There's More To The TEENAGER MARKET Than Meets The Eye

For several years now, the record industry has experienced an expanding market. We saw sales figures reach their highest point ever last year and the prospect is that we may go 50% over even that amount this year.

Many reasons have been advanced for this expansion. There has been, for instance, the increase in the number of juke boxes throughout the country and their larger capacity; there has been a modernization of sales procedures which now takes advantage of the latest developments in placing merchandise before the public; there has been a development of the packaged goods field that was all but unforeseen only a short while ago. But perhaps more important than all these reasons is that the population of the United States is expanding at a phenomenal rate and that this expansion is projected for decades to come.

As far as single records go, one of its largest markets is among teenagers. We would like to quote therefore a recent article from the Wall Street Journal, which reports on a presentation made by the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association. "Its findings, based on a research study conducted among 4,940 teenagers by Engene Gilbert & Co., indicate that there are 16,000,000 boys and girls aged 13 through 19 who have \$9,000,000,000 to spend each year. This represents money earned or received as allowances. By 1965, accord-

ing to the study, the market is expected to expand to 24,000,000 boys and girls with at least \$14,000,000,000 1956-value dollars to spend."

We dare say that although the record industry may be getting some share of the billions of dollars that teenagers have to spend, it certainly is not getting enough of it.

Record firms face a tremendous challenge today. They are all geared for an expanding market and there's no going back without some highly unpleasant results. Therefore they must go out and actively promote new business instead of just waiting for it to come to them. Of course the statistics just quoted indicate that merely by the increase expected in the number of teenagers in the next ten years, business will automatically increase. But it really isn't enough to increase sales merely in the same proportion. The record industry must garner a greater share of the teenager dollar to make more than pedestrian progress.

Such a project is going to require imagination, daring and the development of new promotional approaches. But it's obvious that the effort could be well worth it. For there are going to be lots more teenagers. They are going to have the money to spend. What the record industry must do more than ever before is show them why they should buy records in preference to all the other demands that will be made upon their purchasing power.

On December 2, B.G. and his 13-piece crew leave for Bangkok, Thailand, where they open on Dec. 7th for a two-week appearance at the American Exhibit of the Bangkok Trade Fair. Accompanying the band throughout the Far East will be singer Dottie Reid.

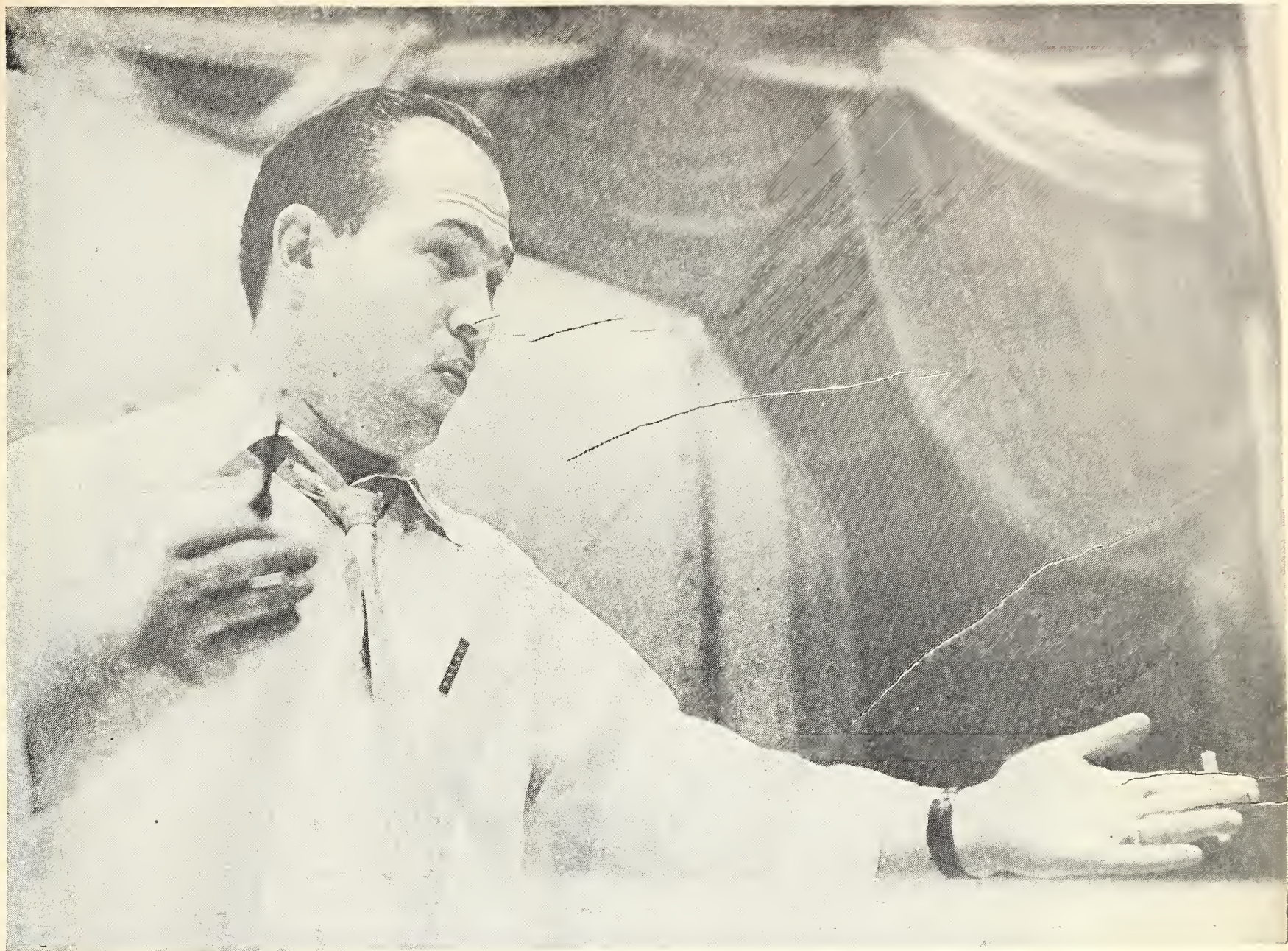

WDOK Stages First Annual Hi-Fi Show

CLEVELAND—The first annual high-fidelity fair in Cleveland, sponsored by Radio Station WDOK, ended November 18 with close to 10,000 fans having attended.

The two-day show was held from noon to 10 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 17 and 18 at Hotel Cleveland. Sixteen distributors housed more than 60 different products in 22 rooms.

The show was sponsored by WDOK, one of Cleveland's popular music stations. The AM-FM station's pop disk jockey, Norman Wain, was in charge of the show. Fred Wolf is owner of WDOK.

Distributors at the show were elated at the huge turn-out. They sold thousands of dollars worth of equipment. Many said the quality of the crowds was the best in any fair they had seen. One representative who had participated in many shows has already put in a bid for the Hotel Cleveland Ball Room. This year he had a room suite.

Prominent names in the hi-fi trade were represented: Fisher, Ampex, RCA Victor, British Industries, Bell Sound Systems, Scott Dictograph, Pentron, Audax, Harman-Kardon, Bozak, Lansing, Fairchild, McIntosh and many others.

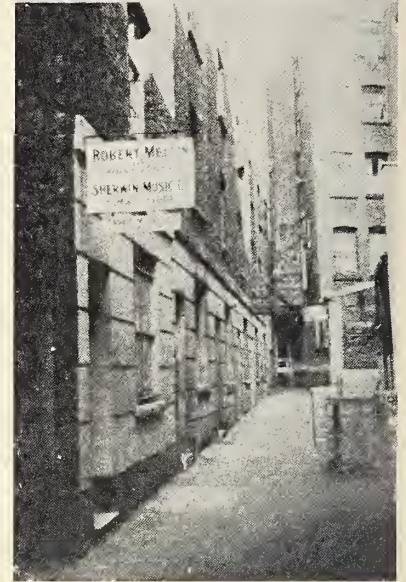
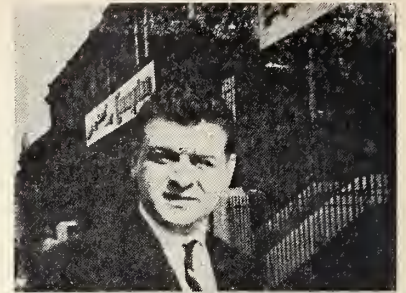

New Disk Series Inaugurated by American Academy and Composers Recordings

NEW YORK—The American Academy and the National Institute of Arts and Letters, in collaboration with Composers Recordings, Inc., have inaugurated a new series of recordings of compositions by winners of Grants in Music of the National Institute. The first disk to be released presents the work of two 1955 award winners: Henry Brant's "Angels and Devils," a Concerto for Solo Flute and Flute Orchestra, and Irving Fine's "Mutability," a Cycle of Six Songs for Contralto and Piano, and his "Music for Piano." Eunice Alberts is the soloist in Fine's song cycle, with the composer at the piano. The Brant work is conducted by the composer, with Frederick Wilkins playing the solo flute.

The National Institute confers fifteen Grants of \$1,000 each annually to artists in varied fields, in recognition of distinguished work. Three of these are given to composers. The Academy and Institute give exhibitions of the works of Grantees in painting, sculpture and literature each year. The difficulty of offering a similar service to the award winners in music has been solved in the past by presenting the music in concert form, either in the Academy Auditorium, Carnegie Hall or at Town Hall. But it is now conceded that a single performance of a contemporary work reaches only a limited audience, while a recording can be played over various radio stations and can be acquired by private as well as school and college collections all over the country. The Academy and the Institute therefore decided to subsidize the production of Grant winners' works on disks through Composers Recordings, Inc., which was formed last year to offer to the public significant works of American composers never before available on records. Although Composers Recordings, Inc. is a business enterprise, its primary objective is not so much to make money as to advance the interest of contemporary composers by enabling their works to be heard. All royalties accruing to the Academy and Institute on the sale of records by Grant winners will go back into a revolving fund for the production of records by other Grantees.

Pat Boone Signs With 20th Century Fox; To Make 1 Picture a Year For 7 Years

HOLLYWOOD — 22-year-old Dot recording star Pat Boone has signed a seven-year contract with 20th Century Fox Studios after some competitive bidding by other lots. Contract calls for one picture a year for seven years at a total value of \$1,000,000. This is not an exclusive contract but 20th has first option for additional pictures within any given year which would have to be negotiated at a higher figure. Boone is free to work elsewhere if Fox doesn't pick him up for more than one picture a year.

Boone, who rose to the heights of popularity on the wings of his recording for Dot Records, was an unknown less than two years ago. In that short space of time he has cut 8 single releases for Dot, which are reported to have sold approximately 7,000,000 copies. Randy Wood, president of Dot Records, announced that he will very shortly present Pat with three gold records, denoting the sale of a million or more copies on each of "Ain't That a Shame", "I'll Be Home", and "I Almost Lost My Mind".

Boone has never appeared in a motion picture although his voice is heard behind the main title of Allied Artists' current release "Friendly Persuasion". Boone can be seen daily as a regular member on the Arthur Godfrey network television show.

Boone's first movie role will be opposite Terry Moore in "Bernadine", to be produced by Sam Engel, directed by Henry Levin, scheduled to go into production February 4.

At the present time, Boone is in his senior year at Columbia University. Whether or not he will skip a semester and graduate from Columbia or transfer to UCLA and become a permanent resident of Los Angeles has not yet been decided.

Currently in the negotiation stage is a network television show which will be Pat's own. Randy Wood, who has Pat under personal management, disclosed that a number of top national firms have been angling for the sponsorship of the television show. Lee Cooley, long associated with the Perry Como Show, will act as producer.

It is the intention of the National Council of Disk Jockeys for Public Service to help in steering their teen-aged listeners onto a course of good citizenship. The membership aims to accomplish this by instituting a series of interesting social programs that will provide its young followers with wholesome and educational entertainment and relaxation.

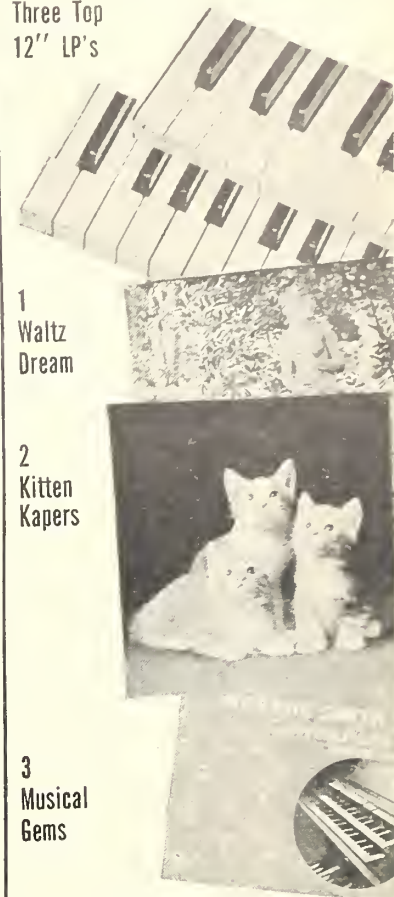
Reason for the booking, it is understood, is the turn-away business the orchestra did at the Washington, D.C. Statler from September 20 to October 13.

POPULAR

"JERRY LEWIS JUST SINGS"—With Orchestra Conducted By Buddy Bregman—Decca DL 8410 (1-12" LP)

COME RAIN OR COME SHINE; SHINE ON YOUR SHOES; HOW LONG HAS THIS BEEN GOING ON; I'VE GOT THE WORLD ON A STRING; ROCK-A-BYE YOUR BABY WITH A DIXIE MELODY; BYE BYE BABY; I'M SITTING ON TOP OF THE WORLD; GET HAPPY; BY MYSELF; BACK IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD; SOMETIMES I'M HAPPY; BIRTH OF THE BLUES.

One might ask, as one of Jerry Lewis' songs does, "How Long Has This Been Going On?" For, here, the comic takes a breather from his usual antics and tries his larynx on 12 evergreens, supplying a swinging skill on the majority of them. When a ballad is offered (i.e. "By Myself"), Jerry again uncovers a delightful musical sense by delivering the tune with sincerity and a particularly noteworthy regard for its lyrical message. Buddy Bregman and the ork seem to be delighted with the goings on by tastefully supporting Jerry all the way. Two of the sessions on the waxing, "Come Rain Or Come Shine" and "Rock-A-Bye Your Baby With A Dixie Melody" are doing well on singles and should greatly aid the sales of this unusual Jerry Lewis effort. Jerry has been personally plugging the platter on radio-tv, too.

"CALENDAR GIRL"—Julie London—Orchestra Conducted By Pete King—Liberty SL-9002 (1-12" LP)

JUNE IN JANUARY; FEBRUARY BRINGS THE RAIN; MELANCHOLY MARCH; I'LL REMEMBER APRIL; PEOPLE WHO ARE BORN IN MAY; MEMPHIS IN JUNE; SLEIGH RIDE IN JULY; TIME FOR AUGUST; SEPTEMBER IN THE RAIN; THIS OCTOBER; NOVEMBER TWILIGHT; WARM DECEMBER; THE THIRTEENTH MONTH.

Somehow the months will never be the same, thanks to this latest Liberty entry by the always-in-season thrush, Julie London. For each month (including "the thirteenth") Miss London has a song (standard or new one), and an appropriately clad London on the book-type package. Pete King's orchestral backing and occasional choral support has greater fullness than Miss London or her listeners are accustomed to hearing. But still the singer's sultry vocal touch is given much room to move about. Disk should be another sales bonanza for dealers who enjoyed healthy sales with the lark's recent smash LP "Julie Is Her Name."

"THE TEENAGERS"—Featuring Frankie Lymon—Gee 701 (1-12" LP)

WHY DO FOOLS FALL IN LOVE; PLEASE BE MINE; WHO CAN EXPLAIN; SHARE; LOVE IS A CLOWN; I PROMISE TO REMEMBER; I WANT YOU TO BE MY GIRL; I'M NOT A KNOW IT ALL; BABY, BABY, BABY; ABC'S OF LOVE; AM I FOOLING MYSELF AGAIN; I'M NOT A JUVENILE DELINQUENT.

All of the group's hit singles plus two new entries by the Teenagers make this Gee pressing a sure-fire sales smash. Led by the exciting voice of 14-year-old Frankie Lymon, the group takes 10 previously released encores (i.e. "Why Do Fools Fall In Love," "I'm Not A Know It All") and presents two new ditties, "Love Is A Clown" and "Am I Fooling Myself Again," the former a fast-paced item and the latter a ballad-type rock 'n' roller. Eye-catching cover shot of the kids. Potent teenage fare. Should be a tremendous seller this Christmas. Top stock for rock 'n' roll enthusiasts.

"CAN'T WE BE FRIENDS?"—Jane Powell—Verve MG V-2023 (1-12" LP)

MY BABY JUST CARES FOR ME; FOR EVERY MAN THERE'S A WOMAN; IMAGINATION; HOORAY FOR LOVE; I GOT IT BAD AND THAT AIN'T GOOD; EV'RY TIME; COMES LOVE; LET'S FACE THE MUSIC; IN LOVE IN VAIN; HOW COME YOU DO ME LIKE YOU DO; CAN'T WE BE FRIENDS; THE THINGS WE DID LAST SUMMER.

Filmdom's famed soprano star, Jane Powell, cuts her initial LP for Verve and material-wise, the album gives Miss Powell many moments to let her hair down. The garden of goodies includes such offbeat (for this singer) items as "Hooray For Love" and "How Come You Do Me Like You Do," which Miss Powell carries with a surprisingly energetic "umph." Back on her familiar road, the thrush sentimentally calms down with such pieces as "Ev'ry Time" and "In Love In Vain." Buddy Bregman provides his usual skillful support. Extremely important name value here for stock purposes. Her current success "True Love" should boost sales of this LP.

"INTERNATIONAL CASE"—Russ Case And His Orchestra—Vik LX-1064 (1-12" LP)

GOODBYE TO ROME; VOLA COLOMBA; SUDDENLY; MARIA BONITA; CONTIGO EN LA DISTANCIA; I GET IDEAS; UNDER THE BRIDGES OF PARIS; POOR PEOPLE OF PARIS; TU RETRATO; WITHOUT YOU; THE STORY OF LOVE; BESAME MORENITA.

As the title of the set cleverly puts it, this collection of foreign and domestic melodies is conducted by the well-traveled mood music hand of Russ Case. The Case "baggage" consists of a resonant string section and suitably sentimental arrangements that capture the romantic aroma of each place visited. Two recent chart items included are "Goodbye To Rome" and "Poor People Of Paris." Attractive package. Solid mood offering.

"... IN THE MOOD FOR A SONG?"—Corky Shayne—The Johnnie Pate Quartet—Salem SLP-1 (1-12" LP)

IF I ONLY HAD A BRAIN; HE'S JUST MY BILL; MY LOVE IS A WANDERER; BACK IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD; NOW MORE THAN EVER; EVERYTIME; AUTUMN IN NEW YORK; JUST SQUEEZE ME; I'M GLAD THERE IS YOU; TEARDROPS; I HEAR A RHAPSODY; TWO SLEEPY PEOPLE.

Salem Records' initial LP venture is also the disk debut for Chicago stylist Corky Shayne. The singer can skillfully fondle the sentimental aspects of a melody as with "He's Just My Bill," play with a tune (i.e. "Everytime") or strike hard (i.e. "I Hear A Rhapsody"). Accompaniment by the Johnnie Pate Quartet complements Miss Shayne's vocal points of view formidably. Striking intro for both diskery and artist.

"CHA-CHA-CHA—MERENGUES"—Johny Segui, El Indio, Domino Orchestra, Saliens Orchestra, Orchestra Cubana—Flair-X FL-DLP 101 (1-12" LP)

RUMBA EN CHA-CHA-CHA; RICO VACION; GOZA CHA-CHA-CHA; EL TRUQUITO; I'LL ALWAYS LOVE YOU; ME LO DIJO ADELA; TIRAME EL CABO; MARIA; NO ME LLEVES PARO OSCURO; LA EMPALIZA; SI TU NO, LA OTRA; TANYA.

Newly formed Flair-X makes its initial entry into the LP listings by taking the reliable cha-cha-cha and merengue course. Five orks are on hand to supply the Latin dance floor fan with 12 numbers devoted to either of the dance sensations. Credit the boys in the five crews for a disk with a little extra cha-cha-cha and merengue punch. The platter's polish should result in commendable sales.

JAZZ

"THE JIMMY GIUFFRE CLARINET"—Atlantic 1238 (1-12" LP)

SO LOW; DEEP PURPLE; THE SIDE PIPERS; MY FUNNY VALENTINE; QUIET COOK; THE SHEPHERDER; FASCINATIN' RHYTHM; DOWN HOME.

One of the less hackneyed approaches on the clarinet is that of Jimmy Giuffre. The usually driving instrument is, for the most part, replaced by a deliberate, lazy-afternoon type of attack, virtually a sigh into the stick. On the flip side, the jazzman is more forceful on such pieces as "Fascinatin' Rhythm," yet the subtle inspection of the tunes closely parallels Giuffre's first side excursions. Notables such as Shorty Rogers (trumpet), Shelley Manne (drums) and Bud Shank (alto flute) seem eager to mind the clarinetist's ideas. Eye-catching cover. Fine, off-the-beaten-path jazz disk.

"THE HAWK IN PARIS"—Coleman Hawkins (Tenor Sax)—Manny Albam And His Orchestra—Vik LX-1059 (1-12" LP)

APRIL IN PARIS; MON HOMME; UNDER PARIS SKIES; MIMI; LA CHNOUF; LA VIE EN ROSE; LA MER; PARIS IN THE SPRING; I LOVE PARIS; MADEMOISELLE DE PAREE; CHIENS PERDU SANS COLLIER; TU N' PEUX PAS T' FIGURER.

Coleman Hawkins makes his initial pressing for Vik a provocative one and, in keeping with the subject material, makes a sentimental tour of tunes associated with Paris. With excellent support from Manny Albam's assortment (3) of combos, the Hawk either nestles warmly (i.e. "Paris In The Spring") or offers flighty, driving sessions (i.e. "Mimi") of mostly familiar melodies. Arty, colorful pic on package. Strong jazz and possible mood attraction.

"THE PAT MORAN QUARTET"—Bethlehem BCP-6007 (1-12" LP)

THIS CAN'T BE LOVE; A FOGGY DAY; WHAT A DIFFERENCE A DAY MAKES; HAVE YOU MET MISS JONES; I SHOULD CARE; GONE WITH THE WIND; SOMEBODY LOVES ME; THE BEST THINGS IN LIFE ARE FREE; SUNDAY KIND OF LOVE; MEDLEY: SPRING IS HERE/IT MIGHT AS WELL BE SPRING; TWO SLEEPY PEOPLE; PICK YOURSELF UP.

The inventive Pat Moran Quartet, which effectively combines the vocal and instrumental jazz ideas, keeps firing creative sparks throughout this Bethlehem pressing. The evergreen material is broken up into three categories, single vocal efforts, the vocal blend of the group's four members and instrumentals only, spearheaded by Moran's sparkling keyboard work. Bev Kelley weaves excitingly through her vocal chores, especially in "What A Difference A Day Makes," the group vocal highlight is "Pick Yourself Up" and the medley of "Spring Is Here" and "It Might As Well Be Spring" instrumentally glows with its inner warmth. A versatile, and always entertaining group.

CLASSICAL

"LEONARD BERNSTEIN ON BEETHOVEN"—Leonard Bernstein—Bruno Walter Conducting The Entire Symphony With The Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra of New York—Columbia CL 918 (1-12" LP)

Columbia has made available the first of Leonard Bernstein's musical discussions seen on Omnibus, a concise analysis of Beethoven's first movement of his great Fifth Symphony. The major portion of the Bernstein lecture involves an evaluation of notes that never became part of the work, how they would sound if included in the symphony and reasons why Bernstein thinks they were rejected. All this is done with clarity and fascinating insight by the conductor-composer. The second side features Bruno Walter and Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra in a powerful reading of the symphony itself. Package has reproductions of the rejected manuscripts. The Bernstein discussion should give the disk a sales advantage over the commanding catalogue of the opus.

DELIBES: Coppelia—Orchestra Of The Royal Opera House Covent Garden—Robert Irving, Conducting—RCA Victor LM-2035 (1-12" LP)

DELIBES: Sylvia—The Philharmonia Orchestra—Robert Irving, Conductor—RCA Victor LM-2036 (1-12" LP)

Two indestructible ballet scores by Leo Delibes have been recorded by Robert Irving, the musical director of the Sadler Wells Ballet Company, on two separate Victor disks. These melodious delights are given their sprightly due by Irving leading the Orchestra Of The Royal Opera House Covent Garden ("Coppelia") and the Philharmonia Orchestra ("Sylvia"). The waxings were recorded in England, beautifully. Each package features a ballet dancer painted by Degas. Page of explanatory notes is included. There is more music of the works on this pressing than is generally available.

STRAVINSKY: Firebird Suite—KODALY: Hary Janos Suite—The Concertgebouw Orchestra Of Amsterdam—Eduard Van Beinum, Conductor—Epic LC 3290 (1-12" LP)

Color, as the swirling mass of hues on the package implies, is the common bond between the two works featured on this Epic release. Both pieces, Stravinsky's "Firebird Suite" and Kodaly's "Hary Janos Suite," contain brilliant orchestrations, exciting, penetrating and, considering these times, extraordinary hi-fi show pieces. Thanks to a superb performance by Amsterdam's Concertgebouw Orchestra under Eduard Van Beinum's direction and dazzling sound, the disk takes an important position alongside the growing list of other available waxings of the two works.

CHRISTMAS ALBUMS

"MERRY CHRISTMAS FROM JONI"—Joni James—With Orchestra And Chorus Conducted By David Terry—MGM E3468 (1-12" LP)

Both the spiritual and sentimental aspects of the Yuletide season are brought into tender focus by popdom's frequent hit contributor, Joni James. The selections are practically split down the middle as far as the categories are concerned. Miss James' way with such noble pieces as "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear" and "Oh Holy Night" is compelling and sincere and her smooth ballad delivery hits the mark with such superior items as "The Christmas Song" and "Have Yourself A Merry Little Christmas." The singer's following has her at her vocal best here.

"CHRISTMAS TIME"—Fred Waring And The Pennsylvanians—Decca DL 8172 (1-12" LP)

The joy and reflection that the Holiday Season brings has always found able interpreters in Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians. Once again this ensemble imaginatively blends voices in a collection of melodies that each Xmas seems to make more beloved. These include such items as "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," "The Christmas Song" and "Joy To The World." Having Waring and the Pennsylvanians in the Christmas home should make things that much brighter. Year after year stock issue.

"A MERRY CHRISTMAS TO YOU"—From David Rose And His Orchestra—MGM E3469 (1-12" LP)

David Rose, who, the year round supplies mood music fans with polished lush disks, makes his Xmas offering one of high order. Twenty-four Holiday favorites (i.e. "Silent Night," "Joy To The World") are played continuously by the string strong ork with impeccable taste. Effective Holiday packaging. Quality performances and quantity of material make this set a major Christmas stock item.

"THE MAGIC OF CHRISTMAS"—Songs And Carols For A Family Christmas—Mary Mayo With Chorus And Orchestra Conducted By Leroy Holmes—MGM E3452 (1-12" LP)

The great backlog of Xmas favorites has, naturally, made many a Holiday package so far. This MGM pressing however, calls upon twelve new melodies written by lyricist Fay Tishman and Majorie Goetschius, adding a touch of originality for Holiday consumption while keeping the warmth of The Season intact. A major factor in the set's engaging quality is vocalist Mary Mayo, a singer whose vocal sincerity and grace add much to the package's glowing Christmas spirit. Appealing family scene at Xmas on cover.

"JINGLE BELLS"—Guy Lombardo And His Royal Canadians—Decca DL 8354 (1-12" LP)

A famous sound of some 30 years standing has a Merry Xmas greeting on this Decca release. The light Lombardo bounce takes its jaunty course through such happy Holiday items as "Jingle Bells" and "Rudolph, The Red Nosed Reindeer." Some of the sessions (i.e. "Winter Wonderland," "Christmas") feature the Andrews Sisters. Effective cover. This set will appeal to the adult Yuletide group with handsome sales results.

"ORGAN AND CHIMES"—Played By Owen Bradley—Coral CRL 57071 (1-12" LP)

The more serene and devotional aspects of the coming Day are reverently brought out in the organ and chimes work of Owen Bradley on this Coral Christmas offering. Assisted by fine recorded sound, Bradley covers such noble melodies as "Silent Night," "Joy To The World" and "Away In The Manger" with a direct and suitably restrained approach. It's one of those disks that can be played near the Xmas tree for a more inspiring effect.

"CHRISTMAS CAROLS IN HI-FI"—Carlos Salzedo, Harp—Mercury MG 50116 (1-12" LP)

The harp makes a rare solo Christmas appearance on this Mercury disk featuring harpist Carlos Salzedo. Salzedo has taken the trouble to transcribe the 20 selections for the instrument and the result is not only performances that reflect the Season's feeling, but also cleverly patterned arrangements that suit the range of the instrument most imaginatively. Eye appealing photo of Mistletoe on the package. These are skillful performances, excellently recorded, that should appeal to both the Xmas and classical-minded crowd.

"HOLIDAY MUSIC"—Played By Ashley Miller At The Mighty Organ Of The Radio City Music Hall—Mercury MG 20189 (1-12" LP)

The massive Radio City Music Hall pipe organ, with its numerous instrumental effects (cymbals, harps and snare drums) couldn't have a more propitious time to make one of its rare record entries. Playing Holiday favorites (i.e. "The First Noel," "The Christmas Song") adroitly is the organ's current master, Ashley Miller. Well recorded sound. Sparkling photo of the huge Radio City Christmas tree on the package. The disk carries heavy name value for the organ-minded Xmas buyer.

"CHRISTMAS IN EUROPE"—Christmas Carols From Spain, France, Italy, Holland, Denmark, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, England—Epic LN 3315 (1-12" LP)

This Epic release represents 9 European nations in Xmas selections using the services of an outstanding choir or orchestra in each country. Many of the Holiday melodies are familiar to these shores (Austria: "Silent Night, Holy Night"), while others are less well known here (Switzerland: "Tout Dort Dans La Nuit Sombre") but are, nevertheless, lovely expressions of the Yuletide spirit. Beautiful snow laden scene of a European city at dusk on package. Excellent Xmas purchase.

Jerry Lewis Promoting Two Interests

CHICAGO — Jerry Lewis, comic, philanthropist, and Decca singing star rushed through Chi on his way to the west coast this past week. Showing the rigors of all too few hours sleep, Lewis was still the laughable character millions of Americans have grown to love via TV, movies and now records.

Plugging not only his latest wax, "Rock-A-Bye Your Baby With A Dixie Melody" b/w "Come Rain Or Come Shine", Lewis gave a considerable length of his time, during interviews, to help strengthen the Muscular Dystrophy drive. On every show Lewis appeared the mike was turned over to him to make the appeal. Here many saw the serious side of Lewis for the first time. It looked good.

In an interview with *The Cash Box*, Lewis was most generous. In answer to questions about his new "single" act, Lewis had this to say.

"You ain't never going to see any one try harder than I will. Those people don't care who or what you work with. All they want is to be entertained and if you don't, you'll find out."

When asked about his similarity to the late Al Jolson, Lewis replied, "I do not emulate Jolson. This was just a fortunate accident. I do feel that I am influenced by the era Jolson came from."

How he was contracted to Decca was the next question.

"I filled in for Judy Garland at Vegas last year. I didn't know how to get off the stage so I sang her closing number, "Rock-A-Bye". My wife, Patty, liked the way I sang it straight and had me make a dub for our own personal collection. Decca heard it, liked it, recorded it. Easy."

Asked if he had any formal training as a singer Lewis replied, "I don't know how to sing. It starts in the stomach, goes through the neck, and when it gets out there," pointing to the audience, "I have no control over it."

Decca's Chi office reports the single is moving like a hit and that advance orders on LP "Jerry Lewis Just Sings" are amazing.

B+ "GUITAR RHUMBO" (1:59) [Excellorec BMI—J. Miller] Gable tries to follow his hit, "Congo Mambo", with a rhumba instrumental and turns in a very infectious wax. Deck is appealing in sound and tune. Can lightning strike twice?

LITTLE RICHARD

B+ "ALL AROUND THE WORLD" (2:25) [Venice BMI—Blackwell, Millet] Little Richard chants a quick beat jump telling how the cats are rocking all around the world. An infectious platter the kids should like. Little Richard's popularity will also help. Deck should be watched.

B+ "THE GIRL CAN'T HELP IT" (2:20) [Robbins ASCAP—Bobby Troup] Little Richard wails a flic tune with his energetic drive. Cute bouncer that could stir up some action. Two good sides, tho we feel they are not as strong as some of his previous powerhouse hits.

B+ "THE LAST MEAL" (2:14) [Goday BMI—Hammer] A somewhat gruesome idea for a rock and roll happy, but the deck is certainly different. This lad is just about to take the long walk to his execution, but he finds a way to stall. Told he can order anything he wants for his last meal he orders things like dinosaurs, a whole hippopotamus, a purple watermelon, etc. Says "I ain't goin' till you come back with it." Quick beat jump with a good performance. We think enough kids are going to like this to make it a money making deck.

C+ "PENNSYLVANIA BLUES" (2:50) [Antoine BMI—Edison] Slow beat blues done well and wailed with feeling. Chanter sings in a manner that captures your attention. Good blues, but not outstanding.

B+ "HONKY TONK" (2:22) [Billace BMI—Doggett, Shepherd, Scott, Butler, Glover] The nation's biggie is now fitted out with a vocal. Tommy Brown does the honors. A good release that will find its market, but in view of the overwhelming number of records already sold in its original form, the sale of this deck might be slowed somewhat. But it is definitely a side to be stocked.

B "PEACOCK ALLEY" (2:31) [Jay & Cee BMI—Butler, Ellis] The Doggett Combo drives through a happy middle beat jump with that so commercial sound. A crowd pleaser, especially in view of Doggett's current popularity.

B "HE'S MY BABY" (2:02) [Modern BMI—Hightower, Ling] Donna Hightower shouts out a quick beat jump with an enthusiastic treatment. Gal lends it plenty of excitement and the deck should get good action.

B "FLOYD'S GUITAR BLUES" (2:43) [Jay & Cee BMI—Smith, Columbo, Weigand] Good instrumental wailer with a sound that is different enough to command attention. This one will make good deejay programming and over the counter sales bait.

B+ "SO LONG, SO LONG" (2:56) [Excellorec BMI—Miller, Richardson] The repercussions of "Flying Saucer" are still being felt. Borrowing from the disk, this artist becomes Skinny Dynamo, the take-off on Fats Domino, and does a very close relative to "So Long". This tune is titled, "So Long, So Long". But—aside from the gimmicked name and the obvious similarity in tunes, the artist does a good job and the deck could start something. Keep an eye on it.

C "JINGLE BELLS" (2:19) [Excellorec BMI—J. Miller] Skinny does the standard Yule tune and does a rather weak reading of the pretty tune.

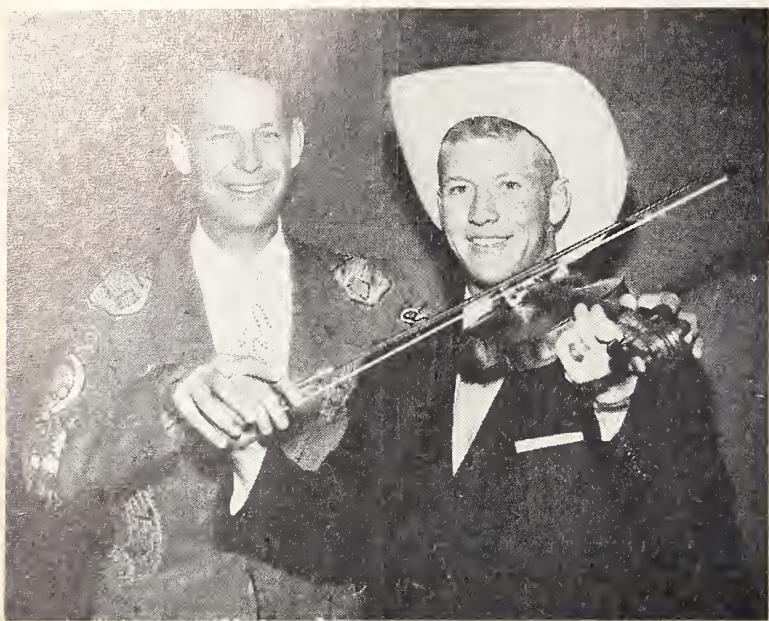

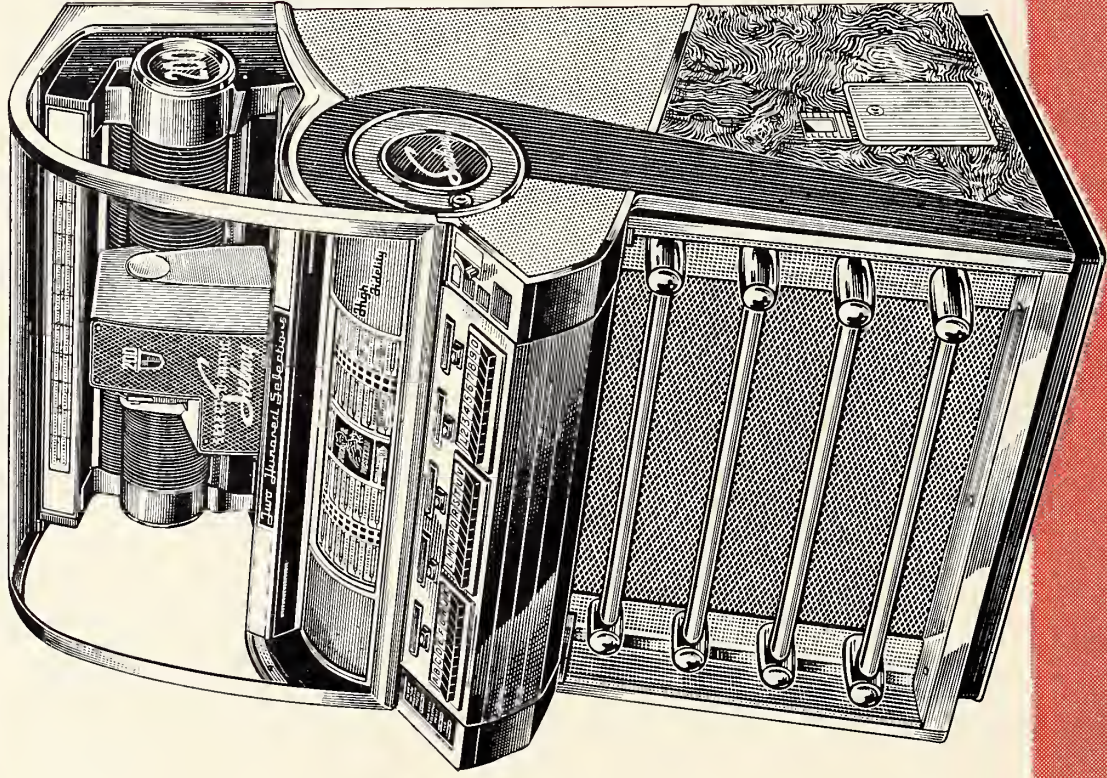

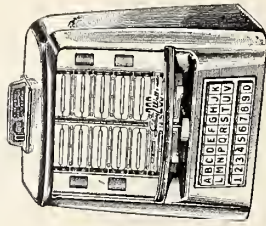

Here and There

SPARTANBURG, S. C.—At a dinner of the Spartanburg County Foundation, this city, Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange, told the guests that "Corporate philanthropy is the new 'growth industry' and now amounts to well over \$500 million a year." He cited four principal reasons for the upswing in corporate giving: "Conviction of a 'genuine need' to lend assistance to education, medical and social organizations"; "need for higher living standards and creating a healthier climate for the nation to enjoy"; "surmounting of legal obstacles in which the concept of corporate aid has been recognized by court rulings"; and "need for manpower trained in independent colleges to man the pumps of tomorrow's world." Funston said businessmen are fast realizing where their philanthropic responsibilities end. "They know, for example, their assistance must be offered without strings and without attempts to influence the policies of organizations they are supporting."

ST. LOUIS, MO.—When the conservative banking industry looks to the future optimistically, it's worth comment. A majority of nearly 700 bankers from 16 states polled at a meeting here last week look for no serious economic trouble in the year ahead. The poll was conducted at a meeting of 682 bankers attending the 10th Annual Conference of Bank Correspondents of the First National Bank in St. Louis. Only 2 per cent of the 415 bankers who filled out the questionnaires, expect business conditions to "fall off sharply" in the coming year. 38 per cent said they expect business to continue to improve; 30 per cent expect conditions to "remain about the same"; and 22 per cent expect business to "fall off slightly."

NEW YORK—With the dollar supreme on the foreign exchange market thruout the world, it is interesting to note that the Canadian dollar, this past week, broke thru \$1.04, climaxing a two-month steady advance that has brought this currency to its highest price in more than four years.

Chi Phono Ops Hold Big General Meeting

Many New Plans Advanced. Discuss Better Income Percentage for Ops. Officers of Recorded Music Service Assn. Report 1956 Great Year.

CHICAGO—This past week, Thursday, November 15, the Recorded Music Service Association of this city held its largest general meeting.

Over 90% of the membership of this noted organization was present in the beautiful Mural Room of the Bismarck Hotel in this city.

Many important subjects came up for discussion at this meeting. Among these the questions of gifts and loans to locations.

Also a general discussion as to bettering conditions for all the music operators in this area so that they could enjoy a finer return on their investments in automatic music.

Phil Levin, president of RMSA, discussed the many advantages which have accrued to the entire membership.

He told how the Federal Grand Jury, Anti-Trust Division, had returned the books of the organization and had dismissed this jury as of October 22, 1956.

Levin told how for 18 months the government's attorneys had tried to prove monopolistic practices but, in the end, the Grand Jury was dismissed with no action whatsoever being taken.

Levin reported, "The Recorded Music Service Association is one organization that continually works for the complete betterment of all conditions for its members."

"What's more", he stated, "we of the Recorded Music Service Association have been operating dime play for over six years now."

"This has helped our entire mem-

bership financially and has helped to build a strong and prosperous group of operators."

Levin also reported that the City of Chicago has issued 9,500 licenses for automatic music machines.

He then presented a proposal for 2 plays for 25c for the consideration of the membership.

Levin is so very much interested in *The Cash Box*' "10c play plus" plan. A complete presentation of this plan is being prepared for the members of RMSA.

In the past year, Phil Levin stated, there were 1,439 contracts signed. There were 545 investigations made thru the Commercial Phonograph Survey. Over 146 disputes were amicably settled between members by the association. Only 12 phonographs were reported lost and all 12 were recovered.

Decalcomanias were to be printed and passed out to all the members to be placed on the front glass of all their phonographs.

Refreshments were served after the meeting. All operators present remarked on the fact that the meeting was one of the best ever held and that the progress report was extremely encouraging to one and all.

Phil Levin took time out to compliment *The Cash Box* for sending its reporter and photographer to this meeting.

He said, "The Cash Box is the one and only publication that has attended and correctly publicized our meetings by direct personal contact."

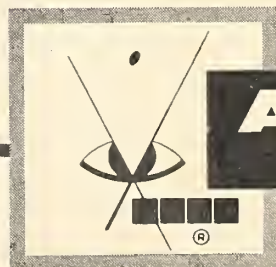



More Intensive Public Relations Program Urged

Willie Blatt Tries to Set Up "Teenage Dance" in Miami

CHICAGO — Ever since its inception, *The Cash Box* has been urging the industry to participate in every public relations effort possible. Due to the fact that the industry's growth is being rapidly recognized by the news media of the nation, operators everywhere are now being urged to intensify whatever public relations efforts they may be engaged in at the moment, and to institute other programs to portray the coin machines field in the best possible light.

Whatever the future holds in store for the members of the industry, leaders believe the one sure method to overcome any adverse news would be for all engaged in this business to intensify whatever public relations programs they now have under way. This would assure better understanding for themselves with officials, politicians, authorities, and especially, all the public in their communities.

One of the most important programs coinmen can institute, not only from the standpoint of better public relations for all the nation's operators, but even more important, because of the problem of juvenile delinquency thruout the country, is to create "Teenage Canteens".

"Teenage Canteens", an original proposal of *The Cash Box* a number of years ago, has been the subject of many editorials and articles in this publication. Tremendous acclaim has resulted from this proposal, with the fact that winter will find many of the nation's teenagers without any gathering places, operators are urged to get together in all cities and communities thruout the country and create "Teenage Canteens."

It is acknowledged that, not only does this mean finer public relations for all engaged in the industry, but it is a tremendously worthwhile effort on the part of all Americans.

Some coinmen have undertaken a "Teenage Canteen" program with considerable success. Others have tried, but obstacles have arisen. However, an experienced businessman knows that problems are always coming up, but they can be overcome by persistent effort.

One of those coinmen who tried seriously to establish a "Teenage Canteen" and was stymied due to conditions beyond his control was Willie Blatt of Miami, Fla. Blatt writes: "I have been trying for three years to get a 'Teenage' program going and so far I have met with very little success."

"Several months ago I was told by one of our radio stations to submit a written outline of one of my plans for a 'Teenage' dance, which was as follows", writes Blatt. "We could get the use of our city auditorium free of charge and have representatives of the police department chaperone this dance and to keep order. There would be some entertainment in between dances and the DJ's from a radio station would act as M.C.'s."

"The highlight of this dance would be as follows: We would place a 200 record juke box (with all the record strips covered so that they could not be read) on the platform and after the orchestra stops for a pause between dances, 200 teenagers will get a chance to guess the title of each record. If they guess correctly, they will receive a \$25 government bond, if not, all funds will be placed in a bank and would be used for scholarship grants.

"The reason for my failure to arouse more interest in this, and get the cooperation from our radio stations is due to the fact that I had no real working plan and couldn't guarantee its success. Also, the fact that nearly all politicians and city fathers wanted to get the glory for it, and couldn't agree among themselves as to who was to do what, did not help. Plus the fact that when I had everything worked out, the particular DJ whom I had consulted switched to another radio station.

"However, I am sure that with the proper approach and proof as to how much our program can help the teenagers, we can get them to sponsor and assist at some of our undertakings in all communities."

Blatt suggests that a foundation for a national effort along these lines be laid at the MOA meet by inviting DJ's to participate at a meeting.

(Editor's comment: Blatt's program is well worth considering. However, it is more or less a one-shot, big organized dance and entertainment meet. These type promotions take time, effort and a great deal of assistance from outsiders. What *The Cash Box* proposes is a permanent meeting place for teenagers, with adult supervision. All that is needed is a location of some kind, plus a juke box, Outside assistance from police forces, dj's, merchants, et al, can be secured. And, in our opinion, these "Teenage Canteens" are a local matter, which doesn't need any national program or assistance. As a matter of fact, any effort along national lines would only slow up and hinder local efforts.)

Columbus Court Rules In Favor Of Pinball Ops

COLUMBUS, OHIO — An interesting point has been developed in the court fight in this city, by the amusement machine operators against the Columbus ordinance which would ban pinball machines from public places and businesses.

The ordinance, which would have gone into effect on June 14, was held up as Judge Robert N. Draper, Common Pleas judge, granted the operators a temporary restraining order preventing the city of Columbus from

enforcing the ordinances. The order was challenged by the city attorney's office.

The latest development was another decision in favor of the pinball operators, when on November 19, Judge Draper held that the city's anti-pinball ordinances were "Prohibitory" instead of merely regulatory. The Court explained that an ordinance of an Ohio city cannot outlaw a device unless it is obviously evil, which it said has not yet been established about pinballs.

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK — According to the private banking firm of Oscar Siesbye of this city, Denmark's leading juke box operator presented a page editorial from *The Cash Box*, featuring *The Cash Box'* proposal for a four year automatic music depreciation plan, and the Danish Government immediately approved.

The Cash Box' suggestion for an equitable phono depreciation plan was based on 40% to be deducted as depreciation of the phono the first year, 30% the second year, 20% the third year, and 10% the fourth and final year

Adopting this depreciation method the juke box operator here in Copenhagen was called in by the government's tax authorities as to his basis for such a depreciation method.

He took along the full page editorial which had appeared in this publication some years ago and, when this was perused by Denmark's tax authorities, they agreed that this was an equitable depreciation method.

Other juke box operators thruout Europe have used the same method in obtaining agreement to a four-year depreciation schedule with their governments.

Continuing Inflation Demands:**10¢ PLAY
PLUS
FRONT MONEY AND A MORE
EQUITABLE COMMISSION BASIS**

Ancient, Slot-Type 50%-50% Commission Basis Must be Abolished so that Ops Can Meet Higher Overhead Expenses and Increased Costs of All New Equipment, Parts, Supplies, Merchandise and All Necessities. More Practical Division of Gross Receipts Has Become an Absolute Necessity.

An intensive study of economical conditions prevailing in the coin machine business absolutely qualifies the fact that today, with continuing creeping inflation apparent thruout the U. S., operators simply must put into effect 10¢ play *PLUS* front money and a more equitable commission basis if they are to be assured a decent profit return on their investment.

The ancient, slot-type 50%-50% commission basis has long, long ago worn itself out. In those days, when only the placement of the slot and no attendant expenses were necessary, it was somewhat plausible to give merchants 50% of the gross receipts.

But today, with all the many, many expenses attendant to the operation of almost any type machine now on the market, especially automatic music, dividing the gross receipts on a 50%-50% basis is absolutely unbusinesslike in every regard.

Thruout Europe the majority of automatic musical instruments are operated on approximately 8% to 10% of the gross receipts being paid as commission to the location owners and, in a great many cases, no commission at all is paid.

In fact, the highest commission paid to location

owners for the operation of games is 20% of the gross receipts. In many cases this is 10% to 15%.

America's operators are today faced with tremendous overhead expenses as well as with greatly increased costs of new machines. They simply cannot continue to operate profitably on a 50%-50% division of the gross receipts. They must arrange for front money and a more equitable division of the gross intake from their machines.

Already many operators' associations have taken the statements which have appeared in *The Cash Box* to heart and are urging 60%-40% division (60% to the operators and 40% to the location owners) with front money guarantee arrangements in addition.

It is, as always, up to the intelligent operators everywhere in the nation to be the first to take this absolutely necessary and businesslike step. These men will be followed by all others. This will, most definitely, eliminate the gripes that are now being heard everywhere in the industry that "no profit is possible" where operating is concerned under present conditions.

The answer lies in 10¢ play *PLUS* front money and a more equitable commission basis.

Rock-Ola On 6-Day Double Shift Work Sked

CHICAGO—Kurt Kluever, assistant sales manager of the Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation, this city, reported that the production departments are now working on double shifts and Saturdays.

"All metal prefabrication, as well as paint and manufacturing departments, have been running double shifts till midnight from Monday to Friday," stated Kluever.

"The entire plant has been on overtime all day Saturdays. All departments are producing at maximum capacity.

"Unprecedented demand for all models of Rock-Ola phonographs has created a huge backlog of orders that will keep us at full capacity for a long time. This demand is being met as rapidly as possible.

"At the present time, we are concentrating on production of the new Rock-Ola '200' and shipments of this model are going forward at a record rate.

"We are also forced to step up production of the '120's, although we had anticipated sufficient supply to last thru the end of 1956.

"Surprisingly, in view of so much emphasis this past year on '120' and '200' selection phonographs, we note a sharp increase in demand for our '50' selection Rock-Ola's, and are gauging production of this model accordingly."

Stated Kluever in conclusion, "1956 will be a record year for Rock-Ola. Our distributing organization has done a wonderful job. We want to assure every one of them that we are doing everything possible to supply the quantity and quality of phonographs they need for their customers."

Survey Indicates Just About 5% More Phonos On Location

Constant Replacement of Old Equipment Noted. Increase is Gauged at Just About 5% Over Former Figure. Anywhere From 560,000 to 575,000 Phonos on Location

CHICAGO—Tho the survey is still under way, figures so far indicate that there may be just about five percent more phonographs on locations in the U.S. than the figure of 550,000 which this publication has featured.

Regardless of the growth of retail businesses thruout the U. S. it seems, from all indications, that the majority of these are not suitable for the operation of automatic music.

It is also reported that the constant replacement and sell-off of old machines has pretty much held the total close to the former 550,000 figure.

The figure of 600,000, which was advanced by some music leaders and which brought on this present survey by *The Cash Box*, is as yet far from being fact.

A more conservative estimate would be that there are anywhere from 550,000 to about 575,000 phonos on locations thruout the U.S.

Of itself this is a very marvelous achievement, especially when considering the fact that the cost of new machines has risen steadily ever since the end of War II, and that replace-

ment has been a very costly process in a great many instances.

There are some who claim that the figure of 550,000 phonos on locations in the U.S. has remained steadfast. They do not believe, because of sales of old and worn phonos and replacement of secondary locations, while new models were purchased for top spots, that any real and definite increase can be shown at this time.

The majority are of the belief that there has been some increase and, according to individual territorial reports, this increase can be said to be just about 5 percent.

Rather than use an assumed figure of 575,000, until the survey is complete in every regard, this publication only reports what the survey indicates as of this writing.

If this 5% increase becomes fact, when the survey is completed, it would mean that there are now on locations thruout the nation 575,000 automatic musical instruments.

These range from telephone music, to hidden music installations to juke boxes.

If the average of about three wall and bar boxes were used for each of the 575,000 locations (many claim the average is four boxes) the industry could assume that there are over 2,000,000 wall and bar boxes in operation in the U.S.

It is well, at this time, to use the approximate 5 percent increase with great care, at least until the survey is completed, and the figures to be published at that time correspond to the present indications.

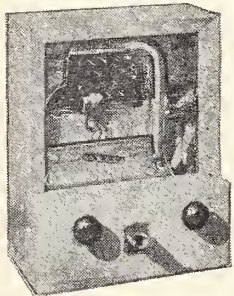

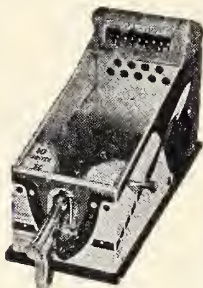

How To Use "THE CASH BOX PRICE LISTS"

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.

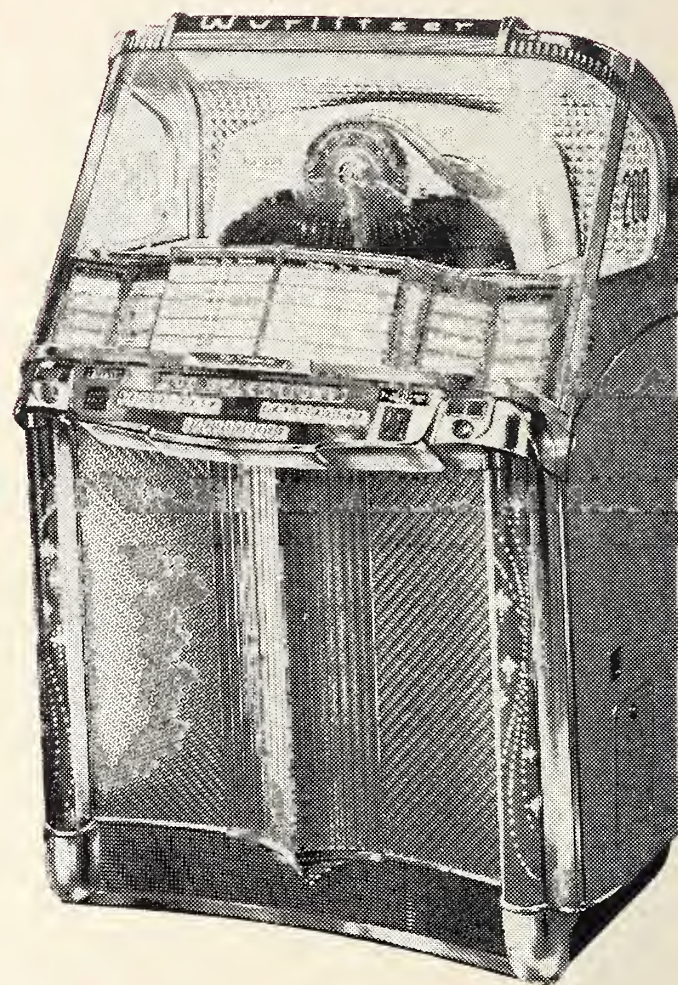
