

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San Remo & MIDEM

The international music market enters its most eventful 10-day period in history this week. Two major events, getting underway, one an industry tradition, the other with hopes of becoming an annual affair, are the San Remo Festival (Jan. 26-28) and MIDEM (Jan. 30-Feb. 4). San Remo, of course, brings into prominence a number of top Italian songs, being at the same time a showcase for a strong roster of international stars. Also, it is not unlike the purposes of MIDEM, described as an international record & music market, in that it is a meeting-ground for conducting business, and, from the American point-of-view, contacting foreign licensees for person-to-person reviews of the past and prospects for the future.

While MIDEM will assume several functions of a festival, the Cannes gathering has been organized with the idea of being a "music market" for the entire world of music and recordings. This means that MIDEM is far from merely a chance to obtain sub-publishing rights on tunes, but an opportunity to touch on every creative aspect involved in putting a disk on release, from master & artist deals to far-reaching distribution arrangements, whether they involve labels or entire song catalogs.

Within this remarkable span of less than two weeks is the unparalleled opportunity not only to meet-and-greet and perhaps sign on the dotted line, but to get an unhurried picture of what is making the European market tick in terms of music and records. The discerning tradester will undoubtedly return from San Remo and MIDEM with a number of after thoughts that will prove extremely helpful in the foreign coverage of what his firm has to offer. It should be added, of course, that the European music man will receive the same perspective of the American musical scene that his American counterpart will glean of the Continent.

As reported in last week's Cash Box. MIDEM is also scheduled to bring on its scene members of the Red Bloc nations, an area that may soon blossom into one of the great music markets for American and European product.

Both events, in short, will travel a two-way-street of business dealings and information that are certain to affect the trades of both markets for years to come. In the light of what San Remo and MIDEM are going to accomplish, the music man who sees himself as a part of the wide, wide world of music & recordings must regard his attendance at these affairs as vital as the sale of his product to the ultimate consumer.

Capitol Enters Film Production With 'Space Vision' Dimensions

NEW YORK—Capitol Records' long-awaited entry into film production involves a striking new process, "Space Vision" While Capitol and Arch Oboler entered into an agreement last year which provided for the label to supply the financial backing necessary for the development of the process, announcement was withheld until the system could be demonstrated via a feature-length film, "The Bubble." This was done last week (17) at the CBS Studio Center in Studio City, with Alan Livingston, president of Capitol, and Oboler making the presentation.

Oboler, a writer/director, was responsible for the first 3D film in the early 50's, "Bwana Devil."

The venture will give Capitol a percentage of the profits derived from "The Bubble," which cost about \$1 million, and, in addition, the label will also share in the proceeds derived from the leasing of the newly-developed "Space-Vision" process to other motion-picture production compped "Space-Vision" process to motion-picture production com-

other motion-picture production companies.

Invented by Col. (Ret.) Robert V. Bernier, the new "4-D Space-Vision" adds, with a special eye-piece, the dimension of space to height, width and depth. The process also "frees" the motion picture from the screen and allows scenes to "float" over the heads of the audience.

Two additional films are in the planning stage, with the first to be shot in the spring.

"Bubble" will open in Detroit on Feb. 1, New York on Feb. 8 No date

Written, directed and produced by Oboler, and featuring Michael Cole, Deborah Walley and Johnny Desmond, "The Bubble" had its world premiere at the Woods Theatre in Chicago, where it has grossed more than \$100,000 since its Dec. 18 opening. News of the film's success has thus far brought more than 100 requests for major bookings throughout the country, according to George J. Schaefer, sales representative for the firm.

Various London executives presented the London line-up of LP's celebrating the diskery's 20th year in business, at the Decca studios. Herb Goldfarb, sales manager, offered Mantovani's 45th album for the label, "Mantovani's Golden Hits." He pointed out that Mantovani has sold more than \$75 million worth of LP product over the past two decades, six of the albums receiving RIAA-certified gold records for sales of at least \$1 million. In addition, it was noted that the maestro has been seen by 2½ million people "live" during his annual concert visits in the U.S. Goldfarb also presented the new Tom Jones album, "Green Green Grass of Home," the single cut of the same name that has reached the million sales figure in England, a remarkable showing for this market, and British Decca's first million-seller. The Rolling Stones, consistent winners on London, also have a new LP, "Between the Buttons," This set follows five other albums, all of which are gold record winners.

Tony D'Amato, A&R head of London's Phase 4 "sound" line presented seven new sets, "Bullfight" with Roger Laredo, "Two Pianos in Hollywood" with Ronnie Aldrich, "Heath Vs. Ros, Round 2" and "France," with Stanley Black & the London Festival Orchestra and Chorus with the Mormon Choir of England. D'Amato said that the Phase 4 line, now a catalog of 98 albums, was being designed with more commercial releases to reach a broad market "Stokowski/Wagner," Leopold Stokowski conducting the London Symphony Orchestra, "Strauss Waltzes" with Antal Dorati conducting the London Philharmonic (Continued on page 50)

Sheppard To Direct King's A&R, Promotion

King's A&R, Promotion

MIAMI BEACH, FLA.—Syd Nathan, president of King Records, announced last week at his winter offices in Miami, the exclusive signing of William "Bunky" Sheppard to a longterm contract as A&R director and promotion chief for King and its subsidiary labels. Nathan also announced the subsequent release of the first two records produced by Sheppard under the new arrangement, "Why, Why, Why" b/w "Right Now" by Mill Evans and "Why Am I Crying" b/w "That's How Long I'm Gonna Love You" by Shirley Wahls.

A veteran of more than ten years in the record business, Sheppard owned and operated his own company Apex Records during the late 1950's and produced the label's only hit, "Island of Love" by the Sheppards.

In 1961, Sheppard produced a session by a then unknown artist, Gene Chandler, and leased the sides to Ewart Abner at Vee-Jay. From that session came the smash, "Duke of Earl," which earned for Sheppard akey position on the Vee-Jay R&B staff. Abner also utilized Sheppard's strong established relationships with the country's leading R&B diskjockeys by appointing him national director of R&B promotion.

Sheppard left Vee-Jay in 1963, along with Abner, to form Constellation Records. At the new label, he was much the same as at Vee-Jay. During the years at Constellation, he produced the following hits with Gene Chandler: "Just Be True"; "Nothing Can Stop Me"; "Rainbow '65" and the album "Gene Chandler — Live On Stage."

Theater Review:

By Jupiter,' R & H Jewels Among Reverse Gags

NEW YORK—There were days in musical comedy when an entire show was built around a single gimmick, much like today's TV situation comedies. Such a show was Rodgers & Hart's 1942 hit, "By Jupiter," which, aside from the revival run of "Pal Joey," was the longest running show in the long career of the songwriters. "Jupiter" was based on Julian Thompson's "The Warrior's Husband," which gives you the plot of "By Jupiter" right off the bat. As for the time element, its characters hark back to mythology, focusing on the Amazons, who took life's initiatives that are usually left to men. This, of course, opened up to the librettests, which happened to be Rodgers & Hart themselves, a whole area of reverse


gags, which they didn't neglect to insert throughout the proceedings. But, the main thing "By Jupiter" accomplished was that it gave Broadway another Rodgers & Hart score, a feat of not only musical significance but historical as well, for "By Jupiter" was the last new show from the team (they wrote six songs for a revival of "A Connecticut Yankee" in 1943).

At its revival opening at New York's Theatre Four last week, the reverse gags are still there (and humorous) and so is the Rodgers & Hart score plus. That "plus" is the lovely "Wait Til You See Her," which was cut from the show shortly after the original opening. Two other ballads are among the score's chief assets, "Nobody's Heart" and "Carless Rhapsody." The best comedy item is the standard, "Everything I've Got," but "Jupiter Forbid," "Here's a Hand," "Life with Father" and "The Boy I Left Behind Me" do nothing to alter the impression of many that Larry Hart was the funniest lyric writer ever, and that Rodgers teamed Hart's words with delightful tunes. Yes, there were at least a half a dozen other R&H scores of more consistent quality, which means that

dozen other R&H scores of more consistent quality, which means that each of their songs was remarkable.

The new production bristles with zest and talent, especially with regard to singing voices and the comic style of Bob Dishy, the warrior's husband. Singing is particularly noteworthy from Robert R. Kaye, Jackie Alloway and Sheila Sullivan.

RCA Victor is recording the original caster. Undoubtedly, it will help perpetuate the myth that they don't write show songs like they used to. Certainly not like Rodgers & Hart.

Dr. Albert Sirmay Dies

- Dr. Albert Sirmay,

NEW YORK—Dr. Albert Sirmay, music editor for many of America's top songwriters and a composer (as well as conductor) in his own right, died last week (15) in New York Midtown Hospital at the age of 85.

A longtime friend of the late Max Dreyfus, founder of the music publishing firm of Chappell & Co., Inc., Dr. Sirmay joined that organization in 1927 and became chief music editor. He was a close friend, as well as the music editor, of such famous composers as Richard Rodgers, Cole Porter, George Gershwin, Jerome Kern, Jule Styne and almost every writer who composed for this firm. As a composer, himself, Dr. Sirmay became a writer member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) in 1933.

Born in Budapest, Hungary on July 2, 1882 Dr. Sirmay was educated at the Royal Academy of Music in Budapest and received his Doctorate of Music from the University of Budapest. He composed the scores for eleven musicals in Budapest and Vienna including Dancing Hussars, Alexandra, The Gingerbread Heart, etc. His London stage scores included Bamboula and Lady Mary; as well as Girl on the Film and Princess Charming which were also produced on Broadway. His score, Ripples, written with Oscar Levant, was produced on Broadway in 1930.

In addition to his music editing and composing, he edited many song books for the Chappell firm including A Treasury of Gilbert and Sullivan, Songs of the Rivers of America, A Treasury of Grand Opera, Rodgers & Harmerstein Song Book, Cole Porter Song Book, Jerome Kern Song Book and Lerner & Loewe Song Book.

ASCAP President Stanley Adams, upon learning of Dr. Sirmay's death, said: "All of us in the music field mourn the loss of Dr. Albert Sirmay, a gentle, talented music man. Many of our outstanding American composers relied upon his judgment and good taste in music matters. In addition to his own compositions, he was always ready to be helpful to his fellow composers in the production of their works. We shall miss him greatly."

Kaye's recent film credits include Otto Preminger's "Hurry Sundown" with music by Hugo Montenegro, "Triple Cross" (Warner Bros.) and "The Corrupt Ones" (Warner Bros.) with music by Georges Garvarentz and "A Man Called Dagger," an indie production from Lew Horwitz with music by Steve Allen. "The Hurry" tune has been cut by nine performers, including Harry Belafonte (Victor), Little Richard (Epic), Hugo Montenegro (Victor) and Jaxon Reese, a newcomer on Cameo Parkway. Tom Jones (Parrot) and Dusty Springfield (Philips) have cut "Triple Cross," while Maureen Arthur, to be seen in the film version of "How To Succeed ...," has cut "A Man Called Dagger" on a master yet to be sold.

For TV, Kaye did "I Dream Of Jennie" with music by Montenegro, and, with Nelson Riddle, Who?," a new NBC-TV comedy series which a town's sheriff will be killed off each week to allow a new star to play the role.

Kaye is still maintaining a New York staff for his various publishing companies.

Youngfolk Sign With Double-Shot

HOLLYWOOD-The Youngfolk, formerly with United Artists Records, have inked a long-term pact with Double-Shot Records. Complete Version Of Ruby Tape Released

HOLLYWOOD—The death of Jack Ruby on Jan. 3, 1967, propelled a Capitol Record documentary news album, "The Controversy," into national prominence and drew particular attention to one small four minute segment in which Ruby was interviewed at Parkland Hospital just prior to his death.

The portion of the tape included in the album was part of a 14-minute interview conducted with Ruby on Dec. 16, 1966. At the time of Mr. Ruby's death, the entire un-edited tape, which was recorded at Parkland Hospital, could not be released because:

1. It had not been equalized (noise level) for proper listening, and

2. It was in a safe deposit box in California and could not be played publicly without permission of the producer of the album who had solely edited the tape.

At that time Lawrence Schiller, producer of "The Controversy" album, chose not to release the un-edited version because he felt it would be improper to make the tape public during the family's mourning period.


At the end of the mourning period, steps were immediately taken to prepare the quality of tape and transcription for a non-commercial public release on Jan. 12, and the arrangements were made for the Ruby family's attorney, Elmer Gertz, to come to Los Angeles from Chicago to represent the family at that time.

Dirksen Cutting 2nd LP

NEW YORK-Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois returned to the recording studio on Jan. 21 to begin work on his second album. The senator has selected a group of inspirational readings, many taken from the Bible, for his new LP venture.

The album, like the first Dirksen recordings (the "Gallant Men" single and LP) will be produced by Arch Lustberg, director of special projects at Chappell & Co. under special assignment from M. A. Mangum Productions of New York. Chappell is also publisher of John Cavacas' score for the first Dirksen recordings.

Cavacas, director of publications at Chappell, is currently writing the score for the new album, the music for which is expected to be recorded in mid-Feb.



The Standells present a groovy grab bag of pop sounds including "Eleanor Rigby," "Last Train To Clarksville," "Black Is Black," and "Wild Thing." Good sales and plenty of radio action could be in store for this, the group's third LP venture. Should be especially popular with the teen set.



GREEN, GREEN GRASS OF HOME—Tom Jones—Parrot PA 61009/PAS 71009
Tom Jones, who after a long cold spell made a strong comeback with his single, "Green, Green Grass Of Home," follows up with a powerhouse LP that could send him all the way to the top. Among the numbers on this set are "A Taste Of Honey," "If Ever I Would Leave You," "Kansas City," and "When I Fall In Love." Could be a big one.



THE DOORS—Doors—Elektra EK/EKS-74007
This is the premier album for a bright new west-coast rock group whose first single, "Break On Through" has been making a lot of noise across the airwaves. In addition to "Break On Through" the set includes "Soul Kitchen," "The Crystal Ship," "Back Door Man," and I Looked At You." The Doors could really open wide with this one.



THE IMPOSSIBLE DREAM—Jerry Vale—Columbia CL 2583/CS 9383

Jerry Vale presents an album of romantic ballads. Featured on the disk are the title tune, "The Impossible Dream," from the stage hit "Man Of La Mancha"; "The Shadow Of Your Smile"; and "Strangers In The Night." The artist's smooth, robust vocal style is ideally suited to the warm love songs on the LP, and the package should find favor with the singer's many fans.



HEART & SOUL—Lorraine Ellison—Warner Bros. W/WS 1674
With this, her first album, Lorraine Ellison should greatly expand her stand of loyal fans. Highlights among the many fine tracks of the set are: "Stay With Me," her recent powerhouse single; "If I Had A Hammer"; and "Games That Lovers Play." Groovey from beginning to end, this package might be a runaway for the lark.



SNOOPY VS. THE RED BARON—The Royal Guardsmen—Laurie LLP 2038
Fans of the Royal Guardsmen's current chart single "Snoopy Vs. The Red Baron" should give an enthusiastic welcome to this LP of the same name. All the numbers on the album are in the same bag as "Snoopy." "The Battle Of New Orleans," "Alley Oop," "The Jolly Green Giant," and "Peanut Butter" should be of special interest to Guardsmen devotees.



THE MUSIC OF WALT DISNEY—Vista BV 2000 All of the songs in this LP are from Disney flicks, except for "It's A Small World," the theme of the "It's A Small World" New York World's Fair attraction now a part of Disneyland. Included in the tracks are "I'm Wishing," from "Snow White"; "Alive In Wonderland," from the film; and "Chim Chim Cheree," from "Mary Poppins." Many of the tunes on the album are from the original sound tracks of the movies. The package should be a huge success with Disney's multitudinous admirers.




DA CAPO—Love—Elektra EKS 74005

The talented artist projects a personal and magnetic style which commands the full attention of the listener. This set should add to the growing number of the singer's devoted fans.



MURDERERS' ROW—Original Soundtrack—Colgems COMO/COSO 5003

The original soundtrack from the flick, "Murderers' Row." The music is composed and conducted by Lalo Schifrin, the Argentine composer and jazz instrumentalist. The score backs up the action of the film with amorous and absorbing sounds. The audience which viewed "Murderers' Row" should be anxious to add this album to their record libraries. The LP should also find favor with movie music collectors in general.

The Surprise Package has a hit all wrapped up!





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




OUR COUNTRY 'TIS OF THEE—Arthur God-frey—RCA Camden CAL/CAS 1082

MORE THAN MUSIC—The Mystic Moods Orchestra—Philips PHM 200-231/PHS 600-231

Among the tracks are "Wednesday's Child," from "The Quiller Memorandum"; "A Man And A Woman," from the flick of the same name; and "Theme From 'The Sand Pebbles.'" This package should prove attractive to movie fans and good music lovers alike.



34:40 OF JOHN FRED AND HIS PLAYBOYS—John Fred & his Playboys—Paula LP/LPS 2193
Chanter John Fred leads his Playboys through a rousing, free-wheeling series of rockers on this LP. Included in the selections are "Knock On Wood," "I've Been Loving You Too Long," "Something's Going On," and "We Gotta Get Out Of This Place." Should be especially popular with the young set.




GIRL WATCHERS—Les & Larry Elgart—Columbia—CL 2633/CS 9433

THE BOSS MEN—Don Patterson with Sonny Stitt and Billy James—Prestige 7466
Popular organist Don Patterson should score quickly with this hard-driving LP. Assisted by alto saxophonist Sonny Stitt and drummer Billy James, Patterson swings out on "Diane," "Easy To Love," and "Big C's Rock," among others. Those digging Patterson's sound should find what they want on this one.



AFRO-JAZZIAC-Herbie Mann-Roulette R/SR-

AFRO-JAZZIAC—Herbie Mann Mann—Roulette R/SR-52122

Jazz flautist Herbie Mann offers a powerful selection of self-composed numbers on this set. Leonard Bernstein leads the London Symphony Orchestra in a performance of Mahler's aweinspiring Symphony No. 8. The conductor has a vast musical canvas at his disposal on this album, including a huge vocal contingent and a gigantic orchestra. Lovers of classical music should hasten to add this magnificent LP to their collections.



SAC Revenues Reach \$4.6 Million In '66

NEW YORK—Don Soviero, president of Shaw Artists Corp., has announced that his agency attained billings of \$4,650,000 in 1966. He predicted that in 1967 SAC's billings will be at least 25% over those of last year.

A reorganization of SAC and a pruning of its roster are the two factors to which Soviero attributed the increased revenue. He said, "I felt that we had a company that was antiquated in its personnel and attitude and therefore limited in the type of bookings it could secure as well as the type of artists it could represent. My first goal was to broaden the areas in which we could provide full agency representation—appearances on television, commercials on radio and TV, motion pictures, the theater, personal concerts and records. By retaining only those acts that were already moneymakers or had growth potential and were exclusively signed to us, we kept on all the artists that either produce good commissions now or who will justify our investment of time and effort. The acts that are presently carried at a loss are the newcomers to the business whom we feel, in the coming years, will more than make up for their present cost to us."

SAC today is the exclusive booking office for 68 performers including Ray Charles, Otis Redding, Bobby Hebb, the Drifters, Rufus Harley, Chuck Jackson, Fats Domino, and B. B. King.



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FOCUS ON JAZZ

It looks like the original Five Spot, maybe about two and a half times as large, and the layout is much better for seeing the musicians, but basically it's very much the same. The New Five Spot, which really isn't new in the strict sense of the word, is the third jazz club in New York City that has been owned and operated by the brothers, Termini, Joe and Iggie.

Every jazz soon has a certain flavor about it, and usually a colorful history. If there is a room in New York City that is the exemplification of a jazz club, none has worthier credentials than The New Five Spot Cafe. If there are jazz club owners who have been good friends to jazz musicians and audiences, again none are more worthy of recognition than the Termini brothers. Sure, there have been, and still are, others who have fought the fight for survival in this hazardous business, and have fought it well, without exploiting the jazz musician. There are men like Max Gordon, long-time operator of the renowned Village Vanguard, the Canterino brothers, Mike and Sonny, whose Half Note has earned the respect and admiration of performers and audiences, and Art D'Lugoff, who operates The Village Gate, which has been the home for many performers, jazz and non-jazz, alike. But today we pay homage to Joe and Iggie Termini and their New Five Spot Cafe, within whose walls they spend the major part of their waking hours. They're both ordinary guys, but in a very extraordinary way.

Up From the Bowery

Up From the Bowery

Their indoctrination to jazz came late in 1955 in the original Five Spot Cafe, when they first tried presenting live entertainment, mostly piano duos, or solo piano. Until then, The Five Spot had been just a neighborhood bar, located on Cooper Square, the uptown periphery of The Bowery. The Termini family, Joe, Iggie and their father before them, had been serving a neighborhood trade, and the geography dictated that it was several notches below what might be called an average neighborhood. Long after the jazz policy was instituted, it was not uncommon to see an ill-clad derelict wander into The Five Spot during a set by Thelonius Monk or Ornette Coleman, pause for a moment, then retreat to his more familiar haunt, the streets of the Bowery, where, in his low state, he had much more company. So, from this inauspicious beginning The Five Spot Cafe came into existence as a jazz emporium, and one which was to gain much respect from the entire jazz world.

Stature With Monk

Stature With Monk

Little by little The Five Spot, under the naive guidance of Joe and Iggie Termini, began to stretch its wings. Soon they were booking quartets, then quintets, then large groups. Sometimes they would feature two groups, so that the music was continuous, with very little time out between sets. Being a small room, it was not uncommon to see patrons lined up on the sidewalk, waiting to gain admission. One of the most attractive aspects of The Five Spot operation was the informality that prevailed. A large segment of the artist colony took The Five Spot to its bosom, and it became the place to meet, the place to commune. After about two years of operation as a jazz Club, a most significant booking was affected: Thelonius Monk was contracted to appear for the Terminis. Immediately this gave The Five Spot stature as a jazz Club. Joe and Iggie had scored a coup. It was hard to recall the last coup. It was hard to recall the last time Monk had played in a New York Club. The Mystique about Monk, coupled with his rare appearances made "standing room only" commonplace night after night for weeks at a time. With this kind of business The Five Spot was firmly established as a major jazz room in New York.

The Terminis prospered, but even

in the light of this prosperity, the climate of The Five Spot did not change. Prices weren't jacked up, as is so often the case when a room catches on and the number of customers exceeds the room's capacity. The trappings of The Five Spot weren't changed, nor were the waiters and their casual attire. The only difference you could detect was that the place was always crowded. Suddenly, many record companies did "location" recordings at The Five Spot. This was the place where things were happening. Where else in New York City could you hear Monk? Where else could you hear Monk? Where else could you hear Monk? Where else could you hear for his first New York appearance. Word of Coleman's exploits on the West Coast had filtered East, and these rumblings plus two recordings that Ornette had done on Contemporary, were enough to convince the brothers that it would be a good engagement. The rest is history because since Ornette Coleman appeared at The Five Spot the jazz world hasn't been the same. Once again the Termini brothers had upstaged their more experienced colleagues in the jazz club business.

The Jazz Gallery

Now, looking for new horizons, Joe and Iggie opened The Jazz Gallery which was located in the same general area of Manhattan, four blocks farther uptown and one block East Unfortunately, this turned out to be an ill-advised move. The Gallery was a much bigger and much more elaborate operation than what they had been accustomed to. Lighting engineers designers, big name bookings all contributed to the decline. The Jazz Gallery was operated concurrent with The Five Spot Cafe and whatever was being accomplished and earned at the smaller room was being poured into the new venture to keep it going. Ultimately, The Jazz Gallery had to be foresaken as an unwise undertaking. That meant all hands went back to the mother room, The Five Spot But now Joe and Iggie were informed that condemnation was in store for that condemnation was in store for the site of The Five Spot, as part of a face-lifting for Lower Manhattan All of which leads us to where they are now, The New Five Spot Cafe, just four blocks North of the original location, and just one block West of the ill-fated Jazz Gallery and for the benefit of those not familiar with New York City, on the corner of Third Avenue and St. Marks Place.

The New Five Spot

In The New Five Spot, Joe and Iggie have tried just about everything they know to make it a going proposition. They have staged Monday night specials, featuring painters who also play jazz. They have always been most co-operative in offering their premises in conjunction with worthy benefits, they continue to strive to give engagements to deserving musicians, often to their economic detriment. In essence, they remain nice gentle people in a business where these characteristics are suicidal. Joe and Iggie Termini are stickouts in The New York jazz scene, dwarfing most of their colleagues when it comes to consideration, appreciation and consternation regarding the plight of the jazz musician in New York City. The men who play jazz should rally round Joe and Iggie and lend them their every assistance, the better that they the brothers, may resist the final erosion which will drive them from the jazz world into something completely unrelated. The New York jazz Community will be much poorer with-

CHERRY HILL, PA.—The James Brown Show is one of the best buys you'll ever get for your money. Delivering the goods in such diverse areas as the big band sound, soul, and vaudevillian comedy, the show has something for just about anybody. Attendance figures would seem to back this up as the James Brown Show is reportedly breaking all records at the Latin Casino.

Patrons of this huge supper club are treated to their first glimpse of "Soul Brother No. 1" while he plays the organ during a swingin' big-bandwarm-up-the-audience session. Then, along comes the dancers (some of the best we've seen). Getting closer to the "Little Dynamo's" entrance now, we're treated to the groovey song stylings of a lovely femme due going

under the individual names of Vicki Anderson and Barbara Britt. Next comes a comedy act that just stepped off the stage at the old Palace Theatre, Butterbean and Daisey. True, fast-paced vaudvillian routines and they're FUNNY!

And suddenly he's there! James Brown is on stage wailing and moaning through such R&B workouts as: "Money Won't Change You," "Papa's Got A Brand New Bag," "Ain't That A Groove," "It's A Man's Man's Man's World," and his current King deck "Bring It Up." All these are interspersed with dance-like routines and bits with the Fabulous Flames. bits with the Fabulous Flames.

The James Brown Show is well worth seeing anytime you get a chance.

CHARLES AZNAVOUR

NEW YORK — Charles Aznavour, who can count on New York as one of his biggest markets for his recordings, is far from an imposing figure on stage, but his songs and his Gallic flair for the dramatic reveal a giant talent. Opening last Monday (16) at the Americana Hotel, Aznavour covered familiar ground, that is a selection of songs that he is best known for, both as an artist and writer. His material wears well, finding human fault in the lives and loves of his characters. It seems to one observer that Aznavour is reading more of his material in English, which is all to the better, since (1) one who isn't versed in French can understand them and (2) his English lyric writ-

ers are excellent.

While much of Aznavour's material depicts the humor that is often present within tragedy, there are several light-hearted songs, including "Formidable," a good swinger and "How To Try To Write A Song," which, unfortunately, gets lost in a wave of references to courtroom procedures.

There is little doubt, however, that among a growing following, Aznavour is establishing many of his songs as standards. Whether there are more than a handful of artists, if any, who can spread the gospel of Aznavour further and with greater dispatch is a problem that the Howie Richmond Organization, holders of these Aznavour songs, must contend with.

TOM RUSH

NEW YORK--Elektra's Tom Rush breezed onto the stage in front of a capacity Town Hall crowd on Jan 6th. Backed by a group of excellent musicians that included Bruce Langhorn on guitar, Rush opened up with "I'll Turn Your Money Green" and kept up the pace with funky offerings of mostly-Blues 'til the end of the concert.

Rush deviated from the Blues bag a few times during the program, once for "The Circle Game" and later for "Urge For Going." Both of these tunes are by the Canadian songstress, Janie Mitchell. A Turneresque version of "Duncan And Brady" and a virtuoso performance of "Panama Express" were highlights of a show that would delight any folk or Blues fan.

LANA CANTRELL

NEW YORK—As she herself noted, Lana Cantrell is down-under despite the fact that she's not in her native Australia. It's not a fantastic feat of physics, but the fact that she's now singing in that cavern known as the Copacabana, a fairly steep downstairs climb from street level. This all sounds ominous, but RCA Victor Records' bet on stardom gives the room a sunny disposition derived from talent and youth (she's 22). Attired in a gown that's a striking marriage of Mod and formality (plus a Sassoon hairstyle), she starts things rolling with a daring, mannered ballad reading of "I'm All Smiles," rather than some it's-a-good-day-for-singing-a-song pick-me-up. She is essentially a good-music voice, although a pretty

"Sunny" opening soon rocks vibrantly. Since she's playing second-fiddle to insult comic Jack E. Leonard, her act isn't long (about eight songs worth). Her "If You Go Away" performance indicates the evergreen quality of the newer foreign number, as does her sprightly "You'd Better Love Me While You May," which is one of the neglected items from the musical "High Spirits." She also offers "Stay," a moderate singles success for her and hardly up to the general high quality of her program. Her act is topped off with what could have been her opening song, "Mame." It's a rousing encore stand. The impression is that Lana will be back at the Copa as a headliner. It'll be a pleasure to see and hear more of her.

BETTY RHODES, PRENTICE MINNER, SONNY MARS

HOLLYWOOD—Chirp, male vocalist and comic add up to one miss, one hit and a fielder's choice at the Playboy's Playroom with the club batting only a mediocre .333 this past week.

Lead off slot goes to Betty Rhodes, former actress turned musical comedy performer and currently a nightclub single. Petite and flame tressed, she's attractive but flounders without direction or point of view. Triple threat attempt (songstress-impersonator-comedienne) touches first with a dramatic piece from "Irma La Douce" but fails to make second or third. Particularly weak, partly because it's "old hat" and even more since it misses its mark, is a long winded Judy Garland impression.

Prentice Minner, on the other hand, practically throws away his Mrs. Miller "take off" on "Downtown." And it's a gem—unexpected, devastating and hilarious. It's not merely the highlight of the evening. It's alone

worth the cost of a key. But aside from this two minute twinkle, Minner exhibits an expansive range on ballads and a sure sense of rhythm as well. A voice major at Washington U in St. Louis, youth was discovered by Eddie Fisher and booked into Grossinger's last year. This, his first Playboy appearance, could lead to better things—a record contract, for example. He's ready.

Sonny Mars is the closer, a comic who scores well with the crowd but manages to mix only a few new gags along with somethings borrowed and too many blues. Style ingratiates so you can't help wishing he'd reach for more Mars and less Hackett-Berle and other peers.

Singers are capably backed by the Joe Parnello Trio. But inspiration is lacking, possibly because Parnello is away for two weeks, laboring as pianist for Keely Smith at the Plaza.

LOU RAWLS

NEW YORK—It took a long time for Lou Rawls to make the big time and it's always a source of wonder that a talent like his could go virtually unnoticed until he was discovered about a year ago. His recent Carnegie Hall concert only lent further emphasis to that feeling.

To say that the overflow crowd was disappointed when he finally left the stage at the close of the performance would be to understate a fact. Like many enjoyable things, the concert left the majority of the audience wanting more. Ticket-holders were firmly entrenched in their seats and as far as many were concerned, the conclusion of the show might well have been delayed 'til a later hour.

From his opening treatment of "Stormy Monday" to his final bow, Lou Rawls was soaring. They used to

call him an up-and-coming jazz singer, but now they call him an R&B artist. The fact is he's both, and he's more. Somewhere there are invisible lines between jazz and blues and R&B, and Lou Rawls does a delicate balancing act along those lines, now leaning this way and now leaning that, but never falling from his perch. Like the man on the high wire, he causes a hush when he sings the blues and offers light relief with his rapid-fire banter. If there were any question before this, there should no longer be a doubt about the up-and-coming jazz singer making good.

The bill also included a pleasant young songstress named Patience

young songstress named Patience Valentine, whose style, unfortunately, came across as being more affected

The big social event of the London distributor trip to England, Sir Edward and Lady Lewis, Thursday night black tie dinner at London's posh Savoy Hotel, was a sentimental climax to a magnificent convention. Sir Edward gave thanks in the form of grace before dinner and an atmosphere of warmth, sentimentality and thanks prevailed throughout the evening. The witty Sir Edward addressing his guests briefly scanned fond memories of the past two decades on this occasion of London Records' 20th anniversary. He pointed to the Hartstones, his first distributors, and Sherman Koening and George MacDuff, other charter member distributors. He pointed to his long association and friendship with Gene Freidman, Tutti Camarata and Joe Coughi of Hi Records. He mentioned his first confrontation with discounting and Sam Goody. He remembered when a young lady asked him for his autograph because she thought he was the bandleader Ted Lewis. He spoke about the time in 1934 when he almost acquired the whole Columbia label including its plant in Bridgeport for only 75 thousand dollars and how he turned down the American Decca Label (Brunswick then) because he doubted it was worth 35 thousand dollars. He thanked the distributors for the merchandise they ordered while here and praised the fine relations between our two countries via the Decca Company. 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

Carol Channing, star of "Hello, Dolly!," is heard singing two songs in the album which also unites the musical talents of Elmer Bernstein, who composed the background musical score; Andre Previn, who scored the musical numbers; and eight-time Academy Award winners Sammy Cahn and James Van Heusen, who wrote the title song and "The Tapioca," one of the hit numbers in the picture.

The new 1500 Deluxe Album Series

The new 1500 Deluxe Album Series will be given distinctive packaging that will include a specially designed color souvenir booklet individually tailored for each release. The "Millie" booklet contains behind-the-scenes information and photography of the production and its stars—Julie Andrews, Mary Tyler Moore, Carol Channing, James Fox, John Gavin and Beatrice Lillie.

George Roy Hill directed "Millie," a Universal picture, produced by Ross Hunter from an original screenplay by Richard Morris.

GRT Gets Viva Tapes

NEW YORK—The Viva Records company has given tape rights to its LP catalog to General Recorded Tape. The announcement was made jointly by Ed Silvers, of Viva Records, and Alan J. Bayley, president of GRT. "Rhapsodies For Young Lovers" (The Midnight String Quartet) and the new Winchester-inspiring Rudy Vallee album "Hi-Ho Everybody," currently on the charts, are being rushed into 8-track, 4-track and open reel production by GRT.

Rabinowitz On **Business Tour**

NEW YORK-Sol Rabinowitz, director of Records Acquisition and Publishing Operations for CBS International, has left New York for a month-long round of conferences with CBS' subsidiaries and licensees in Europe.

The first stop on Rabinowitz's itinerary was London. From there he traveled to Italy to attend the 17th annual San Remo Festival. On Jan. 29th, he will begin a three-day series of meetings in Frankfurt. The remaining stops on his schedule include Cannes, from Feb. 1 through 4; Amsterdam, Feb. 5 through 7; and Paris, on Feb. 8th and 9th.

Stones Find NY Rocky

NEW YORK — The Rolling Stones came to New York Jan. 12 to appear on CBS-TV's "Ed Sullivan Show" and ran into trouble with Sullivan over the propriety of one of their songs. Sullivan demanded that the group substitute another song for "Let's Spend The Night Together," the lyrics of which he considered offensive, and the Stones, by way of compromise, altered the lyrics and changed the title to "Let's Spend Some Time Together." Inside the theater a group of singing nuns who were to appear on the same show listened and observed, "What difference does it make if the lyrics mean the same thing?' and outside a crowd of teen pickets protested the change.

The Stones left New York Jan. 16 to begin preparations for their forthcoming debut appearance on Britain's "Palladium" TV show Feb. 22. Following this outing the Stones are scheduled to appear on several segments of the "Top Of The Pops" TV

show as well.

Premier Talent; Spiraling Upward

NEW YORK — Three years ago, Premier talent was less than a gleam in the eye of its founder, Frank Barsalona; today it can probably be described as one of the fastest-growing major booking agencies in the country. Barsalona left his post with the giant G.A.C. organization in 1964 to strike out on his own, and he set up Premier Talent as a one-man, one-office operation. At the time of this writing his offices at 200 W. 57 St. are comprised of two floors, staffed with over 30 people.

The basic reason for the phenomenal P.T.A. growth pattern is fairly simple, as Barsalona explains it. "We keep the groups happy," he says, "and we keep the promoters happy."

The art of keeping both promoters and artists happy is a tricky one indeed, especially when it comes to making work for artists without hit records. But, instead of it being a problem, this art has become a Premier forte. By using his stronger names as a wedge, Barsalona has been able to keep his lesser name acts working regularly. And good acts can be re-booked without benefit of hit records, or even recording contracts.

The booking of acts not known in the recording world serves a two-fold purpose (above and beyond the collecting of booker's fees). First, it establishes a following for the artist or group out in the field prior to the release of a record, thus paving the way for the disk. At least one case of a group whose career was launched in this manner regards the Young Rascals. The boys were booked constantly in the New York area and built up a tremendous following even before they had released their first Atlantic record, "Good Lovin'." When the record was released, it shot

straight to the top of the charts. Although the Rascals' New York following was not strictly responsible for the success of the record, it certainly had a hand in the matter.

The second purpose served by the booking of a no-name act is to give the artist seasoning and experience against the day when he becomes a recording success. In the contemporary market, when records can make overnight stars, many an act sits way up on the charts but is completely lost in front of a 'live' audience. Constant bookings before disk success can mold a performer into an acceptable, if not a polished, 'live' performer.

success can mold a performer into an acceptable, if not a polished, 'live' performer.

When he says that his agency keeps the artists happy he underscores the statement by showing how many of his signed acts have been firm promoters of the firm and have brought new acts to the fold. Of course a good percentage of the talent on the street is not willing to sign blindly on the dotted line. Barsalona believes there's nothing like action to bring them around. After a few bookings through Premier without benefit of a contract, the acts are generally ready to join the ranks.

After the acts have signed, it's up to the various departments in the agency to "keep them happy." The departments include TV, college, locale & lounge and commercials. Cooperation between the various departments is essential, if not vital to the success of the organization. Barsalona insists on this sort of cooperation, for, without it, the acts suffer. With it, the acts are kept as busy as possible in all areas. And busy acts are happy acts.

In a business where ideas are good

are happy acts.

In a business where ideas are good only in a direct proportion to the amount of business they create, it can certainly be said that Premier has the right idea.








THE COUNTRY GENTLEMAN—Carl Smith—Columbia CL 2610/CS 9410

MILAN—"Scala Reale," the biggest contest organized by the Italian Radio & TV company, in a series of 14 weekly transmissions, demonstrated that in spite of the world "beat" trend, Italy remains the country of "melody."

Winner of the song contest was Claudio Villa, the most famous Italian "traditional" singer, who presented the wellknown standard, "Granada." 734,818 Italians voted for him: for one of the most traditional and most popular artists among Italian performers, Claudio Villa (Fonit-Cetra). He has been in music for more than 23 years. His voice is familiar to all Italians, both young and old. He won singing a "traditional" song: "Granada," from a Southern repertoire. This will serve to explain the reason why the disk "Granada" sung by Claudio Villa, and released by Fonit-Cetra, is now listed among the top best sellers of the Italian record market.

This is a confirmation of the fact that, in spite of the changes, and of the new trends introduced on our musical market, Italy remains primarily a country connected with a "melodic" tradition. The 14 weekly transmissions of this contest, coupled with a national lottery, have well demonstrated this fact.

Top young artists took part in it: divided into 16 different teams, each team had the most popular artist of the group as a leader. Each week, one team was opposed to the other, and public in possession of the lottery ticket, was invited to vote. The losing team was excluded from the contest.

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Ashkenazy Wins **Edison Award**

The award was handed to Ashkenazy (Clairon Bar, Hilversum) by Piet Beishuizen, president of the Dutch Collective Committee for Gramophone Records' Campaigns, in the presence of Phonogram's managing director Jack Haslinghuis, the company's deputy manager Rein Klaassen, classical advisor Otto Glastra van Loon, heads of Commercial, Advertising and Press Depts Leo Boudewijns, Henk Schippers and Rolf Ten Kate, and a number of other Phonogram staff-members. Ashkenazy and his wife admired the sculpture and thanked their Dutch friends. On Dutch Delta label, the brand new Tee Set single, including "Don't You Leave" and the composition of talentful composer Hans van Eyck, "Long Ago," sold a record number of 10,000 in the first week.

On Roulette, there is the remarkable release of the new Sonny Stitt LP: "Sonny Stitt Plays The Varitone" on which LP Stitt plays a completely new kind of electronic saxophone called the Varitone.

Recently CBS recorded two brand new items for Les Cruches' third single: "It's Always Me," a Vaudeville sound, and "Nose For Trouble." CBS has high hopes that this single of the popular group Les Cruches, whose in-person appearances are highly sucessful, will hit our local market.

Now in its 8th consecutive week on the local charts, Donovan's "Mellow Yellow" is blossoming into a true follow-up of "Surshine Superman." His superb "Sunshine Superman" album, released late in October, is still one of the hottest on the teen scene.

Biggest Tamla-Motown smash in The Netherlands since years is the exciting Four Tops platter "Reach Out, I'll Be There," on the charts since mid-October. Now past its peak, "Reach Out" is slowly bowing out in favor of new Tops deck "Standing In The Shadow Of Love." The Detroit foursome is so hot in the local market that a Pete Felleman compiled reissue of two older hits ("It's The Same Old Song" & "Baby, I Need Your Loving") also made the best sellers listings, whilst their brand new album "Four Tops Live" is the fastest-selling Tamla-Motown LP ever! Things definitely look bright for Berry Gordy's label, as both Stevie Wonder (first with "Blowin' In The Wind," now with "A Place In The Sun") and the Supremes ("You Can't Hurry Love" and "You Keep Me Hangin' On") are on the chart continuously.

Important aditions to Artone's locally-produced international line have been announced this week. Leo Fuld, generally recognized as one of the truly great interpreters of Jewish song, can be heard at his very best on his initial album for the label. Recorded last year, LP contains fourteen beloved songs: "My Yiddish Mama," "Ich Hab Dich Zu Fiel Lieb," "Shalom Israel," and others. Set also features his own "Wo Ahin Soll Ich Geh'n" ("Where Can I Go") which brought him world-wide acclaim in the early fifties as well as a record sale of well over one million copies. Package has already been obtained by CBS Records in Israel and France for imediate release in these countries. Further new Artone releases in the popular long play field include a first package by Jan Burgers' New Orleans Syncopators entitled "Hey Look Me Over" and featuring danceable readings of fourteen Dixieland classics, as well as an album of 16 Latin American favorites played and sung by Mexican Trio Los Amadores. A fourth LP issue of De Maskers, entitled "Beat Meets R&B," includes the guitar-combo's internationally acclaimed rendition of "Batman TV-Theme."

Artone's Benelux release of "Friday On My Mind" by the Easybeats, recorded in London for the United Artists label, has become a blockbuster in this territory. Platter reached the No. 1 slot on the local charts this month and continues to sell very well. Later this month the group is due for several in-person dates and a live appearance on Bob Rooyens "Moef Ga Ga" TV show. Other Artone releases from the UA catalog include Bobby Goldboro's "Blue Autumn" and Jay & the Americans' "Raining Is My Sunshine.

Local oldies reach fame again these days. The charts include more and more of them, modernized, of course, but bringing money to composers who might long ago have forgotten the tunes they once wrote. Recorded by Matadorerne (the Matadors) on Metronome, the tune has become a top seller here. Both tunes used to be published here once, but in both cases, the publishing houses are no longer in business and the composers control their tunes themselves.

Decca Records are celebrating a double victory with "Green Green Grass Of Home." Not only is it Decca's fastest-selling record ever, but Tom Jones is the first British artist to achieve a million-selling record with sales confined to Britain alone. Previous claimants have been Bill Haley with "Rock. Around The Clock," Elvis Presley with "it's Now Or Never," and Harry Belafonte with "Mary's Boy Child." The company's sales in December, 1966, were the highest ever and the month of January is expected to be even better. Apart from "Green Green Grass," other big sellers for Decca include Val Doonican's "What Would I Be" which has reached the half million mark and "I'm A Believer" by the Monkees who have sold over a quarter of a million in five days of release. LP's too, have had their share of the limelight with strong sales of "Big Hits" by the Rolling Stones. During the past year "The Sound Of Music" soundtrack album has sold over 750,000. Decca have just ended their five-day London Records distributors meeting during which time some 140 executives of London Records plus distributors converged on London for the second Decca-London convention. A full report will be published by Cash Box in the next issue.

Jack Magraw of Screen Gems is highly delighted that his company has the rights to all the Monkees' material. Re reports that apart from the single "I'm A Believer" which must be a number one, their first Monkees album to be released at the end of the month already has advance orders totalling 40,000. Magraw has also been having discussions with Burt Bacharach and Hal David who are responsible for the score of Columbia's picture "Casino Royale" (a spoof on James Bond) starring Peter Sellers, David Niven, Ursula Andress, Orson Welles, etc. Recordings are being lined up for the title song "The Look Of Love" and "Let The Love Come Through." London premier is set for April 13th. Another film under the Screen Gems aegis is "To Sir With Love" starring Sydney Poitier. Don Black and Mark London are responsible for the tit

the film and plan to record as a single for Fontana. The Mindbenders also perform "It's Getting Harder All The Time" written by Charles Albertine and Ben Raleigh.

Justifiably Jack Baverstock is elated with the success achieved by Fontana Records since he started the label in 1958 and which reached its zenith in 1966. During the past year Fontana had 271 chart entries on 35 records by 14 artists. Broken down it means that for 51 weeks they had 16 Records in the Top Ten; 12 records in the Top 5 for 35 weeks; 11 records in the Top 3 for 27 weeks and 21 records in the Top 20 for 52 weeks. They also achieved No. 1 status for 7 weeks. To follow this fantastic achievement, Baverstock has plans for 1967 which include acquiring more songs and yet more talent. Already he has signed up an American group, the Misunderstood, whose first single "I Can Take You To The Sun" has been released to critical acclaim, and he is determined to get Julie Felix into the charts with her Donovanpenned "Saturday Night." He also has great faith in Kiki Dee, who is already established internationally but has yet to find record fame in Britain.

Latest Board of Trade figures show that manufacturers' sales of gramophone records in October, valued at £2.287,000 were 6% lower than in October, 1965. Sales for the home market fell by 8½%, but sales for export, representing 18% of the total, rose by 6%. Total production of records in October amounting to 7,630, was 17% lower than in the same period of 1965. Output of 78 r.p.m. and 45 r.p.m. records fell by 57% and 35½% respectively, but that of 33½ r.p.m. records rose by over 20%. For the period January to October, 1966, total output of gramophone records was down by 6% compared with the same period in 1965. Production of 78 r.p.m. and of 45 r.p.m. records fell by 14 and 15% respectively but that of 33½ r.p.m. records rose by 10%. Sales of records in the period were 1% above those in the corresponding period of 1965, but sales for export increased by 11%.

It has already sold over 300,000 copies in France for Philips Records much to the delight of sub-publisher Gerard Tournier. This is the first time that Francois has recorded an unknown Eng-

U.A. star Bobby Goldsboro will appear at the San Remo Festival and, en route to Italy from America, Goldsboro will visit Britain for a few days for personal appearances promoting his current release "Fun At The Fair."

Although a lowering of the customer's buying power is expected for 1967 due to inflation and a smaller increase in salaries than in prices, most companies have set higher sales goals for this year, sometimes even about 30% over last year totals. The main point for obtaining this are the widening of marketing elements (in some cases, through "clubs," in other, via special deals with companies working in other areas) and budget series. It seems that, once more, the record priced at 60% of the regular tab is well established and seems to be here to stay. This could affect the sales estimates, but it is expected that 1967 will be a hard but good year.



The new firm, Stigwood-Yaskiel International G.M.B.H. has already set up new offices at Koerner Strasse 13 in Hamburg 39, Germany, telephone 2792081. The basis of the organization is a partnership between the Robert Stigwood organization of Great Britain and Larry.

Larry is managing director of the firm. International director is the well-known Mr. Peter Knight, Jr., who recently left his post at Pye Records to take over the new position in Hamburg. The press-artist promotion work is divided between Daniela Holobowsky, who worked at Vogue together with Larry and who will take care of North Germany, and Gaby Richt, former head of promotion, production and publicity for Barclay Records in Germany and Berlin for the firm. Press officer is Jurgen Otterstein who left a top position with the teen-oriented magazine OK to take over the post.

Two music publishing firms have been set up, and they are Rudolph Slezak Musikverlag and "Auf Wiedersehn" Musik KG with former Aberbach man Rudy Slezak acting as general manager for both companies.

The organization will handle promotion and publicity as well as exploitation of artists and certain catalogs for several major German record firms on an independent individual artist and catalog basis. The firm will, for instance, pick the releases of foreign product for this market from the product available. The firm already has contracts to do production for major labels and will also work at acquiring foreign catalogs for their clients followed up by promotion of the catalogs. The same applies to acquiring individual artists, foreign and local, for their clients with the organization mainly handling promotion. Future plans call for an artist management agency set up on similar lines as those already in existence in England.

The first records getting the full promotion treatment by the Stigwood-Yaskiel International are "Happy Jack" from the Who, "I Feel Free" from the Cream, "Nashville Cat" from the Lovin' Spoonful, "Hello, Hello" from Sopwith Camel and Sandy Posey with "Sing

Editorial

The Dying Dime

It took approximately ten years for the nation's operators to change over from nickel play to dime. In that decade the cost of the machines went up, transportation and labor charges went up, the number of locations began to shrink, and radio cut close to the bone in nabbing what had been an almost exclusive iukebox audience.

In the last five years in New York alone, the desire to tax has got such a hold on the state and city governments that a belch from Albany or City Hall signals not contented, well fed-tax coffers, but simply an appetite for more. Cigarette vendors were nearly levied to the wall and the case now pending, concerning jukebox sales taxes, centers not on the court's power to strike down what operators consider an unfair tax, but only the court's opinion as to whether or not the tax law applies to them. Nowhere does the court or will the court attempt to consider or make judgment upon (1) the necessity for new taxes and (2) the morals behind them.

Now through all this our friend the dime, while losing its silver skin, had in the meantime gone down the hill in value. Call it inflation or the war in Viet Nam or the Price of Prosperity or what you will. It is simply not worth very much today.

If all the major cities of the nation decided to tax jukebox sales on anything over dime play, it would be regrettable and in some cases destructive. But consider also that jukebox operators are not making that

much money on dime play alone. What is the outcome? The outcome is a tightrope between a rapidly devaluating dime and a possibly taxed quarter. Somewhere between the two the operator must find his take-home money and his business expenses. What then is the solution, or what is the least onerous compromise?

There have been calls from phonograph and games manufacturers for increasing the single play price from one dime to fifteen cents or two plays for a quarter. One games manufacturer has already built models with the fifteen cent chute, with an optional dime

It would seem that the hesitancy of the operator to up his price and the race between the dime and the quarter to see which becomes profitably extinct and taxably passable could be reconciled quickly and effectively by the phonograph manufacturers. Simply build next year's models with optional two for-aquarter chutes. Since the manufacturers have pointed the way in almost everything else, even merchandising, this move would seem to be the most time-saving.

If there are objections that such a coin chute would be open territory for tax-hungry governments, then consider that said governments usually tax what they feel like taxing, without fine definitions of who it hurts. If they don't tax it, of course, it's extra money. A little extra. But it seems the only alternative to the dying dime.

minute!

There are two exciting, new bowling and scoring games introduced in "Park Lane" six-player puck bowler. In the 'Keep Striking' feature when a player makes a strike he keeps shooting until he finally misses. This, according to Scheer, adds greatly to the suspense and thrill factor in coinoperated bowling.

Little LPs This Month In Release For January:

As part of their continuing cooperative program with various record companies, Seeburg has released six Little LPs this month covering various music fields. The reviews below are given on the basis of probable jukebox market potentiality, but location preferences should be kept in mind. Operators should consult their local one-stops or local record company distributing offices for the availability of these or any other Little LPs desired.

JIMMY SMITH

"Hoochie Coochie Man" Verve SLV8667 * Seeburg Part No. 1094
Considered to be the top-ranking jazz organist, Jimmy Smith had some national chart success with "Hoochie Coochie Man" and this Verve little LP features the complete five minute track. The tune is from the prolific pen of blues writer Willie Dixon, and was originally a hit by Muddy Waters. Smith takes the vocal in his rough, gravel-like tones at a blues tempo, then turns confidently to the organ to bat out several choruses. "One Mint Julep" scored by Oliver Nelson in a tribute to the Ray Charles instrumental, features Smith pulling pranks in Part I and getting down to the nitty-gritty in Part II. John Lee Hooker's "Boom Boom" is more or less an organ solo with orchestra fillins, Smith mumbling a la Earl Hines as he explores his instrument. These sides are examples of the turning of jazz musicians to rock and blues numbers, and although they may call it "soul music" it is simply Roots with a few new Leaves grafted on. Not to take away from Smith and his comrade Nelson, however These are good sides and should sell like crazy in any R & B location in any large city. Ops should pick up.

HANK WILLIAMS

"The Legend Lives Anew": MGM SLM4377 * Seburg Part No. 1091
Since Williams' death in 1953 the masters he left behind for MGM have been repackaged time and time again. Perhaps this little LP represents the ultimate in repackaging—Williams' vocal tracks from the original 1940s and 1950s masters with strings and bump-bump rhythm added on. It is not so much an attempt to update Williams, as the work he did is considered immortal by country musicians and fans—but an effort to update his backing, or simply another way to sell a product that's been around for a long time. The same technique was applied to Caruso recordings in the 1930s. Almost anything by Williams is immediately soaked up by country fans and with country music rapidly crossing or happily straddling the border between itself and cosmopolitan "pop," this little LP should go on any jukebox in a country location, or any location that has country fans. Selections include "I'm So Lonesome I Could Cry," "You Win Again," "Lovesick Blues" and three others. Sure programming.

ERNEST TUBB

"Sings Country Hits Old and New": Decca DL 74772 * Seeburg Part No.

Mr. Tubb takes it easy through six vocals while the Texas Troubadors play the usual country background. Tubb has been a consistant seller over the years and receives happy yells whenever he appears on stage. Safe programming for country locations. Songs: "Memphis," "Waitin' In Your Welfare Line," "I'm Gonna Tie One On Tonight" and three more.

CONNIE FRANCIS

"Movie Greats of the 60's": MGM SLM 4382 * Seeburg Part No. 1090 Gone to the brass and lush violins is Connie Francis, taking six tunes from last decade's movies. "Strangers In The Night," "Forget Domani," "Second Time Around," "I Will Wait

For You," "Call Me Irresponsible" and "Somewhere My Love." Miss Francis takes "Second Time Around" a la Mae West. Interesting. Program where desired.



CHICAGO — Barney Ross, former welterweight and lightweight world boxing champion and longtime associate of many members of the coin machine industry, died of cancer last Wed. (Jan. 18th) at his Lakeshore Drive home. Ross was 57 last Dec. 23rd.

The former champion had many friends in the coin trade who came to his aid several months back when news of his illness was first made known. They called it the 'Barney Ross Fund' and chose Runyon Sales Company's Lou Wolberg to spearhead the campaign in New York.

Wolberg, whose sadness was evident during a phone conversation last Wed., advised that a benefit Barney Ross Fund wrestling match (starring Bruno San Martino) was to have taken place at the Newark Armory last Sat. night (21st). "The match will still go on," Wolberg had stated, "and whatever proceeds we gain will go to Barney's widow Cathy."

The Ross Fund was co-sponsored by boxing vet Lou Halper who at one time fought Ross in a match in Philadelphia's Convention Hall.

Barney's affiliation with the coin industry was prompted by his association with Wolberg, former Runyon chief Barney Sugerman and with

promoter Milton Blackstone. Ross spent a great deal of his time helping in whatever way he could to further the cause of industry public relations by attending many of our conventions and other functions and speaking on our behalf. His memory in the trade will survive for many years to come. Ross, a successful fighter in the Chicago of the 20's, turned professional in 1929, just after his 19th birthday. He assumed the name of Ross to keep his ailing mother (Mrs. Isidore Rosofsky) from finding out. Barney's professional career lasted less than nine years. But when it was over, he had earned a place in boxing's Hall of Fame, a rating in the top 10 welterweights of all time and about \$500,000 according to the N.Y. Times.

To many, his World War II years were just as memorable as his ring career, having fought gallantly in the Pacific Theater, ultimately earning the Silver Star and the pride of a grateful nation.

Funeral services were scheduled to be held Friday, Jan. 20th, at the Original Weinstein & Sons Chapel here on the North Side. Interment would follow in Rosemont Park





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Theft Losses Give New Cause For Insurance: Spindell

CHICAGO—"The increasing losses suffered by the theft of equipment in many parts of the country make it almost mandatory for insurance of this type to be carried." So said Manfred S. Spindel, president of Spindel Insurance Agency, Inc., who specializes in serving the coin machine and vending trade

"In the games field a lack of permanent serial numbers, which cannot be removed or eradicated, further encourages the theft of this type of equipment," he added. "Good business dictates carrying proper insurance on equipment as well as the operator protecting himself against claims by insuring himself and his company for liability and property damage."

Spindel's company handles what he calls Credit Life Insurance, when major items of merchandise are purchased in the installment plan.

"It is important to take out credit life insurance to protect your family and your business, so that an unpaid balance is not left in the event of the insured's death." About \$280,000,000 in debts were repaid in 1965 by credit life insurance, reports the Institute of Life Insurance; or \$27,000,000 more than the previous year. Figures, Spindel said, for 1966 are not yet available.

"However, the Spindel Insurance Agency, Inc., which writes credit life insurance on games, music and vending equipment, paid death claims to distributors on the lives of operators who died during 1966 in excess of \$400,000. The increasing importance of this type of coverage to the operator and the distributor is most evident," Spindel asserted.

Spindel further explained that this credit life insurance program for the coin machine and vending industries is handled under GM&V Corp., a division of Spindel Insurance Agency.

Where Will NAMA Meet This Year?

A Spark — And McCormick Place Downed By Fire

CHICAGO—The shocking scene viewed by the unbelieving Cash Box reporter at McCormick Place early Monday morning, January 16, after the huge exposition center was practically destroyed by flames was horrifying, to state it mildly. The blaze, which started at about 2:10 a.m. in an exhibit booth of the National Housewares Manufacturers Association, scheduled to open last Monday morning, spread so rapidly that it was impossible for some 475 firemen to contain it

Edward J. Lee, general manager of the famed convention palace, declared that the huge hall, built at a cost to the City of Chicago of \$40,000,000, was a total loss. He added that due to increased construction costs it undoubtedly would require more than that sum to duplicate the center. He

leaned more to the \$50,000,000 mark overall.

It should be noted that the building was supposed to be fireproof. Lee said: "The building itself did not burn. The contents caught fire, and the intensity of the unbelievable heat twisted the structural steel. When the roof popped and the walls caved in it was a direct result of the expansion of the steel."

The loss to the city in convention dollars is so vast that it is almost too difficult to comprehend. A fair estimate by some responsible observers place it in the neighborhood in an overall loss of more than \$300,000,000.

An estimated 175,000,000 persons were expected to attend conventions at McCormick Place between now and April of next year, according to Irv (Kup) Kupcinet, of the Chicago Sun-Times.


