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Coming Up . . THE **BIG** MONTHS

At a time when most luxury item industries take an involuntary post-Christmas rest, the record industry swings into its strongest season.

Hot new singles by top-name artists, which were being held back for fear of being caught up in the programming confusion which confronts the record industry during the holiday season, are now coming out in full strength. As a result, air play has a refreshing quality to it. Jocks who had to play some of the worn titles by the top names only because there was nothing new available, are now substituting the new titles-a factor which should result in heavy store traffic.

In the area of album product, almost all of the important diskeries have already unleashed their big guns including once again some magnificent new commercial material which no doubt will be climbing the best seller list in short order.

Along with the strong new merchandise in the LP field, companies are now offering some mighty tempting discount deals including dated billing as well as a number of other excellent incentives to buy ... all of which should result in a tremendous buying period during the rest of this month.

Another important factor which keeps the industry swinging during the early months of the year is the huge number of phonographs which were sold during the Christmas season. Many people across the country are now sitting at home with lovely new phonographs and perhaps very few records for them. The coming months will probably see these people investing a good

deal of their income and allowances in both singles and albums.

Also lending a timely hand is Mother Nature, who with the aid of Jack Frost forces most people throughout the country to spend more time indoors, and, as a result, more time with records.

Now is the time to make hay. Consumers buy more records during the first three months of the year than any other quarterly period. Now is the time when a manufacturer, distributor, dealer and rack jobber can get maximum milage out a good hit item.

In addition to all the above mentioned factors which contribute to a big sales season, there are a number of other characteristics which could make this winter one of the biggest ever.

Economists are predicting a tremendous business year, for one. They feel the public will be spending more and saving less during '61. Then there is the "Twist" which has developed into a much bigger boost to the record industry than anyone had anticipated. And we believe that the Twist has only scratched the surface of its potential. Thirdly, during the past few weeks, we have heard a great many encouraging remarks about sales total for both hot albums and singles-including word that a few recent singles have gone over the million mark. It's encouraging news considering how rare such an event was last year.

It should be a very big winter ... with a little extra initiative and a little-bit-o'-luck, it could be down right great.

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
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
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

"CHIP CHIP" (2:13) [Trinity, Glo-Mac BMI—Barry, Crofford, Resnick] "ANOTHER TEAR FALLS" (2:18) [Eleventh Floor ASCAP-David, Bacharach]

GENE McDANIELS (Liberty 55405)

McDaniels, fresh from his "Tower Of Strength" top-ten'er, hits the wax scene this week with another powerhouse that can go all the way. It's a fabulous rock-a-cha-cha thumper, dubbed "Chip Chip," that Gene & the Johnny Mann Singers deliver with solid sales authority. "Another Tear Falls" is a haunting, string-filled ballad that also rates close at-tention tention.

"PICTURES IN THE FIRE" (2:24) [Spoone ASCAP-Rosenblatt, Kalmanoff]

"I'LL SEE YOU IN MY DREAMS" (2:35) [Leo Feist ASCAP-Jones, Kahn]

PAT BOONE (Dot 16312)

Boone starts off the new year with a two-sided sales heavyweight in this newie-oldie combination. The newcomer's a captivating, tear-compelling, beat-ballad hip-swinger tabbed "Pictures In The Fire." From the ever-green dept., it's the sentimental beaut, "I'll See You In My Dreams," set to an ear-arresting, string-filled shuffle-ballad pace. Excellent two-sided ork-choral support from Billy Vaughn's crew.

"TALKIN' ABOUT YOU" (2:32) [Aldon BMI-King, Goffin] "MY BABY'S A STRANGER" (2:16) [Aldon BMI-Rubin, Koppleman, Keller] TONY ORLANDO (Epic 9491)

Orlando, who has already tasted a number of hits in his young career, can have his biggest one to date in "Talkin' About You." Stanza's a con-tagious thumper that sports some delightful opening vocal byplay by Tony and the femme chorus. Ultra-commercial Carole King arrangement. Topdrawer rock-a-cha-credits belong to Alan Lorber on the potent pairing, "My Baby's A Stranger."

"MAMIE IN THE AFTERNOON" (2:10) [Sunbeam BMI-Kander, Goldman, Goldman] "YES, OH YES, IT DID" (2:30) [Lescay BMI-Keyes, Lewis, Rene] **BOBBY LEWIS (Beltone 1016)**

Lewis, who racked up an impressive list of hits during his debut wax year, starts off the new one on the right foot. His latest offering, "Mamie In The Afternoon," is an enticing twist ditty from the up-coming B'way musical, "Mamie In The Afternoon." More top twist sounds on the sock coupler, "Yes, Oh Yes, It Did." Winning Joe Rene ork assists once again.

"THE BATTLE" (2:04) [Gregmark BMI—Hazlewood, Eddy] "TRAMBONE" (1:40) [Athens BMI—Atkins] DUANE EDDY (Jamie 1209)

"The Battle" should easily prove to be another sensational money-maker for Duane Eddy & his Rebels. It's a rockin' adaptation of "The Battle Hymn Of The Republic," that gets the full Eddy-funky guitar, growlin' sax, handclap and shout treatment. Looks like a real biggie. Also keep an eye on the intriguing easy-beat while-back noise-maker for cleffer Chat Atkins an eye on th Chet Atkins.

"IT'S GOOD TO HAVE YOU BACK WITH ME" (2:57) [George Paxton ASCAP—Warren, Kent] "HOW ARE THINGS IN LOVER'S LANE" (2:45) [Winneton BMI-Howard] ADAM WADE (Coed 565)

Wade comes up with another charmer from the beautiful country-flavored ballad dept. Tune, dubbed "It's So Good To Have You Back With Me," is superbly executed lilter that should be all over the charts in the weeks to come. More splendid ballad sounds (from the pen of standout tune-smith Harlan Howard) on the other end. Can also come thru in top flight fashion.

"THE THORN ON THE ROSE" (2:32) [Aldon BMI-Keller, Kolber] "THE SOUND OF SADNESS" (2:07) [Painted Desert BMI-Hart, Tarshis] JOE DOWELL (Smash 1730)

Dowell can score with this interesting change-of-pace from his polka-waltz hit outings. This one, tabbed "Thorn On A Rose," is heartfelt lover's lament set to a slow, martial-like beat. Strong choral-ork support. However, don't overlook "The Sound Of Sadness" jumper on the other end. Could be a back-to-back clicker.

"TEEN QUEEN OF THE WEEK" (2:09) [Conley ASCAP-Slay, Crewe] "WILD GUY" (2:34) [Chicory BMI—Hunter] FREDDY CANNON (Swan 4096)

Cannon's recent addition to his long hit string was "For Me And My Gal." Look for "Teen Queen Of The Week" to be his next. It's a happy-go-lucky thump-a-twist'er that Freddy & the Frank "Flying Circle" Slay ork-chorus belt out with coin-catching enthusiasm. "Wild Guy" is another dandy teen-styled ditty that the artists pound out on the other end. end.

LENA CALHOUN (Flip 358)

> (B+) "I CAN TELL (I'm Losing Your Love)" (2:00) [Limax BMI—Wells] R&B thrush does an infectious upbeat vocal against a very catchy sound from the musicians and chanting femmes. Has chart potential in both the R&B and pop areas.

(B) "BEEN LOOKIN' YOUR WAY" (3:00) [Limax BMI— Wells] Smooth Latinish romantic from the performer and support.

HERB ZANE (20th Fox 289)

(B+) "DIGGA-DIGGA DUM DUM" (B+) "DIGGA-DIGGA DUM DUM (1:45) [Paul-Ee ASCAP— Zane] A sunny stint that takes com-mercial advantage of the happy sound of Yiddish "freilech" music in both Zane's chant vocal and the ork back-ing Might prove a left field success ing. Might prove a left-field success.

(B) "HOKEY - POKEY ROCK" (3:35) [Paul-Ee ASCAP-Zane] Strictly for the teeners is this good-natured dance lesson.

THE HOT TOMALES (Pac 3501)

(B+) "HUM DOUBLE BUBBLE" (2:20) [September BMI—Sum-ner, Hill, Thompson] Here's a whacky sock-rock novelty about bub-ble-gum. Songsters perform with sure-fire chant gimmicks, and a hand-clap sound supports throughout. Date could make it. Label is handled by London London.

(B) "HOT TAMALE" (2:07) [September BMI — Sumner, Hill, Thompson] Somewhat less hectic teen novelty track.

JERRY FULLER (Challenge 9132)

(B+) "WAKE UP SLEEPING BEAUTY" (2:24) [4-Star BMI —Fuller] Songster can score with this appealing Latinish romantic, some-times multi-tracked, about a fella who wants a gal to wake up to the fact that he digs her. Fine rock-a-string setting. Eye closely.

(B) "TRUST ME" (2:26) [4-Star BMI—Burgess, Fuller] Bluesy, slow-beat pleader.

DEAN JONES (ABC-Paramount 10283)

(B+) "OLD JOE CLARK" (2:20) [Trinity BMI—Jones] Here's an off-beat item. Jones warbles a catchy spiritual-like folk ditty against a snappy rhythm beat plus strings. Could catch-on.

(B) "I'VE LOST HER LOVE" (2:30) [Trinity BMI—Jones] Moody disenchanted stint for the teeners.

THE BELAIRES (Arvee 5034)

(B+) "MR. MOTO" (2:04) [Arvee BMI-Johnson, Delvy] Guitars and keyboard do a solid-sounding rock job on the previously cut ditty. Ses-sion generates an excitement the teeners will dig.

(B) "LITTLE BROWN JUG" (2:06) [Arvee BMI—Winner] Familiar tune is taken for a snappy rock ride.

FORD EAGLIN (Imperial 5802)

(B) "GOING TO THE RIVER" (2:10) [Commodore BMI — Domino, Bartholomew] The old Fats Domino success is reliably revived by the performer and his infectious easy-best combe chorus accompaniment beat combo-chorus accompaniment.

(B) "I'M SLIPPIN' IN" (2:25) [Commodore BMI—Bartholo-mew] Catchy upbeat blueser.

NICO FIDENCO (RCA Victor International 2)

(B+) "TIED TO A GRAIN OF SAND (Legata un Granello di Sabbia)" (3:22) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Marchetti, Fidenco] Victor's foreign product label has released the star Italian songster's recent smash. Very attractive opus is effectively crooned by the performer in English and Italian. A pretty Latinish full ork-chorus sound supports. Can break-out in the States.

(B) "WHAT A SKY" (2:34) [Roosevelt & Hill & Range BMI—Cassia, Maselli, Fusco] This is an earlier hit by the performer, sung in English. Opus is haunting.

BRUCE JOHNSTON (Donna 1354)

(B+) "DO THE SURFER STOMP PART ONE" (2:10) [Maravil-la BMI-Johnston, Hartnett] The Twist-able dance-step, currently get-ting big disk activity, is done with sure-handed zest by the songster and his solid-sounding combo-chorus back-drop. Strong survey on the step.

(B+) "DO THE SURFER STOMP PART TWO" (2:20) [Maravil-la BMI—Johnston, Hartnett] Very worthy teen-market work is continued sans vocals.

RAY ALLEN & THE UPBEATS (Blast 204)

(B+) "LA BAMBA" (2:10) [Kemo BMI—Valens] From an LP devoted to hits by teen stars who have died, singer Allen and his crew do a good-sounding job on one of the late Richie Valens' smashes.

(B) "PEGGY SUE" (2:15) [Nor-vajak BMI—Holly, Allison, Petty] A soft-spoken stint on the late Buddy Holly's famed vehicle. Also from the LP, which is tagged "Trib-ute To Six."

ALLEN COLLAY (Instant 3241)

(B+) "FOUR DAYS — FOUR NIGHTS" (1:54) [Tune-Kel BMI—Collay] Collay's gets to the teen heart of the pleasing teen wistful. Combo-chorus setting, including sax-keyboard solos, is a good-sounding affair. With enough exposure, side affair. With could move.

(B) "BYE BYE BLACKBIRD" (2:04) [Remick ASCAP— Henderson, Dixon] Oldtimer is up-dated with a good, sing-along-like feeling. BLACKBIRD"

THE DEVOTIONS (Roulette 4406)

(B+) "RIP VAN WINKLE" (2:20) [Sidmore BMI — Sanchez]
 Solid old-fashioned upbeat novelty blend from the R&B-flavored song-sters. Included are such gimmick sounds as "snoring" and a bowling ball striking pins. Whacky enough to get attention. Eye it.

(B) "(I Love You) FOR SENTI-MENTAL REASONS" (2:18).
 [Duchess BMI—Best, Watson] Deliberate-beat reading of the durable.


GABRIEL & HIS TRUMPET (Norman 514)

(B+) "MISS YOU SO" (2:45) [Ex-cello BMI—Babb] Fine blues opus is presented with a well-done trumpet-led sound and a good-sound-ing, steady-beat combo arrangement. An interesting sound that merits airtime.

(B) "CC RIDER" (2:30) [Mis-souri BMI—] Chuck Berry's onetime smash is done with good rock vitality by the trumpeter and same steady-beat backing.

THE DOVELLS (Parkway 833)

The Dovells are a good bet to follow their "Bristol Stomp" smasheroo with another chart triumph in "Do The New Continental." It's a solid rock-a-shuffler that features a dandy set of teen dance instructions. There's a deep, raspy-voiced lead on the incessant beat "Mope-itty Mope Stomp" stanza.

MAXINE BROWN (ABC-Paramount 10290)

Take your pick here. The thrush has a sensational new ABC duo that has those money-making ingredients notched into every groove. For the initial action it's the "This Little Girl Of Mine"—flavored rock-a-twist'er, "I Got A Funny Kind Of Feeling." For the long haul it's the extremely pretty, ballad-with-a-beat weeper, "What I Don't Know." Top notch assists supplied by Roy Glover's outfit.

"CRY TO ME" (2:33) [Mellin-Progressive BMI-Russell] "I ALMOST LOST MY MIND" (2:19) [St. Louis BMI-Hunter] SOLOMON BURKE (Atlantic 2131)

Burke, who crashed thru the hit barrier in a big pop-r&b hit way with "Just Out Of Reach," can repeat with his newest Atlantic session. It's a tantalizing rock-a-cha-cha opus, tagged "Cry To Me," that Solomon and the Klaus Ogerman ork-chorus knock out with telling effect. There's an ear-pleasing beat-ballad revival of "I Almost Lost My Mind" on the other end. Watch it too.

"HE KNOWS I LOVE HIM TOO MUCH" (2:20) [Aldon BMI—Goffin, King] "A LONELY GIRL'S PRAYER" (2:35) [Darcey BMI—Spector, Sands] THE PARIS SISTERS (Gregmark 10)

Femmes, who scored heavily with their reading of "I Love How You Love Me," can make it two-in-a-row with their newest on the Era-dis-tributed Gregmark label. It's another tender ballad, dubbed "He Knows I Love Him Too Much," that they deliver in their pretty, soft-spoken manner. More war, ear-arresting sounds on the touching coupler.

"PATTI ANN" (2:06) [Maravilla, Escort BMI-Smith, Goldsmith] "DONNA" (2:36) [Kemo BMI-Valens] JOHNNY CRAWFORD (Del-Fi 4172)

Crawford, who plays Mark McCain on the popular "Rifleman" TV'er, can latch onto another chart-rider in his newest Del-Fi issue. It's an inviting soft beat cha cha romancer, titled "Patti Ann," that has an at-tention-getting echo chamber sound. Coupler's a warm beat-ballad up-dating of the late Richie Valens classic. Both ends are included in his "Captivating" LP.

"THE WHITE ROSE OF ATHENS" (2:28) [Peter Schaeffer's ASCAP—Hadjidakis] "SLAUGHTER ON TENTH AVENUE" (2:06) [Chappell ASCAP—Rodgers] DAVID CARROLL (Mercury 71917)

Ork leader Carroll can have a big deck this side of the Atlantic with his wonderful version of "The White Rose Of Athens," the current German chart-topper penned by Manos "Never On Sunday" Hadjidakis. Tune, from the "Dreamland Of Desire" flick, is an enchanting, sweet sax spot-lited lilter that the jocks'll love. Backing's an engaging beat-ballad (with sans lyrics choral chants) of the Richard Rodgers classic.

"A GOOD MAN IS HARD TO FIND" (3:17) [Mayfair ASCAP-Greene] "FLOP EARED MULE" (1:49) [Andick BMI—Traditional; Adapt. by Griffith] ANDY GRIFFITH (Capitol 4684)

The next big comedy single may well be Griffith's deacon-like "sermon" which makes very humorous use of the lyrics (and sometimes the tune) to the standard, "A Good Man Is Hard To Find." A "live" audience sometimes participates in the whacky proceedings. Flip is an authentic-sounding folk novelty date.

TONY MARTIN (Dot 16313)

(B) "THE BRIDE (La Novia)" (2:46) [Regent—Prieto, Web-ster, Fain] The oft-cut international hit gets a sensitive, English-sung portrayal from the vet warbler. An effective cover version.

(B) "HORIZONS OF JOY (Oriz-zonti Di Gioia)" (2:31)
 [BIEM—Garinei, Giovannini, Modug-no] Brighter item sung in Italian.

JOHNNY HALO/CINDI PRINCE (Southern Sound 109)

(B) "ERRAND BOY" (2:15) [Al-don BMI—Mann, Hunter] Tale of a "part-time" love affair is under-standingly relayed by singer Johnny Halo. He warbles against a good slowbeat combo-male chorus setting.

(C+) "BABY SITTER" (1:52) [Rehmel BMI — Gailbreath] Cindi Prince sings this lively opus, about a gal who bemoans the fact that she has to baby-sit.

EDDIE CANO (GNP 172)

(B) "HAVA NAGILAH" [P.D.—] Pianist Cano fronts a pach-anga outing for the Israeli favorite, now hitting as "Flying Circle" in a reading by Frank Slay on the Swan label. Bright listening.

(B) "LA CASITA (Ahora Seremons Felices)" (3:00) [Southern ASCAP—Hernandez] Male chorus is included in this cha-cha date. Both tracks stem from an LP called "Mucho Piano."

THE MAJESTICS (Chanson 1007)

(B) "SAFARI" (2:10) [Czar BMI—Fletcher, Bunch, Dabbs, Kissel, Montgomery] Solid-sounding jungle-type rocker. Top sounds come from a growling sax and steady per-cussion beat. Fine wild-one instru-mental for the youngsters.

(B) "RIDING BY" (2:06) [Czar BMI—Fletcher, Bunch, Dabbs, Kissel, Montgomery] Sax and percus-sions again lead-the-way in a romp date.

DAKOTA STATON (Capitol 4673)

(B+) "WHEN I GROW TOO OLD TO DREAM" (1:55) [Robbins ASCAP — Romberg, Hammerstein] From an LP cut "live" at Storyville, the famed jazz nitery, the performer offers a bright swing rundown of the offers a bright swing rundown of the sentimental oldie. She's backed by a happy stint by The Norman Simmons Quartet. Can come-up with strong station time.

(B) "MEAN AND EVIL BLUES" (2:41) [Pic ASCAP—Metruis] Down-home sound from the album.

PAUL LONDON (Check Mate 1006)

 (B) "NEVER LIKE THIS (The Big Band Twist)" (2:15)
 [Chevis BMI—Davis] The stature of the dance is noted with a pro sock-rock sound from the warbler and his combo-chorus companions. Deserves combo-chorus companions. Deserves Twist time programming.

(B) "SUGAR BABY" (2:38) [Kata & Bridgeport BMI— Davis] Funky harmonica is included in this effective bouncy-beat display.

KING CURTIS (Tru-Sound 406)

TIME" "JIVIN' (B) (2:45)[-Curtis] The tenor saxist is spotlighted on a relaxed blues jumper from an LP, "Trouble In Mind."

(B) "I HAVE TO WORRY" (2:41) [-Curtis] Curtis sings this blues moody. Also from the al-

(B+) "DOOLEY WALK" (2:37) [Ben Ghazi & Ellen BMI — Floyd] Guy encounters an infectious dance step in this spirited R&B-styled novelty stint from the songster and his pro combo-chorus accompani-ment. Kids will dig the approach.

(B) "HEY, I LIKE IT" (2:25) [Ben Ghazi & Ellen BMI — Floyd] Similar blues rockin' here.

ARTHUR ALEXANDER (Dot 16309)

(B+) "A SHOT OF RHYTHM AND BLUES" (1:44) [Fame BMI —Thompson] Songster and gal chorus-combo offer a contagious trib-ute to the R&B sound. Catchy cut that could get some action.

(B) "YOU BETTER MOVE ON" (2:40) [Spartus & Keva BMI —Alexander] A softie stint that re-calls dates by The Drifters and Ben E. King.

LES McCANN (Pacific Jazz 335) (B) "WONDER WHY" (2:58) [Robbins ASCAP — Brodsky, Cahn] The popular jazz pianist tries his hand at warbling and acquits him-self nicely in this easy swinger on the old flick tune. Gerald Wilson's smart band crew backs-up. Side is from an LP of McCann vocals LP of McCann vocals.

(B) "NEXT BAND" (2:45) [Ste-len BMI—Jenkins] More re-laxed vocal-ork swingin'.

JOYCE DAVIS (United Artists 413)

(B) "MEAN TO ME" (2:39) [Fred Ahlert & Cromwell AS-CAP—Ahlert, Turk] Lark invitingly reads the great oldtimer against a big-sounding rock-a-string setting. Can make noise with enough exposure.

(B) "CHANCES ARE" (2:30) [Korwin ASCAP—Allen, Still-man] Rich Latinish backdrop backs the performer's stint on the early Johnny Mathis hit.

THE FOUR AMIGOS (Capitol 4680)

(B) "LOVE THEME FROM 'EL CID'" (2:31) [Robbins AS-CAP, Rozsa] Spanish songsters offer an English reading of the pretty item from the recently opened film epic. Lush Spanish-flavored guitars support. A different helled sound to program. A different ballad sound to program.

(B) "AMOR EN ABRIL" (2:50) [Friendship BMI — Monge]
 Appealing softie sung in Spanish. Team has a fine legit sound.

BILLY JOYCE COMBO (On The Ball 109)

(B) "(They're) TWISTIN' IN HONG KONG" (2:35) [Drax-on BMI—Dixon] Oriental-flavored touches in this good-sounding organ-led novelty on the big dance. Vocal comments are included. This worth-while Twist date is from a label based in Elizabeth, N.J.

MG 20682 Cashing in on the success of his current chart item, "Walk On By," Leroy Van Dyke kicks off his premiere LP with the biggie and launches into eleven other country tunes with the assurance of a long-successful artist. Collection includes "Big Man In A Big House," a previous Van Dyke hit, plus songs by the best country tunesmiths writ-ing today. Notable examples of the chanter's abil-ity are his readings of "Big Shoes" and "Funny How Time Slips Away." Disk seems a natural to score in the coin department.

"SHOWCASE"—Patsy Cline—Decca DL 74202 Since she first hit it big with "Walkin' After Midnight," Patsy Cline has risen to the top ranks of country stardom. Lark's vibrant delivery and style have won her a large and loyal following of fans. This Decca LP truly displays all of her vocal talents. Backed up by the Jordanaires, Patsy reads her current chart-ride "Crazy" plus eleven other country favorites. Disk should create a lot of ex-citement.



"TWISTING THE OLDIES"-Night Owls-Val-



--Capitol ST 1649 Boston's famed jazz night club Storyville provides the background for Dakota Stanton's first on-stage recording. Thrush completely captivates her audience as she reads standards such as "The Show Must Go On," "Mean And Evil Blues," and "Easy To Love." The Stanton style is, as always, top-drawer. Set should make noise with the legion of the lark's admirers.

"GREEK SONGS"—Four Coins—MGM SE 3944 The Four Coins draw upon their own backgrounds to deliver this top-flight collection of Greek folk songs. The only tune not of a folk origin is "Never On Sunday," which seemed so appropriate to the spirit of the album that it was included. The se-lections, which are mostly in English, capture all the joy of the Greek people. Disk could score with the group's fans as well as folk tune buffs.

"TWISTING WITH THE CADILLACS"—Jubilee JGM 5009

JGM 5009 The free-flowing, hard-driving sound of the Cadil-lacs give forth with a hot group of tunes geared for teens and oldsters alike. The beat is rockin' and twist is fast as the group reads "Speedo," "It's Love" and "Sugar Sugar." Disk has an in-fectious spirit that should make it favorite with the entire twistin' set.

"ONE FOR MY BABY"—Eddie Heywood—Mer-cury SR 60632 Eddie Heywood dishes up a tasteful collection of evergreens and two original compositions in this third offering from Mercury. Pianist, who is ably assisted by Albert Lucas on bass and Donald Lamond on drums, demonstrates a first-rate swingin', soft sound on all the tunes essayed. The likeable Heywood touch is superb as he reads "Body And Soul," "It's All Right With Me," and "Don't Take Your Love From Me." Excellent set. Should score with all the 88er's fans.

"LES BROWN AND HIS BAND OF RENOWN PLAY THE GERSHWIN BANDWORK"-Colum-bia CL 1679 All Gershwin fans should find this attractive,

All Gershwin fans should find this attractive, swinging album from Les Brown a welcome asset. Orkster Brown leads his boys through the paces of "Somebody Loves Me," "Love Walked In," and "They All Laughed" with the strict attention to melody that the music demands. The band has a polished, compelling sound that puts new life into the Gershwin sturdies. Jay Hill has supplied some excellent arrangements for the Brown group.

"GUY LOMBARDO AND THE ROYAL CANAD-IANS GO DIXIE"—Capitol ST 1648 Guy Lombardo has cast aside his familiar sweet

Guy Lombardo has cast aside his familiar sweet sounds to come up with a lively bag of Dixie fa-vorites. Orkster proves his versatility as he reads "Tin Roof Blues," "Down Home Rag," and "Musk-rat Ramble." Lombardo directs his attention to beat in the offering, giving the tunes rendered here a fast-moving, swinging flavor that is com-pletely enjoyable. All the arrangements are first-rate on this Capitol LP.

"NORMA ZIMMER SINGS TRUE LOVE"—Dot DLP 25404 Norma Zimmer, who has a national audience from her featured spot on the Lawrence Welk TV'er, showcases her vocal talents in this first LP effort. Thrush beautifully reads a group of inspirational sturdies including "Battle Hymn Of The Repub-lic," "This Is My Country," and "Ave Maria." On four selections she is teamed up with Jim Roberts for duets. Disk should score with all champagne fans. fans.





Occasionally, Father Dustin accompanies himself in song, which does much to give this LP a warm, human flavor.



"6 MILLION ACCUSE"-United Artists-UAL 9003

9003 United Artists has produced a memorable spoken-word offering of the recent trial of Adolph Eich-mann. Disk gives penetrating insight into Eich-mann the man. Yehuda Lev provides an impres-sive English narration, giving a factual account of the courtroom activities. LP preserves a page of history that should not be forgotten and ranks as ton-rung, enthralling listening. as top-rung, enthralling listening.



"AMERICA'S FAVORITE ORGAN HITS"—Don George—Reprise R 6008 Don George offers a superior collection of mood music in this new Reprise album. The disk is divided into two parts: "Torah In Song" and "Wedding In The Old Country." The first part is concerned with the hope and faith that is con-tained in the first five Books of the Bible. The later selection is centered on the happy, spirited occasion of marriage. Singers Adele Margolin and Mort Freeman are excellent, as is Shmuel Fershko, who conducts an orchestra gathered especially for this disk.

wEAVER OF DREAMS — Kenny Burrell—Co-lumbia CL 1703 Kenny Burrell, who has achieved success as a jazz guitarist, now spreads his wings as a full-fledged vocalist. Burrell's voice is warm, sincere and original as he reads an interesting group of sturdies and newies. His vocal style is a perfect compli-ment to the melodic strains of his sensitive gui-tar. This boy could really score as a pro songster. Disk should attract both pop and jazz fans.

"MEET MR. TRUMPET"—Dick Ruedebusch-Jubilee JGM 5008



He started with the hit of 33 years ago and worked up to the present day. Roger played these records during the 11-5 AM stanza.

It was Happy New Year and Hap-It was Happy New Year and Hap-py Birthday recently on KDKA-Pittsburgh's "Party Line" program. Ed and Wendy King's 10:05 to mid-night all-conversation show celebrated its 11th birthday on New Year's Night. "Party Line" was started on January 1, 1951, with Ed handling the on-the-air portion and wife Wendy answering telephone calls off-mike. Wendy soon took her place at the microphone and has remained there ever since. ever since.

Col. Arthur Sheets, director of Oregon State civil defense, together with Jack Lowe, Portland civil defense di-Jack Lowe, Portland civil defense di-rector, presented a special award certificate to KEX-Portland in recog-nition of the "Operation Survival" project of the station which included a blast shelter test. The shelter test, which was conducted in November with a KEX personality and his wife actually living in the shelter under simulated attack conditions, was com-mended by Mr. Lowe and Col. Sheets as, "greatly adding to the public un-derstanding of the conditions under which those in fallout shelters must exist."

In spite of a busy commercial sched-ule before Christmas, WNJR-Newark managed to broadcast 1,048 public service announcements between De-cember 1st and Christmas Day. 

NEW YORK—Fourteen albums in-cluding the label's bow in the "sound" field, mark the initial '62 product from Warner Bros. Records. The new albums were introduced to all 32 WB distributors recently via a series of audio-visual presentations throughout the country. WB district sales managers staged meetings in all distributor markets for its distributor personnel, in addition to a series of dealer meetings in 11 key markets. The diskery's new "sound" line, debuting with three LP's, is a project

Brubeck Calls For Singles To Challenge Public, Musicians

NEW YORK-Music that's a challenge to the public (and the musicians who play it) has an important place in the singles field, according to jazz pianist Dave Brubeck, whose "Take Five" and "Unsquare Dance" jazz deck were a recent click in both juke boxes and on the Top 100.

Citing the acceptance of "Take Five," Brubeck believes that the public can meet the challenge of such music.

He termed a "serious offense," the music industry's underestimation of the public's taste. This "lack of duty," the performer added, is present at all levels of the music field, including musicians, labels, disk jockeys and others who bring disks before the public.

Brubeck is particularly displeased with the material found on today's juke-boxes, and would like to see the jukebox return to the importance, "good-music-wise, it had when he was a kid growing-up, with its heavy reliance on programming of singles by the likes of Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington and other masters of past jazz eras."

"When the music industry doesn't realize its duty to the public, this country will be in trouble," Brubeck feels.

"All persons involved in the presentation of music," Brubeck concludes, "should take their most important work more seriously."

2 New LP Lines **From Synthetic Plastics**



London Sales Up 25% In 9 Mos. Period

NEW YORK—London Records' net sales for the nine month period ending Dec. 31 exceeded the same period of 1960 by 25%, the firm has reported through Leon C. Hartstone, veep and general manager.

London, a wholly owned American subsid of the Decca Record Co. Ltd. of England, has had success in the pop singles field here via its distribution of such indie labels as Hi, Monument, Felsted and many others.

On LP's, London reported continued strength with its vast opera catalog, including "Lucia" with acclaimed soprano Joan Sutherland, and decks by Mantovani. In addition, the label noted the strong appeal of its "sound" series, phase 4, which debuted last August.

Victor Bows Red Seal Program Designed To Boost Classical Sales

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records, in cooperation with its distributors, is launching a major "Red Seal Merchandising Program," beginning with this month's Red Seal releases (see below), to help boost the sales of classical disks.

In all its aspects, this program is designed to meet the needs of all dealers, "especially those who are genuinely concerned with the future of their classical business," an announcement said.

"It is no secret that sales of classical recordings have not increased as fast as other types of music," George Marek, vice-president and general manager of RCA Victor Records, noted.

"Nor have they grown to the same extent to which the public's appetite for serious music has grown in recent years," he continued.

"For many months, RCA Victor has conducted an intensive study of the classical retail market. The results showed that the predictions for unprecedented opportunities in the Sixties are entirely sound. However, they also revealed one fundamental problem. 'New' customers' frequently look for a type of dealer-service which is hard to find nowadays. They need and want the guidance of 'experts,' the personal attention which self-service by itself can not provide. In addition, neophytes as well as oldtimers are quick to become discouraged when they can not find the records which they came to buy. This is especially true in the case of new releases which they advertised or reviewed."

Dealers with an established classical business, it was learned, have become increasingly aware of this problem. Some of them have already begun to re-introduce services which few stores have provided in recent years—including listening facilities, individual attention by knowledgeable and courteous sales people, etc.

The program involves an obligation on the part of the dealer to:

1. stock the new Red Seal releases, in agreed on minimum quantities and for a specified period of time; 2. provide efficient service on the entire Red Seal catalog, utilizing the new "Dealer Special Order Service" for any albums not carried in stock. This service is designed to augment the dealers' sales from the complete Red Seal catalog by direct shipment either to him or his customers. The dealer must display at all times the special materials which describe this service, includan identification decal for use in the window, and show-cards, for use in the window and inside the store. (See separate story)

3. participate in Red Seal merchandising, promotion and advertising, including local newspaper or radio advertising on all new releases, window displays, etc.

The advertising and promotional support which will be available to augment this dealer effort is "unprecedented in the history of the record business," Victor declares.

In addition to the usual national advertising, Victor has established an entirely new basis for the most effective use of advertising on a local basis. In 1962 alone, a special and substantial fund will be available for local exploitation of the new Red Seal albums — including newspaper and radio advertising, dealer sales-aids, displays, etc.

Designed to publicize the new releases as well as the stores where consumers may be sure to find them, all ads will be uniform in size and content.

Victor's first Red Seal issue of '62, consisting of six issues by top keyboard artists, bows Victor's policy of limiting Red Seal releases to a quantity which "dealers and classical collectors can treat with full justice, under present conditions."

"As the market for recordings of serious music develops further, in size as well as scope," the announcement said, "RCA Victor will keep apace in the programming of its new releases."

The six albums:

Artur Rubinstein is heard in performance with conductor Alfred Wallenstein in the Grieg Piano Concerto in A Minor; Van Cliburn plays the Brahms Second with Fritz Reiner and the Chicago Symphony; the Beethoven Piano Concerto No. 1 is heard in performance by Sviatoslav Richter and the Boston Symphony Orchestra conducted by Charles Munch; the Boston Pops Orchestra, conducted by Arthur Fiedler, plays Gershwin-the Piano Concerto in F, with Earl Wild, and the Cuban Overture as well as the first LP recording of Gershwin's Variations on "I Got Rhythm"; two albums of re-issued performances are included in the release: "The Great Rachmaninoff" is heard in a program which includes Chopin, Mendelssohn, Bach, Schubert as well as Rachmaninoff, and "The Unforgettable William Kapell" performs the Khachaturian Piano Concerto with the Boston Symphony under Koussevitzky.

As a bonus to the consumer, each album in the Jan. release will be packaged back to back with "Keyboard Giants of The Past," which was sent for review in December. The recording, which includes performances by Paderewski, Bauer, Lhevinne, and many other pianistic titans, will be available in regular edition with a manufacturer's nationally advertised price of \$4.98.

The final album on Angel's Janu-ary release is entitled "Victoria Le Los Angeles & Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau In Duets," and presents these artists in songs of Purcell, Beethoven, J. C. Bach, Schubert, Haydn, Berlioz, Dvorak, Tchaikovsky, Saint-Saens and Faure. Gerald Moore provides piano accompaniment.

Broadway original-cast album-wise, the label came-up with two strong items, "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" and "Milk

And Honey." Victor's success in the classical field was exemplified by the sale of one million copies of Van Cliburn's recording of Tchaikovsky's Concerto No. 1.

In singles, Elvis Presley kept roll-ing along with such hits as "Sur-render" and "Can't Help Falling in Love," two best-selling albums, "Blue Hawaii" and "G.I. Blues." One of the top singles of the year was The Tokens' number one hit, "The Lion Sleeps Tonight." There were other singles successes by Neil Sedaka, Ann-Margaret and various country artist staples. The label reported that its record club had increased its membership since it was taken-over last year by Reader's Digest.

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

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Here's a report of Brazilian disk activities in 1961, beginning with Chantecler, the youngest of our most important companies. The "cockerel label" as it is known, was responsible for the two greatest Brazilian hits of the year, with two newcomers: Edith Veiga and Martha Mendonça. These two singers recorded, respectively, "Faz-Me Rir"—Portuguese version of "Me Da Risa," and "Tu Sabes," a Brazilian bolero. Those two records reached the top of our charts and stayed there for several weeks. Besides that, Chantecler waxed a lot of other hits, including "Coraçao De Luto" with Teixeirinha, "Teu Despreso," with Claudio de Barros, "Nao Sabemos" with Leila Silva, and many others. RCA VICTOR did a great job, too. The Brazilian version of the "Bat Master-son," theme from the TV series with Carlos Gonzaga, was the most important, followed by Nelson Gonçalves' "Flor Do Meu Bairro" and Carlos Gahardo's "Orguho." Among the LP's, once more Nelson Gonçalves with "Noite De Sau-dade" and "Sambas E Boleros."

Odeon (Brazilian E.M.I. subsidiary) was present on the charts with another version of an American hit, "The Green Leaves Of Summer," under the Bra-zilian title of "As Folhas Verdes Do Verao," waxed by Wilma Bentivegna. Under Capitol label, "Ansiedad," by Nat "King" Cole. Two records of Brazilian singer Orlando Dias had enormous popularity: "Perdoa-me Pelo Bem Que Te Quero" and "Tenho Ciume De Tudo." And under the London label, also repre-sented by Odeon, Del Shannon's "Runaway." Two of the best-selling LP's, ap-peared to be "Eu Sou O Espetáculo" with Brazilian comic José Vasconcellos and the film sound-track of "Can Can" from the Capitol label. Continental Records had some hits, too. The most important was "A Noiva"

Continental Records had some hits, too. The most important was "A Noiva" with Angela Maria, followed by "Corinna, Corinna," with the teenage singer Demetrius, and "Blue Moon," under Colpix label with The Marcels. RGE, Brazilian representative of Dot Records, pressed a few hits with Billy Vaughn, among them "Wheels"-one of the best selling singles of the year, and the LP's "Billy Vaughn No Cinema," "Orange Blossom Special" and "Os Grandes Sucessos De Billy Vaughn." Miltinho, RGE's singer, cut "Poema Do Adeus," "Palha-çada" and "Poema Das Maos," all on the charts, and two LP's: "Poema Do Adeus" and "Miltinho E Samba." And another foreign success, also waxed by RGE, was Bienvenido Granda's "Egoismo."

Musidisc, without being too frequently on the charts, was responsible for releases with an extraordinary technical quality. It began to press in Brazil the United Artists and Command labels. Its most popular releases were "Os Romanticos De Cuba No Cinema" and "Ed Lincoln, Seu Piano E Seu Orgao Espetacular."

Columbia Records, with Ray Conniff's "'S Music," "'S Love" and 'S Different," made the greatest LP's hits of 1961. Besides that, the label was responsible for the first Compact hits, with Conniff's "Aquarela Do Brasil" and "Besame Mucho." Johnny Mathis too was on the charts with his LP, "My Love For You."

Companhia Brasileira De Discos-(Philips) released last year an LP series entitled "Metais Em Brasa," with Henry Jerome's Orchestra, with unexpected success. The five albums with this orchestra appeared on the charts and the EP, "Metais Em Brasa No. 1," was the best selling 7 incher of the year.

Fermata Records pressed, under the Hispa-Vox label, several LPs with the movie actress and singer Sarita Montiel. Two of them are included in the list of the best seller's: "Meu Ultimo Tango" and "La Violetera." At the end of the year, Fermata waxed two single Compacts with Chubby Checker: "The Twist" and "Let's Twist Again," and the two are doing very well and no doubt will be on this year's charts.

And finally, Copacabana Records, with two important hits this year: "Nao Sei Explicar" with Morgana and "Itsy Bitsy Teenie Weenie Yellow Polka Dot Bikini" with Ronnie Cord.

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FINLAND

Annikki Tähti has been contracted to RCA. Miss Tähti has for several years been recording for Scandia, and is also considered as the Finnish recording artist who has the sales record in Finland. Her recording of "Muistatko Mon-repos'n" is reported sold not less than 40,000 copies, a record that might be hard to break in Finland. 30,000 records sold means a gold disk in Finland and except of the above mentioned, Miss Tähti has also received a gold disk for her "Ballaadi Olavinlinnasta." Swedish sincer Laile Munther 10 to Helsishi formediane here

Swedish singer Laila Munther, 10, to Helsinki for radio and TV appearances Jan 7

Jan 7. Laila Kinnunen is mentioned as Finland's representative at the Eurovision Song Festival, taking place in Luxembourg in middle of March. The German song "Iwan Iwanowitsch," a satirical song about a Russian rock 'n roll hero (rock 'n roll is not liked by the Kremlin) was "banned" in Finland, it is reported. After a good sales result of the German version, lyrics in Finnish was ready to be recorded when Moscow started its diplomatic activity a couple of months ago. As a result of this, the record trade con-sidered it might be most wise not to record the song in order not to hurt Fin-land's friendly connections with a foreign country, as the diplomats put it.

NORWAY

Authorities in Norway have got a problem. As in other "non-commercial" Scandinavian countries, Norwegian radio and TV is most anxious not to pro-mote records. However, there is some charity programs in which people send money and ask for a record to be played. Now, someone has discovered that record companies, people at record companies, artists, etc., are sending money asking for their most recent record to be played. An investigation has started to find out how far this has gone and what can be done about it. However, Norway is not the first Scandinavian country to face this problem, Denmark had the same problem some years ago.

SWEDEN

STIM (Performance Rights Society) has distributed a letter to all pub-lishers and record companies in Sweden, informing them that the song "Hava Nagila" is not a "free" song, as everybody seems to have believed. According to ACUM (STIM in Israel), "Hava Nagila" was composed by A. Z. Idelsohn, who died in 1938, and accordingly, the song will not be listed as free or P.D. before 1988. Original publisher of the song is Illan Melody Press in Israel, reports STIM.

About the 170-page Christmas Issue of Cash Box, the office here had the pleasure to receive several phone calls from trade people who expressed their great satisfaction with the Issue.

The German magazine Musik-Markt has published the result of its annual popularity poll. Most popular singer of the year was the Greek-born Nana Mouskouri, but more interesting for Swedish readers was to find that the Swedish Metronome singer Siv Malmquist appears in the fifth place. Another notable success for Scandinavia was that Denmark's Jorgen Ingmann (also on Metronome here) came second in the instrumentalist's group after Billy Vaueba Vaughn.

Metronome here) came second in the instrumentalist's group after Billy Yaughn. Gunnar Wiklund, the BFB singer, made stage debut in a New Year Show at the Southern Theatre in Malmö on December 29. Wiklund, recently came out with his first EP sung in English. Metronome expects a lot from Siv Malmquist's "Läs Inte Brevet Jag Skrev Dej," being the Swedish version of "Don't Read the Letter," according to Börje Ekberg, export manager of Metronome. Ekberg was very happy to notice that SBC-TV just had voted "Multiplication" by Bobby Darin on At-lantic as number one in its "Hit Parade." This is of special interest since, ac-cording to Ekberg, the American company did not want to release this record as it didn't believe in it. However, after requests from all over Europe, the record was released, and by now it seems like it will be a top seller, at least in the Scandinavian countries. On Cadence, Metronome is releasing "Mug Mates," a new Eddie Hodges record, early in January. Siv Malmquist is making a film in Vienna, Austria, in February. It is reported here that Aldon Music is looking for a new rep in Sweden. At the present, the firm's songs are handled here by Robert Mellin (Scandinavia) AB, headed by Ake Gerhard-Larsson. The song competition arranged by commercial Radio Nord has been very popular. Around 600 contributions have been received at the end of 1961. Kassner Musik AB of Stockholm has denied an item in the 1961 round-up from Sweden (Dec. 30 issue) which noted that Stig Anderson would take over Kassner for Sweden starting with the new year.

With the holiday season, the activity of the Argentine music world decreases. Most of the people are commenting on the record market in 1962. Peter de Rougemont, vice president for South American operations of Colum-bia Records, and head of Columbia Argentina, has recently answered some of the questions asked by Mercurio Musical, a magazine published by the Asso-ciation of Record Retailers. de Rougemont informed that the production of the Columbia factory in Buenos Aires increased 40% in 1961, and that the label expected to have more or less the same increase in 1962, too. Regarding the size of the domestic market, he said that "Argentina is a potentially very big market, but to reach higher sales we have to create better conditions for the record buyer, and this must be made in great part, by the retailer, who must improve his sales organization and sell more with less people, as modern op-erating systems require."

When asked about the influence of the recent price increase, he said that "It isn't really an increase, because our costs have also increased. In the United States, the cost of the average LP is 362 pesos, and here it is 395, but, for example, the vinyl costs here is three times more than there; thus, I believe that the Argentine record producer is making all efforts to maintain the records at a comparatively low price."
Regarding the sales of locally produced records in other markets, de Rougemont said that Columbia is making big efforts to release records simultaneously in many countries, and that it is now working in the Spanish-speaking U.S. market, which involves about seven million people, and is very interesting.
RCA Victor offered a party to the press and disk jockeys, celebrating the end of 1961 and the release of a series of new records and the sixth Explosivos LP, "99 Megatoneladas," which is already showing very good sales. The publishers and other recording companies were also represented at the gathering. Spanish songstress Lolita Garrido, who recorded here some singles for Music Hall, went to Montevideo, Uruguay, to appear on radio and TV. Later, she'll return to her country.

During his last visit to Buenos Aires, Mexican singer and composer Roberto Cantoral, with the cooperation of local composer Manuel Sucher, wrote the tune "Locura, Locura," which has been published by Edami and recorded by Armando Pontier (Columbia) Leticia Estrada (Odeon), Argentino Ledesma (also for Odeon) and Arturo Gatica (Music Hall). The publisher expects that "Locura, Locura" will become a big hit early in 1962. Philips, which last year successfully organized the European tour of the Los Fronterizos folkloric group, one of Argentina's best sellers, has been in-vited by Dr. Vitolo, Argentine Minister of Interior, to organize a similar tour for another very popular group, Los Cantores de Quilla Huasi, who some months ago hit the charts with "Angelica," one of the biggest hits in Argen-tina's music history, and are now doing very well with "Del Tiempo 'I Mama," currently number three in the charts. The lists show this week a new hit tune, and it's again a folkloric song: "La

This time its a chacarera, with very good lyrics and rhythm, and a great amount of humor. It was recorded first by Los Chalchaleros and recently by Los Chilicotes for Odeon. In general, Christmas and New Year showed an increase of sales, and especially folk music; as it may be noted, the three folk tunes on the lists ("La Gorda," "Del Tiempo 'I Mama" and "Chacarera Del Finao") have jumped upwards.






Things are looking very good for Johnny Cash. Chanter was recently in Dallas for the premiere of his movie, "Five Minutes To Live." The mayor,

'62 Could Shape Up As A Good Year

Father Time bowed out last week and 1962 checked in smack in the midst of an upsurge in business that has brought about the natural reaction of optimistic predictions from the nation's leading business people.

The reluctant consumer finally opened his pocketbook and started cash registers ringing from one end of the country to the other bringing the nation's total output during the final quarter of '61 to an 8% increase over the first three months of the year and the promise is that this trend will continue right on through to at least midyear. This certainly gives every business firm the time to capitalize on the continued increased spending.

The experts advise us to look for a temporary slowdown in this quickened pace somewhere along midsummer due to several economic factors—the steel industry problems included. But another expected surge is due in the final quarter winding up '62 with a bang and sending the nation off onto a happier '63. If the economists are accurate in their predictions the coin machine industry should expect to share in this prosperity—providing all avenues of opportunity are explored. In fact 1962 will undoubtedly be a year in which increased production and sales will come about primarily due to radical changes in merchandising. Some evidence of these new approaches to sales have already been offered by the nation's business leaders and we outline several of them here:

• Major appliances will experience major sales increases via a completely new approach to sales namely display in giant super-market chains with a price discount based on the housewife's monthly food purchase.

• European vacations for the masses sold through Sears, Roebuck and J. C. Penney mail order catalogs, a move which was heralded by all concerned as a success almost before it started.

• Nationwide acceptance of trading stamps by retail outlets as a means of bringing the customer back for repeat sales. (Just last week the long list of users was increased by the addition of a major automobile dealer network, a drive-in theater chain, and a super-market chain who had previously spent two million dollars fighting the trading stamp practice.)

• An almost frenzied atmosphere in swimming pool manufacturer circles where sales predictions for this coming summer season point to a waterhole in every backyard.

• An already working-plan which will result in the appearance of more and more automatic restaurants completely equipped with vending machines. Early trials in '61 have indicated this.

These are but a few of the changes which are taking place in America's business world and they all have one thing in common—they all represent a *change* in previous methods of merchandising a product or service.

Change is no doubt a prime reason for the increase in this nation's productivity and consumption and we point this out to all members of the coin machine industry because a change should be made in many of the methods used today to sell music and amusement. There are too many indications that the idea of a change is fought rather than supported by many coinmen.

As to the actual changes which should take place, only the individual operator can answer this. He knows best what should be changed on a route. Perhaps the game needs promotion, or the music needs a new programming approach, or maybe he's in the wrong location to begin with. If Philco Corp. can sell freezers from food stores, and Sears can sell 14-day trips to London by mail, then perhaps the methods an operator uses can stand a change. It might be for the better.

In any event, the old chestnut "there's nothing new under the sun" can certainly stand some argument. After all, who ever thought, after a bad business year, that we'd "twist" right into a bright new year with record-breaking sales figures on the horizon?

'61 Cig Sales Set **Another Record For Fifth Straight Year**

NEW YORK—Cigarette operators across the length and breadth of this nervous land of ours were even hap-pier over cig sales reports for '61 last week when the Dept. of Agriculture reported that Americans smoked more

week when the Dept. of Agriculture reported that Americans smoked more than ever during 1961. For the information of ops with snuff vending machines on location— the word is out that sales are drop-ping, so sell. Chewing tobacco is an-other thing—the sales are holding their own. No new buyers, but the old chewers aren't switching to new fangled butts either. Taking the cig sales in single units the figure is an interesting 528 billion butts sold to smokers in twelve months. The figure represents a 4% increase over last year's record-breaking total and any-one connected with the tobacco busi-ness can rest easy for another season. The \$6.9 billion figure is the total amount expended. A good sized por-tion of these coins went through vend-ing machines, probably the single largest purvevor of cigarettes known to man. Federal and local tax people were happy with the figure, too. There will undoubtedly be another increase in sales next year, barring scare headlines on cancer, disease and heart trouble which is not expected. In fact cigarettes have increased sales for five consecutive years in the face of all types of rumors and news. —

In fact cigarettes have increased sales for five consecutive years in the face of all types of rumors and news. ______ Pall Mall led the pack again and remains the number one cigarette in the country today (so don't laff at their commercials).

their commercials). For the benefit of cigar vendors, figure another increase for 1963 as well. The '61 totals were the highest since 1923 (when old, fat guys with big black mustacheos were the main users). Today its smart to appear with a cigar, or so say the ads, and from the increase in sales, we don't doubt it.

Manufacturer's prices have not increased since 1957, according to the Department, but because of steady tax increases the retail price has necessarily increased. From July through October during '61 the cig tax averaged about a nickel a pack (in 47 states)—federal tax is 8¢ per pack. King-size and filters have been introduced at higher prices, too.

In 1961, George Allen, secretary. said in a year-end statement that new heights will be reached in '63 by farmers raising tobacco crops. Allen said that the tobacco farmers grew about 2 billion pounds of tobacco on 1 mil-lion acres and were paid approximately \$1.3 billion for their efforts. Sounds even better than the vending machine business.

the dent. This merger joins an established vending operation with a well-known large volume industrial caterer. This now, for the first time, gives a locally owned and operated company a com-plete range of feeding facilities, both manual and vended. The two Chicago based firms did a total of \$4.5 million business this year in their separate capacities of industrial food catering and automatic vending. They expect to increase this by \$1 million in 1962 through inte-grating the two functions. Commissary, which now is the

sonnel and know-how, we now are the only Chicago company that can handle anything from box lunches and beverages for an industrial outing to the finest hotel-type service for executive dining rooms," Regan said. Coin-Operated Laundry Gains Greatest Response From Handbills Distributed Locally

Kesponse from Handbills NEW YORK—Handbills for delivery by boys or through the mails are among the most effective traffic build-ers for coin-operated laundry and dry-cleaning establishments, according to reports received by Jack A. Coleman, general manager, Small Equipment Sales department of American Laun-dry Machinery Industries, Cincinnati. Operators of Econ-O-Wash stores have reported that Fall promotions have increased patronage as much as 30 per cent in some instances. Econ-O-Wash stores regularly re-ceive traffic building promotions as part of the franchise package. These consist of window posters, in-store displays, handbills, newspaper ad mats and similar aids. This Fall three contests were in-cluded among the promotions. These consisted of drawings with prizes for customers and non-customers. Three types of giveaways were tried. The first, to promote Fall busi-ness, consisted of a wrist watch. The prize for each store was supplied by the franchise. The second was an in-expensive giveaway without a contest for Halloween, when lollipops, also

the franchise. The second was an in-expensive giveaway without a contest for Halloween, when lollipops, also provided by the franchise, were made available to children who came into the store. The third was a free tur-key, with the franchise providing the drawing materials and with each store providing the turkey. Responses from franchise holders are now being evaluated to determine what types of promotions will be used during 1962.

Coleman reported that, as was to be expected, owners who used all the ma-terials reported the greatest increases in patronage. However, virtually all owners indicated that handbills were the most effective. Since coupons on the handbills had to be deposited in a box at the store, they brought many housewives who had never been in the stores previously. The increase in revenue was proof that many took advantage of the trip to use the equipment.

equipment. Window and in-store displays ranked next in popularity among the owners, with newspaper ad mats fol-lowing. The usefulness of the ad mats appeared to be related to the size of the city where the Econ-O-Wash was located. Lower rates and less wasted circulation in smaller cities appeared to make these ad meta more useful to make these ad mats more useful

'The main objective of the franchise is to achieve a continuity of pro-motion by Econ-O-Wash franchise holders," Coleman pointed out. "No store achieves the maximum return on the investment without promotion. However, it must be recognized that many Econ-O-Wash owners, like others in the field, are investors inexperienced in promotion techniques. That is the reason we supply a com-

That is the reason we supply a com-plete package so that each promotion is virtually self-executing." The Christmas promotion stressed an institutional, rather than a sales approach, on the theory that institu-tional promotion is as important for an Econ-O-Wash as it is for a major industrial company. The kit apprised of two large

Industrial company. The kit consisted of two large Christmas wreaths, two smaller wreaths, two Santa Claus posters, thirty bunches of holly and a one-column newspaper mat. The single theme, "Merry Christmas From Your Econ-O-Wash Coin-Operated Laun-dry," appeared, but most of the mate-rials were nurely decorative with po rials were purely decorative with no copy at all.




