dealer Day At The Races

NEW YORK—MGM Records' distributor in Philadelphia, Edward S. Barsky, hosted sixty dealers in his distribution area with a day at the races at Atlantic City Race Track August 14. Dealers eligible for invites had to reach special quotas during July. In honor of the festivities Barsky awarded each dealer \$50 in cash for betting at the mutual windows.

Festivities started at 12:30 with a luncheon in the club house where the group had special tables at the finish line. Post time was 2 o'clock and the fifth race was named the Edward S. Barsky, Inc. Handicap. Jack Lamar who is a disk jockey at WCAM, Camden, played MGM records between races for the special occasion.

Wins BMI Scholarship To School Of Jazz

LENOX, MASS.—John Lewis, Musical Director of the School of Jazz in Lenox, Massachusetts, announced last week that M. Arif Mardin of Istanbul, Turkey, has been awarded the 1958 Broadcast Music, Inc. scholarship in jazz composition. This scholarship is the first award by BMI to a jazz composer and the first scholarship in jazz composition from any source throughout the history of jazz.

BMI, a music licensing organization, has, during the past six years, granted over \$40,000 in scholarship aid to composers in the concert field through its annual Student Composer's Awards competitions. The new jazz award was presented to the School of Jazz in April, 1958, and provides full maintenance for a jazz composer during his attendance at the School, which begins its second annual session on the grounds of Music Inn in Lenox, Massachusetts, on August 10.

Mardin came to the United States in January, 1958, and is presently the holder of the Quincy Jones Award at the Berkeley School of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. Before coming to this country, Mardin was a student with the Faculty of Economics and Commerce in Istanbul and at the London School of Economics in England. As a jazz musician he is largely self-taught, but during the past eight years he has been composing and arranging in Istanbul. He submitted an original composition to Dizzy Gillespie while Gillespie's band was on tour in Turkey and this composition has since been performed by that group. His work has frequently been performed by the Herb Pomeroy Orchestra of Boston during the past few months, and Mardin himself will soon appear on NBC-TV.

M. Arif Mardin is one of several foreign students who will be in attendance at the August session of the School of Jazz along with some 30 students from throughout the United States.

The School of Jazz was organized in 1957 under the directorship of John Lewis, director of the Modern Jazz Quartet, in recognition of the need for instruction in the jazz field. Like Tanglewood in the area of concert music, the School of Jazz provides the opportunity for young jazz musicians to study and play in ensemble with the outstanding jazz musicians of our time. Its faculty this summer includes, in addition to John Lewis: Milt Jackson, Percy Heath, Max Roach, Lee Konitz, Jimmy Giuffre, Bob Brookmeyer, George Russell, Bill Russo, Kenny Dorham, and Marshall Stearns.

Now It's "Postage"

STILLWATER, OKLA. — So writers probably have as close watch on current events as politicians. In the past week or so there have been a number of releases about the "49th State", Alaska. And now there is a song dealing with the increased U.S. postage rate. The song is appropriately called "That New Postage Rate" and has been recorded by Billy Jaye on the Rose label, diskery with offices in Stillwater, Okla.

Title Strip On Sleeve

ANNISTON, ALABAMA—H. Killian, a dental surgeon, this week feels he has come up with an idea that will be of mutual benefit to juke box operators and record manufacturers. His idea is to print a title strip of a record directly on the sleeve in which the disk is contained. (Killian calls his idea an "Operators' Record Package").

Killian reports that he has contacted numerous operators about his idea and they have told him that they would be "more than happy to pay from three to five cents more per recording" for this service.

Sid Mills Signs Two

NEW YORK—Sid Mills, head of Diana Music, last week announced that he has signed two newcomers to his personal management enterprise. The performers are Sam Hawkins and Mike Kelly. Both will record on the Diana label.

Mills recently completed an album for Coral Records with the Mercer Ellington Orchestra, also a major pactee. Other artists who Mills manages are Helen Carr, whose first Atlantic release is skedded for September; Bobby Hamilton, who will appear with the Alan Freed Fox Theatre show in New York for ten days beginning August 29th; and Jimmy McPhail, who will be out in two weeks with his first platter for the Ga label.

NEW YORK — Atlantic Records has announced the release of a new LP package consisting of four albums. They are "Wilbur de Paris Plays Porter"; Bobby Short, "Sing Me a Song"; Dizzy Gillespie, "At Home And Abroad"; and Taylor Trio, "The Billy Taylor Trio".

Valando To Europe

NEW YORK — Tommy Valando, president of Sunbeam Records, left for Europe last week to study plans for expanding Sunbeam's operations to the continent, the diskery announced last week.

Valando, who will be in Europe for several weeks, expects to discuss the possibility of foreign distribution for Sunbeam singles as well as albums throughout Europe.

The Sunbeam prexy will also look into the possibility of renegotiating a new option on the Italian musical comedy, "Good Night, Bettina," an option which he had previously held but released last year.

He will also look over the operations of Valando Music Company, Limited. While in Italy, Valando will look for new material for his publishing firms here and will also audition European singers with recording potential for Sunbeam Records.

U.A. To Distribute XYZ

NEW YORK—Al Tamarin, United Artists exec, this week announced the completion of a deal with Frank Slay and Bob Crewe to distribute their XYZ label.

The first release that will come under the new arrangement is "Elevator Operator" by The Rays.

Jay Forms Jolt Records

HOLLYWOOD — George Jay, well known coast promotion man, has formed a record label with David Holt, former child star. It will be called Jolt Records.

The label's first release is a side dubbed "Fatty Patty", already available.

Holt, recently made some masters (in an A & R capacity) for Capitol and Coral.

Jay will continue his national record promotion activities.

Dot Acts To Eradicate Bad Distrib Practices

HOLLYWOOD — Dot Records' president Randy Wood has begun an all out fight against what he terms one of the industry's "long-standing chronic ills", trans-shipping.

He announced last week that hereafter, Dot's distributors across the country will lose their Dot franchise if they practice territory jumping and trans-shipping of merchandise.

According to Wood, the jumping of territorial lines and trans-shipping of records have worked against the distributor's own interests in the past, resulting in price wars and loss of sales to the rightful franchise holder, who is also often snowed under by disk returns from dealers over-loaded by the line-jumping distributor. In some cases returns to the franchise distributor may run higher than his actual shipments, being the overstock pushed by the territorial violator.

McLellan To Emcee Ind. Jazz Festival

BOSTON — John McLellan, jazz critic and WHDH-Radio and WHDH-TV (Boston) commentator on the subject, emceed the first annual Jazz Festival at French Lick, Indiana.

The festival was held August 15, 16 and 17 and featured among others, Duke Ellington, Stan Kenton, Erroll Garner and Dave Brubeck.

The Indiana affair was produced by George Wein and sponsored by the Sheraton Hotels. Wein is the owner of Boston's Storyville nightclub and producer of the very successful Newport (R. I.) Festival.

"THE COLUMBIA ALBUM OF VICTOR HERBERT"—Percy Faith And His Orchestra—Columbia C2L 10 (2-12" LP)
"THE ROMANTIC MUSIC OF TCHAIKOVSKY"—Andre Kostelanetz And His Orchestra—Columbia C2L 11 (2-12" LP)
"THE COLUMBIA ALBUM OF IRVING BERLIN"—Frank DeVol And His Orchestra—Columbia C2L (2-12" LP)
"THE COLUMBIA SIGMUND ROMBERG"—Paul Weston And His Orchestra—Columbia C2L 14 (1-12" LP)

These are four more additions to Columbia's two-pocket series of light, melodic music produced by the diskery's excellent mood ork roster. The DeVol ork is the only newcomer to series, replacing Michele LeGrand, who cut a two disk Cole Porter package last year. Otherwise the cast is the same as the one that produced the Richard Rodgers (Andre Kostelanetz); George Gershwin (Percy Faith); and Jerome Kern (Paul Weston) sets. The orchestras are matched perfectly with the composers, Faith and Weston on sweetly innocent Herbert and Romberg gems, bright arranger-conductor DeVol on the varied Berlin tunes, and the symphonically-inclined Kostelanetz crew on the wondrous Tchaikovsky affair. Masterpieces of melody in glowing ork performances.



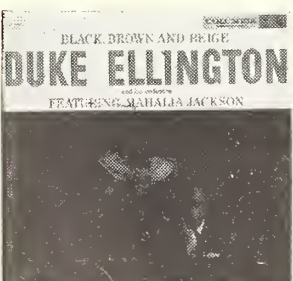
"THE MARVELOUS MILLER MEDLEYS"—Glenn Miller And His Orchestra—RCA Victor LOP-1005 (1-12" LP)

The package consists of eight Glenn Miller medleys (a thirty-two song total) performed by the late bandleader's civilian ork, and his string-added Air Force outfit. The set covers a variety of tempos and moods ("Blue Room", "Stompin' At The Savoy", "Flow Gently, Sweet Afton" and "The Way You Look Tonight"). Solo vocals by Ray Eberle, Johnny Desmond, and Marion Hutton. Appealing Miller moods, which the Miller following will want.



"CLOSER THAN A KISS"—Vic Damone—Orchestra Under The Direction Of Frank DeVol—Columbia CL 1174 (1-12" LP)

On a round of handsome melodies, the strong-voiced vocalist sets a well-crooned pace. There's plenty of room for expressive moments in such works as "We Kiss In A Shadow", "You And The Night And The Music", and "Close As Pages In A Book", and Damone treats them warmly, and respectfully. Lush vocals on choice songs. Deejaays will spin extensively.



"BLACK, BROWN AND BEIGE"—Duke Ellington And His Orchestra—Featuring Mahalia Jackson—Columbia CL 1162 (1-12" LP)

"Black, Brown And Beige" is an orchestral work by Ellington written in 1943, which suggests various aspects of Negro life in America. There are two principal themes developed, one a bluesy "Work Song", the other a moving declaration, "Come Sunday" (a vocal version of which is beautifully sung by Gospel singing great, Mahalia Jackson). A performance by Miss Jackson of the Twenty-Third Psalm at the conclusion of the work (an addition to the opus decided upon during rehearsals for the recording) brings the work to a compelling close. Jazz traffic will be interested in the presentation.



"TROUBLE IS A MAN"—Judy Holliday—Columbia CL 1153 (1-12" LP)

This is an unusual, wistful session for the usually buoyant comedienne ("Born Yesterday", "Bells Are Ringing"). But, if it's possible for listeners to forget Miss Holliday's great comic talents for the duration of the disk's playing time, they'll discover a voice, if not particularly polished, of notable sincerity, and depth. The excellent collection of rarer items needs Miss Holliday's vocal intelligence more than anything else, and thus her winning way with them.



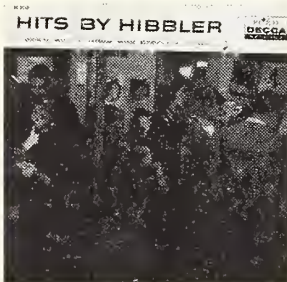
"COUNTRY SONGS FOR CITY PEOPLE"—Roberta Sherwood—With Jack Pleis And His Orchestra—Decca DL 8739 (1-12" LP)

Miss Sherwood's expert rhythmic sense and voice that emanates from her throaty delivery are handy vocal accoutrements for the set's bill of famed country melodies, which often require the services of the two vocal qualities. It is natural, then, that she is able to catch the make-up of such country (and sometimes pop) successes as "Half As Much", "Your Cheatin' Heart", "Tumbling Tumbleweeds" and "Cold, Cold Heart". Expert, pop attitude toward the country listings.



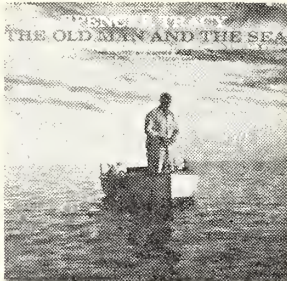
"FLOYD TILLMAN'S GREATEST"—RCA Victor LPM-1686 (1-12" LP)

Tillman is a country cleffer with a number hits to his credit ("Slipping Around", "I Love You So Much It Hurts Me", "It Makes No Difference Now"), and his first Victor pressing features his readings of his own material. Tillman's vocals show an obvious liking for his compositions, which he attacks with good-natured ease. Chorus-combo backing often has a pop feel. Good country production.



"HITS BY HIBBLER"—Al Hibbler—Decca DL 8757 (1-12" LP)

Hibbler's singles have had a consistency of taste, and, of course, his individual inventive work with a song. Twelve of the vocalist's 45's are included, and they represent him well. Among the Hibbler pressings here are such variety stints as the inspirational "He", the haunting "Unchained Melody", the sweeping "11th Hour Melody" and the bright "Breeze (Blow My Hair Back To Me)". Fine sampling of one of popdom's best voices.



"THE OLD MAN AND THE SEA"—Original Soundtrack Music—Columbia CL 1183 (1-12" LP)

One of the year's most important film productions, the screen adaptation of the Ernest Hemingway novel has music by veteran flick composer Dimitri Tiomkin ("High Noon", "Duel In The Sun"), whose soaring themes reflect the romance and power of the sea. As presented here, the score is broken-up into eighteen titled vignettes. Publicity due film will aid package's sale considerably.



"LOUIS AND THE GOOD BOOK"—Louis Armstrong With Sy Oliver And The All Stars—Decca DL 8741 (1-12" LP)

Armstrong, gravel-voice and all, brings sincerity and humour to his readings of twelve favorite spirituals. The selections mostly catalog the more uptempo expressions of faith ("Didn't It Rain", "Down By The Riverside", "Ezekiel Saw De Wheel"), and Armstrong recites them in delightfully free-swinging fashion. Fine support from the Sy Oliver Choir and Armstrong's own All Stars. Great Satchmo waxing.



"POPS BY THE POET"—Jesse Crawford At The Hammond Chord Organ—Decca DL 8732 (1-12" LP)

Crawford, who with Lenny Dee and Ethel Smith provides Decca with remarkable organ punch, eases through a bill of tunes mostly recent chart hitting vintage. The selections are of melodic worth, as exemplified by "Around The World", "Gigi", "Fascination" and "Cats A Falling Star". This is an organist who expertly allows melodies to speak for themselves. Extremely important organ stock.



"LONELY STREET"—Kitty Wells—Decca DL 8732 (1-12" LP)

Miss Wells is one of country music's most consistent femme chart stars, and package performances by the artist are bound to be strong country stock. Miss Wells handles, with her typical concentration on tales of unrequited love, such material as "Just When I Needed You", "May You Never Be Alone", "Lonely Street" and "That's Me Without You."



"PRESENTING PETER PALMER"—RCA Victor LPM-1736 (1-12" LP)

Palmer became one of Broadway's newest male leads as a result of his Li'l Abner role in the hit musical of the same name. His first Victor package contains standards quite in keeping with his big, lyrical voice ("Younger Than Springtime", "All The Things You Are", "Granada", etc.), and his approach to them has matinee-idol showmanship. Show music pro Lehman Engel conducted the able-ork backdrop. Durable romantic items in concert-like readings.

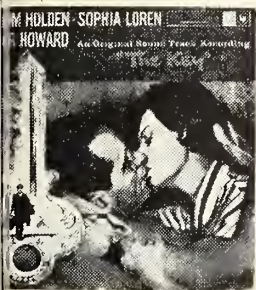

"BIG AND SWEET, WITH A BEAT"—Hugo Winterhalter His Orchestra And Chorus—Camden CAL 443 (1-12" LP)

Winterhalter's second set for Victor's Camden line, the effort features an array of sparkling and sentimental numbers performed with usual Winterhalter polish. Sides include novelties ("Music Box In Blue", "The Flying Dutchman") and ballads ("Blue December", "My Bouquet"). Also included is a sweet Jerome Kern gem, "Babes In The Wood". Stuart Forster and Johnny Parker supply the able solo vocals. Good ork-vocal variety.



"THE KEY"—An original Sound Track Recording—Columbia CL 1185 (1-12" LP)

Penned by famed British composer Malcolm Arnold, the score to the well-received World War Two melodrama (William Holden-Sophia Loren-Trevor Howard starred) contains appropriately dramatic scoring, plus occasional satiric contrasts between mysterious "U Boat Alley" themes, and happy dance-beat music from what seems to be complacent home. Mitch Miller directs the ork-chorus on the "The Key (To Your Heart)" romancer. When pic hits local theatres, the disk could turn out to be a sound track set that moves.



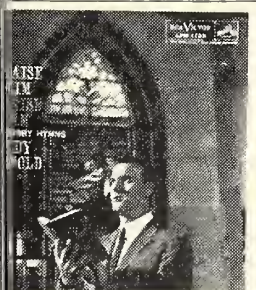
"THAT CERTAIN FEELING"—Felicia Sanders—Decca DL 8762 (1-12" LP)

This is the waxing that establishes Miss Sanders as a stylist of the first order. On material that can challenge the most articulate vocalist, the performer supplies performances of great variety, and uncommon expression. Few vocalists can skillfully yield the emotions of the neglected Kurt Weill-Maxwell Anderson "Knickerbocker Holiday" treasure, "It Never Was You", and turn around to the dynamic exuberance of Cole Porter's "I Happen To Like New York" with a superb command of the requirements of each. Other examples: "I Had Myself A True Love"/"That Certain Feeling"; the beautiful "Summer Love"/"Rabbit At Top Speed" (a Leonard Bernstein delight). Excellent vocal versatility.



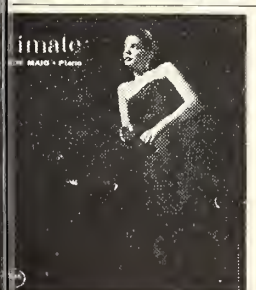
"WANDA JACKSON"—Capitol T 1041 (1-12" LP)

This is the country lark's (and guitarist) initial Capitol package, a rhythmic-slow beat affair with material combed from both the country and rock 'n roll field. In fact, it's on an r&r tune, the Little Richard click, "Long Tall Sally," that Miss Jackson displays the disk's best no-holds-barred take. Other items "I Wanna Waltz", "Let Me Go Lover", "Just Call Me Lonesome" and "Happy, Happy Birthday". Strong package debut by the performer.



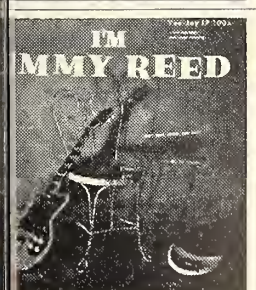
"PRAISE HIM PRAISE HIM"—Fanny Crosby Hymn—Eddie Arnold—RCA Victor LPM-1733 (1-12" LP)

Country-pop vocalist Arnold convincingly recalls twelve hymns, whose verses were written by the famed, nineteenth century hymn-writer, Fanny Crosby. Arnold's approach to the hymns is simple, directly concerned with the melody and words. The chorus-organ-piano accompaniment also possesses a sincere, church atmosphere. Important hymnal recording.



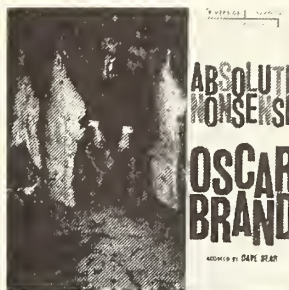
"INTIMATE"—John De Maio, Piano—Westminster WP 6094 (1-12" LP)

Keyboard mood disks which solo the pianist sans lush ork or combo accompaniment are rare, and thus De Maio's comes as a pleasant surprise, for here is ivory work that has the whole spotlight, and holds it with rich, romantic finesse. The tunes, all concerned with time-of-year or places, are of the unhackneyed variety. They include "Spring Is Here", "The Last Time I Saw Paris", "Summertime" and "Autumn Leaves". Intimate (and intelligent) mood programming.



"I'M JIMMY REED"—Jimmy Reed — Vee-Jay LP-1004 (1-12" LP)

Reed's traditionally bluesy delivery coupled with the twelve self penned selections make this set a must for blues lovers. The artist, ably plucking his guitar and also offering harmonica inserts in addition to his moving vocals, treats the listener to such goodies as "Honest I Do", "You Don't Have To Go", and his current "You Got Me Crying". Jimmy Reed has a collection here that will more than please his many followers. An adventure in true blues.



"ABSOLUTE NONSENSE"—Oscar Brand—Assisted By Dave Sear—Riverside 12-825 (1-12" LP)

Brand, who has a long disk history of disks in a folk vein, is an authoritative, and delectable interpreter of eighteen ridiculously humorous folk ditties. The fine guitar support by Dave Sear is not to be neglected. It follows Brand delightfully. Pro folk performances of sprightly, good-fun items.



"MY HAPPINESS"—The Mu'cays—GNP-1001 (1-12" LP)

The harmonica duo skillfully investigates the sentimental and tricky techniques of harmonica playing on a big, sixteen opus selection (each tune is performed on a separate track). With fine hi-fi sound to the bargain, the team fondly recalls such items as "Dream", "Near You", "It's Been A Long, Long Time" and sizzle through "Saber Dance", "Beer Barrel Polka" and "Wabash Blues". Strong harmonica pressing.

"J. J. IN PERSON!"—The J. J. Johnson Quintet—Columbia CL 1161 (1-12" LP)

The waxing was cut at an un-named J. J. Johnson Quintet appearance, which figured in typically sparkling, and expressive programming from the crew. Four of the seven evergreen-originals are bright tales, while reflections on "Laura", and "My Old Flame" are the ballad story here. Very good sound. J. J. Johnson is a strong attraction on the jazz shelf.



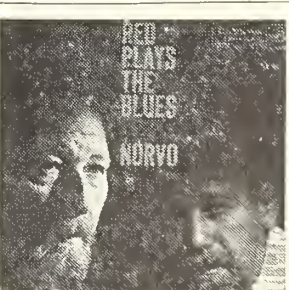
"SWINGIN' DIXIE!"—Al Hirt At Dan Pier 600 In New Orleans—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1877 (1-12" LP)

This is the second appearance on Audio Fidelity for Hirt and fans of both Dixieland and hi-fi will find the playing and sound on a high level. The numbers are Dixieland naturals, involving such evergreens as "Mississippi Mud", "St. Louis Blues", "Caravan", and "Tailgate Ramble". Hirt's trumpet is a sizzling, standout attraction here.



"NOTHING BUT THE BLUES"—Herb Ellis—Featuring Roy Eldridge, Stan Getz, Ray Brown, And Stan Levey—Verve MG V-8252 (1-12" LP)

Guitarist Ellis and his stellar-cast of featured jazzists play "nothing but the blues" but well. Though the eight-tune program calls for some zestful blues cuts, the nod for the most meaningful sessions go to the wonderful, funky statements on the opener, "Pap's Blues" and the closer, "Blues For Junior". It is on the latter sides that the boys catch the depth of their blues theme best. Superb jazz understanding.



"RED PLAYS THE BLUES"—Red Norvo—RCA Victor LPM-1729 (1-2" LP)

Four of the seven sessions feature vibist Norvo at the helm of a compact, expertly performing sextet, and three cuts feature aggressive blue notes from an ork set-up. In either format, Norvo and a notable jazz membership (in the sextet, trumpeter Harry Edison; tenor saxist Ben Webster; in the ork, drummer Mel Lewis, trumpeter Don Fagerquist) sell a skilled blues bill of goods. Blues thrush Helen Humes, a former Count Basie shouter (1938-42), is authoritative on "I Sing The Blues", and "Shed No Tears". Major jazz work.



"SWINGIN' THE LOOP"—Vito Price, and Lou Levy, Max Bennett, Gus Johnson, Freddie Green—Argo 631 (1-12" LP)

The disk is tenor-alto saxist Price's first featured role, a stint as front man which covers lots of tempos to fine rhythmic and ballad effect. On one side, Price is supported by a fast-medium blowing ork, while the flip portion is a quintet affair made-up of personnel listed above on the credits. Price drives tastefully ("Mousey's Tune") and sentimentalizes expressively ("Time After Time"). Each side has five standard-original compositions. Reliable jazz issue.

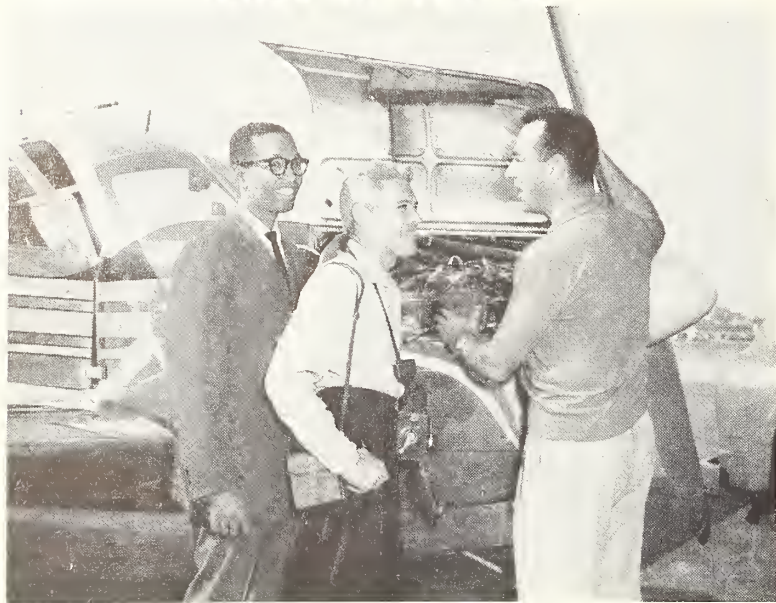

B+ "SOFTLY AND TENDERLY" [Savoy BMI—Roberts] On the bottom half the songsters slow down the pace as they effectively harmonize on a heartwarming, middle beat gospel item.

Wein, in addition to playing piano every performance, produced the entire program under the auspices of the Newport Jazz Festival and the U. S. State Department.

Willis Conover, who produces the famous jazz music show in Washington, D. C. for beaming overseas by the Voice of America, was Master of Ceremonies for the show.

The American jazz program was received with front-page rave reviews by all of the European press covering the event.

NEW YORK—Borje Ekberg, export manager of Metronome Records of Sweden, is returning to Stockholm this week after a two-month stay in the U. S. Ekberg has visited Metronome's U. New Co-op Plan For Starday And "D"

NASHVILLE — Don Pierce announced last week that after several days of planning in Nashville, he and "Pappy" Daily had decided to operate separately under C&W labels on a mutual co-operation basis. Under the new setup Pierce will own and operate the C&W Starday label internationally. While "Pappy" Daily, with Houston as his base of operations, will continue to build his new "D" Label which has come up with "Cotton Picker", "Chantilly Lace", and "Talk To Me Oh Lonesome Heart" in the past 30 days.

Both Pierce and Daily have been producing and promoting the sale of the Mercury-Starday "Country Series" for the past 18 months. Mercury Records recently decided to concentrate on fewer C&W artists, principally George Jones and Jimmie Skinner, who have consistently been in the charts for Mercury-Starday. Feeling that more latitude for expansion in the C&W field was needed, Pierce and Daily have obtained approval to terminate their Mercury pact so they can swing out on their own.

One of the unusual features of the Pierce-Daily accord is that Daily will produce many of the masters that Pierce will be releasing on his Starday label and Pierce will be assisting Daily in sales, promotion and administration of Daily's D Label.

Furthermore Pierce and Daily will continue to work together to produce the masters by George Jones and Jimmie Skinner and help promote sales by these artists on the Mercury label.

Daily and Pierce divided over 1400 recorded songs in the Starrite song catalog and "Pappy" Daily acquired the Starrite trade name.

Pierce will hit the road in Septem-

ber with new releases on Starday and D label and plans to change distributors in several areas in order to strengthen sales & promotion setups for both Starday and D labels.

Here Billy sadly reflects that trouble with the gal is that she's so attractive and that he's starting to fear the competition. They're two goodies, back-to-back.

And the distinctive-voiced warbler tells about the 'steel drivin' man' in a manner that's gonna make the jocks sit up and take notice. Watch it.

B+ "THERE'S MORE PRETTY GIRLS THAN ONE" (2:30) [American BMI — A. Delmore, A. Smith] Under portion is an interesting fast moving romantic weeper that Brown sells with authority. Strong double-decker that features some fine, 'pure country' vocal and instrumental sounds.

ORVILLE COUCH
(Dixie 2007)

B "LET IT HAPPEN" (2:35) [Starrite BMI—J. Shell, J. Price] Here's a pretty, moderate paced romantic biscuit that falls pleasantly on the ear. The smooth-toned Orville Couch and a chorus are responsible for this 'must programming' platter for the deejays — pop and country-wise.

C+ "EASY DOES IT" (2:15) [Starrite BMI—O. Couch, E. McDuff] On the reverse etching, Couch and the vocal crew inject a "Little Bitty Pretty One" feeling into a subdued, light-hearted novelty rocker. Enjoyable companion piece.

BOBBY BARNETT

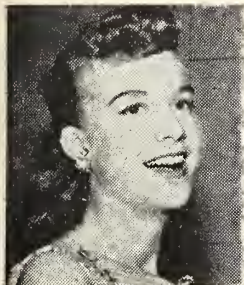

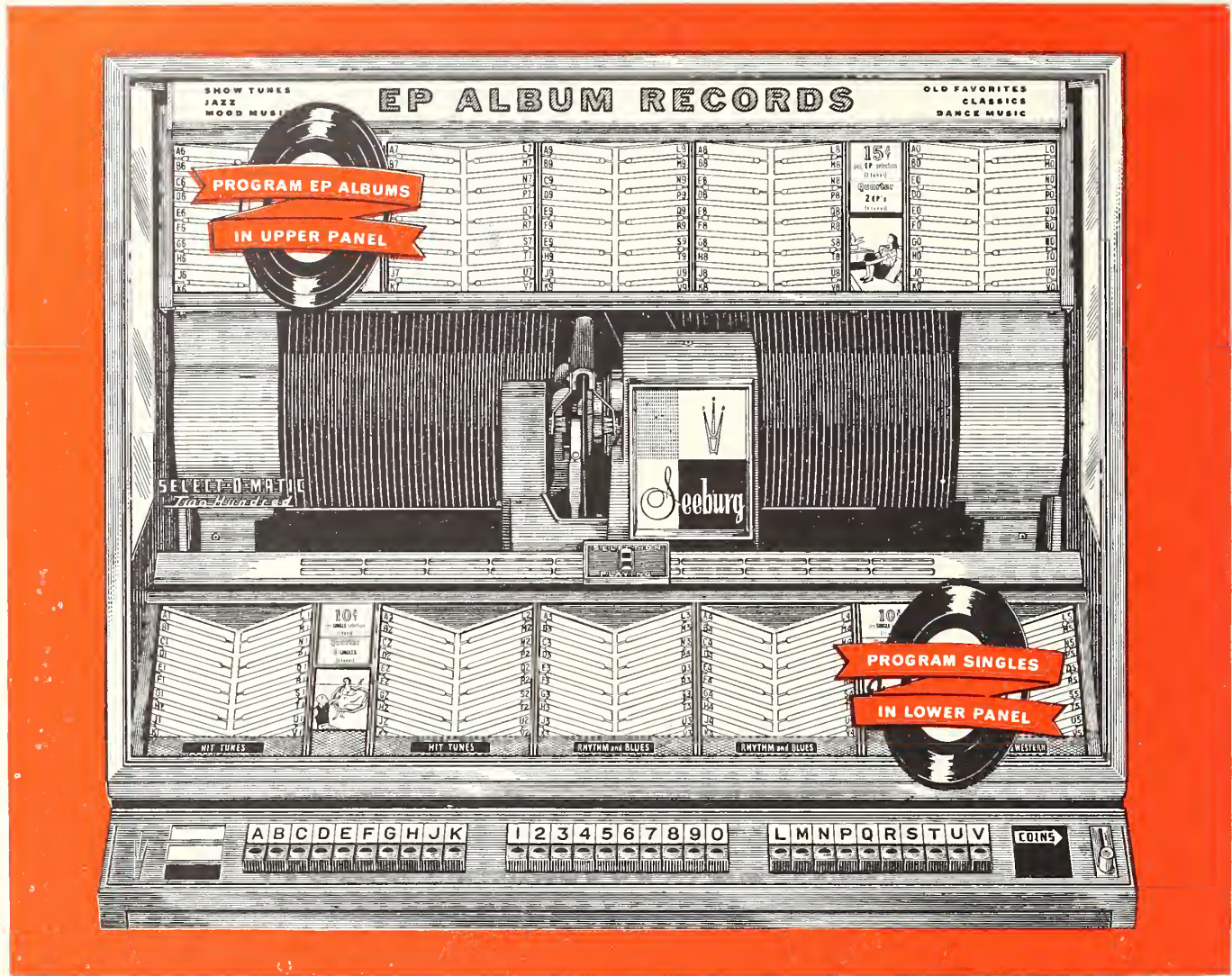

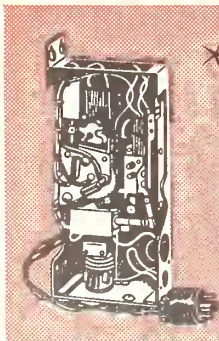

To Beat Inflation:

IT PAYS TO BUY NEW EQUIPMENT

During Last Year of Depreciation Schedule Operators Should Quickly Replace With New Equipment While the Trade-in Price is Still Up to Help Offset the Inflationary Differential

New, 1958 Phono Cost	\$1,295.00
Trade-in Value of Average 1954 Phono	250.00
NET COST	1045.00
Depreciation Taken on 1954 Phono	895.00
Actual Extra Cost	\$150.00

One way for operators to beat constant, creeping inflation, is to replace old equipment with new as quickly as possible. Especially while trade-in values are high.

Trade-in, or salvage values, should not be confused with selling prices of reconditioned phonos of the same year, make and model.

For example, a 1954 phono may "sell" for \$375 after it has been completely reconditioned, but the accepted trade-in value may be only \$250.

The \$125 difference is the cost of reconditioning the salvaged trade-in plus the profit necessary to the seller.

As the above chart indicates that for \$150 difference operators can obtain the kind of peak play action only a new phono can bring.

Not only will the new phono, by increased play action, bring back the \$150 difference between what was depreciated, what was salvaged by the trade-in, and what the new phono cost, but play continues at peak for some time to come.

Players are pleased by the finer tone

quality and the marvelous multi-selectivity of the new and beautiful high fidelity phonos.

The location owners are happy. They are proud of such beautiful and outstanding attractions in their places of business.

Because the location owners are happy, the need for bonuses or loans is lessened to a very great extent.

The introduction of new equipment more quickly to the location can most effectively help to eliminate bonuses and loans.

In addition, the time may come where, by the taxing authorities acceptance of realistic depreciation, even the \$150 differential (as shown in the above chart) may be made convertible thru allowance for a reserve to be set aside by the operator to take care of this inflationary factor.

At such time it will most definitely pay operators to trade in their phonos even more quickly.

What is most important to the operator is that he can, at very little cost to himself, gain greater play action and, thereby, more certain profits by more quickly trading in his old equipment.

New phonos always lift up play action anywhere from 20% to 50% and this continues for a good period of time.

At the same time the operator offsets possible loss of locations to competitors and, to a very great extent, helps eliminate bonuses and loans by quicker change of new phonos in his locations.

These facts are very important to the operator.

No Cabaret Tax For Teenage Juke Box Dancing Means:

BIG LOCATION REVIVAL

With Congress Expected to Pass Bill Before Closing of This Session Eliminating Payment of 20% Cabaret Tax Where Teenagers Dance to Juke Box Music in "Milk Bars" and Other Places Where Light Refreshments are Served Means Revival of Many Locations as Top Spots for Music Ops.

CHICAGO—The report from Washington, this past week, that the tax-easing bill, now in both the Senate and the House of Representatives, with this version very likely to remain in the final bill which is expected to pass before the end of this session, that "Milk Bars" where teenagers gather and dance to juke box music and where light refreshments are served will no longer have to pay the 20% cabaret tax, is one of the best news reports which this industry has received in a long time.

For many years now this publication has, from time to time, urged the industry to attempt ways and means of eliminating the 20% cabaret tax so that dancing to juke box music would again be permitted.

As this publication has pointed out over the years, this would mean a revival of thousands of locations thruout the nation which are, today, considered mediocre spots, again becoming top spots for the country's music ops.

There are thousands of so-called "Milk Bars" and other such spots where light refreshments are served that feature juke boxes and where teenagers gather. Formerly, in the majority of these places, and due to the 20% cabaret tax imposed by the Federal Government, teenagers were not allowed to dance to the juke box music.

They would, in most such places, gather about the juke box and simply listen to the music while their feet itched to get around on a small dance floor like used to be the top feature of these locations.

It is, therefore, a very happy thought on the part of the nation's legislators to recognize this need for the teenagers to vent their energies on a dance floor instead of in delinquencies.

There is also every belief that more "Milk Bars" will be opened all over the country once Congress passes this tax-easing bill. This will mean new top locations for the nation's juke box operators.

It is the hope of this publication that, with dancing allowed to juke box music for the teenagers, the rest of the cabaret tax in this direction will be eased and that the older folks will also be allowed to dance.

As has been pointed out in the past,

NEWS FLASH

Among the tax-easing provisions in the new bill before the Senate and the House, and which is expected to pass before the closing of this present Congressional session, is that "Milk Bars", places that cater to teenagers by providing a juke box, dancing space and light refreshments, no longer will have to pay the 20% cabaret tax.

the 20% cabaret tax was strictly a wartime revenue measure. It should have been eliminated a long time ago.

The industry, being as busy as it is, neglected to approach Congressmen and Senators in the hope that one of the legislators would introduce a bill to eliminate the 20% cabaret tax in places where there is dancing to juke box music, whether by teenagers or by oldsters.

Now that there is a great possibility that the 20% U.S. cabaret tax will be eliminated, where teenagers dance to juke box music in those spots where light refreshments are served, there is every hope that this stimulus for greater play action will result in thousands of better and more profitable locations for the nation's music businessmen.

The fact of the matter is, as many have pointed out in the past, dancing to juke box music seems to be the desire of the teenagers.

There are locations where older folk, too, would dance to juke box music, were the cabaret tax eliminated so this could be allowed by the proprietors of these places.

Congress, in its new tax-easing bill, by eliminating the 20% cabaret tax where dancing will be allowed to juke box music in such spots as "Milk

Bars" where light refreshments are served, has opened a great new field to businessmen nationwide.

There may even be a complete revival of dance recordings to meet the demand should it reach the proportions that it so importantly occupied prior to War II.

This would also help many of the present bands and orchestras about the country. Orchestra leaders have stated, for a long time now, that youth is forgetting how to dance. Perhaps this wedge into dancetime music may result in a new dancing era for the teenagers of the nation.

More than anything else, of course, and as far as this industry is concerned, the elimination of the 20% U.S. cabaret tax where teenagers dance to juke box music in "Milk Bars", and similar such places, can help revive thousands of locations which have fallen into mediocrity and cause them to again become among the best in the nation.

There is also no doubt that a great many astute businessmen all over the country will enter into the "Milk Bars" business. This means a lift for construction all over the nation. It also means more employment. Wider use of goods and merchandise which, again, means still more employment for people all over the nation.

CHICAGO—"It seems that even before we can get an announcement of a new game to the trade", stated Nate Gottlieb of D. Gottlieb & Company, this past week, "we are swamped with orders for immediate and speedy delivery."

With Alvin Gottlieb away on his vacation this past week, Nate was faced with the double duty of answering distributors' phone calls as well as handling all the business that Alvin does each week.

"Our new two-player, 'Gondolier'", Nate reported, "has captured the imagination of everyone who has seen it.

"Here's one game", Nate explained, "that has the kind of full action playfield that quickly attracts the players with the result that it pulls in more profits for the operators.

"Advance tests indicated that 'Gondolier' is going to prove one of the most outstanding games of '58."

"Gondolier" is a multiple player game with four flippers. It has 3 bulls-eye targets that score 10 and 100 times indicated value of mystery circle.

The fascinating "mystery circle", according to Nate Gottlieb, in turn controls the scoring value of the bulls-eye targets and the two super-score holes.

There are seven rollovers spin lites in the mystery circle that score 50 points when lit. On-off rollunders light four pop bumpers. There is also a double number match feature, as well as cross-board cyclonic kickers. The game can be set for 3 or 5 ball play.

"Even tho some of the features we have listed are among the most outstanding yet produced on our five-ball games", Nate stated, "there is that extra something in 'Gondolier' that is hard to describe except by playing the game itself. This is what has caused such a tremendous advance business for this new two-player game."

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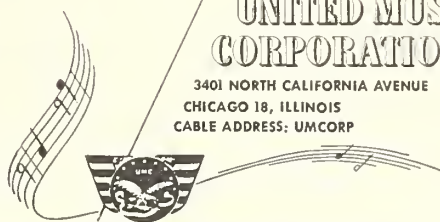
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Acclaim Three Year Phono Depreciation Schedule

75% First Year, 15% Second Year, 10% Third Year, Plus 30% Inflation Reserve vs Trade-in Salvage Value as "Realistic Depreciation."

CHICAGO—Ever since the suggestion, made by this publication editorially, that phono ops try to obtain a three-year depreciation schedule for automatic music, plus a 30% reserve against continued creeping inflation, there has been much acclaim for this plan.

Operators are in agreement that the suggested three-year depreciation schedule, 75% to be depreciated the first year, 15% the second year, and 10% the third year, is more in keeping with today's faster purchasing of new automatic phonos than the old four-year depreciation schedule.

Furthermore, due to the fact that those who paid \$995 in 1955 for their new phonos will now have to pay \$1295 to replace these same new juke boxes, should they depreciate them in the three-year period and buy the same type new income-producing investment equipment, they will be paying 30% more out of their own pocket, that is, paying 30% more already tax paid dollars for the replacement.

Music ops should set aside a reserve, in keeping with what the inflationary trend has been the past three years for the forthcoming three years to 1961, in the hope that inflation will not be greater from '58 to '61.

In this way, by depreciating their automatic music machines in a three-

year period, 75% the first year, 15% the second year, and 10% the third year, plus a reserve set aside for inflated prices that are sure to come into being by 1961 of at least 30%, the operator will be in a position to repurchase his income producing capital investment equipment without using already tax paid dollars from his own pocket to do so.

There is one important point that some operators overlook. This is the salvage, or trade-in value, of the depreciated machine. When trade-in (or salvage) value is high, then it pays the operator to trade immediately and replace with new equipment.

In the meantime, and most important, is the acclaim which this plan for "realistic depreciation" has met with from all the trade since its origination and introduction by *The Cash Box*.

Operators from all over the country have commended this publication for its efforts in the direction of eventually obtaining "realistic depreciation" for the industry.

It means that all business in this field will gain. It also means that operators will be able to see their way to speedier amortization of new machines and, thereby, enjoy a decent return on their investment in faster time.

"We have a lot of prewar equipment," Glass reports, "that we are still using as we are unable to import newer machines and," he adds, "spare parts have become a real problem."

"If there were a depot to which we could pay in sterling it would be of the greatest help," Glass advises.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: There may be some U. S. operators who have parts for prewar equipment and who may be able to help out a brother operator in England even if this means leaving the money in that country until such time as it can be removed or can be used by the operator if he visits England.)

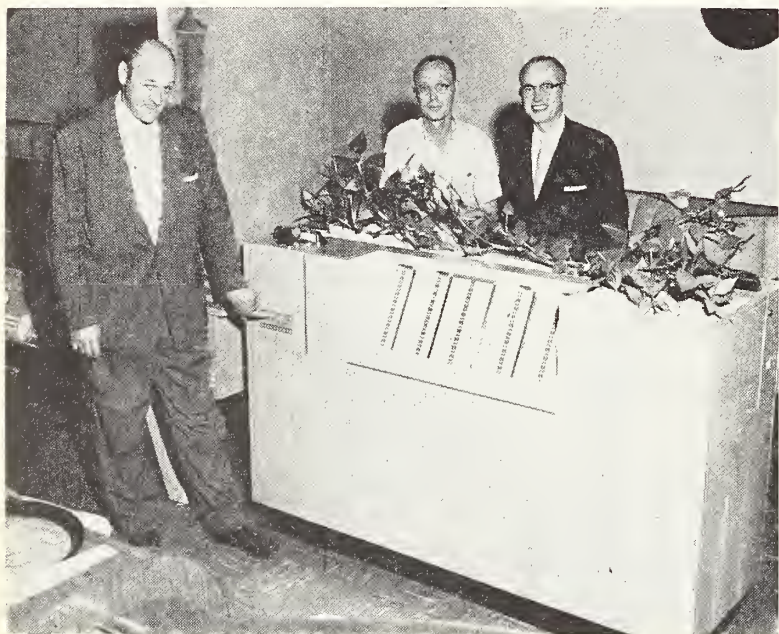

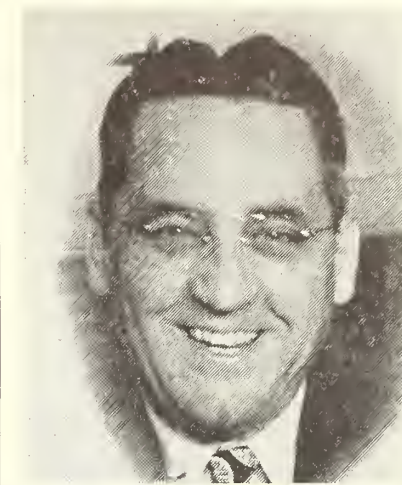

Robbins, Empire Coin, Suggests Rental Of Equipment By Ops

CHICAGO—"The rental of coin operated equipment by operators is the fastest growing and, probably, the least understood phase of this business," says Joe Robbins of Empire Coin Machine Exchange, this city. "Although thousands of machines are now being rented," continued Robbins, "many areas throughout the nation have not even been touched by rentals."

"It has been roundly condemned by operators and distributors as being detrimental to the well being of the industry. They have taken an ostrich-like view of rentals and have stubbornly refused to probe the reasons for its presence and, with few exceptions, its success."

Robbins continued by stating, "The downward trend in phonograph and game income makes it mandatory for everyone to examine any phase of the industry that will be helpful in avoiding financial disaster, during this period of recession, minor depression; or whatever you may prefer to call it."

Robbins stressed the fact that there are many reasons why an operator decides to rent instead of buying. Although these reasons may vary in individual cases, the most common are lack of profits over a long period of time, lack of operating capital—which can be attributed to many causes, poor judgment in purchasing and trading, etc.

"The distributor who is renting equipment tends to be more careful as to types of equipment he sends out," Robbins continued, "than the distributor who is merely selling. This is, of course, not true in all cases; however, the tendency to be more choosy is there nonetheless. The reasons for this attitude are quite obvious. The cost of equipment is the salient factor in the rental of all coin operated equipment."

"The high prices prevalent on most equipment," continued Robbins, "and the occasional staggering deprecia-

tion in a short period of time makes the purchase of amusement machines a risky business at best."

"True", Robbins stated, "many operators have been, and are now, quite successful in the operation of this type of equipment."

"The rental of machines does not now, and may never appeal to them—and rightly so."

"However there are countless operators who have consistently made money on music operations and lost money on their game operations. In such cases as these, they would be far better off to rent equipment to minimize their losses, or possibly through the resultant tax advantages, show a profit."

"The distributor, having the natural sales and re-rental outlets," Robbins added, "helps the operator by providing him with better equipment than he could normally afford to purchase; and, providing him with suitable changes in equipment as circumstances require."

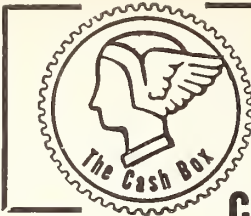
"Any operator, and there are certainly countless today," he said, "who is having trouble making a success of operating amusement games through the normal purchasing—operating—trading channels, should see his local distributor who does rent equipment; and see what his program has to offer."

"There will be many cases in which rentals will afford little or no relief. However there will be either a partial or a complete solution."

Robbins concluded by saying, "This is a business which, experience has shown, requires almost revolutionary trends in order to produce high gross takes and resultant high profits."

"The flipper pinball, the bumper pool tables, the shuffle alleys and the bowling alleys are cases in point. The valleys, however, are much deeper and longer than are peaks in this sort of business."

"The rental idea may well be the answer to this uneven distribution of income."

Location Demands Three Pinballs GREAT BRITAIN GLIMPSES

Further news is to hand on the British flipper front. The machine-hungry market is not only seizing every pin-table it can get from Mondial in Dublin, but it is also going into the multiple banks of machines business, reports Gottlieb/Williams distributor Bill Smith, of Music Hire (Yorkshire) Ltd., in Leeds: "We fitted a table in a café site at Brighthouse where we already have a juke box and about a fortnight ago the proprietor rang me up asking if he could have another pin-table, as in busy periods people were queuing up to play the pin-table. We therefore sent one over and two days afterwards he rang up to say that now the school holidays had started both tables were fully occupied at the busy periods, could we send a third! I think this illustrates the interest that is being shown in tables". It certainly does!

Fisher and Ludlow, Ltd., of Erdington, Birmingham, has entered the slot-machine industry. The firm is making machines for selling cigarettes, sweets and other small packed products. Output is on a small scale at present and only the simpler type of machine is being made. But the firm—one of the leading companies in the British Motor Corporation—has a big expansion program. A spokesman said: "There is a growing awareness of the potentialities of vending machines in this country. We seem to have lagged behind the American and Continental countries in this industry, but we feel it has a big fortune." Inquiries from overseas are already pouring in and the firm hopes to export a large proportion of its machines. Fisher and Ludlow already make a wide range of pressed steel products.

Automatic Vendors, of Cambridge, has designed a new machine for biscuits and cake, and Huntley and Palmers, Ltd., the biscuit firm, is operating one in the entrance to the refreshment room at Paddington Station. The machine is pale blue-green, with a glass front panel, showing the biscuits and cake. It is lit internally and has four drawers. . . . Expect an announcement shortly from the Rank film company about record distribution, which will be of interest to operators in Britain. Meanwhile, the Rank Organization has now registered as a company Rank Record Sales to handle the disc club which it is expected to start. Objects of the new company are described as "to carry on the business of selling gramophone records by retail; and in that or any other way whatsoever to exploit sound recordings, records and copyright assets etc." Formation of a company is necessary to comply with Purchase Tax requirements.

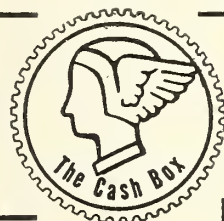

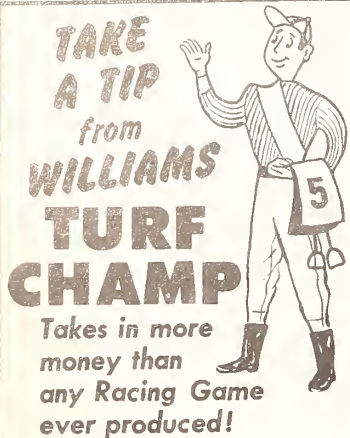

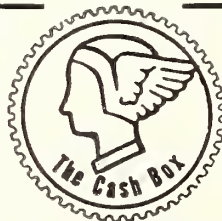
Eye Fall And Winter With Optimism

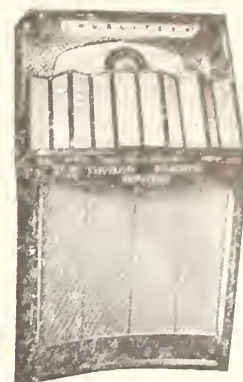

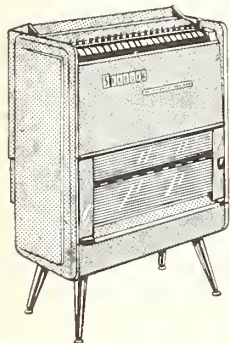

"Location owners would then have more respect for the operators."

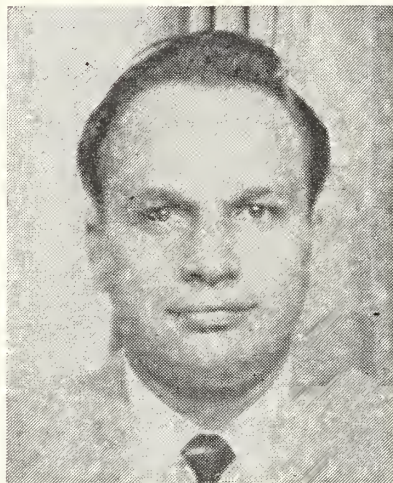
"The operators spend large sums of money to open with new machines. Then the locations find that they can buy these very same machines direct."

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.
