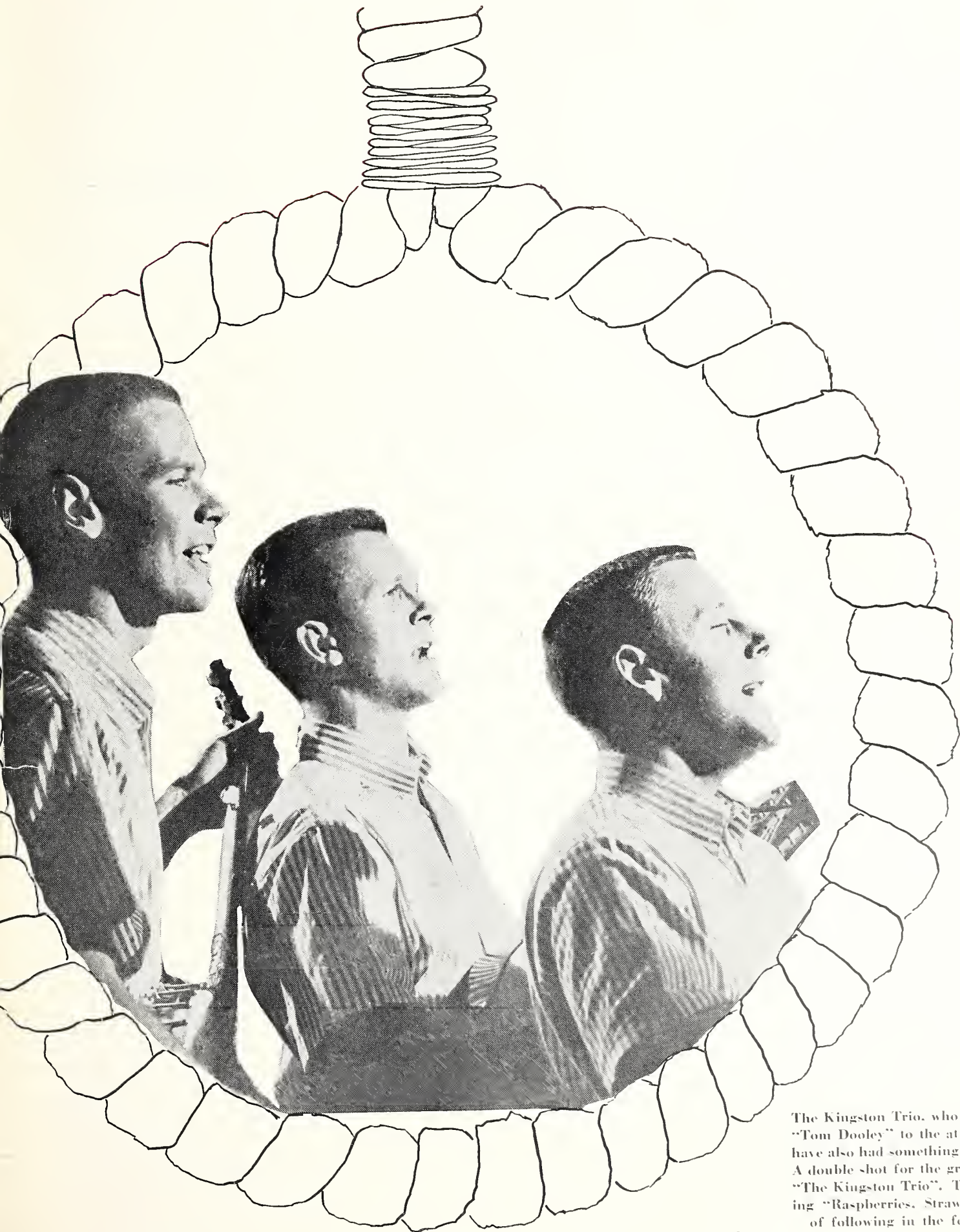

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ONE-SHOT ARTIST!

One of the great wastes in the record business is the one-shot artist, the artist who skyrockets to renown on one record and is never heard from again. Some record company execs may not look at it as a waste, thinking they've cashed in on the one hit record that particular artist was capable of. But of course this is the shortest kind of thinking. For any artist, no matter how inexperienced he may be, is capable of repeating a hit. The problem very often is that the record brings the artist to national prominence before he is truly prepared to appear in front of a nationwide audience, as a consequence of which he fails as a visual performer, and in addition to that the record firm usually spends all its energies trying to create a repeat of the first hit, which seldom happens, and as a consequence of this, the artist fails also to have sustaining power as a record performer. The total result is a complete waste of potential hit record performances and of course revenue to everyone concerned with the record business.

Perhaps the time has come when the record company must accept some part of the overall development of a new artist, and not just feel responsibility for his development as a record artist, leaving the other areas of development in different hands. A record company has too much at stake in an artist to disregard any part of his per-

forming education. An artist's visual performances very often play just as big a part in selling a record as the sound itself. Unfortunately artists sometimes do not have the proper professional direction, and even when they do, are not always in a financial position to take the steps necessary to the proper conduct of their careers. It is time perhaps that record companies should be more forceful in their direction of artists, possibly through the reservation of those rights in recording contracts. But having the right of direction and not having the proper personnel to handle those chores would be just as futile.

What we think, in short, should be stopped if possible, is the artist who is abandoned after a record or two which does not come up to his initial hit. It is a truism that the artist who has one hit can have another. It is up to the record company, who has in the first place been responsible for bringing the artist to national attention, and who also has a great deal to gain from keeping him there, to work with any artist who has made it once until he has either come through again or until the firm's executives truly believe that everything possible has been done and there is no other avenue open.

On the other half they bring back the Chuck Willis favorite, "From The Bottom Of My Heart", in a manner that's sure to have the rockin' teensters calling for more and more. Tremendous, teen-slanted money-makers with the upper end leading the way.

● Rarely has Martin's voice been put to better sentimental use than on "It Takes So Long To Say Goodbye", a lovely, tender song that the pro vocalist is certain to send to a strong chart standing. Smooth and warm, Martin eases gently over the affair and pours out all the vocal affection the song could ask for. Martin covers more familiar pop ground on "Made For Love", an affable, middle-beat piece. Side is overshadowed by the glow of the top-half.

THE SKYLINERS

B+ "SINCE I DON'T HAVE YOU"
[Calico ASCAP—Rock, Skyliners] Here's one to eye closely. The group—led by a fine, sometimes Sam Cooke-sounding songster—reads a choice rock-ballad that the kids will find extremely palatable. Voicing by the lead vocalist on the word "you" near disk's end is quite a showpiece. Lenny Martin's string-accented ork backs-up admirably. Song and rendition are teen naturals.

B "ONE NIGHT, ONE NIGHT"
[Calico ASCAP—Rock, Skyliners] A full-bodied, driving performance by the boys on this end. Polished sock work. Upper track is the important product, though.

THE DOUBLES

(Century 0002)

B+ "LITTLE JOE" (1:57) [Audio BMI—Galbreath] There's a sound of note here on both vocal and instrumental counts. The Doubles singers slickly beat out a rhythmic rock novelty, while, on support, the Gay Blades combo prances with excellent teen color. All in all, a date that can measure up to chart sales.

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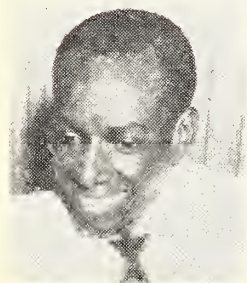

MGM's 31 LP January Release To Be Introduced At National Distrib Meet

NEW YORK—MGM Records will inaugurate its most extensive album promotion to date with the release of 31 albums in January encompassing the MGM line, Metrojazz line, Cub line and Lion line. Highlight of the campaign will be a meeting of all distributors at the Sheraton Hotel, Chicago, on January 15 where a special audio-visual slide presentation giving full details of the program will be presented. This program which MGM Records will introduce to distributors January 15 is "so unusual and unprecedented", says MGM brass, that details are being guarded carefully and will not be announced prior to the distributors meeting.

Biggest item on the list is the original cast album from the Broadway musical "Whoop-Up". Two other albums from "Whoop-Up"—a David Rose version and a Dick Hyman version will also be scheduled in January. Under the MGM banner the diskery will release "Joni James Sings Songs of Hank Williams", "Lisa Kirk Sings At The Plaza", "Maurice Chevalier Sings Broadway", "Conway Twitty Sings", "Murray Arnold Entertains At The Sahara, Las Vegas", "Flamenco Fury" with Jose Greco, "Dick Roman Sings", and "Country Pickin' And Hillside Singin'" featuring The Osborne Brothers and Red Allen.

Six Hank Williams albums will be released as part of the January campaign, a new one by Hank entitled "The Unforgettable Hank Williams", and five other Hank Williams LP's with redesigned covers. They are "Hank Williams As 'Luke The Drifter'", "Honky Tonkin'", "I Saw The Light", "Ramblin' Man", and the

famous "Memorial Album".

Under the Metrojazz banner will be "New Faces At Newport" featuring the Randy Weston Trio and Lem Winchester, and "Keeping Up With The Joneses" Featuring the Jones Brothers playing the music of Thad Jones and Isham Jones.

Under the Cub banner MGM Records will release a Marla Smith album entitled "Take Off In Sound" which will come in for an extensive tie-in with American Airlines. Also on Cub is "The Blues—Mamie Webster Sings W. C. Handy".

In the MGM classics there will be Prokofieff: Symphony No. 4—Gennadi Rozhdestvenski conducting The State Orchestra of the U.S.S.R.; Khatchaturian: Symphony No. 2—Nathan Rachlin conducting The State Radio Orchestra of The U.S.S.R.; Kogan Plays The Kreutzer Sonata, etc., Leonid Kogan, Violin; and Oistrakh Plays Grieg, etc.—David Oistrakh, Violin.

Under the Lion banner will be "A Community Sing of 60 All Time Favorite Children Songs"—Robert Q. Lewis, "Space Stories & Sounds"—Bill Stern, "Tom And Jerry Storytime", "Billy And Sarah"—Billy Eckstine and Sarah Vaughan, "Highlights From "Naughty Marietta" And "The Firefly"—Paul Britten, and "Million Dollar Vaudeville Show".

Most of these albums will be released in stereo and monaural and many will have EP equivalents. "A tremendous merchandising, trade advertising, consumer campaign will make this release the biggest in MGM Records 12-year history", MGM execs stated.

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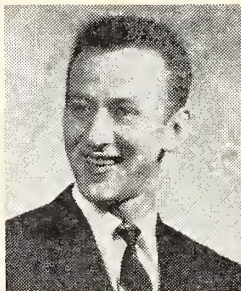

Before joining the label, he was manager of a large Southern California jazz record store at which time he also served as jazz advisor to the Armed Forces Radio Service Headquarters in Hollywood. Shortly after coming to World-Pacific, he was commissioned by the Petersen Publishing Co. to write a book on jazz, the successful "Jazz Americana".

In further World-Pacific developments, the label will issue an album tabbed "A Night At The Ash Grove", a jazz effort recorded at Los Angeles' Ash Grove, one of the many teen "coffee houses" springing up on the West Coast. A photo taken by camera enthusiast Bock and used for World-Pacific's "Drums On Fire" package (one of the many Bock photos on the label's covers and backs) was selected by the Art Directors Club of Los Angeles for exhibition and publication in the 14th Annual Exhibition of Advertising and Editorial Art. The cover was designed by Armand Acosta.

Coca-Cola Signs McGuires

NEW YORK—The Coca-Cola Company has just signed the McGuire Sisters vocal team, to an exclusive one-year contract for their services in television and radio commercials.

To take advantage of the special abilities of the girls, the Coca-Cola Company is preparing a new general selling jingle for Coca-Cola in varying lengths. This will be available as a radio transcription and also as a series of film commercials in which the girls will appear.

London '58 Sales Volume Up 20%

NEW YORK—London Records increased its sales volume 20% over 1957 last year, according to an announcement by Lee Hartstone, vice-president and sales manager of the diskery.

Largely responsible for London's tremendous growth last year were the successes of the firm's stereo line, the Felsted Division of London, which includes the Felsted, Monument, Dale, Stan and Fascination diskeries and the \$1.98 Richmond label, consisting of previous London tabbed albums.

In stereo, London, which was a pioneer in stereo experimentation, pushed its stereo catalog with a major national advertising campaign this fall, with strong sales results.

The Felsted Division, formed in 1958, has as its function to provide sales, distribution, promotion and advertising representation for independ-

The Richmond label was established in 1958 to fill the need for a low-priced, "quality" LP line, with both classical and popular recordings. Such top names as Pierre Monteux, Charles Munch, Robert Irving, Stanley Black and Robert Farnon have appeared on Richmond.

In December, London and its Monument affiliate had three disks on the charts. They were: Billy Grammar's "Gotta Travel On" (Monument); Emundo Ros' "I Talk To The Trees" (London) Cyril Stapleton's "The Children's Marching Song" (London).

Roulette Holds National Promo Meet In N. Y.

NEW YORK—Roulette Records held a special National Promotion Meeting in New York last Saturday, December 27, at the Park Sheraton Hotel. The meeting covered all phases of the label's promotional operation, and all fieldmen were delegated with new duties, aimed at strengthening the company's merchandising efforts at the dealers', rack-jobbers' and operators' level. Heavy emphasis was also placed on disk jockey and sales promotion of albums.

Roulette fieldmen have now been designated as District Sales and Promotion Representatives, and according to Irv Jerome, Vice-President In Charge Of Sales, their new duties will bring them into a much closer association with the Roulette distributors in the areas they cover.

Following discussions on the general aspects of promotion, the meeting covered the details of Roulette's Second Anniversary celebration during January, which included a Restocking Sales Program for distributors and dealers. An important part of this program is the special sales offer on the firm's five best-selling albums. These albums, "Jimmie Rodgers Sings Folk Songs", "Basie", "A Man Ain't Supposed To Cry"—Joe Williams, "When Good Fellows Get Together"—Hugo & Luigi & Their Family Singers; and "Tyree Glenn At The Roundtable", will be reduced to a \$2.98 suggested retail price during this month. A specially prepared "Hit Album Highlights" LP, featuring excerpts from the five best-selling albums, will be sent to radio stations and disk jockeys; and the district sales and promotion representatives will con-

centrate on getting this special LP exposed.

During the course of the one-day conclave, debate also centered around the Top 40 radio station format and the various methods available to the fieldmen in busting through with a hit record on stations with this format. A complete analysis and review of each representative's area was made.

The meeting was hosted by the Roulette national office, which included: Joe Kolsky, Executive Vice-President; Hugo Peretti and Luigi Creatore, Vice-Presidents and Directors of A & R; Irv Jerome, Vice-President In Charge Of Sales; Mel Turoff, National Promotion Manager, and Bud Katzel, Director of Publicity and Public Relations. The Roulette fieldmen attending included: Harry Fink of Philadelphia, Solly Solomon of Pittsburgh, Saul Star of Detroit, Marv Helfer of Cleveland, Stan Pat of Chicago, and Abe Glaser of Los Angeles. Lee Smith, who covers the Baltimore and Washington areas could not attend because of recent illness.

Before winding up the get-together, Hugo and Luigi previewed new single releases due on the market during this month. Among the new singles played, was the new Georgia Gibbs record out this week, "The Hucklebuck." Irv Jerome stated: "Our district sales and promotion men left the meeting all fired-up with enthusiasm, and I'm certain that when they convey this enthusiasm out in the field, we will have not only a successful sales program in January, but we will wind up with quite a number of big chart-selling hits!"

Consumers Play A & R Men

NEW YORK—Golden Crest records will let purchasers play the part of A&R men in an upcoming promotion on the second volume of "And The Banjos Sing".

During this promotion—tabbed "Assignment A&R"—every consumer in a store featuring Golden Crest disks will be given the opportunity to submit his list of tunes for the new "And The Banjos Sing" set. Anybody submitting a tune eventually used on the record will win a free disk.

According to Clark Galehouse, head of Golden Crest, the gimmick, besides its promotional value, helps Golden Crest come-up with a program most popular with buyers.

Counter displays, store flyers and direct-mail will be employed for the promotion. If it succeeds, the idea will be extended to other facets of the Golden Crest operation.

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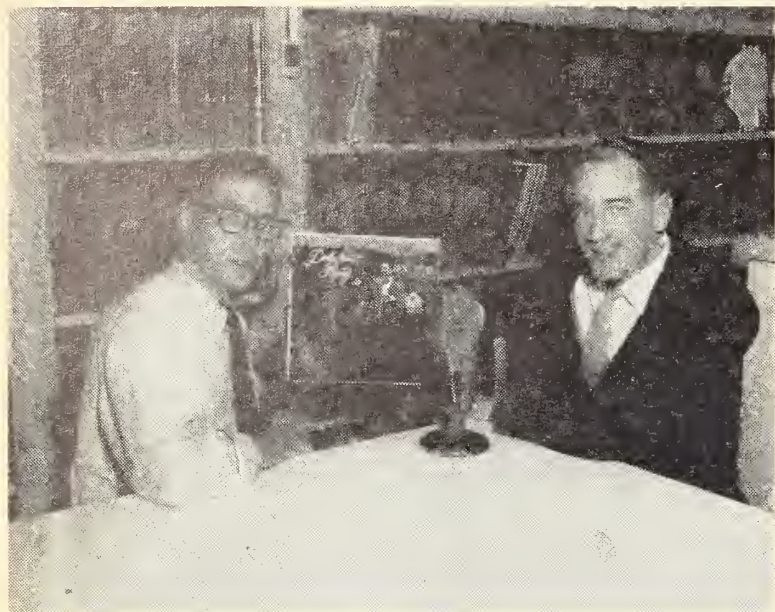

Williams and the Penguins will have a February single issue on Hanover, while Staton's first Hanover release is skedded for this month.

Appearing in the picture with Freed are Jimmy Clanton, who plays the boy lead, and Sandy Stewart, who handles the top fem part. Also scheduled for the flick are Chuck Berry, The Cadillacs, The Flamingos, Jo Ann Campbell, Harvey, Eddie Cochran and Jackie Wilson.

The story is of a wayward youngster whom Freed, playing the part of a disk jockey, helps to make the grade as a singer.

"Smoke" Tops Million Mark

CHICAGO — Mercury Records announced last week that the Platters' current smash "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes" had just topped the million mark.

This is the fourth Platters single to have topped the gold disk figure. Past records to have made the grade include "Only You", "The Great Pretender" and "My Prayer".

"Space Girl" D. J. Tour

NEW YORK — Jesse Lee Turner, who with KUNZ-Houston deejay Paul Berlin cut the smash "Space Girl" novelty for Carlton, is currently on a thirteen state deejay tour on behalf of the waxing, which, according to Carlton brass, has already hit the five hundred thousand mark. The twenty-year old Texan's first stop-over was the Dick Clark TV'er Jan. 3.

Turner, a three letter athlete and a licensed pilot, is the singing "narrator" of the deck, while Berlin is the speeded-up girl's voice.

Bluebird Sets Big Kiddie Disk Promo

NEW YORK—To help dealers and distributors cash in on the mounting consumer interest in kiddie record products, RCA Victor has created a special promotion campaign for the new year, it was announced last week by Ray Clark, Manager, Merchandising and Planning, Single Records.

In early January Victor is shipping a four-color counter display pre-pack merchandiser holding 30 of the most popular Bluebird albums. There will also be available a colorful combination floor merchandiser made to hold 200 45 single records and 50 LPs. Other sales aids have been prepared, including picture brochures on 45 and LP albums, plus dealer order forms.

As part of the promotion, three new Bluebird albums are being shipped to distributors on January 9: "Walt Disney's Bambi" with narration by Shirley Temple and the soundtrack cast of the original Disney film, "Popeye's Favorite Sea Shanties and Other Songs" with narration by Captain Allen Swift with Bill Simon and the Crew, and "Aesop's Fables" narrated by the Hanky Pank Players in today's language.

In addition, two new singles are shipping on January 6: Homer & Jethro's "How Much Is That Doggie In The Window" backed by "The Crazy Mixed-Up Song" and Dorothy Olsen's "The Little Train Who Said 'Ah-Choo!'" backed by "Casey Jones."

Clark said that the Bluebird kiddie record sales in 1958 outstripped the record-breaking sales year of 1957. There are strong indications that 1959 will be the biggest year yet in the kiddie line, he continued, emphasizing that "Victor will continue to feature only the best in repertoire and packaging." The Bluebird catalog has been rounded out to include Mother Goose tales, adventure stories, themes from TV shows, science fiction, and also better music for the children such as "Major Classics For Minors" and "Tales From The Great Book."

NEW YORK—The Neal Hefti Orchestra, billed as "The Band With The Sweet Beat", plays its first date February 6-7-8 at Loring Air Base, Presque Isle, Maine, it was announced last week.

Hefti is currently compiling the book and contacting sidemen for the orchestra, which is recording for Coral. He gave up a lucrative conducting-composing and arranging career to hit the road again with an orchestra.

"Negotiations are now under way with several interested producing firms," said Kuhn, "and I am heading East in a few days to close a few deals. Just as soon as we acquire these record labels we will really get rolling with some interesting promotions."

Kuhn stated that his firm is adequately staffed to go all out in sales and promotion in Chicago and the suburbs.

Sorkin M. C.'s Jr. Football League Benefit Show

CHICAGO—A special benefit show will be held January 31, at the Thornton Township High School in Harvey, Illinois, by Dan Sorkin, prominent WCFL deejay and local personality, to raise funds to equip the recently organized Junior Football League of America, which is patterned after baseball's Little League group.

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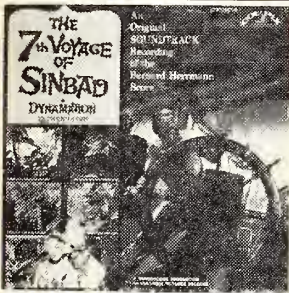

POPULAR PICK OF THE WEEK



"PETER GUNN" — Composed and Conducted By Henry Mancini — RCA Victor LPM-1956 (Monaural & Stereo)

The popularity of the "Peter Gunn" TV series and composer Henry Mancini's vivid jazz scoring that accompanies each "Peter Gunn" presentation can mean sensational sales reaction to this twelve-track sampling from the show's various soundtracks. The selections are blue and bold, relaxed and resourceful and very well handled by the fine ork assembled. Watch this package.



"THE 7TH VOYAGE OF SINBAD"—Original Soundtrack—Colpix CP 504

This is a most exciting soundtrack score, one that could prove a chart click. Aptly exotic, colorfully orchestrated, the Bernard Herrmann music (twenty-two tracks here) stands-up exceedingly well apart from the motion picture. Disk sound is brilliant. Colpix may well have a sales bonanza here.



"I'VE HEARD THAT SONG BEFORE"—Patti Page—Mercury MG 20388

The chantress provides a nicely balanced program of sweet and swinging performances, relying largely on material that is generally in the neglected category (i.e. the title song, "A Sunday Kind Of Love", "There Are Such Things" and "Memories Of You"). These sessions will give Miss Page's many deejay-purchaser fans much to spin over and over again. Strong vocal merchandise.



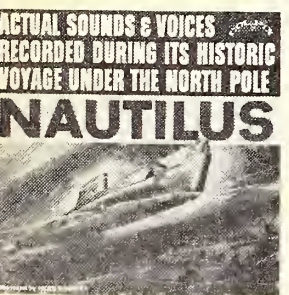
"THE STORY OF THE BLUES"—Della Reese—Jubilee 1095 (Monaural & Stereo)

As a blues stylist and blues story-teller, Miss Reese comes-off winningly here. Each of her eleven blues numbers here—a varied collection of blue blues and happy blues—is preceded by short commentary in which the blues as Truth, as inseparable from love, as the source of much in popular music is brought out. Backed with sparkling blues authority by a Sy Oliver outfit, the performer romps and wails notably over the likes of "Squeeze Me", "Lover Man", "Stormy Weather", "St. James Infirmary" and "Good Morning Blues". Could prove Miss Reese's biggest package showing.



"THE GEISHA BOY"—Original Soundtrack—Jubilee JLP 1096

The Jubilee label's first try at a soundtrack issue, the disk is a pleasant array of mostly sentimental and pretty, occasionally jaunty Oriental-like vignettes from the Jerry Lewis starrer. Composer Walter Scharf's "Main Title", the ballad highlight of the score, has a lovely melodic line. England's Muir Mathieson conducts the full Sinfonia of London Orchestra. Fine sound track music, which the Lewis name can greatly aid in sales.



"NAUTILUS"—Narrated By Herb Shriner—Colpix CP 701

This ambitious production—relating the pioneering voyage of the Nautilus under the North Pole last year—is a great spectacular for the adventure crowd. The disk itself contains on-the-spot coverage of the event, tied-in by detailed narration by Herb Shriner. Soundtrack music from "The Silent World" flick (an undersea affair) offers appropriate musical background. Certainly, the wealth of written-pictorial info about the submarine in the fourteen page package make-up is a sales clincher. One of the most saleable documentary sets released in quite a while.



"SLEEPING BEAUTY" — Darlene Gillespie—Mickey Mouse Club MM-32

This package has formidable sales possibilities at \$1.98. The deck contains the songs and plotline from what should prove one of the pic highlights of the year: Walt Disney's full-length cartoon based on the "Sleeping Beauty" fairytale, with music and songs from Tchaikovsky's ballet score on same. Here, Mickey Mouse Club favorite, Darlene Gillespie and the fine Camarata's ork-chorus offer six songs from the effort and Miss Gillespie warmly narrates the story. Must for the kiddie shelf.



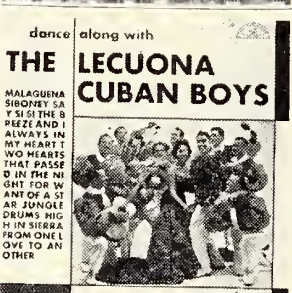
"FAVORITE SHOW TUNES"—Sorkin Strings—Concert-Disc CS 29 (Stereo & Monaural)

Concert-Disc, famed in the tape field as Concert-Tapes, has a fine string mood stint here one which has particular scope in stereo. The playing is smooth and contrasting tonal qualities among the strings in each selection (plus an occasional keyboard interlude) nicely aid in bringing out stereo dimension. The nine tunes are all melodic delights (i.e. "Blue Moon", "Dancing In The Dark", "Fascinating Rhythm" and "If There Is Someone Lovelier Than You"). Especially lovely and effective string affair.



"LATIN FEVER"—Jack Costanzo—Liberty LRI 3093

Bongoist Costanzo—alleged here with seven mer well-bred in Afro-Cuban rhythms—makes his first LP for Liberty one of sure-delight to Latin music enthusiasts. Working on a bill of mostly favorite Latin bon-bons, Costanzo and the boys (i.e. pianist Eddie Cano; drummer Ray Rivera) are colorful conveyers of the material. Included are "Peanut Vendor", "La Paloma", "Malaguena" and "Oye Negra". Excellent sound. Tunes played for all their rhythmic worth.



"DANCE ALONG WITH THE LECUONA CUBAN BOYS"—Featuring Candido — ABC-Paramount ABC-230

This first Latin display by the popular ork outfit features relaxed and rhythmic takes on a sturdy bill of melodies, all except one clefied by outstanding Latin composer, Ernesto Lecuona. Though Latin dance beats (i.e. cha-cha, tango) are skillfully present, the disk often hits highly listenable mood notes (some selections contain strings). On hand is volatile drummer Candido, a vet of many Ampar Latin disks. Some of the tunes: "Malaguena", "Siboney", "Always In My Heart". Fine Latin ork session.



"FROM NATCHEZ TO MOBILE"—River Boat Five—Mercury MG 20378

Thanks to the boys' Dixieland know-how and the superb quality of disk sound, this bundle of New Orleans' enthusiasm comes-off ingratiatingly. The tunes—whether born in New Orleans or in the Brill Building—are all easily adaptable to the Dixieland outlook (i.e. "Yellow Dog Blues", "Lazy River", "St. Louis Blues"). "Lazy River", by the way, is an extended, rousing track affair. Bright sounds for Dixieland lovers.



"CAFE ITALIANO"—Jo Basile, Accordion and Orchestra—Aldo Conti, Tenor and Chorus—Audio Fidelity AFLP 1893 (Monaural & Stereo)

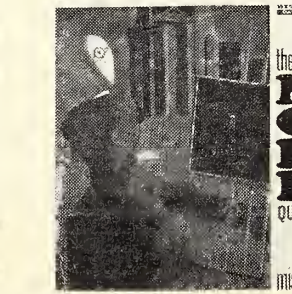
Accordionist Basile, an Audio Fidelity commuter between France and Italy, pops-up again in Italy in a colorful ork-vocal round of twelve bright Italian ditties. Handling the solo vocal spots is sweet-voiced tenor Aldo Conti, a fella completely at home with the material. Tunes include "Guaglione", "Scapricciatello" "Sophia" and "La Panse". Reliable attraction to Italian market.



"A LINCOLN TREASURY"—Decca DL 9065

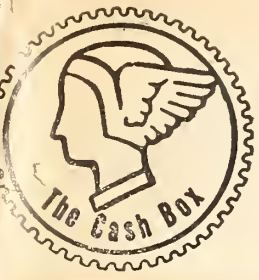
Decca has collected its previous disks on Lincoln for a fine and fitting musical and poetic tribute to the great President. One side is given over to the musical tribute, the famed "The Lonesome Train", an expressive opus built around the Lincoln funeral train, starring Burl Ives and the other features poet Carl Sandberg reading his "Lincoln" (Part 1 & 2), Orson Welles' on both Lincoln's "Gettysburg Address" and "Second Inaugural Address" and the late Walter Houston rendering Edwin Markham's "Lincoln, Man Of The People" and Vachel Lindsay's "Abraham Lincoln Walks At Midnight". For adults and youngsters, a lyrical Lincoln omnibus.

"MISTERIOSO"—Thelonious Monk Quartet—Riverside RLP 12-279

These six performances by Monk a fella in great disk demand—were cut during a Monk quartet outing at New York's Five Spot. The work by the pianist and the boys sticks to the uptempo, with Monk's solo, reflective imprint on "Just A Gigolo" the only ballad musing here. Tenor saxist Johnny Griffin gets lots of time on the various tracks. Must for jazz shelf.

JAZZ PICKS (cont.)



"THE AUSTRALIAN JAZZ QUINTET IN FREE STYLE"—Bethlehem BCP-6029

After a fairly long disk lay-off, the famed outfit returns with eight sessions liberally creative, and invitingly possessed of the AJQ regard for tonal shadings, particularly on the ballad stanzas. Pacings on the eight tracks—mostly standards and including a three movement jazz work (on one band)—are driving and nostalgic. Jazz issue that can move.



"HARRY ARNOLD + BIG BAND + QUINCY JONES = JAZZ"—Mercury MG 36139

There's more than enough "convincers" here to display the fine, driving jazz Arnold's Swedish ork is capable of. True, in most instances here the crew's working on American arranger-composer Quincy Jones' scorings, but the Swedes are the ones reading them, and they expertly sell the works. The tracks—consisting of originals, Ray Noble's "Cherokee" excepted,—cover lots of mood and tempi ground, a reliable gauge of the ork's variety. An excellent jazz import.



"JAZZ BEGINS"—Sounds of New Orleans Streets: Funeral and Parade Music By The Young Tuxedo Brass Band—Atlantic 1297 (Monaural & Stereo)

Here's a presentation of great musical and historical value to the jazz coterie. The Negro practice of performing music before and after funerals in New Orleans has been vividly captured in on-the-spot recordings of music played during such an event. Three tracks are devoted to unforgettable brass band performances of dirges—featuring clarinet wailing of great emotional strength—played on the way to the cemetery, while the remaining seven takes consist of joyful parade music read coming back from the cemetery. Handsome cover-art of a typical brass band parade—which appeared in the Life "Entertainment" issue spread on jazz—adorns fold-out sleeve.



"THE MOVIES SWING!"—Jackie Cooper And His Combo—Dot DLP 3146

A stellar septet headed by actor-drummer Cooper beautifully brings around a dozen pic tunes to a Dixieland format. The change-over for the items ("Gigi", "Let's Fall In Love", "Who's Afraid Of The Big Bad Wolf" and "Pennies From Heaven") is accomplished with superior marksmanship, thanks to the presence of artists like Yank Lawson, Lou McGarrity, Bob Haggart, Dick Hyman and, of course, Cooper. Like the movies, some of these tunes sound better-than-ever here.



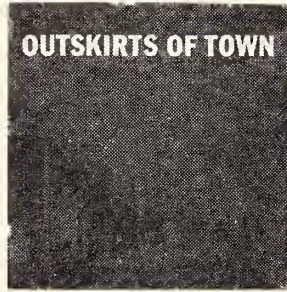
"EARL'S BACKROOM AND COZY'S CARAVAN"—The Earl Hines Quartet—The Cozy Cole Septet—Felsted FAJ 7002

Two jazz vets are admirably at work here, with drummer Cole the big attraction, thanks to his remarkable single successes, "Topsy Part 2" and "Turvy Part 2". On the side devoted to the Cole septet performances, Cole sizzles on the extended track, "Caravan", one of his three sessions. Pianist Hines and his foursome offer stormy work on "Brussels' Hustle", while their other two numbers are a funky and middle-beat blues affair. Cole's current stature should mean extra jazz-pop traffic attention here.



"BLUES FOR DRACULA"—Philly Joe Jones Sextet—Riverside RLP 12-282

After an opening humor bit by drummer Jones imitating the late Bela Lugosi's Dracula, the deck settles down to a musical "homage" to the creature, one which takes things in an inventively driving blues light. In fact, the only sulky work in the five-session affair is the combo performance on the same track Jones kids on. The drummer's sidekicks here include Nat Adderley, Johnny Griffin and Jimmy Garrison. Horror package photo will draw shelf attention to venture.



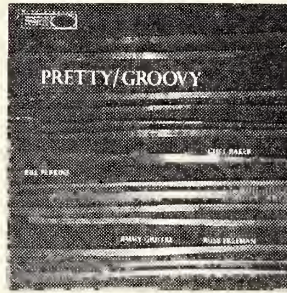
"OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN"—The Prestige Blue Swingers—Prestige 7145

A formidable jazz assemblage here reads blues format with taste and showmanship. With the likes of Art Farmer, Wendell Marshall, Os Johnson, Pepper Adams and Ray Bryant on hand to dish-out the Jerry Valentine arrangements, the pro showing to be expected occurs. The sides range from funky ("Blue Flute") to up swing (the oldie, "Sent For You Yesterday, Here You Come Today"). Name jazzists very well employed.



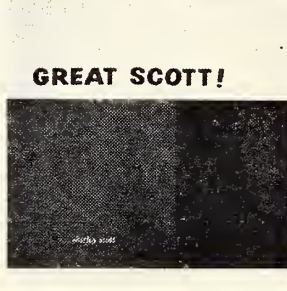
"STEVE'S SONGS"—Manny Albam and His Jazz Greats—Dot DLP 9008

For the uptenth time this year the cleft side of Steve Allen is the basis for an LP issue and this one on Dot—a label quickly getting the jazz picture—boasts the clean-cut ork creativity of arranger Albam and the spunk of an, indeed, great line-up of jazz talent (i.e. Al Cohn, Os Johnson, Dick Katz, Art Farmer, Bob Brookmeyer). Delectable jazz ork sessions.

The "pretty" portion of the deck is artfully realized on one side, while the other pounds a firm, creative beat for the "groovy" game. In either case, boys in the jazz know are on hand, and the performances speak impressively for each area. Fourteen mostly evergreen tunes comprise the surprisingly large program. Outstanding jazz work.



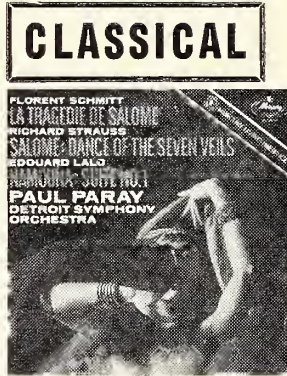
"GREAT SCOTT!"—The Shirley Scott Trio—Prestige 7143

In the rarely heard from realm of jazz organists, the femme artist on the instrument comes as a most welcome attraction. Her command of the organ is one of being skillfully adept at employing the organ in true jazz expression. She swings inventively and brings a natural blues quality to the instrument. Four tracks offer ample proof of her noteworthy artistry in both moods. Extremely well-spoken series of jazz organ sides.



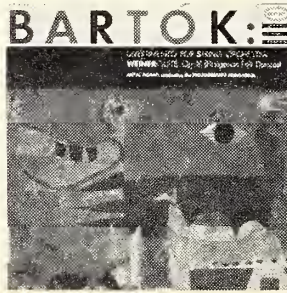
"APPEARING NIGHTLY"—The Russ Haddock Trio—Coral CRL 57243

The Haddock crew—a New York nitery inhabitant—can play it inventively cool, yet nicely keep a big chunk of melodic content in its work. Haddock runs both a swinging and sentimental keyboard or organ-violin sounding Solovox here, while drummer Ken Belding and bassist Pat Cerone skilfully round-out the rhythm section. Songs include such goodies as "My Funny Valentine", "September Song", "So In Love" and "It's A Sin To Tell A Lie". Fine trio jazz touches.



SCHMITT: La Tragedie De Salome—STRAUSS: Salome: Dance Of The Seven Veils—LALO: Naimona: Suite No. 1—Paul Paray Conducting The Detroit Symphony Orchestra—Mercury MG 50177

This glittering orchestral omnibus features the only currently available disk performance on the vivid Schmitt tone-poem, while the catalog receives two more additions to the not extensively recorded Strauss and Lalo works. The Lalo opus—one of three suite culled from a ballet—is sweet and pompous, while the Strauss "Dance Of The Seven Veils"—from his opera "Salome"—is short, but unrelentingly striking piece. Renditions and sound are fine. Excellent ork enterprise.

Rudy De Saxe Dies

NEW YORK—Rudy De Saxe, composer-arranger and pianist, and husband of songstress Serena Shaw, died December 27 of a heart attack at his home here. His age was 46.

De Saxe had for the last five years resided in New York City and had concentrated on composing and arranging for recording artists and night club acts. Most recently, De Saxe had been associated with Esoteric and Counterpoint Records as an AR executive.

Born in Egypt, studied music at the Liceo Musicale in Bologna, Italy. He studied composition with Ottorino Respighi, the Italian composer, at Rome. Both in Europe and in the United States De Saxe held positions as a pianist, accompanist, teacher and dance band musician. In 1943, and for years after, he composed and orchestrated for Hollywood motion pictures, including "Bells of San Fernando," "Calamity Jane and the Ranger," "Beyond One's Own," and "Mystery Range." His serious compositions include "Aurora," a symphonic poem (1944); "Prayer for Soldier," for orchestra (1945); "Parodiette," for pianoforte (1945); "Paumanok," a symphonic poem, based on Walt Whitman's "Sea Drift" (1946); "Amor Gitano," for orchestra (1947); "La Belle Morena," for orchestra (1947), and a march, "Hail My Native Land" (1948).

De Saxe held membership in the American Federation of Musicians, Local 27; American Society of Musical Arrangers; ASCAP; Screen Actors Guild; American Composers and Lyricists Guild.

Besides his widow, a son, Rudolph, Jr., from a previous marriage, survives.

Ward Granted Injunction In "Domino" Dispute

HOLLYWOOD—The Superior Court of the State of California has ruled that the showbusiness use of the name "Dominoes" belongs exclusively to Billy Ward, leader of the song-and-dance troupe by the same name.

In granting a preliminary injunction, the court restrained all members and representatives of a Los Angeles band which called themselves the "Domino Band" from use of the name, or any colorable imitation thereof, in any media of theatrical pursuit.

Ward did not appear in court but was represented by Attorney Rufus J. Carter.

Defendants in the case were Claude Bernal and Larry Chevarra, who refused to drop the name after scores of persons called Ward's Hollywood office in protest a month ago following an announcement that the "Domino Band" would appear at a nearby armory.

"These people thought I had dropped my quartette and organized a band," Ward said. "This I would never do. My boys have been too good to me through the years. Now I hope this court decision will serve as a deterrent to other irresponsibles who seek to capitalize illegally on the reputation and good name of other members of the profession."

Chips Promotes Basie

PHILADELPHIA—Chips Distributing here is currently conducting a January "Count Basie Orchestra On Parade" promotion in Philly.

Chips head Harry Chipetz, and Harry Fink, of Roulette Records, which recorded Basie, are covering all Philly radio stations. The outlets will feature the new Count Basie Roulette LP, "Sing Along With Basie". Bob Heller, of Chips, has his salesman setting up window displays in dealer stores and the salesman who sells the most Basie Roulette albums will win an undisclosed prize.

Sales on such Basie packages as "Basie" and "A Man Ain't Supposed To Cry" (featuring Basie vocalist Joe Williams) are reported "excellent" in the area.

Urania Adds To Rost

NEW YORK—Urania Records has added to its roster Conductor Hans Schwieger and the Kansas City Philharmonic, and Jacques Belasco, composer-pianist-arranger, whose original score for the flick, "The Light In The Window," won him an Academy Award.

According to Urania's Bill Nielsen, the Schwieger-Kansas City Philharmonic signing will eventually mark the disk debut of the symphony orchestra. Urania will set up national promotions and publicity to herald the orchestra's first recordings, slated to be cut later this month. Jack Mardal, of Urania, and Herman Adams will supervise the recordings in Kansas City. Dr. Schwieger has been musical director and conductor of the orchestra since 1948.

The diskery also announced the addition of Marilyn Bernstein to its publicity and promotion staff. Bernstein was previously associated with the advertising and public relations department of United Artists Records, and the Monroe Greenthal ad agency.

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a **CHALLENGE** *to The* *Coin Machine* *Industry*

While members of the coin machine industry, like all others in small business, must meet current problems to survive, it is well sometimes to look into what the future has in store.

It would appear to us that the future portends great possibilities for every segment of the industry—but its members will have to be ready to meet this great challenge.

From the viewpoint of the operator, he must keep in step and institute modern and progressive business methods to meet competition and move with the times. The manufacturers must produce equipment acceptable to the general public so that it and its distributors can find a ready sales market to the operators.

To look into the future:

It is generally acknowledged that the population of the United States is growing with great rapidity. In a recent talk, one of the leading bankers in the country estimated that by 1976, the United States will probably have nearly 30 per cent more people than now; there will be about 50 per cent more people in the eighteen-to-thirty-five year age group than now (the best group for the coin machine industry).

In addition to a greater population available to play its machines, it is also predicted there will be more leisure hours to utilize for entertainment and relaxation. Dr. Boris

Pregel, president of the New York Academy of Sciences, told a meeting of 250 members, that the average industrial work week will be reduced "probably very soon" to twenty hours. He predicted that with the world so altered by automation and the abundance of cheap nuclear energy, it would bring about a class of leisure stricken individuals who will find sources of entertainment "grievously insufficient" to accommodate their needs.

Will the coin machine industry, which is producing low priced, economical entertainment for the general public, be able to meet this challenge?

We believe it will! It has for the past quarter century. Of course, there have been slack periods when it seemed that the factories failed to meet the demands of the public with the machines it would like to have patronized. However, overall, these factories have shown amazing ingenuity in developing equipment attractive to the public. They are continually experimenting, studying, developing and marketing machines, that for the most part, have brought profitable returns to themselves, their distributors and the operators. Of course, the most brilliant mind is never 100% perfect, so, like the record manufacturers, not everything brought out is a "hit". But the average is pretty high.

We therefore feel that the coin machine manufacturers can meet the challenge—now, and in the years to come.

PREDICT BANNER YEAR FOR '59

Industry's Leaders Emphasize Optimism Based on Vast Array of New Equipment and Improved General Biz

There is a widespread consensus of opinion throughout the industry that this year's business expectations offer far greater prosperity than 1958. The prime reason expounded by many is the vast array of new equipment which has been released by manufacturers at this time.

A majority of the nation's coinmen, ever mindful of the mid-year slump period which cut deeply into gross sales and profits, generally predict a more optimistic trend during the year 1959.

Manufacturers are waxing greater enthusiasm and confidence as the infant New Year flexes its muscles, chiefly because they are fully aware that the many new ideas, which have crossed the drawing board and numerous other innovations, must certainly generate greater activity among distributors and operators.

In fact, manufacturers are already making available to operators a faster, more diversified lineup of amusement games and music equipment. This effort on the part of producers will accordingly tend to effect a greater increase in collections for operators throughout the nation.

A general feeling among the nation's coinmen is that the tendency among operators toward more widespread consolidation—which is carrying over into '59—must, of necessity, constitute larger individual purchases and a larger, more expansive operating combines in most areas of the nation.

Another prime factor to consider is the tremendous growth recently, and greater demand for all types of equipment, in a wider area in the foreign markets. The industry is experiencing a rapid development of new distributorships, and ever increasing entry of more operators in these markets, mushrooming throughout the four corners of the globe.

A general survey was made of leading manufacturers this week, which tends to support this forecast for 1959.

A spirit of great accomplishment is being celebrated starting the year 1959 at AMI, Incorporated, as it starts its 50th year (Golden Jubilee). Starting in 1909 the firm has given the music industry 50 years of continuous service—and with the developments over the past week, merger with Automatic Canteen Company of America, AMI officials predict the firm is now ready to serve the music machine industry better than ever.

"We're entering a bright new year with our finest game to date 'Circus Wagon Wheel,'" stated Al Warren, sales manager of Auto-Bell Manufacturing, "and since the latter quarter

of '58 was spent in setting up vast and wide distribution for our games, we naturally expect this year to be our banner year. We predict a truly great year for the entire industry."

Herb Jones, vice president, Bally Manufacturing, predicts that a new idea, which is now making great headway, will most certainly enhance the entire industry's prospects. "There has been a vast growth recently of playlands and amusement centers cropping up in large shopping areas all over the country," he said. "One excellent example of this," he continued, "is the Playland of the Great Eastern Shopping Center in New Jersey. In these amusement areas the visitor will find large batteries of amusement games, kiddie rides and other equipment." In conclusion he said that there will naturally be an increase in this interesting new, large volume outlet, making for greater placement of equipment in the entire industry in '59. Bally is stepping up its production and designing facilities to meet this great demand.

John Stewart of Bally Vending, stresses the fact that the firm will have its best year in 1959. "Considering that Bally Vending is only in its third year," he said, "and that '58 was generally a very great year in our growth, we have every reason to expect much more activity. The vending industry is growing by leaps and bounds; and this expansion will not let up at all. In fact, the surface of the potential of this industry has scarcely been scratched. Bally Vending will certainly be in there at the top."

Samuel Wolberg, president of Chicago Dynamic Industries, expressed his complete satisfaction and optimistic outlook based on the fact that the firm enters the new year with a tremendous and very desirable lineup of equipment. In fact, one of Chicago Coin's most recently released games is having an unprecedented acceptance throughout the entire nation, according to Wolberg. This, he feels, is the best indication of what Chicago Dynamic Industries expects in '59.

Chet Gore, president of Exhibit Supply, reports that he anticipates far greater action with card venders and a larger selection of faster selling cards. Activity in the field towards year's end indicates continued higher sales in '59 with the new

Vacuomatic Card Vender, according to Gore.

John F. Frantz, president, J. F. Frantz Manufacturing, believes that penny games will really boom throughout the year due to increase in popularity. The firm has an extremely popular counter game to augment the year in "Dodge City". Generally, Frantz expects this year to be one of the better years for all types of equipment.

Clarence Schuyler, president of Games, Incorporated, forecasted a great year for accomplishment for the industry in '59; based on activity generated by those manufacturers which have recently released new games. This activity generates much interest everywhere, he said. Games, Incorporated's newest game "Wild Cat" is receiving wide acceptance already among operators; and this should keep his firm rolling along in production for quite a spell, according to Schuyler.

Nate Gottlieb, vice president of D. Gottlieb & Company, indicated the firm's release right at the start of the year with its new multiple player pinball game "Double Action" as a good start for '59. "One of the crowning factors in the past year has been our great growth in foreign markets," he said, "which far surpassed any previous year. We maintain that this trend will not only continue, but increase in magnitude. We will also continue to hold our high position in production and sales of pinballs."

Paul Huebsch, vice president, J. H. Keeney & Company, expects the coming year to be a very fruitful year for upright amusement games. "We're planning to continue to build our share of uprights," he stated. We will, of course, manufacture other types of amusement games; and forge ahead with a greater array of vending equipment, including cigarette venders. "Make no mistake about it," he continued, "there will be no soft touch. However, the industry in general is in excellent shape, and most everyone should have a good year."

David C. Rockola, president Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation, predicts 1959 will be the firm's greatest year, based on tremendous acceptance of the Rock-Ola "Tempo" phonograph line in foreign, as well as domestic markets. "There is a backlog of over \$1,500,000 in orders dated ahead of production going into February",

stated Rockola. "Our production is now well ahead of the same period of last year. In fact, it is 40% ahead. These facts most certainly indicate that we can look forward to the greatest year in Rock-Ola Manufacturing's history."

Herbert L. Oettinger, vice president of United Manufacturing, and Charles B. (Bill) DeSelm, sales manager, predict a banner year for the entire industry bristling with new products and steady sales throughout the year. "United will naturally strive," Oettinger stated, "as in years past, to produce the finest amusement and music equipment available for national and foreign distribution. We will spare no expense or effort toward this end."

Jack Mitnick, executive vice president, United Music Company, looks forward to his greatest year in '59, due to wide acceptance of United's model "UPB-100" phonograph. "We can present many reasons for our optimism," he stated. "However, we have planned diligently and prepared extensively for a greater year ahead. We predict a great year for the entire music and amusement industry."

Edward Ruber and Morris Wiczer of Wico Corporation are looking forward to a greater overall year in '59, with the impetus placed on expansion of Wico's parts lineup.

1959 looks big for Wurlitzer, according to Bob Bear, sales manager, The Wurlitzer Company. "Wurlitzer introduced the industry's first stereo unit in 1958", stated Bear, "and obviously the introduction of stereo in juke boxes will have a vast impact on industry sales. The recession was a thing of the past by mid-August, as far as Wurlitzer was concerned. The last 4 months of 1958 showed a very gratifying increase in business. Obviously, it should continue with our 1959 line of music machines, offering a choice of models to operators including everything required for every location in stereo or standard model phonos."

Comments from several outstanding manufacturers are not included in this roundup as officials of these firms were not available. However, based on the predictions obtained, and the forecast for business in general for 1959, it is feasible to assume that the coin machine industry may have its greatest of all years.

Haddock Announces Acceptance Of Canteen Proposal

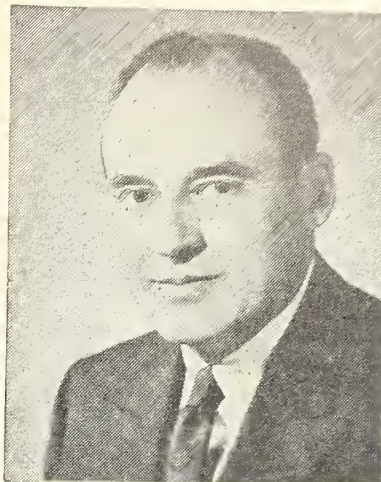

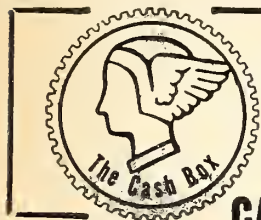
forthcoming, it is believed that AMI will function as it has over the past many years, and that no changes in policy or personnel are contemplated.

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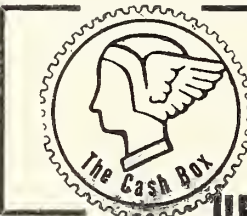


Ops Get Down To Business As Holidays End EASTERN FLASHES

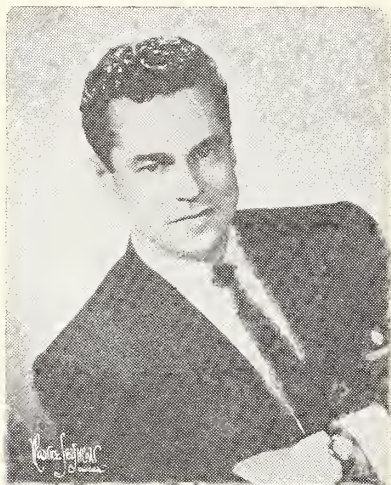

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Two Hundred Year Vendor Discovered In Kent, England GREAT BRITAIN GLIMPSES

The Coin Operated Amusements Co., Ltd., of Shannon, Eire, a company set up by a number of British coinmen to handle and part-manufacture American amusement equipment in the duty free area at Shannon Airport, gets under way this week. At present, the factory, the first to be established at Shannon International Airport, with the support of the Irish government, will employ 30 people. However, plans are under way for a rapid expansion. . . . Important changes in the main distributorships for Bal-Ami equipment and other makes of juke boxes in the Midlands of England, with Birmingham the focal point, are currently taking place and details should be available within the next week or so. One other area is also likely to have two main distributors instead of one in view of the easing of local licenses difficulties in the area. . . . 1959 promises to be the greatest year ever in the British coin machine industry. As 1958 closed the figure of 14,000 juke boxes in Britain on location was reached—a figure that is currently increasing at 600 boxes per month. With the market very hungry for new amusement machines and prospects of considerable numbers of these reaching Great Britain from Eire during 1959, the operating business will certainly have a record year. Wall machines and console shooters (manufactured in Britain) are also doing splendidly, as is arcade equipment of British origin. Chief interest is in the prospect of further convertibility of the pound against the dollar. In view of the moves in the past ten days it is expected that limited direct imports of coin machines from America will be allowed with the next month. It is thought that at first a quota system will operate, but that this will be gradually increased until full convertibility can be reached. The present Chancellor of the Exchequer, whose policies have been so successful in strengthening and maintaining sterling, is known as Mr. "Little By Little"—hence the expected bit by bit plan. . . . Two leading British amusement caterers had to spend Christmas in the hospital. They are Alfred Freeman of London and Bob Wilkie of South Shields. . . . The Annual Ladies' Night of the Amusement Trades' Association takes place on Monday, January 19 at the Trocadero Restaurant, London. . . . A coin vendor of 200 years ago has been discovered in Kent, England. At a recent Canterbury auction sale an oblong brass vending machine (once used in the inns) was knocked down to a collector at a very reasonable price. The machine is divided into two compartments. Through a slit in the side a half-penny (half a cent) was dropped and the lid automatically shot up to dispense a chew of tobacco to the customer.

(Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

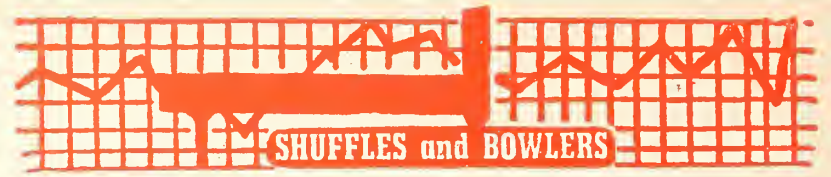

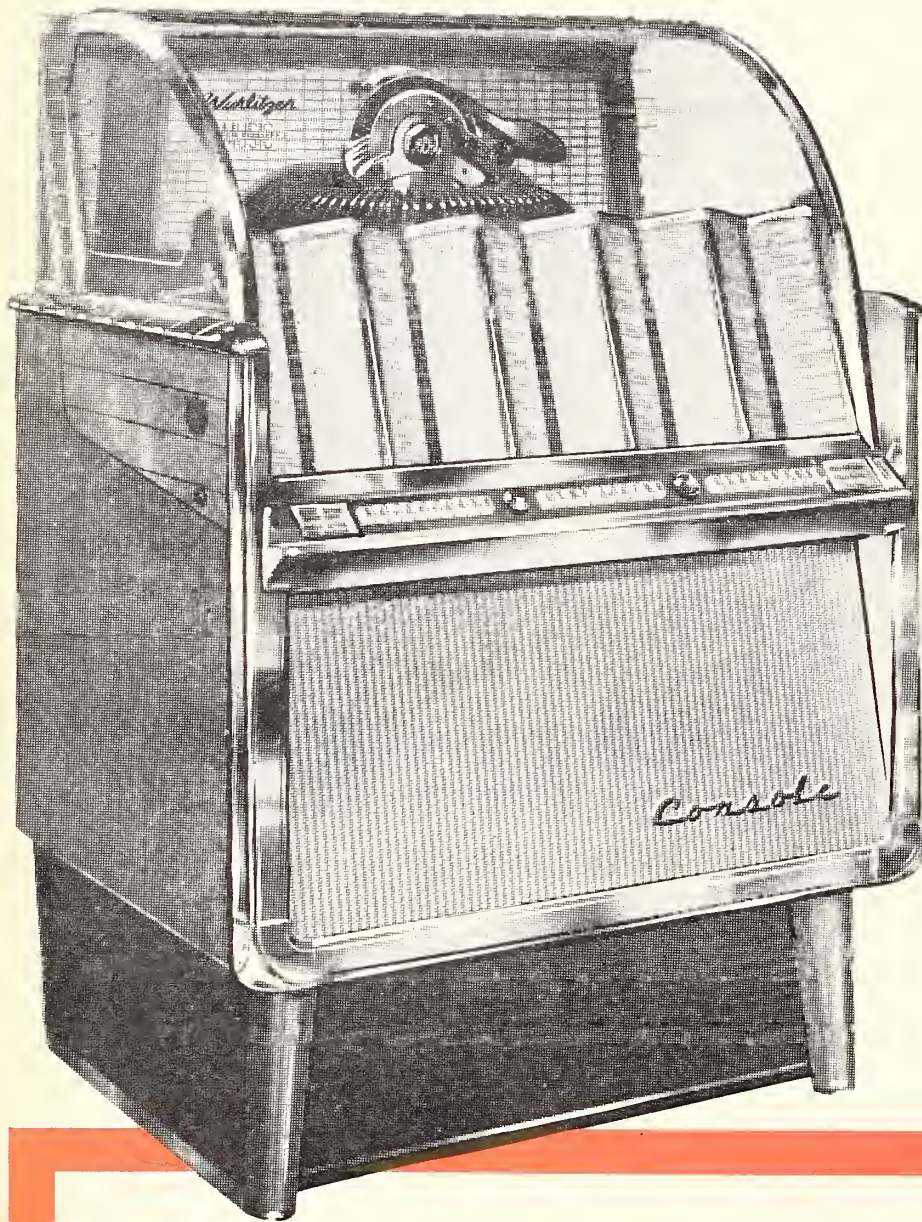

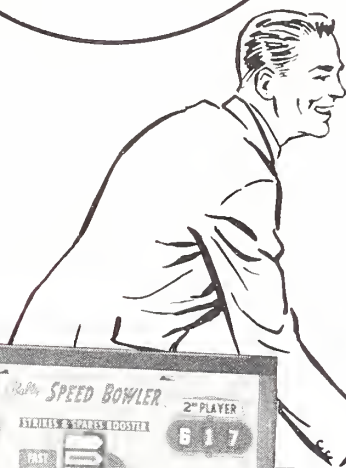
