PROBE ENDS ON DISTASTEFUL NOTE


Similar damage was done the week before last when Representative Moss referred to The Cash Box lists as "rigged." By making this all-encompassing statement, Moss was obviously basing his comment on the Harry Weiss incident of last February when Weiss, a promotion man for Music Suppliers in Boston, testified that he had sent in phony lists on radio station letterheads for reprinting in the Cash Box' weekly Disk Jockey Regional Record Report. The Cash Box investigated the matter at the time Weiss made the statement and reported to the trade that not one of Weiss' listings was ever printed in The Cash Box.

Irresponsible statements of this nature could possibly affect The Cash Box reputation built over a period of seventeen years. We are proud of the honesty and accuracy of our lists and we have taken exception to the remarks made by **Representative Moss in a strong** telegram to the Harris Committee.

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

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



"BYE BYE JOHNNY" (2:05) [Arc BMI-C. Berry Music]

"WORRIED LIFE BLUES" (2:10)

CHUCK BERRY (Chess 1754)

Looks like Chuck Berry's gonna get back in the big hit groove with his newest rock-delighter, "Bye Bye Johnny." It's pile-driving sequel to "Johnny B. Goode" (who, on this deck, heads out to Hollywood to star in films). The kids'll love it. Backing's a slow, rhythmic blueser that Chuck wails with down home authority.

"I CAN'T HELP IT" (2:34) [Acuff-Rose ASCAP-Williams] "I HAD THE CRAZIEST DREAM" (2:30)

[Bregman, Vocco & Conn ASCAP—Gordon, Warren]

ADAM WADE (Coed 530)

Songster Wade should place another entry on the charts, making it three-in-a-row since his Coed debut (others were "Tell Her For Me" and Ruby.") Topside is a solid ballad reading of one of Hank Williams' best works, "I Can't Help It." Coupler is a tasteful sentimental look at another sturdy.

"BIG BOY PETE" (2:15) [Venice BMI—Ilarris, Terry]

"THE SLOP" (2:06) [Arvee BMI—Smith, Goldsmith]

THE OLYMPICS (Arvee 595)

The Olympics come thru with a terrific follow-up to their recent money-maker, "The Hully Gully." Tagged "Big Boy Pete," it's a contagious flash-back to their "Western Movies" days and it's told with teen beat finesse by the artists. Loads of ultra-commercial vocal and instrumental sounds are packed into what looks like a real smasheroo. "The Slop" also packs a solid teen wallop. Watch it, too!

"THE DANCE IS OVER" (2:45) [Aldon BMI-Goffin, Weiss, King] "TOO YOUNG TO KNOW" (2:27) [Maxana ASCAP-Traynor, Dickinson, Copeland]

EYDIE GORME (ABC—Paramount 10111)

Eydic Gorme should be joining hubby Steve "Footsteps" Lawrence up on the hit lists as soon as this platter gets around. Tagged "The Dance Is Over," it's probably the most commercial effort the lark has cut to date. And there's a great Don Costa ork-choral assist on this teen-angled, tear-compelling rock-a-cha cha. Watch it zoom. "Too Young To Know" makes for a very pretty ballad companion piece.

"SONG FOR A SUMMER NIGHT" (2:50) [Cromwell ASCAP-Allen] "DREAMY MELODY" (2:15) [Cromwell ASCAP—Clinton]

SPENCER ROSS ORCH (Columbia 41664)

Here's two beautiful instrumental Columbia follow-ups to Spencer Ross' "Tracy's Theme." Both "Song For A Summer Night" (the short-while back Mitch Miller hit) and "Dreamy Melody" retain the same haunting fect that dominated Ross' initial smash. Jimmy Abato's sax solos are standouts on both sides. Two programming musts.

"MAKE LOVE TO ME" (2:45) [Melrose ASCAP-Norvas, Copeland, Roppolo, Mares, Brunies, Pollack, Stitzel, Melrose]

"HEAVEN HELP ME" (2:13) [Anvil ASCAP-Stillman, DeLugg]

KITTY KALLEN (Columbia 41671)

Kitty Kallen, who's been on a 'bring-back-the-oldies' hit kick, could have another chart-rider in the years-back Jo Stafford success, "Make Love To Me." The new version features Kitty and Milton DeLugg ork and choral group in a tantalizing swing, shuffle outfit. Also watch the captivating romantic lilter, "Heaven Help Me." Jocks'll have a picnic with both halves.

JOHNNY DAVID (Dot 16078)

(B+) "I MET A GIRL" (2:07) [Gil BMI — McNeill] Interesting, haunting-sound ballad is effectively recited by songster David. Guitars & percussion are the fine setting high-light. Could move.

(B+) "RACE WITH THE DEVIL" (2:20) [Gil BMI—McNeil] This session has quick-beat finesse and can also come thru.

PETE CHARLES (Buzz 107)

(B) "LOVE AFFAIR" (2:00) [Trace ASCAP—Wynne, Lor-en] Vocalist and combo-chorus nicely handle the infectious, C&W-sounding opus. Kids should enjoy the beat.

(C+) "SUSAN — SUSAN" (2:23) [Trace ASCAP—Wynne, Lor-en] An OK light-rhythm touch to the name-song.

JOE MELSON (Hickory 1121)






"BE SINCERE" (2:05) [Tree Studio BMI-Nelson, Burch]

LITTLE DIPPERS (University 6064)

The gentle way of their recent hit, "Forever," is again the basic ingredi-ent of the vocalists' latest success-bound session, "Be Sincere." Strings provide attractive accompaniment. Lush rock-a-cha setting on the appeal-ing underlid. "Be Sincere" is the important entry. Liberty Records handles the label.



Jimmy Reed's distinctive brand of blues warbling comes across in solid sales fashion on both ends of his follow-up to his recent biggie, "Baby, What You Want Me To Do." Both the middle beat shuffler, "Found Love" and the slow rhythmic, "Where Can You Be" have the chart goods. Potent pairing.

"YOUR SEVENTEENTH SPRING" (2:42) [Alden BMI-Kolber, Mann]

"LITTLE GIRL" (1:36) [Leeds ASCAP-Hyde, Henry]

MARTY WILDE (Epic 9392)

The English songster, who recently kicked up a chart fuss with "Bad Boy," could do even bigger things with his latest for Epic, "Your Seven-teenth Spring." It's a beat-ballad beaut that Wilde carves out in ear-arresting fashion. Chuck Sagle's ork and choral support helps make this a listening treat. Flipside, Marty and company delightfully bring back, teen-style, "Little Girl." Bright coupler.

"ONLY THE LONELY" (2:24) [Acuff-Rose BMI-Orbison, Melson] "HERE COMES THAT SONG AGAIN" (2:40) [Combine BMI--Flood]

ROY ORBISON (Monument 421)

Roy Orbison can have a chart-topper in this follow-up to his recent "Up-town" coin-catcher. Tune tabbed "Only The Lonely (Know How I Feel)" is a fabulous cha cha affair with heartbreaking love lyrics. Stellar assist by Bob Moore's vocal and instrumental crew perfectly blends with beauti-ful vocal job. Tempo breaks are just great. Under cut's an appealing ballad-with-a-mild beat weeper. Lovely coupler.

"CHURCH BELLS MAY RING" [Selma BMI—Craft, Willows] "MY FOOLISH HEART" [Santly-Joy ASCAP—Washington, Young] SUNNY GALE (Warwick 540) "Church Bells May Ring" (the while-back teen click co-shared by the Willows and the Diamonds) may very well mark the chirp's return to the hit ranks. Sunny's winning vocal way coupled with a sensational Stan Appelbaum ork-chorus backdrop makes this a solid chart threat. The beautiful old-timer, "My Foolish Heart," is treated to a superb beat-ballad job by Sunny and support.

RUSTY DRAPER (Mercury 71634)

"Mule Skinner Blues," the dynamic-beat oldic, gets two readings of teen note, Mercury's Draper and combo takes a sock attitude, while the Soma outing—headed by fine lead songster, Phil Humphrey—has less drive, but excellent chant bits throughout. POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

"IT'S EVERLY TIME!"—The Everly Brothers— Warner Bros. W 1381 The Everly's first album date for the WB label is a veritable riot in rhythm. Whether it is a driving country blues or a tender beat ballad the infectious rhythms set up by the two guitars re-mains a focal point for the teen dancers. And the songs themselves, mostly originals by Boudleaux and Felice Bryant, are ideal vehicles for the boys' country-ish style. Set includes "Nashville Blues," "You Thrill Me," "Memories Are Made of This," "So Sad" and "What Kind of Girl Are You." A guaranteed smash.

"THE FABULOUS EVERLY BROTHERS"— Cadence CLP 3040 A volatile package of Everly Bros. performances, many of which saw the top of the singles charts in recent months. Now, under one cover, the tunes present an irresistible attraction for top honors. Along with such proven hits as "('Til) I Kissed You," "Take A Message To Mary," "Let It Be Me" and "Poor Jenny," the package also includes two new sides: "When Will I Be Loved" and "Like Strangers." Slated for a long ride.

"EVERYTHING BUT THE BEER"—Arthur Fiedler Conducts a Boston Pops Concert—RCA Victor LM 6082 RCA Victor supplies "everything but the beer" for this presentation of a typical Boston Pops concert right down to the two porcelain beer mugs which come packaged with the two disk set. And the music, typical of the pops repertoire, in-cludes such diverse numbers as "Pomp and Cir-cumstance March," prelude to Act III of "Lohen-grin," a medley of the score from "West Side Story" and even the theme from "Peter Gunn." This all-encompassing concert should meet with terrific reception. terrific reception.



"ALL AGLOW AGAIN"—Peggy Lee—Capitol T 1366 A review of Peggy Lee's past hits (this album) is an exciting look back over the career of one of the music biz' top personalities. The set reaches back for the stimulating "Manana," and also in-cludes "My Man," "Where Do I Go From Here" and the more recent "Hallelujah, I Love Him So" and "Fever." A natural for a chart ride.

"SANDS AT THE SANDS"-Tommy Sands-Capitol ST 1364 Tommy Sands comes across as a full fledged Tommy Sands comes across as a full fledged pro entertainer on this set waxed during live per-formance at the Las Vegas nitery. His versatility is acknowledged when he slips easily from a ten-der ballad into a upbeat swinger; and he credits his beginnings with a comic rock & roll medley aided and abetted by a group called the Sharks. Tunes include "This Could Be the Start of Some-thing," "Everything's Coming Up Roses," "Get Happy," "Unchained Melody" and "Sinner Man." Set should do well as Sands is the labels "Artist of the Month."

"MADISON TIME"—Ray Bryant Combo—Calls by Eddie Morrison—Columbia CS 8267 Ray Bryant's studio group, containing some very excellent jazz musicians, went commercial successfully on the "Madison Time" single and now extends itself for an entire album of tunes for which to do the Madison. Set includes the two part hit, plus other two-parters: "Split T" and "Hit It" with Eddie Morrison along for the hip calls. Harry Edison's "Centerpiece" is one of the highlights here.





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"ALAN DALE SINGS GREAT AMERICAN HITS IN ITALIAN"—United Artists UAL 3091 This is quite a switch. Ordinarily it's the Italian song which gets an English translation but for some reason Dale prefers the reverse and in what is a treat for the Italian-Americans, he proves an excellent interpreter. His diction is fine but most important is his smooth treatment of the songs. They include "Laura," "I Surrender Dear," "Over the Rainbow," "Stardust" and "Blue Moon." Should do a brisk business. Should do a brisk business.

"COOL WATER"—Sons of the Pioneers—RCA Victor LPM 2118

Victor LPM 2118 In this day of mass Western entertainment the Sons of the Pioneers are a fresh breeze of authen-ticity. Their genuine sincerity in the singing of Western songs is a welcome change from what emanates from TV scores. This album contains their most famous hit, "Cool Water," as well as such favorites as "Whoopie-Ti-Yi-Yo," "Twilight On the Trail," "Wagon Wheels," "Tumbling Tum-bleweeds" and "Blue Shadows On the Trail," among a total of 18 songs. among a total of 18 songs.

"FELIX SLATKIN'S FANTASTIC BRASS MARCHES THE BLUES"—Liberty LST 7157 Slatkin leads a huge group comprised of equal parts of march rhythm section and jazz-oriented brass through a high stepping program of old time blues tunes. It's quite interesting listening and has merit on the audiophile level. Tracks in-clude "Sugar Blues," "Tin Roof Blues," "St. Louis Blues" and "Memphis Blues."

"MOOD IN MINK"—Teal Joy—Seeco CELP 457 A song stylist with jazz overtones, Miss Joy has a strong, sure voice and a soft naturalness in her approach to a song. She can swing delight-fully and warmly express a ballad story. Here, with quartet accompaniment, she serves up "They Didn't Believe Me," "Skylark," "I Married An Angel," "I Didn't Know What Time It Was" and "I Remember You." Attractive, smart vocal album. album.

"THE ELOISE TRIO"—Decca DL 8983 This Calypso trio whips up enough music and excitement to satisfy a group five times its size. Currently, they're attracting pop chart attention via their wild reading of "Chic Chi Merengue." They add to that here with equally vibrant ex-cursions of "La Bamba," "Zombie Jamboree," "Goombay" and "Calypso Island." Listening to them perform is a thrilling experience.

"LEGRAND PIANO"—Michael Legrand plays I Love Paris—Columbia CL 1441 The album which created excited American in-terest in the young French musician was "I Love Paris." Now Legrand reaches back and essays the same tunes from that first album, but utiliz-ing a jazz trio approach with himself at piano. It's interesting listening, although his jazz style seems a little stiff and conventional. Neverthless his romantic approach and concern for the melody will sell a lot of albums. Among the tunes are "April In Paris," "Autumn Leaves," "Under Paris Skies" and "La Vie en Rose."

"GOODIES BUT GASSERS"—Lee Castle and the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra—Epic LN 3681 Proving that big band material need not be dated and can (and should) appeal to younger music lovers, Lee Castle has arranged a session containing some of the big pop hits of recent years, giving them a full-swinging ork treatment. Although these songs do not have the staying power of the usual Dorsey vehicles, they do have appeal for the teeners and that is what Castle is evidently aiming for. Side include "Personality," "Don't Be Cruel," "Dream Lover" and "Kansas City."

The remaining 11 selections are all new compositions, an odd thing for the usual big band albums. Under such titles as "Go Non-Stop," "Panama Patrol," "Obsession" and "Cool Collins," the music is very well suited for the brassy, rhythmic Owen treatment. Merits serious atten-tion.

"IRVING FIELDS FAVORITES"-Irving Fields

"IRVING FIELDS FAVORITES"—Irving Fields Trio—King 703 The Fields Trio has long been a favorite in the smart supper clubs, specializing in lithe Latin interpretations of pop tunes. Here the pianist serves up an interesting program of such music but with the tempo varied away from just Latin rhythms. The numbers are "Ebb Tide," "My Funny Valentine," "Tico Tico" and "Holiday For Strings" plus 8 others. For listening and dancing Fields fills the bill neatly.

"SOUNDS FROM BRASILIA"—The Brasilian Rhythmists—Musidisc MS-16014 Commemorating the new ultra-modern capitol city of Brazil, Brasilia, the label has put together an album comprised of popular Brazilian songs played authentically in the rhythm-concentrated Brazilian style. This is highly stimulating music, sensuous and irresistible in its contagiousness. Give it a whirl.

"FORGOTTEN HITS"—The Unforgettables— Forget-Me-Not LPF 101 These are the real forgotten hits of the past, songs that will evoke twinges of nostalgia from those old enough to remember such titles as "Tired of Me," "Oh How I Laughed When I Think How I Cried About You," George M. Cohan's "You Remind Me of My Mother" and Irving Berlin's "After You Get What You Want You Don't Want It." Singer Bob Monet and organist Irma Hollan-der (The Unforgettables) are capable performers, handling the tunes, for the most part, straight and unadorned. But a few tracks are given the heavy beat treatment which seems so out of line here. Still many oldtimers will get a kick out of the album. "BERLIN; PORTRAIT OF A CITY"—Horst Bu-

the album. "BERLIN; PORTRAIT OF A CITY"—Horst Bu-cholz, Eva Nelson—Panorama PLP 2006 Horst Bucholz narrates behind the scenes stor-ies and traditions of Berlin but it is through Eva Nelson's rendering of German songs that the album captures the listener in a web of enchant-ment about the famous city. She sings in German, in the style of a cabaret chanteuse, and audience reaction has been dubbed in for a feeling of authenticity. The songs are all of German origin and include (surprisingly) "Just a Gigolo," "Fall-ing In Love Again," "Take Me In Your Arms" and of course "Mack the Knife." Wonderful item for the international shelf.

"MINGUS DYNASTY"—Charles Mingus and his Jazz Groups—Columbia CL 1440 Popularly, Mingus has found a great audience for his "soul" numbers, the rousing, emotional gospel tunes in ¾ time. He satisfies that need here best on "Slop" and in several recurring places in the album, but also focuses attention on his other experiments; (i.e., his scoring of indi-vidual instruments in ensemble playing rather than the usual section harmony.) His musicians are all top rank and include Benny Golson, Ro-land Hanna, Jimmy Knepper and Jerome Rich-ardson. Outstanding album date.

"PATENTED BY EDISON"—The Harry 'Sweets" Edison Quintet—Roulette R 52041 Still the unchallenged leader of the sweet, clear, simple, swinging trumpet style, Edison takes firm hold of the instrument here for an easy going ride through a dozen melodic tunes. Assisted by Jimmy Forest on tenor, and a rhythm section, Edison, open and muted, glides easily through "Blue Skies," "Ain't Misbehavin'," "They Can't Take That Away From Me" and "Tea For Two." Completely enjoyable date.

"CAN-CAN & ANYTHING GOES"—Benny Car-ter & Hal Schaefer—United Artists UAL 3055 Two Cole Porter show scores offer the playing-arranging team of Carter and Schaefer ample material for a lively and inventive session. Schaefer arranged the five tunes from "Can-Can," while Carter assumed those chores for the "Any-thing Goes" side. Freshness and imaginativeness pervade both arrangers' work and as their own interpreters, play with wit and charm. And it swings. Check out "Anything Goes," "You're the Top," "It's All Right With Me" and "Waltz Down the Aisle."

"PHIL TALKS WITH QUILL"—The Phil Woods Quartet with Gene Quill—Epic LN 3521 Alto saxists cut from the same Parker mold, Woods and Quill are a common twosome in jazz circles. Here they are given to assert their in-dividuality in a relaxed, loosely swinging session in which emphasis is on extended solos by the two. The very complete liner notes identify the solos, commendable and very necessary in this type out-ing. Tunes include "A Night in Tunisia," "Scrap-ple from the Apple" and two different readings of "Doxie." Good, substantial, easily enjoyable jazz album. jazz album.

"SONNY CLARK TRIO"---Time T/70010 Sonny Clark's first album as a leader is a re-warding one for the pianist and, therefore, the listener. He shows he is a natural, unselfconscious swinger with a full-bodied attack and clear melodic and harmonic conceptions. Teamed with Max Roach and George Duvivier, he would have to look far to find a better rhythm duo. Since the two are so important, they have been recorded well and are never shunted off. All eight tunes are Sonny's and several are blues, as Clark, like most young jazzmen, returns to "roots" for inspiration. Well worth wide recognition.

Well worth wide recognition. "SPREADIN' JOY"—The Music of Sidney Bechet interpreted by Bob Wilber—Classic Jazz CJ 5 Wilber, a one-time student of Bechet's and a faithful friend, undertakes here to set down his own feelings about the music of Sidney Bechet. Using two groups, of quintet and septet size, and loosely following the instrumentation of tradi-tional groups, Wilber plays with a more modern conception, that is, opposed to the usual Bechet music. There is a definite New Orleans feeling in Wilber's music—in rhythm, timing and feeling. Elaborate two-fold liner with extensive notes and pictures bind this admirable and successful date.

It is a magnificent production, one which only this company is capable of. Complete on two disks and including the libretto, the at-tractively boxed album is an outstanding addition to the Gilbert & Sullivan catalog.



"JUBILEE RECORD"—Mischa Elman, violin— Vanguard VSD 2048 This "Jubilee" recording by Elman celebrates "fifty years of violinistic triumph." The program is comprised of light classics and encore pieces and could somewhat be considered a pops concert. Elman plays with his usual aplomb such favorites as Arensky's "Serenade," Schumann's "Trau-merei," Schubert's "Ave Maria" and Beethoven's "Minuet in G." He is still an artist of consummate skill.



Pacted by Friedman in behalf of Rank Records of America were Nevins-Kirshner Associates, Inc., the music publishing, independent production and personal management firm built by Al Nevins and Don Kirshner, the independent producing team of Slay and Crewe, and Bud Greenspan, producer of documentary spoken word albums. Greenspan is currently associated with the Lawrence C. Gumbinner Advertising Agency as a radio and television producer. Friedman also set a distribution deal with the newly formed Tri-Ess Records.

Nevins-Kirshner Associates, Inc. was formed late in 1958. Since their inception as a team they have had a total of eighteen songs that have become hits. The firm's publishing subsidiary, Aldon Music Inc., currently has five tunes on the charts. Nevins and Kirshner manage Neil Sedaka and produce and publish all of his and the Three Suns recordings.

"This arrangement with Rank Records of America is of particular interest to us," Nevins and Kirshner stated, "because of the world-wide distribution of the Rank Organization in every medium of the entertainment industry-motion pictures, television and recordings. We will develop the type of talent that can achieve stardom in all three of those media and in every geographical area. The record is the heart of today's entertainment industry. Artists who can make hits are immediately exposed to international audiences not only via records but on TV and in films. We feel that the Rank Organization is ideally constituted to take fullest advantage of this on behalf of the artist and for us as music publishers, producers and talent managers."

Slay and Crewe are one of the top songwriting and record producing teams. They currently are responsible for the record dates of Freddie Cannon and Billy & Lilly, both of whom are distributed overseas by Rank International. As songwriters, they scored their first hit two years ago with "Silhouettes." They write most of the material which are used in their sessions. Bernard Ness, general manager of the Record Division of the Rank Organization, London, and President of Rank Records of America, said of the pactings: "The foundation of a record company's supply of product is its A & R Department. Under the direction of Sonny Lester, and now with the recent addition of Paul E. Cohen for country music, we believe that we have the finest A & R men anywhere.

"The second phase in building product is to open the door to material from every source. We have used our English affiliation for the Knightsbridge Strings, Ernest Maxin, Phil Green and other artists. We have released material obtained from Rank International that is the product of record companies in all foreign countries.

"Now, we are taking the next logical step and arranging for independent A & R. The people Harold Friedman has signed have a record of success that will give us additional highly saleable merchandise for our distributors."


Harold Friedman revealed that Rank Records of America will purchase masters and distribute for other labels as well as deal with independent producers. He stressed the significance of international cooperation.

WASHINGTON-The Harris Committee ended its public hearings into payola last week, with Dick Clark insisting that "I never accepted payola." Clark's probe-ending testimony last Monday and Tuesday (2 & 3) brought him back to the stand after his initial testimony the Friday before (29), and, again, the committee confronted him with the information it had gathered dealing with his activities in the disk business. Cynicism was also a factor Clark was confronted with, and it was at this type of committee questions and replies that Clark's polish and consistently calm attitude while testifying came to his aid.

In addition to the Clark testimony, the committee also heard from Leonard H. Goldenson, head of ABC, Clark's outlet. Goldenson testified on general programming practices, and ran into committee criticism because of a matter dealing with payments of \$7,150 given Clark by American Airlines for plugs received on the Clark TV shows. Goldenson said the network had approved the payments because ABC wanted Clark to "travel his show."

ABC figured that Clark would require \$7,000 to cover travel expenses and, therefore, permitted Clark to take such an amount. After the committee produced a memorandum to Clark for his lawyer saying that after all travel expenses of ABC and three affiliated Clark businesses, there was a profit of \$3,049.60 on the airline's payment, Rep. Moss said to Goldenson, "Quite candidly, I do not believe you." Clark admitted in testimony the day before that the airline hadn't always transported his talent every time it received a plug. Moss then called it an undercover payment-and when Clark said such payments were "common prac-tice" in the industry, Moss said, "I don't care who did it or what you call it—'Clarkola,'—it's against the law."

Goldenson's appearance before the committee also revealed the fact the disk jockey Alan Freed, a former ABC

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

Producers Say Clark Has No Interest In Eddy

HOLLYWOOD-"The charges that Duane Eddy is owned by Dick Clark is completely untrue and not founded in fact," according to a statement last week by Lester Sill and Lee Hazlewood, who produce all of the instrumentalist's recordings on the Jamie label.

This arose when it was learned Clark's testimony before during House payola probers that Clark owns 25% of the management firm of SRO Artists, Inc., which also handles Eddy's personal management. It was also brought out that Clarkover a 21/2 year period-had a 25% interest in Jamie Records.

"However," Sill and Hazlewood said in a joint statement, "it should be pointed out that SRO Artists only receive a standard of 10% of Duane's salary for their management services, and this is in no way unfair or excessive. It is the normal fee charged by any manager. It also is important to add that SRO received no part of Duane's record royalties."

Hazlewood and Sill stated, "When Eddy started in the business two years ago, we were his personal managers, but because of our heavy activity in recording the talented youngster, we turned his management contract over to Al Wilde, whom we believe to be one of the best personal managers in the business.

"This still leaves 90% of Duane's earnings going to himself and should indicate to everyone that Duane Eddy is owned by Duane Eddy and not by Dick Clark. When we signed with Mr. Wilde, of our own volition, we were not concerned with who SRO's stockholders were, but rather with the fact that we were getting the services of Mr. Wilde, who is one of the most competent managers in the industry.

"We also wish to take this opportunity to express our sentiments, as well as Duane's, in regard to the current investigation into Dick Clark's activities. We are wholeheartedly behind Dick and believe he is being singled out unfairly simply because he is one of the most successful diskjockeys in the business. Prior to forming All-Disc, Amo was president of Listento Records, which was dissolved when he organized the new company. He is still a partner with N. C. Irion in the Garden State Hydraulics Company. The latter firm manufactures pre-plasticizers, a machine for uniformly pre-heating the material used in press-ing records, thus eliminating the use of biscuits. Amo invented the pre-plasticizer, which is now widely used throughout the record industry. He also served 10 years as general mana-ger and chief engineer for the M. & W. Company, manufacturer of automatic injection molding equipment for the industry. industry.

Jensen was formerly with Boston Records and Connoisseur Records. He has specialized in record promotions, most recently in the drug and petroleum industries.



The committee pledged themselves to do everything possible to put into practice the following recommendations: 1. The 5% returns should be increased; 2. Catalogs and publicity should be free; 3. Price cutting and discount should be stopped; 4. New labels should not be limited to one factor without appointing dealerships; 5. There should be a reduction in the quantity of releases; 6. Supplies to juke box operators should come via retailers; 7. Pre-release plugging of records should be banned; 8. Deleted LP's re-issued on cheap labels should be returnable; 9. Record prices should be standardized; 10. Manufacturers should not seek the abolition of purchase tax in one bulk.



The strike of musicians against record companies belonging to GFL (Record Manufacturer's Association) has finally been ended. On April 29th, the agree-ment between the Musician's Union and GFL was signed in Stockholm by Sven Wassmouth representing the MU and for GFL by Sixten Eriksson of RCA, Anders Holmstedt of EMI and Felix Alvo of Knäppupp Records. The strike ended officially on May 1, and the new agreement will be in force until Apirl 30, 1962. According to information received, the new agreement means a compromise of both parts involved in the affair. The strike started early in February and complicated the situation for the record companies belonging to GFL. According to international problems, the BIEM-NCB (mechanical collect-ing organizations in Europe) ordered a ban against making new recordings in Europe starting at New Year 1960. After special negotiations, the NCB-controlled part of Europe, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden, got a separate agreement for three months (February-April) during which period record companies in these countries could make new recordings. How-ever, if there was no final agreement between BIEM and the other European record companies, there would be a new ban also for Scandinavia after May 1st. Just a few days after this separate agreement for Scandinavia, the Swedish MU declared a strike against GFL-members, who actually had no use for the new three-month intermission. On other hand, companies who did not belong to GFL (such as BFB, Oktav, Artist, etc) could make separate agree-ments with the MU and could continue their activity. The BIEM-ban was lifted in end of March and there were no problems of that kind shadowing the situation any longer. The Swedish strike which continued for another month, has now also been solved. "Tom Pillibi" has now been recorded in Danish by Katy Bödtger on Poly-phon label. A new record label has appeared in Sweden. It is Stockholm Records, with



Gruger, one of the directors of Budd Music Ltd., London, and Buddy Kaye (USA), the composer who has written many hit tunes for such stars as Perry Como, Frank Sinatra, Eddie Fisher, Rosemary Clooney, Dinah Shore, etc., are visiting publisher Peter Schaeffers in Berlin to discuss final plans for his new film which will feature Nat "King" Cole, Sara Vaughn, Cab Calloway and the Duke Ellington Band. This film is titled "Hit Parade" and will also feature German stars Heidi Bruehl, Peter Kraus and Dalida. The purpose of the visit of Kruger and Kaye is also to meet with Mr. Seeger of Peer International who represents part of their music catalogue, and to meet with executives of the major German record companies to arrange a stronger distribution of German disks in the USA and England. After their visit to Germany they will go to Zurich, Switzerland. Disk jockeys in France are very enthused about the first French Peter Kraus EP on Polydor. After finishing his television appearances in England, Peter will record some English tunes there. His new release is "All Girls Want To Kiss," backed with the second Paul Anka hit which Peter sings in German, "It's Time To Cry."

Besides the LP, the album included an illustrated souvenir program that tells about the development of this 15 mil-lion dollar production. Within two months more than 50,000 Ben Hur albums have been sold in the United States. Marlene Dietrich's concert, which should have come off in Vienna at the end of April could not begin as only 160 tickets had been sold in advance, and for a concert hall with 1600 seats. It is of high interest as to what German reac-tion will be when Marlene is on her tour throughout Germany. Most of the German press doubt that she will have full houses anywhere. Vera Lynn, English recording star, has terminated her contract with Decca Records. While she was with Decca about eight million of her records were sold, the most famous being "Auf Wiedersehn," which went over 2 million. Rainer Bertram, who won the second and third prize at the first German record festival, now signed to an exclusive contract with Metronome. Before the contract was signed, Rainer already had recorded 12 songs with this firm. The Philips hit, "Laila" was composed and written in 1928. England Label Develops Spoken Word Line

LONDON—The Cash Box representa-tive last week visited the offices of the Jupiter Recording Company, founded just over two years ago by its three present directors, Clinton Baddeley, Edgar Vetter and T. W. Southam. Baddeley and Vetter had worked to-gether during the war on propaganda recordings and again afterwards in a small company The London Library of recorded English entirely devoted to poetry. After three years the com-pany was sold to America where it is still published by Britam Agencies. In Feb. 1958, the two men came to-gether again and with T. W. Southam launched Jupiter Recordings. Bad-deley explained: "We set out to do poetry—to be read and recorded in the best possible way—and to this end great attention is paid to find ex-actly the right voice for the right poem." The names of many leading actors and actresses from the British theatre appear in the Jupiter catalog, including Dame Sthil Thorndite Sir

theatre appear in the Jupiter catalog, including Dame Sybil Thorndike, Sir Lewis Casson, Michael Hordern, Stephen Murray, Jill Balcon and Christopher Hassall. With their own recording studio, Jupiter in its first two years has produced to date 21 recordings-15 7" disks, 3 12" disks and 3 10" disks (monaural).

Pressings are handled by Philips and Pye and distribution is direct. Individual sleeve designers include Osbert Lancaster and Colin Sorensen. Early releases were confined to 10" and 12" disks, including "A Junior An-thology of English Verse" Parts 1 and 2 aimed directly at schools who account for a large proportion of the company's output,

About a year later came, what Bad-deley considers, the company's best release "The Jupiter Book of Ballads," a 12" LP containing ballads from Scotland, Ireland, England and from America the 19th century ballad "The House of the Rising Sun." Then came the first 7" disks of poems read, in many cases, by the poets themselves such as Dame Edith Sitwell, C. Day Lewis, Robert Graves and Elizabeth Jennings. One of the label's best sell-ers has been "Some Negative Aspects of the Administrative Process" by Professor Parkinson who, in 1959, was appointed to the Miller Chair at the University of Illinois. This disk broke the chain of purely poetical record-ings and resulted in the company's un-usual series of reminiscences by four usual series of reminiscences by four famous ballerinas, Beryl Grey, Marie Rambert, Karsavina and Genee. The company have agents in Sweden, Belgium, Germany, France, Italy, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. They export to America but have no agents there.

N.Z. Firm Wants Franchise

AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND -Manufacturers and distribs here are on the lookout for overseas franchises from U.S. diskeries, according to Harry M. Miller of newly formed Miller Associates. The firm has just announced that it will undertakethrough its La Gloria Records set-up -the representation of diskeries in the Australian and New Zealand areas.

The Interdisc has appointed Recordi of France as their distributor for Riverside, World Pacific, Jazzland, Good-Time Jazz and Contemporary. He is leaving for the United States in May to see their manufacturers and attend the MOA Convention in Chicago. The Sei Giorni Della Canzone held in the Lirico Theatre in Milan, has been won by singer Tony Renis, who records on the His Master's Voice label. He was first among 100 singers and 100 songs. His Master's Voice is publishing the winning composition. In this same show, Nicola Arigliano of VCM was one of the most successful among the guests of honor. He sang six songs instead of the two originally planned. Fonit has just released "Nel Bene E Nel Male" by Domenico Modugno, backed with "Hello Amore," the song the artist wrote for Princess Margaret's wedding. Giacomo Rondinella (Philips) will take part in Ilversun's (Holland) telecast, "Parata Di Assi Mondiali" (Parade Of World Stars). This show will have American, French, Hollandese, German and Italian singers. The relations between IFPI and BIEM in Italy are as follows. In Italy the IFPI is represented by the "Gruppo Italiano Produttori Dischi" whose secretary general is Mr. Frachetti. The BIEM is represented in Italy by Sedrim, managed by adv. Colova. The associated firms of the Gruppo Italiano Produttori Dischi are 19. All Italian publishers are members of Sedrim except, Gallazzi (Francis Day); Abate (Connelly); Carish (Southern Music); Alfredo Rossi (Ariston); Carlo Alberto Rossi (C. A. Rossi) and Bottoni-Panzuti (Cielo-Girl). These six publishers form the younger generation of Italian publishing firms. When it was time to renew their contract with Sedrim last August, which would have linked Italian publishers to Sedrim for a period of ten years, the above men-tioned firms decided not to renew. The six editors intend to create an organiza-tion of their own which can fulfill the duties of Sedrim. Mr. Frachetti informed me that after an interruption of three months, from January 1st to April 1st, the contacts between the Gruppo Italiano Produttori Dischi and Sedrim have been resumed. 
PEE WEE KING

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



A.T.E. Exec Comments On Gaming Bill | Wurlitzer Awards \$1000 Scholarship

Mr. John Singleton, Secretary and General Manager of The Amusement Caterers Association in this country sends the following message: "As Organizer of the 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition held here last February I send my greetings and best wishes to the Organizers and all concerned with the 1960 M.O.A. Convention in Chicago. Our interest is more than academic as obviously many of the new machines and equipment which will be on show for the first time will be seen at our next A.T.E. At this point it is still not possible to say where our 1961 Convention will be held—the enormous success of this year's show with an all-time record number of exhibitors and visitors, indicates that we have outgrown The Royal Horticultural Hall and an all out effort is being made to explore the possibility of finding a larger venue for future Conventions. It may well be that failure to find a suitable site in London will necessitate moving to the provinces—although this is not altogether desirable."

getner desirable." Commenting on the British Government's new Betting and Gaming Bill, which has now gone through the Committee stage, thus advancing one step further, Singleton said, "At the instigation of the A.C.A. many new amendments have been made most of them to the advantage of the trade—the only major reversal being the reduction to five years of the present ten year permit for existing sites. However, there is no reason to suppose that extensions will not be granted to well conducted sites. Indeed, promises have been made by the Minister that further safeguards will be put into

the Bill ensuring that where a site has been properly conducted there should be no fear that such a permit, when it expires, will not be renewed. There are quite a number of fresh amendments tabled by the Government, mainly concerning betting. The next step is the Report stage which may well take two or three days—then follows the third reading before the Bill is presented to The House of Lords for approval.

for approval. "It may be that The House of Lords will make still further amendments in which case the Bill will be passed back to the House of Commons for further debate. In any case the final outcome is not expected until July at the earliest."

CHICAGO—"Whispering Joe" Wilson, of television bowling fame, will be in and out of the MOA exhibit area this week, as much as his very busy schedule will permit. While there, he can most readily be reached at booths 68 and 69 where Bill Weikel (Fischer Sales) has made arrangements to provide almost continuous viewing of a film of one of the half hour TV shows "10/20 Billiards," now running once a week in Detroit, St. Louis, Decatur and Cincinnati. There is every reason to believe that this TV sports hit show will soon also be scheduled in Columbus, Philadelphia and other eastern slots. Wilson said that wherever the show is on there is evidence that the public

Wilson said that wherever the show is on there is evidence that the public is showing an avid appetite for billiard play. Ops and locations in the Chicago area can cite increased cash box earnings on coin billiard tables last fall while the "10/20" TV show was on "live" in the Windy City area. Joe also states that the same factors are at work for billiards insofar as public interest trends are concerned that sparked the tremendous explosion in the bowling field these past few years.

The old "pool hall" prejudices are giving way to modern billiard palace techniques, where new equipment, carpeted floors, panelled walls and attractive color motifs provide the basis for stimulated customer relations and updated promotion techniques which include rigid supervision, parent-signed permit cards for youngsters, professional instruction, exhibition matches and even "ladies' day" on a once-a-week schedule.

Frank Oliva, co-producer and referee on the "10/20" show, will be on hand most of the time at Fischer's booths to answer specific questions as well as demonstrate fundamentals of billiard play.

Bill Weikel, sales manager for Fischer, states that plans are almost complete for a "packaged" plan which should interest ops, distribs and locations in that increased earnings can be engineered through proper promotion of tournament play backed up by a series of weekly "10/20" TV billiard shows.

The enthusiasm exhibited by Wilson, Oliva and Weikel seems to be

In addition, the firm has expanded into the vending field with much success and today operates a full-line automatic cafeteria in the Kieler Howardtswerke, in Germany. The shipbuilding firm is one of the largest in the world employing more than 14,-000 people. This he hopes to accomplish during the summer of 1960.

Beyond any doubt, Willie has spent much time and money with these activities, but, as he says, "Every minute and every penny spent is well worthwhile."

Now, the point is, anyone connected with the coin machine business is capable of doing the same type of work in his own town and in his own community according to Blatt. Willie believes that by involving yourself in the many activities mentioned above, it will go a long way in bringing about good public relations and a better understanding of the people in the coin machine industry.

Willie Blatt has spent almost 35 years in the coin machine industry, and he believes that the time has arrived when all segments of this industry should get together for the purpose of fighting adverse legislation, confiscatory taxation, adverse publicity, and what he terms "unfair competition."

Edelman Offers Tape Conversion Units Doubles Amount Of Playing Time

NEW YORK—Iz Edelman, president, Cine-Sonic Sound Corp., this city, with plant in Detroit, has announced that conversions are available for tape machines, used for background music systems, which are currently using 3¼ sized tapes. The conversion will permit machines to play 1% tapes thereby doubling the playing time from one hour to two hours, before the music repeats. At the same time each student dons a set of earphones and either takes instruction or listens to foreign language records piped through the system.'

Seeburg Announces "Artist Of Week" Program Phonos To Display Panels For 331/3 Disks

CHICAGO—J. C. Gordon, vice presi-dent of The Seeburg Corporation, this city, has announced the release, through the company's worldwide dis-tributing organization, of a "dynamtributing organization, of a "dynam-ically new merchandising program" in connection with its stereophonic Model "Q" phonograph. A series of four re-gional sales meetings was scheduled to be held in Chicago, New York, New Orleans, and Los Angeles last week to detail the plan to Seeburg distribu-tors.

The program ties in directly with the new seven-inch 33-1/3 stereo sin-gle record which was introduced to the trade last fall and is currently be-ing produced by a total of 18 record companies: ABC Paramount, Decca, Laurie, Brunswick, Epic, Liberty, Ca-dence, Everest, MGM, Capitol, Guy-den, Roulette, Columbia, Jamie, Verve, Coral, King and World Pacific. Seeburg has redesigned the display panels atop its "160" and "100" ver-sions of the "Q" line to accommodate a seven inch square lithographed re-production of a specific best-selling album. Each album features a top vocal or instrumental artist. The bal-ance of the display panel headlines: Seeburg Presents "THE ARTIST OF THE WEEK" in 33-1/3 Stereo. Di-rectly beneath the illuminated display panel, appropriate brackets highlight five separate title strips. These detail the ten tunes from the single records selected from the artist's best selling album which is featured. The litho-graphed album reproductions and title strips can be replaced in seconds each week or two by the operator or his strips can be replaced in seconds each week or two by the operator or his route man so that a new artist and new records can be featured, stated Gordon.

Each of the record companies making 33-1/3 stereo singles is partici-pating in the Seeburg program. Each

pating in the Seeburg program. Each is releasing one or more special pack-ages complete with records, litho re-productions of album covers and title strips, according to Gordon. "This is a merchandising program aimed to benefit both operator and lo-cation owner alike," said Gordon. "We have noted for a long time the trend in consumer listening, and resultant buving, habits. It is no news to anyhave noted for a long time the trend in consumer listening, and resultant buying, habits. It is no news to any-one that stereo is the future of the record industry and of all related in-dustries such as our own. It is also well known that the 33-1/3 album rec-ord is the dominating commodity in the business today and accounts for well over three-quarters of all record sales. It is also apparent that 45 RPM single record sales have been declin-ing—and, that the industry is less committed to a "45" stereo single record today than it was a year ago. "We feel, in analyzing the situa-tion," continued Gordon, "that here is a golden opportunity to capitalize on the proven and logical direction of the music business and to turn it into a merchandising program of substance for the music operator. It stands to reason that if the consumer, and this includes everyone from teenagers to oldsters, buys and wants to hear ste-reo album records in his home, that desire can be no less in his place of entertainment. "Furthermore, he is being denied the opportunity of hearing this music

entertainment. "Furthermore, he is being denied the opportunity of hearing this music 'on location' by the inability of the music operator to obtain single rec-ord versions of best selling album se-lections. And we agree with a grow-ing number of the record companies that the 33-1/3 stereo single record may well be the answer to both these problems—the decline in singles sales problems—the decline in singles sales and the unavailability of stereo at the singles level. "Our program is designed to bring

this music to the location and to dis-play the artist and his album in the most dramatic and unusual method we could conceive. This is the reasoning behind the design of the 'Artist of the Week' display panel and merchan-

dising program. "What is needed more than any-thing else in our business today," said Gordon, "is a new idea that will create excitement at the location level like the first 100-selection phonograph did in 1949. It benefits the location in

a dozen obvious ways. But most important to us, it benefits our opera-

portant to us, it benefits out opera-tors. "With a really effective and desir-able music merchandising piece they are in a position to negotiate long term contracts which include more equitable commission arrangements with their locations. This is their need today with the rising cost of doing business—the need to get back on a sound basis with their customer, the location.

"We believe that the 'Artist of the Week' program is built on the bed-rock foundation of public taste and preference and that it will be an in-

valuable tool to the operator. In connection with the new pro-gram Seeburg has also arranged for the production of two film presentathe production of two film presenta-tions—one to explain and demonstrate the program to the music operator and the other to present it to the location. The film presentation is shown by means of a portable sound projector and was produced by Visual Com-munications, Inc. of New York.

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

LONDON—In an interview with Lil-lian Shaw, honorary secretary of the Phonograph Operators Association here, The Cash Box received an up-to-date outlook on the coin machine business in this country, as seen from the largest operator trade group in Britain. Mrs. Shaw wished MOA and its members the best during this 10th an-nual convention and compared it to

members the best during this 10th an-nual convention and compared it to Britain's coin industry association, on a proportionate level. "Greetings to the President and all members of the M.O.A. as they begin another year of endeavour. American friends, visiting us for the first time, invariably comment on how different the Juke Box Industry, in this small Island, is to the gigantic enterprise carried on throughout the length and breadth of the United States. Terri-torially, the whole of Great Britain could be dropped into a corner of one of your States—yet, if it was, you would have to visualize a population of fifty-million clustered therein. "Up to 1950 there were less than


five hundred boxes scattered amongst the fifty-million. In 1955, when P.O.A. was formed, there were not more than one thousand. Coin-operated vending was something which the British pub-lic, with its conservative and insular found difficult to assimilate and, in particular, the idea of slot-music raised indignant opposition from almost every side. Citizens were from almost every side. Citizens were extremely self-conscious when plac-ing a coin in a machine and selecting a number; they worried as to what on-lookers would think of them and whether their choice would give of-fense. After a while, the site owner, who had been bold enough to offer his customers music. found his trade customers music, found his trade vastly increased. His bar, or cafe was full at the expense of those of his com-petitors and it looked all set for Op-

petitors and it looked all set for Op-erators to forge ahead. "Then there arose a greater menace to the progress of the coin-operated Phonograph—the Local Authority. We are ruled by a number of ancient Statutes drafted for a way of life dif-ferent from modern conditions and alien to an electronic age. This gives power to innumerable County Councils to determine whether or not music to determine whether or not music may be played in their particular area,

to determine whether or not music may be played in their particular area, quite irrespective of whether or not the Citizens want it. There is no ap-peal against a ruling, there need be no reason given for a decision and the Local Authority was prejudiced. The juke box became their whipping horse, they linked it with every crime, pil-loried it in Press and Pulpit and fea-tured it as an overwhelming evil. "Such was the position facing P.O.A. in its first year. Public rela-tions were strained to the utmost and it was indeed a slow, uphill fight. A policy of compromise and conciliation finally prevailed and the barriers, al-though not yet completely down, are considerably lower and fewer. Today, opposition is confined to isolated dis-tricts and high ranking politicians are saying that unreasonable prejudice must be scrapped. "From its inception P.O.A. have studied the problems which faced the

must be scrapped. "From its inception P.O.A. have studied the problems which faced the Industry in your country and have tried to profit from your experience. We are not so troubled with the rate





cutting which, in the past, reduced your Operators to a small profit mar-gin and good relations have mostly been maintained one with another, which lessens site-poaching. We have found that in a dispute between Op-erators the winner is the Site Owner. "Another vexatious matter, which has no doubt also troubled M.O.A. has been the search for an equitable ar-

has no doubt also troubled M.O.A. has been the search for an equitable ar-rangement between Royalty Bodies and the Phonograph Operators. In the United Kingdom there are two—The Performing Right Society Ltd., and Phonographic Performances Ltd. In a compact territory it is easier for these Societies to enforce a standard fee from coast to coast, irrespective of local conditions, than it is in the great American continent with its varying State controls. Many Operators in the U.K. resent what they consider to be an unfair double royalty and P.O.A. is faced with the difficulty of striving, on the one hand, to get the best terms for its Members and on the other hand,

of upholding the rights given these Societies under the Copyright Act. Naturally, none of the compromises are entirely satisfactory, but the es-sential point of the issue is the con-duct of a respectable trade. Relations between P.O.A. and the Royalty Groups have, in the main, been friendly and conducted in an atmos-phere of mutual understanding. Our role is clear: it is to keep the trade on an even keel of legitimacy. A prop-erly conducted Industry must be pre-pared to accept prevailing conditions, always with the proviso that every ef-fort is made to better them. "Opinion in the U.K. is sharply di-vided on the advisability of joining games and vending machines with a music round. Both Trade Associations should, however, never lose sight of the fundamental fact that the busi-ness, which they strive to represent, is basically that of music selling. Mu-sic knows no frontiers and from time immemorial has been one of man's



greatest consolations and greatest greatest consolations and greatest pleasures. With these thoughts, best wishes for an enjoyable Convention are offered to M.O.A. coupled with a successful years trading," concluded Mrs. Shaw.





"The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory. his territory.









