So first, the bad news. After much wailing and gnashing of teeth, it seems that Sega will indeed cease production of its fine console and probably never make another new console (boo!). Er, that's it..

However on the positive side, the Dreamcast gubbins (the bits with wires, ROMS and the like) will be finding its way into PCs and set-top boxes (see page 15). This means that in a kind of stealth-console-like way, the Dreamcast isn't even remotely dead. Secondly, by the time Sega flicks the switch on the DC there'll be some two million consoles out there waiting to be bought by anyone with a modicum of sense. This combined with the PC stuff etc will ensure its longevity. Moreover, Sega has confirmed that the DC has over a hundred titles in (hurrah!) which is good news for all.

definitely changed for us Dreamcasters, there's still plenty to look forward to - namely the pending Sega titles. As always you'll read about them each month in this very magazine. Oh, and have you noticed how PlayStation2 owners are suddenly very excited about the prospect of playing some decent games (the titles that Sega has announced that it is developing for the PS2)? It's funny how an almost complete lack of original games on the PS2 has made its owners all desperate for anyone, even alleged rivals, to develop games for them... ahh bless 'em.

All that really matters is whether or not your own console has good games because, let's face it, that's why you bought the thing. A look at the Directory and a shufty through the Newscast and Reviews section of the mag confirms that there are still tons of great games on the way which, given the current state of videogames in general, is a rather unique situation. So, while the rest of the world waits for Sega to show them how to make first class games, just sit back and enjoy the very best any console has to offer.

As always, enjoy the mag and take it easy on the stairs.

He showed how the game used a number of communication methods, the least of which was a system to translate, in RealTime, between English, Spanish, French, German and Japanese, with no dilution of understanding. A monumental achievement indeed, yet only a small part of the game. *PSO* should be out by now – let the free love commence!

What is it with heads of Sega? First it was Bernie Stolar leaving Sega Of America back in 1999, then it was JF Cecillon leaving Sega Europe at the end of last year and now Shockiro Irimajiri has left Sega Of Japan. Irimajiri joined Sega over five years ago from motor company Honda and

quickly became president of Sega Of Japan, a position from which he guided the Dreamcast into the world. However, last year he resigned as president of the company, blaming himself for poor sales of the console, to become vice-chairman and latterly an advisor to the company.

Sega Bites The Dust?

The rumour mill goes mad... but we've got the REAL facts.

• If you're even remotely • in tune with the games industry, you'll probably have picked up on a number of nasty rumours going around that the Dreamcast is dead. There's all sorts of rubbish flying around at the moment but here at DREAMCAST MAG, we've carefully gone through all the drivel to put together a rundown of the facts:

TRUE - Sega is to cease manufacturing the Dreamcast console in its present form as of March 2001. This is because continuous production of the machine, balanced against the number of sales (hardware is sold at a loss, with the money being made back on software sales) was proving too costly.

FALSE - Sega is NOT calling it a day. In fact, it has vowed to continue support of the Dreamcast with over 70 firstparty titles due out between now and March 2002.

TRUE - Sega has been in talks with several other companies to incorporate Dreamcast technology in its products. The most prominent company to note is PACE Micro Technology, who is a key player in the manufacturing of set-top digital and satellite boxes. A set-top box that allows you to play Dreamcast games, go on the Internet AND watch TV? Sounds good to us...

FALSE - The Xbox will NOT have a chip in it that allows you to play Dreamcast games. TRUE - Sega is developing games for other platforms. These include Crazy Taxi, Space Channel 5 and Virtua Fighter 4 for the PlayStation2 (!), Chu Chu Rocket! and Sonic Adventure Advance for the Game Boy Advance and a Sonic title for the PSone.

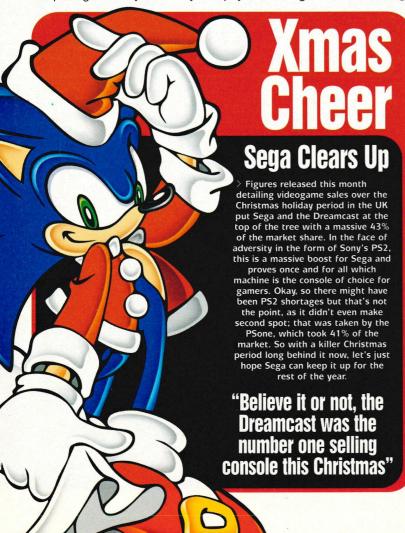
Bit of a bugger, eh? Still, at least Sega is willing to stand up and admit its problems; some people just can't do that, can they? Our sources report that Sony isn't exactly doing that well either. Apparently, everyone that's buying the PS2 is only getting it for the DVD capabilities - they aren't buying the software and therefore, Sony is losing money hand over fist. Oh dear, what a pity, nevermind... ha.

If you still don't want to believe everything that you read, don't take our word for it - try reading these cuttings from the official press release we got directly from the Sega offices. They're 100% kosher, so you'd better

"We will be withdrawing from the ordinary gaming business that consider game console as a main, and we will stop manufacturing and retailing Dreamcast by the end of this fiscal year (March 2001). Regarding the Dreamcast software business, we will be continuing this aggressively from now on too and we are to release more than 70 game titles within this fiscal year (2001 April to 2001 March)."

"As we have announced the new management plan on November 2001, Sega has already started providing its solid contents to next-generation mobile phone and PDA. And now, as the second phase of our contents business strategy, we have decided to provide Sonic the Hedgehog Advance (working title) and other two titles to Nintendo's Game Boy Advance (March 2001 to be released), Virtua Fighter 4 and other four titles to Sony's PlayStation2."

And if you want proof, then look no further than System Shock 2... it's based on a true story, you see. Really, it is.

Following on closely from where the first game left off (not that you'd know that, unless you've played System Shock, of course) System Shock 2 gives you the

opportunity to play as one of three different characters the Marine, the Navy Seal or the OSA Psychic – as you hunt around the giant Von Braun spaceship, trying to find out what happened to everyone. You see, the ship was full of people before you were stuck into hypersleep but now you're awake again... well, they've all vanished. Hmm, we sense some kind of 'intrusive humans disturb a malevolent alien being that kills everyone' scenario here. Golly, it's all so exciting.

Shock Horror

While the game might look like your average Half-Life clone, it's actually far from it - while Half-Life simply offered a horde of alien nasties and tough marinetypes to deal with, System Shock 2 is so much more complex. For example, the character you choose at the

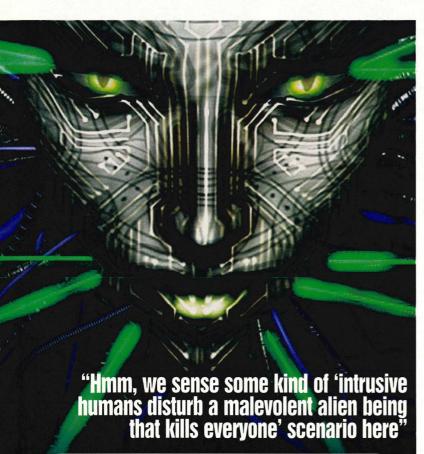
start dictates how you handle enemy confrontations; while the headstrong Marine may prefer the 'shoot first, sod the questions' approach, the Navy Seal can use his heightened evasion and hacking skills to unlock new doors and avoid the monsters altogether. You should all know this one by now... guide all your little Chu Chu's into their rockets away from those nasty Capu Capu's. You can also make up your own puzzles which you can then upload on to a server, thus creating an almost infinite number of puzzles for users to download.

In a recent survey of software sales for 2000, compiled by PC Data, Sega came in at number five in the top ten software publishers, beating its rival Sony by several thousand dollars. It might not have been able to compete with that other software/hardware behemoth, Nintendo, or the likes of EA, Activision or THQ, but even so it's a fine showing from a company many continue to lambaste. American gamers had their first taste of broadband Internet gaming last month as the broadband adapter was released. After much debate about when the adapter would actually make it to the shelves - some stores had it down for May, others March - Sega slipped it out exclusively via Sega.com's online store for \$59.95. which is a small price to pay for the fastest online play around. Two titles currently support the adapter, Quake III and POD: Speedzone, although many more are planned including Infogrames' upcoming smash Unreal Tournament.

Sega of Japan announced this month that it would be porting Capcom's Street Fighter Zero III into arcade format via the Naomi GD-ROM - well, it makes a change from Dreamcast games coming flyin out from the arcades. Actually, it was originally an arcade title, only it's being re-released under the guise of StreetFighter Zero III (that's upper, by the way), this time featuring all the extras that the Dreamcast version benefited from. Best of all though, is that gamers will be able to use their VM units to download all the characters that they've been able to unlock in the Dreamcast version, which is always good

ega Combats

In a bid to wipe out pirate gaming, Sega has just released an all-new Dreamcast over in Japan called the Sakura Wars Dreamcast, which is equipped with a new motherboard. If anything but a GD-ROM is put into the machine, in other words any kind of CD-ROM, the machine automatically boots it up as if it were a music CD and nothing more, thus preventing games from being played. Most interestingly is that, as a result of the new machine, the price for the original machine has rocketed in Asia as gamers attempt to take full advantage of pirate games before it's too late.

But still some Vipers stand against the mayor, looking to overthrow his virtual tyranny and return law and order to the city. Yeah, alright - it's not much of a story line but come on, every beat-'em-up has to have some crass and cheesy excuse to exist, and who's to stop Fighting Vipers 2 indulging itself?

Apart from that, what can we say? It's your average beat-'em-up. Combining aspects of both Virtua Fighter and Capcom's Project Justice, the game is a veritable feast of fighting action which should satiate even the most hardened appetite until the arrival of Virtua Fighter 4 later in the year. With eleven initial characters to pick from, each with their own distinct style and moves, and several others no doubt hidden along the way, combined with 12 semiinteractive levels, you have the makings of a half decent beat-'em-up. Versus, Random Versus CPU, Survival and Training - and you'll soon realise that there's plenty to keep you coming back for more.

Equally mouth-watering, however, is the prospect of getting a free demo disc with the game, showing footage of some of AM2's future releases - Shenmue 2. Out Trigger, VF4 anybody? Actually, this hasn't been confirmed for the PAL release yet, but considering Japanese gamers were treated to this little insight into the future then it's only fair that we should get it too. Fire Pro-Wrestling finally makes the leap over to the Dreamcast

∴ loathe it, it's certainly popular and now there's yet another game on its way to the Dreamcast, just to prove that you love watching men in tight lycra as much as the next man. Fire Pro-Wrestling D sticks itself firmly in the retro mud by refusing to budge from its 2D roots - as you can tell from these screenshots, it's not exactly the visual wonder that you'd expect from the Dreamcast. Of course, that doesn't mean that the graphics don't do the job. Each wrestler is perfectly detailed and represents his real-life counterpart to a tee, while the crowds and ring set up the atmosphere wonderfully. On the gameplay side, there's plenty on offer - not only can you edit your own fighter, referee or championship belt

but there are tons of new matches to try out, including a death-defying barbed wire match. Ouch.

Go On, Hit 'Im!

The only major bone of contention at the moment is whether Spike (the developers) will bring the game online or not. Considering that there's now the option to take part in an eight-player Battle Royale or eight-man Tag Team match, there has to be the option for more than four players to play at once - something the Dreamcast can only do online. The only other possibility is the use of the link-up cable, a peripheral that only appeared in Japan and isn't used by any game other than F355 Challenge. Until Spike makes an announcement, we can only speculate.



Unfortunately, as is always the case with bizarre Japanese wrestling games, like this and Giant Gram 2000, there isn't any word on whether Sega will see fit to give someone the chance to bring the game to our shores. This sucks, as we know full well how great the Saturn version of Fire Pro-Wrestling was and how much better the Dreamcast version will be ... still, that's life eh? Regardless of how things pan out though, we guarantee that you'll find a full import review of this storming little game in this very magazine next issue. Honest.

How Many Fighters?

DREAMCAST MAGAZINE caught up with Oliver Sykes, lead designer for Dragon Riders, for a few words of wisdom on the world of Pern

DM: Why did you decide to make a game based on the stories of Pern?
OS: The MD of the company at the time the game started was a big fan of the novels and also a friend of Anne's. He was the one that got the



that needed exploring further and would translate very well into a videogame. It's a very rich world with lots of depth, intrigue, social order (and disorder) and of course really enormous dragons! (Always a plus!)

DM: Were you a fan of the books at all before you started work

on the game?
OS: Well I kind of had them forced on me by a friend in a sort of 'you gotta read this!' kind of way, so I had to read them or risk physical harm. After that I got the job here working on the project and kinda got hooked. So I'm a fan now!

DM: How much of an input has Anne McCaffrey had in the development of the game?

OS: She was very instrumental in the development of the dragons and the story line, alongside Todd, her son. The dragons on the book covers are very traditional - short forelegs, big hind legs - very T-Rex - but she always imagined them as horses (very big horses) so our dragons have a very equine look about them which some of the fans don't like. The thing is, they are the dragons that Anne wanted.

DM: What other games have influenced the development of Dragon Riders?

OS: Zelda, Shenmue, Kings Quest: Mask of Eternity, Silent Hill and the Resident Evil series, especially Code: Veronica.

DM: How would you describe the world of Pern and all that it represents to someone who hadn't experienced it before? OS: A medieval, feudal but peaceful place with a strict social order and enormous dragons. It has no magic like a traditional fantasy setting, but the most interesting element is that these people are our descendants who colonised Pern and then lost the knowledge that brought them there. It's very interesting when they mention ancient artifacts that are high technology items!

DM: How would you best describe the game as a whole? OS: A sedate, involving, atmospheric action adventure.

DM: What is it about Dragon Riders that you think is going to

appeal to gamers?
OS: Its depth, richness and an involving and the atmospheric world that's waiting to be explored

DM: What does this game have to offer that the other adventure/RPGs don't?

OS: Over 170 characters, all with full speech, a branching plot, a variety of differing puzzles to keep the player constantly entertained and bloody big dragons. And they're on your side!







of all the premature deaths in the Weyr. Along the way you'll meet and interact with over 170 different characters, many of whom will require your help on numerous submissions. In this respect the gameplay is very much multilayered and intricate. Cross the real-life adventure of Shenmue with the fantasy world of Zelda and you might be some way to realising the gorgeous concoction of gameplay that Dragon Riders has to offer.

However, for those of you expecting to trip the lightfantastic on the back of a dragon while jousting with other Dragon Riders, you're going to be deeply disappointed. Dragon Riders is an adventure game in the purest sense of the word, with few action sequences of mass killing, and in this sense the game is very much in keeping with the books' moral - that 'there are other ways to resolve conflict'. As dull as you might imagine all this to

be (along with the lack of any magic), nothing could be further from the truth, because before long you'll slowly become absorbed in the whole fantastical world of Pern. We're not just talking figuratively either, as the game literally offers hours and hours of gameplay - even if you know exactly what you're doing, the developers reckon it will take in excess of 25 hours to clamber through. Not your average jaunt through fantasy land then.

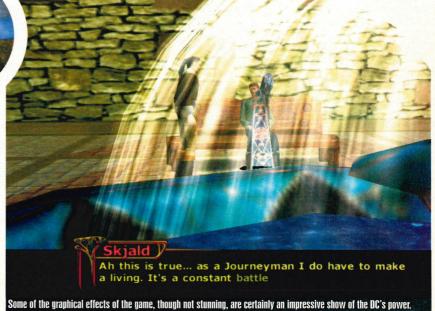


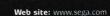

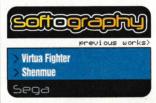
Longing to fulfil those Days of Thunder fantasies? Now you can, as Daytona USA 2001 races its way towards our shores.

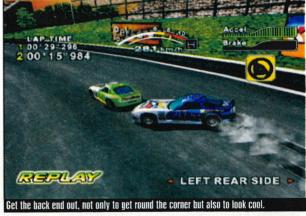
there was a racing game that revolutionised the term multiplayer, attracting crowds of people and creating huge queues. That game was Daytona USA – unleashed on arcades in 1994 it went head to head with Namco's Ridge Racer and came out on top. However, the home version didn't fare so well, but now, after years of waiting, a definitive version of the game is about to be unleashed on Dreamcast owners.

Those of you who have never played it are probably wondering what all the fuss is about – after all, isn't it just another racing game? Well, no. If you play *Daytona USA* in the arcade now, it may have serious pop-up and the

cars look like shoeboxes on wheels, but the playability is still up there with the best. It is possible to link eight machines, there are 40 cars on the track at any one time and it was one of the first games to use textured 3D graphics. The only way you'll get a similar racing experience with seven mates is to hire out eight Ferraris for the day and hammer round Brands Hatch... okay, so maybe there's a little exaggeration there, but you get the drift. "But you can't link eight Dreamcasts up!" we hear you cry, and you'd be almost right, but thankfully, Sega has made the wise move of including online play in Daytona USA 2001. Obviously this isn't the same as linking up eight arcade

cabinets, but it's as close as you're gonna get... unless you've got pots of money and plenty of space, that is.

Race The Superhighway

Online racing games have never really taken off on the PC, the most memorable being Ultim@te Race Pro, which bore more than a passing resemblance to Daytona USA. On the Dreamcast, it's a similar story - Speed Devils Online is the only decent online racer so far. With Daytona USA 2001 though, Sega is not only promising that there won't be any delay like Chu Chu Rocket!, but it will connect in the same way through central lobbies, with the racing taking place between individual

Start Your Engines

All the cars and tracks from the original arcade game have made it into this version, from the classic Hornet to the signature Daytona track, Three Seven Speedway, with a giant Sonic carved into the rock-face. There are four cars to chose from, all with varying abilities, and eight tracks. The first three tracks are taken from the original, the next two from the Saturn Champion Circuit Edition and the last three are exclusive to Dreamcast owners. Each track also has four different types -Normal, Reverse, Mirror and Reverse Mirror (each of which

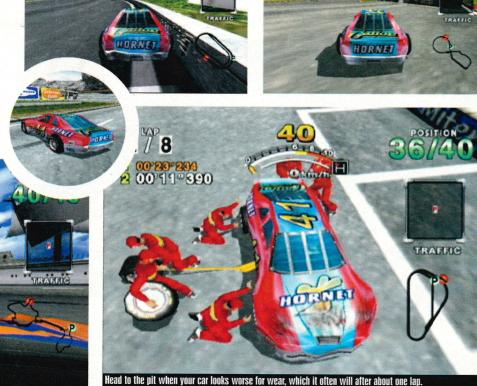
are totally different to race around), making a grand total of 32 courses.

The Tracks

The tracks in Daytona are a mixed bag. Some are a dream to drive around, whereas others are full of nightmare hairpins. Here's a quick run down.



1. Three Seven **Speedway**

This is the beginner track in the arcade and as such is very easy, with three long banked corners.

2. Dinosaur Canvon

This was the advanced track in the arcade and has a couple of nice big corners but also some tight ones which can require powersliding if taken too fast.

3. Sea-side Street Galaxy

The advanced track from the arcade has two nice straights but the rest of it is made up mostly of tight bends.

4. Desert City

The first track from the Saturn game is pretty easy going with only a couple of nasty bends.

5. National Park Speedway

The second Saturn track is a helluva lot of fun to drive, with fast straights and only one hairpin turn.

6. Circuit Pixie

This is the closest you will get to a real NASCAR track in the game and is THE track to live out your Days of Thunder fantasies on. Just as long as you don't start singing that irritating song while you play.

7. Rin Rin Rink

The second Dreamcast exclusive track combines fast banked turns with a tight lefthand hairpin.

8. Mermaid Lake

The best of the Dreamcast tracks, it starts with a huge banked turn then goes under itself to form a figure eight.

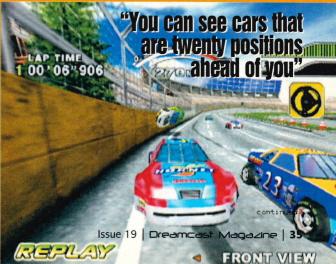














The Art Of The Powerslide

> To succeed in Daytona you must learn how to powerslide like a pro. Some tracks require no powersliding whatsoever, but others need it on just about every corner. 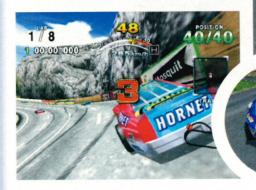

packed full of cars. It also seems to have eliminated all traces of pop-up from the game and you can see cars that are twenty positions ahead of you. A good example of this is on one of the Dreamcast-exclusive tracks, Mermaid Lake. 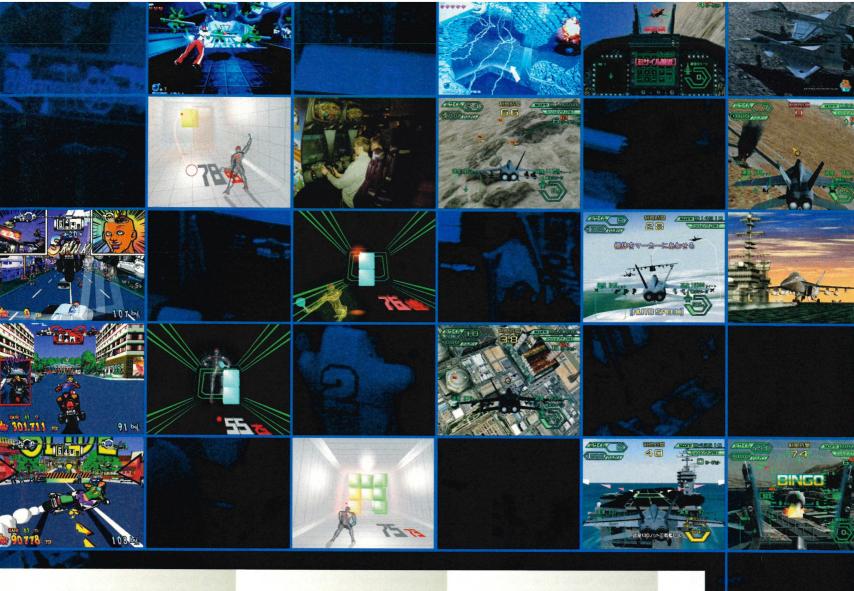
Everyone knows that the Dreamcast is just an arcade machine in disguise, so DREAMCAST Magazine journeyed down to Earls Court for this year's ATEI arcade show to check out all the hottest Dreamcast-headed games... and man, are they looking good.



∴ Some might say that arcades
∴ as we know it have had their day. Not us. Why? Well, DREAMCAST MAGAZINE visited this year's annual ATEI at Earl's Court to check out all the latest arcade games. We were amazed to find an entire exhibition hall crammed full of the latest arcade titles and literally hundreds of fruit machines all begging for attention.

With Namco, Konami and Midway, among others, showing off all their latest wares to the gaming community it would seem that arcade gaming is still very much seen as a profitable concern. But if there's one company that has faith in the future of the arcade industry, it's Sega. With an arcade release schedule that would have many a games

developer/publisher green with envy, it appears that arcade gaming isn't guite as near the precipice as people are making out. Just check out the next six pages and you'll see exactly what we mean. With games like Wild Riders and Club Kart on the allsinging, all-dancing Naomi 2 board and Confidential Mission, Sega Sports Jam and WWF Royal Rumble waving the flag for the original Naomi board, the future of arcade gaming certainly looks pretty good to us. Even beyond that you have the likes of Shaka The Tambourine, Samba De Amigo 2000 and Crackin' DJ threatening to redefine the traditional arcade. Oh, and then there's always the small matter of Virtua Fighter 4. Arcades dead? You're having a laugh...



Wild Riders (Sega)

Look familiar? Of course it does - you can tell where Wild Riders gets its visual style straight off the bat. If you want to be cynical, it's Jet Set Radio on a motorbike and not surprisingly, the premise is remarkably similar as well. Once again, you take the role of a rebellious gang member but instead of using paint cans to put your point across, you're jumping blockades and sliding under lorries this time around. By pulling up or pushing down on the handlebars (yep, another chance for a specialist Dreamcast peripheral) at the right time, you can fly over or slide beneath obstacles to keep ahead of the ever-persistent Police Chief in pursuit, who is intent on locking you away. Mess up the timing or crash too often though and... well, you can probably guess what happens. It's got everything you would expect from such an arcade game, from Crazy Taxi-style racing speed and fantastic visuals to a booming soundtrack, complete with running commentary on how well you're doing. Make sure you keep an eye open for this one in your local arcade - you simply have to play it!



Cosmic Smash (Sega)

Talk about retro gaming! Coming from the loins of Sega Rosso, Cosmic Smash is a history lesson in gaming if ever there was one. It has more in common with the likes of Pong and Arkanoid than Virtua Tennis, such is its design, which harks back to Eighties film extraordinaire Tron. Basically, it's futuristic squash and it's totally addictive. Picture it now you're in a small room with only a racquet and a ball to help you destroy the innumerable amounts of blocks which stand between you and precious glory. Starting off pretty easily, the game has a huge amount of stages to get through which, as you can imagine, get harder and harder as you slowly progress. It might not look great but Cosmic Smash relies more or less entirely on its gameplay which, we warn you now, will have you hooked from the very first second





Sega Strike Fighter (Sega)

Another relative newcomer to the amusement parks around the country is Wow Entertainment's flight-sim Sega Strike Fighter which, depending on your view on these sort of things, is really ace or a load of old tosh. Simulation is very much the keyword here as it attempts to re-create the look and feel of a jet fighter right down to the very last detail. There's pedals, joysticks, thrusters - you name it, it's here. The combination of the lot make it mighty hard to play, and you'll need to be extremely co-ordinated to be able to fly the thing without crashing within seconds of take-off. With loads of missions to be accomplished - most of which include blowing the hell out of enemy planes and bases - there's plenty to the game but only if you have the patience to conquer the controls and master the skies. Needless to say, it looks absolutely tops, so if you've ever wanted to live out those Top Gun fantasies then this is the game to satisfy you.

Club Kart (Sega)

Can you cut it as a race ace, bombing along at speeds that make you go giddy with your precious butt a mere 10cm from solid tarmac? Then chances are that Sega's latest Naomi 2 title Club Kart will be right up your alley. We've been cart racing, and this is just like the real thing - from the sit-in cart to the thrills and spills of the race, spinning out and crashing out, it's all here and it looks stunning. With courses around the streets of Piazza Laziale, Cote d'Azur and Andalucia among others, this is a truly continental affair which looks gorgeous at all times - it's just a shame there's so little time to check out the scenery as you're speeding around concentrating on the job in hand. However, the real beauty of the game is that it uses the Club Kart card, which allows you to create your very own customised carts and take part in the Championship races. Basically, the card allows you to save your car as well as your progress through the Championship so that wherever you are, you can pick up from where you left off.





Sega Sports Jam (Sega)

Nope, we'd never heard of it before now either - saying that though, you'd be surprised how much fun this game actually is. Rather than dedicating the game to a single sport à la Virtua Tennis and Virtua Striker, Sports Jam manages to pack in a whopping 12 events from a selection of eight sports including basketball, baseball, ice hockey, American football, tennis, football, golf and even speed cycling. And the idea of the game? To reach a certain target or (in the case of two-player games) do better than your opponent - whether it's shooting hoops, blocking pucks or getting closest to the pin, you'll need to have plenty of skill to come out on top and make it into the Hall Of Fame. It's fast and frantic fun, with each event lasting long enough to be thoroughly enjoyable without getting boring. The only thing that's holding Sega Sports Jam back from being released on the Dreamcast is that it's a bit short-lived like most arcade titles, it's designed for instant enjoyment rather than longterm playability. Still, we've seen Sega make additions in the past so you never know...





Ferarri F355 Challenge 2 (Sega)

Okay, so technically this isn't a new game, but a year on and Yu Suzuki's driving masterpiece is back and better than ever before, with the addition of all the courses from the Dreamcast version thrown in for good measure. Last year we were gagging for this game to be released on the Dreamcast and our prayers were answered, but let's face it there's nothing quite like sitting in that deluxe cabinet with surround sound for the full effect. Heavenly!





Confidential Mission (Sega)

Anyone who saw our massive feature on *Confidential Mission* last month will know just how highly we rate this game. A month on and we still love it to bits... probably because we've yet to finish it, but also because it's the most fun we've had with a gun since we went blasting zombies in *House Of The Dead 2*. Its mix of James Bond stealth, evil henchmen, ladies and allout action is irrefutably perfect. It will be an absolute must when it's eventually released on the Dreamcast.

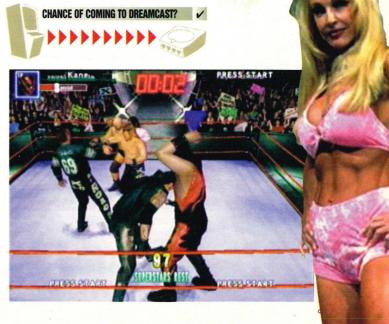
Air Trix (Sega)

WWF Royal Rumble (Sega)

It's not often that games go from the home to the arcade – it's usually the other way around. That's the route that WWF Royal Rumble has taken, so you'll have to get used to it. Quite clearly the best wrestling game on the Dreamcast (as long as you ignore Japanese-only releases like Giant Gram 2000), you can head for your local Sega Park and kick the hell out of perfect strangers in the confines of the Royal Rumble ring rather than only taking on your mates. 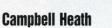

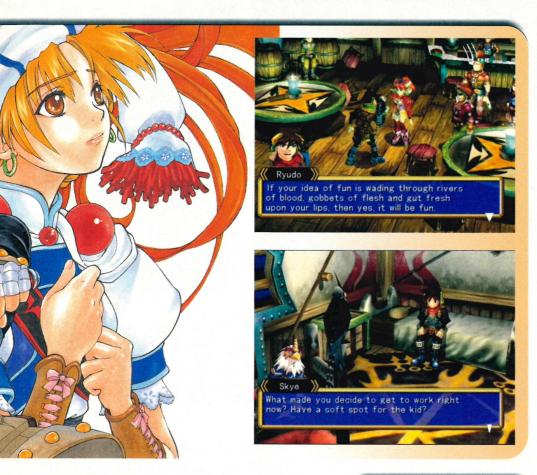

Considering it's had almost as much hype surrounding it as the mighty Shenmue, can Sonic Team's latest game live up to the expectations?

trust when it comes to delivering the respective goods - and we're not talking about parcels here, obviously. With games especially, there are certain groups that always produce grade-A titles; Nintendo (who hasn't produced a bad game yet... maybe some average ones, but never a bad one), CodeMasters and Namco are all names that have a reputation for quality. If you take a look in Sega's direction though, one name clearly stands out





above all the rest... can you guess who it is yet? If you said Sonic Team, you're right - well done, two points.

Let Me Be Your Phantasy

So after spending ages in development and even losing its original creator to the team behind Skies Of Arcadia (which we WILL be reviewing next issue... by golly, we will), Sonic Team's massive RPG experience Phantasy Star Online has finally landed on European shores. Are we excited? Well yes, of course we are. Saying that though, you've got to be careful when dealing with a game that's received more attention than our girl Karen's not-so-camera shy pants - the more you expect, the greater the disappointment is likely to be. After all, Shenmue was dubbed to be the best game ever and yet, in the opinion of



most of the people we know (though not yourselves, judging from all the mail we've had) it was boring with a capital 'Yawn'. Thankfully, hyped games don't always have to be this way...

Before you start getting all gooey-eyed and claiming that Phantasy Star Online is the greatest game ever and you've never seen anything like it (and we know you will - God knows, you've said pretty much the same thing about flippin' Shenmue) you're wrong. Not about the game being excellent, you understand; it's just that when you look back at other RPGs, you can see where Sonic Team got its ideas from. Break Phantasy Star Online down and what you'll end up with is incredibly similar to the ageing Blizzard classic on the PC called Diablo. Roaming around a complex series of chambers, slaying enemies and collecting items in a party consisting of online players - the similarities really are quite startling. But then that's just us being incredibly picky and trying to find fault... probably.

Although it takes several ideas from the last Phantasy Star game - entitled Phantasy Star IV: End Of The Millennium - in terms of gameplay, the world of

Not surprisingly though, things go a bit pear-shaped when they get there in a whole big explosion/contact lost/we're all buggered-stylee and even less surprisingly, only YOU as a bountyhunting ranger can find out what actually happened out there. Let the adventuring commence!

However, there is a catch. Despite sounding like it has the requisite story line to get all the role-playing fans amongst you drooling like babies, the plot actually takes a backseat during the whole of

Star Online goes one better and actually lets you build a character from scratch in two easy steps...

Step One -**Get A Job**

Before you do anything, you'll need to decide exactly what form your character is going to take. There are three different 'professions' to choose from – the Hunter (who excels at close-range fighting), the Ranger (more proficient at long-range attacks) and the Force (specialising in Techniques). That's not all though; in each category there are a range of races from which to select as well. Picking between a Human, Newman or Android in each of the professions can drastically alter the way in which your character evolves, so pick wisely and think about how you'd like the game to proceed.

Step Two – You've Got The Look

Next is the all-important look of your character - after all, other players are going to have to see you, so you might as well try to smarten yourself up a bit. Choosing

your clothes, facial features and even proportions (tall and thin or short and fat? It's up to you!) doesn't affect the way your character develops but at least it's nice to be able to decide, eh? With all of that sorted, just hit the OK button and it's off into the wide blue yonder of adventure... makes you feel all tingly inside, doesn't it?



Phantasy Star Online. Sure, you know that something's happened down on Ragol and it's your job to find the survivors but apart from that, you'll get very little in the way of pointers. In complete contrast to the Final Fantasy style, where you're led through the game by a deep and involving plot that draws you into the fantasy world (much like Skies Of Arcadia... damn, we really must stop making comparisons like that) Phantasy Star Online basically tosses you in at the deep end and then occasionally sniggers when you mess it all up. If you need a visual image, think of it as 'RPG Lite' - your average RPG story but with none of the additives, preservatives or flavour.

Stars In Your Eves

Thankfully, there isn't that much to mess up when it actually comes to playing through Phantasy Star Online... apart from dying, obviously. Compared to all the other RPGs out there with their multitude of armour classes, bizarre weapon combinations and magic systems





that defy logic, Sonic Team has kept it simple to the extreme with this game. It's easy - equip your best armour (and if you pick up better, swap them round), grab your best gun (or stick, if you're a bit of a wimpy Force) then get out there and smack some beasties. Magic, or Technique, as it's called here, is also incredibly straightforward; by finding or buying disks, you can learn a variety of Techniques. These can be set to any of the buttons and drain your Technique Points when used... and that's it. No complicated menus, no waiting for your turn to come round – nothing. It's this simplicity that makes Phantasy Star Online really easy to get into and prevents it from deterring those that might not be attracted by role-playing games at first.

Play the game offline (as we did to begin with) and you'll start your quest alone. Unfortunately, you won't have much chance of getting past many of the tougher beasts on the planet surface on your own - something you'll need to do





in order to progress. Thankfully, the local Hunter's Guild is on hand to offer a number of sub-missions for you to take up. These can be used to build up your experience as well as your Meseta (that's money, to us) and the more you complete, the more will be offered. A major problem that we've got to bring up, though, is actually regarding all these 'different' missions that the Hunter's Guild dish out - although they all seem to have different objectives, they don't. No matter who or what you're asked to find, they're all the same; roam around a repetitive map (yes, there are only a small selection of areas - the first eight missions take place over the same two maps, for example), killing all the creatures in each clearing to unlock any nearby doors and talking to anyone that doesn't try to hurt you until you manage to find said person/item. Occasionally

something original might get thrown into the mix (like completing the mission in a set time) but aside from these minor distractions, it's all pretty samey. In fact, we'd almost go so far as to say it was rather du... du... nope, we can't bring ourselves to say it. Not yet, at least.

We Are Family

Of course, one of the reasons why the offline mode is quite so plodding and repetitive could be because Sega doesn't really want you to play the game that way – after all, it's not called *Phantasy Star Online* for nothing. Get yourself online and you'll be given a choice of ship to enter; from there, you can choose from a massive selection of 'lobbies' where teams of online players are created. Whether you're forming your own group or simply joining one that already exists, it's all pretty straightforward and what's more,

Phantasy Star Online disc, you'll be prompted to enter the specific Serial Number and Access Key that comes hidden away inside the box. Once you've done this, the game will tell you that because you've registered your disc, you'll only be able to play your game of Phantasy Star Online on that specific Dreamcast... believe us, you'll want to take heed of the advice. Why? Because if you don't, you'll regret it. Especially if, like us, you play through the game for over 15 hours and build up a really powerful character and then lose EVERYTHING just because you switched machines. What's more, this happened to us on two separate occasions... let's just say that annoying isn't a

strong enough word. Aargh!

the game itself doesn't change that much either. You'll still need to visit the Hunter's Guild and get yourself a mission to undertake, although the selection is slightly smaller. However, we couldn't help but notice that despite being similar to the offline game in structure, there was much more enjoyment to be had. Being able to kick arse en masse, chat to each other and generally act like a team is actually a great deal of fun... especially the kicking arse part. It opens up a whole new world of helping each other out that the offline mode sorely lacks - if ever there was a game that was made a million times better by playing it online, this is it.

The only real complaint we could genuinely level at the online side of Phantasy Star Online is one we've bleated on about before; in the words of our old friend the Man In The Pub, online gaming is just too bloomin' expensive. Considering the immense size of the game (well, it is an RPG after all) and the time it'll take to get anywhere, this isn't quite the same quick-fix that Chu Chu Rocket! or Quake III Arena was. If you're in the middle of a Hunter's Guild quest, for example, you can't really just stop playing until it's completed. It's certainly quite a thrill to be able to communicate and play with gamers from all over the world but unless you're prepared to fork out a hefty sum for the privilege at the end of the month (or get shouted at by your parents if you don't pay the bill), you'll never get as much out of it as you might.

Out Of This World

At brass tacks level, Phantasy Star Online is certainly not a new style of RPG. However, fans of more traditional RPGs (as well as anyone not normally into roleplaying, but looking to try something a







little different) should be aware that this game certainly isn't going to be loved by everyone. Gamers with no intent of ever going online should also think twice before getting Phantasy Star Online; offline, this is really as base as it gets. In truth, having to wade through room after strangely-familiar-looking room of identical monsters purely for the purpose of looking for another cake wagon/lost friend/man dressed as a yellow penguin is a strangely compelling experience for those of you determined enough to do so (and we were, considering Sega held back all details of anything past the second level). Looking at it purely from the perspective of someone that loves RPGs though, it's all a bit... well, dull. There - we've said it. Dull, dull, dull. It's certainly nowhere near the blandness of Shenmue, but playing Phantasy Star Online offline certainly only provides an ounce of the experience that the game really offers.

But then, that's the point isn't it? Where Chu Chu Rocket! and Quake III Arena had one-player offline games that only offered a taste of the excitement in comparison to the online game, so Phantasy Star Online also does the same. Unfortunately, Chu Chu Rocket! and Quake III Arena both had excellent offline multiplayer options as well... but Phantasy Star Online doesn't. Do you think Sega might be trying to tell us something? Maybe. Supposedly, the future of gaming is online. However, it's not because games are evolving that way - it's because developers are making it so they HAVE to be that way by penalising people who choose to keep their phone bills lower than the gross national debt of Uganda. What a bugger, eh? **Martin Mathers**

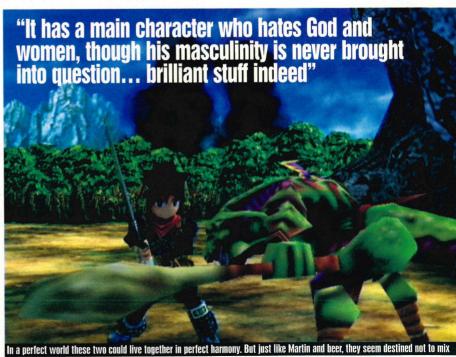

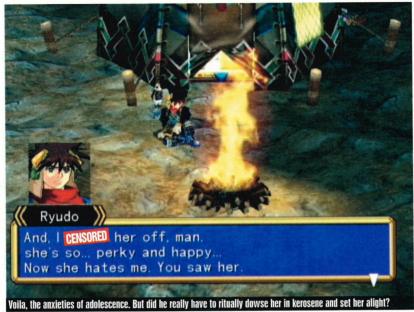

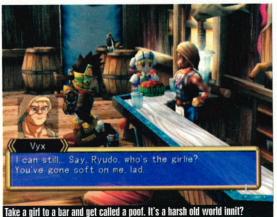
Good Translations

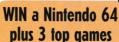

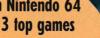

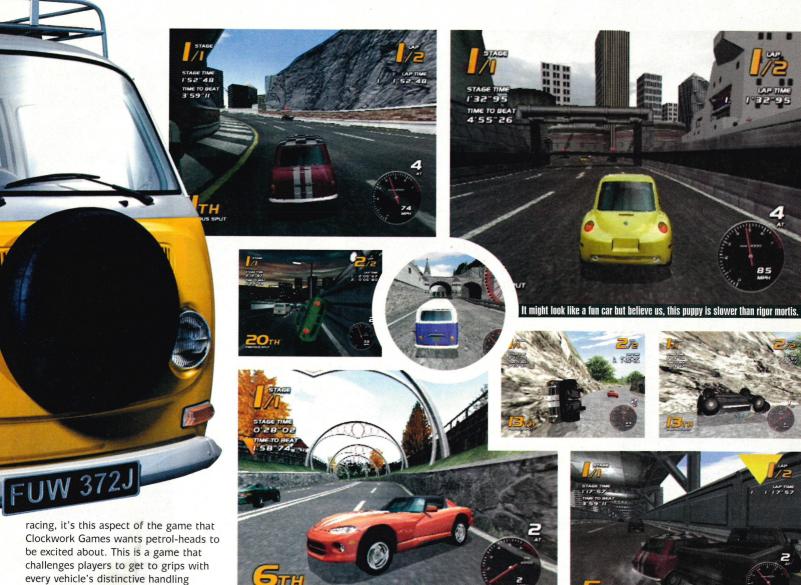
However, if early impressions are of an arcade racer, once you've taken to the road you'll find that this is certainly no ordinary racing game. Two years spent by three PhD grade eggheads has produced one of the most realistic driving engines you'll ever find. Though you start with just two cars to drive, as you progress through the game you'll slowly unlock a total of 32 vehicles modelled on their real-life counterparts. Each looks and sounds as it should but more importantly, they handle realistically as well. This forms the game's fulcrum and in place of proper

qualities and sure enough, you'll find that most of the vehicles on offer are a tad tricky to master.

Are You Lonesome Tonight?

For some this will be frustrating but for others, the challenge will be an absolute joy. This is both the game's greatest strength and its weakest link. Using this stunningly realistic engine, Clockwork Games has ditched the now-familiar racing game in favour of more time trial-based action. Rather than starting a race against your standard five opponents, Vanishing Point places you amidst 39 racers, but they are not racing directly against you. In fact, when they are on the circuit they don't actually react in any way to your presence. So you have a racing game that has circuits littered with cars - both racers and 'civilian' cars that just happen to be poodling along the circuit - but ultimately, it's just a time limit that you are racing against. Obviously, the circuits, the handling of the cars and the time limits imposed upon you are

challenge enough, but even M-SR didn't eschew good old-fashioned racing in favour of a spot of originality, and that was for one good reason: balance. Without the immediacy of a good scrap against 'real' opponents, the one-player mode can feel a bit lonely. This is compounded by the fact that the other cars on the circuit merely impede your progress with their often-erratic driving, causing unnecessary frustration when your chances of winning the race are thwarted on the first corner and your car is rammed (accidentally) by some seemingly drunken opponent.

It's Only Hay...

However, this slight omission is more than made up for by the wealth of options, not least the Stunt mode, which has been the main thief of our time. It comprises 14 challenges that will test

the skill and patience of any gamesplayer. The Head-to-Head mode and Multiplayer mode (where up to eight people can take it in turns to compete against each) all add further depth to the game. Combine this with the staggering amount of bonus stuff that you can open, and this is a game that offers a huge amount of replayability.

Vanishing Point is a rather unbalanced affair. Hardcore racing game fans will find much enjoyment in mastering the cars and the Stunt mode is superb while it lasts, nearly making the game a vital purchase. Unfortunately, though, the lack of arcade-style racing action prevents Vanishing Point from being the must-have game that it could so easily have been. That said, it's certainly worth a look, but we'd recommend that you rent it first... <u>(6)</u>

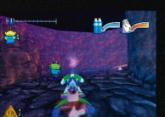

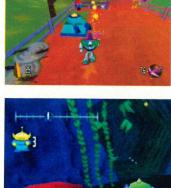

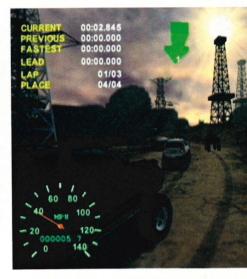

gaming on the Dreamcast has finally gone from being a vague future promise to a serious reality. It started with the likes of Chu Chu Rocket! which, despite looking simpler than a Duplo Block set, finally pitted gamers against each other in a way that didn't involve swapping high scores. From that point on, things went straight to 3D with the stunning Quake III Arena, and we've seen the future rapidly approaching in the shape of Daytona USA 2001 and the almighty text-translating epic Phantasy Star Online. What we're trying to say is that, although online games are very, very welcome here at DREAMCAST MAGAZINE, it's not enough to be just online - the games have got to be good as well.

Down In The Dirt

Which brings us neatly to 4x4 Evolution, possibly one of the ropiest racers we've seen in a long while. The graphics are blocky, the levels are bland and the four wheelers float through the air like feathers. True, there are some neat

touches - there are a lot of trucks to choose from and you can buy a huge amount of parts, upgrades and spares. Truck fans may get engrossed in racing for cash and shopping for bits, but still... it's no Sega GT.

The levels are big and you can drive anywhere you want, as long as you pass through checkpoints along the way, which open up the races for you to find the fastest route. Sadly, this is let down by the incredible slowness with which the game plods around and it isn't helped by the tendency of the trucks to float through the air like Chitty Chitty Bang Bang every time they hit an anthill. This is all well and good when placed inside a fast-paced racer like 4Wheel Thunder, but when the trucks meander around like shopping trolleys and leap in the manner of Superman, it just looks plain weird.

Muddy Waters

Head away from the main game and back onto the online aspect, though, (which is the game's main selling point), and we are on safer ground. PC and Dreamcast owners can connect together, so there's plenty of other contenders in each race. You can download new tracks to the VM unit and there is a handy chat room to meet gamers and set up races.

That said, whilst chatting to other players may be possible, to be honest, there's not much you can say. Even 'Ha! I passed you!' is a bit irrelevant because most of the tracks are so freeform that everybody heads off in different directions.

The only real selling point for 4x4 Evolution is the online aspect, and only because it is still a bit of a rarity in Dreamcast gaming (although not for long). Daytona USA 2001 is on the way and that's really going to show everybody how online racing is done.

It may be a bit of an anxious wait for Daytona, but you'd be better off getting a fun offline racer, such as M-SR or 4Wheel Thunder. Save yourself the phone bill, because you're going to need the money for Daytona and Phantasy Star Online.

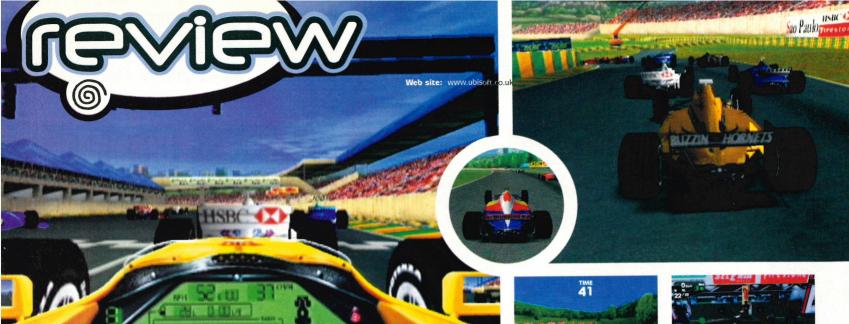

F1 Racing Championship

The crazy world of Formula 1 racing - fast, furious and frantic... but not if you're playing F1 Racing Championship.

With the first Formula 1 Grand Prix of 2001 already upon us the high-octane, adrenaline-fuelled, fortunefilled world of motor-racing seems to be thriving in the 21st Century like never before. Shame no one bothered to tell Ubi Soft then, because if F1 Racing Championship is anything to go by it's still stuck in the doldrums of the 20th Century. It's not just the fact that the game is based on the now-hazy memory of the 1999 season (okay, so it was meant to be released last year but that's not the point) but that it simply doesn't have the spark or pizzazz that should accompany an F1 game. So where a fanfare should be heralding this game in, all we get is a jaded one man band pulling off the same old tricks over and over again.

So FIA So Good

Sure, on the face of it the game has all you could ever want from an F1 title and is a vast improvement on Ubi Soft's previous F1 effort, the rather lacklustre

Monaco Grand Prix, but it still lacks a certain something which means that it stays stalled in the pits, unable to challenge for any serious honours. It has an official FIA licence courtesy of a publishing agreement with Video System, allowing access to all the official track designs, teams and drivers, which is always a bonus, but even this hardly helps to save it in the grand scale of things.

It's not even that the game has a lack of options and modes of play, as both the Arcade and Simulation modes are pretty exhaustive in their own ways. The Arcade mode does its job admirably, offering a quick hit of arcade action in much the same way that Pole Position did all those years ago, leaving you to race against the clock and choke everyone else on your exhaust fumes. It's fun for the most part, but sooner or later the call of the more demanding Simulation mode will lure you in. As with any F1 game, it's the simulation of driving around at break-neck speeds which is the real crux of the game, but for all its efforts there's no sense of actual simulation anywhere to be found here, which kind of defeats the object.

It's The Pits

The real problem with the game lies in the sensation of the game, or rather the lack of. For all the depth, it simply doesn't deliver the goods where it counts as without any real sensation of being at the helm of a multi-million pound car, speeding around at face-contorting speeds, everything else might as well count for nothing. Speed is of the essence, as they say, and without it you can wave goodbye to any serious challenge on the F1 market. Likewise, it never really feels as if you are in the heat of battle, losing all sense of atmosphere, which subsequently means that there's no adrenaline rush or excitement, so the whole experience is rather deflating. At the end of the day, as enjoyable as F1 Racing Championship might be for an arcade blast, the overall simulation lets the game down and it's certainly no match for the superlative F1 World Grand Prix 2.

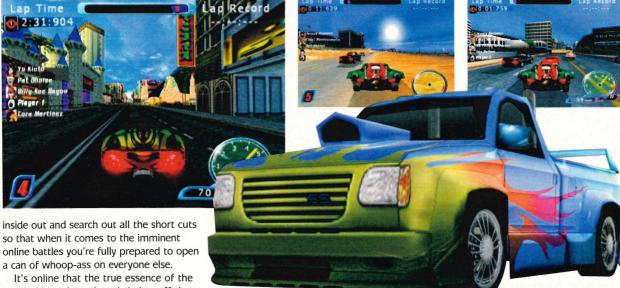

None of the surfers have any advantage over the others as far as we can tell (and we used them all in the process of this review) and as for the beaches... hmm, don't get us started. Yes, the waves go in one of two different directions. Apart from that though - and the slight variation in background detail - we'll be buggered if we can find any difference between them.

increase your abilities at all – if it will (especially with Frames and Barriers) switch it over immediately! You might not think it, but you'll need all the points you can get... especially in the latter stages of the game. What's more, any items that you collect that don't increase your stats can still be kept and then sold back to the shops on the Pioneer 2 – the extra Meseta comes in very handy, so try to collect everything you can!

Feeding Time

If you want your Mag to develop and evolve into a more powerful being you'll need to feed it quite regularly – the more you feed it, the higher it climbs through the

levels to make it stronger. At first, your Mag will eat pretty much any of the healing items that you choose to give it: after it evolves once though, you'll need to be more selective in your feeding. Some items will increase all of its stats, while others will increase some and decrease others - it's all about maintaining a healthy balance and building up each attribute in turn. For all the effort you put in, you'll earn new Photon Blast abilities; covering both attacks and healing powers, they'll be charged up by your Mag as you receive damage. Once it reaches 100% power, you can unleash it by holding down R and pressing the relevant button... excellent!

Run Away!

Don't be afraid to run away from your enemies if you need a breather – by leaving the room, the monsters inside will return to their original positions. This way, you'll know where they're coming from when you re-enter... very handy, especially later in the game. If you can though, try to kill everything; you'll earn those essential Exp. Points that build up your character's levels and make him even stronger!

Saving For A Rainy Day

You might think that dying in Phantasy Star Online isn't much of a problem - you simply return to the Pioneer 2 and get healed up, right? Wrong! It's true that you'll be able to head back to the start of the area where you died via the main teleporter outside the Hunter's Guild but if you look closely, you'll notice that you've lost your equipped weapon AND all the Meseta you've collected! Thankfully, you can reclaim your lost equipment by returning to the spot where you died and picking it up. However, to save you all the hassle it's far better to keep important items like Meseta and ace weapons that you're not quite powerful enough to use yet in storage – just visit the desk to the right of the shopping area and deposit any items you don't need at the moment (but don't want to sell) to clear space in your inventory. Now you can come back and claim them whenever you like!

The Easy Way Home

Although you probably won't need to use them in the earlier stages of the game, one of the most important items you can have is the Telepipe – creating an instant teleporter between your location and the Pioneer 2, you can use them anywhere (with the exception of the boss chambers). This can be vital when you're running low on health/Technique Points/items or when you've collected a lot of Meseta and don't want to risk losing it all by dying. Just use the Telepipe; return to the Pioneer 2 and restock/heal yourself/store your items before stepping back through the teleporter to reappear back where you were. It sounds like cheating, but it's not. Really.

Choose Your Character!

> The Humans in *Phantasy Star Online* are capable of learning a small number of Techniques and have a balanced growth system. This means that all of their statistics increase at roughly the same rate.

Newmans are similar to Humans – none of their attributes stand out, as they are pretty average in all departments. They tend to prefer close-range attacks, avoiding guns when they can.

Androids have the highest Hit Points and attack power, and can use any weapon available. The downside is that you will never be able to learn any techniques and will have to rely on your weapons to get you through the hard times.

As well as the races, there are three vocations to choose from. Hunters are highly adept at closerange attacks and are able to use weapons such as daggers and sabres. Rangers are proficient with guns – they're best suited to using long-range attacks. The last of the professions is the Force. These guys have honed their minds to the art of Techniques; they can learn many Attack and Defence Techniques and as such they have the highest TP (Technique Points).











About Character

This guide has been written with a specific character in mind. Here at DREAMCAST MAG, we've chosen to use the RAmar character as he's a good all-rounder. His preferred weapons are guns, although he can use Sabres as well and can also learn various techniques. This isn't to say that you have to choose as we did - it's really up to you!

Aboard The Pioneer 2

Speak to Principal Tyrell, and then to the other people in this room. The secretary will tell you that the Principal's daughter, one Red Ring Rico who was on the surface when the explosion occurred. Although you will have many other missions, this is your main concern for the time being. Jump onto the transporter and head straight to the Hunter's Guild. Talk to the woman at the counter about a job.



Accept the mission and talk to Garon before exiting the Hunter's Guild. Turn right and head for the doors, which are being guarded by two soldiers. Take the transporter down to the Forest 1 section.

You'll have to quickly learn how to use your Handgun. There are two main modes of fire. The A button will fire off a shot that is quite accurate and has a low chance of missing. The X button will fire off a more powerful shot, but this has a small chance of missing, especially if the enemy is far away. It is possible to fire off multiple shots as part of a combo. Press the A button, then press



it again half a second later, then again half a second after that. You can use the X button for this, or even the X and A buttons in different orders.

Shoot the crates then shut down the force field to get to the large crate. Open the main gate by pressing the switch. There are three Boomas in here. Once you have dealt with them, go to the Options screen and click on 'Items.' Go to 'Mag' and then to 'Give Items'. You should feed your Mag whenever possible. Give it three items of your choice.

It's in your interests to do this, as your Mag will learn special abilities as it grows. Head into Area 3. There is a Savage Wolf in the far corner. Once you have killed it two Boomas will rise up from the ground. Another two will arise afterwards. The gate to Area 8 is locked, so you'll have to go to Area 4. There are three Rappies and four Boomas in here. Once they have disappeared, the barrier to Area 5 will open. Go through and collect the items.

You'll find a RAcaseal in Area 6. Her name is Elenor



and she is the android who has lost the Mags. Talk to her and tell her that you are looking for them - she will join you on your mission. On your way to Area 7 you will come across a force field. Shut it down and shoot the crates. Area 7 has five Boomas and a Rappy in it.





Make your way back to Area 1 via Area 8. The missing Mag can be found in the corner. It will appear as a glowing ball of light. Transport back to Pioneer 2 and go to the Hunter's Guild. Talk to Garon and collect your reward from the counter.

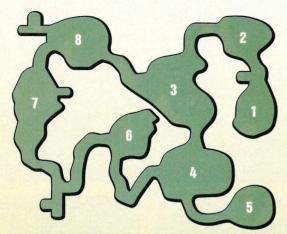














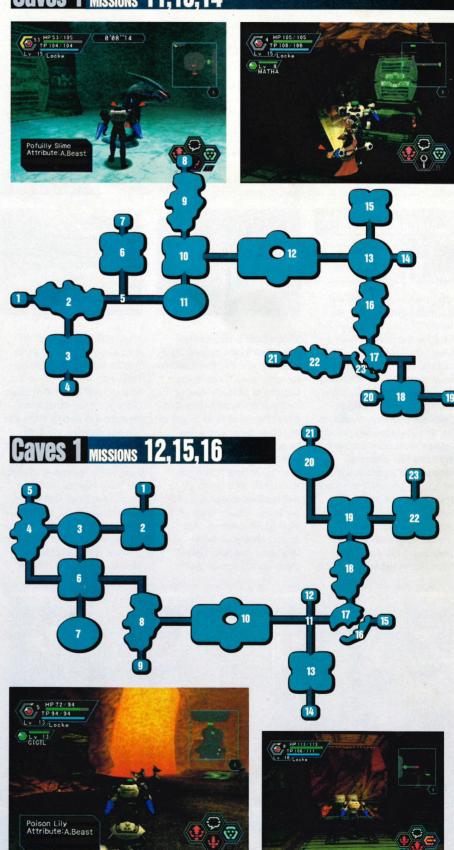

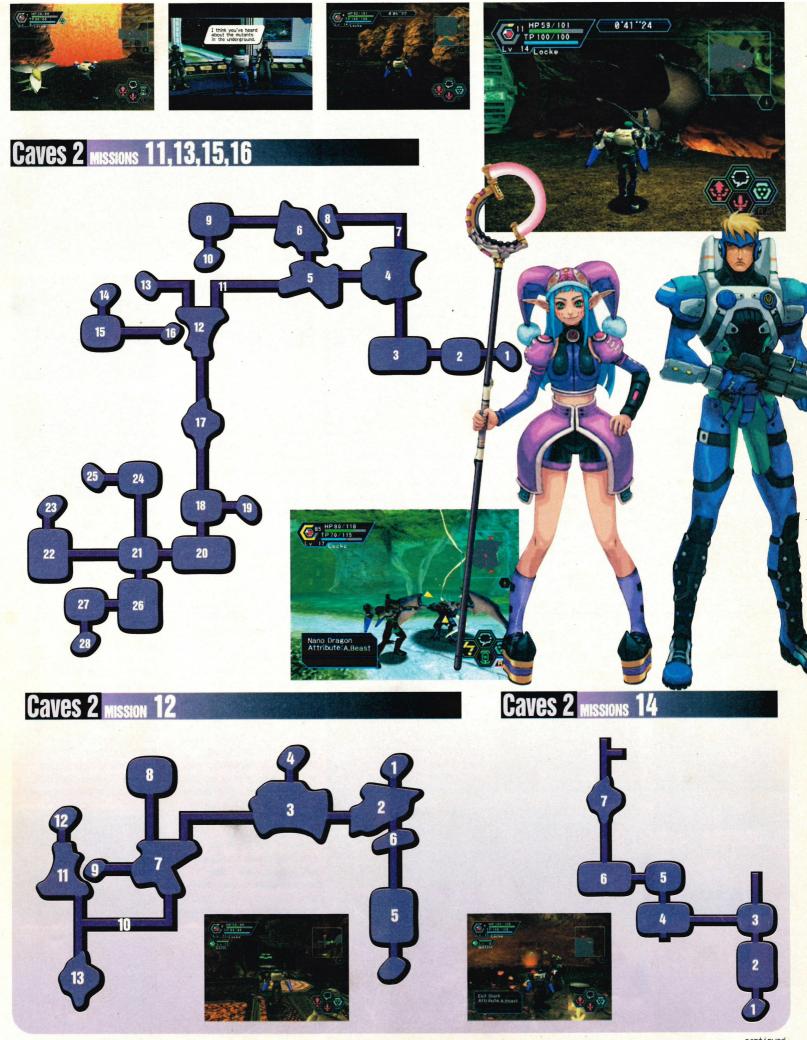

Speak to Racton's son, then visit the shops. Sell any Sabres, Canes or extra Handguns that you may have picked up. You will be able to buy a new gun the Handgun +1. Equip it and go to the Guards Shop. Sell any extra Frames that you have. Check the statistics on them before you sell them, as you may have picked up one that is more effective than your current Frame. Buy the Barrier and equip it. Go to the Tools Shop and buy some Monomates and Monofluids. If anything, they're good for your Mag.







Go down to the surface. Your Mag should be approaching Level 10 very soon. When it reaches this point in its growth, it will clone itself. The twin Mags will learn a new ability - a Proton Blast! The move is called 'Estlla'. When the bar in the top-left corner fills up, you will be able to use this move. It is assigned to the secondary A button (accessible by holding down R and pressing A). When it appears, it will over-ride anything, which you may have assigned to that button.

You will start out in Area 5. Area 6 holds three Rappies and four Boomas. Go into Area 3 and talk to Racton. He is one strange little man! In order to achieve your mission, you'll have to find all three of









the Capsules that he has left lying around. Capsule 3 can be found by backtracking to Area 5. It will be represented by a glowing ball on the ground. Go through to Area 6. There is a Gobooma and four Boomas in here. Shut down the force field, and then go through to the Area 7 approach. One of the force fields will be down. The switch for the other one is in Area 7. Area 7 holds five Boomas and a Rappy

Once all the enemies have been defeated, the door to Area 8 will open. At the moment, there is only a Rappy in here. As soon as you pick up Capsule 2, a Savage Wolf will attack. After this, a Mothmant will drop out of the sky, followed by two Boomas. Go through to Area 1. The final Capsule is in here, as well as two Boomas and a Gobooma. Grab the Capsule and make your way back to Racton. He'll use a Telepipe, which you can use to get back to Pioneer 2. Go and talk to Racton's son, then get your reward.

Talk to Zidd. He'll ask you to work with the Hucast, Kireek, who is in the corner of the room. This guy will teach you about various aspects of battle. like the combos and what the cursors mean. Go and talk to him, then go back and have a chat with Zidd. Before you go down to the surface, make your way to the shopping mall. Sell any unwanted items that you have and buy the Draw Rifle +2. You'll probably have to use all of your money to get it, but it's well worth it. This rifle draws HP from any opponent that you shoot at! This ability only works with the Special Attack command. You will need to assign it to a button. We recommend that you move the Monomate to the secondary B button, and put the Special Attack on the primary B button.

The transporter will take you to Area 5. Area 4 has six Boomas and two Savage Wolves in it. Remember that you will only gain experience if you get a hit on an enemy. If Kireek kills them without you having touched them, you won't get anything.

Area 6 has a Monest in it. Once defeated, two Boomas will appear. Area 7 has another Monest, two Boomas and a Gobooma in it. Area 8 starts off by having a Savage







Wolf in it. Then, two more will jump in, followed by three more after that. Area 3 has two Rappies and four Boomas. Go through to Area 2. There is a Booma, a Gobooma and a Savage Wolf in here

Area 1 is where you will find the missing hunter, Ash. He is lying on the floor and warns you that there are still some monsters hiding in the undergrowth. As you approach the glowing ball, two Savage Wolves will attack. Take them out and pick up the Disk. Talk to Kireek and Ash, and then use the portal to get back to Pioneer 2. Go to the Hunter's Guild and collect your reward.











Sell any items that you don't need, then go down to the surface. Don't worry about Nol - she has got a Handgun and can look after herself. Area 4 has four Boomas and two Savage Wolves in it. Area 6 has a Monest and two Boomas in it. Area 7 has two Gigoboomas and two Savage Wolves in it. By now, you should have reached Level 4 on your Stats screen. If you haven't, you will very soon. On the Items screen, the Disk: Barta Level 1 icon will be lit up. You can now learn this Ice attack and assign it to a button.

Area 8 is void of enemies at the moment. Area 3 has two Rappies, three Boomas and a Gobooma in it. There is a Transport device in Area 2. This will take you to the Forest 2 area, but you may as well clear out are 1 first. Area



2 has a Booma, a Gobooma and a Savage Wolf in it. Area 1 has a Rappy, a Booma and a Gobooma. Grab the items and use the transporter.

There is a Mono-ring in this first area. Stand inside it to heal yourself. Area 2 has two of each type of Booma in it. As you head towards Area 3, two Goboomas and a



Gigobooma will attack. Grab the items from Area 3 and go into Area 4. There is a Monest in here. Area 5 is empty at the moment. There is a control panel in one corner, but it is inaccessible at the moment. Grab the items, and go to Area 6. There are four Rappies below you. Stay on the raised section and shoot at them.

Go to the Weapon Shop. There are two Rifle +3 guns available, but they are being sold at different prices. If you check the stats, you will notice that the more expensive is the one to go for. There is also some Armour available at the Guard Shop.

Go down to the surface. There is a Rappy in this first area. You can't shoot at it, and it won't attack you. You can, however, talk to it. After you have talked to it, it will disappear. Area 2 has seven normal Rappies in it. Area 3 has four Rappies, and Area 4 has ten. Area 6 has another ten normal Rappies. When you have killed them all, there will be one Talking Rappy in the corner. Talk to it and it will disappear. Area

7 has 16 Rappies in it. The best way to deal with all of them is to line them up and use you Barta technique. Do this three times to take them all out at once. There is another Talking Rappy in Area 8. Talk to it three times, at which point it will reveal itself as Dr Gul. Go back to Pioneer 2 and collect your reward.

Before you sell your unwanted items. Take a look and see whether you have picked up a Frame that has two slots on it. If you equip it you will notice that you don't have any suitable items to attach to it. Keep this in mind for later.

Alicia doesn't believe the data that you gave her, so she wants to see the monsters for herself. Go to the Weapons Shop and buy the Heart Rifle +2. Don't equip it, but keep it for later.

Go down to the surface. Use one of the previous Forest 1 maps to get through this first bit. Go to Area 4. There are nine Boomas in here. Be aware of Alicia's condition at all times. If she gets hurt, she will heal herself, but she needs the chance to do so. If you let more than two enemies attack her at once, she won't get the chance to heal herself. Sometimes she will get stuck in an enemy ring - the solution is to keep moving when in dangerous areas.

The transporter for Forest 2 can be found in Area 3; however, it's worth killing the Monest in Area 5, just for the experience points. Once you're in Forest 2, heal yourself using the Mono-ring, and then go into Area 7. There is a Monest, three Savage Wolves and a Hildebear in here. Go into the area opposite the control panel and talk to the baby Hildebear. Hit the switch on the control panel and make your way to Area 5, via 6. Cross the bridge, and get the data on the local area. Now open the gate to Area 7 and go through to 8. There are five Gigoboomas, three Goboomas, three Barbarous Wolves, three Rappies and a Hildebear in here. Alicia's Ice Technique will prove very useful.



There are an enormous amount of enemies in the next area. At first there will be a Hildebear. Then, a Monest and another Hildebear will appear. They will be followed by six Goboomas, two Barbarous Wolves and two Hildebears! Now that you are here, you may as well clear out 1, 3 and 4 before you move on. Area 1 has two Hildebears, Area 3 has some crates, and Area 4 has three Rappies and a Hildebear. Now make your way to the final area of the Forest 2 section:

Area 9. This is almost like a boss area. There will be eight Hildebears that come in a pack of three, a pack of two and lastly, another pack of three. Stay by the entrance. If it gets too much, retreat out of the gate and go back in again. Look after Alicia. Her healing powers may run out, so you'll have to be very careful. With all of them defeated, find the baby Hildebear in the corner. Tell Alicia that she should leave the baby behind and return back to Pioneer 2.







Go down to the surface. There are three Boomas in Area 1, and four Boomas and a Savage Wolf in Area 3. Take out the group of Rappies and Boomas in 4. There is a RAmar by the name of Bernie in Area 5. Answer 'Yes' to his question, and he will join you. His huge gun (erm...) will be very useful. Areas 6, and the run-up to 7, will have hunters in them. Talk to them, but don't give them any information.

Area 7 has five Boomas and a Rappy in it. Area 8 has a Rappy, a Savage Wolf, a Monest and two Boomas.

Use the transporter to get to the Forest 2 area.

There is a Monest and three Goboomas in Area 7. Hit the switch to open up the path to the Mono-ring. Go through to Area 6. Take out the two Goboomas and the two Gigoboomas, and go through to Area 5. There are three Savage Wolves, three Barbarous Wolves, two Gigoboomas and two Boomas. Area 4 has six Rappies. Area 2 has two Monests, four Savage Wolves and a Hildebear in it. Area 1 has four Rappies and Area 8 has four Goboomas and four Barbarous Wolves.

Area 9 is empty apart from a Warp device. Use is to get to the Dome approach. This area has tons of enemies in it – there will be six waves in total. There

will be a mixture of Monests, Gigoboomas, Goboomas, Savage Wolves and Hildebears. Use the second Warp to get to the forcefield switch. This will allow you to get to the crates. Go through the gate and kill the enemies. Save the survivor, who is lying on the floor, and head back to Pioneer 2.





TO THE DOME FOREST CONTINUE YOUR INVESTIGATION

This is not an official mission. Unfortunately, at the end of Mission 8 you had to return to Pioneer 2 in order to report your findings. Now it's time to see what lies beyond this area. Make your way back to the entrance to the dome, where you found the survivor. The transporter for the Forest 2 area can be found in Area 8. You will find several beacons along the way. They have been left by Red Ring Rico, and some of them hint at what may be going on.

There is a large transport device next to the doorway. Use it to get to the large underground cave.









BOSS 1 DRAGON

This boss has five attacks. The first is a stomp. If you stand in front of it, you will get trodden on! Start off by standing beside it. Keep moving to avoid being crushed. Keep shooting at it with the strong attack. Make sure that you stay at its side. This way, you'll avoid its flame attack. If you do enough damage, it will get tired and sit down for a while. At this point you should shoot at its head until it gets up. If you're very quick, you'll be able to get the Dragon to sit down again. Otherwise it will fly up to the roof of the cave. Stay underneath it to avoid the airto-ground flame-thrower. Once it has done this move twice it will drop to the ground. You don't really want to be underneath it when this happens, believe us!

After a while, the dragon will fly into the air and spiral down into the ground, creating a pool of larva. It will now tunnel through the ground - use the map to see which direction it is coming from and run like mad in the opposite direction, sticking to the outside of the chamber to reduce the chance of being hit. After three or four of these attacks, it will burst out of the ground like a rocket. Keep moving to avoid it. When it lands, pummel it with more

shots from your rifle. Use your Proton Blast as soon as you get it, as this will hurt it a lot.

When the Dragon finally dies, collect the items from the perimeter of the cave. before going back to the Pioneer 2 and telling the Principle what happened.

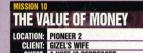












You should be either on, or fast approaching Level 10. At this point, you should buy the Psy Armour, the Giga Shield, the new Heart Rifle +2 (it damages Machines more than the old one) and equip Barta

On returning to the Hunter's Guild, you will notice that there is a new set of missions available. Do the easy one first, although you can hardly call it a mission. Surely it's not your job to settle domestic disputes?

You're going to have to be harsh with this woman's husband - show him who's the boss. You can find him wandering around in the shopping arcade. At his first

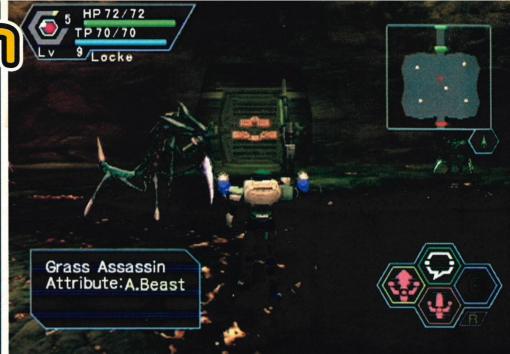


question, tell him that you don't understand. Then tell him that he is a fool. Have a chat with his wife and relay the message to him. Now go and collect your reward

It seems ridiculous that you should risk your life to get someone some sweets! Go to the Weapons Shop. If he has the new Rifle +2 (the one that has the 25% attribute for A. Beasts) then buy it and equip it. You'll also need to buy some Antidotes and Antiparalysis at this point.

Use the transporter to go down to the caves. This area is extremely hard compared to the Forest areas, so prepare yourself for a tough mission. Area 1 has four new enemies in it - Evil Sharks, Pal Sharks, Poison Lillies and Nano Dragons. Be sure to check out the enemy boxout before you start. You'll only get through this by using our techniques.

Area 2 has three waves of enemies. The first wave consists of four Evil Sharks



and two Poison Lillies. Retreat back into Area 1 if the enemies get too close for comfort. Stay on the plateau and take out the Poison Lillies. Retreat back into Area 1 for the second wave of four Evil Sharks and two Pal Sharks. The third wave is two Evil Sharks and two Nano Dragons. Trash the crates and go through to Area 3. There are four Poison Lillies, seven Evil Sharks, two Pal Sharks and one Grass Assassin in here. Carefully clear them out and hit the switch in Area 5.

On your travels in the cave, you may find items such as the Priest/Mind. These items can be attached to your armour. Not all armour will have a slot to attach it to.



Use the L and R buttons to check how many slots your armour has.

Head back to Area 2 and take out the Sharks. The door to Area 5 is now open. Dodge the piston, and go into Area 6. The lights will go out as soon as you enter. Run straight over to the glowing switch and turn the lights back on. Then slowly but surely kill the 18 Evil Sharks and two Pal Sharks. Use the Warp in Area 7 to get to Area 9. Area 10 holds an enormous amount of enemies - Evil Sharks, Pal Sharks, Poison Lillies, Grass Assassins and Nano Dragons will be on full alert! Slaughter them all, then go through to Area 10. Each set of crates is guarded by a





Floating Mine. As they jump into the air, run away, and wait until they have detonated. Shut down the force field and go towards Area 11. As you approach the door, three Floating Mines will appear. Back off and let them detonate. You don't need to go into Area 11 but it's worth it for the Exp. Points. Stand by the crates, and take out the seven Poison Lillies.

Area 12 has three waves of enemies in it. The usual suspects will make their appearance. Retreat to the doorway if things get too hot, then shoot them in the back as they walk away. Hit the switch and go through to Area 13. Things are pretty calm in here - there are only four Evil Sharks and one Grass Assassin. You may find a Knight/Power item in here. Equip it as soon as you get it. Hit both the switches in Area 14, then head for Area 15. Clear it out and collect the items. Take out all of the enemies in 16 and the two Poison Lillies in 17.

At this stage, you should be nearing Level 35 with your Mag. When you do, you will acquire a status-restoring Photon Blast and your Mag will change shape. It's probably a good idea to use a Telepipe and go back to Pioneer 2. The shops will have tons of goodies, including an Autogun and some impressive attachments for you.

Go back to the caves and into Area 18. The crates are being guarded by Floating



Mines, so back off until they detonate. Hit the switch in Area 19, then go back and use the Monoring. The Warp in Area 20 will take you to Area 21. Go through Area 22, taking out the resistance as you go. There is a Grass Assassin in 23 – there isn't much room in here, so get behind it and shoot it in the back. Use the transporter to get to the Caves 2 section.

Area 2 has a new enemy in it. The Guil Sharks are slightly stronger than their cousins, although the Autogun will make short work of them. Area 3 has another new enemy - the Pofuilly Slime! Wait for it to take shape, then shoot it. There are four of them in here, along with several Poison Lillies and a group of Guil Sharks. Area 4 is a lush, green opening. There are two Poison Lillies, as well as a Grass Assassin and a Nano Dragon.

Area 5 is void of enemies at the moment. Go into Area 6 and take out the Poison Lilly. Shoot across the water at the Sharks. Hit the switch to shut down the force field. Now go back to Area 7. There are a group of advanced Floating Mines in here. As soon as they jump up, run away. Collect the items from Area 8, then go to Area 9. Take out the Slime and the Poison Lillies. Area 10 is a cave fully of goodies - there is a mine protecting them, so mind your step! When you turn around, a group of Sharks



will have gathered at the entrance. Blow them away, and head all the way back to Area 11. There are three Floating Mines in here. Area 12 also has a large group of Floating Mines. Use the Warp in Area 13 to get to 14. Make your way to Area 16 and hit the switch. This will open the door in Area 12. Go through the door to Area 17. There are Poison Lillies, Nano Dragons and Sharks in this area.

By now, you will know how to take out all of the enemies, so we won't tell you about them in so much detail. Get to 19 via 18. There is a switch and a Monoring in here. The alternative door in Area 18 will now be open. Go through to 20 and kill the Slimes. Make your way through to 23. Avoid the Floating Mine and collect the items. Visit 24 and 25 in the same fashion.

Make your way to Area 28 in order to transport yourself to the Caves 3 area. This is starting to get really tedious, right? Don't worry, you're nearing the end of the mission. Go through to Area 4 and hit the switch. This will open the doorway in Area 3, and allow you to use the Warp in Area 5. Take out the Poison Lilly and the Slime in Area 7. Hit the switch in Area 9, then get the cake from the sisters in Area 10. Use a Telepipe to get back to Pioneer 2 and give Trekker the cake.

The most important part of this mission is to keep Cecil from getting hurt. If she gets hurt, she'll heal herself and get fat. The best tactic is to weaken an enemy with your Autogun, then take her close to the enemy so that she can finish it off.

Go down into the Caves. Area 20 has a couple of Sharks in it. Avoid the pistons in the passage and take out the enemies in Area 19. Collect the items from Area 23, then head back to Area 18. Clear the area, then go through to 17. There are three Floating Mines in here, so run away as soon as they appear.

Avoid the two pistons in Corridor 11. Use the Warp in Area 14 to get to Area 15. Area 10 is pretty much empty apart from a few Sharks and Lillies. Area 8 has a Nano Dragon in it. As long as you stay close enough to make it fly, you'll



be fine. Clear out 6 and 7 – there's nothing much here really, but it's worth it for the Exp. Points.

Use Trap Vision in Area 3 – there are Floating Mines lurking in the doorways. Run to the switch on the right-hand side of 2 in order to get the lights back on. Collect the items from Area 1, then head back to Area 3. The transporter in Area 5 will take you to the Caves 2 section.

Search the rooms in numerical order, as shown on the map. When you come across switches on the floor, use Trap Vision to locate the safe ones. Be wary of the Floating Mines in the corridors. Make your way to Area 13 where Cecil will decide to go and weigh herself, bringing the mission to an end.

You should know your way around the caves by now none of them have many enemies in, so you won't have a problem. The switch for the Area 13 force field can be found in Area 12. Use the Warp in Area 8 to get to

Area 5. There is an android in Area 3. If you try to put in the command there will be no response but if you try to put in the wrong command, the android will attack you. You're better off just leaving it well alone. Hit the switch in Area 4, then use the transporter in Area 1.

Once again, use the map to find your way around. You can leave out Areas 7 and 8 as they have no purpose.

When you get to Area 12, go straight to 17. Clear out this entire section, from 17 to 28. You will find androids in Areas 22 and 24. Ignore them, but make sure that you hit the switches in the adjoining rooms. The entrance to Area 13 will now be open. Use the warp to get to 14, than find Elenor in Area 16. Input the code, and she will get up. Once she has gone, use a Telepipe to get back to Pioneer 2







Be sure to look after little Matha - she uses fire spells and can look after herself, but watch her to make sure that she doesn't get surrounded.

Head for Area 4 and hit the switch. This will open Area 5. Avoid the piston

and read the first message from the butler. Go through to Area 7 where you will find a warp pad. Make your way through to Area 10. Shut down the force field. Be very wary of the numerous Floating Mines, which will pop up all over the place. Clear our Area 12 - there is another message to read in the next corridor. Hit the switches in 14. Now you will be able to get into Areas 15 and 16. Speak to the two hunters in Area 17, then read the third message, which can be found at the end of the next corridor. Use the warp in Area 20 to get to the transporter in Area 23.

Caves 2 is really simple. Read the messages in Areas 4 and 7. When you walk into the next corridor, Matha will ask you to take her home. Return to Pioneer 2 and collect your reward.











Make sure that you have Level 3 Barta and Monomate/ Dimate assigned to the pad. As soon as you walk into Area 2, two hunters will attack you. One has a Flame Gun, and one has a pair of blades; thankfully, you only have to beat one to get rid of them both. Keep running around the room - every now and then, turn around and use Foie. Heal yourself whenever you get below 60 HP and after several blasts, they'll run away. Clear out the next couple of areas - take it easy as there are Floating Mines everywhere! When you get to Area 6, open the doorway back to Area 3 and shut down the force field. Watch the Floating Mines and hit the switches to open Area 7 for some items.

Head on into Area 8. The switch for Area 10 can be found in Area 9. There are a



few waves of enemies in here. Clear them out, then hit the switch in Area 12. The lights will go out as soon as you enter Area 13. Run over to the switch and hit it to bring the lights back on. Kill off the enemies and use the warp in the next room. There are some items boxes in Area 16 - they are guarded by Floating Mines, so watch your step. Use the warp to get back to the mainland, then go into Area 17. Clear out the next couple of Areas and use the Monoring in Area 21. Area 22 has got five Nano Dragons and hordes of Floating Mines in it. The room will also go dark as soon as you enter it. The first thing to do is to get over to the switch, whilst dodging the mines and the dragons. Hit the switch to bring the lights back on. You





can pit the dragons against each other. Make them fly around until two of them get close together. Leave them to fight it out amongst themselves. Go through to 23 and use the transporter

Once you arrive in Caves 2, you'll have a pretty straightforward path through to your destination - it's a simple case of wiping out the groups of Evil Sharks that attack (although you'll have a Nano Dragon to contend with as well... watch out!) and following the doors through each chamber. When you reach Area 21, press the switch and then head through the right-hand door out of the room; the others only lead to dead ends with monsters in. Be wary of the cluster of Poison Lillies waiting for you in Area 18, as you'll have to take care of five at once. The switch to open Area 17 is in Area 19 -



when you find it though, more Poison Lillies will appear behind you so watch out. Head for Area 17 to meet Anna (Kroe's sister... the one you're looking for!). Unfortunately, she seems to want everything you're carrying so you'll have to fight her off. She's quite good at blocking regular attacks, so try to get some distance between yourself and her before using Foie or Barta to make her go down. Keep some Monomate handy for when she hurts you you'll need it. Eventually, she'll yield and the mission will be over.













This isn't going to be easy - taking on a few rebellious hunters is one thing, but going up against a shadowy character like Black Paper? Well, don't say we didn't warn you... once you've read the mail from Kroe on the Quest Board, check the shop first for any weapons or armour that you might need (always keep your stats up, remember?) and stock up on Monomate/Dimate and Monofluid before heading for the teleporter down into the Caves again.

Once you arrive, head for Area 2 and take out the four Evil Sharks to open the door into Area 3 - when you beat the enemies here, you'll have access to Area 4. Watch out for the Grass Assassin that appears after you clear out all the other enemies, then go down the path to Area 6; open the door back to Area 3, hitting the switch to shut off the force-field. Grab the goodies from Area 7, then go back and head for Area 8.

Deal with the Nano Dragon and throw the switch in Area 9 before coming back and getting more Exp. Points - now enter Area 10 and clear out all the enemies to reach the crossroads at 11. Unless you want the items in Area 16, run straight through to Area 17 and dodge the mines to reach 18. Watch out for the Nano Dragon that appears behind you as you enter; there are three in total to take care of, as well as Evil Sharks and Poison Lillies so be careful. From Area 19 you can either go left and take on a ton of enemies to reach the Monoring in 21, or just go right to find the teleporter to Caves 2 in Area 23.

The network of caves here is similar to that from the last mission, so just follow the same path through them until you reach Area 17 where you fought against Anna. When you get there, you'll interrupt Black Paper's secret meeting - it's time for trouble! A brainwashed hunter will try to stop you going any further, so give him a good kicking with your Foie and Zonde techniques as well as blasting him with your

Autogun. When he dies, use the teleporter in Area 13 to reach the switch in Area 16, unlocking the door to 5. Once there, run straight through into 4, turn right and follow the path through Areas 3 and 2 to reach the teleporter to Caves 3 in Area 1.

You might want to use a Telepipe to clear out your inventory and restock on Monomate/Dimate before carrying on - it's gets tougher from here. Enter Area 2 and wipe out anything that moves, then head through the corridor at 3 into Area 4. You'll meet Black Paper again but he'll just run away; ignore the switches and instead run through the right-hand door into Area 5. Destroy the enemies (there are a couple of Nano Dragons, so watch out!) and head south into Area 6. You'll meet a Pan Arms here - make sure you've got some techniques handy because it'll be unharmed by gunfire until it splits up. Go through into Area 7 to find Black Paper once more. This'll be the last time he lets you interfere so really let him have it. When the hunter attacks, try to stay back - he's got a mean swipe with his Sabre, but only uses easily avoided Barta techniques when you're far away. Try to hit him with repeated blasts from your Autogun and the occasional Foie technique; if he tries to heal himself, just keep blasting away. When he falls, run through into Area 8 to meet Kroe. She's already taken care of Black Paper, leaving you free to return to the Pioneer 2 when the teleporter appears behind you.











SEARCH FOR THE BEAST

CAVES CONTINUE YOUR INVESTIGATION

As before, you'll have to report your findings to the Principal once you reach the end of Mission 16 - he'll tell you to head back into the Caves and find out what it is that's mutating every living thing in sight. You won't have too much trouble finding your way through the Caves; seeing as how you've been here several times before and there's a conveniently-placed



path of information pods left for you to follow (good old Red Ring Rico) you'll quickly find your way down from Caves 1 to Caves 3. This is the only place where you'll need to be careful - you won't have had much of a chance to explore this area and some of the enemies can be a bit nasty. Navigate the lower regions as quickly as you can to reach the large teleporter at the end of the Caves... remember to use a Telepipe and return to the Pioneer 2 to restock on supplies before heading down into the underground!





Although we're not 100% clear on what a De Rol Le is, you can be sure that it's not going to be nice! Once you enter the Underground Passage, you'll find that you're trapped on a raft moving swiftly downstream – the De Rol Le swims around the raft and attacks from all sides, so you'll have to keep your eyes on where he is at all times. Characters with the Rafoie technique will have a field day here; the De Rol Le hates fire and this technique can target all nine of the worm's segments at once, causing massive damage!

To begin with, avoid the pods that land on the raft and concentrate on hitting the De Rol Le as he swims by – watch out for the plasma bursts as these can catch you unawares and kill you pretty quickly. After he's passed you a couple of times, he'll fly out of the water and latch himself onto the side of your raft - this is your best chance to give him a good smacking. Keep pummelling the De Rol Le with shots and Techniques but be ready to run out of the way of his impaling tentacles that head your way every so often; repeat this process until he falls back into the water.

When the lights go out, watch for the De Rol Le flying overhead and dropping rocks onto the raft; as soon as he lands back in the water, look out for him rising up at one end of the raft. He'll fire several hard-hitting plasma beams towards you, so keep out of the way until the lights come back on and the whole process starts again. The De Rol Le can take a lot of punishment, but if you keep plugging away and healing yourself when you need to, he'll eventually snuff it. It's not easy though...
