A Xmas standard gets a Sammy Kaye working over on the upper end and comes out as listenable fare. The Kaydets harmonize on the lyrics as they take this one slow and easy. The bottom end is a medley of Christmas carols sung by the Kaye Choir. These sides make for good holiday listening.

"ONLY YOU" (2:33)
"THE BLOND SAILOR" (2:33)
FRANKIE YANKOVIC & HIS YANKS
(Columbia 39630; 4-39630)

An old Italian melody is brought up to date with new lyrics and handled very nicely by the singing duo of Carl Paradiso and Mary Ann Taylor. This top half should draw well. The lower level finds Carl taking the vocal of a good ballad by himself. Frankie Yankovic and his Yanks set both sides up with a fine instrumental accompaniment. Either lid can go.

MOOSE JACKSON (King 4493)

A standard Xmas tune is given a feelingful going over by Moose Jackson on the first deck. This slow version should go well. The bottom dish is a lovely ballad that is on the receiving end of a good vocal and backing. The second side has more to offer in the long run.

"MAYBE YOU NEED A NEW SWEETHEART" (2:19)
"UNDECIDED" (2:02)
GAYLE WALTON (Pyramid 373)

A couple of organ solos are dished up by Gayle Walton on this new waxing. The first deck is a nice sounding number that should do ok if placed in the right locations. The lower lid is an organ interpretation of a current jump tune. The upper level deserves the attention of ops.

"I IDOLIZE MY BABY'S EYES"
(2:55)

JOHNNY LONG ORCH. (King 15117)

A pleasant novelty number is run through in a pleasing manner by the Johnny Long orchestra on the upper side. Rod Kinder and a chorus turn in a fine job on the vocal. The lower lid offers Jimmy Sellar with another novelty item that lacks the appeal of the first end. Ops oughta tune in on the upper level.

JUNE HUTTON

• A very pretty ballad is carried softly by chirp June Hutton. Her vocal plus the musical setting by Axel Stordahl and the orchestra make this top lid an interesting one. Flip is a bluesy sort of thing that June handles well and gives a fitting interpretation. Our nod goes to the first side.

LOUIS ARMSTRONG

The top level of this disk offers the unique vocal styling of Louis Armstrong and the masterful baton twirling of Gordon Jenkins. Add to this a lovely oldie that has the qualities of coming to life again and you have a lid that's destined for a long ride. Louis delivers one of his typical warm and charming vocals and backs it up with his fine trumpeting while Gordon and the orchestra supply the necessary musical setting. The slow and easy

going tune called "When It's Sleepy Time Down South" is certain of making plenty of noise. The under half is another powerful entry in the form of a current biggie and Louis again does a great job with this ballad. Here too the orchestra is really shown to wonderful advantage and gives the side an added lift. Ops oughta wake up now to the tremendous potentialities of the first end—it's loaded.

"YES YOU ARE" (3:10)
"LOVE LIES" (2:15)

CONNIE HAINES & NEAL HEFTI SEXTET (Coral 60600; 9-60600)

• Connie Haines and the Neal Hefti Sextet get together on the top level and present ops with a soft and soothing version of a pleasant tune. The Cavaliers help out with the vocal here as well as on the bottom deck which is a grand novelty number. Both lids look good and ops oughta watch them.

"HONEY" (2:19)

"DON'T CRY, LITTLE GIRL" (2:26)

ACE HARRIS (Coral 65072; 9-65072)

● Ace Harris delivers a fine instrumental on the upper deck. It's an oldie with a good version that carries the tune home successfully. The second half is a rhythm number that receives a pretty vocal and is backed well by the orchestra, with a piano standing out to good advantage. It's a toss up.

"TRY TO FIND A LITTLE KINDNESS" (2:30)

"LET'S ALL SING LIKE THE BIRDIES SING" (2:03)

JOHNNY GILBERT ORCH. (Mercury 5755; 5755 x 45)

Johnny Gilbert's orchestra comes through with a jump number on the top deck as the Quintet gives out with the vocal. The bottom half is an oldie done in straight style with the sound of birdies in the background. This might make filler material for some spots.

JERRY BYRD
(Mercury 6362)

A couple of good instrumentals are offered here by Jerry Byrd. The first is a very slow unusual thing which sounds real blue. The second half has an Hawaiian sound and it too is pleasant to hear. Ops with the right locations should do fine with these.

"THE TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS" (2:59) "GRANDFATHER KRINGLE" (2:46) BURL IVES (Columbia 90138; 4-90138)

• Burl Ives takes a Christmas standard and gives it a very appealing rendition. With Percy Faith and the orchestra doing the backing, this comes out fine. The lower end is a yodeling number which Ives also handles well. Here too Percy Faith takes care of the musical background.

"LAY SOMETHING ON THE BAR"

"NO SALE" (2:42)
LOUIS JORDAN AND HIS TYMPANY FIVE
(Decca 27898; 9-27898)

A novelty with a good set of lyrics gives Louis Jordan one of his most potent sides in a long while. Louis goes through this one in real top rate style and makes it a potential standout. On the flip he comes up with a jump tune which again gets his typical treatment. The top side looks very good.



The HALE You

From time to time, we find surcease in reflecting back on all that has transpired since we first became a whirling dervish in the record business in the early 30's, and we believe we have just cause to dwell on the future of the industry with all the optimism of a 1952 Republican. ... Merely to substantiate this emotion, we set down the following as some of the reasons why this revolving world of ours continues to look brighter to our optic nerves:

1.—Frequent cocktail parties for artists. . . . More and more distributors are tossing off these afternoon sessions with all the trimmings, including better liquor, a gourmet's taste in fancy hors d'oeuvres, discriminating dress and almost a native Frenchman's pronunciation of Cordon Bleu de Georges Cinq. More and more d.j.'s get the opportunity to mingle with the artistes. generally becoming so chummy-wummy that, after some two or three quaffing sessions together, the artiste is thanking the d.j. for throwing the affair, the d.j. is speaking in praiseworthy phrases of the other platter-spinner who recently stole his top sponsor, and the distributor is plugging every other label but his own.

2.—Disc jockey interviews of record representatives. . . . The nausea which formerly permeated the radio stations whenever a plugger entered upon the premises is now virtually dispelled. An unusual aura of friendliness is now much in evidence and we have observed some d.j.'s overdoing it to the point where they now offer the promoter a chair, cigarettes, candy, his address book (with his best numbers!) and the opportunity to address his vast radio audience. This permits the record rep to discuss his sensational new releases at length and to call the d.j. by his first name, as if they have been buddies since "It Ain't Gonna Rain No More" was the top pop seller. This comraderie is communicated to the yast radio audi-

ence, who realize that the record business is just loaded with guys and dolls who are literally nuts about each other. And, sometimes, the songs that the d.j. asks the record man to have recorded aren't half-bad. And maybe his galfriend isn't as bad a singer. (This is a singer?) as the disc rep first thought.

3.—Artist visitations while "on tour." . . . This has become the Number One requisite of any recording personality, it seems. Here, again, the first name of the d.j. is bandied about with reckless abandon, conveying to the vast radio audience in 39 states the fact that the d.j. and the artiste suffered the pains of gaining stardom together. This is divulged through countless references to sleeping in the park, sharing the cans of beans, the one-nighters they made together (in one sense or another), and the mutual joy they shared when each received "the big break." The only thing wrong with these disclosures is that the vast radio audience is often puzzled as to how many of the d.j.'s actually knew the artiste during the lean period of ascending the staircase to stardom and how many shared those one-nighters—with her.

Anyway, we're constantly being thrilled by newer, more progressive elements of this great, whirling world of the recording business. Before too long, mayhap we'll present some other developments brought to our attention. And mayhap we'll be able to state that we are taking our own personal place in these developments.

Like some of those one-nighters, huh?

Well-what're you gonna do!

Broadcast over WNEW, the show highlighted some of the issues involved in cutting records. It was brought out that of the 100 songs that are submitted to an A & R man each week, 20 are listened to a second time and about 4 or 5 are accepted. The general consensus was that the combination of a good song and rendition make a hit. Bringing to a head some of the points which are seldom revealed to the general public, the men involved discussed how they find new artists, judge material, cover songs etc. Reaction from the trade to the show was that such public discussions should occur more often.

Production of Musical Instruments May Be Cut 25% In First Quarter of 1952

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The production of musical instruments may be cut 25% by the end of March because of reduced first quarter allotments of controlled materials.

The Musical Instrument Industry Advisory Committee, which repre-sents about 60 manufacturers and assemblers of fretted instruments such as mandolins, guitars and stringed instruments, said that such a cut may impel the manufacturers to reduce their total labor force by nearly 1000 employees. Present employment in the industry, slightly below normal, is estimated at between

3000 and 4000.

Since the industry's break-even point is estimated at a production rate of between 80 and 90 percent of normal, a reduction of possibly 25% in the first quarter of 1952 would create serious difficulties within the industry, committee members said. If second quarter 1952 allotments are at the same rate as in the first quarter, an additional 10 percent cut in employment and production may be expected because of exhaustion of in-

Defense contracts have not been obtained by any firms, according to the committee's knowledge, although musical instrument plants turned out a variety of equipment during World War II—ranging from electronic assembly, work to appear a possible of the committee's knowledge, although musical instruments are also assembly work to appear a second se sembly work to canvas pouches, surgical instruments and various small

A committee member cited a competitive difference between the present situation and World War II, when non-military production of musical in-

struments was prohibited. Now a manufacturer who can obtain a defense contract for 100% of his plant facilities would run the risk in a couple of years of losing his market to other producers who continued their normal trade lines.

The National Production Authority indicated that it recognizes the fact that reduced allotments will cause grave hardships in many cases. However, in light of requirements ranging from 130 to 170 percent of supply of the controlled materials for the first quarter, dislocations in non-defense production cannot be avoided, NPA emphasized.

Manufacturers have also protested the importation of musical instru-ments, saying that foreign makers have a market advantage since their use of materials is not controlled as

it is in the United States.

The industry committee asked particularly for relief on its requirements of nickel silver for frets. Frets are crosswires fixed at intervals in the fingerboards of mandolins, and like instruments to establish the scale. They must be non-corrosive to withstand perspiration, soft enough to conform to the rounded shape of the neck and strong enough to stand up under pressure of steel strings. One thousand pounds of nickel would make sufficient nickel silver fret

wire to supply the whole industry for a year, the committee estimated. No good substitute has been found in spite of considerable experimentation

by some companies.

NPA officials have agreed to study this problem.

• A couple of authentic jump renditions are driven out by the Charlie Singleton orchestra on this new disk. The group goes through some wild instrumental arrangements in making both lids pleasureful listening. Charlie handles the lead sax and does a won-derful job. Ops are advised to watch this platter closely.

"LAUGHING ON THE OUTSIDE, CRYING ON THE INSIDE" (2:45) "COME ON UP TO MY ROOM" (2:51)THE MAJORS (Derby 779)

A feelingful treatment of a grand oldie is served up by the Majors on the upper end. It's done slowly and softly and it should gather some coin. The lower deck is a jump tune that boys really go to town on and bring it in handsomely. The top dish seems to carry a bit more appeal.

"UNDECIDED" (2:44) "DIANE" (3:03) BUDDY LUCAS BAND (Jubilee 5070)

A pair of interesting instrumentals are dished up by the Buddy Lucas band. The first deck is a cur-rent pop big seller and the group treats it to a grand jump rendition. The lower end is a lovely oldie that's carried slowly and easily by a nice sounding sax. Both lids offer good listening and ops oughta look in.

• Waymon Brown does a first class job in handling the lyrics to a pleasant ballad on the top end. Backed beautifully by a sax this level should prove to be good juke box fare. The bottom dish is a fast moving number with a good hop to it and this siding may also be a potent half. Ops should tune in.

"TOO LATE, BABY" (2:31) "TAKING NO CHANCES" (2:42) CLARENCE "GATEMOUTH" BROWN (Peacock 1586)

 Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown has a strong contender working on the first lid. A wonderful vocal plus a strong orchestrational backing mark this disk a real good one. Flip is a forceful blues item that's belted out in the typical style of the artist. The top one has possibilities and ops oughta tune in.

NEW YORK — Augmenting its Blues and Rhythm artists roster, RCA Victor has within the past month signed several promising young per-formers to recording contracts, Paul A. Barkmeier, Vice President in charge of the RCA Victor Record De-

charge of the RCA Victor Record Department, has announced. The new artists include TNT Tribble and Frank Motley, Jimmy McPhail, The Heartbreakers, Little Richard, Gene Parrish, and Bob Williams.

Geographically, the group represents the result of a coast-to-coast talent search conducted by Steve Sholes, RCA Victor Blues-Rhythm A & R topper. Tribble, Motley, and McPhail hail from Washington, D. C., where they are local favorites. Tribble is a drummer-singer featured in

ble is a drummer-singer featured in the combo fronted by Motley. Mot-ley's personal specialty is playing two trumpets simultaneously. The two made their debut on RCA Victor rec-ords in two of Tribble's own com-positions, "Cocoa Moe Joe" and "That's What Makes Me Love You So." What Makes Me Love You So".

Fellow Washingtonian Jimmy Mc-Phail is a popular night spot and radio singer whose latest RCA Victor disc is a pairing of "Artificial Leaf" and "That's How Much I Love You."

The nation's capital also contributed The Heartbreakers, a quintet consist-

ing of three tenors, a bass, and a baritone-guitarist. This unusually talented group consists of self-taught musicians who are engaged vocationally in such pursuits as selling insurance and truck driving. Their initial re-lease was a pairing of "Heartbreaker" and "Wanda".

From Macon, Ga., comes little Richard, an 18-year-old blues shouter with a high in pitch but stylistically low-down. Currently making personal appearances in Kentucky and along the Dixie circuit, he is represented among new RCA Victor discs with "Taxi Blues" and "Every Hour".

The West Coast has yielded two baritones in the persons of Gene Par-rish and Bob Williams. Parrish, who has a full-bodied voice which some jazz pundits have compared to that of Wynonie Harris, bowed with two original sides and has a new release pairing "Scraps For A Beggar" and "You Cut The Biggest Hog, Baby".

Newest addition to the Blues and Rhythm line-up is young Bob Williams, who created a stir on the Coast with one recording under an indie label and was promptly inked by RCA Victor for a premier with "On A Honky Tonk Hardwood Floor" and "Cry".



NEW YORK-Carl Smith, Columbia Records' Tennessee-bred folk singer and composer, will sing mountain tunes, strum a lackadaisical guitar and make casual comments on his music when he launches his own program on CBS Radio, Thursday, January 3.

The young singer, a newcomer to the Columbia label, already has more than one smash hit to his recording credit. His waxing of "Let Old Mother Nature Have Her Way" is currently high on the charts of most-played and best-selling Folk recordings in the nation. Other Columbia hits by Smith are "If Teardrops Were Pennies," "Mr. Moon," "Let's Live a Little" and "Me and My Broken Heart."

At 24, Carl Smith has become one of the star singers of the hillbilly tune, just as his present home, Nashville, Tenn., has become the Broadway of "country" music. The son of a Maynardsville, Tenn., farmer, he "farmed till he got into singin'" as a junior in high school, then joined the Navy for 18 months. He subsequently gained national recognition as a composer and singer.



 An appropriate song is doled out on the first side by Ernest Tubb. This half carries lots of meaning and true to life pictures. The melody is simple but has the interesting quality of holding the attention of the listener. Ernest delivers the lyrics in his usual

warm manner and gives added in-

sight with his vocal presentation. The tune titled "Missing In Action" tells the story of a prisoner of war and the problems facing him on his return. Put to music this level offers a wonderful bit of listening and it's destined to kick off and make plenty of noise. The lower lid is done in the same vein and here too Ernest has a number that may easily take off. Both decks receive fitting musical settings that help create the proper moods. The upper dish is the one to watch and ops who wanna be there when the tune clicks oughta get with it now.

CANADA UNFREEZES

Canadian Ops Jubilant as All Foreign Exchange Restrictions Removed. American Firms Expect Sales Booms as Canadian Ops Seek Replacements for Worn Out Games and Phonos. See Open Account and Credit as Basis for Coinbiz Boom

TORONTO, ONT., CANADA — The unfreezing of all foreign exchange in Canada created a great deal of jubilation among coin machine operators thruout the entire Dominion, according to reports current here this past week.

With the news that Canadians could now spend their dollars anywhere in the world, travel freely once again, and use their money for purchasing what-so-ever they desired, many here saw a great upsurge in business ahead with manufacturers and distributors thruout America's coin operated machines industry.

Much of the equipment thruout the Dominion is old and worn. Many machines of World War II vintage, and even before that, are still operating.

Ops here want to release this worn out and old equipment with the latest type machines from the United States and, once again, boost collections.

Much of the boom of exports to the Canadian market will be due to leniency of open account shipments as well as credit facilities which can now be arranged, due to the fact that Americans can now get their money out of Canada, just as easily as they obtain it from any state in the United States.

The Canadian dollar is very strong at this time. It is now being quoted at \$1.025 on the current rate of exchange. (A few weeks ago, prior to this defreezing announcement, it was quoted at \$1.055 and \$1.65.)

It is believed, within a very few weeks, that the Canadian dollar will

find itself on a level with the American dollar, as trade gets under way, and that Americans and Canadians will be able to trade dollar for dollar.

Canada has always been one of the best export markets for American merchandise of all kinds. Manufacturers and distributors in this industry were constantly shipping into the Dominion.

It is believed that, with the market now wide open, the manufacturers and distributors are faced with a tremendous business ahead.

Most important, Canadian ops here report, will be automatic phonos as well as wall boxes and other music accessories. Many of these are desperately in need of replacement thruout the entire Dominion.

Ops predict many, many used machines will be exported into Canada by American distribs.

They claim that, with prices right, and the foreign exchange even, the market here in Canada should prove a real boom to America's coin machines industry.

Games, too, will now be imported by Canadian operators in large quantities. Most of the Canadians state, "We want the latest model machines for we realize that these are bound to help improve play action."

As always, Canadians state, the boom will be based on free credit arrangements between American and Canadian firms. Many of these operators here in Canada ask for a short credit term to get going once again.

Holiday Spirit Captures Coinbiz

CHICAGO — This city's big coin machines manufacturing, distributing and operating industry was captured, most completely, by Santa Claus this past week.

A cheery Christmas spirit prevailed at all coinmen's headquarters everywhere here in Chicago.

Liquid refreshment ran like rivers. There were holiday greetings being exchanged on phones, in person, by cards and telegrams thruout the town.

Leading factories took time out from their materials quotas woes and production problems to give big Christmas parties for all their employees and friends.

The same practice was followed by all the large operating organizations and, especially, by jobbers and distributors everywhere in this area. What may have sounded like mumbled conversations to some long distance phone callers this past week, was only the over-imbibed, happy spirits of all those in the industry here who were enjoying Santa Claus' arrival, and were wishing one and all the merriest of Merry Christmases and the happiest of Happy New Years.

Most of the men here believe that 1952 will prove one of the biggest and best years this industry has ever yet enjoyed. Arguments are sound. Belief is that the predictions which have been made for '52, as a great year for the industry, will prove true.

Juke Box Industry To Take Stand In Opposition To Bill



The music machine industry has been alerted. Outstanding members of the industry will appear before the committee on that day and have their say.



Before the initial hearing was postponed, only those in the music industry were heard. Predicts Great Activity To Come Thruout Nation In 1952

Department Of Commerce States Upturn Will Come Soon In Defense And Other Industries

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Department of Commerce reported this week that business activity, which has remained level for the past several months despite the mounting defense program, probably will take a new unturn soon new upturn soon.

In a survey of current business, the Department of Commerce found little change in October and November from the July-September rate.

A joint survey with the Securities and Exchange Commission, however, showed manufacturers' outlays for new plant and equipment probably would reach a peak of \$11,141,000,000 for 1951, compared with only \$7,491,-000,000 last year.

This indicates an increase in future production, it was stated. Output has been increasing in defense industries, declines in other lines hav total production unusually stable for the past six months.

The Department of Commerce survey pointed to these other factors as indicating "some further improve-

- (1) Deliveries of machine tools rose 16 per cent, with a further rise indicated from now on.
- (2) New orders to manufacturers have climbed to about twice that of the same period last year.
- (3) Farm commodities are up.
- (4) Some prices which had dropped for six months before September now have about leveled off.

(5) Business inventories, exceptionally high earlier in the year, now appear to be about in line with current business sales.

It is pointed out that altho production of consumer durable goods declined, and will decline further in the months to come, the additional government orders will put the country's manufacturors on large government. try's manufacturers on large scale production, which will mean greatly increased employment.

P.M. Speakers To Be Scarce

The committee reported that about 80% of its output is directed into defense and defense-supporting indus-

A series of rules and regulations were drawn up for the permanent magnet manufacturers which will hold down the delivery of such magnets to any civilian goods manufacturers, especially producers of "B" products.

NPA Reports

Copper Wire Supply To Improve After Jan. '52

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The supply of copper is expected to improve slightly in the first quarter of 1952 over the amount that was available in the fourth quarter of 1951, officials of NPA stated on Dec. 11, 1951, at a meeting with the Wire and Cable Industry Advisory Committee.

Despite the more favorable estimate of the supply for the first quarter as a whole, the improvement may not begin until after January, 1952.

Even tho there will be more copper wire available after January, '52, the fact remains, from the report issued by NPA after this meeting, that the greater portion of the copper wire produced will go for military and atomic needs.

It is doubtful, at this time, as to whether this, or any other civilian goods producing industry, will be able to obtain any more copper wire in the second quarter of 1952 (April, May, June) than what was allotted in the first quarter.

In fact official discussions being carried on in Washington are to cut quotas to civilian goods producers in the second quarter even lower than in the first quarter.

There is even discussion current to cut off some industries from critical materials entirely.

Fort Huachuca, Ariz. area: Activation of Fort Huachuca has brought in many workers, which is primarily a copper-mining center.





THIS WEEK'S USED MACHINE OUOTATIONS

How To Use "The Confidential Price Lists"

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Confidential Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Confidential Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Confidential Price Lists", rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00.
