HERE COMES CHRISTMAS

Though a well-heated Indian Summer keeps memories of Summer fresh in our minds, Christmas is just around the corner. The actual selling season for Yuletide records doesn't begin until after Thanksgiving, but new Christmas albums are being introduced to the trade now and now is the time to plan Christmas purchases.

Judging from the releases we've already received it should be a fantastic season for the record business this year. Cover art and quality of material are at an all time high, and stereo packages should be a tremendously important factor this Christmas.

Last year the holidays fell shortly after the introduction—on a major scale—of stereo albums. And the practice of releasing new albums simultaneously in both monaural and stereo was almost non-existent. Today almost all companies are issuing monaural and stereo Christmas packages at the same time. And a considerable number of stereo phonos have been sold since last Christmas. Add these two factors together and we can expect stereo to play an important role in this Yuletide's record grosses.

Now is also the time for dealers, jobbers, etc., to plan display space and promote the idea of giving records as gifts for Christmas. Display space is of great importance for Christmas merchandise and all too often such disks are relegated to some corner of a shop losing the potential such records can offer.

But it is also of utmost importance to caution dealers who do the reverse—display Christmas material and neglect the best selling goods. Christmas records can never hope to cover the wide range of tastes offered by the year-in-year-out best sellers or the current chart hit LP's.

Christmas is without a doubt the best selling-season for all records, and it is imperative that every outlet for the product devote considerable time and careful thought for the merchandising of all product during its peak season.

Records have become one of the most welcomed and appreciated gifts available and outlets recognizing the fact that their entire inventory contains gift appeal will benefit most from the strong season just around the corner.

● The Laurie label should continue its successful importation of European hits (i.e. Chris Barber's "Petite Fleur"; Ivo Robic's "Morgen") with another Continental click, "Marina," an infectious rhythm affair originally released in Belgium. As with "Morgen," a foreign language vocal (Italian here) is no barrier, as it's actually the sound that counts. Side's got strong chart goods. "Manuela" is taken at a sentimental rhythm pace.

"STAY BESIDE ME" (2:15) [Kemo BMI—Olofson, Ellenhorn]

"BIG BABY BLUES" (1:45) [Kemo BMI—Valenzuela]

RITCHIE VALENS (Del-Fi 4128)

● Del-Fi issues another slice from its Limited Valens Memorial Series and it could make a big hit with the late chanter's vast following. Tabbed "Stay Beside Me," it's a slow ballad romancer projected in a haunting "Donna" style. Very pretty offering. "Big Baby Blues," the funky, steady rhythm affair on the flip is strictly instrumental.

"Crying In The Night" drives in powerhouse fashion.

The hip-swinging rock-a-ballad affair on the other half is the theme from the "Jet Over The Atlantic" flick. Also bears watching.

As a result of heavy deejay plays and requests for the side wherever Buckner appears Capitol has issued it as a single. It's a slow, low down blueser that the artist weaves with intrigue. The easy swinger "Count Basement" makes for a fine backer-upper.

NEW YORK—For several months prior to his death in Rome, Mario Lanza had been engaged in making his first new live recordings for RCA Victor in several years as a result of free time between movie commitments, it was reported last week by Alan Kayes, manager, Red Seal A&R.

Since the spring of 1959, in RCA's Rome Studios, Lanza had recorded material for four albums, including "Mario Lanza Sings Christmas Carols," which was released recently by Victor. In addition, before word was received of the tenor's death, Victor had also announced the future release of his newly-recorded performance of "The Student Prince." The remaining albums will be released according to Victor's original schedule, sometime in 1960.

Mario Lanza was one of the most popular Red Seal recording artists. His soundtrack albums, from "The Great Caruso" and "The Student Prince," remain among all-time Victor classical best-sellers. His most recent albums for RCA Victor include "For The First Time" and "Mario!"

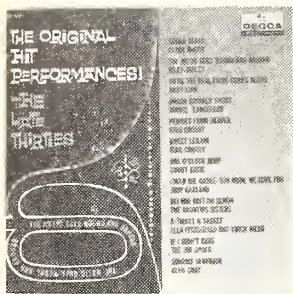

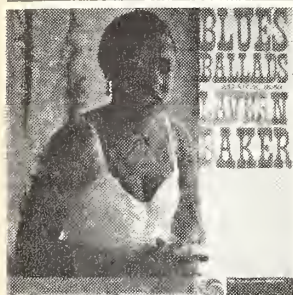
"JOHNNY AND THE HURRICANES"—Warwick W 2007

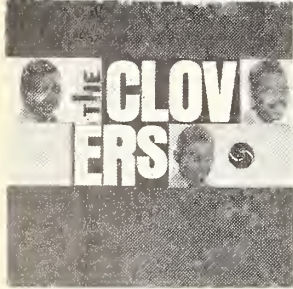

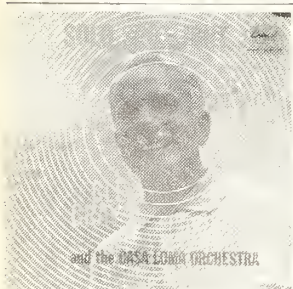
"GALE STORM SINGS"—Dot DLP 3209 (Monaural & Stereo)

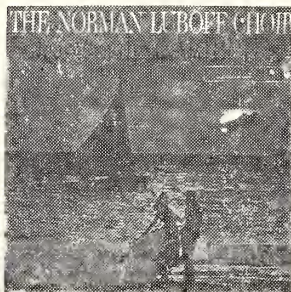
"JOE WILLIAMS SINGS ABOUT YOU"—Roulette R 52030

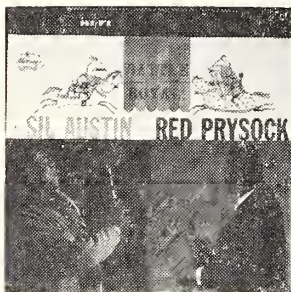
"SONGS OF THE CARIBBEAN"—The Norman Luboff Choir—Columbia CL 1357 (Monaural & Stereo)

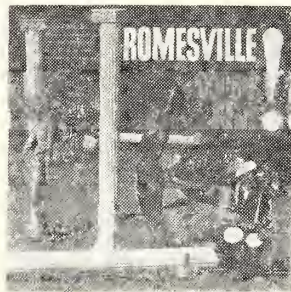
"YOUR GUY LOMBARDO MEDLEY" Vol. 2—Capitol T 1244 (Monaural & Stereo)

"ROMESVILLE"—Googie Rene—Class CSLP 5003

Pianist Rene has put together a unique album. A jazz view of Rome is presented through 10 tracks, yet with three bongo-conga players and a few very hip choruses, the date becomes palatable to pop tastes, listenable and danceable. Song titles indicate the "coolness" of the date—"Cool it at the Coliseum," "Flippin' the Pizza," "Caesar's Pad," etc. Jazzmen present include Buddy Collette, Conrad Gozzo, Larry Bunker and Red Callender. Can achieve wide sales.



"BESAME!"—Toni Arden in Latin America—Decca DL 8875

A dozen Latin-American favorites, most of which have become standards here, are expressively conveyed by Miss Arden, singing both the original Spanish and in English. Her interpretations of such familiar tunes as "Besame Mucho," "Perfidia," "Cielito Lindo," "La Paloma" and "Adios" are a refreshing delight. Enjoyable session.



"THE RED ARMY SINGS—A REVOLUTION IN HI-FI"; "THE RED ARMY MARCHES IN HI-FI"—Artia ALP 113, 114

The Red Army Chorus, popularly known in Russia as the Alexandrov Song and Dance Ensemble, is an extraordinary group numbering more than 300 performers. They are represented on two beautifully recorded and packaged albums released on the new "cultural exchange" label, Artia. The "Marches" set contains both Russian marches and folk songs of neighboring countries. The "Sings" set is a program of Russian folk music. Both are brilliantly done sessions and command special interest.

SMASH FLOPS



"SMASH FLOPS" — A Collection of Ill-Timed Songs—The Characters—Pip PLP 1900

A very hilarious album with a very "sick" approach. Twelve songs, written by Dick Sherman and Milt Larsen, revive memories of negative moments of history as evidenced by their titles: "When the Hindenburg Lands Today," "We're Depending on You General Custer," "When Amelia Earhart Flies Home," "Congratulations Tom Dewey" and "Bon Voyage Titanic." Though very little prospect of airplay exists, album will appeal to the "sick humor" ilk.



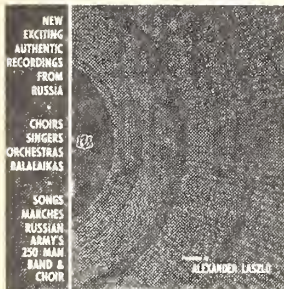
"MONGO" — Mongo Santamaria — Fantasy 3291 (Monaural & Stereo)

Authentic Afro-Cuban music is played by some of the leading Afro-Cuban musicians in the U.S. Featured with Santamaria and Willie Bobo (both members of Cal Tjader's group) are Armanda Peraza, Francisco Aguabella and Modesto Duran, along with several other exciting percussionists and instrumentalists. The numbers are all originals and are the utmost in authenticity. Great disk for this special market.



"CUBAN DANCE PARTY" — Bebo Valdez and his Orchestra—Everest LPBR 5057 & Stereo SDBR 1057

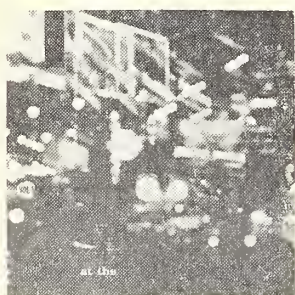
Recorded on location in Cuba, this session presents one of the country's leading local orks. The bill contains both Latin standards and Valdez originals, all played in an authentic, infectious, easy to follow rhythm. There are cha cha chas, mambos, rumbas, and various others. Selections include "Babalu," "El Cumbanchero," "The Peanut Vendor" and "Green Eyes." Good, swinging package.



"NIET? DA! DA!" — Presented by Alexander Laszlo—Raynote RN 5003

Composer Laszlo presents a concert of Russian folk music, performed by actual Russian groups. Sung in Russian, the songs also feature instruments native only to Russia. As in any folk music, the selections here run the gamut of local feelings and emotions. The 250 man Russian Army Choir is represented by two numbers. Timely release, package should be of special interest to many.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"ART BLAKEY AND THE JAZZ MESSENGERS AT THE JAZZ CORNER OF THE WORLD"—Vol. 1—Blue Note 4015 & Stereo BST 84015

Again Birdland is a conducive setting for an explosive jazz session and Blakey's group does credit to the place with an outstanding album recorded there. The messengers play a hard driving, blues-based jazz, spurred by Blakey's relentless drumming. Lee Morgan, Hank Mobley, Bobby Timmons and Jymie Merritt romp through four numbers, among which are "Justice" and "Close Your Eyes." Volatile, highly salable jazz merchandise.



"SAXES, INC."—Arranged and Conducted by Bob Prince—Warner Bros. W 1336 & Stereo WS 1336

Similar to the label's successful "Trombones, Inc" set a short while back, this session features some of the leading sax players in the country. The rhythm section cooks behind exciting ensemble playing and thrilling solos by Coleman Hawkins, Al Cohn, Zoot Sims, Georgie Auld, Seldon Powell, Herb Geller, Phil Woods, Sol Schlinger and others, in Prince's tribute to the jazz history of the sax.

BILLIE HOLIDAY



"ALL OR NOTHING AT ALL"—Billie Holiday—Verve MG V-8329

Verve has come up with another 12 Holiday sides, these cut in 1956 and 1957. For the most part the tunes, all standard pops, are ballads but a few mild swingers add an enjoyable change of pace to the package. Harry Edison and Ben Webster are excellent sympathetic supporters behind the singer. Sides are "Cheek to Cheek," "But Not For Me," "Sophisticated Lady," "Love is Here To Stay" and others. Another hot item for the collector's shelf.



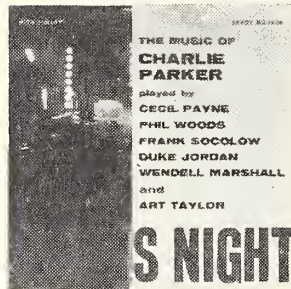
"BLOWING AROUND THE WORLD"—Ruby Braff—United Artists UAS 6045 (Monaural & Stereo)

Trumpeter Braff takes a jazz journey around the world through the use of ten tunes with titles of various countries. (i.e. "April in Paris," "Song of India," "Nagasaki"). Backed rhythmically by Barry Galbraith, Bob Brookmeyer, Joe Benjamin and Buzzy Drootin, Braff improvises on these tunes with intelligence and wit. His warm and tasteful approach is a delight and, furthermore, he maintains respect for the melodies. Jazz of a highly palatable nature.



"THE EDDIE 'LOCKJAW' DAVIS COOKBOOK" Vol. 2—Prestige 7161

Davis plays a gutty, forceful tenor sax. His regard, most of the time, is for earthiness than for pretty tone, although he can play sweet (as on "Stardust"). He is backed here by Jerome Richardson, flute, and a rhythm section consisting of Shirley Scott, George Duvivier and Arthur Edgehill. This second volume of the "Cookbook" should prove as salable as the first.



"BIRD'S NIGHT"—The music of Charlie Parker—Cecil Payne, Phil Woods, Frank Socolow, Duke Jordan, Wendell Marshall, Art Taylor—Savoy MG 12138

The sax sextet (Payne—baritone, Woods—alto, Socolow—tenor) pays tribute to Charlie Parker by playing four of his pieces. Session took place at New York's Five Spot Cafe, and the relaxed atmosphere of the place is evident in the beautiful blowing that is heard here. The four extended tracks ("Buzzy," "Steeplechase," "Scrapple From the Apple," "Parker's Mood") leave enough room for each man to solo extensively. Relaxed, easy-going, yet exciting jazz package.



"RICH VERSUS ROACH"—Buddy Rich and Max Roach—Mercury SR 60133

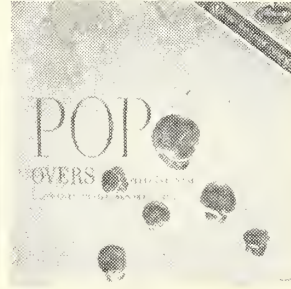
For drum fans this album will be hard to beat. Two of the best drummers in the business partake in a friendly duel, with each band playing a secondary role to the leaders. Gigi Gryce worked out the charts leaving much space for Rich and Roach to "blow" between the melodic choruses. Vehicles are "Sing, Sing, Sing," "Yesterdays," "Limehouse Blues," an all-drum "Figure Eights" and four others. Stereo is needed to distinguish the drummers.



CLASSICAL

"MISS ANN SCHEIN"—Kapp KCL 9040 (Monaural & Stereo)

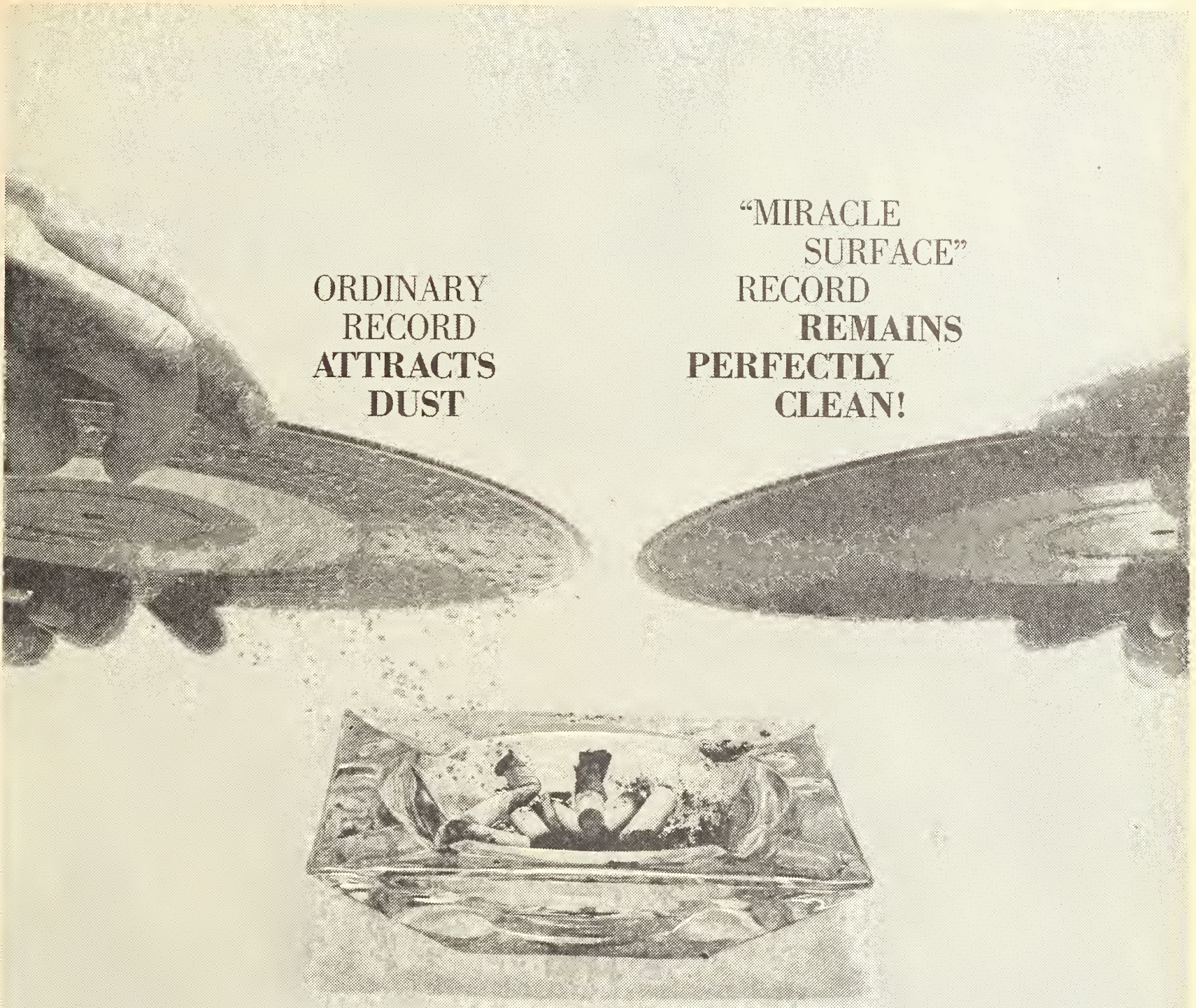

On Nov. 6 the MOA board of directors meets at the Morrison to complete all convention arrangements. At that time committees will be appointed, moderators will be named for various forum meetings and manufacturers from all segments of the amusement industry will be invited to participate.

Cannon Diskery Bows

NEW YORK — The formation of Cannon Records, this city, was announced last week by Monte Blythe, diskery prexy.

Blythe, who has a long and varied background in the music field, is a musician, arranger, and composer, and at one time toured the country with Mitchell Aires, the Four Aristocrats, and the Three Hits and a Miss.

Cannon will limit its activities to producing disks for other labels and will not concern itself with distribution.

The company will scout, develop, coach, record new talent, and screen material submitted by song writers.

The label will begin operation with a recording by Jimmy Hall and the Hi-Lighters, and a recording by the Carol Sisters. Titles will be announced later.

Its executive line-up includes Monte Blythe, president; Bob Thomas, vice-president; Robert Montesano, business manager; and Kay Stevens, secretary.

The company will operate out of 150 West 58th Street.

Omega Cuts LP Prices

HOLLYWOOD — Omega Records announced last week, that, effective immediately, its \$5.95 stereo and \$4.98 monaural albums will both be reduced to a suggested list price of \$3.98. New net prices will provide both distributors and dealers with normal markups. A 100% stock equalization plan is now being offered to Omega's distributors. Initial response to the equalization plan has been overwhelming according to Omega, and it has been working around the clock to service distributors.

Omega's vice president, David Hubert, stated, "Independent album manufacturers must offer firm realistic prices to distributors and dealers. It is the function of the manufacturer to produce recorded music—not falsely inflated prices that are in reality 25% or more above the ultimate retail selling price. We want to sell music—not price. Our new suggested list prices are the result of our belief that distributors and dealers have the ability to sell what we produce; well packaged, quality recorded music."

Dynasty Releases 1st Kiddie LP's

HOLLYWOOD — Dynasty Records last week announced the release of its first two children's albums, titled "Fun In Animal Land" and "Stories In Song For Little People". The albums aimed at the three to seven age group, have a suggested retail price of \$1.98.

Laurie Launches New Record Label

NEW YORK—As part of a general expansion program, Laurie Records has started a new label Andie, according to A. & R. Chief, Gene Schwartz.

As a Laurie subsidiary, Andie will cover the same kind of general releases—vocal and instrumental—that have characterized Laurie entries in

the pop and jazz fields. However, the new label will be serviced by an additional line of distributors, Schwartz revealed.

Laurie men are launching Andie with "What A Night," an up-tempo ballad by the Chippendales and the Quentins' "You'll Never Know."

World Pacific Into Pop Singles; Nick Vent Heads A&R Dept.

LOS ANGELES — Richard Bock, president of World Pacific Records, in disclosing his label's entry into the pop singles field, announced the appointments of Nick Vent and Alan Waite to the WP staff.

Vent will head the A&R department for WP's new pop singles division, developing new singles artists and handling the purchase of masters for release on the World Pacific label. He was formerly associated with the A&R departments of American International, Mercury and Dot Records.

Waite, formerly southern California promotional manager for Warner Bros. Records, will head WP's national publicity department.

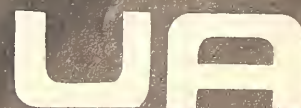

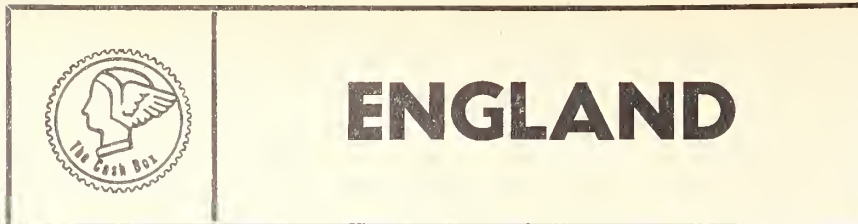

ENGLAND

Recognizing the ever-growing demand for Country and Western Music in this country Capitol is holding a special Country and Western Week which should please the fans. Arthur Muxlow, Sales Manager for the Capitol label says a study of the Hit Parade charts over the past year or more reveals that the majority of records in the Top Twenty have been either directly or indirectly connected with Country and Western Music. This style has been the basis for much popular material. Among the seven Country and Western specials released for this October Rodeo are disks by such famous names as **The Kingston Trio, Hank Thompson, Hylo Brown, Tommy Collins, Simon Crum, Louvin Brothers and Sonny James.** Also being released is a new L.P. featuring a dozen tracks by top artists entitled "Country's Best". Muxlow has also arranged novel publicity gimmicks such as supplying Country and Western hats to the trade and sheriff's badges for record shop assistants. A special edition of Capitol's regular weekly show on Radio Luxembourg, compered by **Ray Orchard**, entitled "The Capitol Country and Western Show" helped to boost this original campaign. Reaction throughout the country has been excellent.

"The Best of Everything", new **Johnny Mathis** disc from 20th Century Fox film of the same title, is due for simultaneous release with the film's premiere during the first week of November on the Fontana label. Initial orders indicate that this will be even bigger than his "Someone", currently selling so strong that Fontana Manager, **Jack Baverstock** is forced to hold back release of yet another Mathis disc, "Misty", currently tearing away in "The Cash Box" charts. L.P. wise "Johnny's Greatest Hits Vol. 1." released here in September is going like a bomb and is his best selling L.P. to date.

Al Saxon's "Only Sixteen", eclipsed over here by the No. 1 **Craig Douglas** version on Top Rank has made the grade in Scandinavia, hitting the No. 1 in Norway, Sweden and Denmark.

As announced in **The Cash Box** Australian section recently the Pye Record Company have now launched their label "down under." The first eight releases include "Cha Cha Cha Delaney" L.P. by ace drummer **Eric Delaney**, an E.P. by **Chris Barber** including his best selling Golden disc award "Petite Fleur". Another L.P. "Max at the Met" by **Max Miller** and a couple of singles by **Lonnie Donegan** and **Jimmy Daren.** In the past three years **Harry Castle**, Pye's London Export Manager has promoted his Company's label in many parts of the World including Japan, Schandinavia, Holland, Belgium, France, Austria, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, Spain, The Far East, Canada, West Africa and now Australia. Castle states "... At all times where at all possible, it is our desire to help our overseas distributors as they help us. Many of them have good material in their catalogues and through our World wide distribution channels we are pleased to co-operate with them to the extent of pushing selections from their repertoire as they already do with ours. The Australian company will be making regular releases as we are here. All the material released in London will have simultaneous release in Australia". **Harry Sutcliffe**, Pye's Australian manager has got the new label off to a flying start with brilliant and original publicity.

Ace American song writing team **Mort Shuman** and **Doc Pomus** ("Teenager In Love"—"Turn Me Loose"—"Hush a Bye" and "Angel Face" to name a few of their hits) are in London on a three-week business trip with **Fred Bienstock** of the Hill and Range Organization in New York. They plan to review the British record scene and famaliarize themselves with British artists and perhaps work with them in terms of material. They visited **The Cash Box** London office with **Little Tony**, new Italian singing star for whom they are writing a new song. Also present were **Jack Good** and **Marty Wilde**, Producer and star of A.T.V.'s Top Teenage Show "Boy Meets Girl". (See picture).

Another visitor to England **Albert Marks**, record producer and publisher from California looking around town and listening to British jazz. He was most impressed by **Johnny Dankworth.**

Benny Lee, manager of **Cromwell Music** (subsidiary of **Essex**) is leaving to concentrate on his film and TV career. **Stuart Reid**, until recently Manager of publishing companies, **Jewel, Sheldon** and **Anglo-Pic** (subsidiary companies of **Chappel**) comes in as General Exploitation Manager for this **Essex** group which is reorganizing and expanding.

Young composer-singer **Jerry Lordan** whose "A House And a Car and a Wedding Ring" recorded by **Mike Preston** went big in the States last year has written a new song "I'm Staying Single" which he has recorded on **Parlophone**, released on October 16th. In the opinion of **Bert Corri**, General Manager of **Francis Day & Hunter**, who publish the song "Lordan", promises to be the biggest name composer-wise since **Paddy Roberts.** Paddy Roberts penned some of this country's greatest hits including "Lay Down Your Arms"—"Softly, Softly" and "Pickin' A Chicken" and a current best seller here "The Heart of A Man". Paddy's own E.P. "Strictly For Grown Ups" on the **Decca** label is No. 2 in the Top Ten E.P. charts.

Cyril Berlin, London Manager for **Lonnie Donegan** tells me that negotiations are well advanced with **Mannie Greenfield** who handles Donegan in the States, for the star to make his third visit to the States early in the New Year. Plans include a recording session for the **Atlantic** label and TV spots. On previous visits Donegan appeared with enormous success on "The Perry Como Show" and at **Madison Square Garden.**

Impressario **Harold Davidson** announces plans for **Louis Armstrong** to star over here in a musical in March next year. The musical was specially written for Armstrong by **Dave Brubeck** and his wife. The title of the show—"World, Take a Holiday." Also starring in the show is **Carmen McRae.**

Larry Parnes who with **John Kenney** manages Britain's No. 1 idol, **Tommy Steele** also runs his own stable of stars. They are easily distinguishable by their sir names. Here are their latest releases. **Marty Wilde**—"Sea of Love" on **Philips**, **Billy Fury**—"Angel Face" on **Decca** backed with his own composition "The Time Has Come," **Vince Eager**—"Making Love" on the **Top Rank** label backed with "Primrose Lane." **Johnny Gentle**—"Milk From the Coconut" on **Philips** backed by his own composition—"I Lika The Way."

Duffy Power—"Ain't She Sweet" backed by "Kissin' Time" on **Fontana.** **Dickie Pride**—"Primrose Lane" backed with "Frantic" on **Columbia.** The latest addition to the **Parnes** stable is new boy who has been given the name **Julian "X".** His first recording is made by **Parnes'** own company **Elempti** to be released on the **Pye** label. Titles are "Can't Wait" by **Lionel Bart** (composer of "Livin' Doll") backed by "Sue Saturday" by **Sammy Samwell** (composer of "Move It" and "High Class Baby".) This sort of material should get him away to a good start. The backing for these sides is provided by **Marty Wilde's** Group "The Wild Cats". **Wilde** is also M.D. on the session.

Sammy Turner whose "Lavender Blue" is still in **The Cash Box** charts arrived in London to guest on A.T.V.'s TV "Boy Meets Girl".

Winifred Atwell returned to England after a year in Australia. Starring in "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" on October 18th and in "Saturday Spectacular" on the 31st.

Broadway spectacular success "World of Susie Wong", straight play with musical background, opens **Prince of Wales** London November 17th. Starring in this £20,000 production will be **Tsai Chin** as "Susie Wong" and **Garry Raymond** as the young man. The play will be directed by **Peter Coe**, responsible for the **Mermaid Theatre** success "Lock Up Your Daughters".

There have been lots of nice comments regarding the extensive world-wide coverage of news being arranged by The Cash Box. This certainly does a great deal to bring members of the trade together on an international basis.

Record clubs are still springing up. The Popular Record Club is in business with 12" LPs available at thirty shillings each. This makes about the fourth large club operating on a national drive. There are strong rumors that another national publication will soon enter the record club field.

Presently top of the 2UE(Sydney) Top 40 is Johnny Ray's Coronet release of "I'll Never Fall In Love Again." This disk was given a terrific boost during Ray's visit to these shores.

Popular pianist, songwriter and arranger Al Lerner, back in Australia for his third visit (with Jimmie Rodgers & Co.) was pleased to renew an old acquaintance with Jack Argent (Leeds Music) and Harry Sutcliffe (Pye-Records). Jack and Harry had hosted Al when he was here previously with Frankie Laine.



CONWAY TWITTY

Alan Lappan, star Sydney disk-jockey with Radio 2SM, has started a series of weekly record hops at Sydney's Trocadero, they run from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Monday nights. Alan says "they will be hep affairs," "I will spin the very latest disks and have provision for about 2,500 dancers."

"Danny Boy" is well up on the Australian charts. A hot-selling version has been released here by Jimmie Little on the Festival label. This disk had a good start on the Conway Twitty version that has done so well in the United States.

Arthur Major—he's the likeable promotion man here for Philips Records—and his wife are the proud parents of a new baby son.

TV Week magazine reports that GTV-Channel 9 intends to start its own record label. The article says that the success of the Al Morgan (who was brought out to this country by GTV-9) disk—recorded and issued by W & G Records—has prompted the television station to enter the record field. Channel 9 executives were "not available" for further comment at the time of writing. It is believed that Mercury may handle pressing and distribution of the GTV-9 label which as yet has not been named.

The Australian disk-jockey Talkathon record has been broken twice this week. First to set a new time of 56 hours 36 minutes Allan Terne of Radio 6PR in Perth, Western Australia. Then a couple of days later Roy Harvey of Radio 3CS Colac, Victoria set a new time of 57 hours.

Frankie Davidson, young W & G disk star, has been signed by Lee Gordon to appear in the Fabian show later this month.

Latest young Australian pop vocalist to announce plans for an overseas tour is Frank Ifield. His Columbia record of "True" is currently riding high on hit charts. Frank leaves for England on the 3rd of November for television appearances with the B.B.C. and I.T.V.

As part of his tremendous advance promotion campaign for the Fabian show, Lee Gordon has offered free photographs of the star to radio listeners and in six days Gordon received over 50,000 requests for them. Meanwhile, the new Fabian disk of "Got The Feeling" is set for release and is assured of wide popularity.

Bob Rogers, top 2UE(Sydney) disk-jockey, is a proud man at the moment with one of the very few taped interviews with Elvis Presley since he joined the army. Bob is a good friend of Tom Moffitt of KPOI Hawaii who recorded the interview in Germany and made it available to Rogers in Australia. As far as is known this is the first Presley interview used in this country on radio.

Ern White, top man with the W & G group of companies, returns to Australia on 21st of October at the completion of a six months world tour. He has been studying every facet of the record industry.

Metronome, Sweden, Celebrates Tenth

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN—Metronome Records, here, recently celebrated its tenth anniversary with a big party at the Foresta in Stockholm, attended by 450 guests.

A number of the label's top stars like singers Siw Malmkvist, Ove Tornquist and Harry Arnold and his band entertained during the night. Also the Delta Rhythm Boys made an appearance. In the late hours a jam session with Swedish top jazz stars took place. The whole event was taped and Metronome will release at least one LP of musical highlights.

The Metronome firm was first started in Sweden but during its ten years of operations has also built up strong Metronome organizations in all the other Scandinavian countries as well as in Germany. Metronome brass includes president Mats Bjerke, export manager Börje Ekberg and Danish topper Bent Fabricius-Bjerre.

Metronome recordings are also released through affiliates throughout the world.

Ever since the start Metronome has maintained its own New York firm, Orion Development Corporation, headed by Claes Dahlgren. This has enabled Metronome to keep up a brisk exchange with the U.S. disk market. American labels presently handled by Metronome include Atlantic, Disneyland and Prestige. Metronome recordings, pop, jazz and classical have been released in the U.S.A. on Atlantic, Capitol, RCA Victor, Mercury, Cadence, Prestige, Vanguard and others. Metronome album entries in the U.S. have included Ernestine Anderson's "Hot Cargo!", Harry Arnold's Mystery Band and the series of Sibelius symphonies recorded by the Stockholm Radio Symphony Orchestra. Multitone is the publishing firm which Metronome owns in partnership with the Karusell, Decca and Philips labels.

British Publisher, Jeff Kruger, In U.S.

NEW YORK — Jeff Kruger, president of the English publishing house, Florida Music and its associated companies, Angel Music, Budd Music, Lissauer Music, Metropole Music and Gloucester Music Companies, arrived in New York last week (13) for conferences with partners Al Silver (Herald-Ember Records), Buddy Kaye (Budd Music) and Bob Lissauer (head of eight associated publishers) and to discuss release of his records in the U.S.

Prior to leaving London, Kruger, in his companies' annual business report, announced that he has begun building his own headquarters to house his many expanding enterprises, and that he hopes to rehouse all his many activities early next year. Deal is reportedly costing over \$300,000.

Completing his fifth year in the music business, Kruger stated that this past twelve months has seen the greatest year of volume business in the companies' history.

Kruger's interests include ownership of Europe's largest jazz club, the Fabulous Flamingo in London, which has over 17,000 paid up members. His management office handles the business affairs of many top British jazz names, including Ronnie Ross, who has just finished a U.S. tour, Ronnie Scott, Tony Crombie, Eddie Thompson, Tommy Whittle and Tony Kinsey, as well as many pop artists. Kruger's publishing companies publish one of the largest jazz catalogs in Europe and are also strong in the pop field, representing his associates and their companies. His disk company, Ember Records (International) Ltd., produces jazz masters in LP form. His Flamingo Film Productions shoots two full-length features each year using talent handled by his management firm and music published by him.

Kruger brought his latest film, "Sweet Beat," with him and will try to consummate a deal on it while here. The flick features Fred Parris and the Satins singing "I Remember" ("In the Still of the Night"), the Mellonicks singing "Tonight Tonight", and Billy Myles doing "The Joker" among others.

Kruger expressed a desire to meet with publishers interested in European representation and diskeries interested in releasing his jazz masters here. He will be here until Nov. 1 and can be reached at either the Victoria Hotel or c/o Buddy Kaye at Judson 6-3090.

Hanover-Signature In Pub Deal With Chappell & Co.

NEW YORK — Buddy Robbins, VP in charge of the Hanover and Signature publishing firms, Rojan (ASCAP) and Vision (BMI) announced completion of a long term publishing deal world wide in scope with Chappell & Co., Ltd. which will give the latter firm exclusive rights throughout the world. The deal was consummated this week. Negotiations had been under way for about a month between Robbins and Louis Dreyfus of Chappell.

Robbins will be off to Europe to visit many of the Chappell branch offices. Bob Thiele, Hanover-Signature prexy will accompany Robbins on the trip.

A great loss: The Italian-American tenor **Mario Lanza** died of heart disease on October the 7th in a Roman hospital, where he had been received a few days before. He was 38, and his real name was Alfred Arnold Cocozza. He was born in New York from Italian parents, began to study music at 15 and devoted himself to singing opera, at the suggestion of Koussevitzky, the American conductor. His name and fame are linked to several pictures which made him famous as a singer all over the world. The picture "il grande Caruso", wherein he played the role of the famous Italian singer, gave him world success. He settled in Italy after starring in "Arrivederci Roma" together with **Marisa Allasio** and **Renato Rascel**. On the evening of Sunday the 4th he had started a series of broadcasts called "La mia vita per il canto".

The Italian TV will probably put on the **Dinah Shore** and **Nat King Cole Show**. The first spectacular is already known to the Italian public, for part of it has already been shown on Italian TV in July 1958, while the latter is entirely new. It is said to be one of the most spectacular performances in the States.

During the month of December **The Di Mara Sisters** will tour Italy and appear in a TV show: **To Rose, Lilian and Marisa** this is a return home, because they were born in Milan some 26 years ago. Their debut took place in Milan in 1950, on the screens of the experimental TV. Three years after, the whole Di Mara family went to the States, where the three sisters worked on radio (Detroit), TV (USA and Cuba) and in many night clubs. Since 1957 they are exclusively engaged to the record firm "Roulette", and their records are sold in Italy under the original label "CGD."

Brunetta Pacini is a 14 year old singer recently engaged by the Ricordi Firm: A few days after her agreement with the Ricordi firm she was engaged to play the most important part in the picture "Uzlatori alla sbarra". Last September she took part in the TV show "Quattro passi fra le nuvole". The New York Times (9th/3/59) defined **Giorgio Gaber** as the Italian **Elvis Presley**: the well known singer of English TV, **Colin Hicks**, paid him great compliments during his recent visit to Italy. This singer, who succeeded in reacquiring the use of his left hand, which was paralyzed, achieved his greatest success with the record "Ciao, ti dirò" on Ricordi.

I had a personal interview with **Van Wood**, who announced his decision to replace his famous quartet with a sextet composed of: piano, drums, bass, sax, two guitars. The members of the quartet will not take part in the future formation which will appear on Television in November. **Van Wood's** songs are recorded on **Fonit-Cetra** records. The most recent best-sellers of the **Fonit-Cetra** Firm are as follows: **Modugno**: "Milioni di scintille" "Come Prima"; **Earl Grant**: "Evening rain"; **Modugno**: "Notte lunga notte", "Sole sole"; **Natalino Otto**: "sei stato il mio primo amore", "Una."

The **King's Men** won the "Maschera d'argento", the famous prize annually awarded in Rome to the best complexes and to the best known singers. This very young orchestra was born in Italy and is formed of U.S. Negro singers, **Don Powell**, conductor, piano player, composer, singer; **Norman Shobey**, drums; **Armstead Shobey**, **Ilew Trotman**, bass; **Errol Brereton**, sax. **Don Powell**, the solo singer, has a voice that is very similar to **Nat King Cole's**.

Every Sunday night the Italian TV presents "Serata di Gala", a broadcast dedicated to the best known figures in the world of music. On September the 6th it was dedicated to **Xavier Cugat**. On September 13th **Renato Carosone** announced that he was going to leave his orchestra to devote himself to his new record firm. On September 27th **Charles Trenet** was dealt with, and on October the 4th it was the turn of **Fred Buscaglione**. Next time the show will be dedicated to **Domenico Modugno**.

Paolo Fabbri, the organizer of the XXXXXth S. Remo Festival, is now trying to contact **Dean Martin**, **Yves Montand**, **Dalida**, and **Caterina Valente** to have them take part in the Festival. **Caterina Valente's** appearance seems however very uncertain, due to her previous engagements.

Robert B. Weiss the International Director of the Warner Brothers Inc. arrived in Milan on October the 4th. I met him personally and he showed the intention of visiting all the Italian record firms. The Warner Bros. Records Inc. intention is to find a record company to launch and distribute its records in Italy. Weiss is touring all the countries of Europe for this precise purpose.

BENELUX

Last Saturday Holland was visited by **Jan and Kjeld**, two Danish boys, age 14 and 15 years. The two, who are in Western Europe currently, create quite a furor. Their record "Tigerrag," sung on **CNR** (managed by **C. N. Rood Lit., Rijswijk Z.H.**) has created interest in the **Benelux**. They made their debut in the **Benelux** countries via the **Dutch Television of the AVRO Broadcasting Corp.** and received a big fee (£3000—\$750). In the beginning of next year the two boys will visit the **United States** to tour through the country.

A real **Benelux** topper is the song "Marina" sung by **Belgian singer Rocco Granata** on **Delahay**, managed by **Delahay Records Comp., The Hague**. **Rocco Granata** who is still living for years in **Belgium**, is beginning to get a name of international reputation. Within a few months **Rocco's** interpretation of the nationwide hit "Marina" will be getting in the **United States** of America.

For some weeks in **Holland** the bam-bam-boo craze prevails. It compares with the hoola-hoop craze of last year. Bam-bam-boo is a song and dance. In it is used a cardboard case, which slides out. The original idea of the bam-bam-boo is from the **Dutch comedian-singer Joop v.d. Marel**, who started the bam-bam-boo on a television program of the **AVRO Broadcasting Company**. The authorities of the **AVRO Television** section considered it as a disguised means of plugging for the record industry. The TV section put a ban on the bam-bam-boo, with the result that the song is very popular, especially the interpretation of **Ria Valk** on **Fontana**, managed by **Philips Lit., Amsterdam**. Also an instrumental on **Philips** by the **Belgian Orchestra of Francis Bay** and on **CNR** (managed by **C. N. Rood Lit., Rijswijk Z.H.**) by the **Latin American orchestra of Laguesta**. As we just learned the last named interpretation is on **Vogue** in **France**.

It isn't the first time, that **American top hits** are hits in the **Benelux** countries, when the **American songs** have a **Dutch interpretation**. The last few weeks such is the case with "Tell Him No", sung by **The Fouryo's** as "Zeg Niet Neen" on **Decca**, managed by **Philips Lit., Amsterdam**. The song is one of the top ten in the **Benelux** countries.

Last week we had a few words about **Caterina Valente**. Now we can tell you that the popular singer will come to **Holland**; that she will visit some big towns and probably appear on radio and television.

The **Modern Jazz Quartet** gives concerts in **The Concertgebouw (Amsterdam, October 17th)** and in **The Kurzaal (Scheveningen, October 24th)**. This **American small combo** is very popular in the **Benelux** countries.

It may be that the **American song**, "Ma Ma Marie" by **The Gaylords** (on **Mercury**, managed by **C. N. Rood Lit., Rijswijk Z.H.**) isn't a hit in the **United States**, but in **Holland** it is becoming a smash. Within three months in **Holland** there were 25,000 records sold, which is a big success by **Dutch standards**.

America—U.S.S.R. Disk Info Exchange?

NEW YORK—The Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) has received a letter from the Department of State asking the opinion of the officers and directors of RIAA on the advisability of an exchange of delegations between the Soviet Union and the U.S. for the purpose of studying recent technology and equipment for the manufacture of phonograph records. It's proposed that the Soviet Union will send here a group of five or six experts to spend three or four weeks visiting manufacturing establishments and other places of interest. We in turn would send a similar group to make a similar study in Russia. Each group would pay its own way. RIAA's **John W. Griffin** will meet shortly with State Department officials to discuss the matter further.

Request Signs Three

NEW YORK — **H. J. Lengsfelder**, A&R topper for **Request Records**, announced last week the signing of **Jan Bart**, **Marguerite**, and **Ramjohn** and the **Porknockers**, to exclusive contracts. **Bart**, a tenor, will be represented with an album of Jewish songs; **Marguerite**, a French chanteuse, will have an album of old and new French songs entitled "Souvenir de Montmartre." **Ramjohn** and the **Porknockers** are a group of native singers. 'Porknockers' is the name given to the men who work in the jungles of **Guiana**. Their first album will contain songs they sing at work and play, accompanying themselves on instruments they built themselves.

In this film Caterina sings many new songs, among them "Schau ich zum Himmelszelt," a tune with pulsing Slow-Rock-Beat, which surely will be very successful. Also the shuffle-fox song with her brother **Silvio Francesco** "Sweet-Sweetheart" (on Decca).

Bert Varell, a very talented singer of chansons, now offers two new titles: "Wenn du vorbeigehst" and "Immer nur du" (Telefunken).

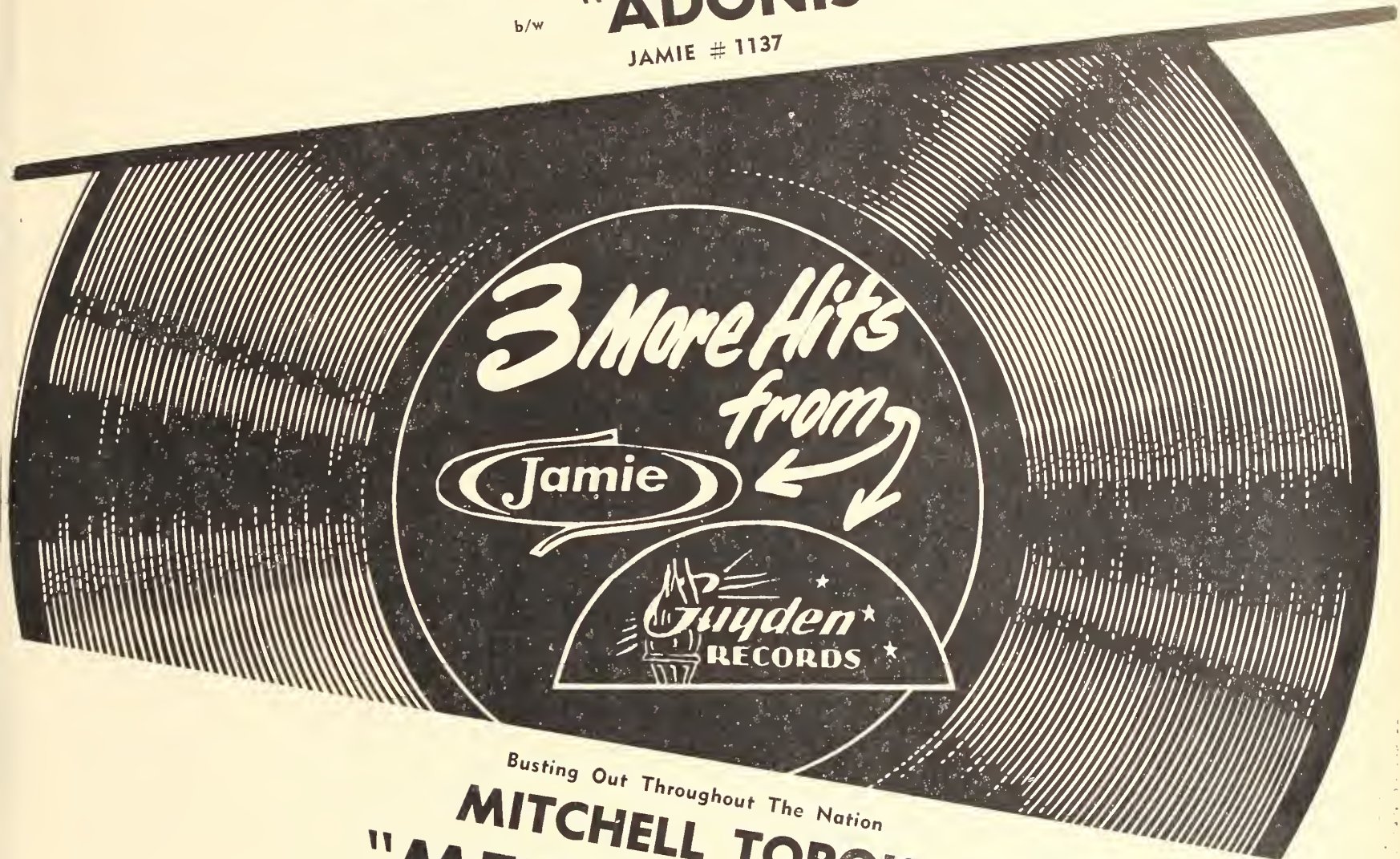

The songbird surprises with a delivery of "Ave Maria" that showcases her voice range. Commercial Value: Seldom heard material coupled with some of Sarah's big ones should delight shoppers. Como Album Heads Up RCA Camden Christmas Packages

NEW YORK—Top Victor performers, headed by Perry Como, highlight RCA Camden's Christmas releases this year, it was announced by Ray Clark, manager, planning and merchandising.

Perry Como, whose "Dream Along With Me" and "Perry Como Sings Just For You" are among RCA Camden's all-time best-sellers, offers "Perry Como's Wednesday Night Music Hall." The album includes such favorites as "Keep It Gay," "A Fellow Needs A Girl" and "All Through The Day". Instrumental backing is provided by the orchestras of Henri Rene, Mitchell Ayres and Russ Case.

The current rage for "join-in" albums is represented by "Everybody Sings," featuring the ork and chorus of Norman Leyden. Recording is offered in stereo as well as monaural versions.

Also in stereo is "That Happy Christmas Feeling" by the Organ Orch. The LP contains such Christmas standards as "Sleigh Ride", "Winter Wonderland" and "I'll Be Home for Christmas".

The Christmas list includes the first RCA Camden album by the Blackwood Brothers, the popular sacred quartet.

Some best-selling Christmas albums make up the balance of the RCA Camden Christmas special. They are:

"Joy to the World," by the Robert Shaw Chorale with Robert Shaw conducting, containing 25 favorite Christmas songs; "Christmas Magic," by Hugo Winterhalter and his orchestra with 13 Yuletide tunes; "Hi-Fi Christmas Party" by Domenico Savino and his orch. (stereo & monaural); "26 Best Loved Christmas Hymns and Carols" by the Carollers and the Yuletide Choristers.

One of the biggest ad campaigns in RCA Camden history backs this release. It includes full-page ads in various consumer mags.

National television exposure is slated on the following shows: The Price is Right (NBC); The Big Payoff (CBS); Treasure Hunt (NBC); Beat The Clock (ABC); Music Bingo (ABC); and Pantomime quiz (ABC).

Tabloid size, 600-line and 280-line ad mats featuring a handy shopper's coupon, is slated for use in local publications.

Also on the local front, a four-page department store mailer, listing the Christmas albums and a handy order form, will be available for use as a stuffer or counter give-away.

In addition, RCA Camden is instituting a blinker box service with this year's Christmas release. First album to be shown is "That Happy Christmas Feeling" by the Organ Orch. It will be followed by the Como album.

Liberty Ships Christmas Releases

LOS ANGELES—A Christmas release from Liberty Records went to market last week, it was announced by Don Bohanan, Liberty's national sales manager.

The Robert Rheims catalogue goes into release under the Liberty label with new packaging, and including both monaural and stereo versions of Rheims' Organ and Chimes LP, "Merry Christmas Carols", which has been a solid Yuletide favorite for the past 12 years. This catalogue was acquired by Liberty last June.

Second portion of the Rheims release features the Choraliers in "We Wish You a Merry Christmas." This LP was first marketed in 1957. The 25 numbers sung by the choral group include the most popular carols, including the title song.

Numbers from Rheims' Organ and Chimes LP album have been selected by Liberty for EP and 45 rpm single releases. The EP disk features five noted carols, while the single platter is grooved with "Silent Night" b/w "O' Come All Ye Faithful."

Liberty's Yuletide offering is capped by the back-to-back release of David Seville's "The Chipmunk Song" and "Alvin's Harmonica". Combined initial sales of these two singles have reportedly reached 5,700,000—much of it during last season's "Chipmunk" Christmas. This 45 rpm single is being offered in a special new sleeve featuring the three Chipmunks.

Liberty has gone all-out in packaging its Christmas merchandise for maximum seasonal appeal. Printed in rich colors on golden aluminum foil, the album jackets are embossed and laminated in keeping with the rich heritage of the contents.

Moreover, a specially printed inner dust jacket in each Rheims album contains the lyrics to all of the carols contained in the albums offering the listener an opportunity to sing along with the music if he wishes.

Counter display merchandising racks are being provided by Liberty to all dealer outlets to help boost sales of the Christmas release. Additionally, Liberty offers 100% return privilege on all Christmas merchandise between October 15 and January 10, 1960.

Coming on the heels of Liberty's "Fall Festival of Music", which was the most successful sales program in the history of the firm, Liberty executives expect the most "bountiful" Christmas sales ever.

NASHVILLE, TENN.—The Omegas, a vocal trio nitery attraction, have been signed to Decca Records, it was disclosed last week. Initial single by the team is due November 1.

B'g Push For "Old Shep"

NEW YORK—For the second time this year, Joe Carlton, Carlton Records topper, is trying to make good with a tune cut many times before, but never a smash pop item. Tune is the plaintive oldie, "Old Shep," sung by Ralph DeMarco on Carlton's affiliate, Guaranteed.

Earlier this year, Carlton's Anita Bryant scored with "Til There Was You," a song which had been cut at least 33 times prior to the Bryant hit. Carlton says he has been able to locate at least 17 previous versions of "Old Shep."

The diskery has shipped 110,000 "Old Shep" disks on a full guarantee basis.

"Hitler's Inferno" Disk Controversy Still Hot

NEW YORK—After a decision by the West German public prosecutor last spring to ban a recording of speeches and songs of Nazi Germany, the Frankfurt High Court has now decided that the recording is not harmful to the West German Constitution. The court has rejected the prosecution's request to make the confiscation of the recordings permanent. The issue will now have to be decided by the Federal Court in Karlsruhe.

Originally produced in this country in 1954, the record is titled "Hitler's Inferno," and was produced by Audio Fidelity Records' affiliate, Audio Rarities. It was discovered recently that this record album was pirated, using the original art and material, but reportedly substituting pro-Nazi and anti-semitic narrative instead of the original English.

Informed of the latest developments, Sid Frey, president of Audio Fidelity said last week that he still does not know who is responsible for the "banned version" of the disk. "However," he said, "the new court ruling upholds my reason for producing this valuable historic document. And, incidentally, its worth has been proven by the constantly increasing sale of Hitler's Inferno here. Our record is in castigation of the Nazi regime. It is no attempt to glorify Hitler. Its purpose is to serve as a grim reminder of the horrors of Nazi Germany and a warning that such conditions should never again prevail. Hitler's Inferno was also made to illustrate the evil effect music can have, as well as good, and to show the shocking, destructive effect these songs and speeches had on a captive audience."

Tops Releases 8 Albums

LOS ANGELES—Tops Records last week announced the release of eight albums for October. The eight packages, all available in monaural and stereo, comprise one of the largest releases in the diskery's history.

Heading the release are three albums by Kate Smith; "The Great Kate," a collection of standards most requested by her fans; "Kate Smith Sings Hymns and Spirituals," twelve all-time favorites; and "Christmas with Kate," the most popular of the yuletide songs.

The remaining five packages are: "Tribute to the Big Bands," swing-era favorites conducted by Russ Williams; "Themes from the Movies," a follow-up collection of famous movie scores to Tops' "Movie Themes Vol. 1," by James Verity and the 110 String Orchestra; "Let's All Sing Christmas," the Fireside Carolers' second "sing-along" album; "TV Themes" by the Richard Gleason Orchestra; and "Piano Roll" by Freddy "Fingers" O'Leary.

As part of Tops' stepped up expansion and promotion campaign, all of these albums will be distributed to the nation's key disk jockeys. Many of them will be displayed in trade ads as part of a regular advertising program.

Recently the company inaugurated a sales exploitation program via trade ads and publicity in which accredited new dealers who wrote in could receive free 10 albums of their choice. Purpose of the promotion was to garner new accounts and also to give the dealers the opportunity to compare the quality of Tops disks with those of other major companies.

Bob Blythe, Tops' national sales manager, just back from a Fall sales kick-off, stated that, since the announcement that the offer had been extended for another 30 days, the company had been flooded with additional requests. Many of these queries were from new dealers who wished to take advantage of the offer in order to obtain the October releases.

"With this sales program and exposure giving impetus to what we believe is one of Tops' strongest album releases in years," said Blythe, "we are confident that dealers will be stocking our merchandise in box lots and will push our Fall sales to an all-time high."

20th-Fox Reports Success Of "Profitscope" Fall Plan

NEW YORK — 20th-Fox Records reported an overwhelming acceptance by dealers and distributors of "Profitscope," the label's first major sales program. Initial orders received from better than eighty-five per cent of 20th-Fox distributors total over three thousand packages, the diskery said.

"The acceptance of our first program by dealers and distributors," said Henry Onorati, 20th-Fox president, "substantiates the fact that dealers will support proven-product merchandising and get behind new products in which production values are spontaneously recognizable."

20th's Fall release is the largest to date and is the first in the company's stepped-up album program.

Roy Freeman, national sales manager, who presented the program in a swing around the country, reports heavy demand for the Harry Simeone Chorale album, "Sing We Now Of Christmas."

"With 190,000 orders already in the house," he said, "there's no doubt that this album," which features the original version of "The Little Drummer Boy," "has captured the attention of dealers and disk jockeys everywhere."

20th has already shipped a half million of the Drummer Boy single against orders received, and the company expects the disk to sell two million or more before the end of the year.

Freeman said that he found distributors and dealers everywhere highly optimistic and looking forward to their biggest Christmas ever.

The success of the program has moved 20th to copyrighting the name "Profitscope," which will be the keynote of 20th's Fall Program activity annually.

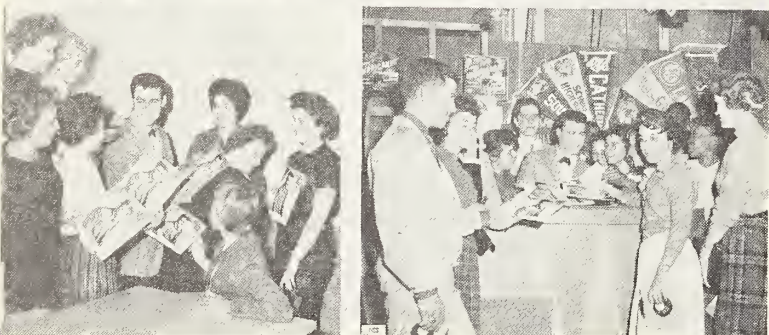
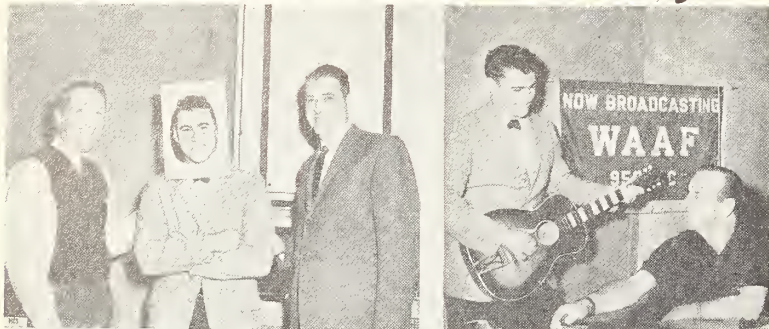

BMI's Student Composer Contest Offers \$10,000

NEW YORK—Student composers residing anywhere in the Western Hemisphere are eligible to win prizes totaling \$10,000 in the 1959 Student Composers Awards (SCA), whose official opening was announced last week by Carl Haverlin, president of Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI), sponsors of the annual competition designed to encourage the creation of concert music by young composers. The 1959 contest is the first in which composers studying in countries other than the United States and Canada are eligible to compete.

"Our decision to extend SCA to the entire Western Hemisphere was made with the full approval of the 1958 National Judging Panel," Haverlin said. "This group of distinguished composers, educators, interpreters of music and music publishers believes, as does BMI, that the recognition and encouragement of musical talent is one of our first duties as stewards of music. It is our hope that student composers from all parts of this hemisphere will share in the cash awards."

With the 1959 prizes, more than \$60,000 will have been awarded by BMI during the past eight years to SCA winners. Announcement of the 1959 winners will be made no later than June, 1960, with sums ranging from \$500 to \$2,000 to be granted at the discretion of the judges.

SCA 1959 is open until February 29, 1960, to residents of any country in the Western Hemisphere who will be under twenty-six years of age on December 31, 1959. Entrants must be enrolled in accredited secondary schools, colleges or conservatories, or engaged in private study with recognized and established teachers.

The permanent SCA Judging Panel is made up of William Schuman, President, Juilliard School of Music; Earl V. Moore, Dean, School of Music, University of Michigan; Henry Cowell, composer and teacher; and Claude Champagne, Assistant Director, Quebec Provincial Conservatory. The 1959 judging group will be augmented by other leading composers, publishers, and interpreters of music.

Because it is the purpose of SCA to encourage student composers, no limitations are established as to instrumentation or length of manuscript. Students may enter as many as three compositions, but no contestant may win more than one prize or award. Compositions need not have been composed during the year of entry.

Contest rules and entry blanks are available from Russell Sanjek, director SCA Project, Broadcast Music, Inc., 589 Fifth Avenue, New York 17, New York.

CMA Annual Meet Set For Nov. 12

NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE—Connie B. Gay, proxy of the Country Music Association, has announced that the CMA's annual meeting and election of officers and directors will be held here November 12.

The activities will be held at the Andrew Jackson Hotel the day before the start of WSM's two-day Country Music Disc Jockey Festival here.

Six new directors are to be named. Following their election, the directors will elect Officers for 1959-60.

"Members should be aware of their deep responsibilities in naming directors," Day commented. "Members should cast ballots for director candidates whom they believe will select the kind of officers our Organization requires."

Prior to the elections, the CMA chief will report on the progress the organization has made during its first year of existence.

CMA officials said there will actually be two elections in each category—a nomination and final election. The nomination will designate the two top contenders for the final elections.

Presiding over all the voting will be Mac Wiseman, the current CMA secretary. He will be assisted by Harry Stone, CMA executive director, and Mrs. Jo Walker, Stone's assistant. Stone and Mrs. Walker, non-voting CMA members, will audit all votes.

Membership lists of those in various categories will be sent members in advance of the voting to assist them in making their choice.

There will not be any absentee voting. However, CMA members desiring to vote by proxy may do so by designating their proxy in a letter to Wiseman. Wiseman reminded that proxy designations should be received by him by November 6.

"To have a really active, live-wire organization like we have had during the first year, it's most important that all members participate, especially in the election of Officers and Directors," Gay said. He noted that CMA membership cards must be displayed before a member is allowed to cast ballots.

The CMA during its first year has experienced a big 12-month jump in its enrollment, with lifetime memberships going from 33 members last year to 51 thus far this year. Annual

membership has jumped from 170 to 390. Organizational membership totals 13. Overall membership has been boosted from 203 in 1958 to 454 so far this year.

During the Country Music Deejay Festival, CMA members will be making a concerted drive for new members and membership renewals. One of the promotion gimmicks to be employed will be the display of huge buttons to be worn by members on their lapels.

The gala affair will be the second social event sponsored by CMA. During last year's Festival, CMA hosted a dance.

The banquet and dance will salute the 34th anniversary of WSM's Grand Ole Opry. Following the dinner, the newly elected officers and directors of CMA—who will be selected November 12—will be installed.

Leon McAuliff and his Cimarron Boys, will provide dance music after the buffet-style dinner.

Here are the current CMA officers and directors and the category each director represents: Officers: Gay, president, radio station; Eddy Arnold, first vice-president, artist; Wm. Harold Moon, second vice-president, publisher; Wiseman, secretary, record company; and Hubert Long, treasurer, management.

Directors: Bob Burton, director-at-large, non-affiliated; Oscar Davis, management; Ernest Tubb, artist; Vic McAlpin, composer; Charlie Lamb, trade publication; Wesley H. Rose, chairman of the board, publisher; Ken Nelson, recording company; W. D. Kilpatrick, radio-TV station; and Cracker Jim Brooker, disk jockey, were elected last year to serve one and/or two year terms. All directors will be elected this year to serve two year terms with the exception of the director-at-large and the radio and TV category. Because of a switch by W. D. Kilpatrick who moved from radio and TV to management, the radio and TV category will elect a new director to fill Kilpatrick's office for a term of one year.

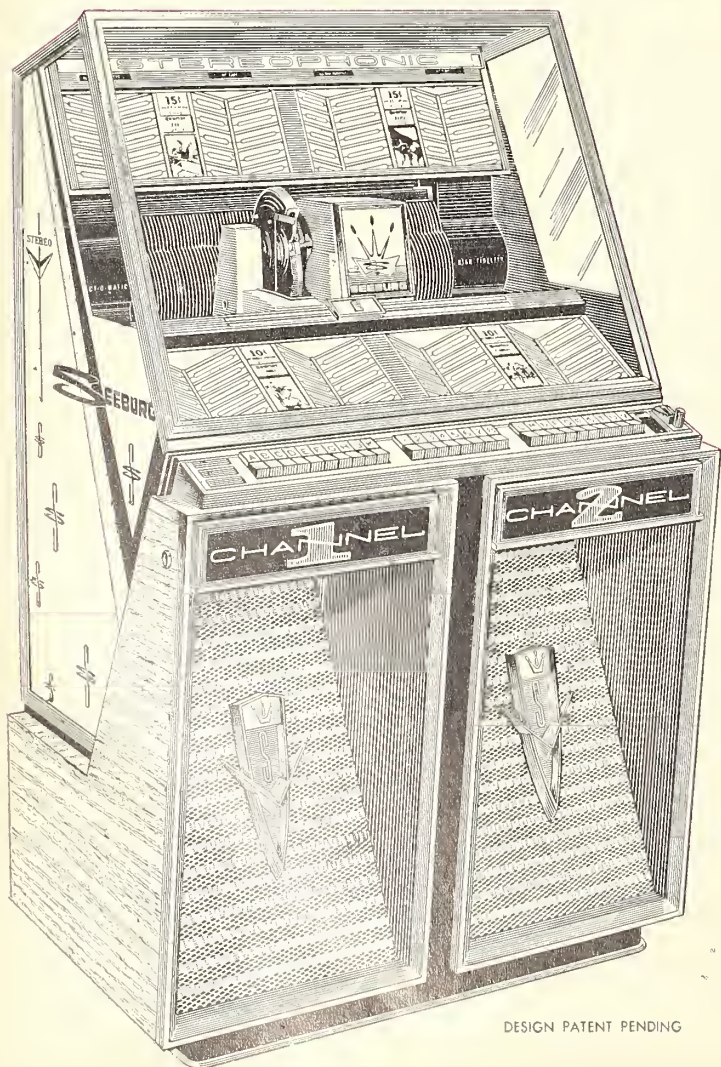

The most astounding factor in the recent World Series, in our opinion, was attendance figures. Chicago, with its established ball park, drew capacity. Los Angeles, in its temporary quarters at the Coliseum, drew over 92,000 in each of its three games—an amazing response from the ball fan. There's not the slightest question of doubt that more than half could have seen the ball games much better—and certainly much more comfortably—if they had stayed at home and watched it on their television sets. But they didn't. They preferred to join the thousands of others and see it "in person," despite the many harassments of driving, parking, baking in the sun, sitting on uncomfortable seats, and viewing what must have seemed to them midgets in action.

The reasons for their participation is obvious. They wanted to be part of the action and excitement. The sport is comparatively new in the L. A. area and the product being served was of championship calibre.

It would seem to us that the coin machine industry could learn a fine lesson from this recent World Series. Give the public what it wants! It wants excitement and always some new thrill or gratification. As an important factor in the entertainment business, the coin machine industry has been providing players with pleasure for many years. And like the ball business,

the patron must be provided with the thrills, excitement and product he is seeking.

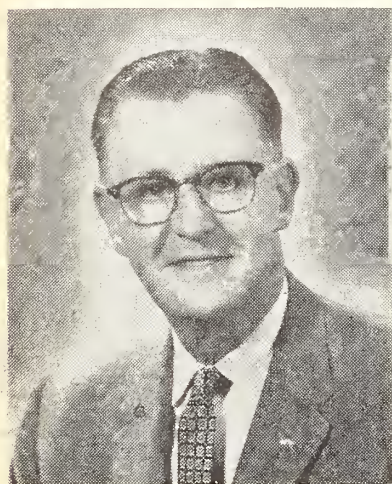
In the amusement game field, the patron, like the ball fan, will buy the product that gives him the thrill, excitement and satisfaction. If the machine (like the ball team) fails to provide this excitement, or if it loses its appeal thru overstaying its visit, then the patron stops playing it. It is then the business of the manufacturer to provide the equipment that will keep the player interested—and of course, up to the operator to place it on location, and know when it is necessary to bring in a new machine when the play appeal dwindles.

In the music machine field, the above conditions prevail—plus the study of each location's patrons to provide the proper records, and to program the machine continuously with whatever new money-making records are released.

When the ball team loses its appeal, or when the patrons lose their interest, the ball club must make the necessary moves to bring back its customers thru new faces or a new location. When a machine loses its appeal, the operator must make the necessary moves to restimulate interest. Entertainment selling is the same no matter what the industry.

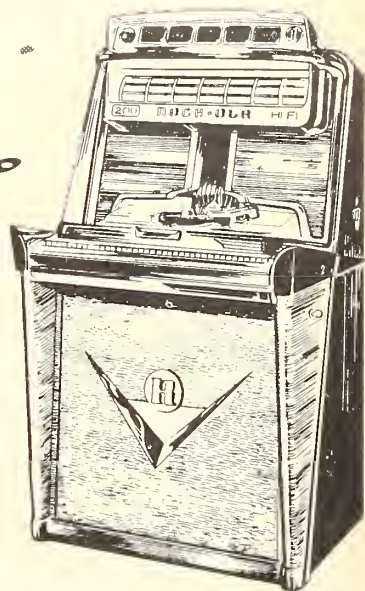

Features Swing-Shot-Action After Success Of "Heavy Hitter," "Batting Practice"

CHICAGO—Bill O'Donnell, general sales manager, Bally Manufacturing Company, this city, announced that all Bally distributors are now showing the new high-score game, shipped last week, named, "Targets."

"Targets" contains the play appeal of the lever-arm or swing-shot method of hitting the ball," stated O'Donnell. "This provides a swing-shot game without the baseball theme," continued O'Donnell, "and therefore attracts a wide audience of players."

Further describing the new game, O'Donnell emphasized the last ball

suspense built into "Targets" with the popular build-up bonus feature which can turn a low score into a really important total when the player hits the collect-bonus target transferring his accumulated bonus to his total score.

"Not only may the rate of bonus advance be doubled or tripled, but the actual bonus may be doubled again when collected," said O'Donnell.

"For example," O'Donnell explained, "by hitting red-lit target, bonus builds up 10 points each hit. But, if the player first hits a yellow-lit target, then hits red target, bonus-advance is 20 or 30. Suppose a player hits the red target 3 times, once normal, once doubled, once tripled. Total bonus is 60 and the 60 is transferred to total score, when collect-bonus is hit. But, if collect-bonus is hit when collect-double bull's-eye is lit, the bonus transferred to totalizer will be a big 120 instead of 60. And, that's really last-ball scoring suspense, the basic ingredient of game success," concluded O'Donnell.

"Targets" is standard pinball size and may be played by 1 or 2 players. Each player gets 30 balls, 10 in each of 3 frames. Play is said to be extremely fast. "Targets" is available in 2 models. Standard model equipped with dime coin-chute; replay model equipped with double chutes, one for dime-a-play, one for 3 plays for quarter.

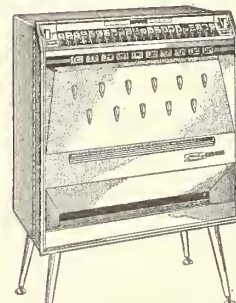

Heart Distributing Intros New "Blood Pressure Machine"

Invented and Developed By Purdue University Physicians

CHICAGO—Steven Sohacki, principal of Heart Distributing Company, this city, announced last week that his firm is currently shipping a new coin-operated "Blood Pressure Machine" for location at airports, bus stations, railway depots, hotel lobbies, shopping centers, carnivals, and amusement parks.

"The possibilities for operators with this equipment are certainly limitless," Sohacki stated, "and there is a 6 month proven test period which will undoubtedly assure operators of high collections on location.

"We spent more than 6 months making certain that this coin-operated machine is mechanically perfect," Sohacki continued. "Naturally, this previous probing by highly skilled and competent engineers assures us of the best possible acceptance by the trade."

The "Blood Pressure Machine" was invented by Dr. A. F. Newland, a physician, and Prof. Arthur Schultz of Purdue University, who contributed the electronic know-how towards the development of the unit. The machine has a 25 cent coin chute in front.

Sohacki advised that Dr. Newland originally conceived the idea of a Blood Pressure Machine approximately four years ago, and he used the machine, which is much more complicated in its structure than the present unit, in his hospital work.

Dr. Newland then developed a different concept of the machine, one similar to a vending machine in appearance, for wide distribution to all parts of the world. He pointed out the increased concern among people all over regarding physical fitness.

Sohacki further advised that territories are available for distributors in most sections of the country and in foreign markets. He urged them to contact him at Heart Distributing Company, 7823 Stony Island Avenue, Chicago 49, Illinois; or to phone him at Regent 4-0508.

The "Blood Pressure Machine" will be exhibited, according to Sohacki, at the N.A.M.A. Show in booth #194, October 31, November 1, 2 & 3, at the Navy Pier in this city.

Wurlitzer On Location In Ecuador

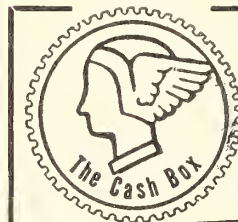


ECUADOR — A recent visitor to the South American country of Ecuador has returned with an interesting pictorial story concerning Wurlitzer juke boxes in the high Chimborazo Mountains of Ecuador. The correspondent is Willie Willenegger, who is associated with Al Siegel, the Wurlitzer Canadian distributor in the operation of the Elmwood Casino in Windsor, Ontario.

Being quite familiar with the newest Wurlitzer model, Willenegger reports surprise at finding these machines furnishing the sole entertainment for natives and visitors alike in many normally inaccessible areas of Ecuador. In a letter to Arthur C. Rutzen, Wurlitzer export sales manager, Willenegger describes the buildings which contained these new American juke boxes.

The shacks, which are supposed to be restaurants, can be built for a cost of less than \$500, but, according to L. A. Cordovez, Casa Nacional, Guayaquil, Wurlitzer distributor in Ecuador, the phonographs cost about \$3000 each delivered in that country. He reports such enthusiasm for the music from these Wurlitzers that they actually pay for themselves in two or three years and make a good profit for each establishment which installs them.

**Public Relations Firms
Submit Programs**

**Special Fund Raising
Committee Appointed**

CHICAGO — A special meeting of the executive committee of the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Industry was held, October 15, at the Bull-Fight Room of the Sherman Hotel for the purpose of discussing with public relations executives, their recently submitted presentations.

Prior to interviewing the public relations men the executive committee convened in the morning, under the leadership of its temporary chairman, Lou Casola, to discuss pertinent business which was handled by the members prior to this session.

Casola presented a lengthy list of names of manufacturers, distributors and operators, who responded to his recent mailing, inviting them to join the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Industry, either in the capacity of members of the executive committee, board of directors, or as members of the public relations council. He stressed the fact that members could remain so on an inactive status, and did not have to be participants in meetings, if they so desired.

"We are certainly aware of the fact that many of the important people in the industry are generally unable to attend meetings in the midwest," Casola said. "However, we are most interested in their lending their much needed background support in future public relations projects. Naturally, this help will eventually affect them favorably, as well as everyone else in the coin machine industry.

"Most of us will agree that we have a 'long row to hoe' toward the accomplishment of a sound, productive public relations program," he continued, "and we fully realize that we require the support of the people in the industry.

"We are, at this time, very pleased to report that response to our mailing was very favorable as to participation in the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Industry by coinmen all over the country.

"This will, of course, serve as a stimulating factor for those of us on the executive committee, who have labored so diligently to accomplish this excellent affirmative response by our colleagues."

The main item for discussion on the agenda at this meeting was the determining of a sound, professionally planned public relations program, which will ultimately transform the existing negative image in the general public's eye into a positive image. It was generally agreed by all that the current misconceptions reflected by consumer medias was chiefly due to a "do nothing" attitude, and should be rectified at the earliest possible time.

Prior to adjourning the committee meeting for lunch (preceding the interviews with public relations executives who were invited to further discuss the presentations they submitted) Casola appointed a special committee within the framework of the executive committee, which will convene November 12 at the Sherman Hotel to further discuss the acquisition of financial support, and arrive at a permanent dues structure to encompass every facet of the coin machine industry.

Members of this special committee, along with Casola, are Sam Lewis, vice-president of Williams Electronic Manufacturing Company; Ed Ratajack, vice-president of Automatic Music, Incorporated (AMI); Art Weinand, sales director of Chicago Dynamic Industries; and O. L. (Bob) Slifer, managing director of the National Coin Machine Distributors' Association (NCMDA).

Gottlieb Ships New Pin-"Universe"

CHICAGO—The exciting appeal of light box animation, which was initially introduced in D. Gottlieb & Company's recent "High Diver" pinball game, and subsequently featured

effectively in other Gottlieb games, has once again been highlighted in the firm's new "Universe" single-player, 5 ball pinball game.

Alvin Gottlieb reported last week, in announcing release of "Universe", that shipments have already been made to Gottlieb distributors throughout the country and to foreign markets.

"In 'Universe'," said Gottlieb, "our engineers have created a very effective animated feature illustrating two space ships in orbit around the Earth on the light box. Each ship advancing to the illustrated moon—while in orbit—scores one trip for the player.

"A very exciting scoring feature," Gottlieb continued, "is the 'Special', which is scored as the space ships complete their trips to the Moon.

"Another engineering accomplishment in 'Universe' which will rate acceptance by operators," Gottlieb said, "is Gottlieb's new coin box in front of the game, with the locking cover. This is a safety feature all will approve of."

Space ship advances are accomplished by the player by hitting 10 rollovers and 2 targets. Dropping a ball in the Center Hole when lit scores from 100 to 300 points.

Other scoring features include Special Awards, and lighting up the center hole by hitting the rollovers numbered from "1" to "8". Pop bumpers and cyclonic kickers light up the extra high score. There are four flippers for added ball action, and the well known Gottlieb "Match Feature."

"We placed 'Universe' in an intensive test program for several weeks in certain territories selected at random," Gottlieb reported, "and the over-all reports concerning reported earnings and lack of service problems convinced us that this fine, pinball game will have a very successful production run.

"We urge operators to visit their nearest Gottlieb distributor and play the game themselves to see how much action it offers," Gottlieb concluded.



Biz Temps Above Normal As Distribs Report Good Sales

EASTERN FLASHES

Distribs along Tenth Avenue reported that all export orders on hand and ready for shipment to foreign ports, since before the dock strike, were expected to leave Thursday or Friday, after longshoremen had finished moving out perishable items marked for "priority." The impression from New York distributors was that export business has definitely picked up during these past few months and that while England represents a solid games market now that restrictions have been lifted, letters of credit and actual orders have been slow in coming to a head, what with the immediate intention of England's importers to move slowly at the outset and find their way through various means of communication before placing a specific order with any given distributor. Several New York representatives, as well as coinmen from New England and the middle west, are presently in Europe with intentions of speeding up the flow of orders from England and the Continent by personal visits with foreign coinmen.

* * * * *

A bright spot in operations these past few weeks has been the settling down of stereophonic installations in the sense that speakers and equipment have "found a home" in locations, originally upset over the proper placement of the units for most advantageous sound. Ops queried reported that stereo locations are definitely a factor in increased collections and that while anything new and different involves education and explanation to location owners, the basic idea has been explained and the stereo sound has resulted in satisfied location owners and greater collections. Incidentally, record manufacturers have indicated that the stereo single situation will be improved somewhat in the coming weeks, what with the heavy stereo phono promotion via the consumer route. Christmas represents the heaviest buying season for the phonograph equipment lines in retail stores and the record mfrs. are expected to hit harder on the stereo single attraction as an added feature.

Al Bodkin and Meyer Parkoff spent part of the week with the Rev. J. Kelly, of National Catholic Charities in New York, regarding the coin industry's annual assistance in setting up a Cathedral Canteen in the U.S.O. quarters on New York's East side. Bodkin and Parkoff advised Father Kelly, at a luncheon on Tuesday, that he may expect even greater cooperation from coinmen this year than any year previous. The industry in N.Y.C. has been very helpful in this move to make Christmas a brighter one for servicemen, from all over the country, and of all faiths, during their stay in New York over the holidays. Bodkin is expected to announce further information shortly, and the PR Committee is planning to handle the charity cause this year, now that an organized group has been formed for this very purpose.

According to Miss Smith, the next meeting will be in Canada and she expects to attend. Bally's 6-pocket pool table was greeted with enthusiasm, according to Irv "Kempy" Kempner, during an upper N.Y. How To Use "THE CASH BOX PRICE LISTS"

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.
