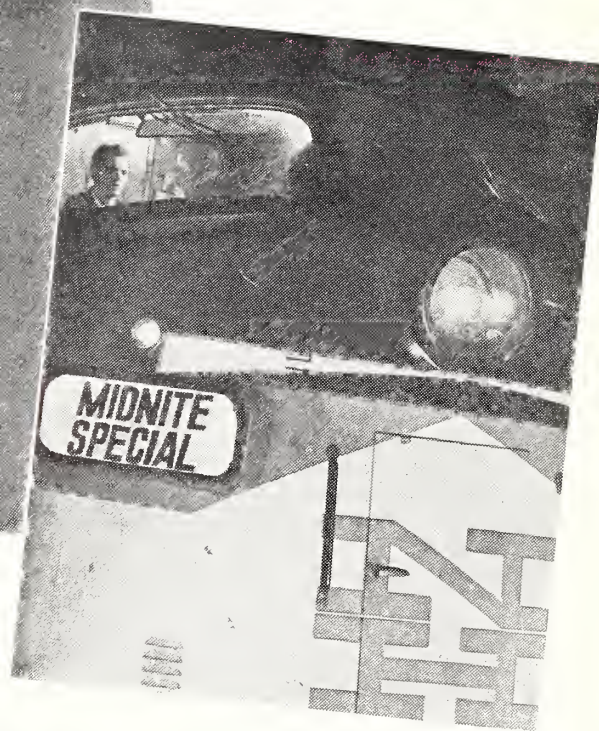
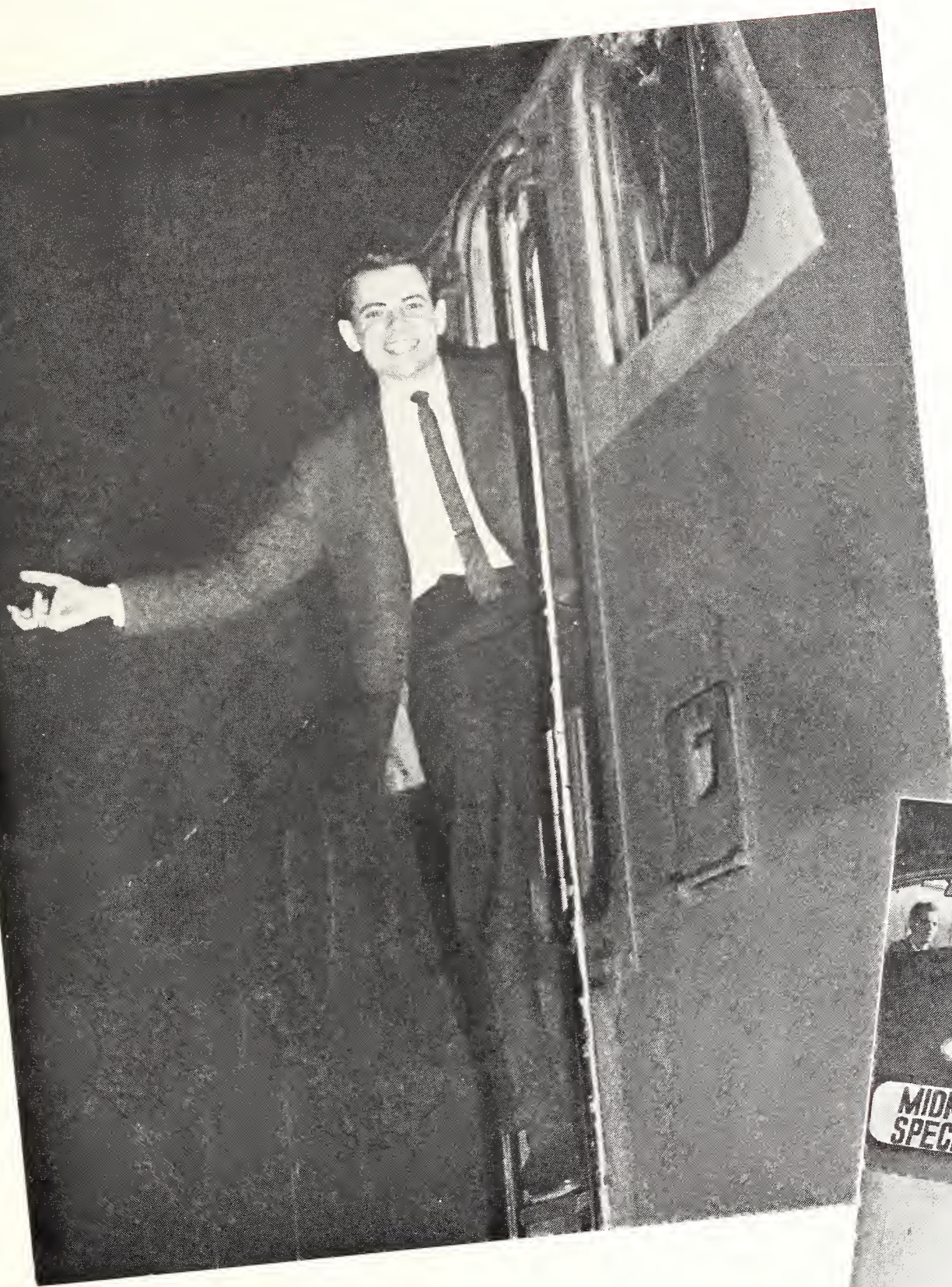

THIS RECORDING DRIVES HOME THE SHOCKING MESSAGE THAT MUSIC CAN BE A FORCE FOR EVIL AS WELL AS GOOD. One's normal immediate reaction on listening to this record is that it is good marching music, well-played. The secondary reaction and conflict of emotion is brought about by the sudden realization that here were literally masses of wildly fanatical murderous people, crazy with murderous intent, and monstrous national and racial murder in their hearts.

This recording in fact is more shocking and startling and hard hitting than any picture of emaciated concentration camp victims, gas chambers, furnaces in which human beings were burned alive, or any other documentary material on the evil extent to which the German people went in their monstrous and devastating pursuit for world power in World War II.

Unfortunately, there are too many attempts to "sweep under the carpet" documentary evidence of this type. ONCE AGAIN, THIS RECORDING STANDS AS A PRIME, PRIMEVAL DOCUMENT OF THE EVIL PURPOSES TO WHICH MUSIC CAN BE PUT.

It must be understood and recalled that the basis of Hitler's propaganda policy was "Don't trust reason because reason can mislead you...but your emotions will never betray you". The use of

music and the traditional patriotic theme with lyric to the effect "let us destroy the Jews and other enemies of the State" was one of the most effective techniques used to whip up the frenzies of the German people.

Whether a situation such as this will ever take place again is anybody's guess. However, if this document serves in any way to demonstrate one of the patterns by which another Hitler could rise to power, it should not be suppressed. The shock value to anyone, Jew or Gentile, in listening to this recording is completely frightening. The American people do not know just how terrible and how animal was this Nazi movement. To suppress this record would be to suppress the most damaging and powerful reminder of German Naziism.

We grant that certain misfits have used this recording to satisfy some of their own "sick" drives. However, this situation is no more unusual than for some sexual pervert to receive sexual gratification from the sight of classic Greek or Roman sculpture. It is also granted that many people have bought this record for the shock value and for "kicks" and as a conversation piece or collectors item. However, we think that the net result is to make people more consciously and universally aware of the terrible result a musical stimulus such as this might achieve.

Leave an ailment alone long enough and you're liable to wind up with an incurable infection.

That's exactly what's happening with bootlegging in our industry. It is certainly not yet incurable, but events that have taken place during the past year indicate that this infection is getting out of hand and had better be treated before it reaches the critical condition.

Everyone is well aware of the tremendous bootlegging that exists in the singles field. But the pirates have had such an easy time of it, that now they are expanding into new phases—the album field.

Bootleggers have of late been reproducing expensive album covers in elaborate four colors with great success. Now they have a catalog to carry them through the "bad months" when there is no single hot enough for them to steal.

And why shouldn't they. No one in our industry seems interested enough to do anything about it.

The tremendous risk in our industry is great enough without the added difficulty of having to compete with your own record when you

finally do come up with a big money maker.

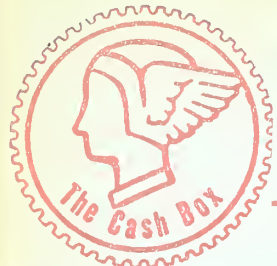
If ever there was a project for the Record Industry Association of America, this is it. It is a project which everyone who manufactures records should be in accord with.

The cost for any one company to carry the ball alone would be much too great. But if an appropriation in proportion to the various record companies' RIAA dues were made, the cost would be insignificant as compared with the phenomenal amount of money being lost.

With increased avenues for merchandising records being announced every other day and with reports that the not too distant future may see the door to door selling of records, areas for the pirates to get rid of their contraband are increasing by the minute.

About two years ago, it was estimated by more than one company that as much as 25% of their gross business was being lost because of bootleggers. Heaven knows what that figure must be today.

The danger must be treated immediately. And now is the time for the RIAA to act.

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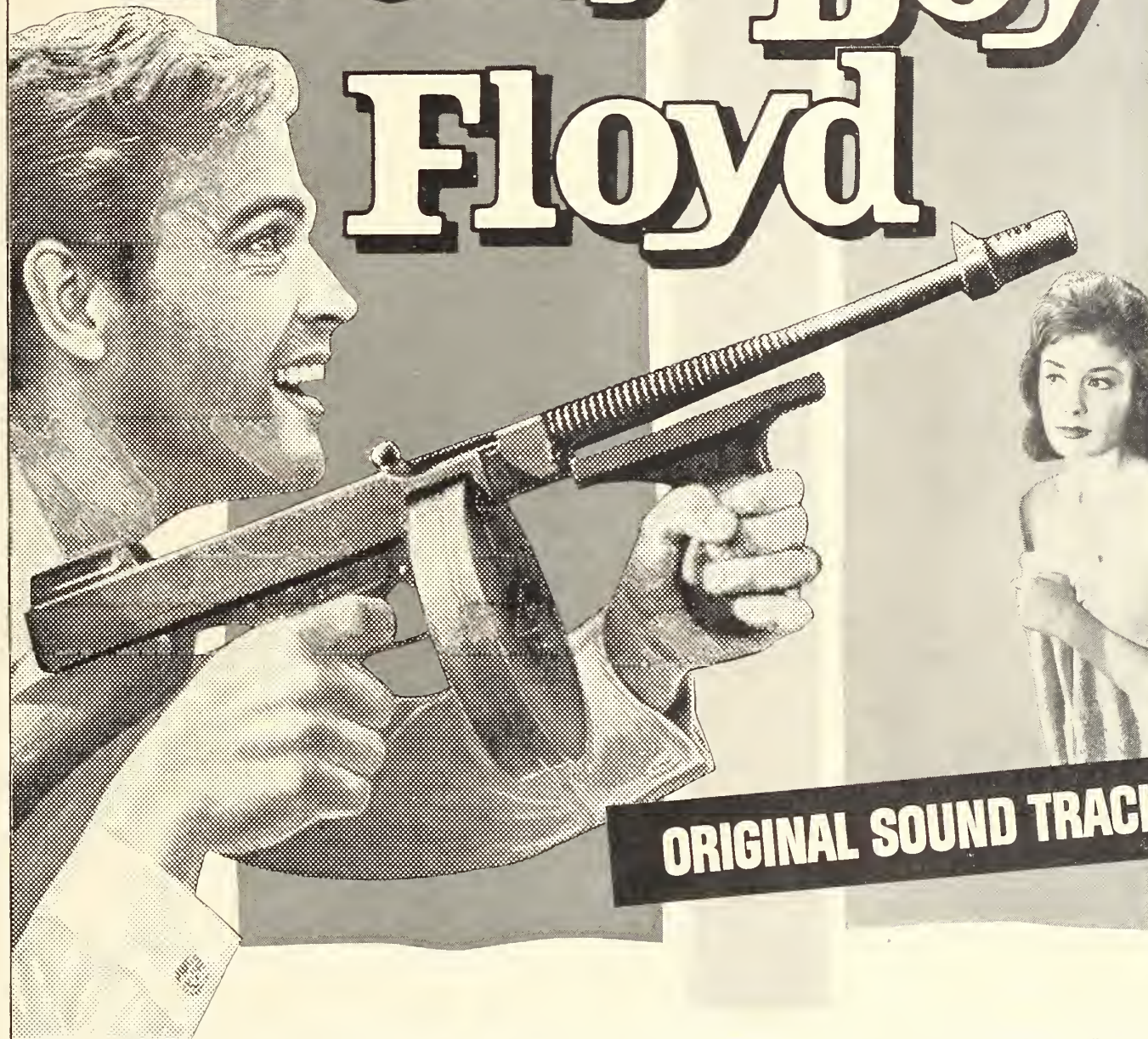

● Looks like two more big winners from the fabulous hit-maker. One side, "Starlight", is an ultra-lovely romancer set to a soft, ear-arresting cha cha beat. The other, "All Is Well", is the town criers' message transformed into a class love swinger. Glenn Osser's ork and choral support matches Mathis' superb performances on both lids.

THE BROWNS (RCA Victor 7700)

● Either end of the trio's newest Victor offering can make it three-in-row for 'em ("Three Bells" and "Scarlet Ribbons"). "Teen-Ex", is a touching ballad, with infectious tempo breaks, that tells the unfortunate tale of teenagers who wed too soon. MICKEY ROSELLI (MPA 853)

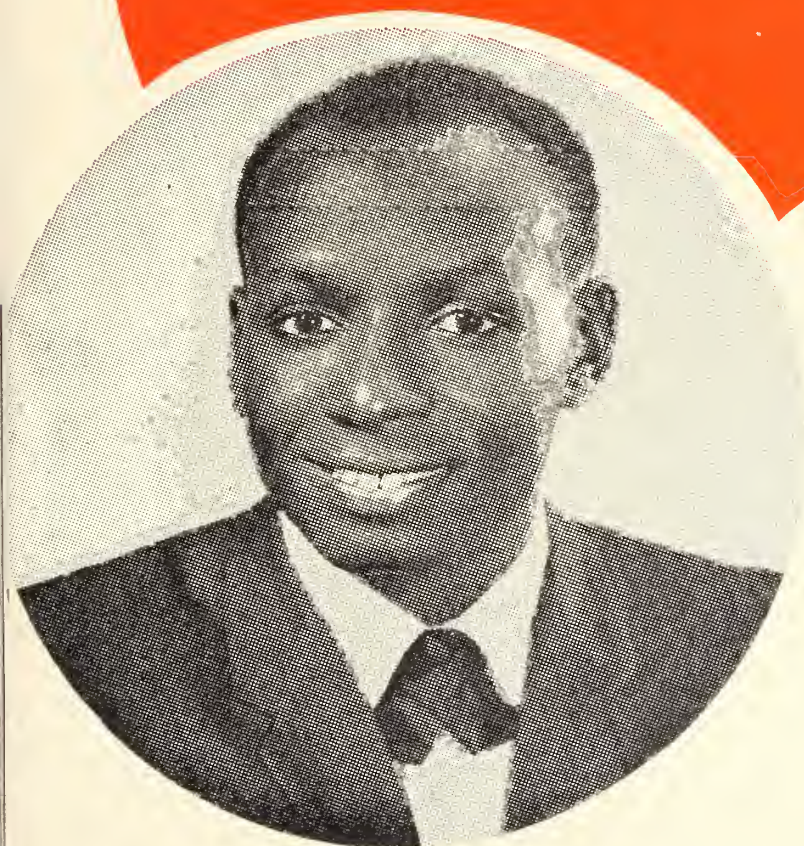

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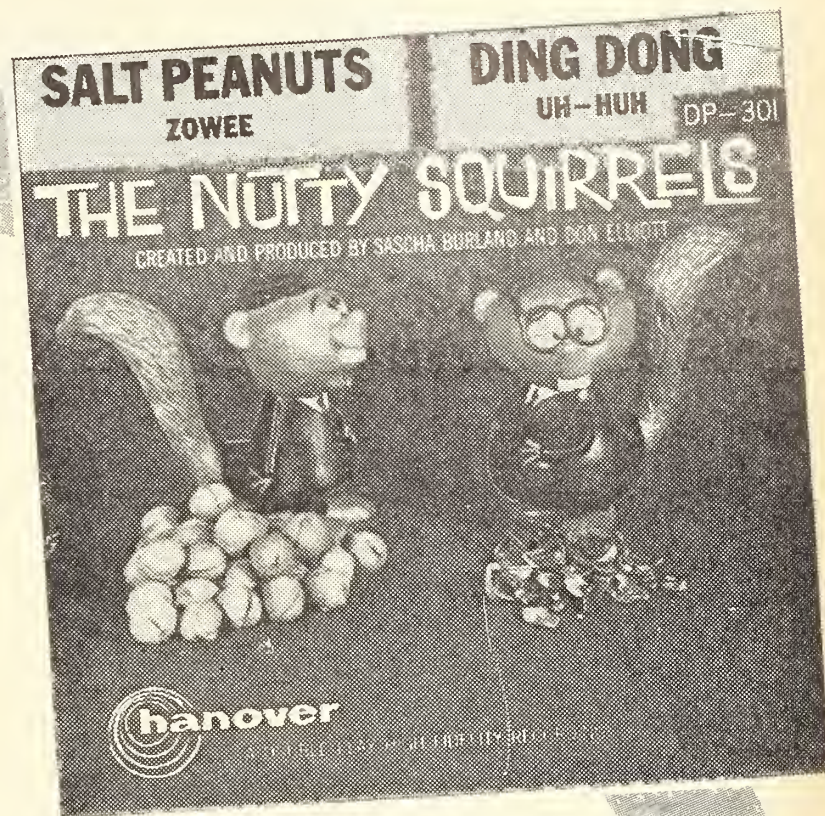

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Album Reviews

POPULAR PICK OF THE WEEK



"SATURDAY NIGHT SING ALONG WITH MITCH"—Mitch Miller & The Gang—Columbia CL 1414

Still another community sing package from Miller, the eighth in the series, and it proves just as musically successful as the previous ones. Saturday night mood songs include "Baby Face," "Poor Butterfly," "Little Brown Jug," "Bye Bye Blackbird," "Ain't She Sweet" and "Now Is The Hour." Four tear-out song sheets are again provided in the double fold cover. No doubt about hit status here.

"LITTLE MARY SUNSHINE"—Original Cast—Capitol WAO 1240

The show—a surprise hit this Off-Broadway season—is an hilarious take-off on typical operetta fare. Rick Besoyan's tuneful songs (he also wrote the libretto) are skillful and delightful recollections of material by other composers (i.e. "Look For A Sky Of Blue," "Colorado Love Call") and are delivered in engaging fashion by the fine cast. A full ork augments the two pianos used in the stage production. The musical will be around for a long time, so set should do very well on the original-cast shelf.

"BROADWAY PLAYBILL"—The Hi-Lo's—Columbia CL 1416

In a survey of the three biggest current Broadway successes, the Hi-Lo's offer bright readings of music from "Gypsy," "The Sound Of Music" and "Fiorello." "Gypsy takes the featured spot with eight selections covering one full side, plus three each from the two newer productions. The music is naturally outstanding and with the group's tasteful jazz-like approach, the album jells into a thoroughly enjoyable session. Warren Barker is along on a commendable conducting stint.

"THE SOUND OF MUSIC"—The Trapp Family Singers—Warner Bros. W 1377

The Trapp Family offers their own version of the music from the smash show about their lives. They are augmented by additional voices, but nevertheless the voices that charmed international audiences for years have not really changed: sweet, clear and thoroughly enchanting. An unusual venture and a welcome reunion on disk for the famous family.

"THREE LITTLE WORDS"—Patti Page—Mercury SR 60037

The polished, poised performer is the height of versatility in this new collection. Such widely separate tunes as "Why Don't You Do Right," "My Prayer," "Whatever Lola Wants" and "I'm Just Wild About Harry" call for such different approaches and the singer never fails to come through in beautiful taste. Big band accompaniment, augmented occasionally by strings, is right in line with her style. Wonderful entertainment here.

"JACKIE GLEASON PRESENTS OPIATE D'AMOUR"—Capitol SW 1315

A scintillating session for the romanticists is again presented by Gleason, contributing six of his own compositions for the date. Alternating a string ork and a brass ork that features 24 trumpets in subdued accord, the mood emerges in full-toned lushness. Selections include "When Your Lover Has Gone," "You've Changed," "She's Funny That Way" and "It's Alright With Me." Another expressive collection for the Gleason music fans.

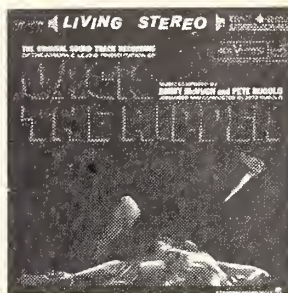
"FROM DEBBIE WITH LOVE"—Debbie Reynolds—MGM E3806

Pert and precocious and bubbling with youthful charm is the Debbie Reynolds pictured here, for most of the selections have been ingeniously culled from MGM Pictures film soundtracks, and this is the type of role Miss Reynolds plays. Such tunes as "Am I In Love?," "It Started With a Kiss," "The Mating Game" and "Love Is a Gamble," feature the songstress-actress in parts which brought her to film stardom. Delightful package.



"DANCE TO THE LESTER LANIN BEAT"—Lester Lanin and his Trio—Epic LN 3656

On the maestro's tenth LP for Epic he features the trio playing 13 medleys comprised of the best loved standards, as usual. Piano, bass and drums, ramble brightly through the music and despite the size of the group, an infectious typical Lanin session results. The beat varies just occasionally but mainly remains in the quick paced, liting society beat area.



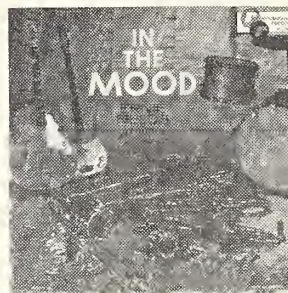
"JACK THE RIPPER"—Original Film Soundtrack composed by Jimmy McHugh and Pete Rugolo—RCA Victor LSP 2199

McHugh and Rugolo have composed a series of eerie, murky background themes that well underscore the brutal violence in the film. It is music both haunting and powerful, gripping in its attention to spine-chilling effects and harmonies. Rugolo's direction furthers the use of dynamics. Should find many film score and mood music enthusiasts.



"LIGHT CLASSICS"—Ferrante and Teicher—ABC-Paramount ABC 313

The popular piano duo takes its fascinating style into the classical field and come up with intriguing arrangements of twelve light-classical pieces that are familiar to everyone. Leading off with a brisk reading of "Malaguena," they then dispose of "Hungarian Dance No. 5" (Brahms), "Minuet in G," "Ave Maria," "Pavanne" and Chopin's "Polonaise" among others in short, but interesting order. A choice package for team.



"IN THE MOOD"—Ernie Fields and his Orchestra—Rendezvous M-1309

Titled after his recent hit, Ernie Fields' album presents more of the driving rock and roll instrumental sounds adjusted to such stalwarts as "Tuxedo Junction," "It's All in the Game," "The Dipsy Doodle," and "Tea For Two (Cha Cha)," along with a few more recent items, including the title hit tune. This is solidly swinging big beat fare that the teeners will like.



"ANNETTE SINGS ANKA"—Vista BV-3302

A talented cleffer, Paul Anka has provided the young songstress with a dozen vehicles that should be the delight of the kids. Titled "Train of Love," "I Love You," "Tell Me That You Love Me" and "It's Really Love," among others, the tunes are ideally suited for teen tastes. Tutti Camaratta has set up the pounding rock and roll beat for accompaniment. Youngsters should appreciate.



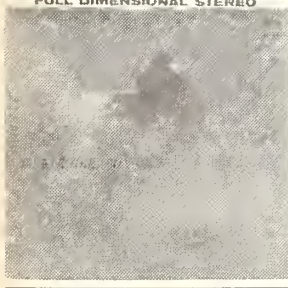
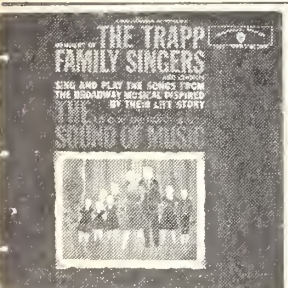
"THE INVITATIONS"—With Billy May and his Orchestra—Liberty D-LST 7145

With Hawaii the subject of a recent flood of albums, the Invitations, five young Hawaiians, are refreshing in this idiom for they combine the style of a smart, modern vocal group with the instrumentation and arrangements native to their state. Miss Ward is a leader in the gospel field, rivaling the greatness of Mahalia Jackson, despite the fact that she's not known outside of religious and jazz circles. Her group is composed of some of the finest in the field, especially Marian Williams, Frances Steadman and Kitty Parham. The selections include "Are You Sure," "Oh, Gabriel," "This Old House" and "Glory to the King."



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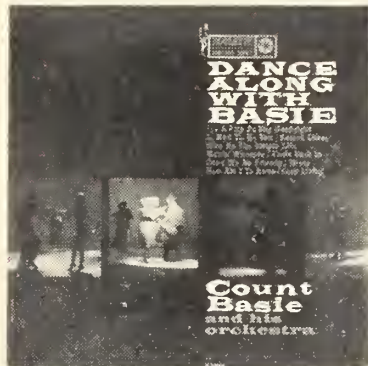
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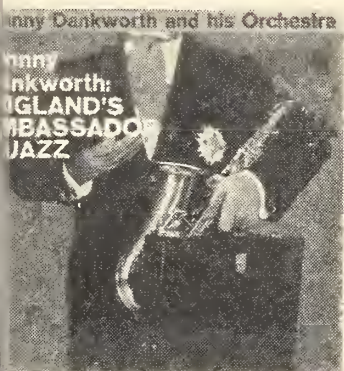

"DANCING AT THE WILLOW-BROOK"—Don Kingston—Profile LP 404

Light, easily danceable melodies are the forte of Don Kingston here, as he essays a group of standards in warm, relaxed Conn organ tones. Assisted by Bobby Christian on various percussion instruments, Kingston offers a typical evening's fare at the Willow-Brook nitery in Willow Springs, Ill., where he has held forth for the past six years. Tunes are "Blue Moon," "Siboney," "Charmaine," "Hi Lilli, Hi Lo" and "Taking a Chance on Love," among others in varying tempos.



"MUDDY WATERS SINGS BIG BILL BROONZY"—Chess LP 1444

The late Bill Broonzy has assumed the status of a legend in the blues field; a truly great singer of the country blues. Muddy Waters carries this tradition when he is not singing for commercial r&b disks. He has recorded examples of his singing that completely dwarf his attempts in importance. Attacking twelve songs written by or associated with Broonzy, Waters again proves he is one of the capable heirs in the field. It is a session loaded with soul and earnestness. Unfortunately the musical accompaniment here mars the performances and hinders Waters, especially the incessantly pounding drums. But enough of Waters comes through to make the album worthwhile.

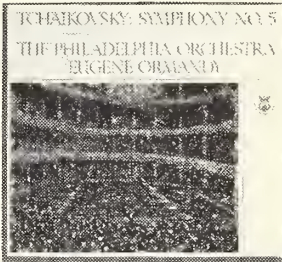
JAZZ PICK OF THE WEEK

"THE BEST OF DJANGO REINHARDT"—Capitol TBO 10226



The legend of the late Django Reinhardt is pure fact; one of the few completely original European jazzmen and one of the select who made an impact upon American jazz. The gypsy guitarist had a style that is still fresh after more than 25 years of recording. This two disk album presents Reinhardt in 24 performances dating from 1937 with the Quintet of the Hot Club of France; from an historic 1939 session that included Rex Stewart and Barney Bigard and a date in 1945 with a nondescript American crew. It is of course the Hot Club and Stewart sides that realized the amazing talents of the man. A commendable issue by the label that is of priceless value to jazz.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



TCHAIKOVSKY: "Symphony No. 5 in Minor"—The Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, Conductor—Columbia MP 5435

This is the second Columbia disk tin around for Ormandy and the Philadelphia on this work; object: to bring the conductor's exciting original interpretation into the realm of stereo sound. Again Ormandy handles the very popular symphony with his usual deftness and the orchestra responds with its customary aplomb. Brilliant recording.

"NINA SIMONE AND HER FRIENDS"—Bethlehem BCP 6041



Though Nina Simone gets featured billing on this release of old sides, she shares disk space with Chris Connor and Carmen McRae, each with four tracks to their credit. These are some of the best recorded performances of these singers, for they were singing for an essentially jazz audience, before they became "pop" conscious. Included are "He's Got The Whole World in His Hands" and "For All We Know" (Simone); "Old Devil Moon" and "Last Time For Love" (McRae); "Try a Little Tenderness" and "What is There To Say" (Connor). Wonderful "sampling" of vocal jazz.



STRAVINSKY: "Le Sacre Du Printemps" ("The Rite of Spring")—Sir Eugene Goossens conducting the London Symphony Orchestra—Everest LPBR 6047

The airing given the popular ballet is completely in keeping with the macabre mood of the music. Goossens directs firmly, with an assured touch that brings the piece to its appropriate barbaric heights. He is able to extract excellent musicianship for the harmonically and rhythmically difficult work. Distinctly enhanced by Everest's outstanding sound reproduction.

CHARLIE DIGS DIXIE



"CHARLIE DIGS DIXIE"—Charlie Shavers—MGM E3809

Shavers is one of the most versatile trumpet players around. He is equally at home in a modern setting, a swing band (the Dorsey Brothers on TV), and, here, in the deep south. His tone is pure: sweet, clear, and rarely hidden behind "junk" mutes. His assistants here are not traditionalists at all. Ray Bryant (piano), Tom Bryant (bass), Oliver Jackson (drums). Selections are all dixie standards and include "Beale Street Blues," "Royal Garden Blues," "If I Could Be With You" and "Basin Street Blues." Good swinging music for all ages and likes.



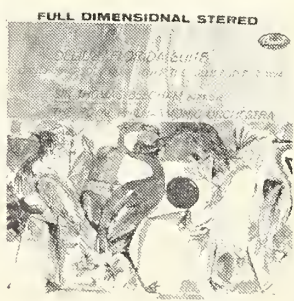
MOZART: "Serenade No. 11 in E-flat Major for Wind Instruments"; "Serenade No. 12 in C Major for Wind Instruments"—Newell Jenkins conducting the Everest Woodwind Octet—Everest LP 6042

These two rarely heard (and recorded) works are neglected among the reams that the composer turned out. They possess an endearing charm of their own and are ideal for pure enjoyment. Also they are considered among the best examples of music for woodwinds. Jenkins quite up to the task of impeccable interpretation, conducting with acute sensitivity. Prime is and much welcome among the sparse recordings of the pieces.



"GOOD DEAL"—The Three Sounds—Blue Note 4020

As a tightly knit, fully integrated group, the Three Sounds rival any trio. Each is in complete accord with the needs and demands of the others and through this cohesion they are able to offer music that is suitable for many tastes besides their basically strong jazz appeal. They swing with lots of deep blues funkiness: "Down the Track" and "Tracy's Blue." Other selections include "Robbins' Nest," "That's All" and "St. Thomas." More attention is due them for their third album for the label.



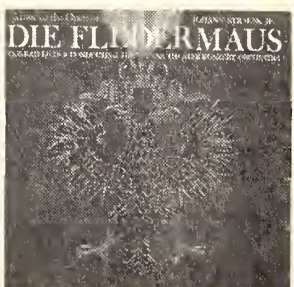
DELIUS: "Florida Suite"; "Dance Rhapsody 2"; "Over The Hills And Far Away"—Sir Thor Beecham conducting the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra—Capitol SG 7193

Beecham, the foremost interpreter of Delius music, offers a long-awaited performance of the composer's celebrated suite, a stirring four-part dedication to the sublime Florida of the 19th century. Though not well-known, Delius' music has had infinite influences upon modern American music, especially jazz. Even the Dance Rhapsody contains the ever-present Delius melancholia. The final piece, a tone-poem, is also typical Delius in its picturesqueness. For the astute buyers.



"QUIET KENNY"—Kenny Dorham—New Jazz 8225

On his first record date as lone soloist (with rhythm), Dorham's playing bears out even more so than on any previous dates that he is one of the more important trumpet players of the decade and continually growing in skill. He works intelligently, using well-thought-out statements, never rushing into something blindly in a burst of quick useless notes. He is a thinker! Rhythmic section is hard to beat—Paul Chambers, Art Taylor and Tommy Flanagan. The tunes are "Alone Together," "Old Folks" and "I Had the Craziest Dream" among others. Give it a good listen.



LEHAR: "The Merry Widow"; STRAUSS: "Fledermaus"—Conrad Lieder conducting Vienna Theatre—Konzert Orchestra—Kapp 1152, 1153

Similar to the label's "Opera Without Words" series are these two recordings issued simultaneously featuring the music of these two famous operettas. "Die Fledermaus" might be numbered an operetta for it closely approaches grand opera. Notwithstanding this, conductor Lieder gives a truly spirited feeling to the typical Viennese compositions. Good mood setter with outlook on the pop market.

Among the reported advantages of nylon records are their great resistance to wear and breakage, and high reproductive quality. Nylon will be used in all releases on Golden Crest's Lab Series, and the raw materials for nylon records cost four times as much as the vinyl now used, according to Galehouse, there will be no increase in the price of the label's \$4.98 Lab series. The first nylon LP released will be "Walter Beeler With Music From 'Gigi,' 'Porgy And Bess,' 'Flower Drum Song,' and 'American In Paris.'"

Harvard Buys World Pub. Rights To "Running Bear"

NEW YORK—Harvard Music has purchased the world publishing rights to "Running Bear," the big Johnny Preston (Mercury) hit, firm topper Ivan Mogull announced last week. The deal was made with publisher Bill Hall of Big Bopper Music in Beaumont, Texas. In addition, Mogull purchased from Hall similar rights to the Preston flip, "My Heart Knows"; "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do" (Jivin' Gene on Mercury); "Shedding Teardrops Over You" (Rod Bernard on Mercury). Mogull also bought from E. M. Marks for his Ivan Mogull Music Ltd. firm a song tagged "El Jamaquino" for the following territories: British Commonwealth of Nations and Ireland. Tune has been cut by Tito Puente, Machito, Tito Rodriguez, among others.

"Payola" Hearings Continue

WASHINGTON—Further payments to deejays—including the first admission by a deejay to House probers that he received money to spin certain records—were revealed in testimony last week before the Congressional investigation into payola in broadcasting. In addition, the investigating committee heard from two record company execs, Sam Clark, president of ABC-Paramount Records, whose closed testimony was made public last week and Jack Gold, head of Paris Records.

The first deejay to tell the House committee he received payments for giving certain records airtime was Norman Prescott, former WBZ-Boston spinner who admitted receiving \$9,955.08 from Boston distributors with the "undersanding" that he would spin "eight to ten records a day." Prescott said he was permitted to spin "anything I wanted to play . . . so long as it was represented by their distributorship." This testimony by Prescott was made behind-closed-doors on Feb. 8 (the opening of the probe) and was made public last week.

Prescott also said that record companies and publishers had—between 1950 and 1954—organized a network of deejays in 15 key markets to promote their disks. These deejays received profits from the disks they plugged and played on the air, Prescott testified.

Prescott revealed that Crystallite Records, based in California, distributed gratis to deejays one million shares in the company's stock. He also said that the diskery recently sent a letter to the stock recipients suggesting that they "forget that you own stock, and we will forget it, and see you later." Reason for the suggestion, the letter stated, according to Prescott, was that the payola probe might prove "embarrassing" to the deejay stockholders.

House investigators heard on Tuesday that Sam Clark, president of Am-Par Records participated in loans to Verve Records. The loans were made thru Boston distributor Music Suppliers of New England, a concern formerly headed by Clark. The testimony also brought out that Music Suppliers was paying the premiums on life insurance for Clark and that Harry Carter, president of Music Suppliers was beneficiary of the insurance. It was also stated that Am-Par "partially subsidized" the weekly wages of a promotion man for Music Suppliers (a situation not uncommon in the record business.) Clark's connections with the Boston distrib were disclosed after the House Subcommittee had calculated that dee jays in Boston had been paid a total of \$40,472.54 in the last three years by Music Suppliers. Of the sum, a government auditor testified, \$27,121.54 was paid to nineteen dee jays and one librarian by Music Suppliers. Other payments listed for record distributors were: Dumont Distributing, \$8,380 to twelve jockeys and one librarian; Mutual Distributors, \$2,121 to seventeen dee jays; and Records, Inc. \$2,850.

On Thursday, the subcommittee released the closed door testimony of Sam Clark. Clark said that ABC deejay Dick Clark would not play an Am-Par disk until it had become an "established hit". Oren Harris raised the question in noting that Dick Clark has played nine Am-Par records thirty times last October. Harris did not pursue the question.

Gordon Dinerstein, v.p. of Music Suppliers testified last week that payments and gifts were given for "creating and maintaining goodwill, testing records at 'record hops' and testing and evaluating new releases."

Representative Moss, Democrat of California, expressed that he did not believe Dinerstein's testimony that the payments made to jockeys did not have any bearings on records played on the air.

Jack Gold, president of Paris Records, told the subcommittee that when he rejected a demand by KYW deejay Joe Finan that Gold change his distributor in Cleveland, Chuck Young, former librarian for KYW and WERE in Cleveland, who admitted receiving \$7,000 in listening fees from record companies in 1958 and 1959, refused to play his records.

After threatening to go to the FCC with a complaint, Gold said he heard one of his records played.

The subcommittee also heard Maxwell Richmond, president of WMEX in Boston testify last week that he received \$1400 for broadcasting one distributor's records for thirteen weeks last year. After hearing testimony that WMEX deejay Arnold Ginsburg had received \$4,400 in the last three years from record companies without being asked for any specific services and that he had assumed the payments had been "goodwill" or "tokens of appreciation", subcommittee chairman Oren Harris lashed out with the statement, "If you and the rest think we are going to swallow this as though it was just an incident, then you must think we're pretty naive."

On Thursday, the committee heard Harry Weiss, a record promoter for Music Suppliers, tell of lists of the "top ten" records which were sent to The Cash Box. He said the "top ten" lists were sent regularly to The Cash Box on radio station letter heads (for the Disk Jockey Regional Record Report) supposedly compiled by dee jays. Weiss testified he had obtained the stationery from radio stations WBZ, WMEX and WHIL, after Sam Clark wrote him in 1958 asking if something could be done to promote an Am-Par record, "Born Too Late" by the Ponitails. Weiss' testimony also referred to the song "Growing Love" by the Downbeats.

Weiss said he had not known that \$60 of his \$160 salary at Music Suppliers had been contributed by Am-Par

Phoney Lists Strike Out

ED. NOTE—The statistical department of The Cash Box has looked into the matter of disk jockey lists from the three Boston radio stations from which Weiss said he obtained letterheads. Here are the facts: stations WBZ, WHIL and WBOS were listed a total of nine times during 1958. Neither the "Growing Love" nor "Born Too Late" recordings were in any of those nine lists printed. A total of 3,276 disk jockey lists were printed in 1958. Thus, the nine lists from the three stations accounted for less than 3/10 of 1% of all the lists published.

The After Six Formal Company will feature the MGM album in their national magazine and newspaper ads as a special feature. Deejays will be sent in conjunction with the release of the MGM album. After Six has extensive follow-up plans with issuing window placecards to its mens' store accounts and department stores plus the support of the entire After Six sales organization. As an incentive to the MGM distributors and salesmen, After Six is furnishing complete formal attire as prizes.

Epic Talent Search

NEW YORK—Al Shulman, general manager of Epic Records, and co-directors of A&R, Charles Sagie and Les Fogelson, have just returned from an extensive talent search of the South, Midwest and East Coast. Shulman left last weekend (21) for the West Coast, and will return to New York on the 29th.

Driftwood At Teachers' Meet

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records' singing artist Jimmie Driftwood appeared last week before some 19 teachers at the National School Administrators Meeting in Atlantic City, N. J., discussing the subjects he knows best: folk music and teaching.

Driftwood, a teacher for many years, was invited by the convention school and college administrators to discuss American folk music and his experiences in writing new material and discovering old songs. He has been considered a prime folk singer and writer in that idiom, with "Battle of New Orleans" among his most famous compositions. His latest album "Wilderness Road," consists of a program of his new compositions. He also appears with other artists on a new set of folk music, "How the West Was Won."

WNEW-TV's "Big Beat" To Discontinue R&R Music

NEW YORK—New York's WNEW-TV (Channel 5) last week announced that beginning this week (22) its "Big Beat" program, featuring Richard Hayes, will no longer present "rock 'n' roll" music.

Following a "long hard look at recent record sales and its own survey of teenagers' song-and-dance needs," the station will concentrate on the more popular forms of music. "Big Beat," seen daily from 5:30-6:00 P.M. and Saturdays from 8:00-9:00 P.M. will feature "ballads, jazz, pop and show tunes and the big band sounds."

In announcing this policy change in the presentation of music for teenagers, Jack Lynn, program manager of WNEW-TV, stated his belief that the program would continue to attract a wide teenage audience.

"We are convinced at the station," Lynn explained, "that the more popular forms of music are reaching an ever-increasing teenage group. During the past few months, we have experimented on "Big Beat" by presenting on each program one or more ballads, pop tunes and recording artists not identified with rock 'n' roll. More and more the teenagers appearing on the program and those who watch the telecasts have indicated a complete acceptance of this change."

"We have noticed, too, that many of the better rock 'n' roll singers have recently been covering themselves with straight melodic songs. As a result, we are convinced that the trend is definitely away from rock 'n' roll and that we believe it important that WNEW-TV be the pace-setter in this new type of format for the teenager viewer."

Record dealers will be supplied with point-of-sale material and a quantity of the sauce to spark the promotion. Disk jockeys and record reviewers will receive special "A Touch of Tabasco" kits including a bottle of the sauce, a kitchen tile, a book of recipes, and the Clooney-Prado album.

Both firms will cross-advertise the products in trade and consumer publications.

Shearing and Miss Staton, currently appearing in Hollywood at the Creendo night club, will give up their flight off to participate in the Olympics entertainment, Disney said.

Klein Enterprises Formed

Previous commitments prevented Eddy Arnold, vice-president, and Mac Wiseman, treasurer, from making the meeting.

Present CMA membership was announced as 521. There are 16 additional organizational memberships. The CMA's next quarterly meeting is scheduled to be held in Nashville in May.

London Appoints Warner

NEW YORK—Sy Warner has been appointed to head the London pop sales division of London Distributing in New York. He will be responsible for sales and the promotion of pop records in close association with the one-stops, rack jobbers, and syndicated chains in the metropolitan area.

Liberty Execs Hit Road

LOS ANGELES—Liberty Records executives Don Blocker and Don Bohanan have hit the road in an all-out promotion and sales drive boosting the label's current "Sound of the Sixties" LP release and hot singles.

Liberty's promotion director, Blocker is concentrating on the key record markets in the East; while sales manager Bohanan is hitting 32 Mid-west cities during his three week sales tour.

Arc Gets United Artists Line

NEW YORK—United Artists Records has announced the appointment of ARC Distributing Company of Detroit as distributor of the label's product in the state of Michigan. The appointment takes effect immediately.

Goldner Pacts Ivory Joe

NEW YORK — George Goldner, president of the newly formed Goldisc record label, has announced the signing of Ivory Joe Hunter to a long term recording contract.

Hunter is known for the hits he has written and/or recorded. Among them: "My Wish Came True", "Since I Met You Baby", "I Almost Lost My Mind" and "A Tear Fell".

The first session, under Goldner's supervision, took place last week and the record will be released on the Goldisc label immediately.

Goldisc's first release is "Barbara" by the Temptations.

NRC Buys Master

ATLANTA — National Recording Corporation last week announced the acquisition of one master from the Deb Label in Lubbock, Texas—"Johnny Goodluck" by Jim Solley and the Lubocs. It was produced by Norman Petty in Clovis, New Mexico, who owns publishing rights to both sides. An undisclosed amount of money was paid for this master which was transferred to the N.R.C. label, and shipped nationally last week.

In addition, the National Recording Corporation secured the exclusive distribution rights on the Rita Label, which currently has an active record in the South in "Mountain Of Love" by Harold Dorman. N.R.C.'s Bill Justis added violins to the original recording and it too is being shipped nationally to jocks and N.R.C. distributors.

The acquiring of these two masters is part of expanding activity that N.R.C. is now engaged in.

Columbia Appoints Adler

NEW YORK—The appointment of Peter Adler to the position of art director, sales promotion and trade advertising, for Columbia Records has been announced by Robert Cato, director of art and design.

Mr. Adler is a graduate of Cooper Union and the Brooklyn Museum Art School. He joined Columbia in November 1954 as a designer.

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ENGLAND

A new group of publishing houses opened this week—The Havard Music Company and The Mulberry Music Company are British and directed by Geoff Love, E.M.I. Orchestra Leader and the associate company Francon Music Ltd. will be the English outlet for **Connie Francis'** American company. The General Manager for the group is **Jim Kent** late of E.M.I. and Philips Record Companies. Current publications include "The Wedding Song", "18th Century Rock", "Trampolina", "Chapel of Dreams", "The Reason" and "Rockin' Already".

With "Summer Set" fast shooting up the British charts interest on both sides of Atlantic has been focused on the unique personality of clarinetist **Acker Bilk** and his **Paramount Jazz Band**. Issued here on the Columbia label competition for the American release has been keen resulting in a deal with Atlantic. "Summer Set" published by Essex Music also entered the British sheet music best sellers five days after publication. During an interview, **Denis Preston** of Record Supervision, in whose studios all Bilk material is recorded, told **The Cash Box** that only two years ago—in 1958—the band almost disbanded from lack of recognition. Fortunately agent, **Lyn Dutton**, intervened and under his aegis Acker Bilk and The Paramount Jazz Band have become one of this country's biggest draws. Shortly after joining Dutton they recorded their first L.P. for Pye "Mr. Acker Bilk Requests"—encouraged by a sell out of the first

pressings within five days of release—two E.P.'s quickly followed "Mr. Acker Bilk Marches On" and "Mr. Acker Bilk Sings". Pye have now released an L.P. "The Mr. Acker Bilk Omnibus" comprising twelve titles from the original recordings.

In the Lansdowne Jazz series recorded by Record Supervision and issued by Columbia have been "The Noble Art of Mr. Acker Bilk", "Acker's Away" and "The Seven Ages of Acker". Original publicity has played an important part in building up the Acker Bilk legend. The bowler hats, rounded collars, striped Edwardian waistcoats and bootlace ties worn by Bilk and members of his band are now an integral part of the act.

Two new L.P.'s are planned in the near future—one to be titled "The Golden Treasury of Bilk" which will also be released here on Columbia and Atlantic in the States. Meanwhile a notable British book publisher is planning a series of childrens' stories with Acker Bilk as the central character. To coincide with this Columbia plan to release a series of Bilk recordings for children.

The latest British musical to reach London's West End is "Fings Aint Wot They Used T'be". The story, based on life in this city's cosmopolitan Soho, is written by **Frank Norman** with music and lyrics by **Lionel Bart**—composer of the recent success "Lock Up Your Daughters" soon to be seen in New York. The music is published by the Peter Maurice Publishing Company where General Manager, **Bill Phillips**, told **The Cash Box** that many recordings are soon to be released. Decca will release the original cast L.P. recording on the 27th of this month and also a single by **Max Bygraves** of the title song. From **Norman Newell**, E.M.I.'s A & R man comes news of an all-star L.P. disk of the show featuring E.M.I. artists **Bruce Forsyth**, **Marion Ryan**, **Alfred Marks**, **Alfie Bass**, **Adam Faith**, **Harry Fowler** and **Rita Williams**. **Russ Conway** is to wax a piano selection of the show's highlights for Columbia.

Bill Phillips also handles the music from the hit show currently packing the Pigalle nitery entitled "Harlem Heatwave" by well-known American song writer **Benny Davis**. E.M.I. plan an original cast L.P. of this show featuring the stars **Maurie Leighton** and **Jack Hammer**.

Jimmy Phillips, Director of Peter Maurice told **The Cash Box** that he is delighted to have acquired the sensational French song "Mon Coeur Est Un Violon" ("Love Is Like A Violin") to be recorded on Philips by French star **Dario Moreno** and on Fontana by **Carmita**. Decca is putting out two instrumentals of the number by **Stanley Black** and **Frank Chacksfield**.

Harry Castle, Export Manager of Pye Records is off on a short visit to Scandinavia at the end of the month for general discussions re the activities of Pye International in this area. Castle reports excellent progress by the Pye label in Australia—and has arranged the release of the company's No. 1 disk "What Do You Want To Make Those Eyes At Me For" by **Emile Ford** in Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Germany, Italy, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and Trinidad. Pye A & R manager **Alan Freeman** will appear on the panel of the BBC TV show "Juke Box Jury" on February 27th.

Sidney Bernstein, Chairman of Granada Group of Theatres and TV is now in New York on his annual visit—accompanied by **Johnny Hamp**, the company's Booking Manager.

Met **Mark Murphy**, young American jazz singer at a party given by E.M.I. to welcome him to London. Mark will appear on ATV's "Music Shop" and in cabaret at London's Astor Club on February 15th for two weeks. His L.P. "This Could Be The Start of Something" is released here on Capitol.

Cliff Richard will interrupt his successful American tour for a 48-hour London visit to appear in "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" on February 21st. On his return from the States Cliff will open his own publishing company Eugene Music, in co-operation with Leeds Music. The Leeds London Manager, **Cyril Simons**, told **The Cash Box** that the American Directors of Eugene Music will be **Lou Levy** and **Sal Chiantia**.

Young British singer **Matt Monro**, accompanied by Band leader **Johnny Gray**, will be in New York on March 2nd and 3rd. After visiting Texas, Matt will return to New York for about three weeks. Matt, who records for Parlophone, is responsible for the lifelike imitation of **Frank Sinatra** which intros the latest Peter Sellers L.P. "Songs For Swingin' Sellers".

Pat Boone, paying a flying visit to London, this week tops the bill of "Sunday Night At The London Palladium." Pat's latest disk "Beyond The Sunset" backed with "The Faithful Heart" is released here on London. His book "Twixt Twelve and Twenty" is also a best seller in this country.

An R.C.A. release certain of making the charts is the **Perry Como** "Delaware" which was featured in BBC TV "The Perry Como Show" this week. From Capitol comes the latest Nat 'King' Cole release "Time And The River". The disk is backed with "Watcha Gonna Do" currently shooting up **The Cash Box Top 100**.

Another fast climbing American hit, "Handy Man" by **Jimmy Jones**, is released here on M.G.M. Ella Fitzgerald's exciting treatment of the 1940 hit "Beat Me Daddy Eight To The Bar" is released here on H.M.V. The same label also releases the original **Frankie Avalon** recording of "Why"—Anthony Newley's version on Decca is still topping the British charts.

Highlight of this week's Columbia releases—a disk by **The John Barry Seven Plus Four** "Hit and Miss"—another of John Barry's own compositions. A special addition to this week's Columbia releases is "A Theme From A Summer Place"—British version by **Norrie Paramor** and his Orchestra, currently No. 6 and likely to rise even higher in **The Cash Box Top 100**. The fabulous cabaret star **Edith Piaf** makes a welcome return to disk with a wonderful number "Milord" backed with "Je Sais Comment" also on Columbia.

David Macbeth whose first disk for Pye "Mr. Blue" made the British charts has followed it up with a romantic ballad "Tell Her For Me" backed with a beat number "Livin' Dangerously". On Pye International **Jane Harvey**, one time vocalist with the **Benny Goodman** Orchestra, makes a come-back with "I'm Gonna Go Fishin'" with **Peggy Lee's** lyrics set to **Duke Ellington's** music—the theme from the film "Anatomy of Murder"—with orchestra directed by **Don Elliott**. Another release of Pye International is the delightful single of the oldie "I'll Build a Stairway to Paradise" backed with "No-one Understands" by a talented singer from Boston, Massachusetts **Pat O'Day**.

Congratulations to British Orchestra Leader **Frank Chacksfield** whose Decca recording of "On The Beach"—title theme from the film—has now entered **The Cash Box Top 100** chart. Frank has already established an international reputation and will be remembered in the States for his successful No. 1 recording of "Ebb Tide" and "Limelight". Incidentally, both "Ebb Tide" and "Limelight" show up again in an L.P. "Big Hits Of Yesterday" by Fontana Records' M.D. **Johnny Gregory** for American release on the

EUROVISION SONG FESTIVAL 1960

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ITALY

Krikor Mintangian, President of Durium, whom I asked about the last San Remo Festival, has made the following statement: "The elimination of festivals is advisable, as it would make the standard and quality of Italian light music better and certain opportunities of pressure would be avoided".

The Italian best selling chart shows that almost all of the San Remo Festival disks were on top this week. The winning, "Romantica" by Dallara holds the number 1 spot, while the sales of "Romantica" sung by Rascel are decreasing. "Libero" by Modugno is also decreasing and at the same time "Licero" by Peppino Di Capri (Carisch) is starting to sell well, though it does not yet appear in the Top Ten. Number 2 and Number 7 are, "Quando Viene La Sera" and "E' Mezzanotte", the two tunes which were sung by Joe Sentieri (Juke Box) at the last Festival where he obtained personal success, is evidence of the fact that the above mentioned tunes are hitting. Another singer has two successful disks on the Italian chart. Dallara, with "Romantica" and number 9, "Noi". The San Remo Festival offered Dallara the main chance of conquering the public. The appearance of "Eri Piccola" by Buscaglione, Cetra, on the chart this week was due to his death. This week all the disks by Buscaglione were selling very well.

This week I visited His Master's Voice-Columbia-Marconiphone. Two singers of this house were asked to sing at San Remo. Sergio Bruni, who sang "Il Mare", a tune written just for him, and "E' Mezzanotte" also singer Julia De Palma, who presented "Noi" and "Notte Mia". The tune "Il Mare" is now hitting in Italy's best sellers and sells principally in Southern Italy. In fact, Sergio Bruni is currently the favorite Neapolitan songster. During the annual Festival in Naples, he has dominated and will also participate in the next one. Sergio Bruni has already had the opportunity to sing at Carnegie Hall in New York.

Visited Mascotte and Cielo-Girl publishing houses' Director, Maestro Eros Sciorilli, who informed me that the tune "Il Tuo Bacio E' Come Un Rock" penned by the well known Italian singer, Adriano Celentano, will now be launched in England, France, Germany, Belgium and Holland by local publishing houses. The disk sung by the author himself was recently a hit in Italy. It is published in Italy by Mascotte. Another tune by Mascotte is already distributed all over the world by local houses and in the United States it is published by Shapiro Bernstein & Co. Inc., New York.

When Sy Leslie, President of Pickwick Sales Corp. came to Milan, he met Mario Panvini (Meazzi) and offered him the exclusive distribution of the Design Records label. Panvini has already started promoting the sale of Design disks.

G. Ricordi has proudly announced the opening of its new factory and of two new elegant record shops. Now there are two Ricordi record shops in Milan, one in Genoa, two in Rome, one in Naples and one in Palermo. They are all among the best ones and represent the most important record chain stores in Italy.

Famous German violin player, Helmut Zacharias appeared on Italian television screens during the "Musichiere" show. He played the three San Remo Festival winning tunes. He also attended the last Festival.

Received a copy of "E' Vero" penned by Umberto Bindi and sung by the author himself. The version presented by Mina at San Remo is Number 5 on the Italian chart. Bindi is a young composer and singer, up to now more successful as a composer than as a singer. Already very well known in Italy, he is Ricordi's top artist. His "Arrivederci" was sung by Don Marino Barreto, Jr., Philips, and the disk represents one of the last biggest best sellers of Italian derivation.

Columbia label. The album will be released here shortly.

Latest acquisition by Fontana is Ivo (Morgen) Robic whose first release on the label is "The Happy Muleteer" backed by "Rhondaly". Another version of "The Happy Muleteer" backed with "Oh So Wunderbar" by Mike Desmond is released on the Top Rank label. Top Rank also released this week a disk by Garry Mills featuring The Cash Box Top 100 No. 1 and No. 2 hits "Teen Angel" backed with "Running Bear". Original versions from the American Hit Parade issued here by Top Rank include "Tell Her For Me" by Adam Wade and "Time After Time" by Frankie Ford.

Johnny Horton has disked "Sink The Bismark" for the Philips label. Johnny wrote the number for the 20th Century Fox film of the same name which was premiered in London this week. The Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "The Flower Drum Song" opens in London at The Palace Theatre on March 24th. Philips will release the original cast L.P. shortly but two singles are released this week, one by Doris Day "I Enjoy Being a Girl" and the other "Love Look Away" by Tony Bennett. A selection from the show by Cyril Ornadel and the Starlight Symphony Orchestra is also released here on the M.G.M. label.

The United States Top Twenty hit "Tracy's Theme" is the title chosen by Decca to introduce the newly formed M.J.6. (Modern Jazz Sextet) led by accordionist Stan Tracy. Two of the tracks "Baby Blue" and "Private Eye" are Tracy's own compositions. By night the M.J.6. play at London's Flamingo Club.

Another hit from The Cash Box charts "Bonnie Came Back" by Duane Eddy is released here on London. Eddie's latest L.P. "The Twang's The Thing" on London is due for release here in March to coincide with his visit to this country.

Maureen Evans, bright young star of Oriole Records has just waxed her third disk for the label "Love, Kisses and Heartaches" is coupled with the oldie "We Just Couldn't Say Goodbye". Backing by Ken Jones and his Orchestra.



GERMANY

Last week Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft published its spring time program for Germany. This is an LP program which on the whole includes 28 LP's. Among them are some American firms, too, who are represented by the Deutsche Grammophon in Germany. On Decca is Earl Grant's "Nothing But The Blues". Earl, with his record "The End" had won many friends in Germany and this record continually sells very well.

Because the German people are very interested in old jazz tunes, Brunswick recorded a new arrangement by Ella Fitzgerald, titled "Ella And Chick Webb". Also the "Porgy And Bess" LP recorded by Sammy Davis, Jr. and Carmen McRae on Decca is important. Davis will visit Germany this year. MGM recorded "Harry James And His New Swinging Band", "Gigi" and "An American In Paris". Since there is a big interest in Germany in original Broadway casts, the Deutsche Grammophon on Brunswick released "Oklahoma" and "The King And I". Decca published "Sea-Shells" with Peggy Lee to try to make mood music more popular in Germany, for up to now this type of music has not been very successful here.

There is a good market here for American ballroom music, and Philips has released a record by the Lester Lanin Orchestra. Polydor, from the Decca repertoire, released Howard Lanmen and his Orchestra platter which is already selling very well. New on the German market are three hot singles out of MGM's American hit parade, "Teen Angel" by Mark Dinning, "Handy Man" by Jimmy Jones, and "Lonely Blue Boy" by Conway Twitty. Twitty had great success with "Mona Lisa" in Germany. The latest record of Heliodor from the Cadence repertoire is the Everly Brothers "Let It Be Me". It is becoming very popular here.

The three best selling records from the Teldec repertoire are, 1—"Red River Rock" (in both versions—American and German), 2—"Mr. Blue" with Detlef Engel, and 3—"Die Zeit Kommt Wieder" (Time Will Return) sung by Wyn Hoop and The Fellows. From the American program, "My Cucuzze" with Louis Prima, "There Is Still Time, Brother" with Bill Courtney, and "He'll Have To Go" with Jim Reeves.

Important on the German market is a new record with Vico Torriani, titled "Un Bacio In Sorrento". After her successful, "Sweetheart, My Darling", Vera Lynn now sings, "Sogno D'Oro" and "Gruu War Der Tag". Lys Assia recorded the old song, "Einsamer Sonntag" (Lonely Sunday). On Telefunken a new singer from Italy, Angelina Monti, out with her first titles, "Amigo Mio" and "Junge Liebe" (Young Love).

As written before, the first decision for the "Grand Prix De Eurovision" came off in Wiesbaden. Here are the decisions of a jury which included thirty members. First prize was won by Wyn Hoop with the song, "Bonne Nuit, Ma Cherie", composed by Josef Breuer. Wyn Hoop will represent Germany in London on March 23rd. Wyn, who comes from Holland, up to now unknown in Germany, was a member of the group called The Fellows and as a soloist had recorded only a few songs. Second prize was won by very successful young film star Heidi Bruhl with "Wir Wollen Niemals Auseinandergehen" (We'll Never Say Goodbye), composed by Michael Jary, who had many hits in the past few years. Third prize was won by Gerhard Wendland with "Alle Wunder Der Welt" (All Miracles Of The World) composed by Gerhard Winkler.

Nearly forty records with music from the Carnival in Cologne are issued by Electrola.

On April 10th, The Oscar Peterson Trio, The Stan Getz Quartet and The Miles Davis Quintet will visit Belgium.

On Saturday, February 20th, there will be a great show called Nacht Der Vedetten in The Ghent Wintervelodroom, with the Venezuelan conductor Benny Bennet and singers Lucille Mapp and Cecily Forde. Belgium singers Myriam Powell, Louis Neefs, Dan Ellery and Benny Evert will also be present that evening.

Kay Starr, one of the singers whom we haven't heard from for a few years, is making her come-back in Benelux with her revival of the Vaughn Monroe hit, "Ghost Riders In The Sky" on Capitol.

Cabaret artist Wim Sonneveld will finish his Dutch version of the popular show "My Fair Lady" in August of 1960.

A new sound among the vocal groups in Belgium are The Four Pandoeren. They are four people who sing two tangos on the Barclay label called, "De Rare Tango" and "Clara, Clara", sung in the style of the American tango, "Hernando's Hideaway".

The Fontana label released a record in Benelux with famous scout songs called, "Weest Paraat", sung by The Welpenkor Van Neerpelt and the Sijersekijns, and conducted by Harry Vermeulen. They are very enthusiastic interpretations.

Bobbejaan Schoepen has sung his new record, "Hutje Op De Heide" and "Schaduw Van de Mijn" on Decca in Belgium. People think the record will become a very good one, especially because Bobbejaan has had success after success this past year.

Societe Nouvelle Siemens Belgium phoned The Cash Box for the five best selling records for the last two weeks, and they were, 1—"Ne Joue Pas" by Colette Dereal; 2—"Morgen" by Ivo Robic; 3—"Unter Fremden Sternen" by Freddy; 4—"Uncle Satchmo's Lullaby" by Louis Armstrong & Gabriele; 5—"Die Gitarre Und Das Meer" by Freddy.

Last week singer Joni James visited Holland and sang the Dutch version of the famous song, "Music, Maestro, Please" on a live broadcast for VARA, one of the five Dutch Broadcasting companies. The American MGM Record Company will listen to the recording of the song and then will decide if the record will be released in Benelux or not. G. M. Oord, director of L. C. Bovema, explained during the press cocktail party in the town of Hilversum, that soon other MGM artists such as Connie Francis, and Conway Twitty will visit Holland.

On April 4th, the Miss Amsterdam Election will take place in Holland. L. C. Phonogram will take care of the program during this election.

The third Dutch song recorded by Caterina Valente, "Er Is Geen Dag" and "Adonis" has just been released on the Decca label, by L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam. Insiders expect that this third Dutch Valente record will surpass the success of "Sweetheart, My Darling, Mijn Schat", for which recording Caterina Valente received the golden disk. As we wrote before, Caterina is a much beloved singer in the Benelux countries. Critics in our area say that her voice is most beautiful.

On the London label, managed by L. C. Phonogram, Holland, The Coasters' hit of "Run, Red, Run" and a new success of Neil Sedaka, "Fly Don't Fly On Me" has just appeared.

The London LP album "The Five Pennies" is called by the national Dutch paper, "Het Algemeen Dagblad", "The Record Of The Year".

The winning songs of the San Remo-Song Festival "Romantica" and "Libero" are released by L. C. Phonogram on a Philips single. Willy Alberti sings the numbers and the record has just appeared in Holland.

The song festivals are in the air. The Eurovision Song Festival is one of these festivals in Europe. The Dutch final for this festival was on February 9th in Hilversum and at that election the Dutch representative for the London Eurovision Song Festival on March 29th was chosen. The songs which the Dutch singers sang were, 1—"Caroussel" by Marcel Thielemans; 2—"Adio" by Betty Luske; 3—"Niet Voor Mij" by Greetje Kauffeld; 4—"In Mijn Hart" by Herman Emmink; 5—"Regenkapje" by Karel v.d. Velden; 6—"Wat Een Geluk" by Annie Palmén; 7—"Vanavond Ga Ik Uit" by Jaap Dubbelboer; 8—"Ik Leef" by Wim v.d. Beek; 9—"Vanavond Ga Ik Uit" by Joop Smits; 10—"In Mijn Hart" by Jan v.d. Most; 11—"Regenkapje" by Rita Huyskens; 12—"Adio" by Tony van Hulst; 13—"Niet Voor Mij" by Piet Sybrandy; 14—"Ik Leef" by Jany Bron; 14—"Caroussel" by John De Mol; 16—"Wat Een Geluk" by Rudi Carrell. The orchestras were, The Metropole Orchestra, conducted by Dolf v.d. Linden & Eddy The Young and his Ensemble. The winning song of the evening was, "Wat Een Geluk", sung by Rudi Carrell. Composers of the song were Willy van Hernet & Dick Schallies, who also were the composers of the winning song of last year, "Een Beetje". The program was on Dutch television and radio on AVRO. Rudi Carrell is the representative for Holland at the International Eurovision Song Festival in London on March 29th, 1960. This week the records with the songs of the Festival will be available at all Dutch record shops.

Jan H. Leyendekker, for five years publicity manager for C. N. Rood L. C., Rijswijk, Holland, will leave this company on April 1st. He will be with VARA Television and will be producer-stage manager.

Hans Kellerman, one of the directors of L. C. Delahay Record Company, thinks that the Top Rank label conquers the market more and more in Benelux. Among others, that label has many hits which meet with a wide response by teenagers. Big stars are singing on Top Rank, such as Freddy Cannon, Bobby Rydell, etc. Kellerman has good hopes for the future with this label.

The popular radio program of disk jockey Co de Kloet, "Tijd Voor 10-agers", which can be heard every Friday in the afternoon on the VARA Broadcasting Corporation, has won the first place in the polls of the Dutch music magazines in the category, "The Most Listened To Radio Program Of The Year". In one hour Mr. de Kloet presents the American, English, German and Dutch hit parade, especially rock and roll.



SCANDINAVIA

There are 102 record labels at the Danish market, being handled by 17 different companies, according to latest statistical figures published.

On a quick march to the top in the Danish Hit Parade is the Swedish song "Ar du Kär i mej ännu, Klas-Göran?", in Danish known as "Klaus Jorgen". Sonet reports a sale of more than 25,000 records in three weeks with Grethe Sonck, who introduced the number in a TV-program which saw her singing the number while milking a cow.

The Danish government has raised the customs on the import of records nearly 1300% compared with the present custom fees. The record importers are working hard to get the government to change this policy, but the possibilities of success is described as very small.

The song competition for a Danish contribution to this year's Euro-vision Song Festival in London at the end of March, has created less interest this year than in 1959, it is reported. Only 248 songs were sent in to the Danish Radio-TV, against about twice as many last year. The reason is attributed to the fact that last year's competition got a "bad reputation". One of the singers who appeared in the program was said to have sent in two songs of her own, and the rumors also say that one of the judges in the competition had contributed a couple of numbers. However, in order to avoid any scandal in connection with this year's competition, the Radio-TV officials are most rigorous. Everybody working with the songs (making arrangements, etc) are doing their jobs in the Radio house, and nobody is allowed to take any of the songs out of the Radio Building until after the competition. The final competition will take place in a TV-program on March 6th.

Number one on Norway's Hit Parade now is "What Do You Want to Make Those Eyes at Me For" recorded in Britain by Emile Ford and released in Scandinavia by Metronome. The song is also on its way up in Sweden, and has been picked as "tomorrow's hit" in Denmark.

Papa Bue's Viking Jazzband, one of the top Danish jazzbands, left for a concert tour in England starting February 3rd. After their British tour they will go to Germany.

Nat "King" Cole to Copenhagen for concerts in the KB.-Hallén on April 21st.

Dansk Jazz Union (Danish Jazz Union) has broken up after three years of existence. The reason is claimed to be lack of money and certain other things of dubious character. Danish police now investigates reports from a jazz club meeting where it is said alcohol was served to teenagers.

A new organization, known as GRAM has been established by record companies in Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Holland, Belgium and Italy as reported previously in several of our columns. The Organization GRAM means Global Records Association and Manufacturers.

AUSTRALIA

News has just been received to the effect that the Lee Gordon packaged show scheduled to arrive on the 18th February has been postponed owing to the illness of its star **Bobby Darin**. Others who were due to appear on the me bill were **Neil Sedaka**, **The Diamonds** and **Bill Haley & The Comets**. The Diamonds are already here as they stayed from the last show. The postponement has been quite a blow to Australian pop music lovers who have been looking forward to once again seeing the world's hottest record star in action. We wish Darin a speedy recovery from his illness and hope that he will be able to make the trip in the near future.

Lee Gordon's office had set in motion a plan for Darin to present the cord industry awards on which a poll is being conducted among disk-jockeys, press, radio and TV program organizers. These are the first such Australian awards to be planned on a national basis.

Johnny O'Keefe's single of "She's My Baby" is leaping to the top of sales charts throughout the nation. If the Liberty people can get a similar reaction in the United States, they may have a tremendous seller first-up from O'Keefe. We wish Johnny O'Keefe and Liberty well with the first big attack on the American market by an Australian artist.

Rex Records (The Voice of Australia) is the new label that the Festival group has introduced and reserved for the release of their material devoted to Australian talent. Distributors of the Rex catalogue will remain with existing Festival agents and representatives. First batch of Rex records—containing one 12" album, three EPs and three singles—is slated for release on 18th February. This move by Festival to switch their strong roster of Australian talent to the new Rex label could be an attempt to exclusively identify the Festival label with material issued here from the American Decca group of companies.

Lee Gordon's scheduled March show contains top recording artists **Rod Lauren**, **Johnny & The Hurricanes**, **Mark Dinning**, **Johnny Preston**, **Dion & The Belmonts**, **Dick Caruso**, **Freddy Cannon**, **Marv Johnson**, **Jack Scott**, **Jerry Lewis**, **Jimmy Clanton**, **Chan Romero** and possibly **Neil Sedaka**. This set to begin mid-March and with a line-up like that, capacity box-office business should be the result.

With consumer response to stereophonic records gaining ground rapidly, major record companies are now making simultaneous releases of albums in both monophonic and stereophonic forms. In order to further boost the advantages of stereo, many leading retailers are conducting demonstration sessions of stereo disks and playback gear for potential record buyers.

All record companies here are delighted about the progressive scheme devised by radio station **WWOL**, (Buffalo, N.Y.) whereby Australian produced disks that reach hit proportions here will be broadcast in special programs from **WWOL**. **Arnold Johnson** of **WWOL** is the toast of the disk industry here following his outlining such a wonderful series of programs. Results of these sessions are sure to be closely watched by Australian record companies, who are naturally keen to have their local hits made available for American consumption. This action by **WWOL** will help to bring the international record trades much closer together.

England's **Tommy Steele** is in Melbourne—with **The Steelmen**—for his season with the **Tivoli Theatre** circuit. This show is something of a departure from the general format of shows brought to this country to play the **Tivoli** theatres. For the first time in ages the **Tivoli** will run two shows nightly while **Steele** is here.

After many months of negotiation, **Allan & Company**—a major publishing house—has given the green light to record companies to issue disks of the tie music from the TV series "77 Sunset Strip". Permission however was not extended to release disks of "Kookie Kookie Lend Me Your Comb".

Pye Records, who has been in operation here for only a few months, is having a fair amount of success with its hit singles of English origin. They broke through solidly with **Lonnie Donegan's** "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose Its Flavor?" then followed up with "What Do You Want To Make Those Eyes At Me For" by **Emile Ford**. The latest single starting to make some noise is the original version of England's big hit "What Do You Want" by **Raig Douglas**.

New Zealand

A tour of NZ under the **Kerridge-Odeon** banner looks set for the **Dave Rubick Quartet** in March according to latest reports to hand.

The **Pye** dinking of "Gidget" by **Jimmy Darren** looks as though it could break through and be really big here.

Radio personality **Phil Shone** held the final of his big talent quest at **Weston Springs Stadium** late last month drawing a crowd of over 8,000 people. **Ahu Pineaha** appeared as a guest artist on the show. A group calling themselves the **Red River Rockers** from **Rotorua** featuring a little Maori lad of 11 on trumpet won the quest and nearly 300 dollars in cash. Judges were **Wynne Shepherd**, **Benny Levin** and record man **Philip Warren**.

Two new labels have appeared on the market. 'LaGloria' and 'Lotus', the latter are stationed in **Wellington**, the former in **Auckland**. They apparently tend to specialise in local material.

The **Top Rank** dinking by **Freddy Cannon** of "Way Down Yonder In New Orleans" has set up a possible speed record for a single to get into the best selling lists. 5,000 copies of the record had been despatched after 10 days of release. **Top Rank** is immediately issuing Cannon's "Chattanooga Shoe Shine Boy" as well as another Cannon single made from his **Swan 12" LP**, "California In The Morning" c/w "Indiana".

It is rumoured that the **World Record Club** will be operating in this country shortly.

Italian Radio-TV Promotes Talent-Tunes Exchange

Among the latter, **RAI** will include programs of a lighter and more popular vein, such as folk songs and hit tunes.

Padovano has been working in the field of international radio since 1942, having been associated with the **Crosley Corp.**, **NBC** and **Voice of America**.

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EMI Board Chairman In U.S.

HOLLYWOOD — Sir Joseph Lockwood, chairman of the Board of England's Electric & Musical Industries Ltd. (EMI), parent company of Capitol Records, arrived here last week (17) from London on the first leg of an extended business tour of North and South America.

Knighthood was conferred on the British industrialist in Queen Elizabeth II's New Year's Honours List and was invested earlier this month by Prince Philip.

Sir Joseph was honored guest at a luncheon at the Beverly Hills Hotel (18), which was attended by some 125 Capitol officers and executives. Sir Joseph leaves Hollywood Feb. 23 for New York City.

He will be honored this week (26) at a reception in the Louis XVI Suite of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel. The reception, hosted by Glenn E. Wallichs, president of Capitol Records, will be attended by several hundred business leaders, publishers, editors, and top executives of the radio and television networks and other recording companies.

Sir Joseph will leave New York by air on Feb. 28 for Buenos Aires, Argentina, the first stop on a month-long tour of South America.

Also in the Capitol Tower last week were: E. G. Hurst, EMI's general manager, international marketing and administration; and P. F. Gardiner-Hill, international commercial and repertoire manager. Both men, members of EMI's international classical repertoire committee (Hurst is chairman, Gardiner-Hill secretary), met with Capitol A&R vice president Lloyd W. Dunn to discuss plans for the coordination of international classical recording activities among EMI's associated firms.

Joni Returns



NEW YORK—Joni James and husband, conductor Tony Acquaviva, snapped upon arrival at Idlewild Airport returning from an eight week European junket.

The MGM recording star had a heavy schedule of personal appearances, recording sessions and promotion work, stopping in London, Paris, Berlin, Rome, Milan, Brussels, Hamburg, Amsterdam and Luxembourg.

While abroad, Miss James cut sixty sides which will make up five new MGM albums. All used 100 string backing and one album will also feature a 100 voice choir.

Among the incidents proving Miss James' immense popularity in Europe was the singer being chosen by the committee of the San Remo Festival to record the award winning Italian song of the year, the first American to be so honored; and while in London, a delegation of Indian recording brass from New Delhi flew in to meet her and present her with a gift of six saris.

Final Heat Determines British Entry In Eurovision Fest

LONDON — The final British heat of The Eurovision Song Festival of 1960 took place recently at one of the BBC TV theatres when seven semi-finalists competed for the honour of representing Great Britain at The European Finals scheduled for March 29 at London's Festival Hall.

The winning entry was "Looking High, High, High" written by John Watson and sung by Bryan Johnson backed by The George Mitchell Singers. The song is published by Robbins Music which also publishes the second prize winner, "Mi Amor," composed by Harry Rabinowitz with lyrics by Fred Lydiate. Trophies were presented to the winning composer, artist and publisher by Eric Maschwitz, BBC-TV light entertainment chief. The composer also received a cash award of £100 presented by The British Song Writers Guild. After the event John Watson who, by profession, is a French Language Master at a private school in Berkshire, told The Cash Box that he had been writing songs for many years and so far about five had been published, notably "What Am I Gonna Do Ma" in 1954 recorded by Alma Cogan and pub-

lished by Keith Prowse.

In 1956 while visiting London, Harold S. Richmond of Essex Music America, acquired one of his number "Those Who Have Loved" which was recorded in the states by Kay Cars on the Capitol label. One of the tracks from the new Diana Dors LP on E (also released as a single), "Ap Heart," was written by Watson three years ago.

Watson expressed his appreciation of the help and co-operation extended to him over the years by Allan Holm of Robbins Music and is, therefore, doubly happy that he is the publisher of the winning song. Holmes described "Looking High, High, High" as a G Mitchell type of number and has received a call from Mickey Scopp, vice president of Robbins Music in New York, requesting copies of the disks and plans "large scale" American promotion. Bryan Johnson has this week recorded the winning song for December which will be released in the states on London. David Hughes is to record "Mi Amor" backed with "Looki High, High, High" on the Top Ram label. Disks of the winning song are also planned by other major labels.

Finnish Jazz Fans Here To Listen

NEW YORK—A group of Finnish jazz fans—including musicians—arrived here last week (15) for a two-week stay in the city to listen to "as much jazz as possible." The Finnish Jazz Society chartered a plane for the trip. Since the war, Finnish jazz fans and musicians—who rarely get visits by U.S. jazzists—have chartered planes to Stockholm to see U.S. performers.

Among those on the trip are: bandleaders Erik Lindstrom and Onni Gideon; Paavo Einio, editor of the Finnish jazz magazine, Rytmi; Hans Westerberg, former secretary of the Finnish Jazzclubs Federation, and now divisional manager for a company that serves as the Finnish representative of Capitol and Mercury Records; Rock Jerry, a Finnish teen artist.

Welk LP's Move In Dot Promos

NEW YORK—Lawrence Welk, who with a total of 10 Dot albums reportedly did more than \$200,000 worth of business during the label's Nov. 15-Dec. 15 "Lawrence Welk Month", has come through again with another \$100,000 in sales of stereo LPs, alone, during the label's "January Stereo Month" merchandising program, it was announced.

Welk recently bowed with his eleventh Dot Records LP, "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles", and his twelfth, "Strictly For Dancing," already is on Dot planning boards and should be released during the next few weeks.

London Records Honored By Vienna Philharmonic

NEW YORK—The Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra has awarded London Records its Nicolai Medal. The award—previously only given to music artists and orchestras—represents the first time a commercial concern has been so honored.

The Viennese musicians present the medal in recognition of London's "outstanding achievement in the production of 'Das Rheingold,' conducted by Georg Solti and starring Kirsti Flagstad, George London, Set Svanholm, Jean Madeira and Kurt Boehm and Acts 1 and 2 of 'Die Walkure' conducted by Knappertsbusch and Solti, respectively and starring Kirsti Flagstad, Svanholm and Otto Edelmann.

London's recording crew, consisting of John Culshaw, Gordon Parry and Jimmy Brown, accepted the award for the company at the conclusion of an "Aida" recording session in Vienna. Professor Otto Strasser, president of Vienna Philharmonic, made the presentation.

The Nicolai Medal gets its name from composer Otto Nicolai, the founder of the Vienna Philharmonic.

Senate To Get Cabaret Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Senate Finance Committee last week approved a bill passed by the House cutting the 20% Federal cabaret tax to 10%. Although the committee acted without a record vote, a strong majority reportedly favored sending the bill to the Senate floor.

Fairchild Defends Compatible Stereo System

NEW YORK—The Fairchild Recording Equipment Corp. last week issued a statement defending its method of producing compatible stereo disks. Since the recent announcement by Design Records that it would market "Compatible Fidelity" disks—using the Fairchild system—statements have been made by engineers paragoning the true compatibility (or quality) of such disks.

"We feel," the statement said, "that the term 'compatible' can be applied to any record that contains ample information to reproduce the stereo illusion and which will produce a satisfactory monophonic sound from an artistic viewpoint and which can be played back with either a stereo cartridge or with the heavier monophonic cartridges presently used for LP's.

During the past few weeks many statements have been issued concerning the technique of the compatible record and as we have mentioned, the technique involved the use of a 100 cycles. As a company dedicated not only to professional equipment engineering but also to consumer fidelity products, a tremendous amount of research is given to all aspects of stereo recording and playback, and we feel that a maximum reduction of 3db in the extreme low of the frequency spectrum will

not degrade the overall stereo illusion.

"When considering what is called true stereo, we think the following facts should be carefully considered. Certainly the variety of original recording techniques employed in the recording industry today could be challenged by the purist or theorist as compromise stereo. The use of multiple microphone, three or more tracks of tape information to produce a commercial stereo impression could be challenged as compromise stereo. Yet, hearing is believing. In this case and in the large majority of cases the result is more than satisfactory artistically and is commercially successful from the final consumer point of view. In view of these facts, the Design Compatible . . . record then could be considered well within the realm of compatible stereo and just one of the many variations easily available. . . ."

In conclusion, the Fairchild statement said that "we are confident that other stereo cutters could be adapted to perform the same basic function. Of course in a field as new and exciting as stereo, continuing experimentation to produce a better universal product for the public is desirable and Fairchild will participate in any further impartial testing of the concept of the compatible record or any other system of improved stereo recording and reproduction."

RCA Victor Original Casts Bob Hope Documentary

NEW YORK—"Project 20—Not So Long Ago," the RCA Victor original album of the NBC-TV documentary starring Bob Hope, was released immediately following last week's telecast of the production.

In addition to containing Robert Bennett's musical score for the hour-long re-creation of the years 1915 to 1950, the album includes Hope's narration, a cross-section of most popular songs of the era, the voices of Babe Ruth, Fiorello LaGuardia, Albert Einstein, Gary Cooper, Harry S. Truman, Whittaker Chambers and President Eisenhower, among others.

Project 20—Not So Long Ago," in the Project 20 series of documentaries by NBC-TV, was designed as a portrait of the "Peace . . . It's Wonderful" era between VJ Day and the start of hostilities in Korea. Hope is chosen as narrator following a month search for an "unconventional" speaker who could keep the lead of the documentary light, yet social and historic perspective.

Among the highlights covered in the show and the RCA Victor album are the coming of jets and flying saucers, wonder drugs and Bikini bathing suits, the rise of television and the growth of the record industry, and such historic landmarks as the Truman-Dewey campaign in 1948, Winston Churchill's "iron curtain" speech at Fulton, Mo., and Fiorello LaGuardia reading the comics during a New York newspaper strike.

Presley's Return Viewed

NEW YORK—Elvis Presley's Army career is drawing to a close and the weeks' ahead will find the consumer press devoting much space (and theory) on the teen sensation. Typical of the front-page value of Presley's return is a current series on Presley's "homecoming plans" in the New York World Telegram.

As one might suspect, coverage of Presley will center around the effects of two years in service and—in many cases—his adaptation to the changes that have taken place in popular music. Well, Fred Sparks, writer of the World-Telegram series, notes that Presley has ambitions of becoming a serious actor and feels he can go along with any popular music trend ("But ah cain't sing!", "Why cain't ah sing other ways?" are quotes Sparks attributes to Presley).

Intensive Disk History Tome

NEW YORK—"From Tin Foil To Stereo" (Howard W. Sams; \$9.95) is the name of a new volume just published that traces the "evolution of the phonograph," including disks and tapes. The detailed study contains twenty-nine chapters and photos. There is also a chapter on the "coin-slot" phonograph industry.

Writers of the book are Oliver Read, publisher of Hi-Fi Review, and Walter Welch, since 1950 a member of the faculty of the State University of New York College of Forestry, in the department of Landscape Architecture, at Syracuse University. Photographs and records have been Welch's lifetime hobby.

Pearce Named National Sales Manager Of World Pacific

HOLLYWOOD—Jack Pearce has been appointed national sales manager of World Pacific Records, the diskery's president, Richard Bock, announced last week. Pearce was formerly sales manager for Kennedy Outdoor Advertising.

Pearce leaves March 15 for a national sales tour to confer with all of WP's national distributors. At that time, he will introduce the new re-activated Pacific Jazz line which began the diskery in 1952. The first release will feature an LP by former Sonny Rollins' drummer Lenny McBrowne and the 4 Souls. Also included packaged by pianist Les McCann featuring Leroy Vinnegar and a re-issue album by the late Clifford Brown.

A key package in WPR's new sales promotion will be a two-package sampler, "World Pacific Swingin' Like '60," covering the label's entire artist roster, designed for both the radio stations for programming and in stores at a special discount price of \$4.98 for the two-packet set. A new mobile sales promotion kit will be offered to qualified dealers as part of the new sales and merchandising effort.

On March 1, the WP organization moves its offices to 8715 West Third Street in the Rex Productions' building where it will have complete recording facilities. Bock announced plans to record singer Gloria Smyth as the first artist to use the new studios. Future sessions scheduled will be new pacted artist, Don Randi and his Trio; tenor saxist Teddy Edwards; an album by singer Annie Ross; an album by the new Bud Shank Quintet with Art Pepper; Med Flory and the Sax Maniacs featuring Joe Mani and an album by Japanese Koto master, Kimio Eto featuring Bud Shank on flute.

The label will continue to release on the World Pacific label music in all categories such as folk, foreign, pop and spoken word.

The March releases include Annie Ross with Zoot Sims, The Mastersounds playing the music of Horace Silver and Bud Shank with his flute and alto.

The semi-progressive jazz score composed by Del Sirino and William Sanford, incorporates the flavor of the jazz beat of the late 20's and early 30's. A shot of title-star John Ericson is being used for the cover illustration.

Audio Fidelity has planned an exclusive advertising and promotional campaign for the LP. Arrangements have been made with Continental Distributing Inc. (distributors of the flick) for national tie-ups between theatre exhibitors and record shops in connection with the flick's showing.

Bob Pare Dies

NEW YORK—Bob Pare, the owner of Portem Distributing here, died last week (16) at the age of 51. He is survived by his widow, Gladys, and a young son. Mrs. Pare is expected to run the firm for the time being.

WB All Out For Sommers

HOLLYWOOD—Warner Bros. Records is launching this month one of the most extensive promotion campaigns in its history for young (18) songstress Joanie Sommers. Promo is tied to Miss Sommers' first LP, "Positively The Most!"

In a statement issued by James B. Conkling, president of Warner Bros. Records, he stated that "Joannie Sommers is the most exciting singing discovery in the last 15 years . . ."

Keyed to the slogan "Sommers' Hot . . . Sommers' Here," the campaign includes nation-wide press and radio coverage, a specially prepared EP with selections culled from her album, which will be shipped to 1200 key disk jockeys along with personal notes from Joanie, in store promotion devices, and network television appearances.

Although Miss Sommers signed with WB over six months ago, the record company held off issuing her first LP until it was sure all promotional avenues were thoroughly covered.

During the past six months, the lark has made two guest appearances on "77 Sunset Strip," been matched with the Edd Byrnes single "Kookie's Love Song" as well as several tracks in his "Kookie" album, and been the featured vocalist on the company's "Behind Closed Doors At A Recording Session."

"We took special care in the recording of her debut album," states Conkling. "We recorded twice the number of songs necessary to insure that we had just what we wanted. Two arrangers, Marty Paich and Tommy Oliver, prepared backgrounds for the album. Additionally, over the past month we have been pre-recording several songs for her first solo single, making sure we have just the right 'sound' and approach."

"In today's fiercely competitive album and single record situation," Conkling concluded, "It's no longer possible just to put a new artist on the market and wait for something to happen. That's why Joannie Sommers is getting all this attention. Besides which, she deserves it."

The firm has acquired the sole selling rights to Dolly-R Publishing. Later's first release is "Wow-Ee Ginger" and "Oh What A Date" by Bobby Baker on the Jordan label.

Capitol Pacts 7-Teens Group

HOLLYWOOD—Bill Baldwin's 7-Teens, a group of seven musicians, mostly still in high school, have been signed to an exclusive contract by Capitol Records, it was announced last week by Lloyd W. Dunn, A&R vice-president.

The 7-Teens' first album—now being recorded under the supervision of A&R producer Fred Grimes—will be a salute to the big bands which were popular around the time the youthful musicians were born, two decades ago.

With the help of his father, Baldwin assembled his musicians from among the "most promising" in the Los Angeles area. Besides Baldwin, the bandmen are bass player Tony Goodman, 17; guitarist Barry Sweig, 17-year-old Paul Novros, clarinet and saxophone; Tony D'Anna, 18, piano; Jim Porter, 18, trumpet; and Bob Ronka, 17, trombone.

"THE BIG DANCE" (2:07) [Mercedes BMI—Phillips, Mitchell] Phillips captures the right teen feelings for this rafter-shaking hooper special. Loads of vocal and instrumental interest here for the kids.

"PATOOTIE PIE" (2:10) [Mercedes BMI—Phillips, Brinson] Infectious finger-snapping romancer has a strong resemblance to "Tweed-Dee". Also has teen spin value.

BOBBY MARCHAN (Fire 1014)

"THIS IS THE LIFE" (2:15) [Fire BMI—Marchan] Familiar rock-a-ballad is carved out with pro ease by Marchan, who gets excellent support from the Tick Tock's vocal group.

"SNOOPIN' AND ACCUSIN'" (2:01) [Fire BMI—Marchan] Wildly frantic rocker of the old r&b school is gleefully indulged in by all. Hey get a Coasters' sound here.

EVERLY ANN GIBSON (King 5315)

"NO OTHER BUT YOU" (2:35) [R-T BMI—Toombs, Shubert] Angstress cops a feelingful romantic tlet for her sincere stylings. Pounding beat ballad also features sock or'n wailing behind the thrush.

B "GET TO STEPPING" (2:33) [Bay Tone BMI—Taylor, Flames] Here they jump into a swinging up-beat opus that should keep the young hoofers happy. Bright vocal approach.

JIMMIE JONES (Roulette 4232)

B+ "LOVER" (2:36) [Kahl BMI—Jones, Goldner] A lidful of exciting high pitched Jones vocalizing turns up on Roulette, waxed previous to his Cub "Handy Man." Pulsating rock-a-cha cha beat, honking sax solos, bright chorale activity and Jones' solid sell add up to a strong entry.

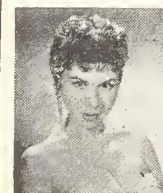

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An Industry Project:

Employ and Develop Young People

Members of the coin machine business, with the interest of the industry at heart, and who visualize its future progress, have been suggesting, in no uncertain terms, that young people be brought into its fold. "The industry needs youth", insisted one of the country's leading operators. "We, who started the business, and who have carried on successfully, today have employees to assist us. We have reached a point in life where we would like to slack off a bit—and yet maintain a going and financially profitable enterprise. We have two paths open to us—either keep working as we have for more than twenty years, with all the responsibilities and decisions; or employ and develop the proper personnel to assume the duties and responsibilities—while, of course, controlling and guiding the business ourselves.

"And the people we employ" he continued, "should be young, aggressive and intelligent. If we are fortunate enough to have sons or sons-in-law, we should bring them into our business. Some people say that they do not want their sons to be in the coin machine business. Not me. The coin machine business is a good, honorable business. As good as any in the nation. It has been wonderful to me. I doubt that I would have done as well in another business. My son-in-law has joined my organization, and is doing very well."

This highly intelligent operator goes a step further. He suggests that coin machine firms make the industry attractive to young men. "There is plenty of room for these young men," he states. "They should be encouraged to join us. We should patiently develop their talents to mesh with our organization; give them incentives; listen to suggestions; experiment with their ideas; and finally, if we are convinced that these young people fit into our program for the future, give them certain authorities to help them blossom out as coin industry executives."

We are seeing young men make progress in our business. But, as our good friend points out, there aren't enough of them. In other industries, which have been carried on from generation to generation, leaders have had long experience in developing young talent to carry on for the future. In the coin machine business, we lack this experience. The industry itself is a youngster. Those who built it are still at the helm. And in a majority of instances, are reluctant to give up some of their executive responsibilities. However, from the rumblings reaching our desk, the problem is becoming a familiar one thruout the nation. It would be a step in the right direction, if those directly concerned with this problem, would give it their serious consideration.

Information Council Progresses With Public Relations Fund Drive

PR Firm Retained To Explore Area

CHICAGO — Pending the final acceptance of a fund raising program by the executive committee of the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Equipment Industry, and members of the Board of Directors who attended the February 6 meeting at the Morrison Hotel in this city, a majority of the group concluded that this problem and all its ramifications should be brought to the attention of the Herbert M. Kraus public relations firm, for a more thorough evaluation of the financing possibilities throughout the coin machine industry.

It was suggested that this conference could possibly result in the final selection of a more specific and acceptable dues structure embracing all of the various segments of the industry.

Herbert M. Kraus & Company was retained by the executive committee of the Information Council, last November, to handle the industry-wide public relations program.

In order to facilitate the fund raising campaign several of the manufacturers, who attended the earlier session (February 6), offered to finance the program on a monthly basis until the plan is further re-appraised some time in May. It was the general opinion of the majority of those present that the public relations program will be sufficiently sparked at that time.

The meeting between several members of the executive committee of the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Equipment Industry and responsible heads of the Herbert M. Kraus public relations firm was held in their offices, Friday, February 12.

During this session representatives of the Information Council advised the public relations firm's executives of the previously mentioned decisions

which were arrived at, at the earlier meeting. Since the president, Lou Casola, was absent at this conference due to illness, Herbert B. Jones, secretary, presided at this session.

The conference was concluded after a thorough review of the financing plan, and a unanimous decision that Herbert M. Kraus & Company was instructed to completely explore the fund raising aspects throughout a facets of the industry.

The next step to be taken is comprehensive fund drive, with emphasis to be aimed at local operator associations, as well as all other segments of the industry.

The public relations annual fee plan accepted during the earlier meeting Saturday, February 6, consists of the following breakdown: Manufacturer's annual dues will be assessed according to each firm's dollar volume of business for the entire year. There are individual dues structures designated for distributors, jobbers, operators, affiliate members (suppliers and associate members.

The committee unanimously agreed to withhold a more complete report of the dues structure until it is more thoroughly reviewed by the Herbert M. Kraus organization. That firm's financing goal for this year is \$56,000.

Co.; Gilbert Kitt, president of Empire Coin, and ex-president of NCMDA; J. Arthur Weinand, Chicago Dynamics Industries; Aaron Sternfeld of Billboard and Lee Brooks of The Cash Box.

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Edelman Intros Stereo Background Music System For Phono Locations

Ops Buy Unit, Rent To Location

NEW YORK—Iz Edelman, president, Cine Sonic Sound, Inc., this city factory and offices in Detroit announced the introduction of a stereo background music system "tereopac," which has been designed for direct sale to music machine operators for rental to locations that do not warrant a new stereo coin-operated phonograph. The unit will list for \$199.50 while the rental charge for locations will be decided by the individual operator. The firm will continue production on the monaural unit which lists for

\$179.50 and is currently on more than 12,000 locations in this country, according to Edelman. The monaural unit is marketed primarily to locations other than taverns and similar type spots. "We now have a product for the coin machine location which will serve as a means of supplying the location with stereo music although the operator does not see fit to install a stereo phonograph. In this way the operator will make a profit from the rental and the location will enjoy stereo music," stated Edelman.

"The 'Stereopac' will enable operators to diversify their routes accommodating even the smallest location with the finest music. The rental fee may be taken from the cash box of the phonograph during collection periods or as agreed to by the location owner. I can see where this unit will also stimulate juke box play since the 'Stereopac' will not be played when the phonograph is patronized. The continuous music of the background unit will stimulate phonograph play," continued Edelman.

Cine Sonic's stereo tape library, which is complemented by the RCA Victor library, consists of a wide range of music, with the catalog growing each week. Edelman has arranged for a continuous production on stereo tapes for use with the unit. The current library includes "Cocktail Music" with scores by Cole Porter, Jerome Kern, Rodgers and Hammerstein, Hoagy Carmichael, and others, plus

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"Broadway Show Tunes", "String Music", and foreign flavored music including French, Latin, Spanish, and Italian. Each cartridge will play for approximately one hour, with the tape being flipped using one-half hour of music on each side of the cartridge.

Cine Sonic has a network of distributors in the United States but sells direct where a distributor has not been appointed. Formerly, with the original monaural unit, tapes could only be purchased from Cine Sonic's Sound Library. The Stereopac' enables operators to purchase the tape either from Edelman or from RCA Victor.

"The 'Stereopac' was designed with the operator in mind taking into account the location demand for stereophonic music and the operator's plans for expanding and improving his route with stereo music," concluded Edelman.

A.C.A. Re-Elects Butlin

LONDON—The Amusement Caterers Association, local coin association here, held its annual general meeting which was scheduled for after the close of the Amusement Trades Exhibition, and re-elected Billy Butlin to the post of presidency. It was Butlin's fifteenth consecutive term in office.

The meeting concerned itself with the success of the A.T.E. which includes on its board several directors of this association. The chief talking point was the impending revision of the Betting and Gaming Acts, expected to be issued this spring.

The A.C.A. members advised that negotiations between various trade organizations and the British government were proceeding as formerly reported.

Bally Mfg. Releases "Bally Derby"

Gun Game Has Horse Race Feature

CHICAGO — "Bally Derby," new rifle-target game, introduced this week by Bally Manufacturing Company, this city, contains a miniature race-track on which 5 jockey-ridden horses are spurred toward the finish-line by player's skill in hitting various bull's-eyes.

"In fact," says Bill O'Donnell, Bally general sales manager, "Bally Derby" combines 3 of the strongest play-appeal features known to the coin-operated amusement industry: skill-thrills of a gun, suspense of a horse race, action and excitement of launching balls.

"Because of the combination of solo skill and horse-race scoring, built into 'Bally Derby,' the game, while ideal for competitive play between a group of patrons, gives the solitary player plenty of amusement. Location tests indicate that 60 per cent of games played are single-player games. This does not mean single-coin games, because players often deposit 2 or 3 dimes per game, each dime se-

lecting a horse. A single player may actually select all 5 horses. When several players compete, each selects his horse, depositing a dime for each selection. Or 2 players may each select 2 horses. The fifth horse remains in the race and, of course, may beat the selected horses to the finish-line.

"Each horse is keyed to a line of 4 ball-launching pockets, and the speed of each horse depends on the number of balls in his line. Horses advance after each shot, and object of the game is to hit targets to launch balls out of rival horse's line and into your horse's line, thus holding back rival horses and speeding up your horse. In addition to line-targets, 'Bally Derby' is equipped with 2 targets that launch all balls, completely re-scrambling the pattern of balls and often resulting in a surprise spurt of speed for a selected horse. Automatic scrambling also occurs after every third shot, when all balls are automatically launched. If several players are competing, third-shot scramble is also a signal to yield gun to next player.

"Game continues until any horse arrives at finish line or until each player shoots his quota—which depends on the number of selections played. If only one horse is selected, quota is 12 shots. If 2 horses are selected, whether by 2 players or a single player, quota is 9 shots per selection. In the case of 3, 4 or 5 selections, quota is 6 shots per selection," continued O'Donnell.

"At end of each game, skill-ratings—Fair, Good, Excellent or Superior—light on backglass. Selected horse must, of course, arrive at finish-line to qualify for skill-rating, and the particular rating depends on the number of shots required to 'bring in' selected horse.

"For example, if only one horse is selected, he must finish in 7 shots to rate Superior. Same rule applies when 3 horses are selected. But, if 2, 4 or 5 horses are selected, winning player is rated Superior if his horse arrives at finish-line in 9 shots—total of all players. If more than 7 or 9 shots are required to drive selected horse across finish-line, rating drops to Excellent, Good or Fair, depending on total number of shots.

"If 2 or more horses finish in dead heat, rating applies to each selection and 'backer' of a winning horse receives posted number of replays.

"Replays range from 9 for Superior to 1 for Fair and game is adjustable to start at 5 replays, instead of 9.

"Triple combination of features, strong competitive play appeal and compact size—only 28 in. wide, 38 in. deep, 74 in. high—positively removes 'Bally Derby' from the 'arcade' class. Location tests in typical tavern spots prove that 'Bally Derby' easily competes with 'novelty' pinball and bowling games—with really amazing cash-box receipts. For example, 4 players in competition at 40 cents a game can complete a game in 3 minutes, 30 seconds—which is an hourly rate of \$6.80. Naturally, 4 players will seldom keep up at that rate, hour after hour, but location tests do show a very high level of continuous play. Definitely, 'Bally Derby' is another inflation-beating Bally game that will do much to restore prosperity to operators," concluded O'Donnell.

Fisher was survived by the widow, Anne, and a son, Joseph.

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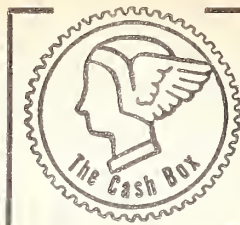
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Equipment Sales Move Well

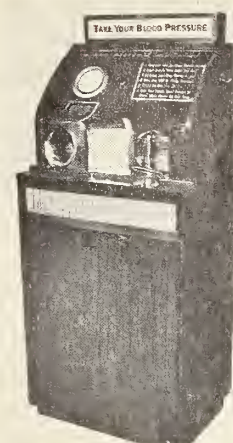

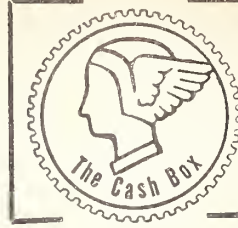

This is an increase of 20% over the previous quarterly dividend rate of 12 1/2 cents per share, and places the stock on an annual dividend rate of 60 cents per share.

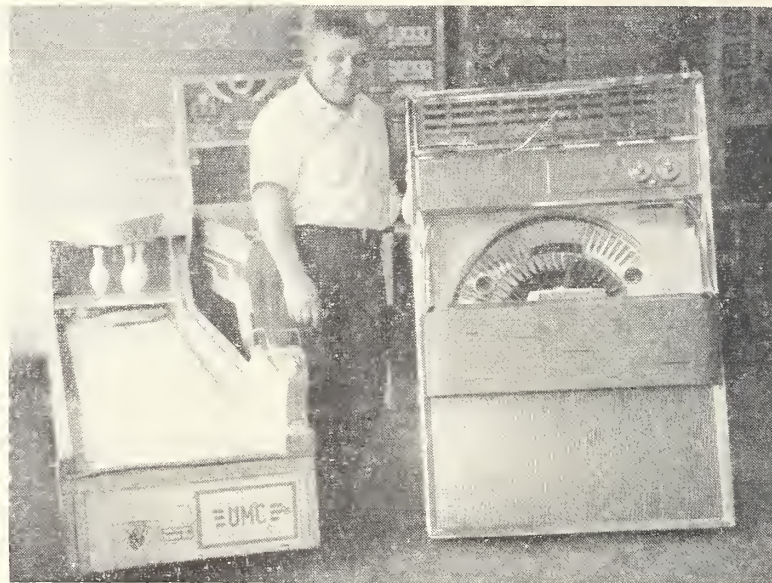
"This action was prompted by an outlook of improved sales and earnings for the Company in both domestic and foreign markets," Leverone explained.

Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

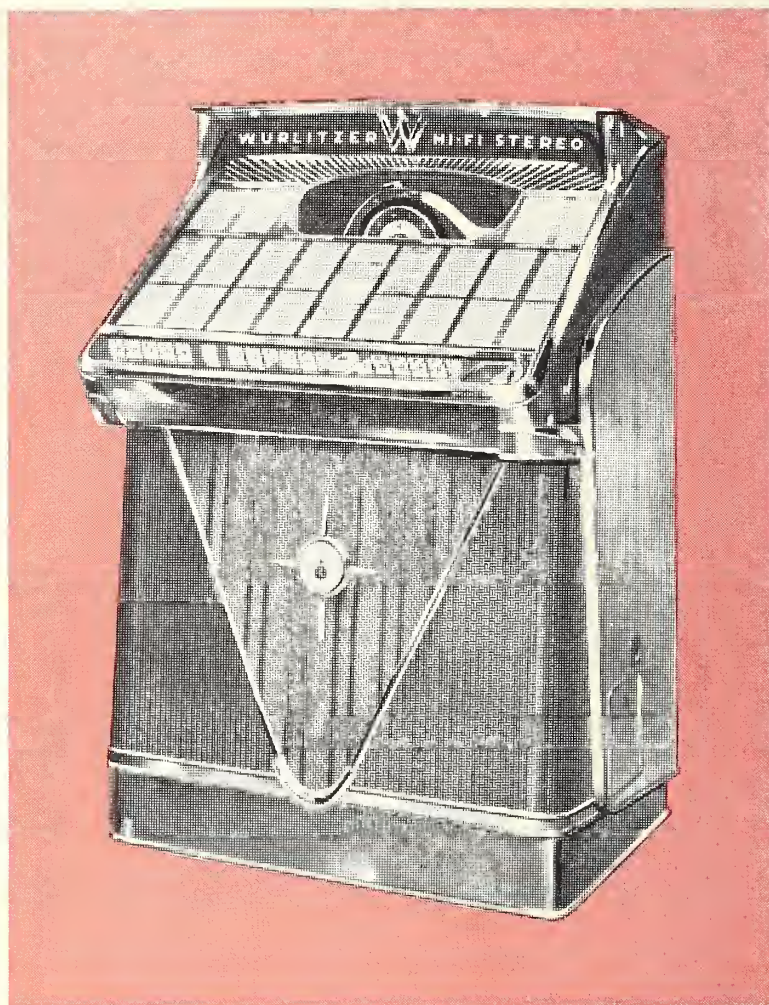

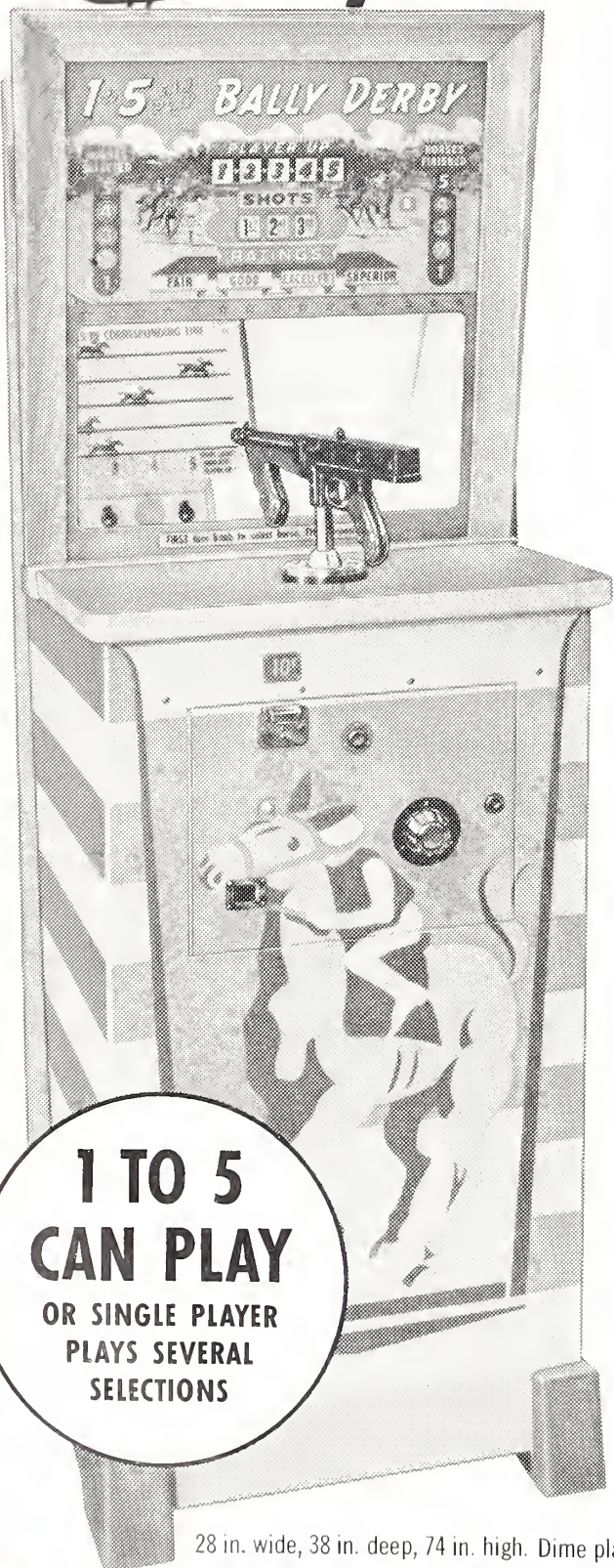
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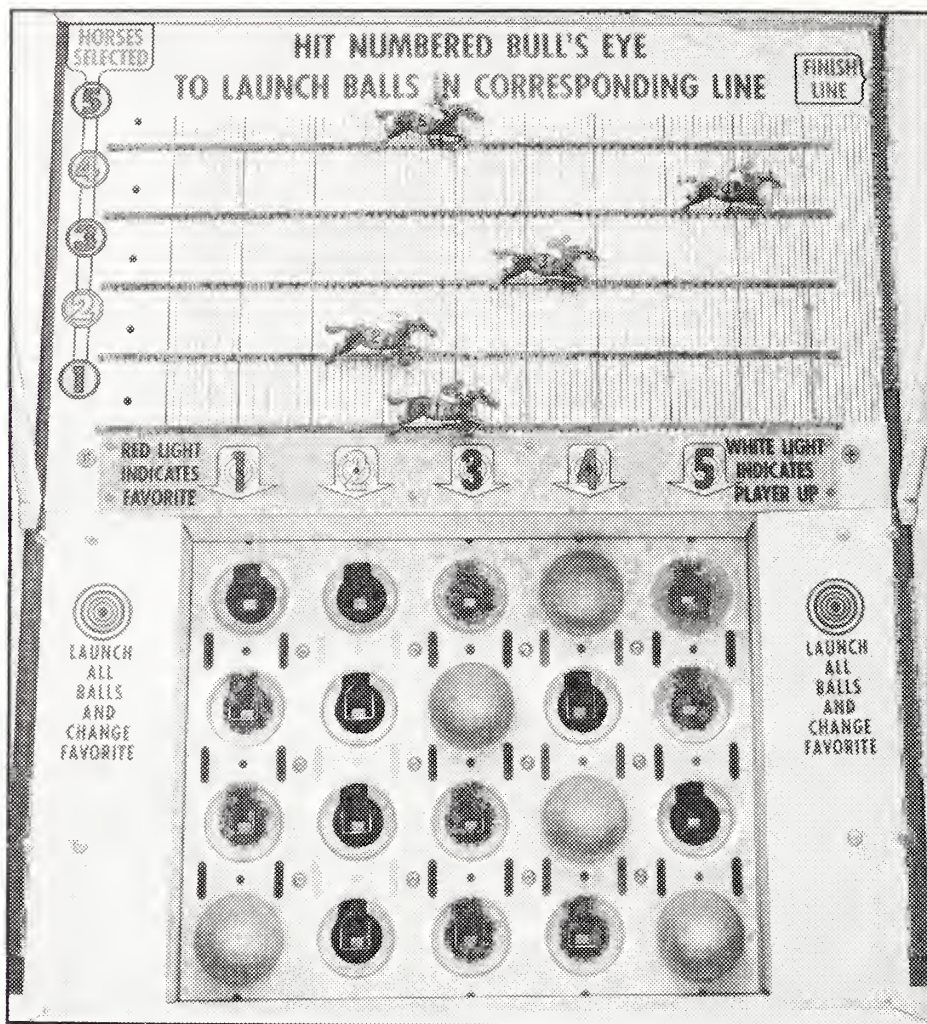
