



Do spiders make your blood curdle?

Digitised images of spiders can help people overcome fear of the longleggedy beasties, claim researchers at Leeds University.

By using images ranging from spidery shapes to 3D models the university's Spider Phobia Project hopes to cure severe arachnophobia.

The exposure builds up to an introduction to real spiders and doctors reckon the treatment could eventually be conducted on a home micro, CD-I or CDTV. Researcher Dr Peter Ward says: "We've found from a number of surveys that roughly half of people with spider-phobia prefer to confide to a computer than a person."

BOMBER BUST

A computer programmer has been arrested for allegedly trying to create a job for himself by planting a 'logic bomb' in a military rocket's

American Michael Lauffenburger was arraigned on charges of attempted computer fraud after he allegedly planted the bomb in a General Dynamics Atlas rocket.

It is alleged that Lauffenburger's scheme was to plant the bomb, allow it to destroy data and thus ensure that US military hardware giant General Dynamics would keep him on at a substantial salary as a consultant to find out exactly what had gone wrong.

Lauffenburger was originally employed by General Dynamics to write programs that tracked the availability and the cost of parts used in the manufacture of Atlas rockets. He quit his job in March to go into business as a consultant. "Four days before his resignation, Lauffenburger created a computer program, he called 'Cleanup' which, upon its execution, would have deleted the

parts database, deleted another set of programs used to respond to government requests for information and then deleted itself without a trace," says Assistant United States Attorney Mitchell Dembin.

It is alleged that the logic bomb was set to go off on May 24, right at the start of a public holiday weekend, but another programmer discovered the sabotage on

April 10 and *successfully removed it from the system.

A powerful bank of twelve Apple Macintosh llfx computers, each with 8Mb of memory and 1.3-gigabyte hard drive, will form the Micro Gallery, enabling visitors to browse through more than 2,000 paintings, plus supporting text, by simply touching an Ellinor Accutouch screen.

The Micro Gallery, sponsored by the American Express Foundation, aims to make the National's collection readily available to both scholars and the general public while preserving the paintings themselves, which suffer when conventionally displayed.

The software behind the project was developed by Cognitive Applications and is based on Apple's Hypercard 2.0, augmented by software written in lightspeed C. Display is via 19-inch Radius colour monitors and users can print out text or pictures on Laser Writers for a take-away record.

Enhanced 8-bit graphic images, more than a million words of text and even animated sequences are all available and the system can be entered at any one of four sections - artists, picture types, historical atlas or general reference.

Deluxe Paint 4 out soon

Of all the Amiga's programs, the Deluxe Paint series from Electronic Arts has been one of the most successful. The latest incarnation of this range, Deluxe Paint 4, is to be released in September and must be one of the most eagerly awaited releases, ever. In fact, Simon Jefferies, spokesman for Electronic Arts, expects that within a year Deluxe Paint 4 will be one of the company's largest revenue earners.

It improves over its predecessors in several important ways. One of the biggest enhancements is the inclusion of Hold And Modify (HAM) mode painting for the first time, which gives access to the Amiga's 4,096 colours at once. Now Amiga artists don't have to use other paint programs to access this mode, and makes Deluxe Paint a real all-rounder and something for its competition to worry about.

Not only is HAM mode available, but HAM pictures can also be animated. Animation as a whole has been expanded and now features a control panel that works in a similar way to a video recorder: playing, fast forwarding and rewinding between frames. Compression techniques have been incorporated to

save memory; essential with HAM mode because of all the colours involved.

Another new tool is the Lightbox feature, which displays animation frames over each other so changes between frames can be seen, making animation much easier.

Other added features include a metamorph function, which can transform brushes over each other and generate the animation frames between them; and anti-aliasing which smooths out the jagged parts of lines and curves.

In spite of all these improvements, the updated program will still be familiar to Deluxe Paint users. The same screen layout is used and the icons on screen remain essentially the same. All the added features have been incorporated in the program's familiar menus.

Deluxe Paint IV is to sell for £89.95. Owners of older versions need not feel left out though, as a complete upgrade path will be offered. Upgrading to the new version will cost £45 for owners of DPaint III, £55 for DPaint II and £65 to for DPaint I owners.

While the program will no doubt be one of the Amiga's hottest titles, Electronic Arts believes it is so complex that a manual is essential, so pirates of the program will lose out. Future upgrades of Deluxe Paint look slim since Electronic Arts feels the program is so complete. Deluxe Paint IV, then, is expected to have an indefinite lifetime.

Japanese manufacturer anounces September UK launch

NEO GEO OFFICIAL

Japanese arcade manufacturer SNK's Neo Geo, available from grey importers for over a year, is now to be officially released in the UK at the Consumer Electronics Show (CES) in September.

In hardware terms the console is very advanced, equipped with both 68000 and Z80 processors, a palette of 65,535 colours (with 4,096 on screen at any one time) and a stereo, 15-way sound chip. This puts it at the forefront of technology, but until recently the price has reflected this to an extreme.

Before now, distributors De Gale Marketing (DGM), imported a limited number of PAL machines during the year, but has now decided to release it on a nationwide basis.


The price of the Neo Geo has recently been cut from £450 to £299 in time for the launch. Even with this reduction, it is still at the top-range of the console market. This doesn't worry Luther de Gale, MD of DGM, who is targeting the machine at 'peo-

ple who want the best in console technology and software'.

Software for the machine is also pricey at £99 to £149, but De Gale believes the sheer quality of the software will speak for itself. SNK, he says, has the second biggest research facility in Japan in terms of arcade development, and at any one time there are always 15-20 titles in development. These are titles of all kinds, but they will not be licensed from other companies.

With only 10 games available at the moment, this number is expected to reach 20 by the end of the year. DGM will also operate a scheme whereby software can be rented or leased. This means that Neo Geo owners can test a game before they buy it.

One unique feature of DGM's marketing will be its exchange scheme, where cartridges bought or leased can be exchanged for others available, the money paid used as part-payment for any software being bought. De Gale sees Neo Geo owners ending up owning the

software that they want, and not being permanently stranded with a £25 disk – as they would with 16-bit computers – which they couldn't exchange.

DGM will sell and support the console itself, in much the same way it has done in the past. Distribution of the machine will be through more upmarket outlets only, such as Harrods, Selfridges and Debenhams, as the console is being targeted at a niche market. Luther de Gale

also sees the Neo Geo being sold in 'executive geared outlets' where it could also be perceived as an executive toy.

Whether this limited marketing approach will be a success is unknown. There is no question of whether the hardware and software is good enough; the problem could be whether there are enough people who will pay out for the most expensive machine in town, even if they do get a real arcade machine.



Companies lose millions says report published by Audit Commission

VIRUS ATTACKS UP BUT HACKING DOWN

Computer virus attacks have dramatically increased, yet hacking has reduced in the past three years, according to a report published by the Audit Commission.

The survey, covering 1,553 organisations between 1988 and 1990, found that a growing number of private and public-sector organisations have been victims of computer fraud and theft, costing them millions of pounds. Many of the crimes were only discovered by chance.

Computer virus attacks account for about 30 per cent of offences and computer hacking, the unauthorised accessing of a data base by an employee or an outsider using the telephone lines, have fallen.


Computer fraud, including making payments to a fictitious account, has also increased, rising from 61 to 73 cases (of the 180 reported) since 1987. Local governments were the hardest hit, reporting 46 cases of fraud, but financial institutions, manufacturing and health service computers didn't escape either the majority have been victims of computer fraud and abuse. Also badly hit by fraud is central government, computing services, communications, transport and the public utilities.

The average loss through fraud was £17,080, but five unnamed companies each reported losses of more than £50,000, while two others lost more than £100,000 each. Total

losses added up to more than a million pounds.

Of the 180 cases reported, 27 acts of theft – including data and software theft, using pirated software and the illicit use of computer systems for private work – affect companies. Many of these happen because of poor controls or safeguards.

However, the findings of the report are only the ones which get detected. Less than a quarter of the reported incidents were caught by internal controls – a considerable drop from the 31 per cent detected by internal controls in 1987 – and 60 per cent were discovered by accident. Many cases, the report acknowledged, remain undetected or undisclosed.

Assembler revamped

ST owners who want to assemble Z80 code, D&S Software's Z80 Cross Assembler for the ST has had two important new features added, while being reduced in price to £49.95.

Now command strings from the assembler can be sent directly to EPROM programmers via the RS232 file transfer facility. This creates and sends an ASCII text file with the necessary start-up codes and also gives the option of sending a header file beforehand, if needed.

Conditional assembly is also supported by the assembler. Four directives have been added which can force the assembly of subsequent lines to be turned on or off, allowing the programmer to write comprehensive source code that can cover many conditions.

These can also help with debugging, since lines can be turned on by conditionally assembling them into the program and when the program is working properly they get turned off.

More power for low-cost Macs

Low-cost needn't mean low power, because owners of two low-cost Macintoshes, the SE/30 and the llsi, can now increase the performance of their machines beyond that of their more upmarket stablemates.

The TokaMac SX accelerator card from Fusion Data Systems will increase performance well beyond the levels of the llfx, Apple's fastest Macintosh, as well as 486-based PCs, the company claims.

Performance improvements are achieved with floating point intensive applications, which may be up to 300 per cent faster than the Macintosh Ilfx. Graphics and desktop publishing applications can also run faster, reaching speeds of up to 185 per cent over the Ilfx.

"We produced a blazing fast and reliable upgrade solution which puts those users at the front of today's Macintosh performance curve", said Fusion's president, Andrew Donoho.

According to the company, the TokaMac SX is the only Motorola 68040 accelerator available for the Macintosh SE/30 and the Ilsi, and the only accelerator compatible with System 7.0. It is also compatible with most Mac applications. TokaMac SX has a suggested list price of \$2,995 (£1,837) plus \$50 (£30) for an 030 PDS adaptor card.





HOW PEN-INPUT SYSTEMS WORK

Pen input systems work via the interaction of a stylus or lightpen with a pressure-sensitive, electromagnetic or laser grid generated across the surface of a screen. This enables the operating system to detect its position and whether it's making contact.

Handwriting recognition is a much more complex process. A typical system can occupy as little as 100K of code and process about three characters a second, but the success of the system depends on

a large number of variables, each of which have to be 'learnt'.

Any handwriting translation (H W X) system also requires a spelling dictionary and the ability to distinguish between characters that overlap and touch, are of mixed size and case and include numbers and punctuation. Any system requires some familiarisation with the person using it. Accuracy rates of over 90 per cent are not uncommon, but four out of five words is the average.

Frequently used notebooks can be put in a bookshelf area to be taken off and opened as desired. Up to 100 pages of mixed text and graphics data are available at any one time.

ACTIVE GETS IN ON PEN-INPUT DISTRIBUTION DEAL

A UK-developed pen-input computer with a claimed battery life of up to 12 hours is on the verge of a major distribution deal.

Active Book Company, run by ex-Acorn founder Herman Hauser, hopes to get the edge in the new pen-input market with the European announcement of its Active Book - a device that enables people to exchange files with a PC as if they had Windows

The computer's power consumption has been kept down by using a static design of Acorn's extremely fast and powerful ARM RISC processor, which uses only a fraction of the power of non-static designs. The instructions per second (mips), but power has been scaled down to 12.5MIPS peak and 5mips

EXPRESS COMMENT:

Pen-based computing is essential. Not only essential to users, but crucial to the well-being of the computer industry. This is the view of many market pundits, who feel this new and revolutionary way in which we interact with computers will bring salvation to a market reeling from recession, product saturation and fierce discounting.

Laptop computers are reported to be on the decline. The PC market, as revealed by Express last week, is fragmenting with no clear market leader, but activity among the heavyweights is frenetic.

An estimated \$3.5 billion carrot is the catalyst - a best estimate of the impact of pen-input computing offered by Massachusetts firm BIS Strategic Decisions.

So why the revolution? As one observer commented, pen-input will "shatter the glass ceiling" that prevents new users entering the market. And for the rest of us, it could well change the way we organise information on computer.

Keyboard-based computing has a years-old reputation for being unfriendly to the novice. Keyboards are cumbersome devices, thus not suited to convenient portability so much needed by the travelling business community. And, in the absence of formal keyboard training for the masses, many users never aspire beyond the time consuming 'twofinger' method of data input. Even mice and WIMP interfaces fail to provide the ultimate solution.

Many business people prefer to carry a Filofax rather than an electronic personal organiser, and here lies the reason for revolution.

A Filofax is a pen-input database. It is easy to use, for all of us are taught how to write with a pen. Adapt that method of input to a computer and suddenly we have friendly, truly portable and potentially marketbusting PC performance.


US-based Forrester Research predicts anywhere between seven and 54 million customers for pen-based computers, prompting Forrester president George Colony to describe it as "a major thunderstorm".

But there is little calm before this storm - Toshiba, Psion, Atari, Kyocera, IBM, Microsoft, Lotus, Apple, NCR, Sony, Tandy - all the big names are reported to be hard at work and substantial investment capital is being directed at start-up operations such as Go, Slate, Pensoft, Pen Pal and Montezuma.

As with any deluge, there is bound to be turbulence and one factor could be cost. Estimates range from £1,500 to £4,500 for an effective pen-input PC. Other causes for concern are substantive handwriting recognition, for true and effortless interaction, and the high cost of colour displays.

However, as has been the case time and again in the computer industry, specification will no doubt rise in inverse proportion to price as market forces are brought to bear.

At any rate, it won't be long before PenPads dominate sales.

A BONE

A bone-conductive, wireless voice transmission (a telephone handset), enough to fit within the has been human ear, announced by US company Norris Communications.

The products are a hybrid of the bone-conductive technology developed for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration by the inventor, Elwood Norris, who is also president of Norris Communications.

Bell Atlantic, which is the parent company of seven local operating telephone companies in Mid-Atlantic states, has paid \$228,000 for a field trial of the "bone phones," Norris said.

The implications for computing may at first not appear obvious, but such devices seem an ideal adjunct to portable computer users.

Parallel power

In the next four years, computers powerful enough to model what goes on in the human brain, or to predict climatic disasters in time to prepare for them, will be available.

Tasks such as these require such huge quantities of data to be processed that even the fastest machines currently available would need decades to finish their calculations. This time could be cut down to only a few days when machines which can perform a million million calculations a second, or a teraflop,

become available.

Parystec, a small German company, has revealed plans for its GC range of computers, the most powerful of which will operate at just under half a teraflop. This machine, the T9000 Transputer GC-5/16, will use parallel processing to achieve this speed, using just over 16,000 transputer chips.

The company is hoping to increase this power four-fold by making a few minor modifications and make it a teraflop machine by the end of 1993.

To speed up data transfer

between the processors and memory, where information usually gets slowed down, Parsytec has included the "virtual channel" with the T9000. This sends information in packets, labelled with their destination, which can take any path and be rerouted if nec-

Previously, transputers only had preset routes for sending information.

Neither the transputer or the GC computer has been tested in practice, however, and the T9000 is not to go into production until the end of this year.

Fascinating facsimiles

Why use a colour laser printer or a high street photobureau everything could be done on a colour fax machine?

The machine is the world's first full-colour desktop fax system which operates over normal telephone lines. It takes three minutes to produce a high-qualglossy 8-by-10 inch photograph.

This new technology doesn't come cheap though, at least for the moment, as the FO-9000 costs \$31,995 (approximately £19,630).

ICOT's Multi-PSI - the fifth generation

A glimpse of what computers could be like in the future has been announced by Japan's Institute for the New Generation of Computer Technology (ICOT), the association that develops fifth generation computers and creates advanced software for parallel processors.

ICOT's latest developments are a variety of systems that solve

complicated problems and scientific questions. These range from a faster way of designing large-scale integrated chips, to making legal decisions by searching and comparing past judgements. The software runs on ICOT's

first version of its parallel processor, the Multi-PSI, which interconnects 64 computers to a main computer. ICOT is also developing an advanced parallel processor which can handle data across 512 computers

simultaneously.

Development of ICOT's fifth generation computer project is expected to escalate during 1991, as this is the last year of the project.

IS THE HARD DISK A SPECIES UNDER THREAT?


In the near future, computer users could be saving data to rewritable optical drives instead of the less capacious hard disks used today. How soon all this happens will depend on many things - price being a major consideration, but the sooner the technology becomes available, the sooner it will be used.

To aid progress, Sony has announced a pair of 3.5 inch optical disk drives that store up to 128 Megabytes of information on a 3.5 inch magnetooptical disk. The drives have been designed for PCs and Macintoshes and comply with the ANSI/ISO standard, meaning that disks can be changed with other drives meeting that standard. IBM has recently announced it will be using drives with similar specifications in its machines.

Internal and external versions of the drives are available: the internal version can be fitted into a variety of hardware, while the external model uses a SCSI-2 interface. Both drives have an average seek time of 40 milliseconds and a four-megabyte burst

Sony hopes to see the drives retail for below £1,000. From there it could only be a matter of time before they are as inexpensive as hard drives.







If you have even the slightest interest in desktop publishing on the Amiga, then chances are that you know Canadabased Gold Disk pretty well. Put simply, Gold Disk is the undisputed leader in Amiga desktop publishing products with such programs as Professional Page.

Although the company has only recently released updates of both ProPage and Prodraw, development hasn't slowed for a minute. Already the company is hard at work on Professional Draw 3 which should be with us sometime in 1992.

According to Gold Disk's own Keith Hughes (who, incidentally, is a Brit), ProDraw 3 boasts a vastly enhanced user interface and considerably faster speed of operation (let's face it, ProDraw needs it). New features are a little vague at the moment, but Keith assures me that ProDraw 3 is going to be something very special indeed.

This announcement comes in the wake of the recent release of DesignWorks from New Horizons, a company better known for its ProWrite word processor. I'll be bringing you a

review of DesignWorks very soon, so stay tuned for that one.

By the time you read this, Gold Disk's long awaited ShowMaker desktop video system should have started shipping, so check the shelves of your local software store for that one. Gold Disk is very excited by ShowMaker, with words such as 'revolutionary' and 'simply stunning' being used with blatant disregard for the innocent.

Once again, I'll be taking a damned good look at this one, so expect a review within the pages of Express.

On the subject of Gold Disk products, PC-owning Amiga users may also be interested to learn that Gold Disk is hard at work on a PC illustration package that steals more than a few good ideas from Gold Disk's existing Professional Draw package.

Codenamed GSDesign, the program still has a long way to go before it is ready to hit the market, but already it sounds simply delicious.

According to Keith, although the program features the same user interface and even the same code as ProDraw, the company has built upon its experiences with ProDraw to develop GSDesign. Using a powerful Windowsbased interface, GSDesign looks set to take the PC DTP market by storm.

Another package that learns more than a thing or two from its Amiga counterpart is Gold Disk's recently released Animation Works system for the Macintosh. Mac users can now get in on this animation lark with their very own dedicated package.

"Animation Works was designed to allow absolutely anyone to produce good quality animations on their Mac," Keith told me.

Well, the Amiga has been doing it for years, so I'll be interested to see how Animation Works performs against such packages as Disney's Animation Studio.


Once again, Mac owners should look out for a review of that one.



Quite what these machines will be like is uncertain. All that Sam would say is that they're, "wow machines". When asked if the machine would be an

extended STE, he declined to comment, although this seems one of the more likely options.

If the machine was an extended STE, what kind of features could we expect? Well for a start, Atari has long expressed an interest in 1.44Mb floppy drive units, so this seems as good a place as any to start. An upgraded version of TOS would, of course, be incorporated. Again, Atari has designed

WHY TYPE 20 LETTERS WHEN ONE'S ENOUGH?

Unless you happen to be a wizard on the keyboard, and can happily trot out 80 words per minute without even so much as a surreptitious glance sideways at your keyboard, then you'll know the problems associated with creating long documents.

Abbreviator ST is a new American program which addresses itself to these problems by enabling the user to create a catalogue of abbreviations.

Thus, as you type in your document you simply replace commonly used words and phrases with an abbreviation and then

the program consults its master lists and set about filling in the gaps.

The program runs as a desk accessory, which means that it can be used in all manner of word processors or DTP packages. You don't have to create separate lists for each program.

an elegant version of TOS for the Mega STE and it's likely that it would incorporate this.

The memory requirements of machines keep rising. In the early 80s, 16K was viewed as being large RAM space. Nowadays, you'll find yourself running out of memory with 1Mb of RAM. So a new ST is bound to feature at least 2Mb of RAM, which can be upgraded easily using simple to install SIMM cards.

The Mega STE features AppleTalk capabilities, as well as space for VME cards, so the new machine is likely to incorporate these features.

One of the most obvious upgrade paths would be a decent sound chip. Alright, so the STE has that DMA chip, but it still has to rely on the increasingly weedy-sounding internal chip warbler. It would seem obvious then that Atari would place a natty new sound chip inside the machine, perhaps one that it has developed for the new consoles.

The STyle and Book both feature RAM card capabilities. These credit card size wafers of technology enable the user to store up to 4Mb of data on board; these can then be transferred to other machines.

So it seems obvious for Atari to include RAM card space. This would enable the new machine to act as a sort of base unit for either Book or STyle, enabling transfer in and out.

Anyway, these are my predictions. I refuse to be drawn on whether or not I have been given some inside information on these matters.



WHAT IS A POKE AND HOW DO YOU USE ONE?

It occurs to me that although most of you know how to use the game pokes I put in this column now and again, the rest of you probably wonder what it's all about.

Well, pokes 'interfere' with the game code in such a way as to give you extra lives, energy, weapons – it really depends on the game. Pokes are written by experienced programmers who have been able to 'get inside' each game to make these little alterations.

You don't really need to know how pokes work, but you do need to know how to use them. So here goes...

1) Make sure the routine is written for your

format - disk or tape. They will not generally work with both.

- 2) Type it in to the computer, making sure there are no errors.
- Save the program to tape or disk (not the game tape or disk!) so that it can be used again.
- Put in the game tape or disk and type ITAPE or IDISC.
- 5) Type RUN to run the routine (not RUN **
 (CTRL+ENTER) as you

normally would)

You should now find that the game will load normally, or you will be given instructions on what needs to be done.

Z80 SIMULATOR

Z80 Simulator is one of the new Goldmark utilities I mentioned in last week's column. I've had time to investigate it a bit more thoroughly now, and I've come to the conclusion it's a really excellent little program.

Simulator does exactly what it says it does – it tests all your Z80 code without actually executing any of the instructions. The contents of the registers, dissembled instructions and other valuable information are displayed continuously.

Z80 Simulator acts as a very powerful machine code monitor. Whereas other monitors use up a part of the machine's memory, however, Simulator doesn't. It leaves you with the whole of one 64K memory bank free, so there are no worries about bits of code overwriting one another.

It's worth stressing that this program really is for experienced machine code dabblers only. Although it offers a comprehensive help screen on start-up, you do really need to know what you're doing.

Z80 Simulator costs £19.95 (£15 introductory offer price!) and works, naturally enough, on 128K machines only. It's not for the inexperienced, but if you're into machine code and debugging, it's a very powerful and very useful little utility indeed.

IT'S A STEAL

Three years ago Armalyte took the C64 world by storm, and now the game is on budget for a mere pittance (but who's complaining?).

The plot follows on from its predecessor, *Delta*, at the end of which the H'siffians were found guilty of gross

piracy in Delta space. In the period between when the two games are set a patrol wandered through the region, and found a deserted H'siffian outpost. For some reason, this is where they decided to form Armalyte industries.

Things were going fine up until recently; scientists sent a transmission

reporting a potential breakthrough, but then all contact was lost. It is rumoured that the H'siffians have made similar progress, and have reclaimed the outpost as their own. Armalyte industries has no choice other than to recruit mercenaries to wipe the H'siffians from the area.

That is where you come in; up to two players can take part in the mission, although in single player mode a remote drone accompanies the ship. The craft has no additional weaponry when it arrives, but all manner of enhancements can be obtained by shooting munitions crystals which frequently appear.


The game is arranged eight different levels, which scroll horizontally. There is a plethora of alien craft, with a liberal sprinkling of huge motherships, snakes, etc.


Collecting a munitions pod untouched will render the craft invincible for roughly five seconds. When shot, it cycles through a number of enhancements; extra forward firepower, rear firing, sideways firepower, trident (which enhances forward firing), converge (which takes rear bullets and puts them through the front), batteries and generators.

The last two are for use with your superweapon; the batteries hold extra charge for repeated use and generators aid the recharging of batteries.

The superweapon comes in three forms: a piercing laser beam, which can pass through absolutely anything, but uses tons of energy; a barrage of laser

beams, guaranteed to eradicate the largest of attack waves; and a highavailability laser beam useful for general everday alien bashing (and it uses the least energy).

In one player mode a remote drone is at hand. This fires in unison with the main ship, and also spits out its own superweapon. It follows the ship around, but its trajectory can be fixed by a hefty prod on the space bar.

Armalyte is undoubtedly the best shoot-'em-up for the C64, as well as

being my favourite game of all time. The gameplay has not aged at all since its release in late 1988. Indeed, it remains fresh, challenging and addictive. Admittedly, some will find the attack waves a tad repetitive, but every game is surprisingly refreshing.

The main asset is the graphics; possibly the best alien sprites ever seen in a horizontal shoot-'em-up, along with some stunningly detailed backdrops (many inspired by Geiger himself). The motherships also deserve some credit,

as they are large, well defined and an awesome adversary!

Sound is superb, with some effective FX and beautiful burbly music from Martin Walker, If you were stupid enough to miss this game before, run all the way to your local software shop with £4 in your hand and demand your copy.

FORMULA 1 RACING GAME IS A REALLY GOOD IDEA


After the abysmal Saracen Paint, Idea can hope to claw back some respect with Formula 1 Grand Prix.

For its part, IBM is offering portions of OS/2, such as Named Pipes, its RISC Powerchip and its entire suite of networking protocols.

WINDOWS ON SPEED

DOS 5: THE Q&A SESSION

It's another new series! DOS 5 is here and, I'll bet, it'll provoke one or three questions. So if you have a problem with DOS 5 write to me and I'll do my best to sort you out. For now, here are the top ten questions asked by the concerned, worried and plain frantic.

Q How much memory does it free? A Basically, around 621K

Q Will it run on my machine? A Yes (if not ring Microsoft).

Q How much hard-disk space do I need? A 3.1Mb, although it's possible to get by with 600K.

Q How much memory do I need? A 512K – to run the setup program.

Q Will it install on DR-DOS? A It should do.

Q Why can't I boot off the Setup disk? A Because DOS 5 is an upgrade running on top of the older DOS, not as a separate entity.

Q What if I have a 8086 or my 386 has a memory manager? Wny should I bother buying DOS 5? A DOS 5 is safer, easier to use, has online help, includes task swapping, plus undelete and unformat options. Do yourself a favour.

Q Should I use the new version of EMM386 with Win3?

A Yes, this version supersedes the older Win3 version.

Q Will my partitioned hard disk (created with Ontack Disk Manager) work under DOS 5?

A Yep, most third party disk managers are compatible.

Q Will my network run under DOS 5? A Should do. Quite a few were tested and work. Examples include MS Net, LAN Manager, PC Lan, Novell Netware, Sitka TOPS, etc., etc.



- Hewlett Packard not guilty of fraud, suggests judge
- Are Macshops the marketing push the Mac needs?

MACSHOPS

Rumours are firming up that Apple will start selling the low-end Macs through some form of high-street outlet well before next Christmas.

There are some reports that a trial shop is already in existence, and certainly visitors to Apple's Stockley Park headquarters over the last six months or so have seen a prototype 'Macshop' - a small booth which could be part of a larger retailing operation.

The rumours have been strengthened by speculation that Apple is not creating any new AppleCentres. Suggested retailers are as diverse as Dixons, Comet or W H Smith's.

Whatever, Apple needs to get its act together before the autumn, or it will miss out on what could, if handled right, be a terrific boost to Macintosh sales. The current situation is ridiculous; in many cities, the only place you can officially buy a Mac is at an AppleCentre, which doesn't open on Saturdays.

This means that all the little kiddies who want to persuade Dad to buy them a Mac instead of an Amiga can't even take him to see the kit.

Surely, given that the Mac is the easiest computer to use, it wouldn't be too hard to train sales staff in a department store to sell the damned thing, surely?



FRAUD CLAIM REJECTED

The judge who is presiding over the hearing between Apple and Microsoft and Hewlett-Packard (over the 'look and feel' of the Mac interface, remember? If not, see Express issue 135 page 6) is said to have announced that he is, "inclined not to allow Apple to accuse Microsoft of fraud".

This relates to a claim which Apple lodged in May this year that Microsoft was guilty of using fraud and coercion in obtaining the licensing agreement in the first place. The judge has also been quoted as saying that it is, "pretty outlandish that Apple discovered this fraud at this late date"

This is not to say that the judge has actually thrown the claim out - even

though it's taken Apple three years from the original case being lodged to make these claims about fraud. But it looks as though Apple's on a hiding to nothing with that particular avenue of complaint.

cannot possibly be the case, as a subjective observer it certainly appears to be so to me - text seems to take almost twice as long to scroll in some cases. Have any of you Mac users out there come to the same conclusions? If so, or if you can conclusively prove that I'm wrong, let me know.

The first incompatibilities between System 7 and major software packages are beginning to come to light. Quark XPress 3.0, one of the two top desktop publishing packages on the Macintosh, isn't exactly happy with Apple's new operating system.

Although it doesn't actually crash, users of the program under System 7 have reported some anomalies - such as the fact that a PICT saved to the clipboard and then pasted into an XPress picture box will not actually print; at least, not with any regularity.

Beta versions of XPress 3.1 are now in circulation, but the actual product will not ship until the third or fourth quarter of this year. XPress 3.1 will, according to Quark, take full advantage of System 7, offering features such as Publish and Subscribe as well as curing any incompatibility bugs. There should be some other fabby features too, but Quark isn't saying any more at the moment. Watch this space for details...

After living with System 7 for a couple of months, I've cru my installation methodology (or fixed it in concrete) for users making the transition. If you'll follow my sane and simple plan, you'll be in seven heaven. If not, you'll wind up in a bottomless bit! RULE ONE: Pretend that you've never seen a Macintosh before. This is more than just a mental exercise, but an important ritual. Use the latest versions of hard disk utility software, and reformat your drive. Lay down a fresh system on the disk, even though the Installer program could update your old 6.0x system. You're a new user in a brave new Mac-world.

RULE TWO: Run a "pure" Apple system for at least a week. The depth of the interface should be used and appreciated. It takes time to really get the new features integrated into the unconscious.

Finder enhancing software, popular with former power users, should be avoided. I've only added a screen saver (After Dark) and Super Boomerang (in the Now Utilities) so far, and I was a real

CDEV/Init junkie in previous systems. Aliases, especially, can be overlooked in a rush to recreate a

as you can throw at it, but piggish? Really!

previous desktop environment. RULE THREE: Turn off esoteric new features. Don't bother with virtual memory, unless you know what you're doing, or have a specific need. The same applies to 32-bit Addressing and File Sharing. Users suddenly find their system has swollen by many Mebabytes, without their knowledge. They scream that System 7 is a memory hog, when they're accidentally "using" a feature. It does want as much memory

The Calculate Folder Sizes option in the Views control panel device is a notorious for slowing machines down. I don't know if Finder operations are truly slowed, but they certainly appear to be to the subjective eye. Certainly the hard disk has to run around getting the information.





TANDY UNVEILS 60MB HARD DISK NOTEBOOK PC

MATHS COPROCESSORS FALL TO SENSIBLE PRICES

Intel and Cyrix, two of the computer industry's major chip suppliers, have slashed the prices of their respective maths coprocessor chipsets for PCs.

The reason for the price cuts? According to Intel, the first company to cut its prices, maths coprocessor prices are perceived as being too high compared to continually falling PC prices. Both companies have also admitted that the maths coprocessor chips are a lot cheaper to produce, now that their respective R&D costs have been covered. This perhaps explains the size of the price cuts, which amount to two-thirds in some cases - an Intel 33MHz 80386 coprocessor, for example, drops from \$994 to \$299.

The price cuts are likely to take some time to filter through to UK suppliers but, in the meantime, if you want one, it may pay you to call Intel in the US on 0101-408-765-8080 to check pricing.

ACCESS YOUR CREDIT CHARGES

Most PC users will be aware that you can balance your bank account using suitable software, but did you know that you can plan your credit card payments as well? Good Advice Press is offering its Banker's Secret Credit Card software

Notebook PCs are nothing new, but how about a seven pound unit that features a massive 60Mb hard disk? Tandy's 3810HD unit has just been released in the US and is based around a fast (20MHz) 80386SX microprocessor driving 1Mb of RAM. All the usual notebook features are available - high-res backlit LCD screen and serial/parallel ports, as well as some sophisticated power- saving software to spin the maximum amount of useful time from the rechargeable battery pack.

The price of the new notebook? An interesting \$3,299 - about 20 per cent less than the heavier competition with the same specifications. So when can we expect the machine to be released in the UK? Tandy UK's official line is that not all US products are released in the UK. I'd expect this particular machine, however, to be available later in the summer. In the meantime, there's always the US mail order companies.

US STUDENTS FINED FOR VIRUS

Three Charleston high school students have been suspended and ordered to pay \$5,000 in restitution after they were found to have inserted two computer virus programs on to their school's computer network. According to school officials, the virus programs caused havoc on the network of 150 PCs, deleting files en-masse. Fortunately for the school - and the students - most of the files had been backed up.

As a result, school officials have concluded that the insertion of the virus programs was an act of stupidity on the part of the students rather than malicious. Clinton Giles, vice principal of Capital High School, told the US press that the students "...were not trying to destroy the system. They took a few liberties that had not been extended and created problems that were beyond their wildest expectations". Greg Bailey, a solicitor for the Kanawha County school board said that the network was shut down for a week during May and a consultant was hired to remove the virus programs. Bailey said that one of the viruses "... was obtained from a book," while the other was received from a computer bulletin board system.

NINTENDO GETS STROPPY

Hot on the heels of taking legal action against the Far Eastern suppliers of pirate games, Nintendo America is getting serious about US distributors of these games. Last week saw the games machine giant take legal action against US importers, distributors and retailers handling the games, claiming copyright and trademark infringements.

In a statement from its Redmond.

Washington, offices, Nintendo said the law suits have been brought against nine defendants and their businesses, alleging unfair competition among many other things. "These actions arise out of the sale of counterfeit multiple Nintendo video game cartridges," the statement said. This could mean hard times ahead for UK suppliers of counterfeit games cartridges, usually priced way below the official prices. Stock up while you can.

HAYES STEPS UP TO 14,400 BPS

After grabbing a fair slice of the high-speed modem market-place with its Ultra Smartmodem 9600, Hayes has speeded ratings yet again with its Smartmodem 14400, a \$1,199 modem that can whiz data at up to 38,400 bits per second (bps) down the phone line. This incredible data throughput is made possible by the use of V.32Bis and V.42Bis modem technology. The V.32Bis modem chipset whirrs along at 14,400 bps, while the V.42Bis data compression software squeezes data over the modem link.

In a statement from its Atlanta headquarters, Hayes claims that the Ultra 144 "delivers unique connectivity to SNA, X.25 and ISDN networks and supports virtually every modem communication application in mainframe, workstation and personal computer environments." Hayes president Dennis Hayes said that the Ultra 144 is "... ideal for customers who want to be 'first' with new technologies and whose applications require additional throughput."

The Ultra 144, available in the US this August, also features Hayes Autosync for synchronous communications, MI/MIC for support of PABX and security systems, and CCITT V.25bis for synchronous autodialing. ■

SUPER-FAMICON— US LAUNCH IN SEPTEMBER

It's official - Nintendo's Super-Famicon home computer system is being readied for launch in the US this coming September. Nintendo reports that mail orders for the machine are already into the high hundreds. The US name for the Super-Famicon is the Super NES. The machine has become a best-seller on the domestic Japanese market since it was released last November, despite the fact that it is incompatible with the original Famicon computer system.

In Japan, Nintendo reports that sales of the \$200 unit have topped the \$2 million mark, a figure it hopes to double by the end of the year, thanks to pent-up demand in the US. So far, __Nintendo has sold about 30 million units of the eight-bit version of the Famicon computer system in the US. The machine has almost saturated the market, as

witnessed by a 29 per cent sales slump during the first quarter of this year.

So when will we see the Super NES on this side of the Atlantic? According to Nintendo Japan, there are no plans to for Europe yet, but sources in Japan suggest that early '92 is a probable launch date in the UK. For now then, it looks like the 'grey market' importers will be the only source of supply of these excellent games machines.



CIRCUIT

We asked you to dig deep for the most outrageous computer tales you could find. David Ward took on dedicated serious industrial machines with his Spectrum and Amiga... and won

avid Ward works for electronics giant GEC in a division dedicated to optical technology. This can mean anything from a simple lens to an antireflective coating and to a full blown telescope David takes up the story:

Optical coating or, to give it its proper title, optical thin films, is a technique for the improvement of the transmission or reflection of light from glass surfaces. This is achieved by the evaporation of one or more chemical compounds onto the glass within a vacuum chamber. The results are dependent on what compounds are used and their relative thicknesses, usually measured in nanometres. In the early days most coatings consisted of one or two layers, this was quite adequate for simple optical instruments designed for naked eye observations. However, as detectors became available for use in the regions of the electromagnetic spectrum outside the human visual range then new coatings needed to be developed, especially those of a high efficiency and broad bandwidth.

SLIDE RULE TECHNOLOGY



CUSTOM COMPUTING

 The output from the Commodore Amiga (above) is streets ahead of the dedicated machine (right) which costs over ten times more and needs a professional operator.



It wasn't long before our physicist decided he needed his own thin film design software, and so he set about writing a program

Now here is where you might like to know about this super computer. It is a Perkin Elmer 3500, and it cost the company over £4000, including the operating system and Microsoft BASIC, twin 360k 5.25" floppies, 48k of memory dropping to 26k with BASIC loaded, mono hi-res graphics, all running on a Motorola 68000 chip. This is the machine I learnt to program on.

After about a year the thin film design software was up and running. At the same time I was confident enough to purchase my first computer, the good old rubber keyed Sinclair Spectrum. It soon became apparent that my £129 Spectrum was as good a machine as the Perkin Elmer and I didn't hesitate to point this out. Of course I was laughed at.

SWEET REVENGE

One night I decided to get my own back and so armed with a listing of the program I sat down and began to type it in. After much trial and error I got the thing to work. Imagine the look on their faces when the humble Spectrum matched the £4000 Perkin Elmer in performance, and beat it with a colour display too. When the Spectrum program was compiled it was a clear winner. ent began. By 1982 a computer was purchased to act. There was no compiler available for the PE, if there as a dedicated equipment controller and it was found to | had've been I bet it wouldn't have cost £15!



ON OUR OWN

By now the physicist had left and so coating design was left to the production staff. Some of my colleagues had also bought Spectrums, but my boss had to be different, he chose the C64. One of the Spectrum owners was really hot on design work and spent his evenings working with the Spectrum, transferring the data to the PE for the better graphics printout. He too eventually left, and with the work we were doing beginning to dry up, not much design was taking place.

ENTER THE AMIGA

1987 was the year when the 16 bit machines began to appear more affordable and new orders were in the offing. The PE was getting long in the tooth and other departments were getting new equipment so we thought it was about time that we had a replacement. Perkin Elmer were marketing their model 7500 Professional workstation based on the 68000 chip, a mere snip at £10,000, so we persuaded the company to buy an Amiga 500 and a colour printer instead!

I'M AFRAID that I'll have to pour cold water on both of your ideas. Most CD ROM players are able to play music CDs as it's a fairly simple job to take the digital signal from the disk and turn it into something to listen to.

Any basic CD ROM or CD player can do or can be adapted to do this. When you get into the realms of passing data to a computer you need a dedicated interface that both the TV and the CD ROM drive can recognise.

If you compare the price of a cheap CD player (£80) with the cheapest CD ROM (£300) you may notice a teeny difference in price. The CD ROM player has all the extra bits necessary to talk to the computer. In raising your question you do inadvertantly raise another.

Are the extra parts in a CD ROM worth the price differential? In PC and some Macintosh installations an extra interface board is provided for the computer which can justify some of the extra expense but as the size of the CD and multimedia market increases I think we'll see that price differential narrow.

Your idea for an adapted TV remote control wouldn't work because in order to function, the CD or computer would need to be set up to recieve infra red signals and interpret them. Even if you could build the infra red interface to receive and interpret the signals, each different kind of ROM drive would need a different interface.

It would be possible to produce a dedicated infra-red controller for say the Amiga and we'll give some thought to a remote interface in Circuit City

THE PURPOSE of opto-isolating a MIDI interface is to protect both the computer and the MIDI network. Opto-isolators work by passing the electronic signal using a short light bridge and restoring the signal and level on the other side of the bridge. If anything goes horrendously wrong with anything on the MIDI network and large quantities of volts, amps, current or surges get loose, they stop in their tracks at the opto-isolator.

If you are planning to build some sort of MIDI interface don't risk blowing up hundreds of pounds worth of equipment for a £5 chip. Opto-isolators (or opto-couplers as they are also known) are easily available and necessary.



6128 BBS

Is it possible to run a bulletin board on an Amstrad 6128? I remember reading about one a long time ago but have lost the mag, read it wrongly or dreamt it.

IT IS POSSIBLE, it has been done, there have been several articles and we

can direct you to the experts. The easiest most efficient way to run a BBS on a 6128 is to use a program called ROS (remote operating system) which works under CP/M. There are versions of ROS specially configured for use with the 6128 and if your modem isn't already catered for, it should be possible to get a modem driver welded together by some helpful programmer.

ROS is written in Borland Turbo
Pascal and the source code is available
from Dave Gorski at Aspects BBS. The
system that you've described should run
ROS as it is without modification. If you
contact Dave at Aspects by logging on
and leaving a message, he should be
able to provide you with the files and
advice that you need. In order to configure the system for your own BBS, you'll
need some sort of word processor.

This is because Turbo Pascal is a compiled high level language and the source code takes the form of a text file. If you understand programming in Pascal, you will be able to further tweak ROS to suit your own ideas and installation. If you're not a programmer, at least you'll be able to configure the screens and messages to your own specification.

The only problem that you may have is in compiling the program. The Turbo Pascal compiler that runs on the CPC is a shade rare nowadays. You'll probably need to find someone with a compiler to do the job for you.

You can either digitise into the program that comes with the digitiser and import the file as clip art or you can digitise on the fly straight into your page in Stop Press

The image for digitising can come from a video camera, still video camera, video recorder or any composite video source.

Again, Dave Gorski should be able to provide a name. If you are a relative newcomer to pogramming and compiling, it's probably a good idea to have someone who understands Pascal compile the program for you.

Turbo Pascal is a powerful language but an unforgiving one. It's easy for a compilation to fall over due to a simple syntax error of punctuation. If you're used to de-bugging Pascal, these mistakes will seem to leap out of the screen or print out to be remedied in short order.

If programming isn't your forté, the colon masquerading as a semi-colon will remain cunningly hidden, refusing to reveal itself as the frustratioin quotient passes the red line. Driven BATty

A PC that was bought at a computer auction had been stripped of software and the 20Mb hard drive only had the files off the provided DOS disk and some strange short text files with the

file extension .BAT. I understand that the AUTOEXEC.BAT file is the one that the machine polls in order to boot and run but what about the other files? They are ROUTE.BAT. WP.BAT. COMM.BAT, PIL.BAT and FU2.BAT. When I try to run them by typing the filename all fail exept FU2.BAT which causes the machine to crash and lock up. The only way to reset the machine after the crash is to turn it off at the switch. What are these files that are sending me batty and are they any use? I've replicated two of them below:

THE BAT FILES are text files which give the machine a series of instructions to follow in much the same way as the Autoexec file does only instead of starting up the machine, a batch file might start an application like a word processor or spreadsheet. The two batch files that you've copied work in the same way. They change from the root directory to the dedicated directory of the application that you need to run and then start the program. The person that had the PC before you had Autoroute Plus route planning software and Protext word processor among their applications and although they've wiped the disk, they've left the batch files.



PC Expansion

I have a PC that has no extra room for expansion on the motherboard but I need to add memory. It is a 286 AT clone and someone who knows about these things opened it up, poked around and told me the following. It is a 286 with 1 megabyte of memory. The video and hard drive controllers are part of the motherboard. There are two cards in the expansion slots. They are a multi i/o card with parallel, serial and games ports and a V21/23 modem. The remaining one eight bit and four sixteen bit slots are free. He further added that a simple way to add memory would be on an expansion card where he reckoned that I could add up to 32 megabytes on board.

THE SIMPLEST WAY to do the upgrade is a slot in memory card as your friend suggests. It may sound a bit backwards way round but it is possible to have a machine with more memory than storage. With the correct software to take advantage of the extra memory a PCs productivity and efficiency can be increased by a large factor. One thing to consider if you're planning to upgrade your 286 is that perhaps a 386sx motherboard may be a useful option too.

The 386 chip has the ability to operate a multi-tasking environment and run as several 'virtual' 8086 processors. If you use your PC for jobs where you move data from application to application you may find that the 386 solution is best in the long term, allowing you to have several applications open at once and cut and paste between them. Check if your software's compatible if you take this route.

There are two logical ways to do it. Firstly, you could get comms programs running on both machines and connect them together using a null modem cable. There are PD comms programs available for both machines for a few pence and Tandy will sell you a null modem connector and serial cable for a few pounds. Save your files in the ASCII format and use the comms software to send them down the wire.

Alternatively, there's a program called Cross Dos that enables an Amiga to read and write a PC disk. As the ST is also able to read and write a PC disk, it's a simple matter of saving an ASCII file on the Amiga and importing it into Calamus on the ST.



WINDOW SHOPPING

The windows environment makes programming an easier task, but what languages and systems can you use? Mary Branscombe tells you what's new, how to use it, where to find it and what to read about it ...

icrosoft unveiled the new Visual BASIC programming system for Windows at the Software Tools 91 show. What you get is a language that looks like fairly standard Quick BASIC offering object oriented facilities. On top of that, Visual BASIC is an event oriented programming language and one of the first of its kind.


With Visual BASIC, you can program your computer to recognize events that are assigned to a window. So, if you wanted to have a signal sent through the COM port every time you clicked a Windows button – say to request some data from a database elsewhere on a network – then you could simply draw the button on the screen, give it an object name. That name enables both Windows and you, the programmer, to access it in future. Then you write procedure.

WHAT YOU GET

Microsoft is keen to stress that Visual BASIC is not a Fourth Generation language, but it does come as a complete environment.

- The Forms designer is a fairly complex application in itself. This lets you draw all the Windows icons and buttons and create text windows or windows that contain bitmaps. It takes about three seconds to draw and name a radio button. In Microsoft C that would be atleast 30 lines of code. Because this is a Windows application itself, you'll also be sticking to the Windows interface guidelines.
- The event-driven BASIC compiler based on Quick BASIC.
- Editing and debugging tools.

But can any BASIC program be converted and run under the new system? The answer, in all honesty, is no. Although *Visual BASIC* applications are remarkably easy to set up, there are still fundamental differences in the way you would approach a program. Because Visual BASIC is event driven, whole programs revolve around what happens to, say, the mouse port or the COM1 port rather than using interrupt routines to search for activity in that particular part of the computer's hardware. Because most applications will sit around waiting for the user to move the mouse or hit a key, this is actually a very good way of writing an application.

know about, you need *Undocumented DOS*. One of the authors, Tim Paterson, wrote the original QDOS (Quick and Dirty Operating System!) that became MS-DOS – so you can rely on the information in these pages.

The book is organised in a similar way to the standard DOS technical manual, covering functions and data structures. It's full of examples, all of which are on the floppy disk that comes with the book. Not only do you get all the inside information on programming the operating system, but you also get some handy utilities, including on-line hypertext documentation for all DOS functions.

WHAT'S NEW

- The official way to program Windows 3 applications has always been to use the Microsoft Software

 Development Kit and a language like Microsoft C 6.0, which is all very well if you are a C programmer.

 Microsoft's release of Visual BASIC a language based on their Quick BASIC that lets you put together the Windows part of an application by dragging icons around shows that even they realise that not everyone who's interested in Windows is a C programmer. Lots of alternatives have been coming through the letterbox this week.
- WINBASIC is a version of BASIC that gives you ready-written code for many of the Windows functions. A new release, WINBASIC 2, lets you use the Dynamic Link Libraries (DLLs) to use the Windows Application Programming Interface, which contains many of the routines that let Windows applications talk to DOS. You can also get at the COM ports, for controlling printers and modems from an application. If you bought an earlier release of WINBASIC, you can get a free upgrade from Blackwell's on 0865 240201.
- even though dBASE doesn't run under Windows (yet), you can use your dBASE code to create Windows applications with a new product from Megatech (081-874 6511) called dBFast for Windows. This uses existing dBASE code to build Windows applications that can have links to other Windows applications using the Dynamic Data Exchange mechanism. That means that if you are using information from your dBFast application to draw graphs in another package, you can update the information and the graph will change to reflect your new values.

Most dBase commands and functions are supported, so you won't need to change your code very much. There are also some 200 extensions that give you mouse support and *Windows* features like pull-down menus, lists and buttons. Applications can create graphs and display bit-mapped images.

- If you don't already have dBASE code to work from, Easy Windows from March Systems on 0734 404079 builds Windows applications from a series of menus. As you choose icons and images from the design screen, the tables that will store the data in your database are created automatically. As if by magic
- If you remember to take copies of your programs at the right time, you can do version control for yourself. That means that if you change your mind and decide to go back to that first working version of the program, it's in your archives, named and dated. Real life is rarely that simple and you may need some help. Many commercial version control systems are designed for large systems. The Sorcerer's Apprentice from Solutions Systems (0763 244141) is designed to work from inside the Brief text editor, which a good many programmers swear by.

Different versions of a program are numbered and stored in a source code library. Only the differences between the most recent version and the previous file are stored, so you won't need to use hundreds of disks. If you're working on a project with other programmers, you can lock old versions, so that two people can't make different changes to the same file at the same time.





SHOPPING EXPRESS BUYERS' GUIDE

hile Shopping Express is undoubtedly the perfect way to track down the best bargains in the computer world, many people are still wary of buying products via mail order or through personal ads. This is probably because usually you are not able to have a look at what you are purchasing before you hand over your money.

We do everything in our power at this end to make sure that all the advertisements we run are above board. But here are a few tips designed to help take the risk out of buying via mail order or over the telephone.

Be precise in describing what you want to buy. Leave no room for error. Feel free to go overboard in double checking details - make, model, specifications, colour, size, the page number and name of the magazine in which you saw the advertisement etc.

Confirm the exact price of the article you are buying. If you are phoning a company check if there are any hidden extras, such as postage and packaging.

Check how the item will be delivered to you and how long it should take. This is especially important with reader ads where delivery details are rarely mentioned. • If you are writing off for the product keep copies of all letters. If you are phoning, note down details of when you phoned and who you spoke to.

• If possible enquire about guarantees and servicing. Check the supplier's policy on returns and refunds. With reader ads, it is best to make the effort to see the item personally before you hand over money.

• When possible pay by credit card for items over £100, as this provides extra cover under the credit card companies' own insurance schemes. Otherwise use a crossed cheque or postal order. Avoid sending cash at all costs.


ally spend any of it, the point of the exercise is somewhat lost. Still, it is mildly entertaining and passes the hours quite merrily for a time.

It all gets very frantic very quickly and it soon becomes a case of autofire on and brain off (or vice versa, depending on how good you are). The graphics are quite lovely for a PD title and scroll smoothly and quickly. The backdrop of

verdant jungle terrain is wonderfully drawn and suits the game perfectly.

Sprite animation is superb, especially the end of level guardian (look, it's the Goodyear Blimp), a massive and imposing dirigible.

The sound effects are outstanding; lots of sampled voices and explosions, all beautifully implemented.

The game has a very high quality feel and wouldn't look out of place at full price as an arcade conversion. It is completely free!

All in all a noisy, frenetic and ultimately wonderful game. But that's not all! It comes on a disc packed to the brim with a selection of equally wonderful games. Wow!


Amiga sickos where are you? Come on, we know you're out there, lurking in the shadows, pondering thoughts of inexplicable violence and gore.

The disc was sent this way by L.A.P.D. in Derbyshire. I'm not entirely sure what the deal with this disc is. It seems to be the official version, programmed by Atari themselves, just why it's available on PD is a bit of a mystery.

No complaints from this direction though, as getting one of the bestest, weirdest, narliest games ever for free is hardly a problem. *Joust* is weird though. You control a knight, who rides just about the strangest mount ever. It's a flying ostrich. No seriously, and it's set in a mystical medieval time when lance-bearing knights did that kind of thing all the time.

The point of the game is to navigate the bird from platform to platform, knocking out opposing knights as you go. This is quite tricky. To fly, you tap the fire button repeatedly to flap the ostrich's wings. You can then move left and right as you rise.

To take out a bad guy, you have to be higher than him and land your bird on his head, this can be difficult, as the platforms bounce you around when you hit them.

Dead birds drop eggs, it's a good idea to catch these for bonus points, if left, the eggs hatch, revealing more dangerous birds and knights to go with them.

The graphics are simple and attractive. Weird is definitely the watchword here though and this game will keep you up into the wee small hours of the night. It's a perfect conversion of a perfect coin-op and you can't say fairer than that can you?



D Construction Kit is a simple-to-use three dimensional environment. It lets you design buildings landscapes and even full worlds. You can settle for 3D design or progress to developing games. The accent is on a suite of software driven by on-screen prompts, icons and menus. This is important to a user who wants results with the least effort.

WHAT'S THE USE?

Two main uses of 3D Construction Kit are as a designer, allowing the user to express a concept in 3D and move in and around it, and as a game designer, letting good game ideas be translated into the Freescape environment without weeks of complex coding. Freescape was popularised in the games Driller, Dark Side, Total Eclipse and Castle Master.

PRODUCTIVITY

The 3D Construction Kit is a fun way to achieve productivity in design and environment with the least work.

There are two things to run on the single disk. There's a demo game and an editor. When you run the editor, you are faced with a main screen from which options can be accessed. The bottom 40 per cent of the screen is taken up by a panel of icons that allow you to access menus and take short cuts in the planning and creation of your design.

VIDEO TUTORIAL

There's a short VHS video cassette tutorial. This leads you through the first steps of using the 3D editor by example, showing you what to do and what will happen if you do it. Objects are made by creating a shape from a menu, dragging it to shape and moving it into position. Complex designs and shapes can be made from simple ones and are easily manipulated.

Objects are made from a palette of 16 colours that become 256 using dithering techniques.

If you want to add life to your creation there's a command language to cover 'what if'. This could be something simple like a cupboard opening, something a little more complex like an object moving when shot, or a condition that moves you to another location when you touch a door panel giving the impression going through a door to another location.

A command language sounds daunting, but the

one in 3D Construction Kit is a logical instruction set that can be easily mastered. This part of the program that relies most on the manual. Commands IF ACTI-VATED, THEN, ELSE, and ENDIF have their function mapped. The 50 commands cover everything from trigger function to animation.

At the top of the screen there are four pull-down menus for File, General, Area and Object. They intuitively guide you through the different controls necessary to build your own world. These are mirrored in the manual in a graphical way that shows you the position of the commands on the menus and explains their function. If you want to find a function in the program, all you need is look it up and the graphic next to the description shows you where it is and what it does.

THE VERDICT


A combination of the command language, easy to use icons, good documentation, and pull down menus make 3D Construction Kit a powerful program that can be used by anyone of average intelligence and imagination, with patience and time on their hands.

MACHINE SPECIFIC

We tested on the ST, but versions are also available for the Amiga and the PC. All of the versions share the same manual. Other than a no mouse option for the PC, and a choice of either joystick or cursor cluster operation, the only visible differences are the sound. The ST and Amiga can utilise sampled sound while the PC is limited by the diminutive PC beep.







CHALLENGE GOLF

On-Line • Amiga, ST, PC • £24.99

The recent release of Electronic Arts' brilliant PGA Tour Golf was thought by many to be just about the last word in computer golf games. On-Line clearly disagrees, and they've brought us this low-key, no-licence release which they presumably hope will clear up what's left of the market. Sad to report, though, there's not much chance of that. Despite being loaded with enough options to make even Mrs Thatcher a little bit undecided (1-4 players, any number of computer opponents, skill levels, various types of competition and practice matches, etc etc), Challenge Golf is decidedly second division material. The game seems largely to play itself, the player's control inputs having minimal bearing on the actual flight of the ball.

Graphically it's extremely crude, and bugged into the bargain (the 3-D replay, for example, doesn't relate to the actual shot, and sometimes even shows the ball bouncing on water). Soundwise there's very little to get excited about (the 'sound off' option included is a complete waste of code space, or possibly a little programmer's joke) and in general the game just doesn't have the right feel to it. Putting in particular is dreadful, with short putts apt to bounce off the hole (don't ask me why) and come straight back at you, ending up further away than they started.

This game doesn't have anything to recommend it over PGA Tour except the price, and if it's price you're concerned with you can buy World Class Leaderboard for eight quid. (And get a much better game into the bargain.) Give it a miss.

hen is a laser printer not a laser printer? When it's an Okilaser Page Printer. The Okilaser Page Printers 400 and 800 are not actually laser printers - they use a technique known as LED technology to produce print outs (see box below).

An average user would not notice the difference they look like laser printers, they are set up like laser printers and, most importantly, they produce print quality virtually indistinguishable from laser printers. Indeed, the results we achieved from the review machine, the lower specification Okilaser 400, were very good. Small fonts printed crisp and clear while bold fonts were sharp and well-defined. Only some of the finer fonts, when italicised, showed signs of becoming bitmapped.

SETTING UP

If you know what you are doing, setting up one of the printers will only take a few minutes. If, however, you need to refer to the manual, it will take a while longer,

The Okilaser Page Printer sounds like a laser printer, prints like a laser printer, but is definitely not a laser printer. Dave Golder puts the machine to the test to see how it performs.

SO HOW DOES A LED PRINTER WORK?

With a laser printer the laser scans to and fro across the drum, repeatedly switching on and off depending on whether the area to be printed should be black or white. The image from the drum is then transferred to

A LED (Light Emitting Diode) printer has a line of diodes, 300 per inch, which remain in a fixed position. As the printer drum rolls beneath them they will switch on and off in a series of different patterns; there will be 300 separate patterns

for every inch of printed area (this gives a print resolution of 300 dots per square inch). This process etches the image to be printed into the toner on the drum, and the image is transferred on to paper in the same way as a laser printer.

since the manual is filled with very helpful-looking diagrams that are not, in fact, that useful. For example, one diagram shows how to insert the image drum, but it is near impossible to tell which way around, or even which side up, the drum should be placed in.

Once switched on the printer takes less than a minute to warm up and, provided you have connected it up to the computer correctly - again something not very clearly explained in the manual - you are ready to print.

Both the 400 and the 800 are HP LaserJet Series II compatible, so if your software does not have an Okilaser printer driver (which is very probable) you should encounter few compatibility problems as most software packages that require print outs have HP Series II drivers.

The Okilaser printers have 25 resident fonts which, at the price, is a very good selection. There are four basic fonts types available - Courier, Helvetica, Times Roman and LN Printer, which can then be made bold or italicised and used in five different sizes.

More fonts are available with 'font cards' which can be obtained separately for £89 each. These are slightly smaller than credit cards and slot into an opening in the side of the printer. Useful, but a bit expensive.

SLOW AND SHORT LIVED

The print speed on the Okilaser 400 is relatively slow. Officially it is four pages a minute, which is about the

machines at comparable prices offer six pages per minute. The Okilaser 800 offers a maximum of eight pages a minute, but will cost you an extra £500.

The toner also has a short life printing only 2,500 sheets - about the half the average for most laser printers. But its toner cartridges, priced at around £19, are excellent value - the average price is around £90.

A drawback the Okilaser unfortunately shares with many laser printers is that it only comes with half a megabyte of RAM as standard; this makes the printing of complex pages created with desktop packages almost impossible. Although upgrades are readily available (from £299 for a 1Mb expansion) it seems strange that the company cannot offer a model with at least 1.5Mb of RAM.

Despite these drawbacks, the Okilaser 400 and Okilaser 800 are very good value for money, offering a competitive alternative to standard laser printers.



LOST IN SPACE



Far from the public glare, visionaries are developing plans for space habitats and sculptures that will orbit earth and be visible to a global audience. Rik Haynes taps into their underground network of art, science and technology ...

he advent of computer graphics, fax, interactive video, teleconferencing, holography, hypermedia and the proliferation of other computer technologies have spawned a new breed of high-tech artists. All share a common disillusionment with the use of science and technology for weapons by turning the tools of Big Brother to their own advantage. These people are contemptuous of television, enthralled by virtual reality.

Possibly the most far-reaching of these artists are the pioneers who wish to break through the boundaries of crowded small-scale art galleries by invading the outer reaches of space. These people look on space as an exciting canvas for the arts of the future.

FORUM FOR HIGH-TECH ARTISTS

Information must have a means of dissemination. Reporting on and nurturing this constant innovation drive is the responsibility of the International Society for the Arts, Sciences and Technology (ISAST). This is a non-profit organisation dedicated to promoting the use of contemporary science and technology in the arts. Associate membership in ISAST is open to professional artists, collectors, scientists, engineers and others interested in modern arts and sciences. Membership brings them plenty of benefits and a subscription to *Leonardo*, the bi-monthly journal of art, science and technology.

"This is the foremost international forum for artists and others interested in the application of contemporary science and technology to the visual arts and music," says a ISAST spokesperson.

"... space exploration has inspired an extraordinary variety of artistic activities"

Leonardo features articles written by artists about their own work, as well as discussions of new concepts, materials and techniques.

In the past year ISAST has begun sponsoring a program that brings *Leonardo* authors, editors and prize winners to local arts institutions for speaking engagements. According to Roger Malina, Executive Editor of Leonardo, "Artists have accompanied explorers on many of the great voyages of scientific and geographic discovery. So it should be no surprise, that, in the last decade, space exploration has inspired an extraordinary variety of artistic activities."

One of ISAST's special theme pack includes articles on a clay sculpture series Unidentified Intergalactic Rovers', satellite art and a call for a Space Ethics Committee. Space Art News is an occasional publication of ISAST in collaboration with the International

GOING UNDERGROUND



Academy of Astronautics. This newsletter, which is also electronically published in an on-line bulletin board, covers fine art which makes use of new techniques, materials or sensory experiences generated as by-products of space exploration.

STAR GAZING

The Sun Drawing Project and L'Astrolabe are typical of the projects revealed in Space Art News.

Supported by the National Science Foundation in America, the VLA Sun Drawing Project is a monumental-scale work of art by Janet Saad-Cook. Located at the national Radio Astronomy Observatory's Very Large Array (VLA) near Socorro, New Mexico, Sun Dawning is a moving mural of light that combines art with the key principles of astronomy, optics and space technology.

While L'Astrolabe is a large outdoor sculpture by Alain Le Boucher, created earlier this year for the exhibit 'Les artistes et la Lumiere' at the Centre National d'Art Comtemporain in France. This sculpture is interactive, the viewer is able to dial-up various images of the night sky on TV monitors. George Dyens also made a 30' x 30' installation for the same exhibit entitled Big Bang II which included holograms, optical fibres and electro-acoustic music.

Conferences and communications regarding space art are regularly occurring throughout the world, from London to Beijing.

The International Academy of Astronautics is currently organising a session on Space Architecture and Space Settlements. At the Round Table on Art in Space, the main topic of discussion was ethical and concerned public art issues arising from orbiting sculptures visible from the ground. Several architects involved in the Eiffel competition were among the participants and a French transcript is available. The International Design for Extreme Environments Association is to be formed later in the year to cover all habitations in extreme environments including orbiting space stations and future outposts on the Moon, Mars and other planets.

Just in case of a potential intergalactic conference, Hans Freudenthal has constructed a language to communicate with members of an alien society.

For some, the time for talk and planning is over. Japanese artist Cao Guo Quiang has created an artwork titled '45.5 Meteorite Craters made by beings on their 45.5 million year old planet'. The work is located in Pourrieres, France and was created using 50Kg of gunpowder, dried grasses and paper last summer. The site, some 10,000 m², as viewed from aerial photographs, shows a large field pock-marked with craters.

Contemporary American artist James Turrell is working on a gigantic earthwork at Roden Crater in Arizona. This volcanic crater is being modified through the building of chambers and passages, and the smoothing and altering of natural topography.

With the International Space Year due to begin in less than six months time, *Leonardo* is planning a special issue, The Artist and Space Exploration, highlighting the work of artists, scholars, scientists and engineers in this exciting field.

Additionally, artist Arthur Woods and aerospace engineer Marco Bernasconi are already working on a remarkable scheme which could spark a new age of art. The Orbiting Unification Ring Satellite Project is an ambitious series of space sculptures. The first is due to be launched next year by the Soviet space agency. Ironic, when you consider similar technology would also be used to launch a nuclear missile strike.

Space really is the final frontier. Artists are boldly going where no-one has gone before.

SCIENCE AND ART

Our culture has produced so few people like Leonardo da Vinci who found it natural to live in a world where science and art coexist. *Leonardo* is the journal for the International Society for the Arts, Sciences and Technology (tel 0101 415 845 8298)

THE ARTISTIC ROCKETEER AND THE ROBERT MAXWELL

Frank Malina, founder of *Leonardo*, was an American scientist who, after receiving his PhD from the California Institute of Technology in 1936, directed the Wac Corporal program that put the first rocket beyond the earth's atmosphere. Malina also co-founded the Jet Propulsion Laboratory and Aerojet General Corporation. He was an active participant in rocket science development in the period leading up to and during World War II.

As an artist, Malina was highly versatile and experimental. He quickly moved from traditional media to string constructions and finally to the development of systems for kinetic painting.

Malina was impressed with publisher Robert Maxwell after he took it upon himself to find and liberate warehouses full of German scientific journals that had accrued during the Nazi regime in isolation from the world's scientific communities. Together, they formed *Leonardo* - the first journal devoted to science, technology and the arts.

When Malina died in 1981, *Leonardo* became the responsibility of his son, Roger, an astrophysicist at the University of California at Berkeley. Roger Malina is married to one of Robert Maxwell's daughters.




